Tyler County residents will get a chance to see firsthand the facility that has and will continue to change the makeup of the local economy this Saturday when the official Grand Opening kicks off at the Gib Lewis Prison Unit.

The opening will begin at 10 a.m., starting with a brief speech by Gib Lewis, Speaker for the Texas House, for whom the prison was named. Other dignitaries are also expected to attend, including State Representative Allen Hightower, State

Senator Bill Haley and members of the Tyler County Commissioners' Court. Following the Grand Opening at 10 a.m., the prison will be open to the general public for walking tours.

Other activities scheduled throughout the day include a barbecue at Timberline Ranch for the dignitaries. The prison unit will employ from 250 to 300 people and will house 1,000

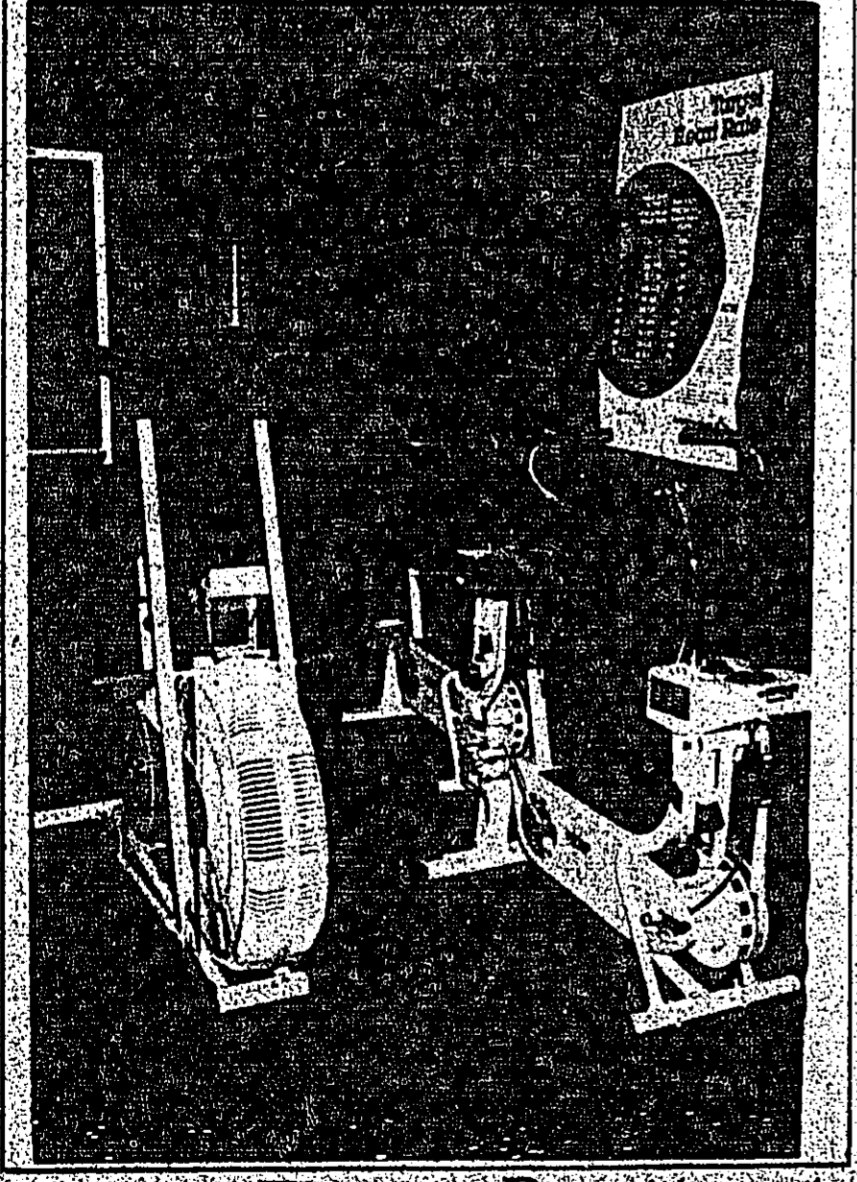
Hospital Top On Newcomers List

When a new business or industry considers locating to a particular area, three questions hold a lot of weight. According to Tyler County Hospital Administrator Thomas Sturdivant, the three factors that are always considered are whether or not the area has good schools, a good hospital, good government and low taxes. That's why, he said, he feels the Tyler County

Hospital played a role in convincing the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to build the Gib Lewis Unit here. Sturdivant said that there has been discussion between the TDCJ deputy director of health services and Tyler County Hospital about the hospital doing some diagnostic work for the Gib Lewis Unit if needed, and providing emergency services in the case of serious injuries or

trauma, until the prisoner can be transferred to the TDCJ facilities at John Sealy Hospital in Galveston. If and when prisoners would use the Tyler County Hospital, TDCJ would provide security. According to Sturdivant, 80 rural hospitals have closed their doors across Texas in the last six years. Fifteen of those were closed last year alone. However, Tyler County

Hospital has been able to save money, purchase state-of-the-art equipment, and is presently planning to expand its emergency room facilities. "And we've done this without having to vote a bond issue and raise taxes," he added. Sturdivant said he feels that's something to brag about, especially since, "I know what my industry is doing, and it's really hurting."

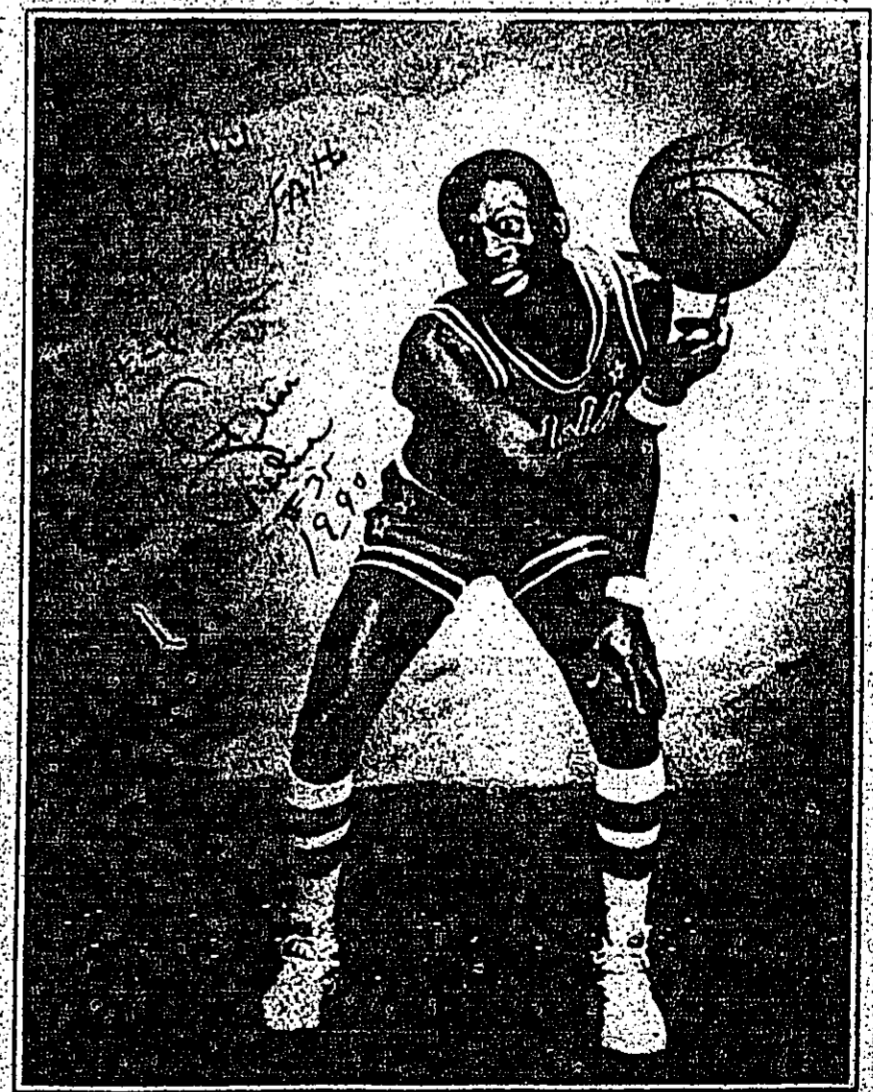

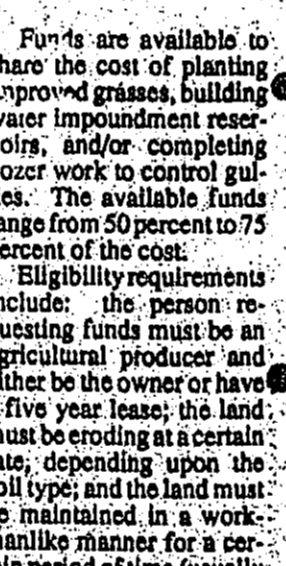

Social Security Questions Answered About Your Social Security Number

When it was first introduced in 1936, the social security number (SSN) was intended to be used as a device for keeping a record of individual earnings for the newly created social security system. According to David Bennett, District Manager of the Lufkin Social Security office, it is still used for that purpose but as the years have passed, the SSN has become the most widely recognized and most frequently used record-keeping number in America.

