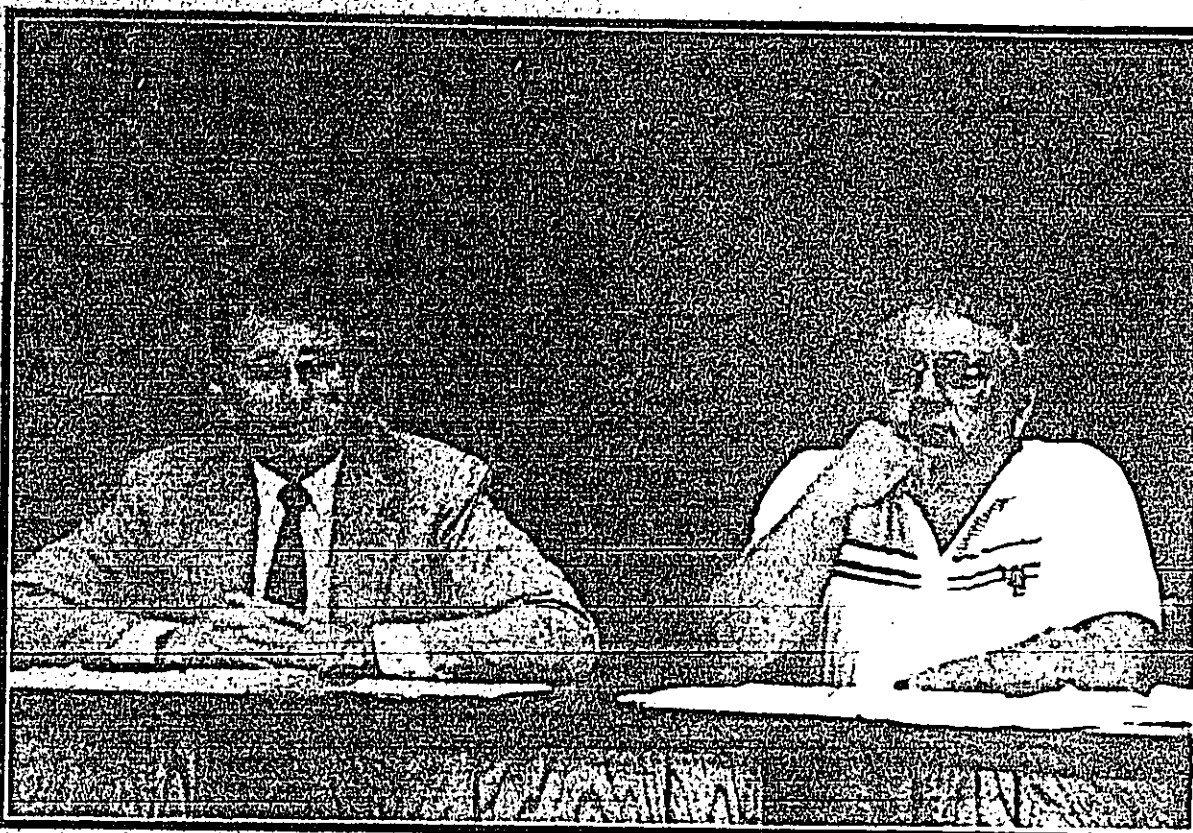

## Commissioners Approve Pay And Library Funds

Tyler County Judge Jerome Owens Friday said he would try to create a policy in the County employees handbook next year which would create salary increase standards

for county employees. "We'll look at a policy program next year...it will go under employee practices," Owens said toward the end of a meeting called last week to adopt the FY

1992 Budget which includes, according to action taken during the meeting a three percent increase across the board for county employees. Uppermost on the

minds of visitors was a planned \$11,000 increase proposed by Commissioner Jerry Mahan. "That came up out of the blue," said Commissioner Pete Barnea. "We

didn't know Mahan was going to suggest it. Owens justified the increase first, then said he would ask the court to dedicate half of it to the much needed Allan Shivers Library Fund.

