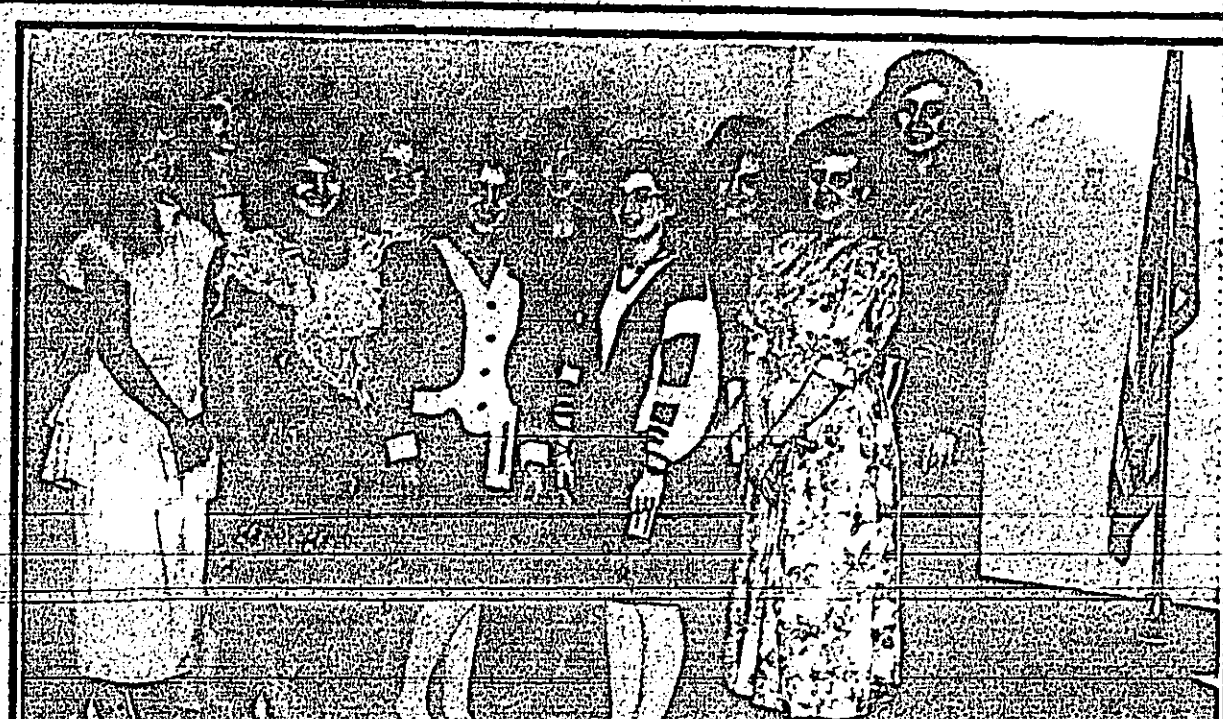

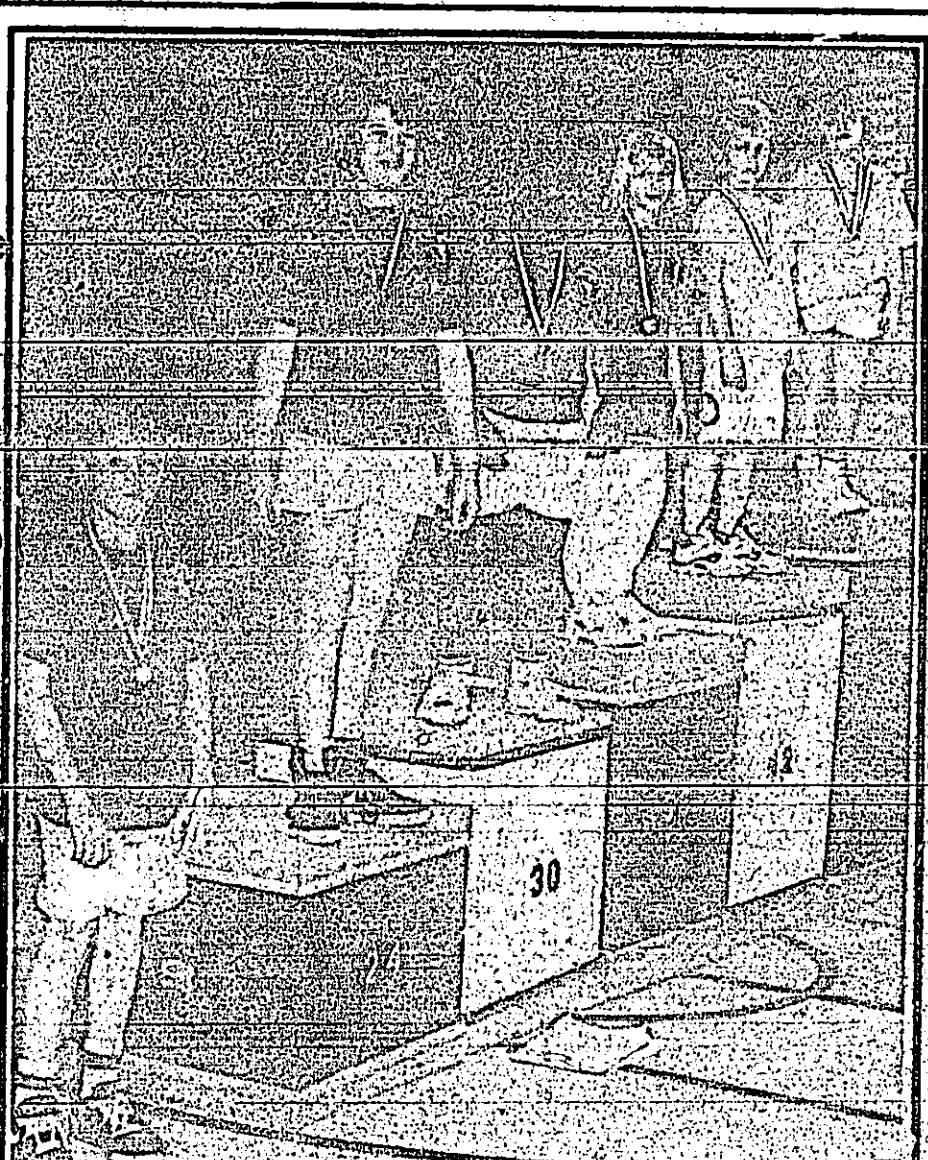

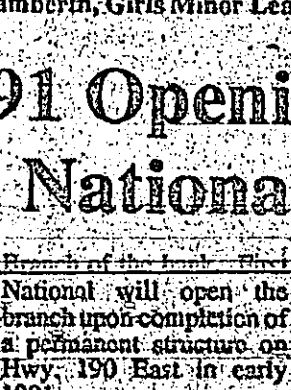

Woodville Is 'Tree U.S.A.'

The city of Woodville has been named a Tree City USA, John Nelepovitz, Chairman of the Woodville City Tree Board said today. "It is the first time the city has received this national recognition," he added.

The Tree City USA honor comes from the National Arbor Day Foundation, a nonprofit education organization dedicated to tree planting and conservation. Nelepovitz said.

Communities entering the nationwide program receive the Tree City USA designation upon recommendation by state foresters. Communities qualify which meet the following standards: a city tree ordinance; a legal tree governing body; a comprehensive urban forestry program; and observance of Arbor Day.

Woodville earned the Tree City designation for the 1990 calendar year by organizing a Tree City Board, adopting a City Tree Ordinance, and promoting tree planting, tree care and maintenance throughout the city through a comprehensive community forestry program. Approximately \$3900 in forestry improvements were successfully completed during the year. All labor and expenditures for the improvements were donated by local businesses, civic clubs, and organizations. An Arbor Day celebration and ceremonial tree planting were held April 27 at the Tyler County Justice Center. Trees were distributed to the students of the Woodville Elementary School to commemorate the occasion.

Tree City USA communities receive a flag with the program's logo and a walnut-mounted plaque. Winners also receive Tree City USA community signs. Maple leaf suckers will indicate additional qualifying years, the Foundation said.

The Woodville City Tree Board will present the Tree City USA flag and other recognition materials to the City Council on March 11 at the City Council Meeting at City Hall. The public is invited to attend.

Soil Conservation Staffers Mackey, Wiedenfeld... Encourage Recycling Effort

As costs and environmental concerns associated with solid waste landfills have risen, recycling has come of age. Woodville and over 1000 other places have started curb-side collection programs according to Tommy Mackey. Mackey is the Woodville representative of the Soil Conservation Service which assists the Longleaf, soil and Water Conservation District here.

About 85 percent of the normal household garbage can be recycled and only 15 percent needs to be buried. Land that is used as landfill is damaged even though some things can grow there after it no longer is being used as a landfill. With everyone recycling, the landfill area can last about six times as long.

