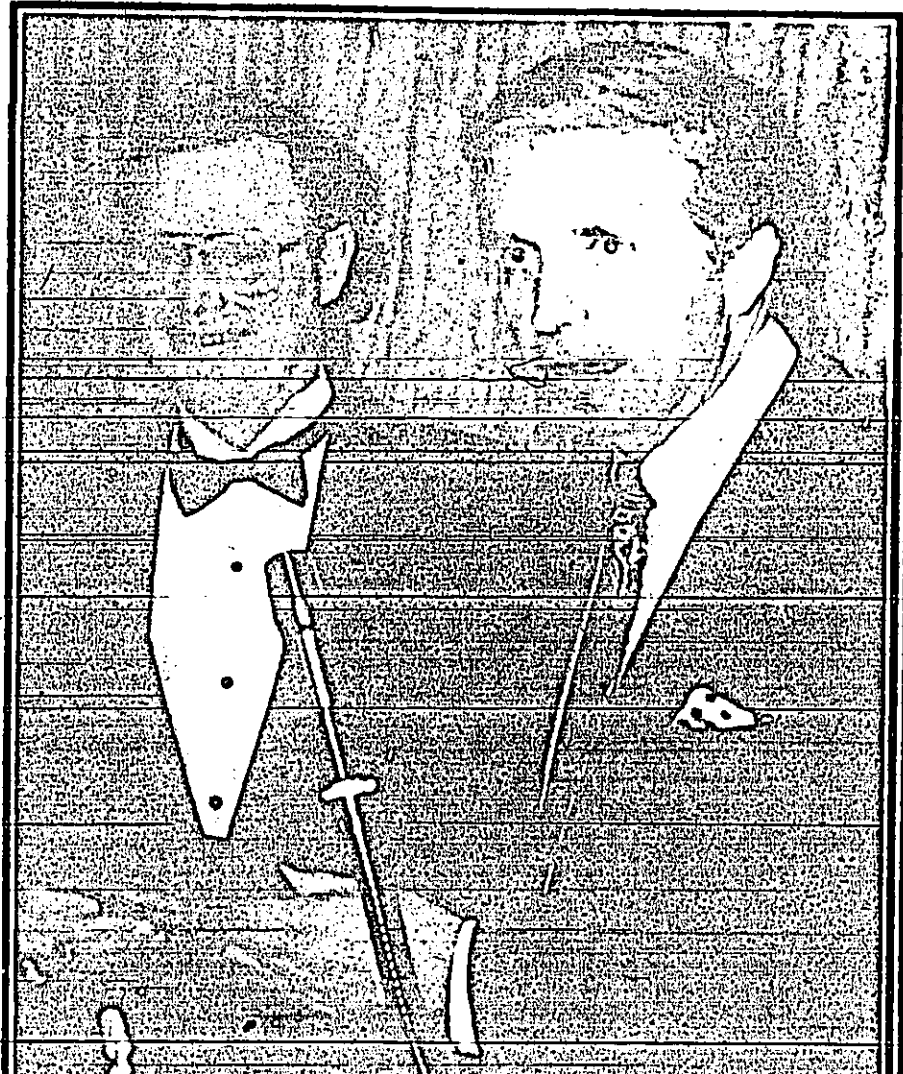
Phillips added a special "Director of the Year" Award which he presented to Industrial Committee Chairman Gene Koci, who

Important Blood Drive Set For Tuesday, Jan. 29

Hospital patients in Tyler, Jasper, Newton, Hardin, Jefferson, Orange and eastern Chambers counties will be counting on the generosity of area residents for life giving blood Tuesday, Jan. 29, 1991.

Woodville High School students, under the direction of faculty member, Julie Lamberth, are urging fellow students, faculty and staff, and members of the community to make this the best ever Annual High School/Community blood drive. Last year a record 158 donations were made!

Jess Collins, last year's highly effective chairperson, will continue to work to obtain the participation of groups within the community. The Woodville

Lions, Southwestern Bell, Gulf States Utilities, and Tyler County Hospital are among the early groups to make a commitment to support the community blood drive.