Today, SSNs are used by both public and private organizations in two basic ways. The first is for internal management purposes, such as licensing drivers, student identification or hospital record keeping. A second use of the SSN is to transfer or match data from one system to another. Examples include matching social security benefit data against AFDC records, veterans benefit rolls, SSA payments and federal payrolls to help curb fraud and abuse of government programs.

Rural Accident Report

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated a total of 17 rural traffic accidents in Tyler County during the month of June according to Sergeant Roy D. Henry, supervisor of Highway Patrol Area 2B-4. As a result of these accidents, Troopers reported nine injuries and no traffic fatalities.

Thus far in 1990, Troopers have investigated a total of 103 motor vehicle accidents in Tyler County resulting in sixty-two injuries and one traffic death.

TDCJ's Presence Beneficial To Tyler County

When "Booster" Publisher John Morrison asked me if I'd like to help him publish a special section welcoming the Texas Department of Criminal Justice employees to Tyler County, I felt like getting old my knees and begging him to let me do so.

As a pleasure to welcome these people for many reasons. Before TDCJ arrived here, we had no office in Woodville, although we did send our claims people here every two weeks to process unemployment claims.

When construction began on the Gib Lewis Prison Unit, we arrived on the scene, setting up a temporary mobile office at the construction site. It was there that I was able to witness firsthand the impact this unit has had and will continue to have on this community.

Once TEC began operation in Tyler County, local businesses became accustomed to calling us when they needed employees. As a result, my area manager has sent a proposal to Austin asking that we put a permanent office here. Because of budget constraints the request may not be approved, but we are trying and if we

succeeded our much-needed services will be available right here at home. One of the first persons I met when I came to Tyler County was former County Judge Allen Sturrock. He told me then, before construction ever began on the prison, that Tyler County needed a TEC office here. Thanks to his persistence and TDCJ Sturrock's dream may become reality.

Although I don't have the figures in front of me, I can tell you that hundreds of Tyler County residents, many of whom had struggled because of the lack of jobs in this area, were employed during the construction of this unit. Not only did they have jobs, but the pay scales were higher than what had ever before been available here.

Even where I go, be it the bank, the grocery store, the hardware store or even a convenience store, I see people who worked on construction jobs at this prison. And that

tells me something about just how many Tyler County people benefited from this project. Even the people from Jasper or Livingston who helped fill some of the skilled positions were an asset to Tyler County. They bought gas here, ate lunch at local restaurants, and spent their money here in numerous places.

One of the things I think might be overlooked is the fact that the Personal Director for the Gib Lewis unit is a Tyler County native, Cindy Riley, who is the daughter-in-law of County Commissioner Maxie Riley, and the entire TDCJ staff deserve praise.

I have seen these people go out of their way to help make the process of applying for a job with TDCJ easier for local residents. One girl even came into my office the other day and said Riley had given her her home telephone number, so that she could contact her to find out what jobs were posted. And this wasn't an old friend of Riley's, it was someone she had just met, someone looking for a job. Now that's dedication on Riley's part.

Warden Bruce Strickland, Riley and particularly Vicki Hinson have all cooperated and in most instances went beyond the call of duty to help me inform the local public how to apply and hopefully go to work at this unit. I have enjoyed the opportunity to work with these people. And I feel fortunate to have made what I consider new friends.

And even if Tyler County hadn't gained all the other benefits we have from TDCJ's presence in this community, we still would have some good reasons. We have some fantastic new friends and neighbors, the type of people who are a credit to any community. The best benefits we will reap are yet to come.

The Warren couple can truly say that this prison unit has changed things for them. It has not only meant a better paying job for both, but it also allowed Curtis to return to Tyler County to work.

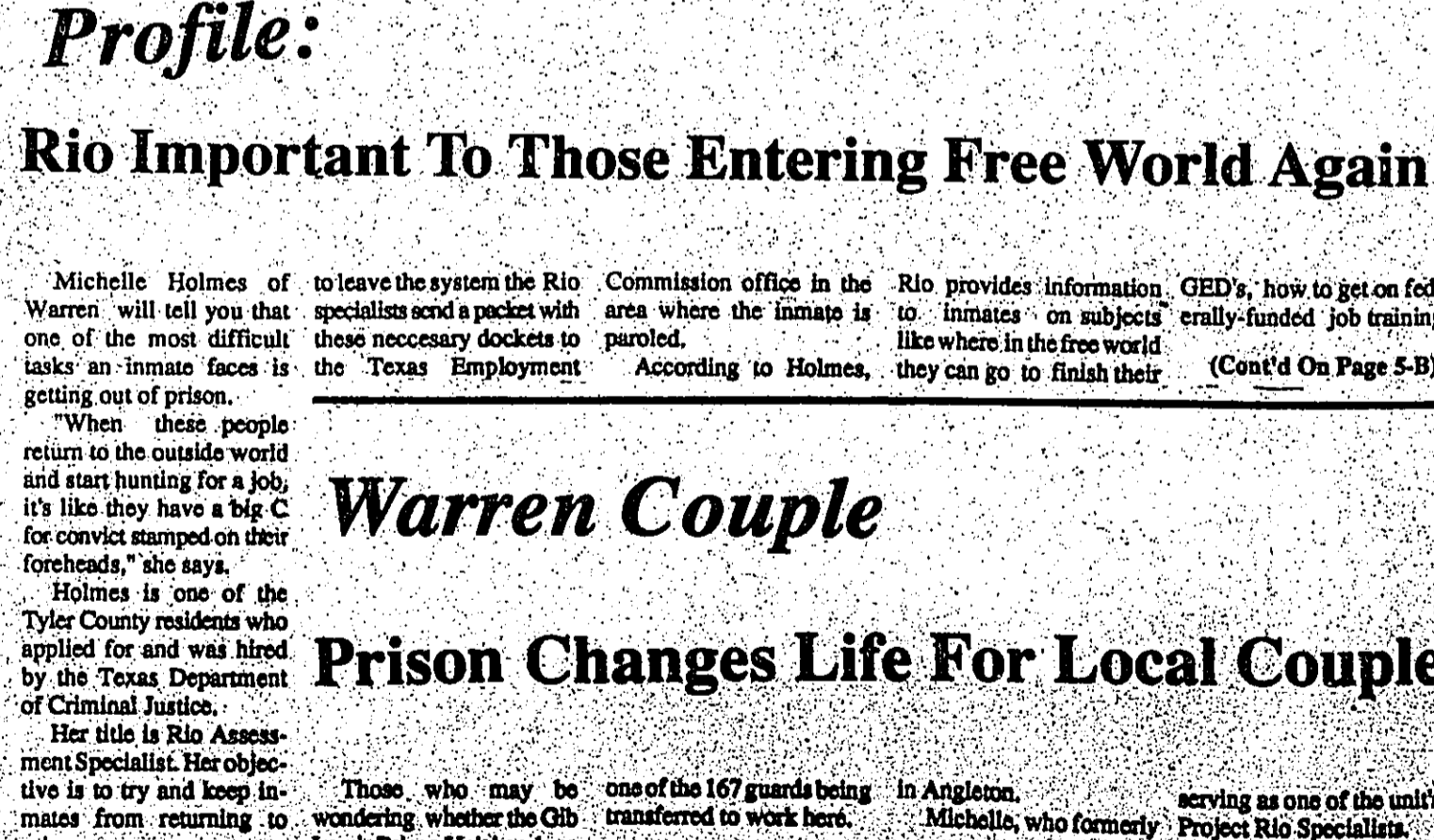
Curtis was hired by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice last April. He is one of the 167 guards being transferred to work here in Angleton.

Michelle, who formerly served as one of the unit's Project Rio Specialists, is now 18 months old.

