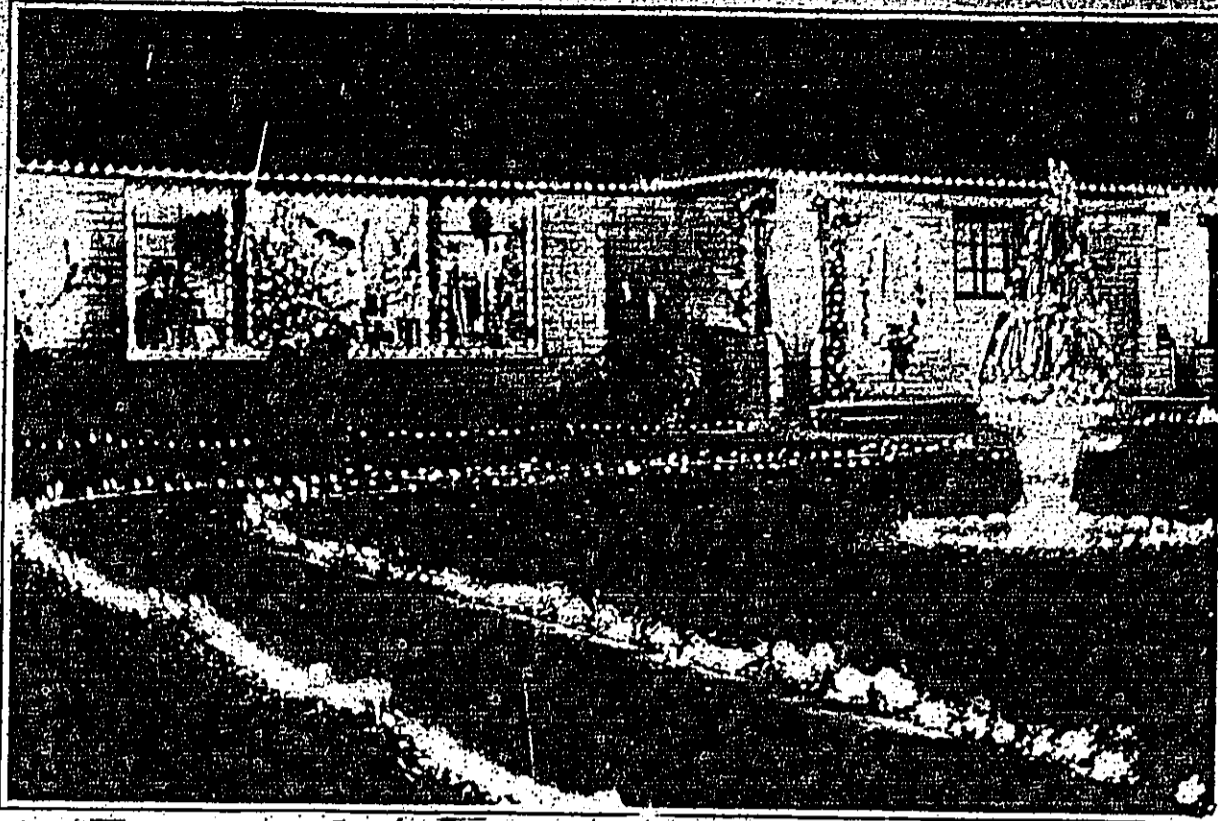

ERIC Would Pay For Itself

Governmental officials and other interested parties from throughout a 12-county area in East Texas Friday heard feasibility study results for an area Economic Resources Information Center (ERIC). The study, by Computer Sciences Corporation of Beltsville, Md., was contracted for by the School of Forestry at SFA in Nacogdoches, which has been working on a project for the past two years in conjunction with the Deep East Texas Council of Governments and the Deep East Texas Development Association. Bob Wright of Computer Sciences Corp. presented results of the study, which was made possible

by a grant from the Southland Foundation. **County Judge 'Stable' After Heart Attack**
Tyler County Judge Jerome Owens is said to be "in stable condition" as of prestime Tuesday following an apparent heart attack suffered while returning from a strategy planning meeting seeking to extend FM 92 to Recreation Road 255 on Thursday Nov. 29. Judge Owens was rushed to Tyler County Hospital arriving around 10:30 p.m. by Sheriff Gary Hentigan, who also had attended the meeting at the Mt. Sinai Baptist Church.

Wright noted the key to ERIC would be a Geographical Information System that, once in place, could be cost beneficial as quickly as two years after beginning operations. Dr. Kent Adair, dean of the SFA School of Forestry, noted the next step is to obtain backing commitments from entities throughout the 12-county area. The ERIC control center would be located at SFA, according to the analysis and conceptual design study. Projected costs to put fully computerized system into operation range from \$1.5 million to \$3 million, depending on whether available housing could be utilized or a control office building be funded from scratch. Operational costs for ERIC were estimated at nearly \$1 million for the start-up year, dropping to

nearly half that figure annually thereafter. Client usage would more than offset operating costs, according to the study. Preacher Haynes: He Clips And Saves

