Y.M.C.A. In Organization Here!

Norris Lineweaver, vice president of the Harris County Y.M.C.A. and who is known as "Mr. Y.M.C.A. himself", picked up on the enthusiasm and cohesiveness of the Tyler County Community Tuesday as a large group assembled to hear him tell of the strategies to undertake in establishing a "Y" in Tyler County.

"This is an unusually large group I have before me...you all look

good, there seems to be a lot of interest here."

Before the meeting ended, primary initiators of the gathering, Precinct 1 Peace Justice Wanda Brasher and The Rev. Larry Shine, of Warren, had begun the process of forming a steering committee to organize further details for finding out what the community may want from a "Y".

"Local Y.M.C.A.'s come up with the darndest ways to come up

with what they perceive to be the needs of their communities," said Lineweaver.

"We have operating models which exist which your group could draw an example from."

Lineweaver said Athens and Kerrville Texas were the closest rural models. Kerrville, he said, started by raising \$150,000 to operate for the first three years.

Y.M.C.A. CORE PROGRAMS: 1. Aquatics, 2. Youth Sports, 3. Older Youth, 12-18, 4. Youth & Govt. Program, 5. Active Older Adults, 6. Fitness & Wellness Swim & Gym, 7. Child Care (incl After School) 8. Camping, 9. Dormitory and Residences.

One audience member asked "What is the adaptability of the Y.M.C.A. programming to the rural community?"

The difference, Lineweaver said, "is in the staff to volunteer relationship," adding, "there is no margin for politics and the overall key is the

partnership between the public and private sector."

Lineweaver suggested the group form a steering committee made up of service club members, school districts, county and city governments and churches. Then he said the group must identify goals and objectives through a needs assessment then set up program priorities.

He said the organization would need \$50,000 cash at first to open, then \$50,000 for each of the next two years in the form of pledges. Then organize an operating board, then hire a staff.

Lineweaver said Tyler County organization would be considered part of the South Texas Cluster of "Y's" if approved.

County Schools Get Payback In.....

Milk Bilk: \$14,700

Attorney General Dan Morales' announced this week that 5 independent school districts in Tyler County will be receiving a total of approximately \$14,700 from a recent lawsuit settlement with eight dairy companies charged by Morales with illegally driving up the cost of school milk through bidding and price-fixing conspiracies.

Morales' investigation

resulted in a \$15.05 million settlement in a Tyler federal court. Morales represented 1,026 Texas school districts, including Tyler County districts.

"One of the most rewarding aspects of my job as Attorney General is when I am able to bring an injustice to a halt and provide real assistance to the taxpayers of Texas," Morales said. "I am confident that as the public school

administrators of Tyler County open up the new school year, they will be able to put these funds to good use in furthering the nutritional well being of our school kids."

The figures for restitution of damages are estimates. Exact awards to school districts will be announced at a later date by the Texas Education Agency, which will also

