## City council opposes treatment center

WOODVILLE — "The Woodville City Council officially registered its opposition at a special meeting Monday, Nov. 23, to the Mary Lee Foundation plan to locate a 30-bed residential treatment center here for youth ranging in age primarily from 5 to 12."

Council's main objection, through a resolution submitted by Councilman Tom Knapp, was the facility's location which is next to a large apartment complex near downtown Woodville and another premise, according to the resolution "that the recreational needs of the children would not be met."

The resolution went further to describe the council's attitude toward the facility by resolving that they, "Will not participate in the soliciting of grants to improve such facility."

Among those voicing opposition to the treatment center during the council's meeting Monday was Marsha Handley, who attended an earlier meeting on the proposed center held Wednesday, Nov. 18 (See related story on Page 1A), where many others voiced their objection to the Mary Lee plan.

Handley, who has a relative living in the apartment complex located next to the center's site, said, "If I cared about 30 children I wouldn't put them on one half acre of concrete...It makes you think it's nothing more than a holding pen for children."

At the council meeting Monday, Councilman Malcolm Radford said,

"We do not want it...and we need to take action...I'm opposed to the city sponsoring funding for them. What about zoning?"

Radford asked City Attorney Harry Stafford the idea of "converse condemnation" in which Radford said, "the people do have something to say."

"I think for the City of Woodville to use extreme action as part of their opposition to this thing," Stafford replied.

Dr. W.S. (Bill) Nichols asked "Are we fighting Sinclair or Mary Lee?"

The question related to the Sinclair family, which donated the property to

## Citizens voice concerns about center

WOODVILLE — In an emotionally charged special meeting held last week, the Woodville City Council met with about 60 local residents to learn how people feel about the arrival of the Mary Lee Foundation and its proposed residential treatment center for troubled, abandoned and neglected children.

The treatment center, which is slated to house 30 children mainly between the ages of 5 and 12, receiving a strong negative reaction from most of those attending the children, mainly due to its location on Nellius Street which one person told council members "everyone objects to."

The 13,000-square-foot building, which is next to the Frank-Mar Apartments and is "cutthroat" across the street from the Woodville United Methodist Church, used to house a funeral home and now is being eyed to assist troubled youth.

And, some people don't like the idea, the Woodville City Council met with about 60 local residents to learn how people feel about the arrival of the Mary Lee Foundation and its proposed residential treatment center for troubled, abandoned and neglected children.

Clemmons said his argument has a lot of retired ladies who, "Are very concerned. I'm for the business, but not for the location."

Paul Walker, who lives about 100 yards from the front door of the planned facility, said he tries to keep a city policeman in the room behind his home for cheap rent, but his 36-year-old mother elected to go into a nursing home when she learned of the project.

"You also have a debt to the older people of Woodville," he said.

Walker also told the council during a special meeting on Monday, Nov. 23,

that he had written a letter to Mrs. Kirby Sinclair, the donor of the property.

"And she called me. She attended Woodville schools in the 1940's and", according to Walker, "developed an illness...went to a sanatorium...then came back to Woodville."

Walker went on to tell the council, "Mrs. Sinclair had a daughter who was physically handicapped and somewhat mentally handicapped, and that the Sinclair family had made several contributions to the (Mary Lee) organization."

"How does she feel about Woodville?" Councilman W.S. (Bill) Nichols asked Walker.

Walker said The Tyler County Booster following the meeting that he had a very nice conversation re-

## Light Up the Square ceremony is Saturday

WOODVILLE — The lighting of more than 61,000 miniature white lights and other holiday decorations at 7 p.m. Saturday will formally usher in the Christmas season in Tyler County.

## E&L permit amendment would up hours, tonnage

WOODVILLE — An application filed by E&L Chipping Co., Inc. to amend its operating permit would allow the Woodville mill to increase its operating hours, its raw material tonnage rates and its airborne waste output, according to documents filed with the Texas Air Control Board.

