Woodville Receives \$780,000 EDA Grant

The city of Woodville has netted a \$780,000 economic development grant to extend its sewer lines to a 146-acre industrial park north of town.

U.S. Sen Phil Gramm notified city officials last week that the city will receive the \$780,000 U.S. Economic Development Administration grant. The city had applied for an \$830,000 grant.

"We should receive the paperwork in about two weeks," said City Manager Walt Davis. He added that the grant will enable

the city to extend its sewer lines to service the Tyler County Industrial Park, owned by the Tyler County Industrial Corporation, a group of private individuals.

Keller Industries of Texas, manufacturer of aluminum products, and Texas Metal Works, which produces metal forgings, will be provided with additional sewer capacity to support their operations at the park. Keller employs approximately 300 people, and Texas Metal Works 18.

"This assistance is important to the economic growth of Woodville and

all of Tyler County," said Gramm in a news release issued by his office. "The area has worked hard to identify new economic development tools, and the improvements to the industrial park there will pay handsome dividends in the future."

"The hard work and dedication of local officials and business leaders was crucial to obtaining this grant, which will go a long way in creating new jobs in Woodville," said Gramm.

Davis said that the present sewer system was built two years ago and is running a little under 50-percent capacity.

"This way (with the grant) we have an opportunity to put Keller on the system without expanding the plant," said Davis. He added that the city's cost for the sewer line expansion project is \$350,000, but in the long run it will save money, since the plant itself won't have to be expanded.

Davis said that if Woodville should experience a lot of population growth in the future, and the plant reached 70-percent capacity, then the present system would need

to be expanded. That is why, he said, the city has already applied for a low-interest rate loan for that purpose.

"We are just preparing for the future, because Woodville is going to grow," said Davis. "We don't need that loan now but we want to be on the list so that when it happens we're ready."

Davis added that economic development grants are no longer available like they were when the city applied for this one, and that the city is fortunate to have received it.

Proposed Budget Cuts Spark Controversial Meeting

An overflow crowd attended the Warren Independent School District Board of Trustees meeting on March 18, to voice their objections to budget cuts recommended for consideration by Superintendent Bettie Yates.

Ed Killam of Warren presented a petition to the board with 796 signatures of people against the closing of Warren Middle School and Fred Elementary School.

In addressing the board, Killam stated, "We appreciate the efforts of you and of the superintendent in trying to reduce the deficit, but feel that this short-term move would result in more buildings and more taxes in the future."

"We have formed a committee and hope to come up with some alternative suggestions," he added. "We would like to request a meeting with the board not earlier than Monday, April 10, to discuss these alternatives."

In reply to Killam's statement, Board President Walter McAlpin said, "We would like to be able to work together and come up with mutually agreeable ways to trim here and there."

"You said you did all this to save money, but then you turned around and hired a public relations person, a second maintenance foreman, and a junior high counselor," he continued. "You're not spending money wisely. You're adding positions that don't help our kids one iota. You want to cut teaching supplies...this hurts our kids. You want to take away teachers' insurance. We don't pay our teachers enough now. If they are unhappy that will hurt our kids. You should

position there, the petition would have topped 1,000 signatures.

Charlotte Sterling asked for a poll of the board regarding the closing of Fred Elementary. In answer to the questions, "Would you vote to close Fred Elementary?" board members replied:

-Walter McAlpin, "I will never vote to close the Fred school."

-Ben Read, "I couldn't vote at the moment to anything. It's never been said by this board, 'Let's move the Fred school.'"

-Roy Moore, "I definitely wouldn't."

-Kenneth Gregory, "I have told you personally how I feel about it. You came by my house. When we built Fred Elementary, we made a commitment...that commitment is still there...I would not vote to close the Fred school."

Superintendent Yates said that she was not in favor of closing Fred Elementary because it would cost as much to build additional classrooms as the district would save by closing the campus.

Board President Walter McAlpin encouraged everyone to attend the April 10 meeting.

A great grand-daughter of Captain James Gaudney Collier, whose name is legion in the Beech Creek Spurlock area of the county, Dore has spent many years researching the Collier family and its many branches and has, to date, compiled a list of over 5000 "Collier cousins."

The event is free and open to the public.

Dore is editor of "Yellowed Pages," the quarterly publication of the Southeast Texas Geneological and Historical Society, the Winter 1988 edition of which deals largely with the famed Collier family, many of whom migrated to Tyler County from Early County, Ga., beginning in 1849.

The following proposals have been made by Warren Superintendent Bettie Yates for Board consideration and will be discussed in a special open meeting Monday, April 10, at 7 p.m., in the Warren High School Cafeteria.

The district is trying to generate \$186,908 to cover this year's deficit and \$373,816 to cover the 1989-1990 projected deficit.

- Superintendent Yates is recommending Proposal 3 because it would have fewer individuals and spend less money, she said.



Seek Medical Help For Tick Bite

A tick-transmitted human health problem called Lyme disease has been reported recently in Texas and 31 other states. About 30 cases have been reported in Texas, making incidence still relatively low in the state but a concern, nevertheless.

It is causing concern because it's also popping up randomly all over the state. It is not known what it's going to do. The disease, transmitted by certain ticks, is now more common than Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever.

Bexar and Kendall counties have reported one case each, along with Victoria and Nueces counties, according to the Texas Department of Health.

The disease was identified in Sweden initially in 1909, and still exists there. In the U.S., it was identified first in 1975 in Lyme, Conn.

School children and adults living at Lyme complained of symptoms resembling rheumatoid arthritis. Dr. Allen Steere of Yale University Medical School investigated the cases and named the new disease "Lyme Arthritis."

Early symptoms include profound fatigue, stiff neck, flu-like symptoms, headache, chills, fever, and muscle aches.

Without treatment, during the second stage, which can occur within weeks to months, it may affect the heart and nervous system.

The third or chronic arthritic stage can begin up to a year or more after a bite.

People who have been bitten by a tick should watch that spot for several weeks. If a rash appears, they should call their physician immediately. Other precautions include not handling sick deer.

Don't try to treat a sick deer. Call the game warden.


