## DPS Trooper Pederson Assigned Here

Trooper Kevin J. Pederson, 33, has graduated from the Texas Department of Public Safety Training Academy and has been assigned to the Driver License Service in Woodville.

Trooper Pederson was one of over 90 cadets recently commissioned as state troopers in graduation ceremonies at the DPS Administrative Headquarters in Austin. Trooper Pederson is a native of Del Rio and assumes his new duties immediately.

Colonel Joe Milner, DPS director, said he is proud of the new troopers and looks forward to their service with the Department. "These men and women were given an extensive 22-week course emphasizing the responsibilities of DPS troopers," Col. Milner said. "They have been well-trained to uphold the laws of this state in routine as well as dangerous law enforcement situations."

"A Texas trooper must perform a number of different tasks in addition to enforcing traffic laws. The trooper will assist in narcotics arrests and other felony cases as well as man-hunts and disaster situations," Milner pointed out.

The DPS training course included comprehensive instruction in traffic law, criminal law, arrest procedures, accident investigation, and numerous other law enforcement related topics.

# Haley Bill Designed For 'Equal Access'

State Senator Bill Haley (D-Center) today introduced a bill to guarantee that every child in Texas has equal access to a quality education as required by the Texas Supreme Court last year.

Haley's bill, based on a plan outlined by State

Comptroller Bob Bullock, would ensure that every school district could afford to spend \$3,600 per student in the first year with a local property tax rate of 85 cents per \$100 valuation. School districts currently spend an average of \$3,200 per student per year.

"This plan would guarantee that every district could provide a quality education with a reasonable local property tax rate," Haley said. "If a district can't raise \$3,600 per student with the target local tax rate, then the State will make up the difference."

The plan would not require that districts raise local property taxes to the target tax rate set by the bill, but districts taxing at a lower rate would receive less State aid. Some districts may be able to reduce their current property tax

rates and still qualify for the full State guaranteed funding level under his bill," said Haley, who is member of the Senate Education Committee.

Haley proposes raising the guaranteed funding level from \$3,600 the first year to \$4,600 in the fifth year. The target tax rate would also rise in future years.

"This is the fairest and simplest way to distribute State education funds and head off the looming crisis of the court order to cut off State aid to all schools after May 1."

Haley's proposal would also provide \$200 million in State bond money the first year for emergency grants and loans to poor districts to build classrooms.

"It's encouraging that every major plan that has been proposed so far has included the guaranteed yield concept that was initially proposed by Comptroller Bullock. There is a general acceptance of the idea that we need to base the level of State aid to some degree on the local tax effort that districts are willing to make," Haley said.

The major differences are in the areas of how much of State aid should be based on local tax effort and how much additional State money the State should put into education.

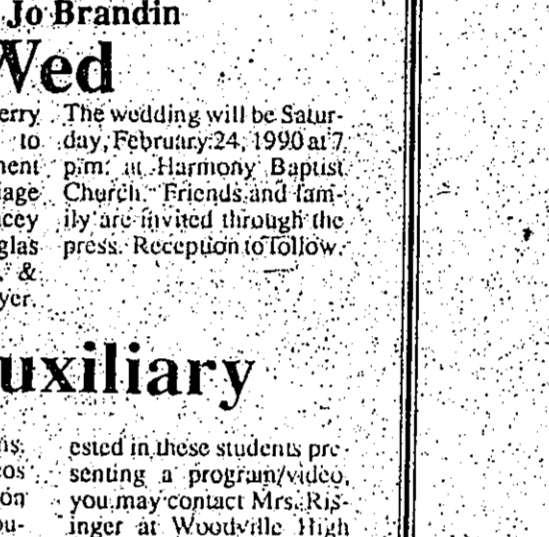

## Candidates Must Follow Highway Sign Rules

Candidates, campaign managers and supporters may be in violation of the law by erecting or allowing others to erect campaign signs on private property adjacent to various State-maintained highways.

Department of Transportation, requires that no signs be placed on the right-of-way of any highway. This law covers all other highways or roads not included in the Interstate or Primary Highway System.

No Outdoor Advertising License is required on the rural road system. Campaign signs may be erected along a rural road

without a permit, but only if:

1. The sign is on private property.
2. The sign is erected no sooner than the 60th day before the election and is removed no later than the 10th day after the election.
3. The sign is constructed of lightweight material.
4. The surface area of the sign is not larger than 50 square feet.
5. The sign is not visible from the main-traveled way of an Interstate or Federal-aid Primary Highway.

No signs, except official traffic control signs, are allowed within the limits of the right-of-way of any road or highway. Maintenance personnel of the Department are authorized to remove all signs illegally erected.

They all knew just when to start crowing every morning. Some people depended on the farm rooster and the sun for their time. **Save Kids Teeth Use Dental Sealants**

Have you ever looked at your kids and wished you could seal them up in a package--safe from harm?

Well, you can--their teeth, at least. Dental sealants is a technique that works well, virtually eliminating all of the cavities that form in the pits and fissures of the chewing surfaces of teeth.

However, although it is safe and fairly cheap, the technique isn't used a lot. Perhaps only 8 percent of school children have had some of their teeth sealed. While there may be some children who don't need any teeth sealed, dental experts say the percentage who could benefit is many times the number who have it done.

Together with fluoride, sealants could virtually eliminate cavities in young people.

Developed in the 1960s and brought into general use in the early 1970s, sealants are applied as a liquid mixture of chemicals that are also used in most white fillings. The sealants can also be tinted or can be clear.

The teeth are first cleaned, then bathed in a mild acid solution to create small pores in the teeth so that when the sealant is brushed on it becomes bonded to the teeth. The process may take seven minutes or so to a tooth.

Sealants may eventually wear down and have to be replaced, but for the first two years they are about 99 percent effective.

The Food and Drug Administration regulates sealants as medical devices, and has found no side effects or safety problems connected with their use.

A 1983 National Institutes of Health consensus conference also concluded that sealants are "safe" and "highly effective."

Safe. Effective. Now all that's needed is greater use.