The Blood Center of Southeast Texas offers group and family plans which reduce the cost of blood to donors or members of participating groups.

Plans 40 and 50, require donations equal to 40% or 30% respectively of their group members. GBP 40 provides a maximum of \$500 per person per year for uninsured blood usage anywhere in the United States, and all group members, spouses and tax dependents are included. GBP 50 provides coverage

for all group members and for the spouses and tax dependents of donors only. Groups have six months to complete plan requirements and coverage begins with the first blood drive. The Annual Summer Community Blood Drive provides an excellent opportunity for groups to complete the plans that are started at the January drive. Information regarding group blood plans is available from Jess Collins or Julie Lamberth.

The Family Benefit Plan is available to all individual donors. It provides benefits to the Donor, Spouse and Tax Dependents. However, the cost of blood needed because of pre-existing conditions is not included, and there is an initial waiting period of 30 days. Blood needed because of childbirth or accident is covered immediately. The Blood Center of Southeast Texas will also be counting on Woodville area residents to help us meet our commitment to Desert Storm. As many of you know, we are affiliated with Louisiana Blood Center, and our two centers are committed to providing 50 pints of blood each week. Our maximum commitment is 100 pints each week from the Blood Center of Southeast Texas alone, whenever we are asked. We made a shipment of 25 pints Wednesday, Jan. 16, 1991 and we are confident that we will be able to meet future re-

quests with your help and that of other generous Southeast Texas blood donors. Every donor should know that his or her specific pint of blood cannot

be earmarked for use by our troops in Saudi Arabia, but every pint will help make it possible for us to ship the types and amounts of blood requested at the times requested.

Please make an appointment to donate Tuesday, Jan. 29 and help make sure that patients in Tyler County Hospital, as well as the 14 other area hospitals and two dialysis centers,

have blood available as needed. Every donor will receive a "Heartbeat of America" T-shirt for their generosity in giving blood.

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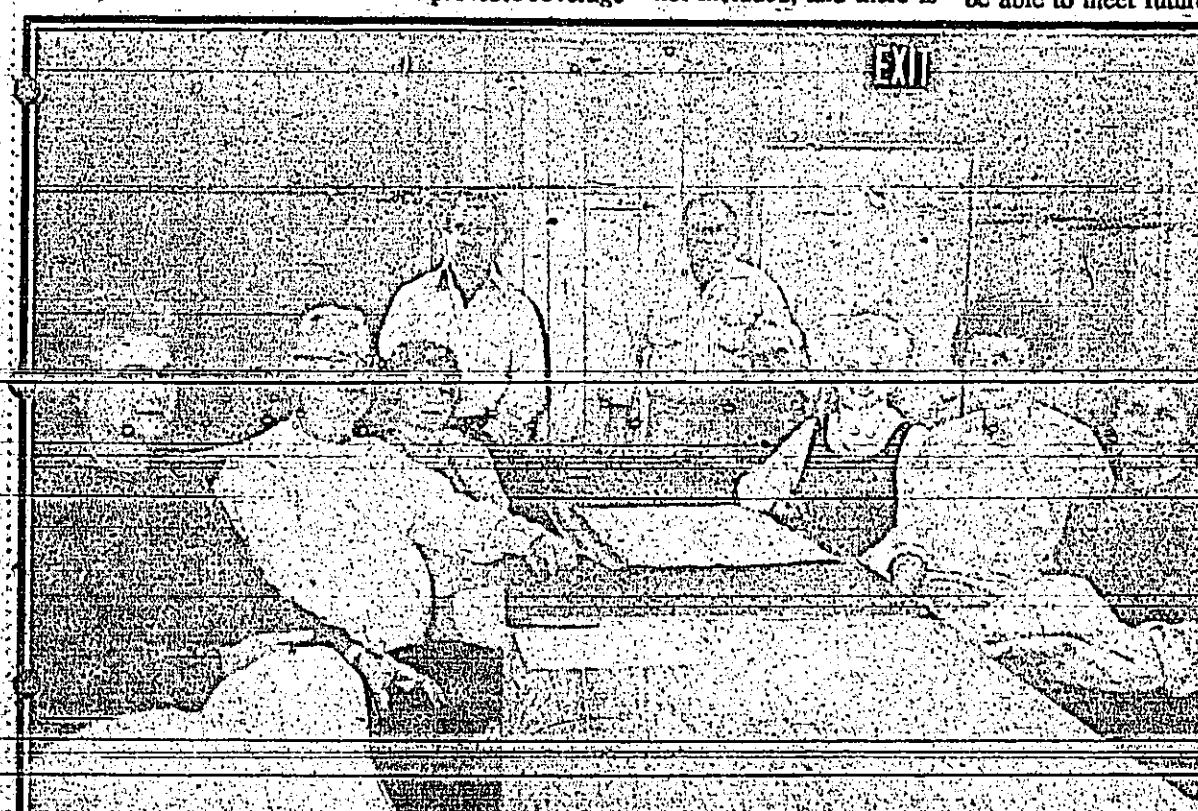
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Operation Desert Storm Support Group Forms

