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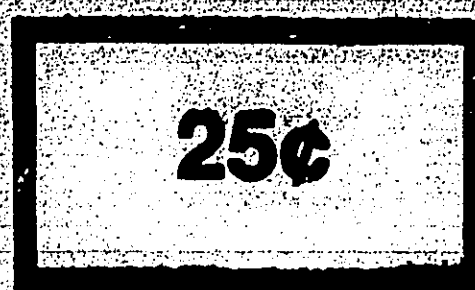

'Law Day U.S.A.' Is May 1st

Law Day U.S.A. is specifically designated across the nation on May 1 each year and this year covers the entire week from May 1-5.

The 1989 theme is "Access To Justice" and the Tyler County Bar Association has made extensive plans for bringing to the attention of the public the national emphasis on access to justice for all people, according to Woodville Attorney Jim Clark who is helping to organize the function.

County Judge Jerome Owens signed a proclamation Monday declaring Law Day U.S.A. and the Tyler County Bar Association, is sponsoring a program in the District Courtroom at the Tyler County Courthouse on Monday, May 1, from 10 to 11 a.m. with their featured speaker being the Honorable Jack Brookshire, Associate Justice of the Court of Appeals of the Ninth Supreme Judicial district of Texas sitting in Beaumont.

"The public is invited to this program and particularly the young people of our county" said Clark. "The high school government class of Becky Jinnette will also be present," he said.

On Tuesday, May 2, a "call-in" program will be held by the Bar Association, on radio station KVLL from the hours of 10 until 11 a.m., the public will be invited to call in any questions to a panel of attorneys.

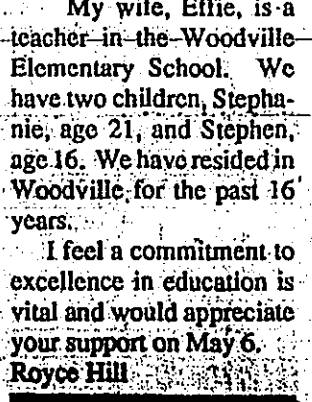

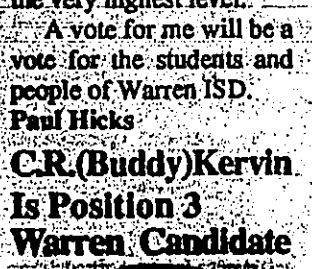

The following statement is from George C. Kimball, a candidate for position 2 on the Warren Independent School Board.

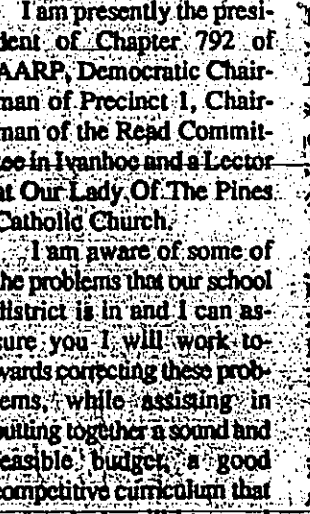
My name is George C. Kimball, 63 years old, retired from Gulf Oil with 36 years of service and a resident of Tyler County for the past 4 years.

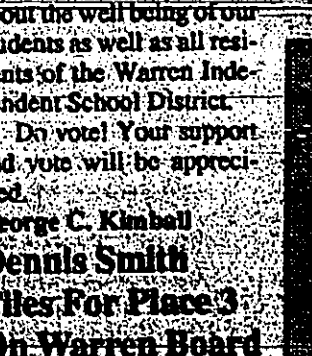

Senator Bill Haley East Texas: It Shouldn't Be A Toxic Dump Waste Site

The cities of Jasper and Palestine have had plans under way for the necessary approval from state agencies before the people realized what was happening.

This is, that our beautiful part of the country could ever be used for a toxic waste dump.

Our delightful scenery in general is the distinguishing feature of Deep East Texas. It is so lovely here that we would never have suspected that our splendid trees, sparkling water and abundant natural resources would ever be subjected to the dumping of toxic waste.

Yet that is just the problem that the people of Jasper and Anderson Counties have found that they do face almost before they realized it.

The businesses who wish to use these counties for toxic waste dumps already had the necessary approval from state agencies before the people realized what was happening.

The Texas Department of Health and the Texas Water Commission had already approved disposal of large quantities of asbestos waste, products in a landfill near Jasper.

