Lilljedahl said. "While I cannot assure you that there will never be an incident, I can tell you that the likely hood of violent behavior (affecting those living and working around the center) will be no greater than that of the so-called 'normal' children who are in your community now," he said. "In fact, it might even be less because of the young age of the children in question and the type of supervision they will receive," the foundation director said. He explained that under state rules, the center's staff is required to know where each child is at all times. While the children will be allowed to go shopping and use other community facilities, Lilljedahl said that will be accompanied by staff members on all of those outings. Crump added that based on experience gained at the foundation's other centers, the children can be expected to become combative with each other and with the employees who are in direct contact with them. However, because of heavy supervision, there is usually very little problem between the children and neighbors. "We understand your concerns. We have encountered them everywhere we have located a center," Crump said. "Going in, many residents feel threatened by the children but after the program has been in place for a while, we've found that our neighbors often become our biggest supporters."

Chief Deputy Sheriff Sam Bibbesingh said that local officials might get together to visit some of the foundation's other residential treatment centers to get a first-hand view of their operation. "We could talk with law enforcement officers and neighbors to see what type of problems they have encountered," he added. Lilljedahl and Crump both agreed that such a visit should be made and each volunteered to do anything that anything we could say to you today," Lilljedahl said. Such a trip is now being planned by Bible, Koci, Woodville Mayor Billy Rose and Woodville Police Chief Scott Yosko.

George Allen Sturrock, who serves as chairman of the Deep East Texas Mental Health-Mental Retardation board of directors, told the county commissioners that MHMR staff have been "checked out" the Mary Lee Foundation after they recently learned of their plans to operate a facility in Woodville. "They seem to be doing an outstanding job," he said. "We don't have this kind of facility in East Texas and people right now. As far as MHMR is concerned, we have no objection and I feel that it will be a benefit to the community."

School services Lilljedahl and Crump also explained that while state law would give the

Woodville Independent School District the responsibility of educating the children, almost all of children would be attending special education classes located at the center. "The local school district will be responsible for providing special education teachers but we would provide the classroom space," Lilljedahl said. "In return, the school district would receive all of the (Average Daily Attendance) money from the state. Although Lilljedahl could not quote figures on how much money the WISD might receive from 30 students, the foundation director told the audience that "we have had no complaints from any school district about our program being a financial drain."

Lilljedahl added that while some of the center's children probably would attend public school classes, he emphasized that it would be the responsibility of the local school system to decide if and when one of the center's children is ready to come to a regular school campus.

"From time to time we will have a child who we feel could attend regular classes, but before he or she can be admitted, the local Admissions Review and Dismissal Committee has to agree. That decision is not in our hands. It is totally up to the school district's ARD committee," he added. Concerning the possibility of exposing teachers to violent behavior in the treatment center's classrooms, Lilljedahl said that any student who displays such behavior would be immediately removed from the class by the center's staff and placed in a "quiet room."

Children are not delinquents In response to other questions, Lilljedahl said that while some of the children in the program may be on juvenile probation due to some type of criminal behavior, none of the children will have been judged to be delinquent and placed with the Texas Youth Commission. He added that these non-problematic children are evaluated as the type of offense they committed before the foundation would accept them into the program.

"Part of the problem that we are faced with is the label of 'residential treatment center,'" Crump added. "When people hear the term 'treatment center,' it is somewhat misleading. That name will often bring to mind some type of adult alcohol or drug abuse facility."

"We could use the term uphanging or children's home just as well here," he added. "What used to be an orphanage years ago is now called a treatment center for state licensing purposes."

Crump added that while the foundation plans to house only 30 students in the Woodville center, state regulations would allow them to put up to 80 children in the building. "We are the ones who set the number at 30 not the state. Based on our past experience, we felt that we could comfortably serve 30 children at this facility," he added. The foundation's largest residential facility, the Live Oak Campus in Austin, was established in 1966 and has 40 beds for boys and girls. The Rockdale Campus, located on 54-acres between Austin and Bryan, houses 30 boys while the Kyle Campus 20 miles south of Austin has 18 beds for boys on a 73-acre farm. The Buda Campus, located 10 miles

south of Austin, has 16 beds for girls on a 38-acre ranch while the Giddings Campus has 24 beds for boys on an 184-acre ranch 60 miles east of Austin. The Lockhart Campus houses 20 girls on a 121-acre farm.

No secret action Concerning criticisms that the public was not previously informed about the plans for the location of the Mary Lee center in Woodville, Rose and Koci took some of the responsibility. "The mayor said the Oct. 29 meetings were designed to inform both the public and local leaders about the details of the foundation's plans. "We didn't know all the details ourselves and therefore we couldn't answer questions," Rose said. "We asked the newspapers to hold off on printing anything until after this meeting today so they could get the facts and they agreed to do so. Maybe that was a mistake, but we wanted to be sure that accurate information was given and, prior to today, we didn't have any."

Crump also apologized to local residents if there was any appearance that the foundation had been moving in secret. "You have to realize that it was only two weeks ago that Cliff Sinclair, the owner of the property, called me and offered to donate this building to the foundation," she said. "We came to Woodville the next day to see if the property would accommodate a program."

