Fisherman Finds Body In Drowning Accident

A Newton County man who was fishing in Steinhagen Lake early Tuesday spotted the body of a drowning victing reported missing since Sunday which had floated about one-half mile from where. his flat bottom aluminum 10 friends and family boat was discovered about 9:30 a.m. Sunday still in gear and idling.

According to Jasper County Sheriff's Office Chief Deputy Jack Myers, Howard I. Winkle, 46, of Spurger was pronounced dead by Justice of the Peace Clifford Woods after his body was recovered Tuesday morning. According to officers the boat was discovered in the lake-"tied up in some moss" in the vicinity of the inlet of Spring Creek. The location was reported to the Martin Dies State Park Ranger who subsequently reported it to the Jasper County Sheriff's office.. Winkle was apparently the lone occupant of the boat which was a 14

rig with a 20 H.P. Mariner Texas State Parks and Wildlife Game Warden Jay Smith of Jasper said that E.O. Havard, of Newton who was fishing and not a part of the search group spotted the body near the backwater Stump Slew area off Steinhagen Lake, officials theorizing the body surfaced then currents pulled it to the slew.

According to Martin Dies Park Ranger Rusty Sergeant, when Winkle was first reported missing the decision was made to conduct the search as a 'survival rescue' from the fact that the victims boat was running. Practicing medicine in The Sticks

By Anne Garner

WOODVILLE-Angel-wing begonias, brandy begonias, eye-lash begonias. giant begonias, dwarf begonias-one Tyler County physician says he had a hothouse with more varieties than he knew existed. Patients gave them to him when he made house calls back in the 1960's. The begonias blossomed in the sun as varied and colorful as the people who gave them to him, he says.

Area doctors made lots of house calls during those days, rolling out into sandy roads or sticky clay roads toward Colmesneil, Chester, Rockland, Spurger, Fred, Hillister. Many calls took them to elderly patients who found traveling to town difficult. Those were good solid folks, salt-of-the-earth people that East Texas boasts have lived in the woods for nearly 200 years. They lived in gray, unpainted dog trot or shotgun houses, softened by green shrubs in the yards and, in the spring and summer, by splashes of color from four-o'clocks, old maids, verbenia,

roses, and cape jasmines.

The doctor on his calls to the country spent 30 to 45 minutes at each place dispensing sample medicines he brought with him in a paper sack and exchanging yarns, swapping pleasan-tries, and maybe picking up a few

begonia cuttings.
"Making house calls was a good way to mend people's ills," a local M.D. says. "Health care was personal. We saw what the patient's home situation fected his illness and his recovery."

Getting there was tough sometimes and directions somewhat vague. Called out to see an elder in the back country, one doctor says he followed instructions to travel about 10 miles on a winding sandy road, cross two cattleguards, go through four gaps, and look for three red dogs on the front




