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State Capital Highlights

Mauro bankruptcy rocks state capitol

AUSTIN — Texas Land Commissioner Gary Mauro rocked the state capitol last week by announcing that he had filed for personal bankruptcy, listing debts of more than \$4 million.

A second Republican Congressman, Jack Fields of Houston, filed as a candidate in the yet-to-be-announced special election to replace U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

Texas Democrats continued urging Gov. Ann Richards to appoint herself as Bentsen's interim successor and run as their party's choice in the election sometime this spring.

Meanwhile, Richards visited with six more men about the senate seat: Congressman John Bryant, Jim Chapman and Mike Andrews; Railroad Commissioner Robert Kerr; former Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle.

However, the governor told reporters she is not close to a decision on Bentsen's successor.

Many Capitol insiders are prone to consider Richards as the inevitable choice, particularly since speculation about Richards as the new senator has been making the Capitol rounds since August, well before the election.

Mauro's Real Estate Services Inc. filed for bankruptcy protection in the 1986 real estate bust for the devaluation of his trust portfolio once worth almost \$10 million.

He said he now has no checking account, his \$77,000 state salary and a home worth more than \$300,000, after spending all other assets to pay creditors.

By filing Chapter 7, Mauro is walking away from payment of the remaining debts.

Mauro to Washington?

Ironically, Mauro manages the state's public lands trusts and the Permanent School Fund; now that his own trust is bankrupt, he is certain to receive heavy bankruptcy publicity if he seeks re-election in 1994.

Mauro, now beginning his 11th year as land commissioner, served as Texas campaign manager for President-elect Bill Clinton, and a protégé of Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

He declined to press for a Washington appointment to a non-profit watchdog group next month and lead a drive for new members, the top aide in his independent presidential campaign has announced.

"The intention is to disseminate information to the public on policy issues and to encourage citizen involvement," said Ray Mulford, general counsel of Perot's campaign.

He said Perot will not try to form a third political party as some supporters have urged.

Perot will be the group's first national chairman, Mulford said.

State Children in Poverty

In one every four Texas children is born into poverty, the state Health Commissioner David Smith said last week, calling for investment in youngsters' well-being.

Smith cited statistics that were part of an annual report by the Children's Defense Fund. The report said that nationally, one in every five children lives in poverty.

Smith said that for black and Hispanic children, the number born into poverty is one out of two. One in every four Texas children has no medical insurance.

Citing figures from other recent studies, Smith said 30 percent of Texas' two-year-olds are fully immunized against childhood diseases, compared to a national average of 60 percent.

He challenged the state to invest in children's health. Childhood immunizations should be made available to all Texas children, Smith said.

That would cost about \$50 million a year in state and federal funds, \$15 million more in state money than the Texas Department of Health's current budget for vaccine and immunizations.

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Views On Dental Health

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GRINDING IN THE NIGHT

An estimated one in 20 adults and three in 20 children unconsciously grind their teeth at night. It is the sound of bruxism. While the noise may disturb spouses or children, it has a far more distressing effect on the sleeper.

Nocturnal grinding can exert thousands of pounds of pressure per square inch on the surfaces of teeth. It can be rough not only on teeth but on the supporting bone, the gums and jaw joint.

For many years, bruxism was attributed to the release of tension from emotional stress. However, many dental authorities today believe that the causes exist in the patient's mouth. Night grinding may be an unconscious effort to correct irregularities of the chewing surfaces of the teeth. Dentist term this a malocclusion. They grind away to eliminate a spot that is too high or to find a comfortable place to fit the upper and lower teeth together.

Quick action by alert bank employees on Jan. 28 foiled robbers at the Bank of East Texas in Chester Tuesday morning and with it, arrested three suspects were released.

The three suspects, each charged with bank robbery, are all from Houston.

According to Tyler County Sheriff Gary Hennigan, an employee at the bank saw the men putting \$500 stacks on after they pulled money from the bank.

Hennigan said that the employees quickly locked the door of the bank and telephoned authorities. As the bank employees waited for help to arrive, the masked suspects, armed

with a .38 revolver stuck in his belt, found the door of the bank locked and quickly fled the scene.

FEBRUARY

A Huntsville man had his pickup truck, camper and \$2,000 in cash seized last week after he was charged with possession of cocaine with intent to distribute.

On Feb. 14, after being pulled over for an expired license plate.

According to Woodville Police Chief Scott Yosko, several individuals wrapped packages of what appears to be cocaine were discovered by officers after the traffic stop. In addition to a set of digital scales and a .41 magnum pistol.

On Feb. 24, District Judge Earl B. "Smack" Stover listened to testimony from opposing attorneys regarding just who has jurisdiction in the case of Dulon versus Colmesneil to the Independent School District.

Colmesneil filed a \$1.2 million lawsuit against the school district two years ago alleging that the school district terminated from the district and that her civil rights were violated in the process. Dulon had been employed as a teacher by the school district in 1981 and rose to be elementary principal before her termination in 1990.

Judge Stover, who had previously ruled that Dulon must exhaust administrative remedies through the Texas Education Agency before seeking the jurisdiction of District Court, listened to a motion asking him to reconsider that ruling.