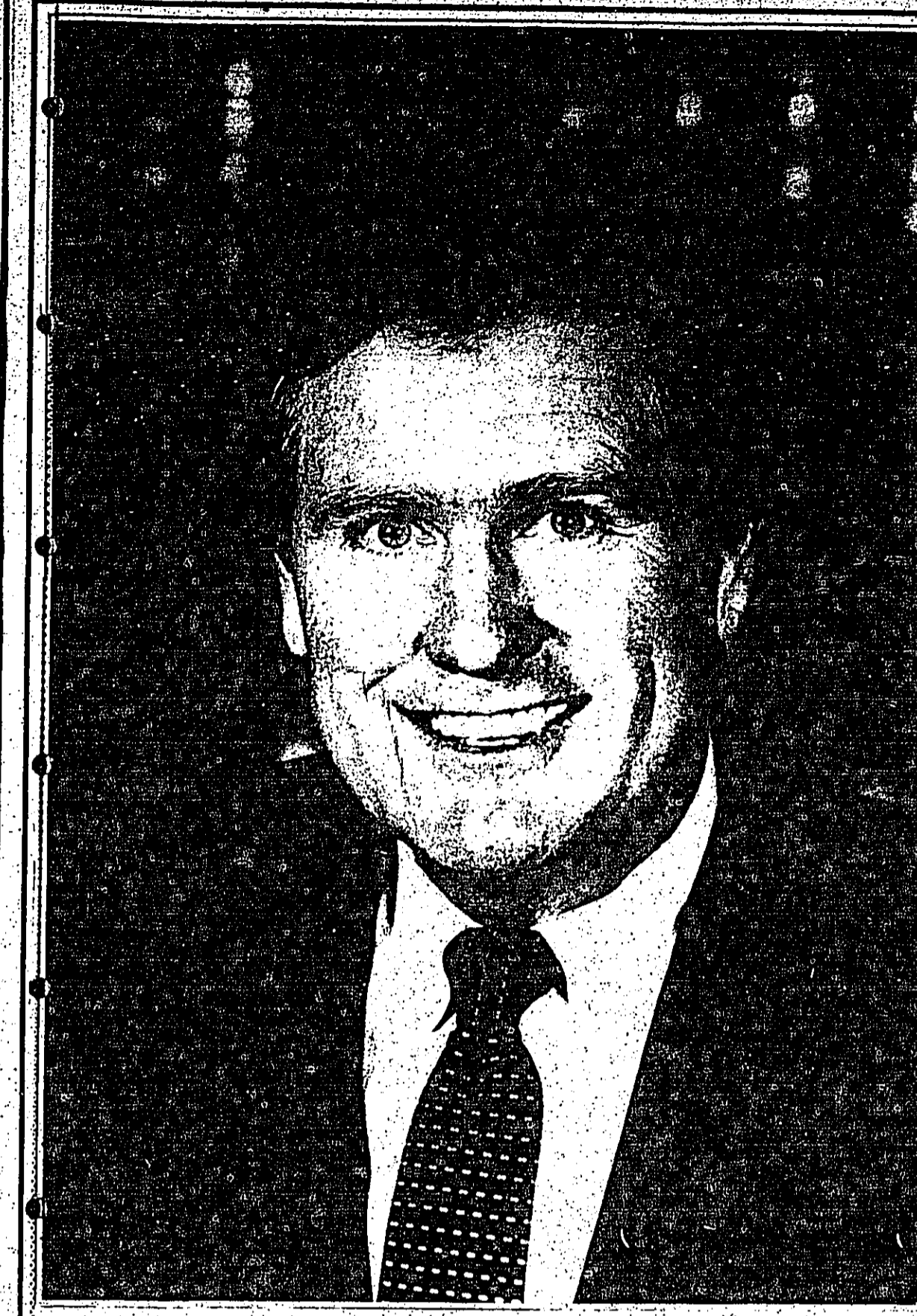

Warden's Career Proves Opportunity Abounds At TDCJ

Strickland, 37, began his career as a correctional officer at 19 years old, had continued throughout the 19 years he's worked for TDCJ to move up in his field, and in January became warden.

When he began his career in 1971 as a guard he wasn't required to attend the academy, because at the time those with a military background didn't have to.

After leaving high school Strickland joined the Texas National Guard. When he became a guard for TDCJ they were paying \$454 a month.

"When they hired me," he said, "it was a Thursday. They asked me if I could start the following day. When I told them I had to tie up some loose ends in Dallas, (where he was) (Cont'd On Page 10-B)

'Wardens Wife Enjoys Law Enforcement Career'

"What is it like being the wife of the Warden of the Gib Lewis Prison Unit at Woodville?" I asked pretty, blond, green-eyed Jan Strickland several weeks ago as she sat behind her desk at the Probation Office in the Tyler County Courthouse in Woodville.

"Not any different than being married to anyone in Law Enforcement," she said. "The phone rings day and night."

Although her husband, W. B. (Bruce) Strickland, has taken over the position of warden, she told me, he won't feel the full effects of his job until the prison receives inmates.

I studied this efficient career woman wearing a color coordinated ensemble that turned her green eyes to blue. "How did you meet him?" I asked.

She drew a deep breath and a nostalgic smile lit her face. "I met him through my sister and brother-in-law, Carol and Virgil (Butch) Jordan," she said.

"Butch had been in National Guard Training in Kentucky. This was in 1972. Butch and Bruce went in training at the same time. When they were released, Butch came home to Carol in Trinity, Texas and Bruce went to work for the Texas Department of Corrections at the Eastham Unit in Lovelady, 13 miles from Trinity.

"I graduated from Trinity High School in June then began working as a telephone operator for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company in Pasadena, then for a while in Huntsville.

"Carol and Butch introduced us. We fell in love and were married. I didn't work outside the home until Wes, our first child, was three years old," she said. "Then I went to work for the T.D.C. as well as working on an associate degree in Applied Science in Criminology and Corrections."

Jan received her degree in May of 1989 and hopes to get her bachelor's degree "before I'm too old for it to do me any good," she said.

"I was not interested in this field until I met Bruce." "What about your present job?" I asked.

"First let me say that I am very appreciative to the people of Woodville and Tyler County for this job. My title is Transfer Officer of the Tyler County Community Supervision and Correction Department," she said. "My name was changed in September. Formerly it was the Tyler County Probation Office."

"What are your duties?" "I supervise all the indirect cases and probationers that are transferred out of state or out of county.

Anti-Crime Stand Prompted Name For Gib Lewis Unit

Who is Gib Lewis? Many know him as the speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, and most folks in Tyler County know by now that a prison unit in Woodville will be named after him.

Why? According to a newsletter from the Texas Department of Corrections, the Woodville unit was named for Lewis because of his contributions to law enforcement and corrections in the state.

First elected to the House in 1971, Lewis' name was chosen for the unit because the TDC wanted to recognize his support of anti-crime legislation and efforts to expand the state prison system. With the ever-growing problem of prison overcrowding in the state, TDC felt the naming was one way to show appreciation for Lewis' efforts to help expand the system.

Another news release from Lewis' office, states that while in the Legislature, Lewis helped sponsor bills that were designed to combat crime, strengthen ethics laws, and toughen laws against drunk drivers.

For those who wonder who Lewis the man is, he was born in Limestone County, in a town named Oleta on Aug. 22, 1926.

"Grew up in Mexia, and graduated from Cleveland High School in 1945; after he also graduated from Sam Houston State Teacher's College, and

continued his studies at Texas Christian University while assigned to Carrollville in Fort Worth.

Married Sandra Margus in 1958. The couple has two daughters and three granddaughters. Owns a multi-million dollar firm, Lewis Label Products, Inc. "Lives with his wife in northwest Tarrant County where, since he moved there, he has been active in civic affairs, including the Fort Worth Jaycees.

"In this job," she said, "I came in backward. I had worked 10 years in TDC as a Corrections Counselor helping inmates with their institutional adjustments - more often overseeing their educational, vocational and social school work while they were in prison. Actually, I was responsible for coordinating the various aspects of the inmates' work, their education, adjustment and their family problems. This is why I say I came into this job backward - dealing with people who have been incarcerated to people who have been given a second chance. Looking at people on probation after working with people who have gone to prison is a little different. It should make people stop and think about it."

The phone rang. Her voice was pleasant, polite, firm - and unyielding. "You're tough," I said as she hung up the phone.