"For us, two weeks from the time that the donation was offered to the point of making a public announcement is really very short," she added. She added that she and Lilljedahl would be available to meet with any group of local residents to discuss the matter and to answer any questions they might have about the program.

Lilljedahl indicated that while meetings were being held with the Woodville city council and Tyler County commissioners, neither body was expected to take any action regarding the foundation's plans to open the treatment center.

One local resident asked the foundation director if their move to Woodville "was a done deal" and that nothing could be done to stop them from coming here.

"That is essentially correct, but we really don't want to look at it that way," he said. "We want to be good neighbors. We want to become a part of the community. That's why we're here today and that's why we are willing to come back at anytime and meet with any group to discuss this."

Regarding the reason for locating the center in Woodville, Crump said the move here is a direct and total result of the donation of the Edwards Funeral Home building by Sinclair. "The move here is a direct and total result of the donation of the Edwards Funeral Home building by Sinclair," she said. "The foundation has had one of its family members enrolled in one of the Mary Lee's adult programs for a number of years and this donation appeared to be his way of thanking the foundation."

"In donating the property to Mary Lee, Mr. Sinclair had two stipulations," Crump said. "First, we had to operate a program on the property. We couldn't accept the donation and then turn around and put the building on the market to be sold. Second, we had to name it after his wife, who was raised in Woodville."

When the facility opens, it will be known as the Kathryn Stanley Sinclair Children's Center.

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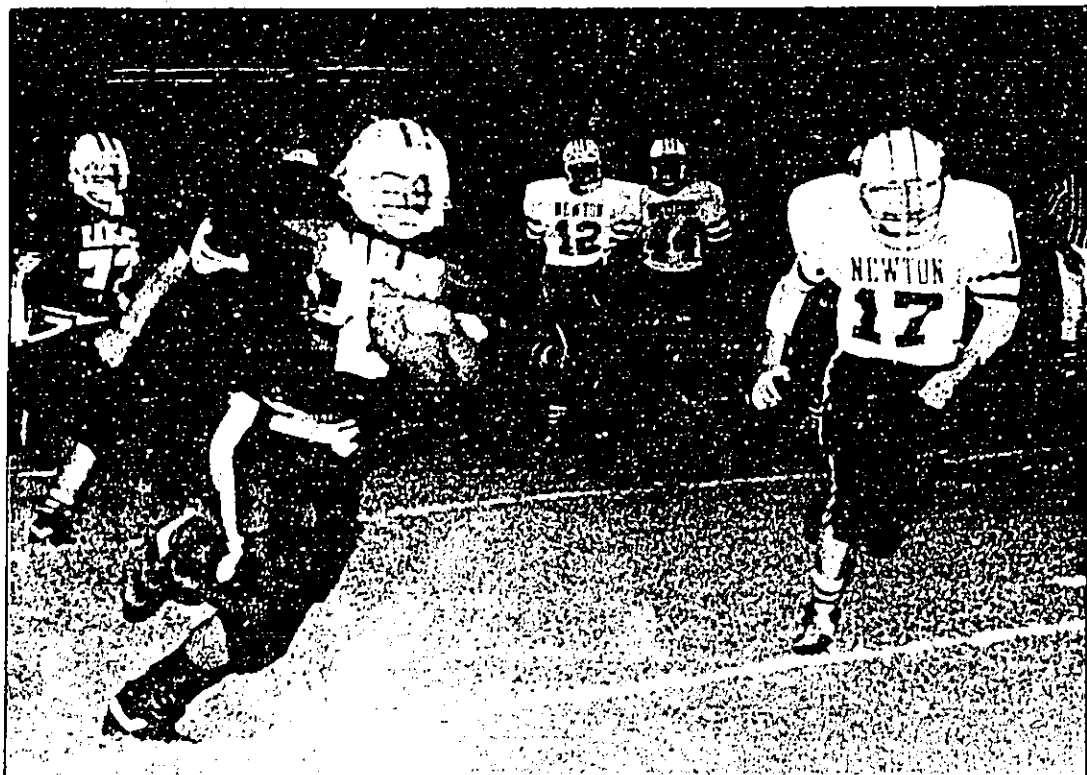
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Maloy runs wild in Woodville loss to Newton

McKinney, who placed ninth in the state last year in class A, took first place at the district meet, leading his team to the third place finish behind Zavalla and Goodrich.

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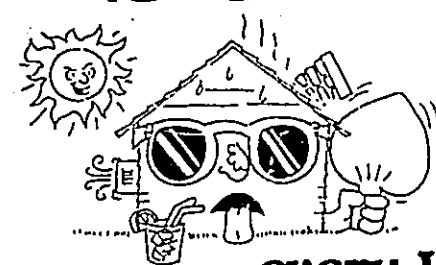
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WOODVILLE - Woodville coach Melvin Houston said it before the game. "For some reason we always play Newton well."

Williams scored Newton's second touchdown on another 12-yard run that came on the heels of a three-play, 80-yard drive. The big play was a 50-yard bomb from quarterback Joe Woodville.

Newton, still not feeling safe, countered with a nine-play, 56-yard drive that was capped with a three yard Foster run. A Gatson run for two yards and then scored on a two-point conversion to give Newton a 32-17 advantage.

