

Arthur Temple, Sr. Regional Cancer Center Preview Set July 7

Deep East Texans will get a special preview of the largest and most modern cancer facility between Tyler and Houston here Friday, July 7, when the new Arthur Temple, Sr. Regional Cancer Center is dedicated at the Memorial Medical Center of East Texas.

The center, which will be operational later in July, was funded by a \$2.8 million grant from the T.L.L. Temple Foundation—the largest grant made by the Foundation in East Texas. Dedication ceremonies will begin at 1 p.m., followed by a public open house.

Dr. Charles A. LeMaistre, president of the University of Texas M.D.

Anderson Cancer Center in Houston, will speak at the dedication ceremonies.

Dr. LeMaistre is a widely recognized authority on cancer, and especially on the harmful effects of smoking. He served on the first U.S. Surgeon General's Advisory Committee on Smoking and Health, which in 1964 identified cigarettes as a major health hazard.

Also appearing on the program will be Frank Stevenson, chairman of the Memorial board of directors; George Henderson, Jr., president of the hospital board of trustees; Dr. J.B. Alexander, Memorial's chief of staff; Dr. Bill Shelton, head of the hospital's radiology department,

which will operate the Cancer Center; and Gary Deer, Memorial's administrator.

Stevenson said the completion of the Cancer Center "is one of the most exciting developments at the hospital in recent years, and all of us owe a debt of

gratitude to the T.L.L. Temple Foundation for its interest in cancer facilities, as well as its ongoing commitment to quality healthcare in Deep East Texas."

The new Cancer Center included one of the largest linear accelerators in East Texas. A linear accelerator enables cancers to be treated with finely-focused bursts of high-energy X-rays.

In addition to the linear accelerator, the Cancer Center will be equipped with several other pieces of new equipment, including

a treatment simulator, which will permit physicians and therapists to precisely localize tumors and determine exact dosages for treatment; a planning computer, which will allow physicians and therapists to more accurately define the field of cancers

in the body; a new patient examination area; and a new patient education area, where cancer patients are instructed in their treatment and rehabilitation.

Dr. Bill Kiefer, a Lufkin radiologist on the Memorial staff, said the improvements "will go a

long way to further Memorial's ability to effectively treat patients from a broad area of East Texas."

He said the linear accelerator, with an energy range between six and 18 million electron volts, will be one of the largest put into operation in East

Gramm: Smaller Hospital Grants Number May Double

WASHINGTON—The House has agreed to accept a Senate provision in the Urgent Supplemental Appropriations bill to double the number of grants available to aid struggling rural hospitals, say U.S. Senator Phil Gramm.

"The Health Care Transition Grant Program

will now provide 160 grants of up to \$50,000 each to help non-profit, rural hospitals, many of which are struggling to survive these days," Gramm said.

"Specifically, the grant program will provide more than \$8 million that is critically needed so that small

hospitals in rural areas can change their method of operation in order to cope with changing demands for services," the senator said.

"I believe that it is vital that we explore every avenue to assure that health care continues to be available in rural areas," he said.

AUSTIN—The Director of the Department of Public Safety has challenged Texas drivers to show that the DPS traffic death estimate for the long July 4th period is far too high. "The DPS Statistical Services bureau has indicated that as many as 52 persons could be killed on Texas roadways during these hours," Colonel Joe Milner said. "But the number will be lower if more drivers will slow down, avoid drinking alcohol and use a well-known safety precaution—seat belts."