## Motor Vehicle Registration Requires Insurance

In September, the simple matter of registering a motor vehicle in Texas will become a little more complicated.

The change is a result of insurance reform enacted by the 72nd Legislature. Beginning September 1, the owner of a motor vehicle must submit current proof of financial responsibility with an application for initial registration, renewal of registration or transfer of registration. Also for the first time, Texas will have to show proof of insurance to receive or renew their driver's licenses and inspection stickers.

"Many states have found that tying these responsibilities of proof of insurance increases compliance with mandatory liability law," said Arnold Oliver, engineer-director of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. "But the Legislature was really responding to public pressure. Insured drivers - that's about 75 percent of

us - wanted to tighten enforcement on the other 25 percent." The most common evidence of financial responsibility is a liability insurance card issued to the policyholder by the insurance company. Examples of other types of acceptable proof include insurance policies and binders, pool coverage documents, certificates of self insurance, and certificates of bond.

The new law applies to registration handled in person or by mail. The original or a photocopy of the evidence will satisfy the requirement of proof of financial responsibility. All original documentation will be returned.

## GSU Gets 'Team Cities' Together

Gulf States Utilities Co. is inviting representatives from Woodville along with those from approximately 40 other Texas cities and counties to the second annual Team City Texas Conference to be held Thursday, September 5, at the Del Lago Resort and Conference Center on Lake Corpus.

This conference provides an opportunity for economic development teams from communities across GSU's Texas service area to share ideas and take part in workshops to strengthen their expertise in areas such as finance, workforce training, leadership development, business retention, downtown revitalization and tourism.

Featured speakers for the conference will be Congressman Joe Barton of El Paso, Texas, and John Kirchhoff, assistant state director of the Texas Home Administration. GSU's Beaumont Division Vice President Arden Loughmiller said the purpose of the conference is twofold. "We want to thank each city and county participating in the Team City economic development program for all their hard work. We also want to give them an opportunity to exchange ideas and learn from each other's experiences."

Participants gave high marks to the first Team City Texas conference held last September at the Woodlands, according to Malcolm Williams, GSU's manager of business development. "Most of those who attended last year's meeting will be back again this year," Williams said. "And we are looking forward to seeing a lot of new faces, as communities continue to join the Team City program."

Gulf States' Team City program is an on going economic development effort which fosters teamwork between community leaders, economic development specialists from GSU and the Texas Department of Commerce. The purpose of the program is to strengthen local economies by retaining existing jobs and creating new ones. After community leaders form marketing teams to promote their area, set goals and complete extensive economic development training, their city is

officially designated as a Team City.

This designation means the city will be featured in GSU national advertising and that selected buildings and sites will be listed in international computer listings. GSU will assist Team Cities on a long-term basis, provided that every two years they meet re-qualification criteria.

Woodville is one of approximately 80 cities, counties and parishes currently participating in the Team City program in Texas and Louisiana.

## Lifeline Service Aids Low Income Customers

For many low income customers, Southwestern Bell Telephone's new Lifeline Service provides local telephone service at a fraction of its normal cost.

As of August 29, customers with an income at or below the poverty level, as determined by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget, became eligible for a \$7 reduction in their monthly residential service charge.

The Lifeline program is part of a negotiated settlement approved last year by the Federal Communications Commission. The settlement includes customer benefits of \$1.2 billion over the next four years.

To be eligible for Lifeline Service, customers must be the head of their household, have income at or below the poverty level or qualify for an assistance program, such as Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), Food Stamps, WIC or Supplemental Security Income.

The discounted rate applies to all classes of residential local exchange service. No optional extended area service may be provided to a customer who qualifies under the discount.

Lifeline customers may subscribe to other telephone services such as Touch Tone and Custom Calling features, but the discount will not apply to those services. The discount is good for one year after the customer qualifies and then must be re-certified.