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Newton's offense, which is averaging almost 500 yards a game in district play, chalked up over 500 yards against Woodville, including 362 on the ground.

Maloy's 249 yards was the seventh best effort of any player in any class in southeast Texas this season. The Woodville runner already has the number two spot with 394 yards, and has now rushed for over 1,500 yards in nine games.

Deer season opens in county Saturday

TYLER COUNTY - Tyler County, like most areas in east Texas, will be inundated by herds of hunters this weekend trying to bag their first deer of the season.

"If the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reports are anywhere close to accurate, then hunters in this area should have plenty of success. Good early rainfall helped this area's dry conditions up until last week and have set range conditions down."

"We've had spotty rainfall since June. Some areas are holding well, some are dry," said Gary Spencer, TPWD wildlife biologist of Jasper. "If we don't get some rain quickly, we'll have a pretty bad stress period from the deer. The deer are in pretty good shape right now, but the dry weather concerns me."

"It's not all bad news though. A good acorn crop is beginning to fall and if the dry weather stops, it will definitely help hunters find the deer. Spencer said preliminary information indicates a 40 percent to 60 percent drop in acorn crop, the same as last year and "pretty good for this area."

The deer population remained stable. "A few areas had increases and some had decreases. It was mixed bag," he said. "The deer population has been going down since 1987. It seems like it's leveled off now. I think hunters will find more bucks this year."

A five-year research program, monitoring whitetail deer, conducted at a South Mississippi Game Reserve covered the following:

- whitetail deer have an approximate 1-2 mile home range area.
- less than 2 percent of bucks actually feed in daylight hours.
- at 80 percent of whitetail deer in an area are active during the same hours.

The law says you may not sell any game animal or part of a game animal except for deer antlers and deer hides. It is against the law to use fire arm killing rifle ammunition to kill deer.

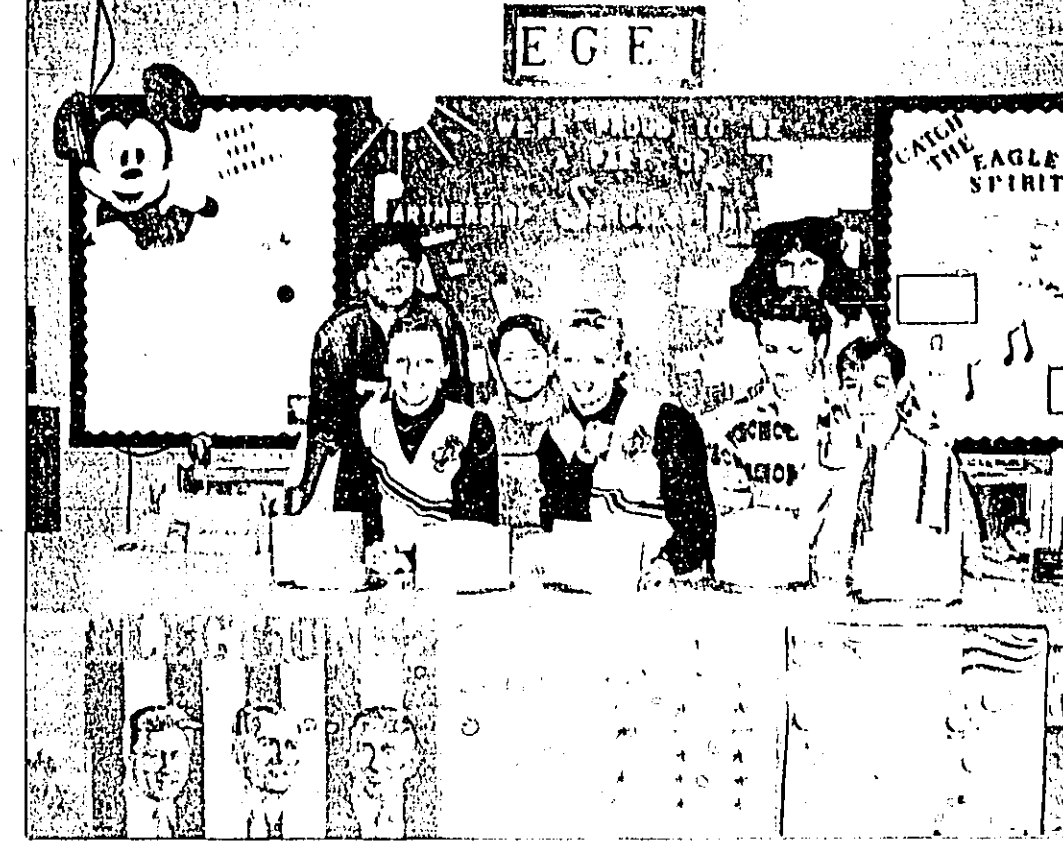
Colmesneil student wins American Farmer Degree

The results of the vote gave Bush the win with 130. Clinton received 117. Perot garnered 94 and "others" received six.