Do you know the difference between a Fiddler and a Violinist? A Fiddler plays hillbilly music and a Violinist plays opera type music. Can anyone play this type instrument? No they sure can't. You are born to play one or just have a knack to do so. If you have ever went to an old time fiddle dance you will see young kids playing the fiddle. Some start as early as 6 or 7 years old. A 12 year old can pull a mean bow over the fiddle strings. If you notice on the T.V. that most of the fiddle players are young people, I wish I could play anything but it just don't work for me. Besides, before you can play any instrument by having a knack to do so, you have to have a tune to play. I don't know no tune from the start to finish. I bought a fiddle in Resville, Texas which is out of the magazine and I had a fiddle made neck on it and gloves were worn on it with fingers where it was played so much. The sound holes were cut larger with a pocket knife and had 2 sets of rattlesnake rattles inside. The rattles don't help the sound any at all. Just a safe place to keep them. Bill Monroe says they keep his mandolin clean.

I looked thru a book the other day which was published and published in the Ozark Mountains about Ozark Mountain folks. It was like Ralph Kramden's book called "Rocking Texas Cradle" but more country if it could be so. A picture in the book showed a man playing the fiddle and another was beating the strings with a small round stick. What the string beater was doing was actually keeping time with the music. I've seen this done by my two oldest brothers. Lot of people don't know what I'm talking about and this something that is never done in this day and time. One a still night a fiddle sound will carry a long ways thru the Williams Creek Hills. If you want to ring the bell you got to pull the rope - Wells to go.