"I may tend to be a little harder on them (probationers) because I know where they're headed if they don't turn their lives around. Some are like little children. Some come up to me and treat me like I'm their mother - so eager to share. You've got to be there for them when they need you. And when one of them comes up to you later on and thanks you for guiding them in the right direction, it makes you feel good - knowing you've helped someone."

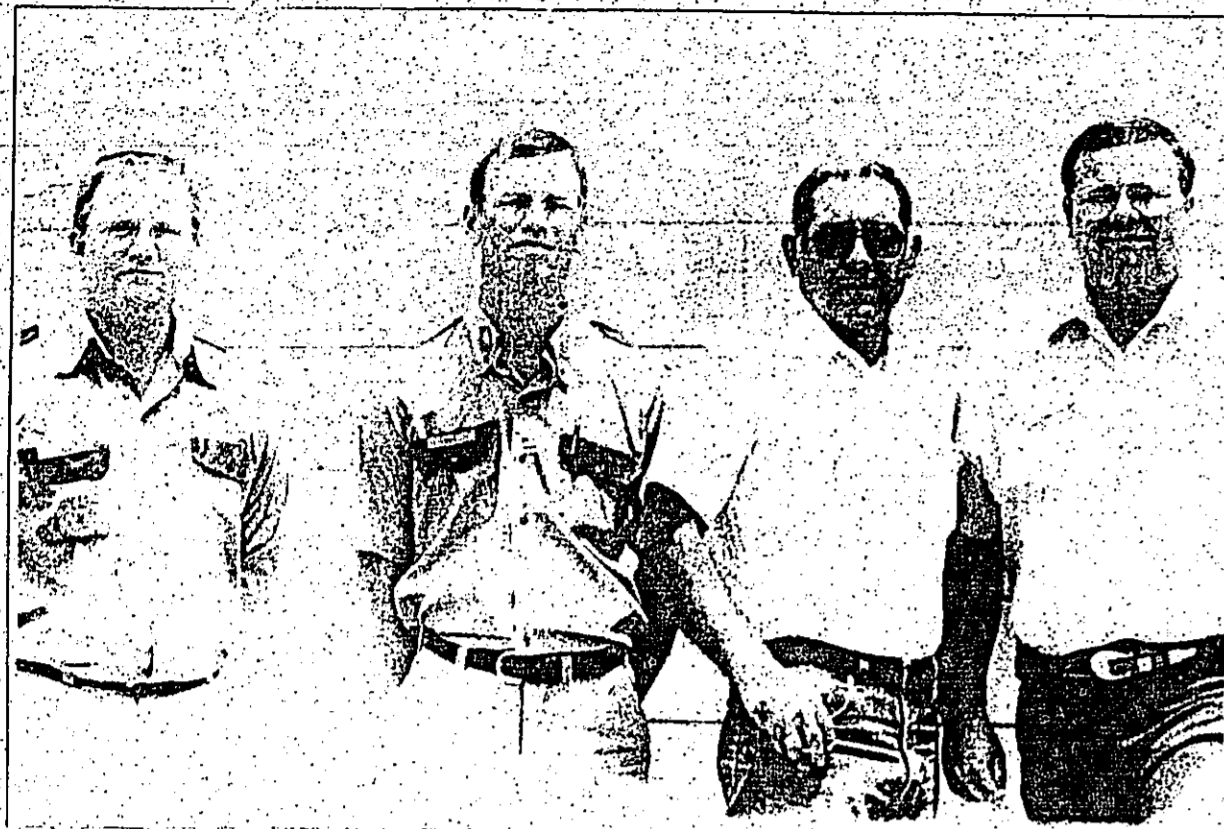
"What about your family?" I asked. "Bruce and I have two children. Westley is 17 and a junior in high school. Kassi is nine and in the fourth grade. We've been a close knit family since we moved to Woodville because we've had more time together. We bought a new travel trailer and have spent most of our weekends camping.

"Do you like roughing it in the great outdoors?" She smiled. "We had not done much camping before we bought the trailer, but we're getting the hang of it. We haven't built a fire yet. It's been too hot. And we're really not roughing it. Our trailer has air conditioning, a microwave oven and all the comforts of home - just about."

"Our move to Woodville has been real positive for us. Everyone has been extremely wonderful and friendly. Our kids have loved it from day one! And by the move being good for them, it has made it easier on us. "When you're growing up, she shrugged her shoulders, beamed back and again a nostalgic smile crossed her face. "You don't think about someday moving to the place where you visited as a child. But that's what happened to me. "I visited in Woodville a lot as a child. My Dad, A.B. Madlin, was born and raised in Colmesneil but he died when I was 10 years old. After that, we never came to Woodville again. "The first week after we moved here, my uncle Lloyd "Bear" Madlin, who lives in Woodville, appeared at my office door looking for me. I had not seen him in 17 years. What a wonderful reunion we had!

"When I was a little girl, another aunt and uncle, Estelle and Ois, also lived in Woodville. Their home was where the Justice Center is now located. Estelle died last March and Ois is now living in Katy. Jan said that everytime she passes the Estelle Center, her heart reaches back for Estelle's and Ois' home. "That's where I always came when I was a little girl," she said. "Havin' been reunited with my family I had not seen in so many years has meant a whole lot to me. "The Stricklands are Baptists but have not attended church in Woodville. Jan said they just haven't decided what church to attend. Kassi went to Vacation Bible School at First Baptist Church and enjoyed it. "What are your plans for the future?" I asked. "In the position Bruce is in," she said, "it's hard to make plans for the future because he could be transferred anytime. And I hope to remain in Law Enforcement too." "Jan's hobbies include camping, making crafts (nothing in particular), she said, - and shopping. "I really don't have time for a lot of hobbies. When you have a family and a job, that's your hobby right there. Apparently she does both well. We wish Jan and her entire family much success and happiness in all their endeavors."