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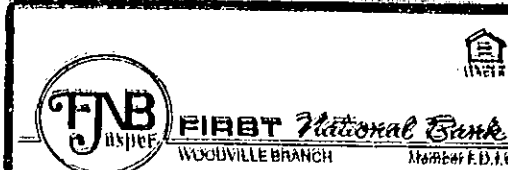

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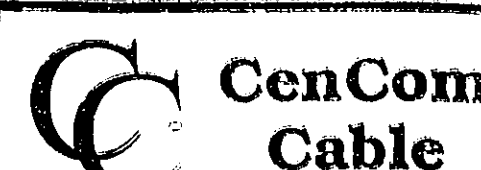

'My Russian Diary'

Thirty years ago, my father, Lt. Col. Charles W. Husey, Sr., at that time a captain in the United States Air Force was stationed in Roswell, New Mexico. His mission was to lead a missile crew under his command. He had a key which turned simultaneously with another officers would have been a nuclear warhead across the sky in Russia. During those days a crisis in Cuba elevated the tension level all the way to DEFCON 5 - global thermo-nuclear war. Thank God, it never happened.
 I now feel especially thankful, because I have seen first hand victims of nuclear annihilation's cruelty. On Sunday afternoon, August 8, 1992, we went to make a heart-rending visit to the hospital where the Chernobyl children were being treated. Surely one of the saddest places on earth. Minsk is only about 120 kilometers from Kiev, where the meltdown occurred. People, especially children, in this vicinity are suffering the effects of fugitive radiation. The first Chernobyl child I saw was a little boy. Full of energy, he came bounding up to the door to have a hug at his dad. His dad was hunched over I knew now what, and he was very excited about these visitors. The mothers of small children were as we prayed for them and their little ones, I couldn't help asking, "Why not me?" One mother asked that we pray for her nine year old son who had been losing seven kilos a week. I knew he might not live much longer. As much out of concern for comforting the mother as for the boy's soul - I knew this poor child was in God's hands - I took a few minutes with an interpreter to share with the mother and child. He understood and wanted to give his heart to Christ. We prayed together and God mixed joy and sorrow. I thought of my Amanda, Sara and Angela as we were leaving and again asked, "Why not me?" I will never forget the children of Chernobyl and their mothers.
 Before we left Russia, God had one miracle waiting for us in St. Petersburg. WE organized a service at the Museum of the History of Atheism and Religion. 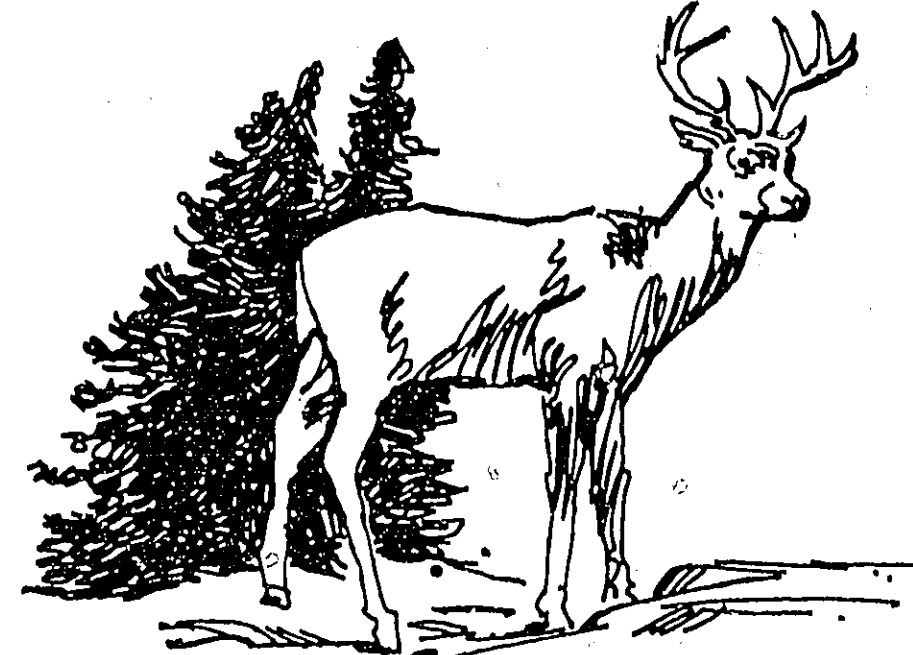

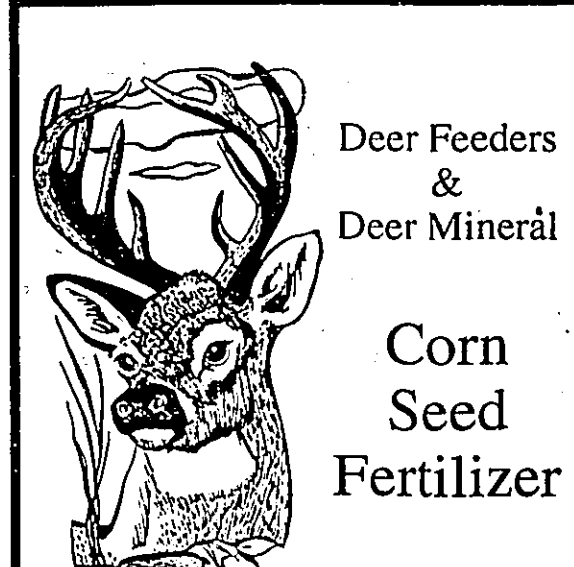

Commissioners table computer purchase

WOODVILLE — The purchase of a new computer system was postponed for at least two weeks after commissioners decided Friday to proceed immediately with plans to add both the auditor's and tax assessor-collector's office to the new system.

