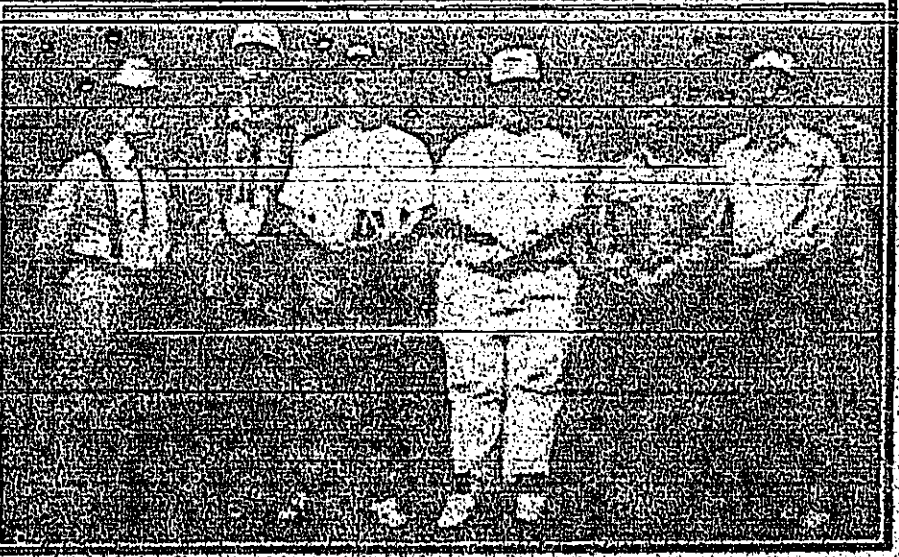
Locals In Woodland Clinic

GSU Offers Senior Discount

Qualified senior citizens may begin signing up for local Gulf States Utilities Co. offices for a \$6 discount on the monthly electric bills for their primary residences. The discount, which is available for customers 65 years old or older with annual household incomes of \$10,000 or less, more than offsets the effects of the Texas rate increase approved for GSU on March 20.

The discount was proposed by GSU as part of its Regional Recovery Plan and was filed in March 1989. The joint recommendation adopted by the Public Utility Commission of Texas this week included the discount. A

typical residential customer now pays \$84.58 for 1,000 kilowatt-hours, compared to the previous bonded rate of \$84.24. The same amount of electricity for a customer who qualifies for the discount will cost \$78.34.

GSU was the first utility in Texas to propose such a discount, and the concept was endorsed by all major participants in the case. Numerous social service agencies, including the Texas Department of Human Services, supported the GSU proposal.

About 19,000 Texas customers are believed to fall into the age and income categories which will qualify them for the discount. To sign up, a senior citizen who meets the age and income requirements must

bring proof of age.

"Older customers living on low, fixed incomes are having a tough time making ends meet, and this discount will provide some relief," said Jo Ann Smith, GSU manager of community affairs. The discount will be automatically taken off bills before they are sent to customers who qualify.

The additional cost for the discount program will be paid by other residential customers, averaging 24 cents per customer per month. A customer attitude survey conducted by GSU when formulating the plan found that a substantial majority would be willing to pay an extra 50 to 75 cents per month to cover the cost of such a program.

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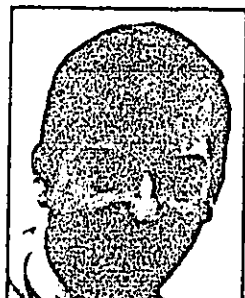

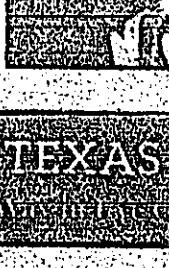

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Grandpa And The Blind Mule

Grandpa Thomas Morgan was one of the most cheerful persons I have ever known. He was a good and gentle person and had never hurt anyone with his practical jokes, but he would plot and plan for weeks to get a good laugh.

He was born in a small town called Rogersville in Jasper County, Texas in 1860. He had a brother Ed, two years older than him and a younger sister he called, Sissey. When war broke out their daddy joined the Confederate forces and fought until the end of the war, but died on his way home with dysentery.