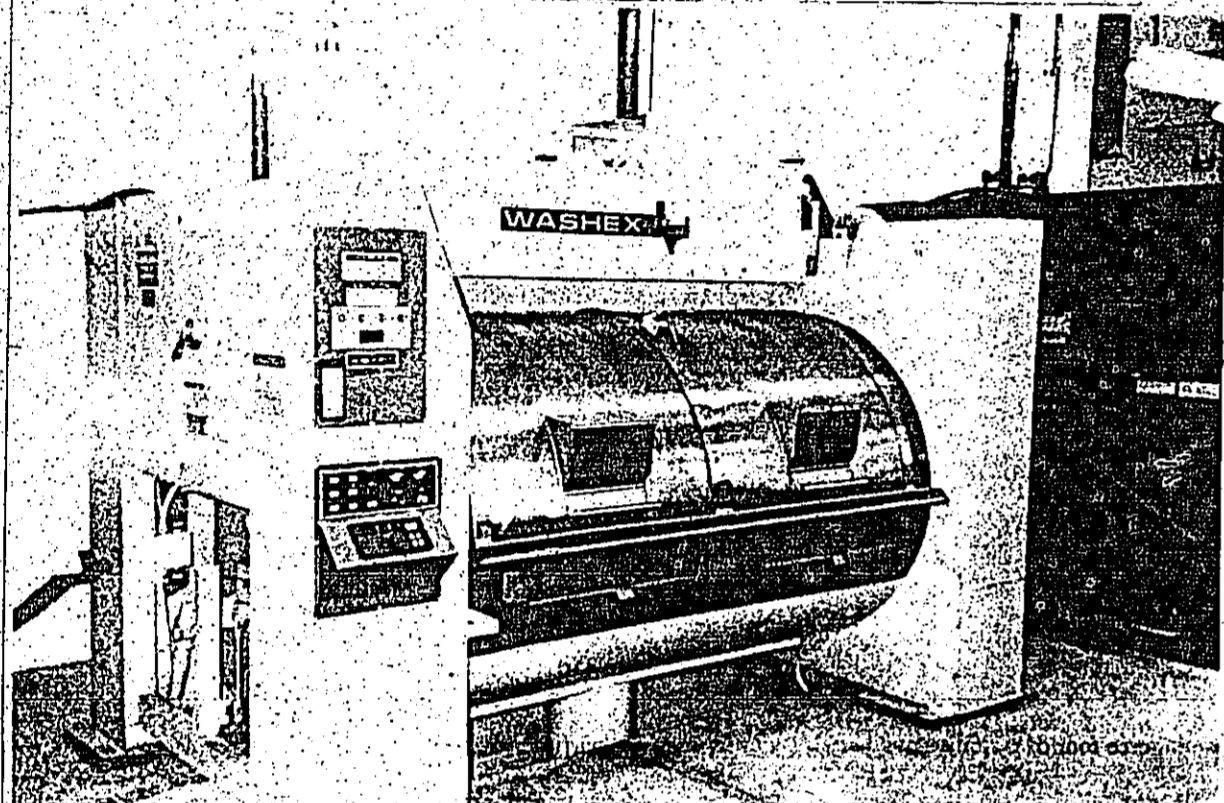

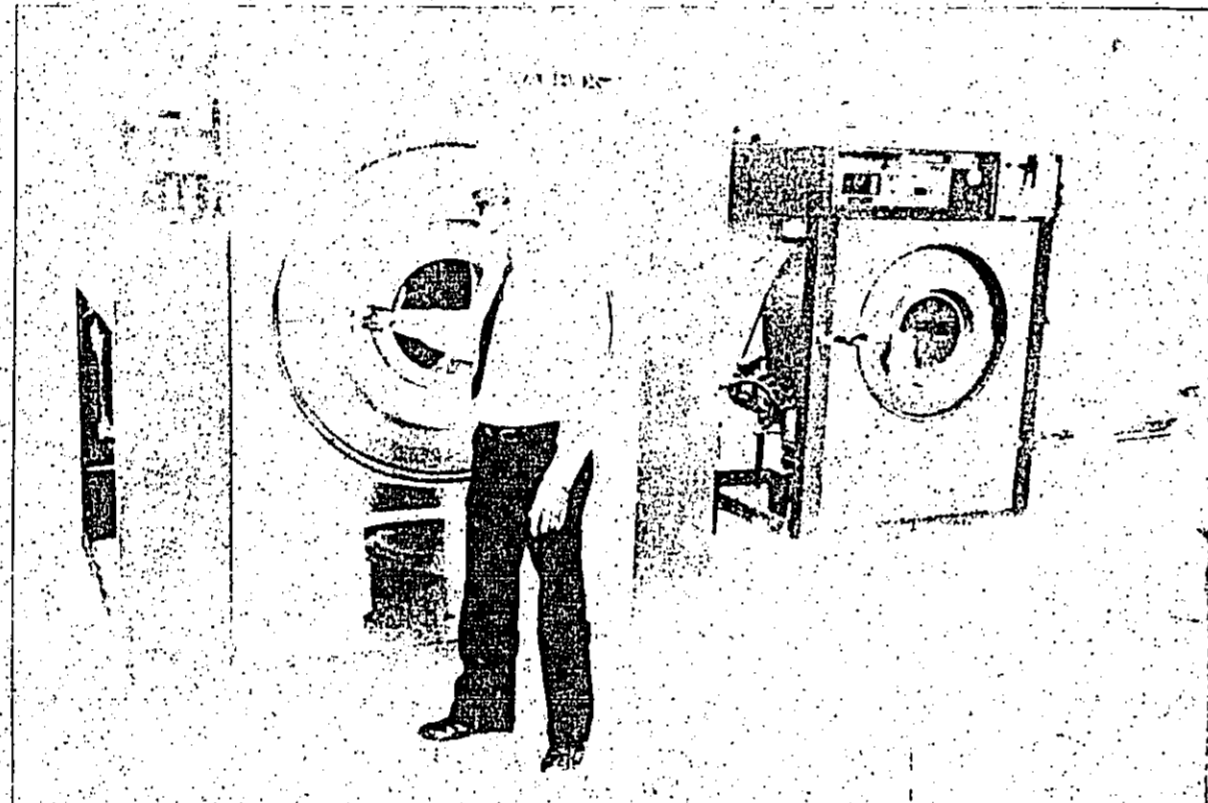

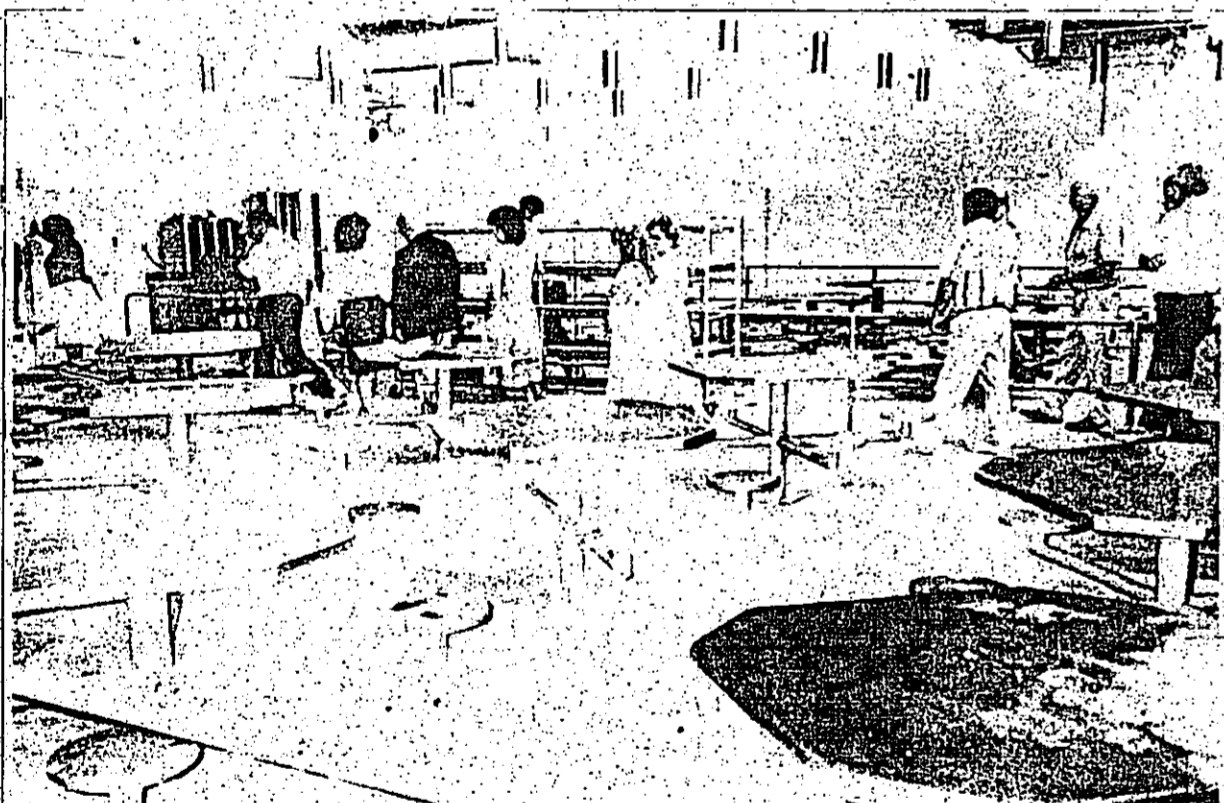

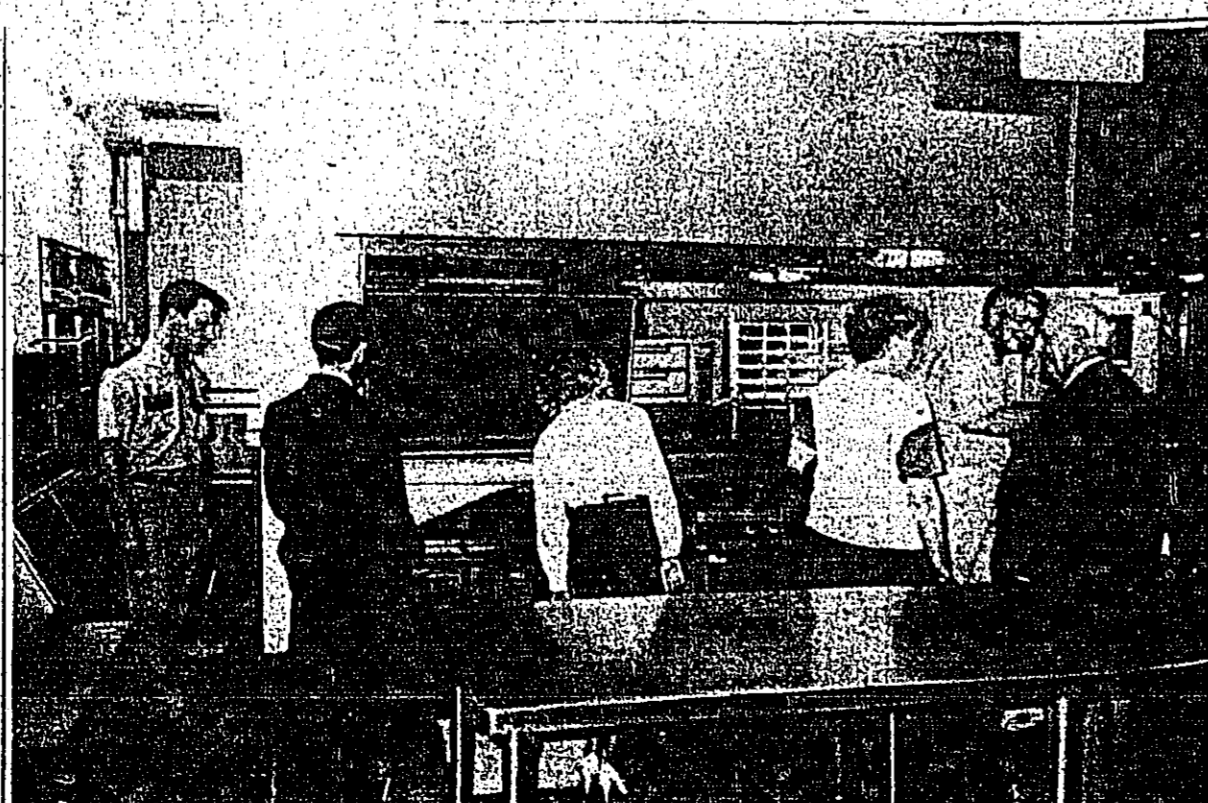

DETCOG Offers Programs To Help Gain Employment

Job seekers new to Tyler County need to be made aware of the special services offered through the Deep East Texas Council of Governments.

Among the services DETCOG offers are on the job, customized, and classroom training programs.

The on the job training program is designed to train the employee a new skill. DETCOG pays half of the employee's wages for a six-month period while the employee is training.

Another feature of DETCOG is the customized training program.

Employers enter into an agreement to hire workers trained to their specifications. The training may occur at the employer's site or may be provided by a training vendor, able to meet the employer's requirement.

The classroom training program is normally conducted in an institutional setting. Technical skills are taught to prepare workers for a specific occupation for which there is a demand. Employers can select from an applicant pool which offers workers trained for a specific job.

The program finances the tuition and books, and in some instances even housing and transportation while the prospective employee attends school.

Other programs offered by DETCOG include the Older Workers Program for persons 55 and older, the Dislocated Workers Program, Summer Youth Employment Program and Computer Assisted Instruction.

To find out if you are eligible to participate in any of the above programs, inmates can take vocational contact DETCOG at 283-3795, or visit their office at 914 N. Magnolia.

programs offered through the Deep East Texas Council of Governments, how to dress for interviews, etc.

"We stress to them to clear up old traffic warrants and get their business straight before they get out," she said. "So that it will be easier for them once they are out."

Holmes said that Rio works closely with the TEC and DETCOG, the Department of Human Services and other agencies that can provide assistance to these inmates.

While still on the inside, inmates can take vocational and other educational courses which can help them find employment once they are out.

"We help them determine short-term and long-term goals," she said. "For instance, one's short-term goal may be to be a welder, whereas the long-term goal may be to be a construction site engineer."

A lot of Rio's responsibility involves meeting basic needs, said Holmes. "Once the basic needs are met, they are less likely to come back," she added. "And they are more likely to become responsible members of society."