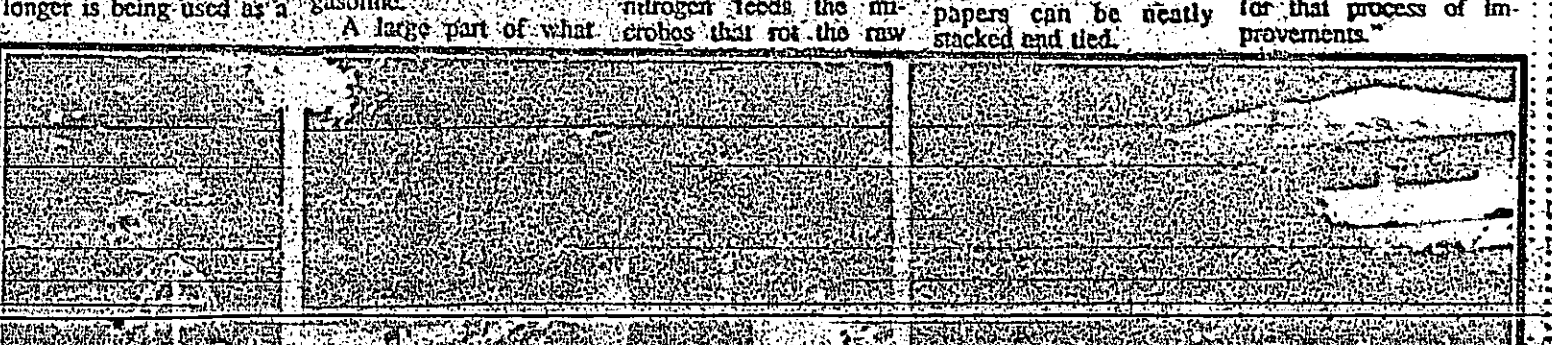
Mackey says that recycling has gained good acceptance with as much as 95 percent participation. Also many organizations are using recycled materials. For example, the National Association of Conservation Districts now uses recycled paper in their Tuesday Newsletter.

Recycling saves energy and resources. The mining, hauling, and refining of bauxite uses both petroleum and electrical energy. It's been estimated that when one aluminum can is recycled it saves energy equivalent to six ounces of gasoline.

A large part of what used to be sent to the landfill should be composted says Mackey. Compost is needed to keep gardens and flower beds rich and fertile and in good health. Leaves, grass clippings, garden trash, and part of the kitchen garbage all make excellent compost. These should never be burned. Simply stack the trash in a pile and keep it moist. In the warm part of the year it rots quickly. In the winter a large pile will also rot quickly because the rotting process generates heat. If you want to speed it up even more, add a few cups of nitrogen fertilizer, add some soil, and mix it occasionally so that it all stays moist. The nitrogen feeds the microbes that rot the raw materials. Phosphorous fertilizer in the compost pile does not cause it to rot faster but it makes the compost more valuable to the garden plants that will later grow in it. The phosphorous will be readily available to plants.

Peat has many of the same good properties of compost. Compost, however, is cheaper and saves landfill acreage. In addition it saves scarce northern wetlands where the peat is being mined. It takes thousands of years to form peat.

Recycling requires that the materials all be kept separate. Some people buy stands that hold grocery bags or crates where newspapers can be neatly stacked and tied.