It was also learned on Feb. 24 that Dulon had filed a federal lawsuit against the Colmesneil ISD in U.S. District Court in Dallas.

In other February news, the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce's Color Tyler County program was scheduled during the last week of the month with the placement of large planters filled with red and white blossoming flowers in the downtown Woodville area.

MARCH

Heavy rains throughout the East Texas region prompted Tyler County Judge Jerome Owens to issue a flood warning for residents along the Neches River in Tyler County.

The rainfall which struck during the opening days of March led to the issuance of the March 2 Sheriff's Office flood warning for residents along the river on March 2 and 3 broadcasting the flood warning over local television stations.

On March 9, after the rising flood water inundated homes in the Mount Neches, Barlow Lake Estates and the Neches River area, the Tyler County Commissioners Court declared a state of disaster.

County Engineers officials at Dam B were forced to increase water discharge to 34,000 cubic feet per second. Anything over 20,000 cfs constitutes a flood.

In other news, five inmates who were involved in the riot at the Gib Lewis Prison Unit in August, 1991 were sentenced to additional prison time on March 4 during District Court sessions.

Officials believed the convictions will have far-reaching consequences in the State's prison system.

The three day trial, which began Monday, ended when the 12-member jury took only 40 minutes to find all five inmates guilty.

The jury deliberated less than two hours on the punishment phase of the trial and handed down two life sentences and two 99-year sentences and one 50-year sentence.

On March 7, Colmesneil school voters defeated a \$545,000 bond election. The bonds were sought to finance renovations and remodeling at the high school, expansion of the cafeteria and auditorium, construction of four new classrooms and a new superintendent's office.

In the March 10 Democratic Party primary election, Tyler County Sheriff Gary Hennigan staved off an attempt by Bob Rawls to unseat him from the county's top law enforcement post.

The incumbent sheriff won by a 2-1 margin while Sandra Harrison defeated Dig Davis for the Tyler County Tax Assessor-Collector nomination. Harrison won 76 percent of the vote to 24 percent for Harrison Tolbert.

Shortly after the primary, Tolbert, who had previously announced plans to retire, submitted his resignation and on March 17 Harrison was sworn in as the tax assessor-collector.

During the week of March 16, Dorman Jackson, Woodville ISD's superintendent since 1984, announced his resignation effective at the end of the school year.

Although Dorman did not immediately announce his future plans, in early May he reported that he had accepted the superintendent's job with the Crockett ISD.

On March 28, a scoring mix-up resulted in a pair of young ladies being named Western Weekend Sweethearts of the 1992 Dogwood Festival activities.

Dawn Childers of Sour Lake was crowned Western Weekend Sweetheart during a Saturday rain storm when Western Weekend director Rusten Chapman reviewed the judges' scores later that day. He discovered that the horseman's picture of the contest had not been weighted properly in the final tally.

When the scores were properly adjusted, Emily Spurluck of Woodville came out on top. Because the crown had already been presented, the festival committee decided to name the two as co-sweethearts.

APRIL

Woodville High School senior Whitney Lambert was crowned Dogwood Queen April 12 at the 49th annual Dogwood Queen coronation and pageant.

Whitney, the daughter of John and Julia Lambert of Woodville, was crowned by Albert Zipp, anchor man for KBTB Channel 12 in Beaumont.

Also on April 8, Tyler County emergency personnel rushed to the scene of a reported plane crash in the Chester area but could not find the aircraft.

The plane, a single engine Cessna, was reported by the Federal Aviation Administration to have "gone down" near Chester.

"The FAA said that the plane was within five mile radius of our tower," said Sheriff Gary Hennigan. "They based their report on the distress signal from the plane's transponder."

Before an air search could be launched, however, the pilot of the plane, Adam Patrick Courville, 23, of Beaumont, contacted the FAA and reported that he had made an emergency landing east of Warren.

Miller rides his way to circuit finals

WOODVILLE — Woodville's Bubba Miller can hardly be accused of switching horses in the middle of a stream. But he is definitely a cowboy who can ride two horses at one time... if not three.

Miller, a 1992 Woodville High School graduate, is in Waco this week competing in the Pro Rodeo Cowboys Association Circuit Finals. The Circuit Finals is limited to the top 15 money winners in each rodeo event.

Miller qualified in bareback.

"There are 10 circuits in the U.S.," explains Miller. "But Texas is the big one to itself."

The Circuit Finals begins Thursday and continues through Sunday, with the top two places qualifying for the National Finals in Colorado.

The local rodeo star, who attends Wharton Junior College on a rodeo scholarship, says that his chances of advancing to the Colorado rodeo are a long shot. The two main reasons are that Miller will go head-to-head against Ty Murray, the three-time All-Around Rodeo Champion and Chuck Lange, two-time World Bareback Champion.

Regardless, Miller, in his first year as a professional, becomes the first

Southeast Texan to qualify for the Circuit Finals since Mark Dishman of Beaumont several years ago. "I feel very fortunate," says the Woodville rider.

