





Panic Attack Treatment Guidelines Issued

The National Institute of Mental Health, following a conference of health and scientific experts, has issued broad guidelines for the treatment of panic attacks, a condition that affects up to three million people at some point in their lives. According to a report in The Consultant Pharmacist, these guidelines indicate that (1) panic disorder is a distinct condition for which there are effective drug and nonding treatments, (2) any treatment that fails to produce an effect within 6 to 8 weeks should be reassessed, and (3) persons who experience a panic attack often have one or more mental conditions existing at the time of the attack. Each condition should be treated carefully.

The American Psychiatric Association has established that at least four of the following must be present in at least one of the attacks in order for the condition to be properly classified as a panic attack; shormess of breath, dizziness, accelerated heart rate, trembling, sweating, choking, nausea, a loss of personality, numbness, flushing, chest pain, fear of dying, or fear

Medizines found to be effective in preventing or treating panic attacks include alprazolam, clonxepam, impramine, despramine, nortriptyline, phenelzine and fluovetine. Response to these medicines will vary from individual to individual.





Should rainy weather hit the area during Santa's visit, he will move inside the Wood Fair Opera House across from the courthouse and receive children's wish lists there. In addition to sponsoring Santa's visit, the TCCSB is once again asking local residents to help provide needy children with holiday gifts through

its Tree of Lights program, "It's also time to think of others and their dreams," TCCSB member Betty Reed said, "As in the past, the Tyler County Children's Services Board will have tags on Christmas trees in the local banks. Please take a tag, buy a needy child a present and return it to the bank with the tag on

the outside of the package."

Although the tags will not list the name of the child being helped, it will give the donors information such as the child's sex, age and clothing izes. Panic Attack Treatment Guidelines Issued

The National Institute of Mental Health, following a conference of health and scientific experts, has issued broad guidelines for the treatment of panic attacks, a condition that affects up to three million people at some point in their lives. According to a report in The Consultant Pharmacist these guidelines indicate that (1) panic disorder is a distinct condition for which there are effective drag and nondrug treatments, (2) any treatment that fails to produce an effect within 6 to 8 weeks should be reassessed, and (3) persons who experience a panic attack often his time or more mental conditions existing at the time of the attack. Each condition should be

The American Psychiatric Association has established that at least four of the following must be present in at least one of the attacks in order for the condition to be properly classified as a panic attack; shortness of breath? dizziness, accelerated heart rate, trembling, sweating, choking, nousea, a loss of personality, mumbness, flushing, chest pain, fear of dying, or fear

Medicines found to be effective in preventing or heating panic affacts. include alprazolam, clon.izepam, impramare, despramme, nortripicine. phenelzine and fluovetine. Response to these medicines will vary from individual to individual.