The \$7 reduction is calculated by subtracting \$3.50 from the local basic service charge and waiver of the current \$3.50 subscriber line charge. The subscriber line charge was instituted after the divestiture of the Bell System in 1984 to compensate local telephone companies such as Southwestern Bell Telephone for the loss of long distance revenues.

Customers may obtain Lifeline Service eligibility forms by calling toll free 1-877-7552.

## Locking up Texas' violent offenders

Texas are fed up with the spectacle of violent criminals being released from prison after serving only a fraction of their sentence. They are frustrated and angry with the revolving doors in our prison system.

And they should be. Because the first responsibility of any government is to insure the safety of its citizens.

On August 25, 1991, however, Texas' state government took a historic step toward fulfilling its fundamental responsibility to the people of this state. The Legislature passed a criminal justice package on that date which I am honored to sign into law.

For the first time — not just in Texas, but in the nation — we have enacted legislation that will keep violent criminals locked up and will attack the root cause of crime: addiction to drugs and alcohol.

It is impossible to overstate the importance of this legislation. No living with crime. Senator Ted Lyon said it best when he noted that, in the future, other states will follow "the Texas plan" as they try to come to grips with their own crime problems.

This "Texas plan" works by simply addressing what law enforcement officers have always known, but politicians have been reluctant to acknowledge. And that is this basic formula that continues to drive our crime rates upward:

Addicts commit crimes. Addicts come out of prison. Addicts commit crimes again.

It is this vicious cycle that must be halted. Since it is an addiction to drugs and alcohol that is at the core of many of our crime problems, it is this addiction that we must combat.

And this legislation does that.

At least 15 new prison facilities will be constructed under this legislation (House Bill 93) which is designed to allow our prisons to hold an additional 25,300 inmates. These new facilities will be built in the next two years to four years.

Almost half of the new cells (12,000) will be utilized to deal with those prisoners who have drug and alcohol addictions. That's four times as many as the next closest state in the country — and a thousand times more than had previously existed in Texas.

New prisons and treating addictions aren't the only aspects to this legislation. H.B. 93 will also get the state out of court, keep violent offenders locked up for longer periods of time, clear the backlog of state prisoners currently being held in county jails and make Texas communities safer.

It does this in several ways. The legislation:

- Establishes 13,300 maximum security beds, ensuring that the worst criminals will remain incarcerated as long as possible.
- Creates a "substance abuse felony punishment" and provides space for 12,000 inmates punished under this provision.
- Settles the Harris County and Nueces County lawsuits (which included 13 counties) against the state and provides a mechanism to reimburse counties for keeping state prisoners — thus reducing the tax load on local taxpayers.
- Expands the use of private prisons from 2,000 to 4,000 beds.
- Adopts the recommendation of Comptroller John Sharp to facilitate the release of elderly and seriously ill prisoners who are no longer a threat to our safety.

Our focus must be on reserving maximum security beds for violent offenders. When we work together — state, county and local officials, along with law enforcement officers and judges — I am confident that we will be able to achieve this goal.

With the adoption of this progressive legislative package, I believe this government has taken a big step toward fulfilling its responsibility to the people of Texas.

But this is only the first step. We must continue to work together on both the local and statewide level to keep our communities safe.

# State And County Working Together To Improve Roads

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, and Tyler County are working together to improve the rutted, sometimes impassable county road that connects Farm to Market Road 92 with Recreation Road 255.

The dirt road is often in poor condition and becomes impassable during heavy rains, hindering mail delivery and emergency and school bus services, county officials said.

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission has offered to designate the 8.5 mile county road part of the state maintained system.

In exchange, Tyler County would provide all the right of way and the cost of utility adjustments, accept responsibility for environmental mitigation and continue to maintain the county road until construction of the extension begins.

The commission action, at its August meeting, will allow Tyler County to accept right of way donations when preliminary engineering is completed.

Commission members will consider authorizing construction, depending on the availability of funds, at a later date.