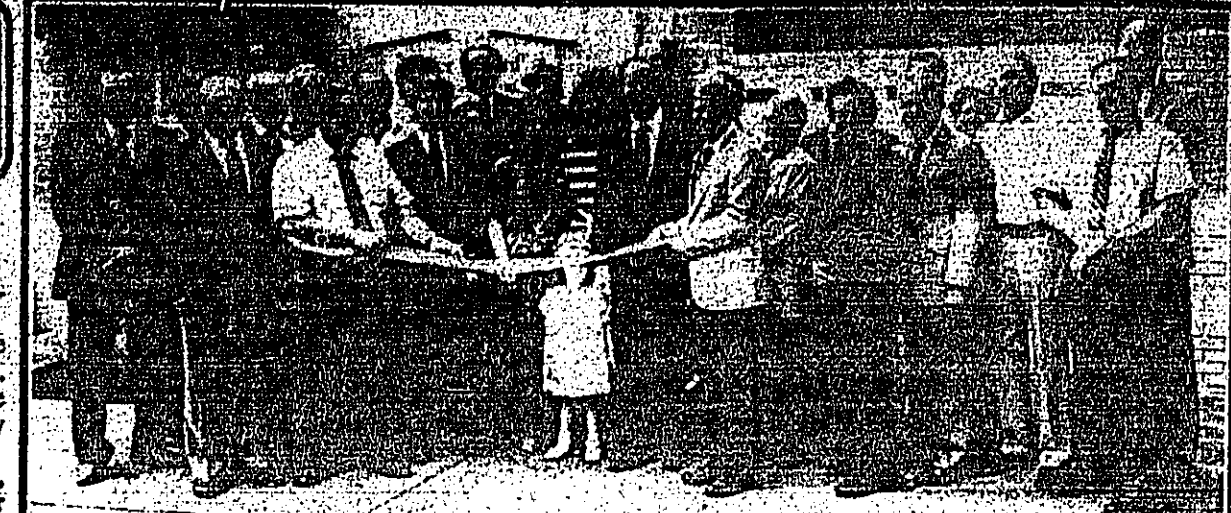

Baptist General Convention Of Texas Speaks Against A Lottery

The lottery creates a new generation of gamblers, it is a "sleazy" and regressive revenue-raiser, and is detrimental to legitimate businesses," concerned Texas Baptists said at a recent news conference.

Sue Cox, executive director of Texas Who Care, announced the kickoff of her organization's campaign to defeat the lottery referendum in the Nov. 5 statewide ballot.

Joining her in launching the anti-lottery campaign were representatives of the Texas Baptist Christian Life Commission, Texas IMPACT, the Texas Conference of Churches, the

Legislative Task Force of the Methodist Bishops of Texas, the Consumers Union of the Southwest and the Texas Alliance for Human Needs.

Also participating in the press conference was Rep. Glenn Rupp, R-Duncanville, who said the numbers show the state would increase state revenue by taking money from a legitimate tax base.

view that a constitutional amendment has been submitted to the voters for their ratification, the decision should center on

whether a lottery is the best method of raising revenue for the state of Texas in fact, whether it should even be a part of the revenue mix. We submit that the answer to both questions is "no," Mrs. Cox said.

Enumerating the four central points of the anti-lottery campaign, Mrs. Cox said:

A lottery will create a new generation of gamblers. Because of the heavy advertising of the lottery, the children of today will be the gamblers of tomorrow.

"Merchandizing a lottery is, at best, a questionable role of government and - at its worst - a sleazy thing for a government to do."

The lottery is a regressive form of revenue that falls unfairly on the citizens with the fewest resources.

"Taking money away from businesses is just reshuffling our financial resources and benefits no one. The lottery player, the

local business and the local government will each be a loser."

Western Warm, executive director of the Texas Baptist Christian Life Commission, emphasized his conviction that it is inappropriate for the government to promote and operate the lottery.

"The lottery is regressive, aggressive, abusive and demeaning," he said.

