

New Prison Site Selection Committee In Woodville

Several members of the Prison Site Selection Committee of the Texas Board of Criminal Justice, along with members of the Texas Department of Corrections, are scheduled to visit Woodville, Wednesday, Oct. 25, will be greeted at the Tyler County airport not only by the Warren High School Band but many other countywide dignitaries who will help roll out the red carpet for the selection team to try to make them feel at home.

The site selection committee makes up the Southern portion of the state group which will help decide on new prison locations.

Those comprising the committee include: Charles Terrell, chairman of the Texas Board of Criminal Justice; Jim Lynaugh, director of Texas Department of Corrections; and boardmembers: Jerry Hodge of Amarillo; Steve Stevens, of San Angelo; Jim Eller, of College Station; and TDC Executive Bill Berry.

The committee will be handed a substantial amendment to the original proposal for a new prison unit to be located here and

submitted several months ago, according to Gil Tubb, Tyler County Chamber of Commerce liaison representative. According to Tubb the group will be

in Woodville only for a quick look at the prison site and to receive any new proposals Woodville and Tyler County have to offer.

Local key representatives on hand to welcome the committee as each will include: Woodville Mayor Tom Knapp; County Judge Jerome Owens; Chamber of Com-

merce Co-ordinator Gil Tubb and Harry Stafford; and Tim Young, of the Austin Law Firm of Winstead, McGuire, Spire and Minick.

DETDA To Host Rosser

Deep East Texas Development Association will hold its regular monthly meeting in San Augustine on October 27th at 10 a.m. at the San Augustine Inn.

Donnie Henson, President of the Association announced, Howard W. Rosser, President and Executive Director of the East Texas Tourism Association, a director of Howard W. Rosser Communication, Inc., which is headquartered in Longview, will be the principal speaker for this month's meeting.

Rosser is a native of Kildare, Cass County, in East Texas and a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Journalism. Rosser was a weekly newspaper editor for 3 1/2 years. During that time, Rosser was the originator of the Winnboro (Texas) Au-

turn Trails Tours and Folk Festival.

In 1963, Rosser organized and was named the first manager of the East Texas Chamber department, which is 25 years under his direction grew to be the largest state or regional chamber tourist association in America.

In 1981, Rosser was named by the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation Tribal Council to its board of directors of Tribal Enterprises, which manages the Tribe's tourist facilities and has served as vice chairman of the Board.

Rosser is author of the 214 page hardback book, "EAST TEXAS - The First 50 Years", a history of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Rosser now serves as a director of the Texas Tourist Council.

Tourism is the second largest industry in Texas, that is the key to economic development and it creates jobs, Henson said.

November 7th Election Important

turned out in that election to adopt 20 of the 25 constitutional amendments and to endorse pari-mutuel wagering.

Important issues will be decided when Texas voters head to the polls Nov. 7 to consider 21 state constitutional amendments. The turnout rate has averaged between 10 percent and 15 percent. Interest in the pari-mutuel issue is credited with the above average turnout in 1987.

As Texas' chief elections officer, it is my responsibility to encourage you to exercise your constitutional right. It is your responsibility to go out and vote. Your vote can make a difference.

The proposed amendment and a brief explanation follow:

Proposition 1 would raise the salaries of state lawmakers to the level of the governor's salary, and increase the salaries of lieutenant governor and the Texas House speaker to one-half of the governor's salary.

Water Conservation Bonds. Proposition 19 would allow the Legislature to enact laws allowing local governments to make certain investments.

Proposition 20 would abolish the office of county surveyor in Cass, Ector, Garza, Smith, Bexar, Harris and Webb counties.

Proposition 21 would authorize the issuance of up to \$75 million in bonds for tax-free college savings bonds by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.






