Teacher Salaries Cut At Warren By Local Red Cross **By Annabeth Willis**

The Warren Independent School District Board of Trustees voted unanimously in a 6 pecial Meeting Tuesday, July 11, 1989, to cut the teaching increment by \$660,000. The District had been paying a \$1400 increment, but will now pay only \$740. The move will

save the District approximately \$48,000. The Board spent several hours discussing budget cuts, but came to no definite conclusions. Superintendent Bettic Rae Yates had presented fourdifferent budgets for the Board's consideration in an effort to eliminate the estimated \$433,515 deficit the the Board's consideration in an errort to eliminate the estimated 9453,513 detect the District is facing for 1989-90 school year. Yates favors closing the Middle School campus, moving the sixth grade to the elementary school and seventh and eight grades to the high school. In a poll of the Board, all Board members except Kenneth Gregory voiced their opposition to closing the Middle School campus. Yates voiced the question, "Why would you go to all this trouble to cut the quality of education that you have worked for so hard to build for the sake of an old building?" The Board seemed favorable
