

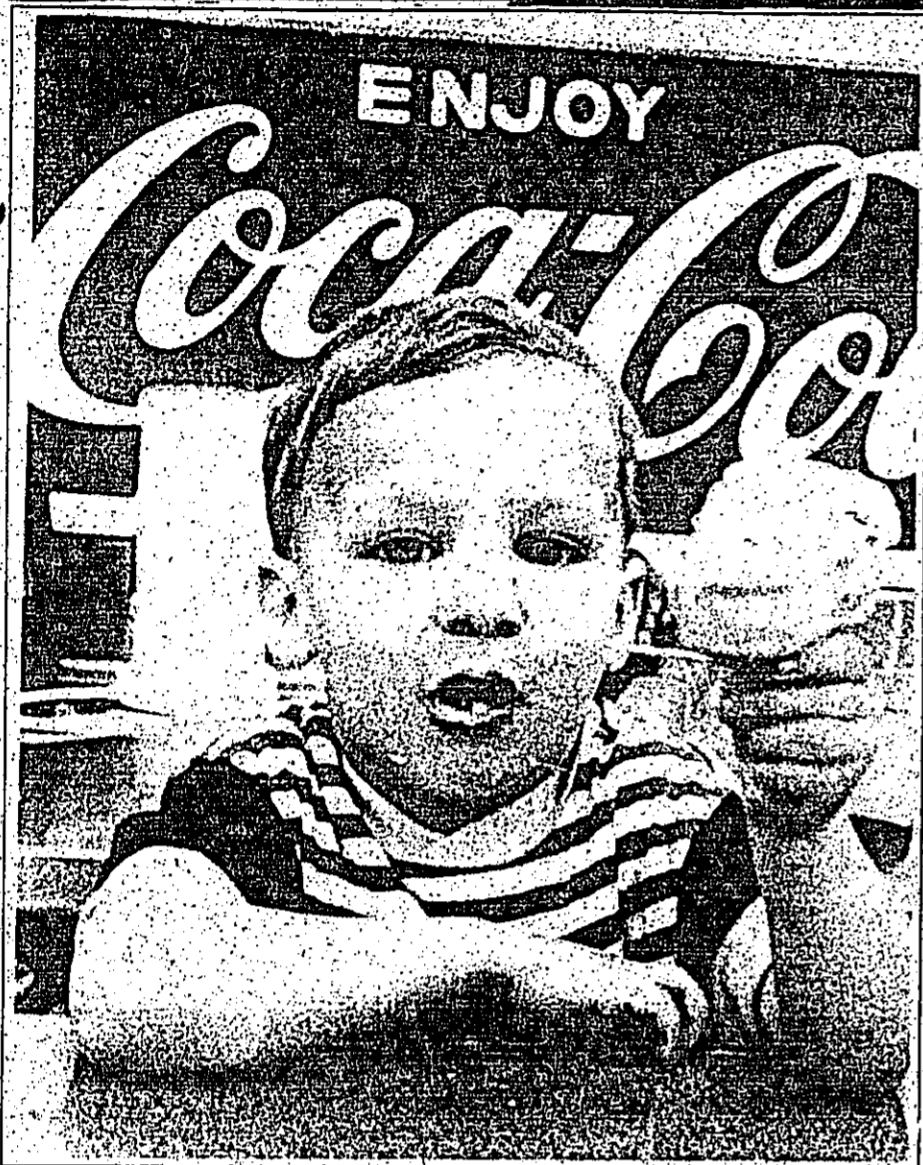

This year Western Weekend will offer a two-night rodeo, as well as the usual trailrides, parade, sweetheart contest, and dance.

