Woodville Ask Residents Help To Kick Off Recycling Effort

Woodville City Fathers are seeking residents help in recognizing the importance of city garbage customers help in starting a curbside garbage recycling program here.

Kickoff for the curbside recycling will begin in Mid-October said Bobby Gibson, hired by the City of Woodville to co-ordinate the program. Funds for Gibsons position, totaling some \$9,000 annually, come from a \$20,000 recycling grant recently awarded to the city. Gibson apparently will keep the value earned from the recyclable goods collected, he said.

Gibson is asking that residents place their recyclable items 8-10 feet behind their regular garbage. He asks also that persons separate into five basic items: newspapers, plastic (milk jugs separate from plastic cold drink bottles); glass (green, clear and brown); aluminum cans and steel and tin cans.

Gibson said all food containers must be rinsed out. He said also that a pickup truck will follow to regular garbage truck around until a route is established. He will keep records of materials collected for city examination.

Warren Adopts 1990 Tax Rate

In a Special Called Meeting Thursday, Sept. 13, 1990, the Warren Independent School District Board of Trustees voted unanimously to adopt a 1990 tax rate of \$1.33. The new rate represents a 4 percent increase over the 1989 effective tax rate. According to Sandra Harrison, tax collector for the District, since the increase

is over the effective tax rate, most taxpayers will pay less taxes. Harrison said that the only people who will have an increase in their taxes are those whose property evaluation has been raised.

The Board also voted to give those teachers in the District who did not receive a raise from the state a raise of \$500. Those

teachers who have been at the top level of 10 for a year or more did not receive a state raise this year. Warren has 10 teachers in this category.

Following Executive Session, the Board voted to employ Hayley Marie McDonald as a First Grade teacher at Fred Elementary School. Board President Harold Davis read a letter

from Mark Nye, TSTA Unit 5 representing Warren Aide Jo Seiley stating that Seiley has withdrawn her grievance against the District. Seiley was grieving the fact that she was transferred from her position as Middle School Secretary to the position of Elementary School Aide at a lesser salary.

Woodville is one of 65 cities, counties and parishes currently participating in Gulf States' Team City program in Texas and Louisiana.

Woodville's First Baptist Church welcomes Dr. Charles W. Haney, Jr. as their new pastor. His formal ministry begins Sunday, October 14, 1990.

Dr. Haney is currently completing commitments at Midway Baptist Church in Big Spring, Texas where he has been pastor since January 1988. Following completion of a Bachelor of Arts degree at Baylor University in 1981, Dr. Haney served several other churches in youth related work. During this time he attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth receiving both Master of Divinity and Doctor of Ministry degrees.

Resource Booklet Available

The Southeast Texas Resource Conservation and Development Area (RC&D) recently published a 52 page booklet entitled "Coastal Marsh Management-Southeast Texas."

The Southeast Texas RC&D area which began operation in 1967 covers ten county area including Tyler County. Organized under the sponsorship of local units of government, RC&D is designed to help local citizens by conserving, improving, developing resources in wetland and area needs. The Long Leaf Soil and Water Conservation District serves as a sponsor to the RC&D area.

The booklet was developed to provide technical information to decision makers when planning or taking of our coastal marshes.

Topics include: water quality, soils, vegetation, wildlife, fisheries, birds and dune management, and other data to be considered when managing coastal marshes.

The booklet was written by personnel of the USDA Soil Conservation Service and Texas A&M Marine Advisory Service. The project was funded by the Chevron Corporation.

Copies of the booklet are being provided to area schools, public libraries, and to coastal landowners and natural resource managers.

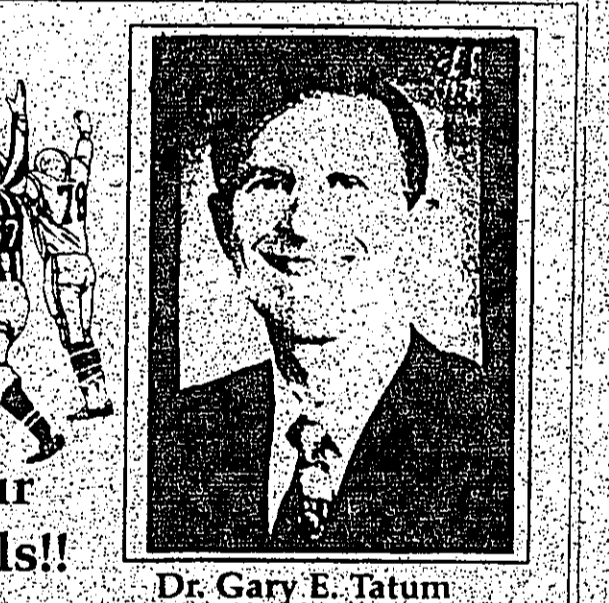

I can't believe a "system" works this way. It just doesn't make sense.

So who's to blame, the law makers or the insurance companies? I'm a scholar, but I'd say both. I believe that something needs to change because the way things work now is totally unproductive and in some cases, even destructive.

If the law makers are going to force us to buy car insurance, then it is their responsibility to make sure everyone can afford it. Poor people need a lot of help. 
Two invitations "flattered to the steps as I pulled open my back screen door preparing to put my key into the lock. I had been gone for only a short while and realized I had missed my visitors.
