County Wins \$199,500 Grant To Support SHECo

AUSTIN - Tyler County has been given a \$199,500 grant award from the Texas Capital Fund (Community Development Block Grant Program) to provide infrastructure support to Sam Houston Electric Cooperative, Inc. The co-op will construct a sewer and water service.

Funds from the program are administered by the Texas Department of Commerce. This project will result in the creation of 16 jobs for Texans.

The award is one of many which have been made to assist with the development of viable communities and the creation of jobs. Funds for the award will be made available upon completion of negotiations between Tyler County and Commerce.

This grant brings the total amount awarded by Texas Capital Fund during its 1991 program year to \$2,798,128, creating or retaining a total of 1094 jobs.

Our children, families, teachers and community will reap many benefits from our efforts. Let's do it now, let's do it right, let's make it happen for our children's sake. A Story About Reading

This is a story about me. It could be a story about you, your neighbor - or someone you've yet to meet.

"Who wrote this letter?" Mr. Waddell asked me as he lifted the unfolded letter from his desk.

"I did," I stammered.

"What's wrong?"

"Nothing," he said. "It's beautiful. But you didn't write it!"

"Yes, sir, I did," I said looking into the sympathetic face of the man who had been my science teacher in Junior School and who was now serving as principal of the Elementary School where my son was completing first grade.

"I find that hard to believe," he said waving the letter that, as secretary of the Garland PTA, I had written to the faculty thanking them for the quality education they had imparted to my son and to the entire student body.

"Why?" I asked talking around the lump in my throat.

"Where did you learn to write like this?" he asked.

"I just wrote what I felt," I said.

He studied the letter for a long moment then looked deeply into my eyes as though looking beyond the present to an earlier time.

He cleared his throat. "Throughout your school years," he said, "your teachers and I considered you a dullard. I think the educational system had better take a closer look at the field of science as opposed to the field of art. Thank you for coming," he said as he stood to dismiss me.

On the way home the words filled my consciousness - "dullard." I was hurt, embarrassed and shocked at hearing my former teacher and friend say it.

School had been very hard for me. I had been teased by illness and tragedy through those eleven school years but I had a loving family and an extended family that lived near.

Reading and math were extremely difficult. Although it was painful, in every way, I graduated from high school with my class - a feat I considered a major victory.

It wasn't until a few months prior to my son's completion of the first grade that a PTA program changed my life forever. One of the PTA members gave a program on reading disabilities with some suggestions on ways in which parents could help their children. As I listened, I recognized my own pattern of "stuckness." I couldn't wait to go home and try some of these remedies. They worked!

It was difficult but having the problem pointed out was a beginning. Until this time, I didn't know what was the matter - only that reading, for me, was difficult and exhausting. I still have the tendency to see the right side of the page as the immediate focal point, but have trained myself to correct this pattern. Such a simple thing one might think, but it can be a problem of insurmountable proportions.

As I worked on the problem, I began to enjoy reading and became selective. I no longer felt compelled to read something simply because someone else had recommended it. I began to read everything including labels on cans. It was a slow reader, but horizons were being expanded.

I went to the library and checked out books for myself. Hereafter I had checked out books to read to my son. It was as though my mind was hungry and reading was the only thing that would satisfy it.

Four years later I applied for a correspondence course in Creative Writing for Children from the University of Arkansas. Proving a student must be a junior in college. I had a high school diploma but with God's help, I was accepted. I had a lot of academic catching up to do.

Louis was now 10 years old, during the entire year, respectively, Frank and Louis cooked, kept house, washed clothes, ironed clothes, sewed on buttons and did the myriad of necessary things that keep a family operating as a unit.

I won't say that Louis did these things without resistance. He was a normal little boy who would have preferred to be outdoors roping a goat, playing with his friends, riding his bicycle and doing all the things a boy finds adventurous. But this year for freedom to study was Frank's and Louis' gift to me. I passed the course with a B+.

Since these humble beginnings and with more study and grasping opportunities, I have had a 10 year radio career, hosting my own programs and for one of those years, syndicating them on two radio stations. For three years I served as reporter/photographer and part of this time as society editor for a small town newspaper and for 18 months, I wrote a newsletter for an apartment complex. Presently I write a column for The Tyler County Booster and write a newsletter for St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Woodville.

Reading and the ability to read has expanded horizons for me - and this is just the beginning. The best is yet to come!

I have always had access to a library. Sometimes it was necessary to travel several miles to take advantage of its opportunities, but it was worth it. The library has always been there for me. Libraries are like that - there when you need them - so are the people who make these libraries available to us.

Tyler County's Allan Shivers Library is no exception. Located in Woodville at 302 N. Charlton, the library offers, to all Tyler County residents, everything you need a library to be. If the library doesn't have a particular book that you need, the librarian can obtain it for you through the inter-library loan system or she possibly tell you where you might secure a copy.

The Allan Shivers Library serves the people of Tyler County - all ages and all walks of life.

Gramm Introduces Thicket Expansion

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Sen. Phil Gramm introduced legislation today designed to add more than 10,000 acres to the 80,000-acre Big Thicket National Preserve in East Texas.

The addition will both enhance the Big Thicket and protect the rights of individual property owners.

Gramm said. Under the senator's bill, additional acreage for the preserve would be acquired through voluntary exchange from timber companies in the area.

The legislation proposes the acquisition of the following land: The Village Creek Corridor Unit, comprised of 4,793 acres in Hardin County. The Big Sandy Corridor Unit, comprised of 4,977 acres in Hardin, Polk, and Tyler counties. The Canyonlands Unit, comprised of 1,476 acres in Tyler County.

"An important facet of this bill is the fact that no provision may be used to take privately-owned property through condemnation procedures," Gramm noted.

"Property owners are free to sell or exchange their land, but no arm of government should be empowered to seize their property," said the senator.

Cordes, Phillips At DECA Confab

Kelly Cordes and Jonathan Phillips, will demonstrate the effective linkage between Woodville High School and the local business community as they travel to the National DECA Career Development Conference in Denver, Colorado, April 20-24, 1991. For the past two years, Hamilton Kennesson of J.B. Best & Co. and Fred Sullivan of Sullivan's Hardware have sponsored on-the-job training in marketing and management related activities for Cordes and Phillips. This training has been coordinated with classroom instruction and DECA activities provided through the school's Marketing Education program.

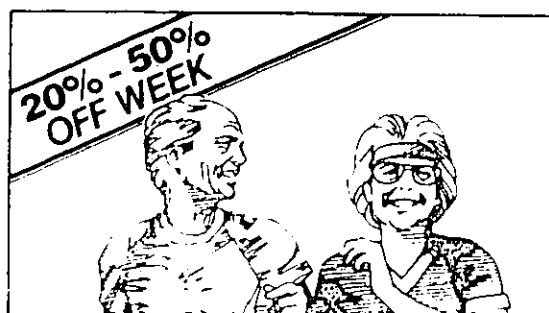

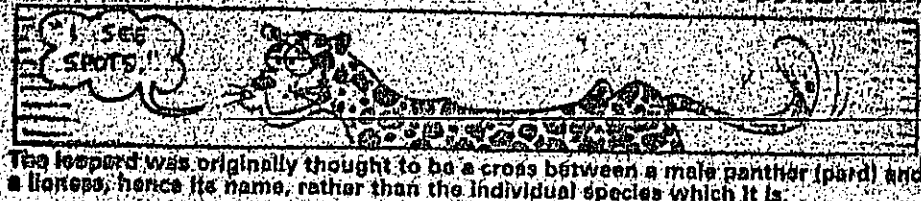