The county had sought bids on a new central computer system to be installed in the County Clerk's office which would be used by both the district and county clerk, the district attorney and the county judge. In addition to the four department which currently are using the central computer, the new system would allow the county to add all offices located at the Tyler County Justice Center to the computer network.

A special \$71,000 grant to pay for the expansion of services to the justice center has been obtained from the state to help pay for the new hardware. In addition, the county has previously set aside an additional \$40,000 to help cover the cost of the computer plus the additional programs needed by the county clerk, sheriff's department and justices of the peace.

However, during a special meeting Friday, the commissioners, at the suggestion of Precinct 3 Commissioner Jerry Mahan, decided to postpone action on the matter to give Leran E. Bosarge, senior marketing representative for IBM, a chance to survey the auditor's and tax assessor-collector's office to determine what additional hardware and software would be required to add those offices to the central system.

Although the commissioners were assured that there were very little, if any difference, in cost between adding

totalled \$12,814.58.

It is fairly obvious that there is no one locally who would want the building and there is a good possibility there won't be many bidders on the property at this time. There might be some Houston investors who might be slightly interested, but I feel that if you are bidding, they may back out," Gilchrist said.

While Houston area investors might bid if they see there is no serious competition for the building's purchase, Gilchrist said he doubted whether any out-of-town investor would pay very much, especially if they already have someone lined up to rent the space.

In addition to the purchase price, a buyer would have to be prepared to spend money to renovate the structure to accommodate whatever might wish to rent it.

"No one is going to spend very much money and then let the building sit empty while they're trying to make payments on the money they borrowed to buy the building in the first place," Gilchrist said.

Because of a lack of any apparent competition during the auction, Gilchrist said the county might be able to obtain the Jasper Federal building for next to nothing.

"There is a very good possibility that this building can be purchased for very little money. It could be a tremendous opportunity for the county," he added.

When asked by Owens what he would consider a good sales price, Gilchrist told the judge that anything from \$150,000 or less would be a good buy, but he added that it was very possible that the final auction price could come in well below \$50,000.

"There is no minimum bid required at this auction. What ever the maximum bid is, that is what the building will be sold for. If the maximum is \$10,000, then that's the price."

"And, on top of that there is a 10 percent discount for a cash payment," he added.

Owens noted that by paying cash, the county could bid up to \$165,000 for the building and still pay less than \$150,000 after the discount is calculated.

Although commissioners were initially concerned about publicly announcing the maximum amount they intended to bid for the building, Gilchrist noted that under state law they had no choice. He pointed out they could go into closed session to discuss the real estate purchase, but added that any final vote would have to be made in open court.

Children's home coming to Woodville

-Some local residents voice concerns about location of treatment center-

WOODVILLE — Plans to open a 30-bed residential treatment center for abused, abandoned and neglected children were unveiled publicly last week by officials with the Mary Lee Foundation.

The Austin-based private, non-profit group currently operates a number of treatment facilities throughout the state which specialize in providing services to multi-handicapped children with behavior problems.

The boys and girls to be housed at the Woodville treatment center are scheduled to range in age — for the most part — from 5 to 12 years. Almost all will be wards of the state who have been removed from abusive home environments by court order.

"I cannot guarantee you today that all of the children who will be located at the Woodville center are going to be 12 years old or younger," Mary Lee Foundation Director Don Liljedahl said during a series of public meetings on Oct. 29. "There will be times when it will be necessary to house older children here, and of course it is very probable that children who come here at age 12 or under will stay until they are teenagers."

In discussing the Woodville treatment center, Liljedahl and Charlene Crump, founder and chairman of the board of the foundation, appeared during special Woodville city council and Tyler County commissioners meetings. In addition, the pair made presentations during the Woodville Lions Club luncheon and had informal meetings with representatives of the Woodville Independent School District and a number of area ministers.

Liljedahl and Crump will be available to meet with members of the community on Wednesday, Nov. 18, during a public forum to be held at the Woodville City Hall at 10 a.m.

In introducing Liljedahl and Crump during separate meetings of the Woodville City Council and Tyler County commissioners last week, Tyler County Chamber of Commerce President Gene Koci noted that when the treatment facility is fully staffed, it would employ between 30 and 40 people. When various "pinpoints" are