The current law allows them to issue these permits even though the people did not want this material dumped in the vicinity of their town.

Medical authorities have shown that there is an acute hazard posed by asbestos exposure. The situation was similar in Anderson County, near Palestine, except that the state approval was given for the dumping of general toxic wastes not just asbestos.

The bill I have introduced will definitely prevent that happening.

I believe it will also take care of the current problems in Jasper and Palestine. My proposal is to amend the Solid Waste Disposal Act to make sure that hazardous substances won't be disposed of near population centers such as these two towns.

That would protect our homes, churches, schools and parks from becoming subject to pollution from these toxic wastes.

I believe my bill will protect the people, not only in those two counties but in all of East Texas from this problem. I truly hope so, because we simply must safeguard the quality of life and the beauty of our countryside for our families, our friends and our neighbors and for future generations.

Weeds Cost Ranchers Many Dollars

Weeds cost ranchers many dollars in lost production each year because they rob desirable forages of moisture and nutrients.

But herbicides can reduce those losses. Range weeds could be a serious problem in some areas of Texas this spring because of winter rains, says Bob Armentrout, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Each rancher needs to check his rangeland now to see if he has a weed infestation. Ranchers that find heavy weed infestations on their ranges should consider control measures.

Broadleaf plants such as alfalfa, clover, annual bromeweed, lambsquarters,

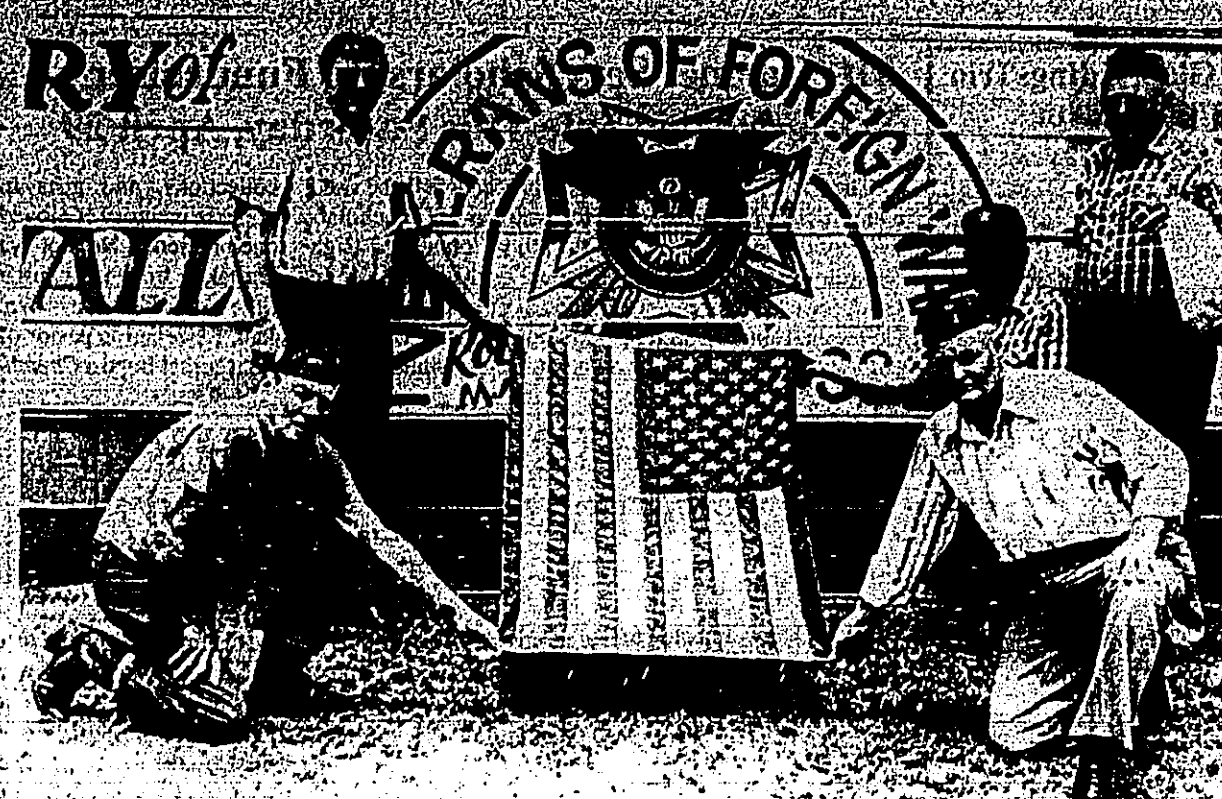
ragweed herbicide 2,4-D in early spring provides excellent control of most annual weeds.