County Commissioners Know Your Elected Officials

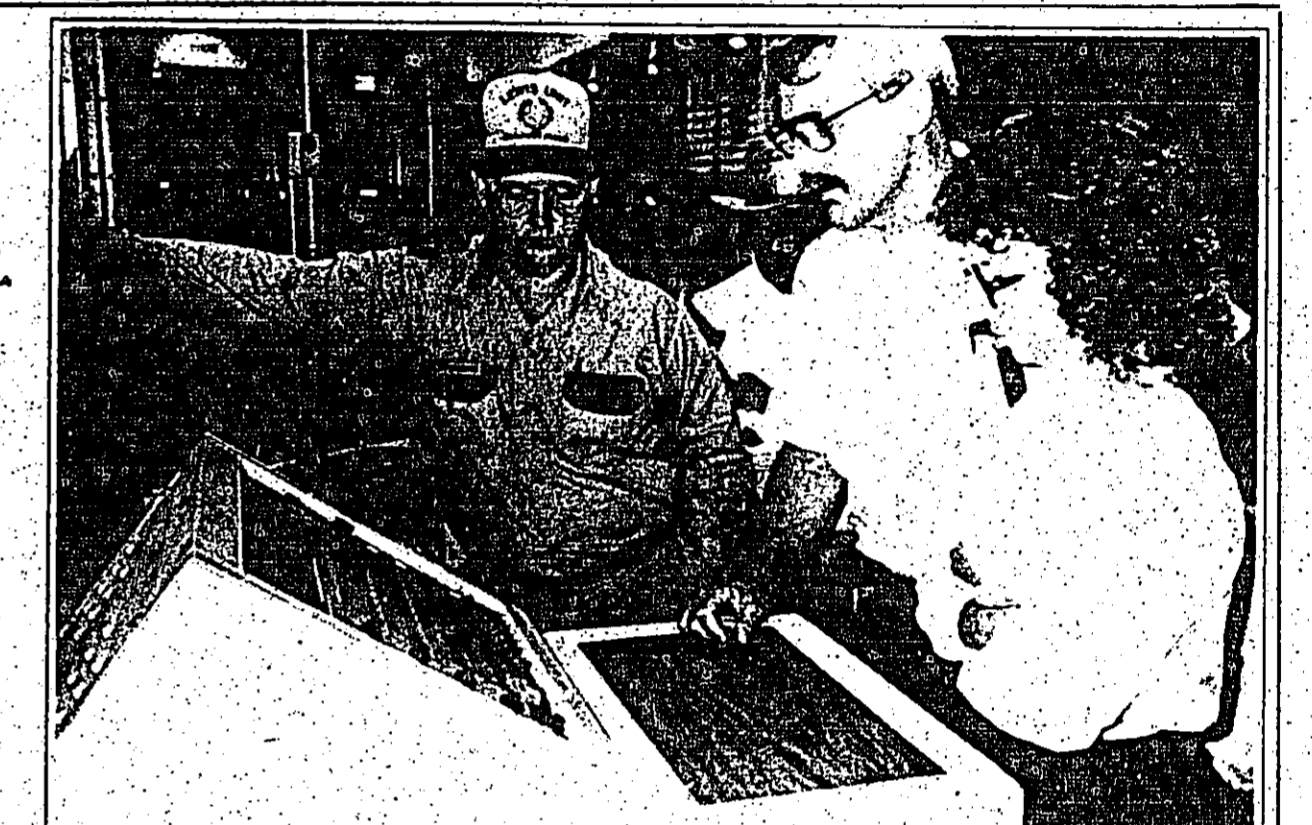

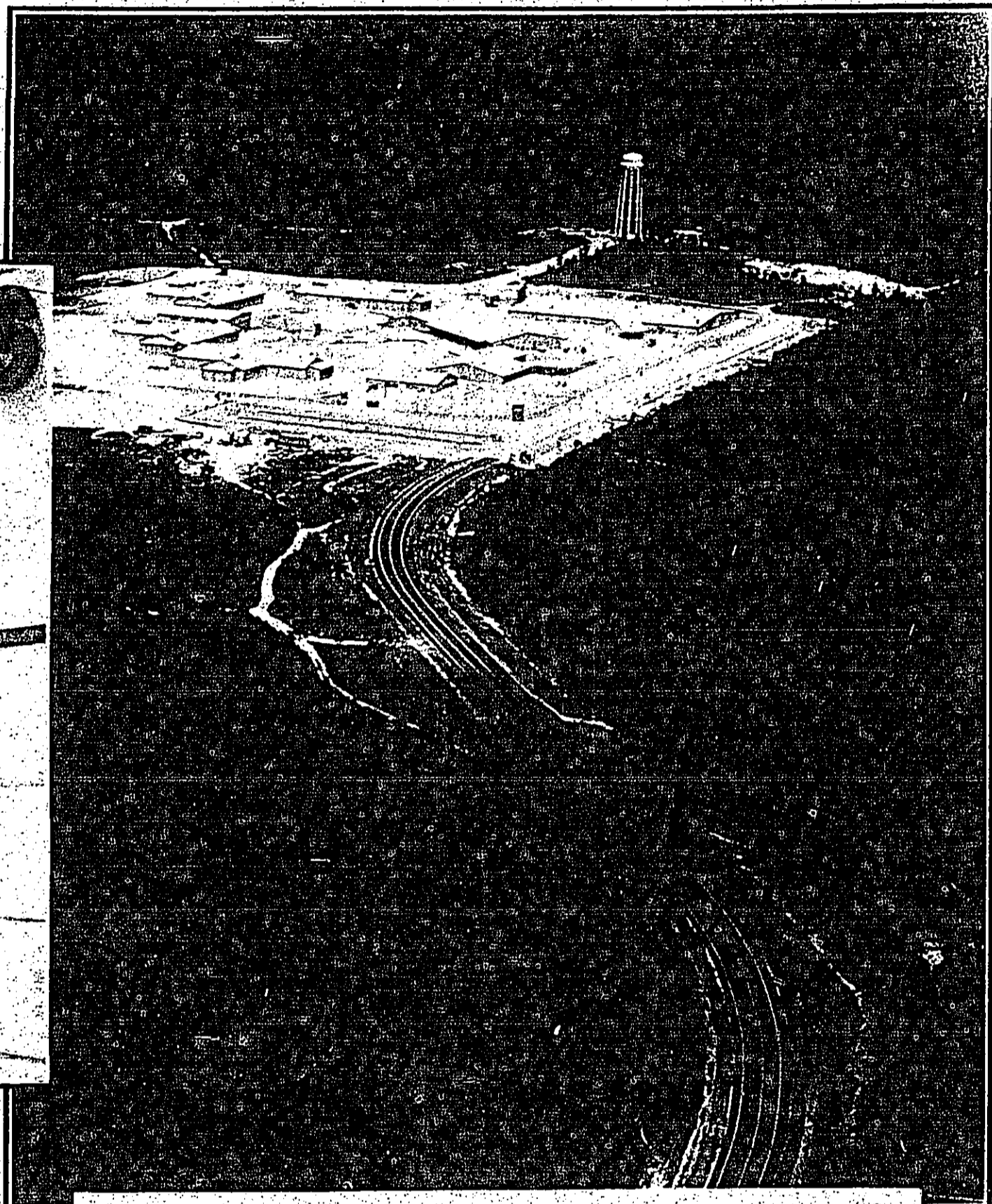

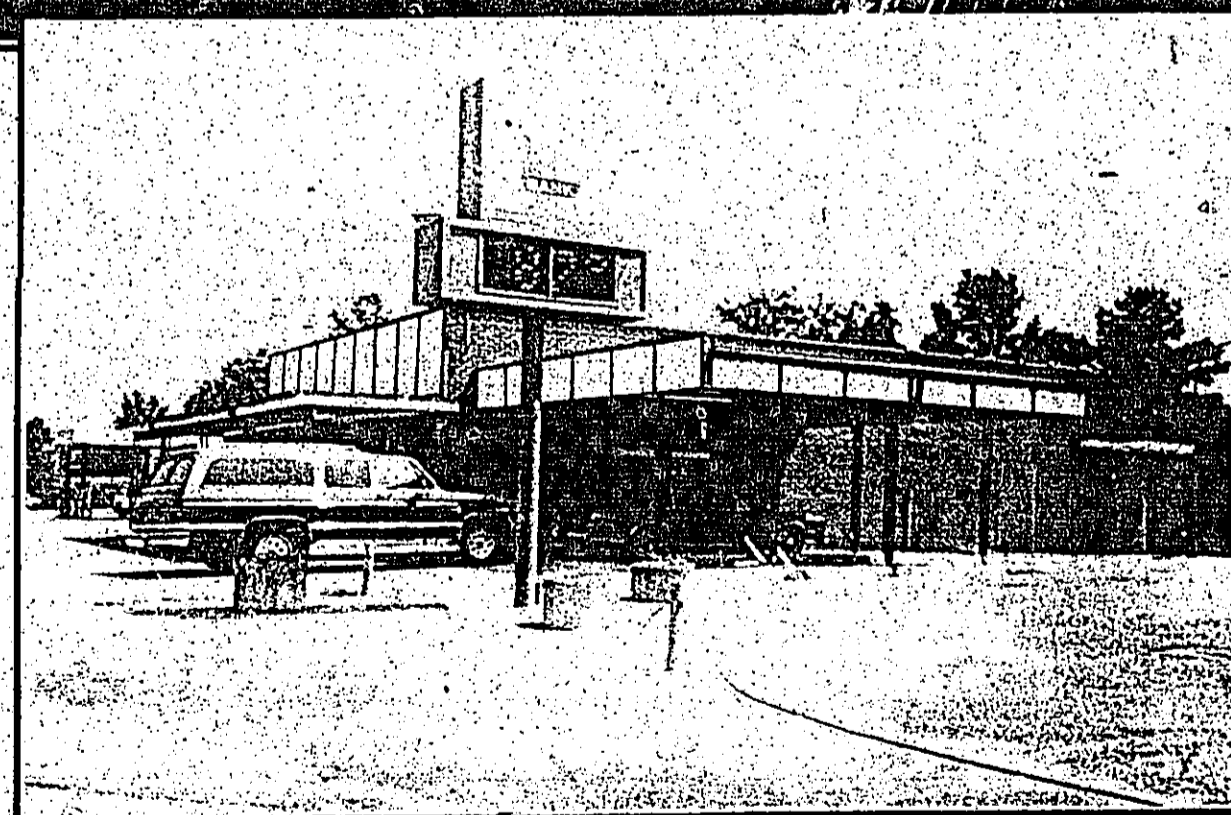

Many of Tyler County's newest residents, who are moving here to work for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, will be needing to have their driver's license changed, need to know where to register to vote, etc...
Below is a list of services available from different agencies in the county:
-Department of Public Safety- Located in the Tyler County Justice Center, on Hwy. 69 across from Knapp Ford. To obtain information on days and hours you can have your driver's license changed, call 283-7757.
-Chamber of Commerce-The Tyler County Chamber of Commerce offers a variety of services and can be of great assistance to those who are just settling into this county. Located inside the Woodville Inn at 201 N. Magnolia, the office is open from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. Monday through Friday. Call 283-2632 for more information on where to go to enjoy scenic attractions in this area, or for additional information on settling in the county.
-County Clerk's Office- To obtain marriage licenses, a birth certificate, death certificate or record a deed or legal instrument related to real estate contact this office, located in the Tyler County Courthouse. The phone number is 283-2281, or 283-7362.
-County Tax Assessor/Collector- To obtain vehicle registrations, license plates and renewal stickers, a voter registration card, or pay property taxes contact this office. It is located in the Tyler County Courthouse and the phone number is 283-2734.
-District Clerk's Office- This office is responsible for functions such as issuing passports and recovering unpaid child support. To contact this office, phone 283-7263.
-Justice of the Peace- Wanda Brasher represents precinct 1, Tom Parker, precinct 2, J.E. Hanks, precinct 3 and Roy Drake, precinct 4. To file a small claims lawsuit or to pay a traffic ticket issued by the Department of Public Safety you will need to contact the JP in your precinct.

from) they asked me if I could start the following Monday.

In 1972, a year after going to work for TDCJ, he was promoted to commissary manager.

His career has prepared him well to head the many different departments that come under his title as warden. He's worked as building lieutenant, personnel lieutenant, disciplinary captain, major and warden I (assistant warden), among other positions.

His duties as warden, he says, are to "maintain the custody of the inmates assigned to my unit, make sure all rules and regulations are followed, and to provide the inmates and employees with a safe, clean working environment."

Part of the reason for his rapid growth within his field could be attributed to the efforts he made to become more knowledgeable in this area, like earning an associate's degree in Correctional Science, and a B.A. in Criminology and Corrections.

"But he'll tell you fast that the most important asset one can have when seeking a career in corrections is common sense.

"An officer with common sense and the education is a good officer," he says. "An officer with just common sense is also good. Both of those make better officers than one with an education but no common sense."

Strickland says that his career has had some gratifying moments, times when a prisoner or his family members write or visit the prison to express appreciation for the educational and rehabilitative opportunities that prisoner was offered while there.

"The thing about the prison system is there are opportunities for rehabilitation if the prisoner wants to take advantage of them," he says.

"We want to rehabilitate them (prisoners), and offer every opportunity to do so, and some take advantage of that opportunity and some don't," says Strickland.

Since being assigned as warden in January, Strickland says he has participated in interviewing,

along with other board members, the many Tyler County residents who applied to positions available at this unit.

