"BRAINSTORMING"--Members of The John Gray Institute and Staff were on hand Tuesday with the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce for a Brainstorming session to create new ideas for the development of Woodville and Tyler County. According to Institute and Chamber officials, the key comment was, "To encourage people to live, work and play and spend time and money in Tyler county."

'Project 6' Street Plan Eyed

Assuring a group of concerned citizens on Monday, "We've got enough money to pave every street in Woodville," City Manager Walt Davis and City Mayor Tom Knapp reassured the group that street paving plans for streets South of Hwy 490, referred to in the meeting as "Project 6" would be engineered soon, and probably paved before Christmas of 1990.

Willie Jerie, a member of the mostly-black group said "I'm satisfied...I suggest we just watch it and see if it's done," he added. All I wanted to know is that all the citizens be treated fair."

The group, according to spokesman Donald Coleman, was concerned about the process of prioritizing the streets for paving. Coleman indicated that after his repeated attempts to inform the council of that groups desire to be considered earlier in the planning attempts that the response from city hall was "insensitive". Coleman also said on several occasions that he was afraid the city was going to "run out of money before they got to our area."

Knapp defended the city's process in paving the streets saying "We've been working on this for two years, we've moved ahead and ahead. At the time we decided on these priorities there was not a

room full of people. For all practical purposes," Knapp said, "the plans for sectors 2,3,5 and 5 are history," the Mayor said, "because of the fact to the fact that council will open bids on Monday, Nov. 20 for the final phases in the current street portion of the street paving plans."

Knapp and Davis told the group that "Very soon engineering plans will be drawn for the "Project-6" area with paving to follow shortly."

According to City Engineers some concern was expressed for the inability of the work crews to pour hot mix in cold weather. "That could cause some delay," said Pete DuBose, representing DP Associates. DuBose said further that his firm looked at concentration of people and current traffic patterns along with sealcoating needs on existing streets that otherwise would deteriorate faster if not sealed now in order to save money for the city.

The concerned citizens group was also interested in the acquisition of the Old Scott School building for activities for the community in the vicinity of the school. The council said there "Would be no problem" and that they would have building inspectors look at the property to determine if it's safe.

In other council business:
-the city fathers heard questions from The Rev. Bobby Pate about concerns regarding the integrity of a sewer line access his property northeast of the city and leading to the Gib Lewis prison. Unit. Pate asked the council to mark the sewer line safely away from the creek on the property. Pate also asked for documents supporting recent land acquisitions which he said were unclear about property lines on the Pate land. City Attorney Josiah Wheat said he would supply the proper documentation to verify the land transfer. Pate thanked the City and said he "Was always a sup-

porter of Woodville" and would continue to be."

In other action the council tabled a request from Bobby Gibson who made a request to the council for permission to pick up all city commercial garbage. City Manager Walt Davis told Gibson that he could pick up commercial garbage within the city as long as the City held a letter from the commercial city customer desiring the change from city pickup to private pickup.

-In other action estimate No. 2 for Holloway Construction Company for the ground storage tank in the amount of \$81,046, and estimate No. 1 for Underground utilities contractors for a water line in the amount of \$75,883 were approved.
-the council then issued approval and support from their Jasper, Newton, Tyler & Sabine County request to make Hwy 96 in Jasper County a 4-lane "trunkline" Highway. The council said they would be glad to support the request.
-The council contracted with the Tyler County Appraisal District for property tax collections and for collection of delinquent taxes. The Property Tax Board was represented by Linda Lewis.
-Council then awarded a water well bid to the Lane Western Company for \$165,000 for the new water well to serve the prison.

County Loses Bid For Second Prison

Tyler Countians, some with a sigh of relief, breathed easier this week after the Texas Board of Criminal Justice, picked Abilene, Beeville and Jefferson County for Maximum Security Prison Units and Childress, Dilley and Freestone County each for a 1,000 man minimum security units.

There were those also who had worked hard to

cally on developing a package for the Board hoping Woodville would be chosen for another prison unit which, following this weeks selection process, seemed almost impossible with the millions of dollars in cash, oil wells and other incentives being thrown at the State in other regional and area sales pitches for the units. There are some who say that the financial

burdens needed to guarantee the second unit would have been financially damaging to local entities who had already agreed to assist "any way they could."

Woodville failed along with adjoining Angelina, Polk and Jasper Counties attempts to woo the "inflation proof" prison industry here again, having already been awarded one 1,000 man unit last year.