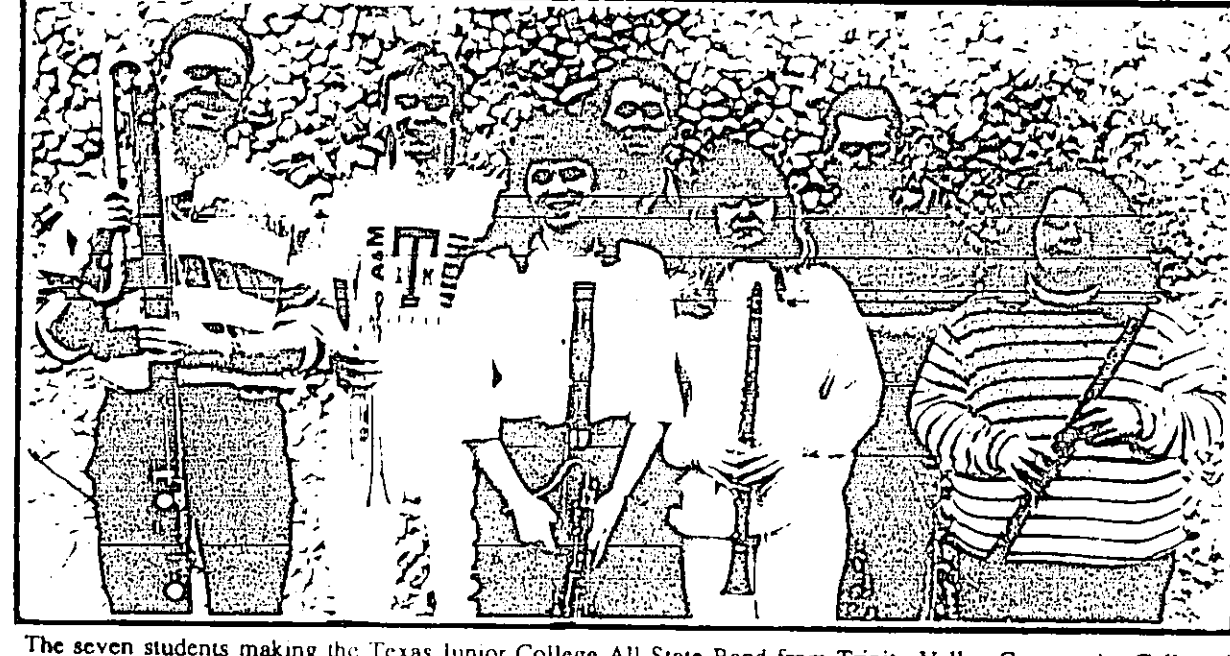

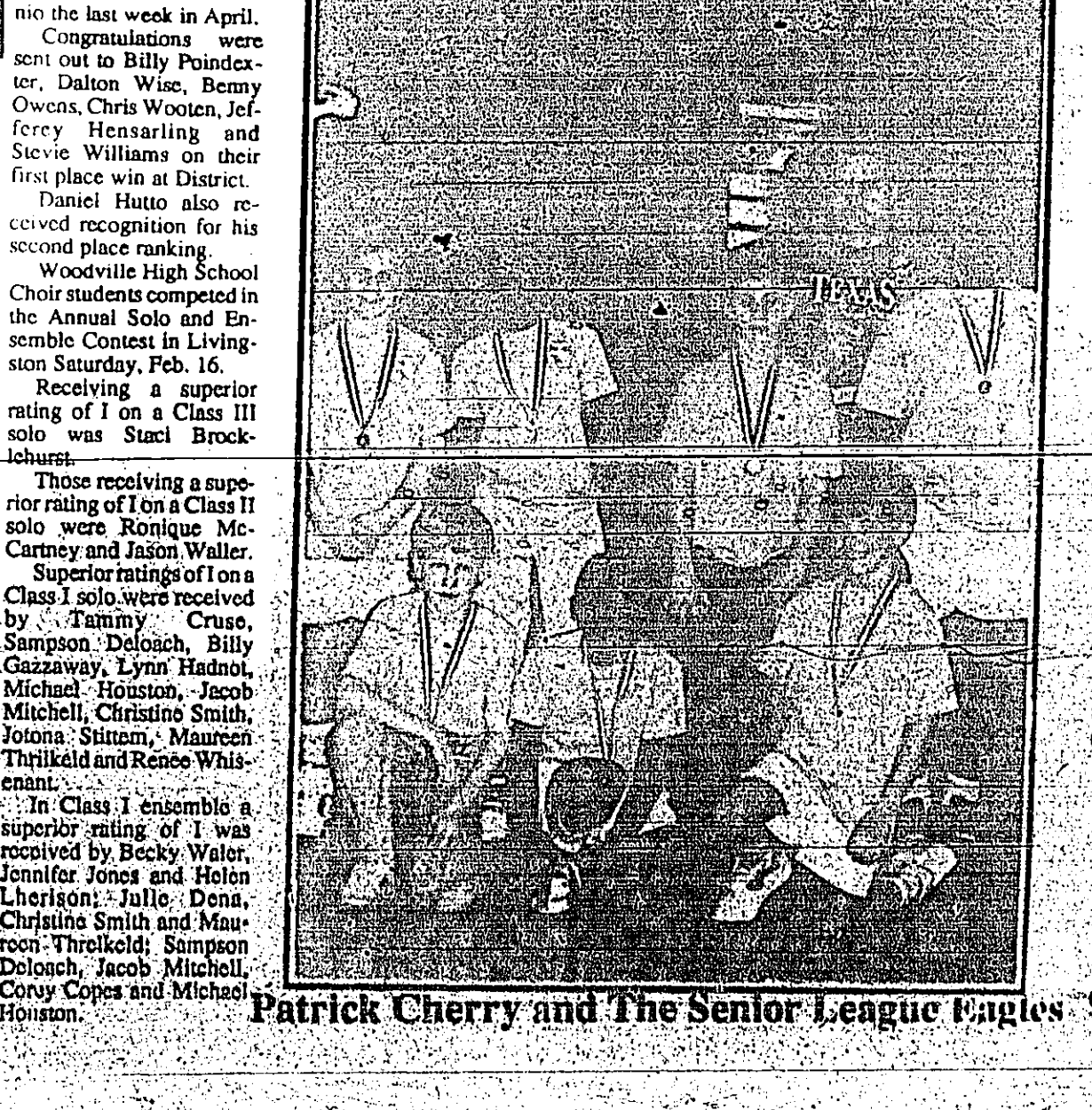

