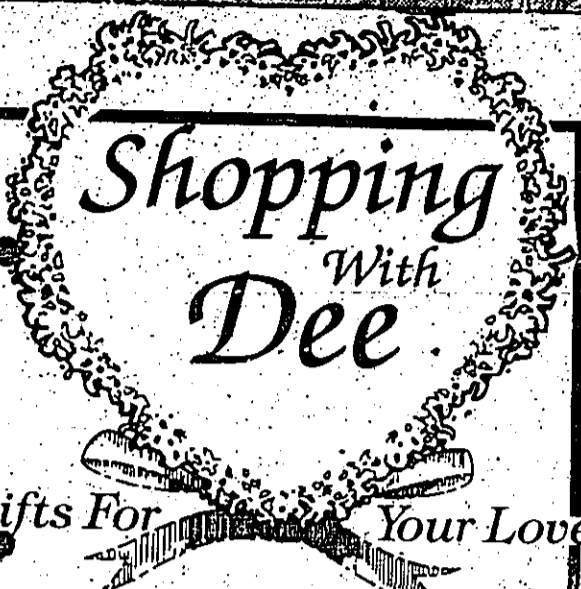

Teaching..... The Everlasting Profession

The following article was written by speech contest winner, Ray Kaderli, Canyon High School, New Braunfels. It was presented at the Annual Conference of Texas Association of Future Educators, March 4, 1989. The article is dedicated to all Woodville teachers.

TEACHING: THE EVERLASTING PROFESSION. After a humiliating defeat, Vince Lombardi lectured his Green Bay Packers team on the importance of fundamentals. He raged that he was a lousy teacher and they were lousy students, and they were going to start over with basics. Lombardi reached down, picked up a football, and said, "Now this is a football." Vince Lombardi did not gain fame by teaching just fundamentals. He like others in the teaching profession, taught more than teachers teach, he values that can be applied to all aspects of life.

This job goes far beyond teaching students to read, write, and do mathematics. Yes, these fundamentals are important, but the emphasis on commitment, kindness, integrity, love, and even work ethics will have an influence on students from generations to generations.

In almost everyone's life, there is a teacher whose legacy is the shared wonder and eternal hope that we can and must make ourselves better. Mark Medoff, 1980 winner of a Tony Award for his play, *Children of a Lesser God*, was also a teacher. In an article for the New York Times, Medoff related that two decades after he was officially no longer a student, he was still learning from his former teachers. "It is not the actual teaching of a subject I recall," said Medoff, "but surprisingly, one thing-a moment, some words hurled forth, a single motivating idea."

The impact teachers have on lives reaches far beyond the classroom. It is not the teaching of

a subject but the living lessons on commitment, kindness, integrity, love, and work ethics that make teaching the everlasting profession.

Like small creeks that grow into mighty rivers, dreams shape the course of history. By George Bernard Shaw.

Teachers must be wise, stern, and loving, because fate has placed in their hands young lives to be molded into future citizens.

For many, it is the single strongest influence on their development. One teacher's faith in a student-that teacher's encouragement and guidance-can change a student's entire future. A teacher who says, "I think you can," and then helps that student succeed, does more for that person's self-image than all the rewards money can buy. Unfortunately, this impact can be a two-sided coin. The words hurled forth may be filled with sarcasm and ridicule, which can devastate a young fragile ego. Being told by a teacher that you are a fool, stupid, lazy, or a failure is like having the door to a successful future slammed in your face. A teacher's immortality is neither more nor less than the words spoken every decade later for former students.

Teachers must be wise, stern, and loving, because fate has placed in their hands young lives to be molded into future citizens.

Social Security

Recently, David Bennett, District Manager of the Lufkin Social Security District, discussed the role of representative payees (RPs) - those appointed by SSA to handle the funds of beneficiaries who, because of physical or mental limitations, are unable to conduct their own affairs. Of the 38 million Social Security beneficiaries, about 5.5 million have RPs.

SSA sees the role of representative payees as one of great responsibility. In the selection process, candidates are screened not only for their ability to manage the funds of others

but also for their genuine interest in the beneficiaries' welfare. Close relatives often meet these requirements but many beneficiaries have non-relatives as RPs.

To carry out their responsibilities, RPs must always be aware of the beneficiary's current and future needs. Thus a person who lives with, or near, the beneficiary and had daily contact with them, meets this important requirement especially since the RP's first responsibility is to make certain that the beneficiary's day-to-day needs for food, clothing,

shelter, and personal expenses are met.

After day-to-day needs are met, benefits may then be used for any special needs such as school expenses, medical expenses, insurance premiums, or payment on a house in which the person has an interest.

Any money left after meeting current needs must be saved or invested. This money cannot be mixed with anyone else's funds and bank accounts, bonds, or other investments must clearly show the beneficiary as owner.

Bennett stressed that representative payees are held fully accountable for the proper use of funds, and periodic reports to SSA are required. RPs who misuse these funds are required to refund the money and, if the situation warrants, are relieved of their RP duties. RPs are also responsible for keeping SSA timely advised of any events that would affect the beneficiary's checks.

Day Care Costs On Rise

The cost of child care outside the home has changed little over the past decade, but it is still a major budget outlay for many American families.

Child care is one of the major expenses facing working parents, said Nancy Granovsky, a family economic specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Parents who regularly use day care services are aware of how much of the family budget goes to child-care services and of the level of quality and convenience of those services.

Child care costs consume about 10 percent of the average family's income.

While the 10 percent is an average, there is a wide variation in what families spend on child-care costs, Granovsky said.

Day Care Costs On Rise

The cost of child care outside the home has changed little over the past decade, but it is still a major budget outlay for many American families.

Child care is one of the major expenses facing working parents, said Nancy Granovsky, a family economic specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Parents who regularly use day care services are aware of how much of the family budget goes to child-care services and of the level of quality and convenience of those services.

Child care costs consume about 10 percent of the average family's income.

While the 10 percent is an average, there is a wide variation in what families spend on child-care costs, Granovsky said.

Urban Institute analysis found that expenditures on day care did not rise at all and that family day home costs had risen only slightly.

But the hourly cost of care by a relative or sitter in the home and risen dramatically, Granovsky said.

Parents should pay close attention to how they spend their money, Granovsky said. They need to be aware of how much of the family budget goes to child-care services and of the level of quality and convenience of those services.