A number of residents and property owners around the mill, located at Highway 69 South, currently are seeking a public hearing in Woodville to protest the change on the grounds of noise pollution and other associated problems.

According to the permit amendment application filed by E&L Chipping Co. with the TACB on Sept. 15, the company is seeking to amend its current TACB operating permit.

Under its initial permit, which was issued in 1986, the chipping mill was authorized to operate eight hours per day, five days per week and 50 weeks per year. The permit also authorized the company to process 115 tons of hardwood pulpwood per hour and to release up to one pound of particulate waste matter into the air per hour.

If approved, the amendment would authorize the company to increase its operating schedule to a maximum of 20 hours per day, six days per week for 50 weeks per year. This change would triple the total amount of time the chipping mill could be in operation each year, increasing it from the current permit level of 2,000 hours per year up to a maximum of 6,000 hours per year.

E&L Chipping's amendment request also would allow the company to in-

# School funding plan stalled

AUSTIN - Speaker G. B. Lewis says he might be eating Thanksgiving dinner on the Hill this year. The speaker said he must muster 100 votes to pass a constitutional amendment on school finance reform. Lewis adjourned the House last Friday morning stating, "We have some more work to do."

Seeking to comply with a court-imposed deadline, Gov. Ann Richards urged House members to stick with their "FairShare Plan," which by Dec. 15, she said, still needed 140 votes for approval.

Any constitutional amendment must be approved by two-thirds vote in both the House and Senate; the senate easily approved the issue several days earlier.

Rep. Tom Cradick, R-Midland, chairman of the House Republican Caucus, said the increase in Richard's state was outrageous. "She's going to have a look at home before she talks about other people trying to cut. She needs to get rid of some of her staff and get down to where the rest of us are," Cradick said.

However, she said, she does not believe all personnel growth is justified. "It is the opinion of this office that the evidence does not warrant further investigation and criminal prosecution," Cradick said.

Mauro, who was President-elect Bill Clinton's state campaign manager, apologized publicly after an audit showed 1,440 calls were made to political offices by Mauro and his staff. Earle said a review of records showed Mauro has consistently reimbursed the state at a minimum of \$25 per month since 1984 to cover any incidental phone use. Records failed to show a conscious pattern of misuse of state property for political or personal purposes.

Agnes, Black Lawmaker  
State Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, a veteran black lawmaker who wants to ban an Aggie fraternity for inviting a party with a racist theme, found himself in a way of words with the Texas A&M student newspaper.

Wilson said an editorial cartoon depicting him was racist; it depicts Wilson as a small black dog barking at an Aggie's senior boot with a caption: "State Rep. Ron Wilson throws his weight around at Texas A&M."

Wilson said he did not intend to leave university administration to administrators, and save his hot air for those who deserve it.

Wilson called the school president into the fight, and made public an anonymous letter containing the cartoon: "If you want a war, we'll give you one you won't believe," the letter said.

Other Highlights  
A bill filed last week by Rep. Bill Carter, R-Richland Hills, would allow people 21 or older to carry concealed weapons once they passed a mandatory training program and received a state license. 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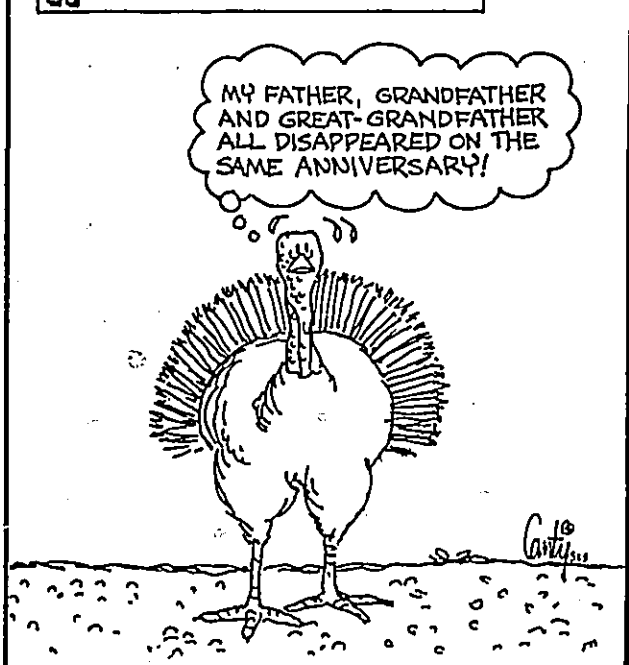