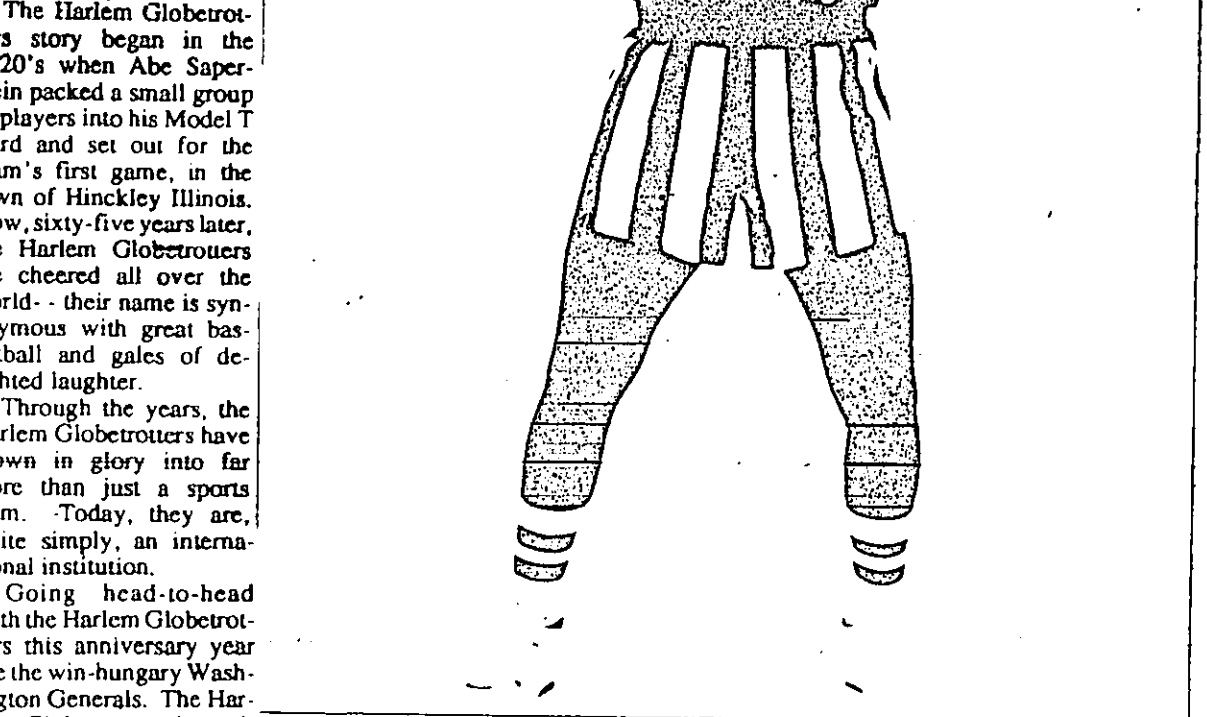

BETTER VISION

Asigmatism, like other optical defects in the eyeball, tends to develop during the growth phase of a person's body and eyes. By the age of 21, the degree of asigmatism has, in most cases, been corrected. However, changes for better or worse, after age 21 are not impossible.

Asigmatism is caused by a slightly misshapen cornea, which should be perfectly spherical. If the shape of the cornea is steeper at some points than others, the light rays passing through will come to a focus at different points, rather than at a single point as required for sharp visual images.

There is no need to endure blurred, fuzzy vision. Corrective lenses can correct most vision defects perfectly. The first step to perfect vision is an eye examination.

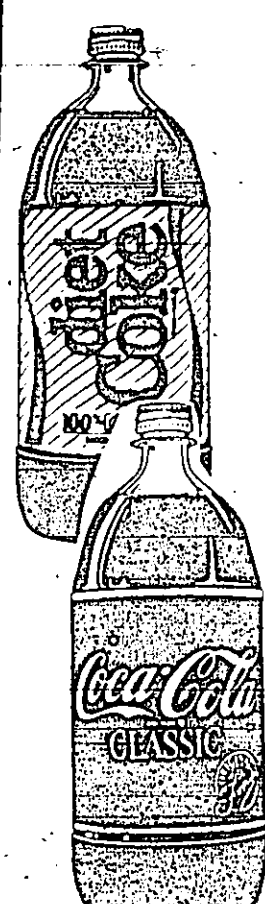
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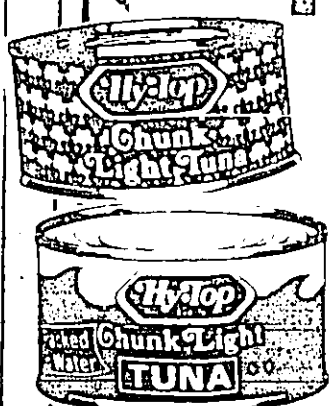
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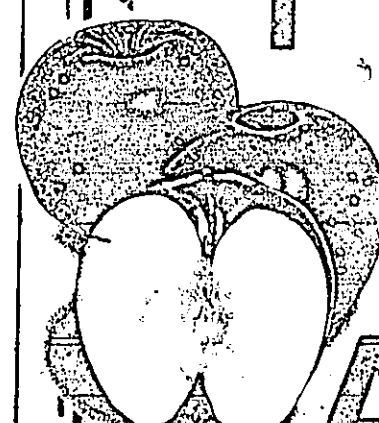
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