The rodeo's first performance will be Friday night, March 30, 1990, beginning at 8:00 p.m. Saturday afternoon, March 31, 1990, at 3:30 p.m. will be the Sweetheart Contest followed by the final rodeo performance at 4:00 p.m. The Friday night rodeo should be concluded at approximately 10:00 p.m., which will leave plenty of time for trailriders to return to their campgrounds for their dances. City Speed Limit Excessive

Traffic was on the minds of Woodville City Council at their last regular meeting with chief concerns centering on "South Hwy 69 excessive speed limits" which, according to Woodville Police Chief Scott Yosko, were set because of recent inaccurate Texas State Department highway speed limit survey calculations. Yosko indicated his police officer calculations differ with those of the state.

"The figures vary greatly", Yosko said. According to Mayor Tom Knapp "Someone's going to get killed there sooner or later, with McDonald's Restaurant

added to the list of merchants along the strip." Knapp said "A groundswell of citizens and retailers who live in or drive through the area in question have told him and the council about the "danger zone".

Knapp identified the Rev. Percy Lewis as one person who was coordinating a petition drive to inform people of the "danger zone" area along the road and encourage support for a specific communication with Franklin Young, district Engineer of Beaumont about the question.

According to Dee Gibson who shops with the retailers in the area, "We

almost got creamed the other day when we turned into the shopping center by a log truck who was barreling down behind us, those speed limits have to be reduced."

Complicating the high speed concerns in the area is the narrow bridge over Turkey Creek, which State Highway officials said needed to be widened to ease the traffic flow.

The Council indicated that efforts would be made to reach state representatives and state senators about the matter.

Gramm Wins 'Watchdog Of Treasury' Award

U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has been awarded a Watchdog of the Treasury, Inc., award for his efforts in 1989 to eliminate government waste and reduce the federal budget deficit.

The award is presented annually to members of Congress who score at least 75 percent on the organization's Economy Voting

Record, an analysis of selected votes on economic and fiscal issues.

"Your efforts to bolster the fiscal integrity of our country are highly commendable," said WTI President George W. Koch in presenting the award.

Gramm scored 95 percent on the Economy Voting Record in the first session of the 101st Congress.

The index covered a total of 22 votes on proposals which included legislation to repeal of the catastrophic health tax, motions to waive the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings deficit reduction law and a bill to begin offering rewards in order to uncover major government fraud cases.

Other Texans who received recognition from Watchdogs of the Treasury include U.S. Reps. Dick Armev, Joe Barton, Larry Combest, Jack Fields, Ralph Hall, Marvin Leath and Lamar Smith.

Long Range Goals Eyed

Local community leaders will be meeting on Thursday, March 22, to help identify the important issues of concern to the people of Tyler County, over the next 4 years. These issues will then be incorporated into the County Extension Offices' Long Range Extension Plan, to provide a blueprint for programs for the next 4 years.

This process was done 4 years ago, and a number of exciting programs came out of it. One group felt local growers needed a way to market fresh produce. With the help of local growers, community leaders and the Extension Service, the Tyler County Farmer's Market was

formed. Beef Cattle Profitability was another area of concern. Programs to assist local producers included beef and forage tours, field days, result demonstrations, media coverage, newsletters, etc. In all, almost 3 million were reached. Obviously, with much duplication but a recent survey showed more county producers are utilizing new management methods than ever before. While the issue of beef cattle profitability will never be totally resolved, producers have made substantial progress towards profitable production.

Another priority from the planning meeting was the need for a community center. While the center

still doesn't exist, substantial progress has been made in developing plans for the center. Work is still ongoing to find a source of funds for the construction.

In the area of home economics, a number of programs were given to help county residents develop lifestyles which incorporate good nutrition and health practices. The people receiving these programs learned how to eat dietarily correctly, how to get more for their food dollar and how to exercise correctly.

With the information gained from the 1990 planning sessions, Extension plans and programs will target Tyler County needs for the next 4 years.