"We want to give you the opportunity to work with us to show compassion for these kids."

"The building here would, after a period of time, handle 30, not 80, children. We will work with children ages 5 to 12. But," she added, "if a child becomes 13 and is doing well, then we don't want to discharge him."

Crump said in response to a question about teenage violence, "I hardly see it appropriate to compare a 6 or 7-year-old child to an adult criminal."

Crump said the children would not be allowed to leave the premises without staff.

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"If a valid point, we want a fenced play area," Crump said, adding that the Mary Lee facility wouldn't fence the kids in. "It would be a serious psychological barrier and they have enough barriers as it is."

The day care center operator asked "What programs do you offer the kids?"

"We have to schedule them 24-hours a day," Lilljedahl said.

Jerry Tolbert said "I don't know that you are going to do what you tell them."

Ann Tolbert said, "That's an awful lot of children in that small building on that small lot. I think we are asking for a kind of a miracle, something controversial, even after it's in place."

Knapp asked the attorney check with the City Attorney to see if the city is willing to take the risk. "I just feel that in the state, that

When an elderly lady answered the door and was asked if she had a problem with the kids across the street, 'Heavens, no, not those children,' she said."

Koel said the group also visited the local police station and said there was an occasional call regarding running the facility.

Crump told the people present, "We want to very seriously address your concerns. We are dealing with abused,

abandoned and neglected children; children that have been removed from their homes. The purpose of the treatment center is to care for children who have been traumatized by a lack of care."

"We want to give you the opportunity to work with us to show compassion for these kids."

"The building here would, after a period of time, handle 30, not 80, children. We will work with children ages 5 to 12. But," she added, "if a child becomes 13 and is doing well, then we don't want to discharge him."

Crump said in response to a question about teenage violence, "I hardly see it appropriate to compare a 6 or 7-year-old child to an adult criminal."

Crump said the children would not be allowed to leave the premises without staff.

"They could run off," she said. "They are young children. In programs that we have now some work in nursing homes. They are basically adored by their neighbors."

WOODVILLE — Through an agreement with a Fredericksburg-based publishing company, The Tyler County Booster will carry a special line of Texas books beginning next week.

The atlas is intricately detailed, but it's readable, too. And it's more than just a book of maps. It shows you picnic grounds, parks where Texas history was made, little area country churches, and the distinctive architecture of this Hill Country community, from the earliest fashions to late limestone houses and barns, including their carefully restored, preserved and maintained interiors, with their attractive state historic landmarks. Price of this book is \$12.95.

There also is a new Braunfels recipe in the book. It is attributed to Mildred R. Knapp and it is for "Leche Quemada," a candy that is made of pecans, margarine, brown sugar, sweetened condensed milk and vanilla.

The 170-page atlas will sell for \$12.95.

The cookbook is by Bob Phillips, the

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## \* E&L seeks increased hours

WOODVILLE — E&L Lumber, a local lumber company, is seeking approval to increase its output of processed hardwood pulpwood up from 115 tons per hour to 220 tons per hour. The amount of air-borne particulate waste which would be allowed to be released would increase from one pound per hour up to a total of 5.53 pounds per hour, according to the TACB document.

