Woodville To Get Telephone Upgrade

Woodville will receive the latest in telephone digital switching as part of an agreement approved by the Texas Public Utility Commission and Southwestern Bell Telephone.

Southwestern Bell Telephone will install the switch as part of an accelerated program which will help boost the Texas economy and provide customer benefits worth more than \$1.2 billion over the next four years.

A timetable for installing Woodville's as well as 195 other switches statewide over the next four years is not yet available, according to Billy Rose, external affairs manager in Woodville.

"Telephone customers all across the state were the big winners today," said Rose. "With this bold, decisive action, the PUC has not only approved more than \$1.2 billion in customer benefits, it has moved to put Texas at the forefront of telecommunications in the U.S."

"The negotiated settlement was a product of months of intense discussion among the PUC staff, Southwestern Bell Telephone and 23 separate intervening groups," said Rose. "This is an example of a broad base of diverse interests joining with the PUC and Southwestern Bell Telephone with a common goal to improve the telecommunication infrastructure of Texas."

The settlement includes the largest rate reductions and most ambitious modernization of the telecommunication network in Texas history.

Consumers will see the customer credits and rate reductions starting shortly, according to Rose. "And we will begin work immediately on the network modernization program."

Other highlights of the agreement include: a one-time refund of approximately \$8.75 for residence and \$10 per access line for business customers; reductions in Southwestern Bell's long distance, WATS, and 800 service rates; reduced access charges to long distance companies in Texas. These savings will flow through to customers; a four-year, accelerated program to bring digital technology to 196 communities now served by older, less versatile equipment; eliminate party-line service and mileage charges for more than 300,000 rural customers residing outside "local calling areas". The upgrade service will not increase customers' bills; expanded optional toll-free calling to 32 cities around Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio; touch tone rate reductions of 50% for business customers at the end of four years; residential service connection charge reductions from \$60 to \$38.35; and a lifeline program for eligible low-income customers.

"The telecommunication industry has changed dramatically since the Bell System was broken up, and our system of regulation has to keep pace with those changes," said Rose. "This settlement is worth roughly \$1.2 billion in direct customer benefits over a four-year period."

"The agreement provides an incentive to build a telecommunication network that should attract new businesses and jobs to Texas without increasing telecommunication costs to the Texas ratepayers," said Rose.

Rose said Southwestern Bell Telephone will be allowed to earn 12.06% return on investment (ROI). Half of all earnings from 12.06% to 14.5% ROI will be returned to customers. Earnings above 14.5% ROI will be returned to customers in full.

According to Rose, a number of states including California have adopted similar progressive regulatory approaches to telecommunications. "Now Texas can join other states in trying to attract the burgeoning number of companies which use advanced information networks."

"What's really exciting is the chance to bring the most advanced communication technology to parts of Texas where, without an incentive, the present rate of growth would not justify this kind of investment for years to come."

Southwestern Bell Customers Share Credit

More than five million Southwestern Bell customers in Texas will share an \$87.5 million, one-time credit as part of an agreement approved Nov. 28, 1990 by the Texas Public Utility Commission.

Beginning with bills mailed today, residential customers will see a credit on their bills ranging from \$9.33 to \$10.11. This range includes \$8.72 in credit for Southwestern Bell service, and a credit for all applicable federal, state and local fees and taxes. This will appear on the "other charges" for Southwestern Bell page of customers' monthly telephone bill.

Depending upon the type of service and rate structure, business customers will receive credits ranging from \$2.91 per access line to more than \$40 per access line in some

"Rockland, next stop," announced the Texas & New Orleans train conductor. Finally, after weeks of weary travel, Beth, her four brothers and dad, have reached their destination. Rockland, the home of their dead mother and kinfolks the young'uns have never seen.

"Now a booming East Texas sawmill town, Rockland was also the turnaround point for two different railroads in East Texas during the early 1900's. All types of people lived and worked and socialized here, some good and some not so good.

After many interviews with old-timers of the Rockland area and years of research, well-known Tyler County playwright Aloha Freeland has finally achieved a dream I never thought possible."

 However, most business customers (those with single-line, flat-rate service) will see a credit in the range of \$9.80 to \$10.38 per access line. These amounts also include the credit for federal, state and local fees and taxes. Customers should receive their credits on bills received in December or early January. These credits are part of a settlement agreement that includes the largest telephone rate telecommunication equipment ever ordered by PUC.

The three-member commission approved the \$1.2 billion consumer benefit package after months of negotiations among the PUC, General Counsel, Southwestern Bell and 23 other parties.

John Dillon Faulk

John Dillon Faulk, Colonel USAF retired, 62, of Austin died Sunday, December 9, 1990. Born October 7, 1928 near Big Sandy, Texas to Houston Hampton and Vicki Mayberry Faulk. Following graduation from Big Sandy High School in 1944 and Texas A&M in 1949, Colonel Faulk was commissioned into the US Air Force. His military career spanned 25 years and made assignments including service in Europe, the Far East and 7 state side bases. At the time of his retirement, he was a Command Pilot with over 5000 flying hours. His awards include the Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Medal, Distinguished Flying Cross with Oak Leaf Clusters, Air Medals with 8 Clusters, Commendation Medal with 2 Clusters and other decorations and citations. He was 12th Air Force Inspector General stationed at Bergstrom Air Force Base at the time of his retirement in 1974.

Following retirement from the Air Force, he completed his teaching certification and earned his Master of Education degree from the University of Texas at Austin. He taught 5th grade for Austin ISD at Sims, Rosewood and Woolridge Elementary schools.

Colonel Faulk has been a resident of Austin since 1969 and was a member of Hyde Park Baptist Church.

Funeral services will be held Thursday, December 13 at Hyde Park Baptist Church with Dr. Ralph M. Smith officiating. Graveside services with full military honors will be held at 1 p.m. Thursday at Ft. Sam Houston National Cemetery in San Antonio.

Colonel Faulk is survived by his wife of 41 years, Anna Lea Faulk of Austin; sons and daughters-in-law, John and Linda Faulk of Austin, and Richard and Lois Faulk of Cypress; daughter, Linda Lawson of Houston; daughter and son-in-law, Susan Lee and Bill Haynes of Washington; mother, Vida Mayberry of Austin; sisters and brothers-in-law, Shirley and Robert Shoy of Austin; Sandra and Jack Alexander of Post; eight grandchildren and numerous nieces, nephews, cousins and friends.