For 46 years, the Rev. W. Charles "Preacher" Haynes has been clipping hair -- and for 37 of those years, he has been saving souls -- bringing them to Christ, combining barbering with God's call to the ministry. Haynes began barbering (unprofessionally) when he was child watching his mother cut "all the kids" hair. When he was old enough, he undertook the responsibility himself. For a while during his childhood, he lived with his uncle, who was a barber. This reinforced his desire to take up the profession as well as giving him the opportunity to observe a professional barber at work. Born on February 4, 1925 in Foreman, Arkansas, Haynes was raised in Ar-

kansas and Texas around the sawmill business. In 1943, he married Elizabeth Callan also of Foreman, Arkansas. Three months later, during the height of World War II, he was a selective service volunteer and joined the U.S. Navy. He began cutting hair in 1944 while aboard the USS Crescent City APA 21 in the South Pacific. However, his duties were not all placid. In 1943, he was an instructor at the Amphibious Base at San Diego, California. His duties included teaching seamen the use of 4.5 barrage rockets. Shortly thereafter, he was assigned to an ambulance boat working from a Base Hospital ship at Okinawa. There, his duties included taking care of the wounded, transferring them

to a regular hospital ship, trying to identify the dead and prepare them for burial. Haynes was in the invasion at Okinawa on an attack ship converted to a hospital ship -- a luxury liner that, prior to the war, sailed from San Francisco to New Orleans. A thread of bringing hope to those in need, prevailed throughout Haynes' tenure of service. Discharged from the service in 1945 at Remington, Washington, Haynes went home to his wife, Elizabeth, who had spent the war years waiting for him in San Francisco. They made their home there until 1951 when they moved to Woodville. While in San Francisco, Haynes graduated from barber school and became

a professional barber, a skill he used during his six years they lived on the west coast. Shortly after their arrival in Woodville, Haynes went to work for Mr. Martin Nellius as a barber at the Palaco barber shop. He also went into business with his dad, W.J. "Shorty" Haynes whose sawmill business was located south of Warren where the senior Haynes owned and operated several portable sawmills in Tyler County -- one at his home near Warren. Earlier "Preacher" Haynes had made a promise to God and forgot about it. In 1953, the younger Haynes went broke in the sawmill business, but continued to work for Nellius. One February day in 1953, Haynes was broke and

pastor asked, "please lead the song." "I can't," he replied. The Lord said, "You told me you would."

Although he can't read a note, he led the music that night.

After he surrendered to the ministry in February of that year, his wife began to change for the better and in 1957, he bought the Palace Barber Shop from Nellius Victory Baptist Church at Town Bluff is the third church he has built in Tyler County since that February day in 1953 when he told God that he would do anything He wanted him to do.

Since that time, he has built Mt. Nebo Baptist Church at Fred, Cobb Mill Baptist Church at Woodville and Victory Baptist Church at Town Bluff.

Preacher Haynes pastored his first church at Shiloh Baptist Church near Camp Ground about seven miles west of Woodville. He pastored there one year, resigned and accepted the call to Bethany Baptist Church northwest of Colmesneil. One month later Beech Creek Baptist Church, a half-time church, called him. He resigned

the call to pastor Victory Baptist Church at Town Bluff.

"At Victory," Haynes said, "we are in the process of enlarging our audience and building eleven Sunday School rooms, Fellowship Hall, and kitchen."

"Along with our men at Victory, men from various Baptist churches in the area, members of the Texas Baptist men, a building group of carpenters, electricians, etc. with association office in Kirby, were at our church on Saturday, December 1 helping us to construct the new buildings, putting up the walls, roof and partitions. We expect to complete this around the last of December."

The women of Victory prepared and served the builders their noon meal and throughout the day provided coffee and snacks, etc.

The builders plan to continue their work for about a week. The women of the church will keep them supplied with coffee and snacks.

Wm. "Preacher" Haynes accepted the call to Victory, 17 were enrolled in Sunday School. Ninety Sunday, December 2, 1990, with the pastor baptizing three more at the Sunday evening service.

Haynes finished the ninth grade in High School. Following his commitment to God, he completed "similarity" courses by correspondence and was taught locally by ministers in the First Baptist Church in Woodville.

"All I know is what the Lord gave me," he said.

After he surrendered to the ministry, a well-meaning area missionary urged him to "sell all his property" and go to school. But Haynes had a wife and two children to support.

Later the missionary met him in town with the same

urgent suggestion. Haynes said, "The Lord called me to preach and He will have a plan for me to preach."

"Sometimes," Haynes said, "we are quick to criticize people and we don't know what's hurting inside that person. We can't judge so let God be the judge."

"Preacher" Haynes and Virginia maintain their home on Lanesboro Drive in Ivanhoe but have built a camp house near the church where they can be close to people on their church field.

Although semi-retired, Haynes continues to maintain his business at the Palace Barber Shop where two excellent barbers, Jerry Thompson and Bob Carothers serve their customers well. Thompson has been with Haynes for 30 years, and Carothers for eight years.

"All my pastorates have been in Tyler County," Haynes said. But he has had revivals all over the state of Texas.

Throughout his ministry, Haynes had maintained his barber shop, but he has not let this stand in the way of serving God.

"I think this is the reason the Lord has blessed me," he said.


Haynes has a married son, Charles Rodney Haynes who lives at Nowata and manages the HEB market at Jasper. The Preacher also has three granddaughters, one great granddaughter and one great grandson.

Virginia has two sons and one granddaughter. Matthew Johnson is married and lives in Fred. He is employed by American Value Hydrant. Mark Johnson is a junior at Sul Ross University in Alpine studying Animal Science.

"This is an exciting time in our life," Haynes said. "Under God's guidance, the work going on at the church coincides with Charles' second anniversary as pastor of Victory Baptist Church," Virginia said. "Charles is a strong leader." Virginia quoted from Nehemiah 4:6 in the Holy Bible.

"It's a case of God working through His people. They take Charles' leadership, under God, and they go with it!"