The application to amend the operating permit came earlier this year after TACB inspectors found the company in violation of its existing permit during a February inspection. At that time, the air board inspector cited the company for exceeding its operating schedule and raw material usage rate.

In his report, TACB inspector Richard Black noted that company records indicated the chipping mill was normally operating two eight-hour work shifts which began at 6 a.m. and ended at 10 p.m.

"Sometimes the plant was in operation until midnight, or 18 hours total," he wrote. "E and L Lumber also consistently operated six days out of the week according to these records. They sometimes worked less days and sometimes more days. They also have operated more than 50 weeks a year during 1990 and 1991."

The review of these records also revealed that E and L Lumber has exceeded the raw material usage limit of 115 tons per hour. Black added, "In his report, Black noted that the notified E&L President Elvin Lowery of the violations and was asked if the company could change the permit to allow the plant to operate at the increased levels."

All employees of commercial food establishments must have a certificate on file with the city before they can legally begin work.

## City council opposes treatment center

WOODVILLE — The Woodville City Council officially registered its opposition at a special meeting Monday, Nov. 23, to the Mary Lee Foundation plan to locate a 30-bed residential treatment center here for youth ranging in age primarily from 5 to 12.

Among those voicing opposition to the treatment center during the council's meeting Monday was Martha Handley, who attended an earlier meeting on the proposed center held Wednesday, Nov. 18 (See related story on Page 1A), when many there expressed their objection to the facility.

Handley, who has a relative living in the apartment complex located next to the center's site, said, "If I cared about 30 children I wouldn't put them on one-half acre of concrete. It makes you think it's nothing more than a holding pen for children."

At the council meeting Monday, Councilman Malcolm Radford said

"We do not want it, and we need to take action. I'm opposed to the city sponsoring funding for them. What about zoning?"

Radford asked City Attorney Harry Stafford about the idea of "converse condemnation" in which Radford said, "the people do have something to say."

He said for the City of Woodville to oppose to this thing," Stafford replied.

Dr. W.S. (Bill) Nichols asked "Are we fighting Sinclair or Mary Lee?"

The question related to the Sinclair family, which donated the property to

## Citizens voice concerns about center

WOODVILLE — In an emotionally charged special meeting held last week, the Woodville City Council met with about 60 local residents to learn how people feel about the arrival of the Mary Lee Foundation and its proposed residential treatment center for children, abandoned and neglected children.

The treatment center, which is slated to house 30 children mainly between the ages of 5 and 12, receiving a strong negative reaction from most of those attending the children, mainly due to its location on Nellis Street which one person told council members "everyone objects to."

The 13,000-square-foot building, which is next to the Farm-Mar Apartments and is "cutty corner" across the street from the Woodville United Methodist Church, used to house a funeral home business and now is

being eyed to assist troubled youth. And, some people don't like the idea. Apartment complex owner Morris Clemmons told the Mary Lee founder and board chairman, Charlene Crump, and Director Don Lillard, "I am in favor of your organization, but I do object to the location."

Clemmons said his apartment has a lot of retired ladies who, "Are very concerned. I'm for the business, but not for the location."

Paul Walker, who lives about 100 yards from the front door of the planned facility, said he tries to keep a city policeman in the rent house behind his home for cheap rent, but his 16-year-old mother elected to go into a nursing home when she learned of the project.

"You also have a debt to the older people of Woodville," he said.

Walker also told the council during a special meeting on Monday, Nov. 23,

that he had written a letter to Mrs. Kitty Sinclair, the donor of the property.

And she called me. She attended Woodville schools in the 1940's, and, according to Walker, "developed an illness, went to a sanitarium, then came back to Woodville."

Walker went on to tell the council, "Mrs. Sinclair had a daughter who was physically handicapped and somewhat mentally handicapped, and that the Sinclair family had made several contributions to the (Mary Lee) organization."

"How does she feel about Woodville?" Councilman W.S. (Bill) Nichols asked Walker.