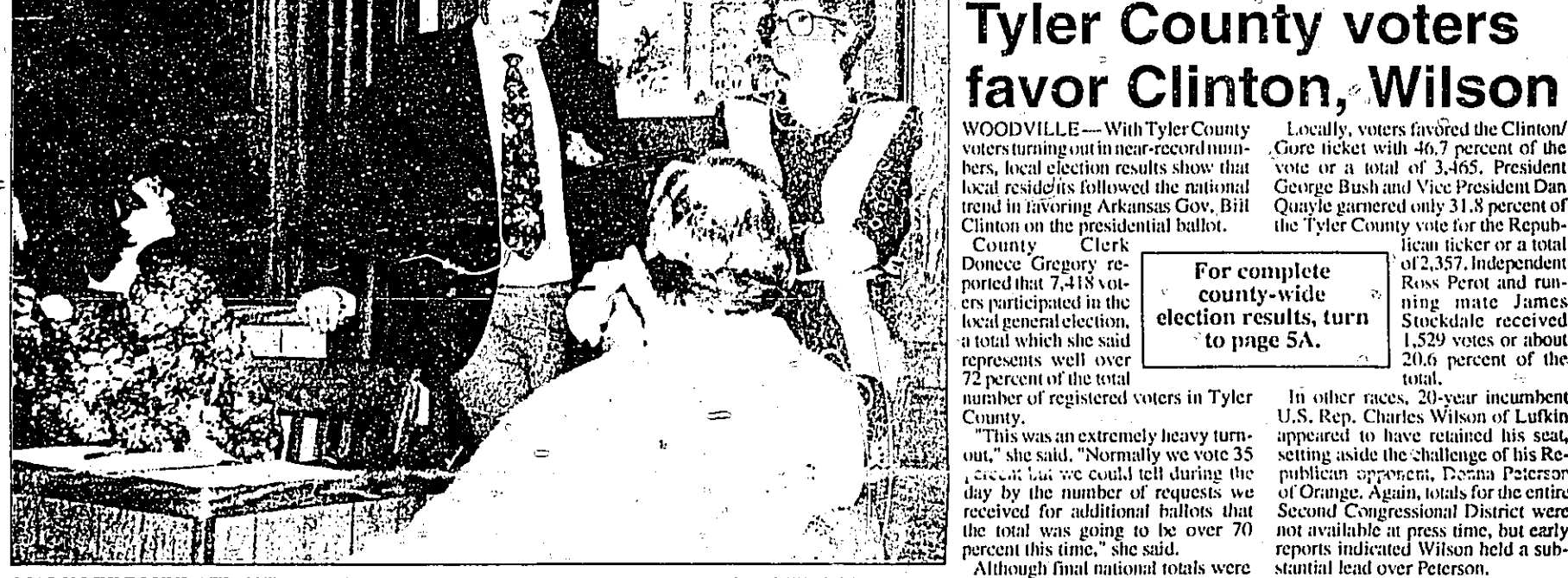
calculated into the picture, Koci said the Woodville area could receive a substantial economic boost from the center.

"If economists are right, there are three new jobs which spin off from every permanent job created in an area," Koci said. "If that is true, then the result of this center coming here could be that \$3.5 million will be pumped into the Woodville and Tyler County economies."

Liljedahl, speaking about the direct economic impact of the center, said that the area could benefit by a spending budget of nearly \$1 million.

"Once we get up an running and have all 30 beds filled, then we will be receiving income of \$80,000 per month. Much of that will be spent right here in the Woodville area. We are concerned about the local economy and about the local residents and law enforcement."

Despite projections of a major economic boost to the community, most local residents and law enforcement

County wins bid on Jasper Federal building

WOODVILLE — For an "exceptionally low price," Owens said following last week's RTC auction. "The last appraised value of the building that I saw was \$255,000 but I don't think you could duplicate the building and its concrete, parking lot for under \$100,000."

Owens added that by purchasing the 4,700-square-foot building and 3.5 acres of land, the county has delayed indefinitely the need for major expansion of the county courthouse.

"I know that this facility alone will provide a huge savings to the taxpayers, the judge said. "To give you an idea of how much we saved, it would take over \$100,000 to install an elevator to the floor of the courthouse."

Although the commissioners have not yet formally taken action on relocating the county tax assessor-collector's office in the old Jasper Federal building, Owens said that the move would be made in the near future.

"We haven't closed on the sale yet so I can't give you a date when the move will be made. We're ready to close now and once that is done, we'll need to go in and condition the building. By that, I mean we'll be making a few minor changes and we'll be checking things over to make sure everything is in good running order."

"I don't feel we'll have to make any major changes to the east of preparing the building for the tax office should be a minor thing," the judge added.

Owens noted that not only does the Jasper Federal building already have a large vault in place, but that each of the old roller windows has its own small safe.

"It is my understanding that the door of the largest vault in the building cost about \$16,000 and the vault itself will be ideal to handle the tax office records," he said.

During last week's RTC auction, Owens said the auctioneers tried to open the bidding at \$100,000 but had no takers until the opening offer was reduced to the \$25,000 level.

Once it came down to \$25,000, the bidding went underway and kept going until a fairly fast pace. We were in fairly

Citizens State Bank announces merger

WOODVILLE — Although the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation has approved a merger between Citizens State Bank of Woodville and First State Bank of Marlin, the combination of the two financial institutions will not take place until Dec. 2 or 3.

We received notification today (Monday) that the FDIC has approved the merger, Citizens State Bank President James E. Hill said. "There is, however, a 30-day waiting period before the merger actually takes place so we're looking at Dec. 2 or 3."

In addition to the green light from the FDIC, Hill said the Texas Department of Banking also must approve the merger agreement before it can take effect.