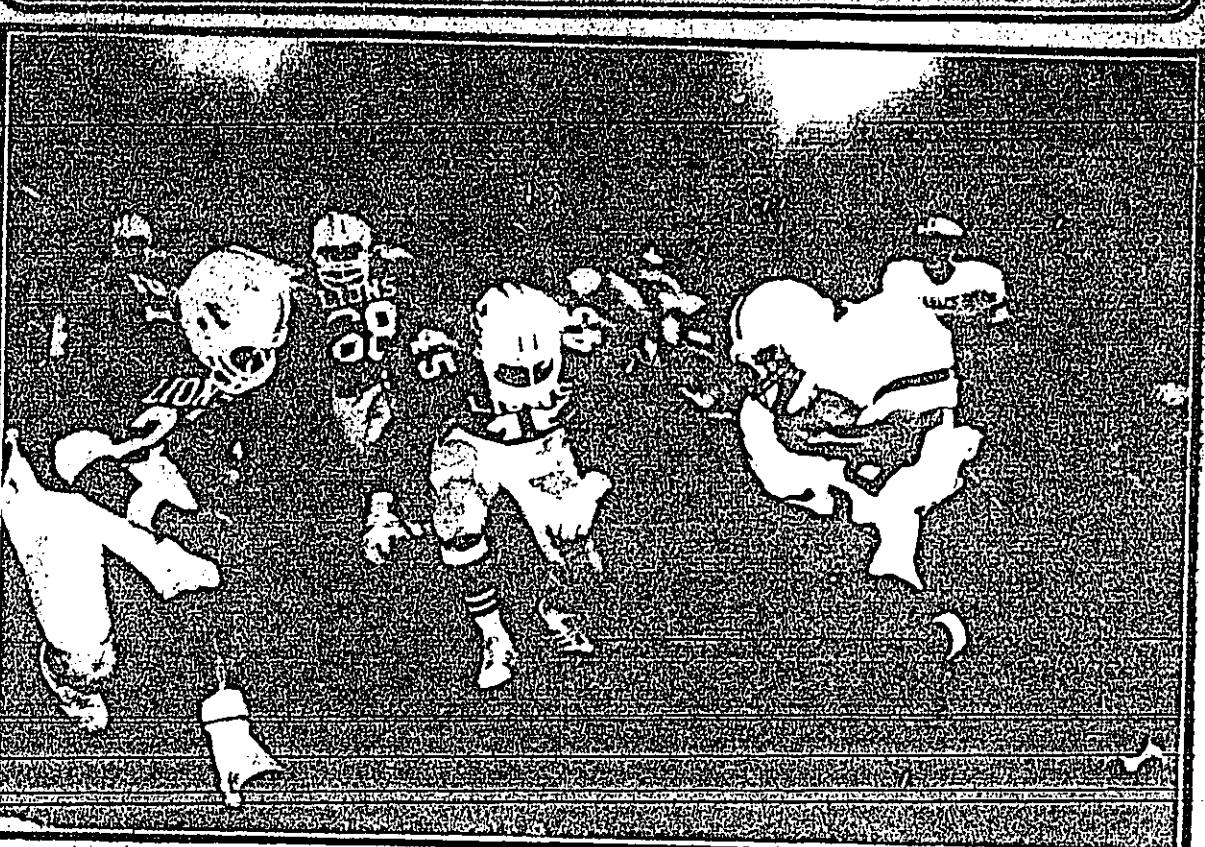

NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$ 4.906 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$ 5.297 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$ 0.83 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the CHESTER INDEPENDENT School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of \$ 6.469 that will provide \$ 5.794 per student in state and local revenues.

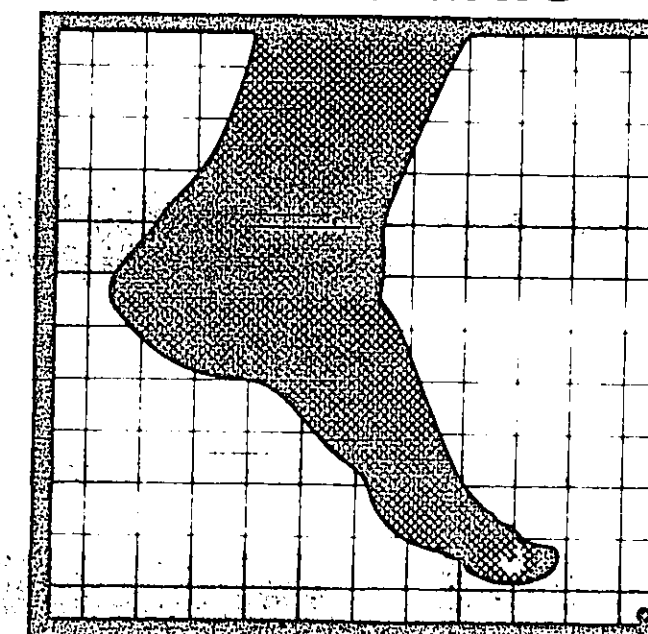

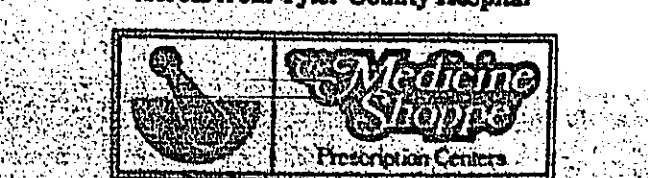

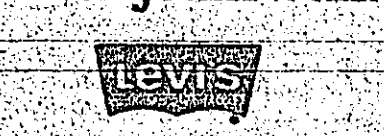