Walker told The Tyler County Booster following the meeting that he had a very nice conversation re-

## Light Up the Square ceremony is Saturday

WOODVILLE — The lighting of more than 61,000 miniature white lights and other holiday decorations at 7 p.m. Saturday will formally usher in the Christmas season in Tyler County.

Sponsored by the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, the Christmas in Tyler County light program is now in its second year and a number of new attractions are being added to the light show to enhance the East Texas holiday spirit.

According to Annabeth Willis, who is helping oversee the Christmas project for the chamber, a number of new items are being placed on the concrete slab located on the east side of the Tyler County courthouse.

"Basically, we're adding items to decorate the whole concrete pad area," she said. "We're going to have a Christmas tree on each corner and there will be a nativity scene, a lighted deer and a lighted wagon filled with Christmas packages."

As was the case with the first

Christmas in Tyler County ceremony last year, the courthouse will be outlined with the white lights to give those passing through Woodville on Highways 69 and 190 a spectacular holiday image.

In conjunction with the chamber's "Light Up the Square" effort Saturday, the Tyler County Children's Services Board also will light the traditional "Tree of Lights" which has graced the courthouse lawn during the holiday season for the past seven or eight years.

During the official lighting ceremony, a choir under the direction of Ruth Houston will be performing Christmas carols and a member from the Warren High School band will perform a holiday program.

Chamber President Gene Koci will serve as the master of ceremonies during the event and Tyler County Judge Jerome Owens will welcome the visitors.

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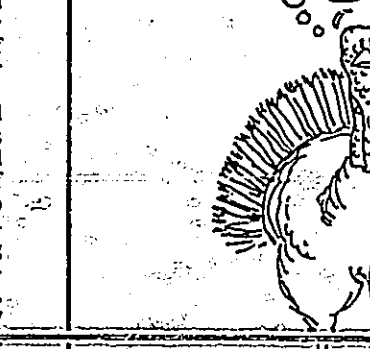

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Texaco school districts, which now spend 23 percent on administration, should cut the figure to 20 percent and use the savings in instruction, said a report by the Education and Economic Policy Center Committee.

Aggie's Black Lawmaker

State Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, a veteran black lawmaker who wants to ban an Aggie fraternity for throwing a party with a racist theme, found himself in a way of words with the Texas A&M student newspaper.

Wilson said an editorial cartoon illustrating him was racist: it depicts Wilson as a small black dog barking at an Aggie's senior hood with a caption: "State Rep. Ron Wilson throws his weight around at Texas A&M."

In accompanying editorial, Wilson said he will not protect staff to begin making cuts. She said some of the additional employees are justified because "this has been a far more difficult time than most."

Richards also said the federal government's investigation into the governor's office more responsibilities. "When they give you a job to do, you have got to have the people to do it," she said.

However, she said, she does not believe all the personnel growth is justified.

### Baptists reject defunding of Baylor University

CORTIS CIRISTI — Messengers to the Baptist General Convention of Texas decisively rejected attempts to defund Baylor University and the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs, overwhelmingly adopting a \$6.7 million basic Cooperative Program budget for 1993. The 107th annual BGCT, which drew more than 6,200 registered messengers to the Bayfront Plaza Convention Center in Corpus Christi, Texas, also rejected Dick Maples, pastor of First Baptist Church, Bryan, Texas, to a second, one-year term as convention president. By a least a two-to-one margin, messengers defeated a motion which would have amended the budget to delete the \$4 million Cooperative Program allocation for Baylor University and divide the funds equally among the other seven Texas Baptist universities. Two years ago, the Baylor board of trustees voted to change the university's charter to create a virtually self-perpetuating governing board of regents. Previously, the university had been governed by a 48-member board of trustees elected by the BGCT. At the 1991 BGCT meeting in Bayou, Texas, a record 11,159 messengers approved a new relationship between the convention and Baylor in which the BGCT allocates 25 percent of each class of Baylor's governing board and Baylor elects the remaining 75 percent, giving "due and careful consideration to the suggestions of the BGCT." Speakers opposing the amendment cited the number of Baylor students preparing for Christian ministry and the university's contributions to Texas Baptist and Southern Baptist life. Supporters of Baylor defunding cited the decreased BGCT representation on the university's governing board. Messengers also turned aside the motion which would have amended the budget to delete a \$65,000 allocation for the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs, the Washington-based, religious liberty watchdog organization. The BJC—which has strongly opposed parochial school vouchers and state-sanctioned public school prayer—was defunded in recent years by the national Southern Baptist Convention.