"We expect to receive the approval from the state fairly soon, as well," Hill said in announcing the FDIC merger approval.

When the merger is consummated, First State Bank of Marlin will operate as a branch of Citizens State Bank of Woodville, with both the Marlin and Woodville locations offering full-service banking.

The resulting bank will have total assets of about \$82 million.

Citizens State Bank was chartered in Woodville in 1920 and has maintained independent ownership since that time. First State Bank of Marlin was chartered in 1909.

Marlin is located 25 miles southeast of Waco and has many characteristics similar to the Woodville area. The town is the Falls County seat as well as the site of a 2,250-bed Texas Department of Criminal Justice prison unit and a Veterans Administration Hospital. Major business segments include agriculture, livestock, dairy and poultry productions.

Both Citizens State Bank and First State Bank are similar in size and specialize in personal services and rural banking needs.

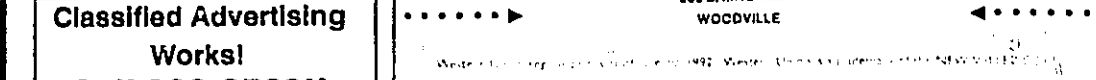
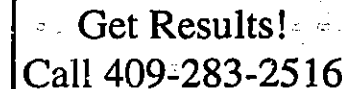
Hill said the bank will promote local, community-involved management and will continue to seek improved services for both areas.

Colmesneil is coached by Mike Lammert while Chester is coached by Don Ellis.

WOODVILLE - Woodville coach Melvin Houston said it before the game. "For some reason we always play Newton well."

Even though Woodville came into the game with only one victory in eight tries, and Newton was ranked in the state polls, Houston's words rang loud and true Friday night. Thanks to another record breaking performance by DeCarlos Maloy, Woodville made a game of it against another state power, this time falling 40-29, in their last home game of the season.

"The team played very well," said Houston after the game. "They did exactly what we wanted them to do, except win."

After being shutdown for the past two weeks by Bona and Stephen F. Austin, Maloy turned on the afterburners once again and rolled his way to 249 yards on the ground and four touchdowns.

Said Houston, "When you've got a good back, you try to get the ball in his hands."

The junior running back got his hands on the ball enough times Friday night to cause Newton a lot of concern. After Newton eased to an 18-2 half-time lead, Maloy and Woodville got back into the game in the third period with a pair of touchdowns from 43 and nine yards out.

In the fourth period, Maloy set sail on a 74 yard kickoff return, and finished out the night with a three yard touchdown with less than a minute to go in the game.

The Woodville runner was the only star of the show though, Newton's Joe Foster also had a 200-yard plus game and scored three touchdowns.

"Our defense held them back," said Houston. "We gave up three easy touchdowns."

Although the Eagles got on the board first with a safety and held a 2-0 first quarter lead, Newton stormed back with three second quarter touchdowns to take an 18-2 lead into halftime.

All three of the Newton scores came at the end of extensive drives, including one of 96 yards that began with a safety. The drive was capped by Eric Williams' 12-yard run.

Woodville had earlier scored a safety thanks to a high snap on a punt attempt that went into the endzone. Newton's punter, instead of taking a chance of a blocked punt deep in his own territory, smartly knelt to one knee and took the safety.

Williams scored Newton's second touchdown on another 12-yard run that came on the heels of a three play, 80-yard drive. The big play was 60-yard bomb from quarterback Joe Russell.

Newton's offense, which is averaging almost 500 yards a game in district play, chalked up over 500 yards against Woodville, including 362 on the ground.

Maloy's 249 yards was the seventh best effort of any player in any class in southeast Texas this season. The Woodville runner already has the number two spot with 394 yards, and has now rushed for over 1,300 yards in nine games.

Foster's 215 yards is his second best of the season. He rushed for 241 against Hardin-Jefferson earlier in the year.

Comparing state ranked Amahuah with Newton, Houston feels that Newton has the better defense, while Amahuah has the better offense.

"If the two play each other, Houston said he felt the game would be a 'toss-up'."

A five year research program, monitoring whitetail deer, conducted at a South Mississippi Game Reserve discovered the following:

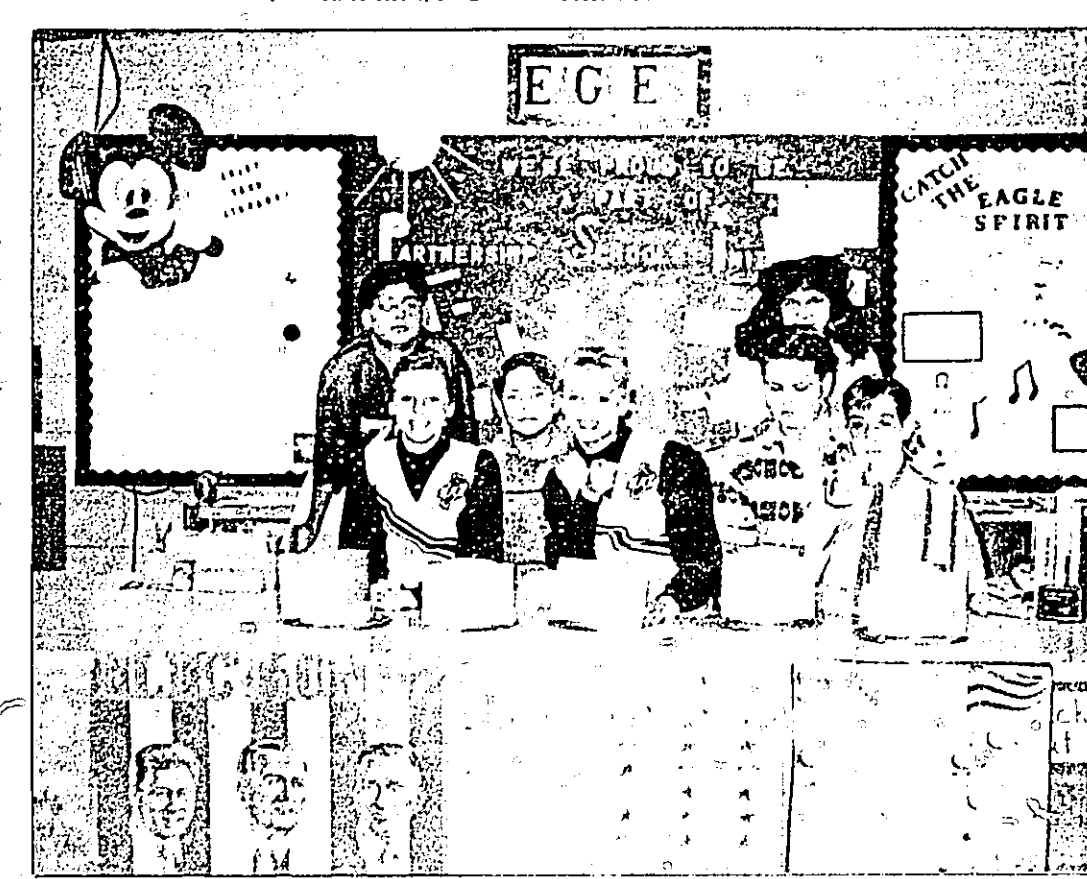
- whitetail deer have an approximate 1-2 mile home range area.

- about 80 percent of whitetail deer in an area are active during the same hours.
- The law says you may not sell any game animal or part of a game animal except for deer antlers and deer hides. It is against the law to use any firearm using rim fire ammunition to kill deer.

Also on Oct. 28, students picked up their voter registration forms for the mock election.

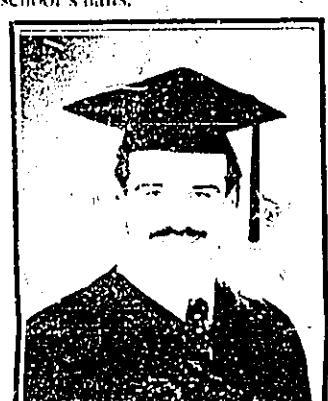
The following day, the candidates presented their material to the sixth, seventh and eighth graders and on Friday, the election was held. Students who presented their registration forms were allowed to vote.

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'My Russian Diary'

Thirty years ago, my father, Lt. Col. Charles W. Hance, Sr., at that time a captain - of the United States Air Force was stationed in Roswell, New Mexico. His mission was to lead a missile crew under his command. He had a key which turned simultaneously with another officers would have been a nuclear warhead across the sky to Russia. During those days a crisis in Cuba elevated the tension level all the way to DEFCON 5 - global thermo-nuclear war. Thank God, it never happened.
I now feel especially thankful, because I have seen first hand victims of nuclear radiation's cruelty. On Sunday afternoon, August 8, 1992, we went to make a heart-rending visit to the hospital where the Chernobyl children were being treated, surely one of the saddest places on earth. I think it only about 120 kilometers from Kiev, where the meltdown occurred. People, especially children, in this vicinity are suffering the effects of fugitive radiation. The first Chernobyl child I saw was a little boy. Full of energy, he came bounding up to the door to have a look at us. His head was bandaged to cover I know how what, and he was very excited about these visitors. The mothers of small children wept as we played for their little ones. I couldn't help asking, "Why not me?" One mother asked that we pray for her nine year old son who had been losing seven kilos a week. I knew he might not live much longer. As much out of concern for comforting the mother as for the boy's soul - I knew this poor child was in God's hands - I took a few minutes with an interpreter to share God's plan of salvation. He said he understood and wanted to give his heart to Christ. We prayed together, and God mixed joy and sorrow. I thought of my Amanda, Sara and Angela as we were leaving and again asked, "Why not me?" I will never forget the children of Chernobyl and their mothers.
Before we left Russia, God had one miracle waiting for us in St. Petersburg. We organized a service at the Museum of the History of Atheism and Religion. I stood up to preach before the gathering of people and told them, "Thirty years ago, my father held a key of destruction in his hand which could have brought devastating destruction and death to our country. Today, instead of missiles of death, I bring you a message of life." Only God could have made such a change happen. After preaching to these people, I gave an invitation to receive Christ as Savior of their lives. As far as we could tell, almost everyone there responded. It was unanimous.
What about you, my readers? Is there really any good reason you would not be willing to give your life to Christ? He can take the power of death and change it to the promise of life.