Their mother worked as a domestic and when the boys got big enough, they started tending farm.

Brother Ed was a serious, hard working type and expected grandpa to be the same. Life on the farm was hard and everyone had to work from sunup to sundown to keep food on the table. Even so, grandpa managed to find time for his pranks and on a few occasions received a sound thrashing from his brother Ed for his efforts.

The summer grandpa turned 18, he and Ed decided to dig a well in their pasture for watering the

livestock. Hand-dug wells were common rather than running in these days, and were four feet by four feet wide. They had earthen walls down through the top soil and ed with a wooden sandbox in the bottom.

Grandpa and uncle Ed took turns digging the hole until it got so deep they couldn't throw the shovels full of dirt out, then erected posts with a crossbeam on top and a pulley to run the large rope through. A windlass was also rigged with handles on each end to wind the rope on and make it easier to haul out the large buckets, filled with dirt.

By the second day, the shaft was down about 12 feet and when the digger tired, the man on top hauled him out on the windlass and they changed jobs. The weather was very hot. At mid-afternoon while Ed was in the hole, grandpa yelled down that he was going to run to the house and bring back a fruit jar full of drinking water.

"Haul me out of here so I can rest while you're gone," said Ed.

There ain't no need to haul me out," replied grandpa. "It ain't time for me to take my turn down there yet. Just set down and rest and I'll be back in a few minutes."

"No, Tom, you haul me out of here at least tie the rope off so I can climb out. Dolly may wander up here and fall in on me while your gone."

"I see Dolly lying down way back in the pasture. There ain't no way she's gonna come up here before I get back," said grandpa as he was leaving. "Just set down and rest."

"You better hurry back here or I'll make you wish you had," yelled Ed.

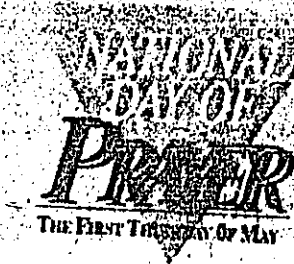
Grandpa ran straight where Dolly was lying nearby, removed the bell from her neck and started slowly back toward the shaft, thinking the bell as he walked. As he got nearer he could hear Ed saying "Whoa now Dolly, easy girl. Whoa Dolly, whoa."

Grandpa started walking in a big circle around the hole, getting a little closer all the time, thinking the bell as he walked. Ed was bawling in a loud, commanding voice, "Now you stop there Dolly."

Whoa girl, whoa, whoa. Suddenly Grandpa turned and started directly toward the well, kicking a little loose gravel in on Ed when he neared the hole. Ed screamed, "Whoa, you son-of-a-bitch, whoa."

Grandpa died in 1945 at age 85 and remained cheerful and in good spirits until just a few days before his death. I had visited him the previous week and remember his mischievous grin when I asked him, "Grandpa, was uncle Ed mad when you hauled him out of the well?"

"I made him promise not to kill me before I pulled him out," he replied.

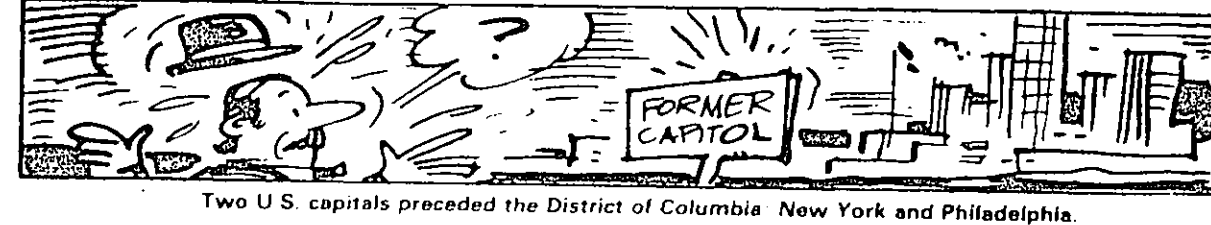

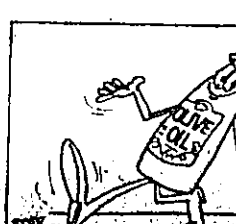

The Medicine Shoppe To Offer Free Diabetes Screening on May 9th

WOODVILLE, TX. A free diabetes screening aimed at detecting and controlling diabetes will be offered on Thursday, May 9, from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. at the Medicine Shoppe, 1010 West Bluff in Woodville. A registered nurse will conduct the diabetes tests. If a potential problem is detected, participants will be advised to visit a physician for a complete diagnosis.