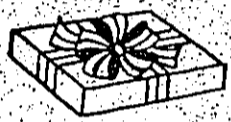

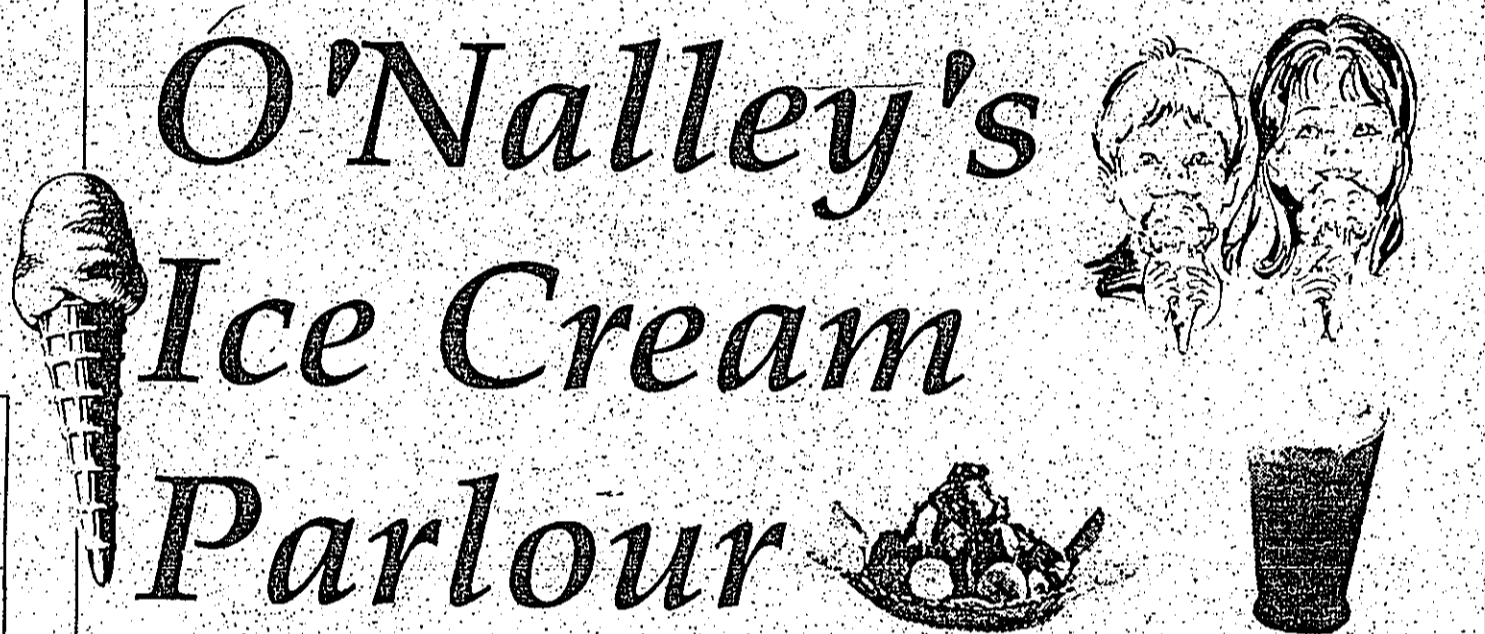

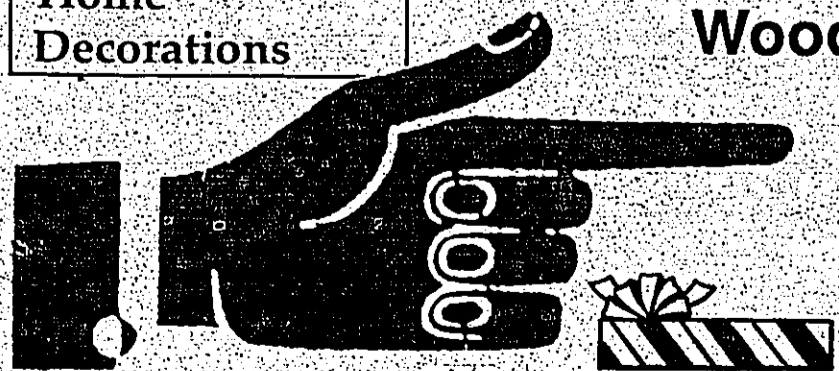