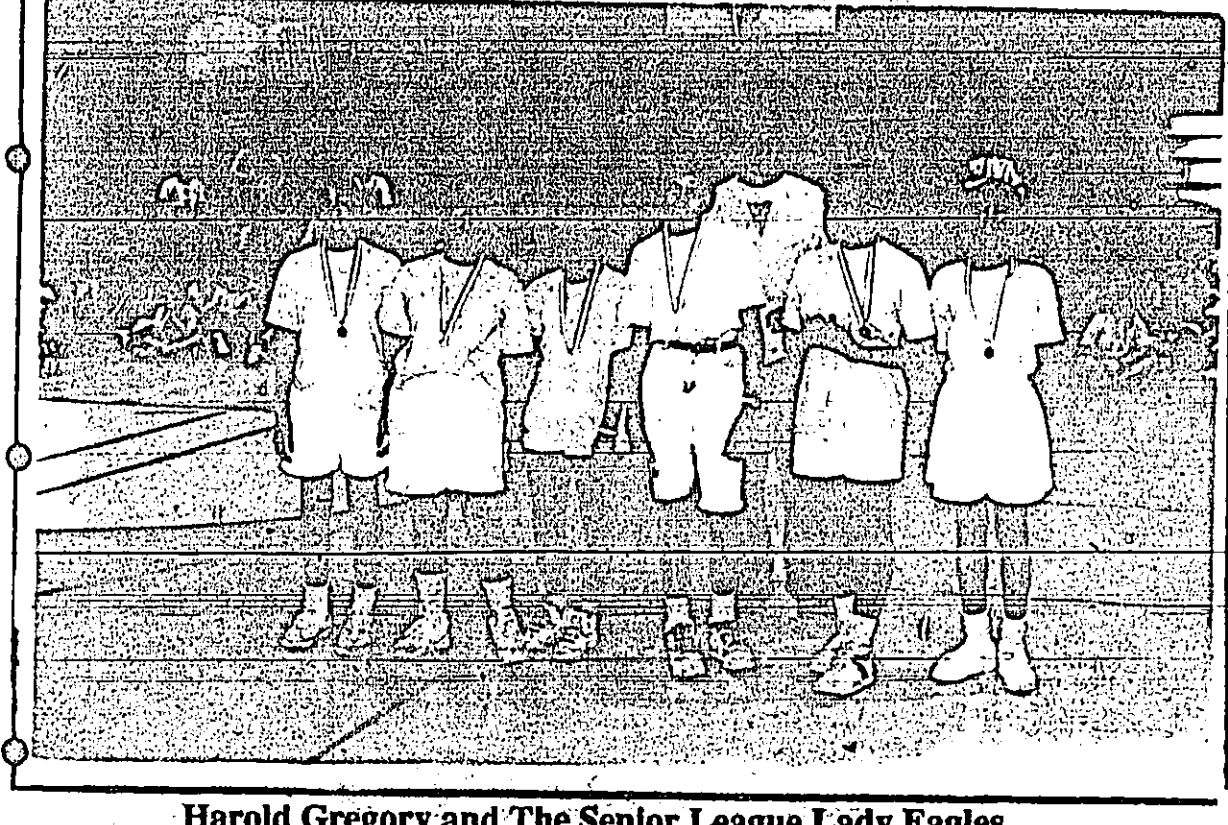
Eagles Drub Lions 14-2 In Season Opener... Hennigan Records 6 R.B.I.'s, 2 Doubles