Diabetes is characterized by abnormal thirst, unusual hunger, fatigue, blurred vision, and slow healing of cuts and bruises. People who are overweight, have a family history of diabetes, or show any of the prior symptoms of the disease should be checked.

Early detection is an extremely important step in controlling diabetes. Depending on severity, diabetes can be controlled by insulin injections, oral hypoglycemics, or simply controlled diet, exercise and periodic check-ups. Though diabetes is incurable, the preceding type of self care programs can generally prevent the onset of complications such as blindness, circulatory problems and heart disease.

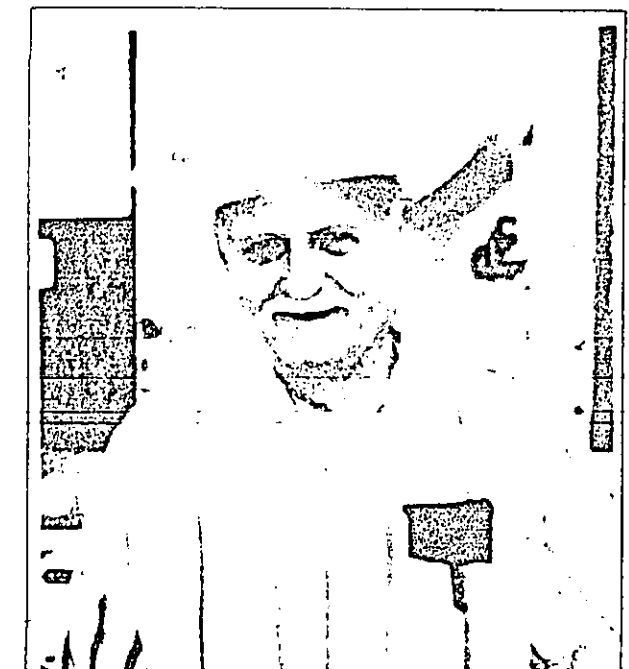
People planning to be tested should eat a balanced meal which is low in

sugar content and includes at least 34 ounces of carbohydrate two hours prior to taking the test. French fries, a glass of milk and a sandwich would meet this requirement. Because of possible complications, known diabetics cannot be checked during this program.



Texas Department of Criminal Justice Announces Passage of Several Bills

Representative Allen Hightower, (D) Huntsville, has announced passage of several bills to benefit the Texas Department of Criminal Justice and its employees.

H.B. 729 prohibits an inmate from obtaining personal information of TDCJ employees such as home address, telephone number, social security number and the names and ages of family members.

Hightower remarked, "This legislation is long overdue. We have a number of inmate employees working in the system, and it's pretty unerving to have an inmate say, 'I know where you live and you daughter. Am I 12 years' old.'"

Rep. Hightower, Chairman of the House Committee on Corrections, has passed this bill successfully in the House and expects no opposition in the Senate.

Hightower has also authored and passed several bills designed to use prison bed space more effectively. The Institutional Division is required to segregate the populations of boot camp participants and probation violators. Under current law, these offenders are required to be held in trust facilities. The populations of both groups is relatively low and causes the division to evacuate a facility of 200 beds for a small group of inmates. The one instance, a 200-bed facility was emptied for one inmate who had been sentenced to the boot camp program. Hightower's legislation allows the department to commingle these populations and place them within the system according to their classifications.

A recent court decision ruled the boot camp program unconstitutional due to the exclusion of women from participation. Hightower explained this was an oversight during the creation of the program and his legislation will correct this problem.

In the upcoming weeks Rep. Hightower will sponsor legislation removing the price system from under the Ruiz order. The state has successfully operated under the federal requirements and last year had the Special Court Master assigned to the department removed. Although the department would no longer be under the Ruiz mandate, the agency intends to operate under the stipulations as agency policy.