## Meetings and Events

### Food handler's class offered each month by city

WOODVILLE — To comply with city ordinance governing commercial food handlers, a certification class is conducted each month by Woodville City Health Officer Neva Rae Mieloux. The course is held at 3 p.m. on the second Thursday of each month in the Woodville Fire Station located at the intersection of Pavilion and Village streets. The certification class is \$10 per person and under city ordinance, all commercial food handlers must be re-certified annually. Certificates must be renewed on or before May 31 of each year. Under the ordinance, it is against the law "for any person to prepare, serve or in any way handle food stuffs intended or suited for human consumption or to employ any person in the business of preparing, serving or in any way handling food, eatery and containers used for the handling and serving of food without a Food Handlers Certificate obtained from the City Health Department. All employees of commercial food establishments must have a certificate on file with the city before they can legally begin work. The ordinance also provides that food service establishments which have a manager on duty at all times may be exempt from individual employee certification requirement. Under the ordinance, manager who have a valid Food Service Managers Certificate from the state are not required to attend the local food handlers class and that the employees they supervise also will be exempt. Managers with a valid Food Service Managers Certificate, however, must file a copy of their certification with the city health officer.

## State ranked Overton ousts Chester in area football game

CROCKETT - The Overton Mustangs wasted little time showing that their number five state ranking is no myth during their area championship game against the Chester Yellowjackets Friday night.

Taking advantage of a Chester fumble on the second play of the game, and a miscalculated punt snap the second time Chester had a punt, the Mustangs rolled to a 48-6 win over the Yellowjackets.

When you spot that type of team two touchdowns right off, said Chester coach Don Enis, "you know it's going to be a long night."

The Mustangs took advantage of both Chester mistakes to jump to a 13-0 lead with just under four minutes gone in the first quarter. By halftime Overton extended the lead to 21-0, and by the end of the third period the Mustangs doubled it with a surprising passing attack.

"They threw a lot better than we expected," said Enis. "That's the best we've seen...even better than Deweyville. I felt that was the key to the game."

The Yellowjackets, who came into the game as a 21-point underdog, never could get its offense clicking against the Mustangs. After being held outside the Overton 45 yard line through the first three quarters, Chester finally put together a last ditch effort to get on the scoreboard late in the game.

Curtis Berry rolled in from three

yards out with 30 seconds remaining on the clock to give the Yellowjackets its only score of the night. Chester had driven 63 yards on 11 plays to set up the touchdown, all of it coming on passes from Michael Wallace to Travis Barnes and Bob David.

David was on the receiving end of two passes for a total of 37 yards. One came on a fake punt attempt, while Mustangs were caught between two Mustang defenders.

Meanwhile Chester's running game was shutdown by a swarm of Mustang defense. The Yellowjackets were able to muster just 53 yards on the ground.

"They are the best defensive team we've played," admitted Enis. "They shot the gaps. Their down linemen were very quick."

Overton's Jessie Starling was the main cog in the Mustang running game, scoring two touchdowns on runs of one and 29 yards in the first quarter. But it was the passing of quarterback Chip Hale that did most of the damage to the Chester defense with 223 yards on 10 of 14 attempts.