Weeds should be growing rapidly and the herbicide mixture is effective. Dicamba (Banvel) and 2,4-D may be tank mixed, or a dicamba-2,4-D mixture (1:3 ratio) is commercially available under the trade name Grazon P+D.

Wood control on rangeland is a practice that can help control weeds. 2,4-D mixture or a petroleum

round of weeds controlled. For maximum benefit from herbicide weed control, ranchers should practice good grazing during the growing season, which will allow grasses to gain vigor and become better established.

Proper grazing management can help control weeds. Grazing can help control weeds by keeping the grass short and healthy.

Extension Agent Offers Helpful Tips

Below are some gardening tips.

Feed azaleas once they have completed bloom. Use a special azalea-camellia fertilizer or a complete and balanced fertilizer such as 8-8-8. The shallow rooted azaleas are easily injured by over-fertilization. Make light and frequent applications. A safe formula is one tablespoon of fertilizer per foot of height of established plant or apply approximately one-fourth one-half cup per square yard of soil area. Repeat applications monthly (May, June, September and October).

Prune winter damaged plants just prior to new growth. Future winter damage may occur with summer heat stress with the splitting major stems near the soil line.

April-Plant lawn grasses. As nights begin to warm and spring rains become more available, lawn grasses begin to grow. New lawns may be planted and old lawns improved. There are several grasses from which to choose; yet, each has its advantages and disadvantages. Thus, selection should be based on personal desires: is a grass and home grounds growing condition.

Caladiums for summer color. April is caladium planting time. Caladiums, whether in pots or shaded garden beds, add a vivid richness to any summer garden. The caladium is a "haircut" as the grass and flowers grow unchecked during May and June, areas critical to safety are mowed.

Young explained that while some roadside areas may appear to need a "haircut" as the grass and flowers grow unchecked during May and June, areas critical to safety are mowed.

"We will mow intersections and other areas with visibility problems so that motorists can see other traffic," said Young. But travelers will be able to enjoy the rest of the right-of-ways in all their spring-time splendor.

The Festival of Flowers is such an important event that the department has developed a way to track the most prolific areas of roadside blooms. Motorists can call the department for a list of such routes around the state, updated weekly.

"Wildflower season is a tradition in Texas," said District Engineer Franklin Young of Beaumont. "We're fortunate to have the natural beauty of our state doubly enhanced during the few months that the flowers bloom. To ensure that they have a healthy chance of returning next year, we stop our mowing procedures until they mature and go to seed."

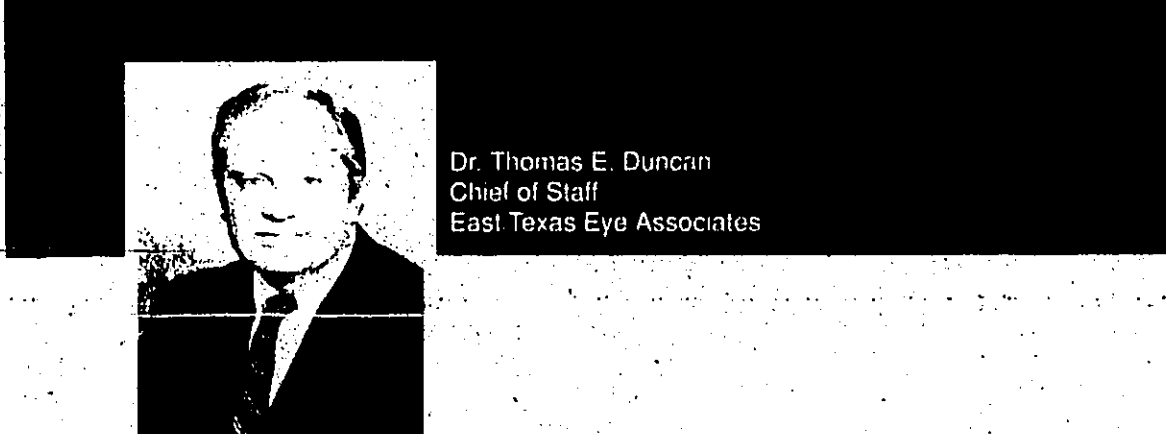