Recently, this board interviewed 100 applicants to fill nine clerical positions.

"I really and truly wish we had more jobs, because during the interviews we ran across so many good, qualified applicants," he says.

But Strickland added that as much as he'd like to have seen Tyler County get a second unit, the 250-bed one awarded to Livingston will have as big an impact on Tyler County as another unit would.

"Having a unit in Polk County is the next best thing," he says. "Some of the people here will be promoted to Livingston, which will create openings here."

Western Weekend

During the last weekend in March each year trailriders from around East Texas crusade to Woodville. This event includes Friday night dances, a dazzling parade through downtown Woodville on Saturday and a rodeo held at the 4-H FFA Rodeo Arena on Hwy 190 west of Woodville on Saturday night. During the rodeo, the Western Weekend Rodeo Queen is crowned.

Dogwood Festival and Pageant

Created in the 1930's the annual Dogwood Festival is a salute to the beauty of the blossoming dogwood tree, which grows wild in East Texas. During the first weekend in April, when the festival is held, the trees are in full bloom. The festival continues to grow larger each year, drawing thousands of people from surrounding areas. The events include dances, an historical pageant, bluegrass music on the courthouse square, Arts and Crafts Fair and the crowning of the Dogwood Queen.

Chamber of Commerce Banquet

Held each year in January, the Outstanding Citizen of the year and the Honorary Outstanding Citizen of the year is named during the chamber's largest fundraiser. The event always includes guest speakers and entertainment.

Miss Tyler County Pageant

Held each February at the Kirby Auditorium, the pageant brings together some of Tyler County's most beautiful and talented youth to vie for this prestigious title, along with a scholarship. Competition includes Miss Tyler County, Junior Miss Tyler County and Future Miss Tyler County.

Woodville Garden Club Flower Show

Held during April the annual event is sponsored by the Woodville Garden Club and features different categories of arrangements and potted plants.

Tyler County Fair

During October the fair features a midway, exhibits of arts and crafts, and an auction of baked goods and livestock.

Tour of Homes

Sponsored by the Heritage Civic Club, the Women's Reading Club and the Women's Study Club, proceeds from this tour go toward 18th scholarships.

Heritage Village

Take a stroll through the past by visiting the Heritage Village Museum and gift shop, located on Hwy 190 west. Social Security While In Prison

According to David Bennett, District Manager of the Lufkin Social Security District, an often asked question is whether a person may be paid Social Security benefits while in prison. In general, he said, the answer is "no", but there is an exception which will be addressed later.

Until 1980 there were no restrictions in the law which prevented an incarcerated person from receiving benefits. If all factors of entitlement were met, benefits were paid. The types of benefits included retirement, survivors, disability and even student benefits, if appropriate.

In 1980 Legislative changes suspended disability payments to those imprisoned for a felony and also student benefits to those in prison. These were the most common types of benefits paid to

Retirement benefits for inmates age 62 or over were not affected by the 1980 legislation. Benefits were dependent benefits payable on the work record of incarcerated individuals. Additional language was added to read, in the case of disability, that any impairment that arose or was aggravated during the commission of a felony would not be considered in determining medical severity for entitlement. Further, this change also applied to any impairment that arose or was aggravated while in prison. The 1980 laws effectively eliminated disability and student benefits, Bennett stated.

In 1983 the law was changed again - to exclude retirement and survivor benefits to those in prison. Social Security claims are still processed for inmates who have eligible dependents. Entitlement must be established for the worker in order to make payment to his/her dependents. The prisoner's benefits is suspended and would be payable only after the first full month after release from prison - if all other factors of entitlement are still met.

The only exception to the prohibition against receiving benefits while in prison is if the inmate is found to be entitled to a disability and is actively engaged in a vocational rehabilitation program approved by a court of law. The program must be expected to result in the inmate being able to do substantial gainful work upon release - and within a reasonable time.

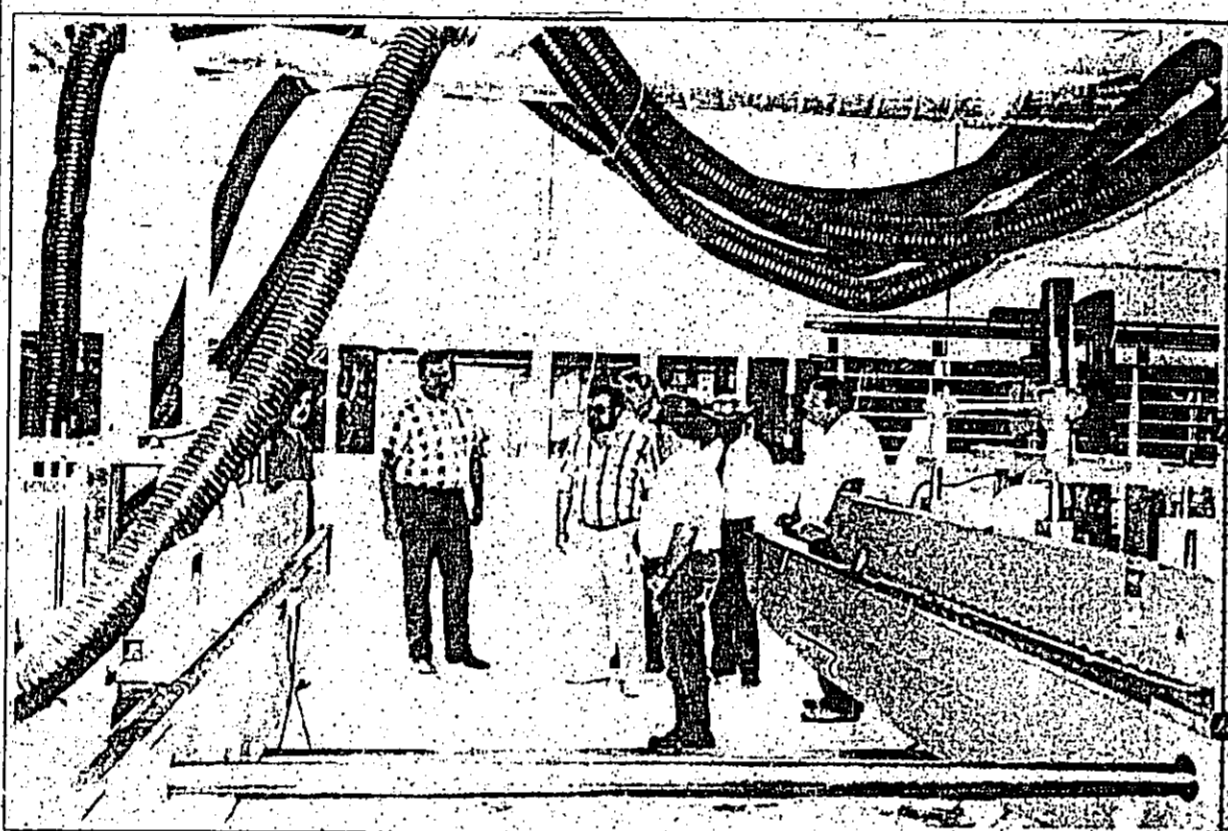

WIC Participants Are Urged To Return To Clinics

State and Woodville WIC health officials are urging the women, infants and children who were cut from the Texas WIC nutrition program earlier this year to contact their local clinics. Several thousand of those who were cut are once again eligible for free food, medical screenings and nutrition counseling.

Legislation passed by Congress and signed by President Bush this week allows the Texas WIC program to restore services to 15,000 of the 27,000 participants who were cut. WIC currently serves 330,000 people every month, down from 357,000 in January.

"This is a godsend for

the women, infants and children who will get back on the program," said Sharon McCloud, Nutritionist. "This legislation means that the pregnant women and many children who were dropped from the program and who need help are now eligible to be re-evaluated."

"We urge all those, es-

pecially pregnant women, who were cut from WIC during the past few months to return to their WIC clinic," said Sharron McCloud. "It is imperative that pregnant women eat healthy foods and have their health monitored. Otherwise, their babies' health could be in jeopardy."

The newly passed legislation allows for the participants' return by enabling the Texas WIC program to borrow up to 3 percent of the funds earmarked for next year's food costs.

The rising cost of WIC-authorized foods—milk, cheese, juice, eggs, beans, cereal, peanut butter and formula—forced the participants to be cut.

The Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) is administered with federal funds totaling \$150,004,058, which accounts for 96.4 percent of program's annual budget.