Hale connected on three touchdown passes in the third period to put the game out of reach. Jason Johnson was on the receiving end of two for 37 and 21 yards. Heath Knox hauled in another for a 47-yard touchdown.

Mustang running back Norris Kelly hit 5-5 speed this way, two more touchdowns for Overton on runs of three and ten yards.

"We just didn't tackle well," said Enis. "We were there, but they would get away from us."

Chester finishes the season with an unusual record of 5-3-3. They were the only county school to make the playoffs.

Overton, now 9-1, will meet Valley View (9-2) in regional play Friday. Valley View defeated Gunter in its area title battle.

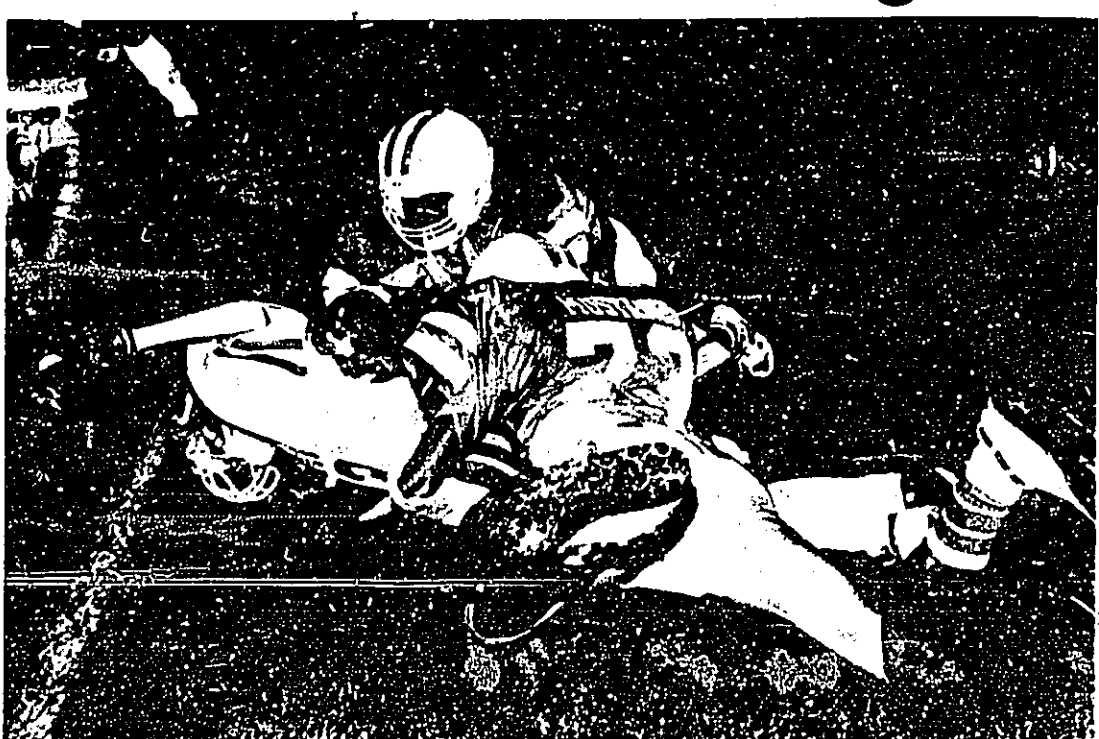

During the board's meeting last week, representatives of the Mary Lee Foundation, which is sponsoring a residential treatment center for abused, abandoned and neglected children, The Home Building Fund, which is sponsoring a new home in March in the old Edwards Funeral Home building located on Woodville Highway 101, and the Woodville Chamber of Commerce, which is sponsoring a new home in March in the old Edwards Funeral Home building located on Woodville Highway 101, were present.

That property, which was been donated to the foundation by Cliff and Kitty Sinclair, will be used to house 30 children who have been abused or neglected, according to Foundation Director Dan Liljedahl.