Water and sewer construction to the current prison site, even though somewhat larger than necessary in the short term, according to Woodville City Council members and Tyler County Chamber of Commerce officials, will be an attractive advantage for other future industrial prospects who might wish to locate here.

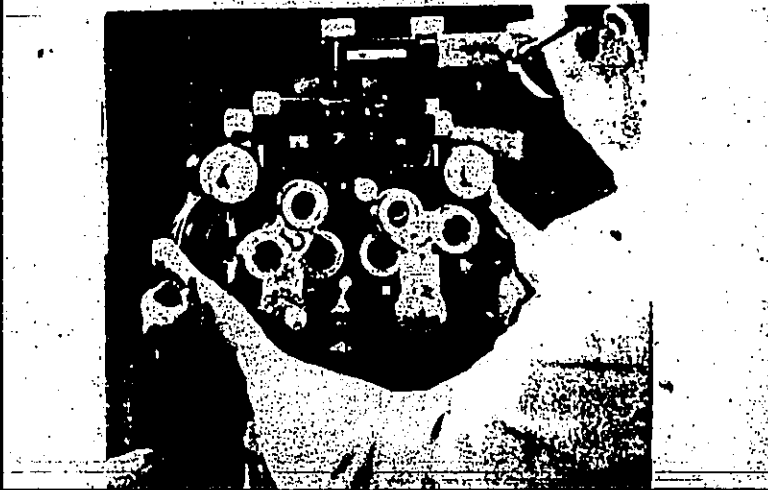

Moral Education

Since the founding of our Republic, people have debated about how children should be taught moral values, who should teach them, and what values should be taught. In an effort to focus the debate and encourage research on moral education in schools, the U.S. Department of Education has furnished the following information on moral education.

Moral education is about the development of character, the stable qualities of a person that are revealed in his or her actions. Moral education is whatever we do as parents and educators to influence how young people feel, think and act regarding issues of right and wrong. Presumably, people adopt a simplistic view of morality. They think it only concerns lying, sexual misbehavior, and cheating. But moral judgment is almost every action we take. These actions are seen in all aspects of everyday human conduct, not just to those traditionally linked with moral behavior. Tasks such as mowing the lawn or writing a good sentence are ordinary activities involving judgments of right and wrong—doing the task well or doing it poorly. It is a mark of character whether the individual takes care to perform such everyday actions well. If we present morality or ethics to children in ways that include this sort of performance, then moral education and conduct become a constant concern, not one restricted to occasional momentous decisions.

Don't Drive on Powerlines, Pipelines

For safety and soil stability reasons, hunters and other national forest users may not drive motor vehicles on or near powerlines or pipelines. Powerlines and pipelines frequently cross roads. Right-of-ways are open to hikers and horseback riders, but they should be cautious, especially in pipeline corridors. Lannan said, "There's a lot of pressure in those lines, and many contain volatile liquids and gases. Punctures could result in terrible explosions and fires."

"These corridors were never planned as travel ways," he said. "Unlike roads, right-of-ways don't have the same contours and they're not drained. Furthermore, they're not maintained as roads. Vehicle traffic on them leads to erosion, then rain strips it away."

Lannan said the prohibition is enforced by Forest Service personnel. Violators may be fined for up to six months and fined \$300.

GSU Receives Josiah Wheat Historic Preservation Award

Gulf States Utilities Co. recently received the Josiah Wheat Award of Merit for outstanding achievement in historic preservation by an industry for its Edison Plant Museum. The Award dates to Dr. Josiah Wheat, 1897-1968 who was born in Chester and was one of the earliest Anglo-American settlers in Tyler County and the donor of the land on which the original Courthouse was situated. He was asked to chair the Texas State Historical Survey Commission in 1933. The museum houses the largest collection of inventor Thomas Alva Edison artifacts west of the Mississippi River and is one of only two such electric industry museums in the United States, said Bill Street, museum curator.

Street accepted the award on behalf of GSU Board Chairman Linn Draper from the Texas Historical Foundation, a non-profit organization dedicated to preserving endangered historical structures and archeological sites.

The red brick building sits in the shadow of GSU's ultra-modern 17-story corporate headquarters.

Since opening its doors to the public, the museum has averaged about 8,000 visitors a year. It is open throughout the United States and overseas. Street said.