Some 60 bareback riders in the state compete for the opportunity of making the Circuit Finals Rodeo in Waco. Cowboys making the most money in each event from December to December each year qualify for the rodeo.

Miller, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Grady Miller of Woodville, only joined the circuit in April and has had to juggle his rodeo time between the riding in professional rodeos and collegiate rodeos.

Because Miller is on scholarship, it is mandatory that he compete on the college circuit. "It's my first priority," he smiles, "but we (Wharton Junior College) only have five rodeos a semester."

For the most part Miller rides in collegiate rodeos and one collegiate rodeo a month and never takes a break unless injured.

Ironically, an injury has kept him sidelined since mid-November, and this weekend's Circuit Final Rodeo will be his first competition in almost

two months.

Miller had to take a break from the rodeo after he was thrown by a bull in Wharton, injuring his head. Although not fully recovered he chose to compete the following weekend at a Stephen F. Austin University rodeo.

On a bareback ride he was tossed around to the extent that a cat-scan later revealed severe swelling of the head.

"The doctor told me if I didn't wait for the swelling to go down, I could die," said Miller. "Because there was no more room for any more swelling."

At that point, Linda Miller, Bubba's mother, stepped in and put a halt to any more rodeo notions until now.

The injury also hampered him in his quest to advance to the National Collegiate Rodeo Finals in Bozeman, Montana in June. Prior to his injury he was first in his region in all-around and bareback, and second in bulls. Since missing several rodeos, he has dropped to second in both all-around and bareback and third in bulls. The top two places in each event in region advance to nationals.

The threat of injury is all part of being a rodeo performer, says Miller, who gets paid both on the college and pro rodeo circuit.

Unlike many college sports, rodeo competitors are paid for winning in college rodeos just like pro rodeos.

Miller took home \$750 in one Wharton college rodeo after finishing first in bull riding and second in bareback riding.

College rodeo participants at Wharton are required, though, to pay their own entry fees. Most collegiate rodeos charge \$60 for the first event and \$40 each for the rest.

By comparison, Miller made \$500 at a pro rodeo in Mesquite where the entry fee was \$40. His prize money was for a first place finish in bareback.

Although the money might look attractive, there are more cowboys who lose money on the circuit than those

who win, especially when taking into consideration travel expenses.

Miller's pro rodeo travels have taken him to Ft. Worth, Carthage, Jacksonville, Mesquite, Lufkin, Beaumont, Jasper and a dozen other cities where he competes only in bulls and bareback.

On the college scene he competes in rodeos at San Houston, McNeese, Hill Junior College in Hillsboro, Stephen F. Austin, Texas A&M, and others while competing in bulls, bareback, saddle bronc and calf roping.

While riding two rodeo circuits would be enough for most any competitor, Miller still finds enough time and energy to carry a "B" average at Wharton while majoring in electronic engineering.

As for other college athletic programs, rodeo participants must maintain a "C" average to compete. "If I don't make my grades, I lose my scholarship," says Miller.

Miller chose Wharton Junior College over several other schools after advancing to the Texas High School Rodeo Finals and the National High School Rodeo Finals in May. He is still being recruited by San Houston, McNeese, and Hill Junior College due to signing a one year scholarship at Wharton.

Thanks to Miller, Wharton is second in team standings in the region behind Hill Junior College. The top two teams advance to the Collegiate National Finals Rodeo.

Miller scored 190 of Wharton's 250 points at San Houston and 205 of Wharton's 260 points at Wharton in two full rodeos.

What will it take to keep Miller at Wharton?

"Right now I have to buy my own meals," admits the Woodville rider. "It sure would be nice to have that taken care of."

Meanwhile he is eating pretty well on the rodeo circuit. At least he will be able to buy a steak or two at the Circuit Finals in Waco this weekend.

Spurger's Bobby Simmons sets a state best scoring record with his 47th shot in a game against High Island. The Pirates set a district record in 14 games in leading the Pirates to a 12-2 record. Before the season finishes he swipes five more to move his total to 52.

Nine county athletes qualify for the state track meet, including four from Woodville, four from Colmesneil, and one from Warren.

Led by Woodville's Bubba Miller, four Tyler County rodeo participants qualify for the State High School Rodeo to be held in Abilene in June. Miller, along with Woodville's Emily Spurlock, Chester's Lori Rawls and Tommy Neal of Warren, places in the top six in the regional rodeo competition.

Meunwhile Warren's Danny Kier earns a berth in the National Finals of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association while competing for Northeast Texas College in Mt. Pleasant.

Woodville, Chester and Spurger capture district basketball championships. Woodville finishes with 10-3 district record, while Chester sports a 9-1 record, and Spurger a 5-1 mark.

Dogwood Hills Country Club opens under the auspices of Tyler County Golf Association. Hundreds of golfers and swimmers converge during grand opening over the Memorial Day weekend.

Woodville girls take second place in team standings at state track meet in Austin. Stefanie Williams, Lynette Harris, Kiki Lewis and Natalie Hackett earn a gold medal, 48.4 clocking in the 400 meter relay and a 1-43.2 gold medal performance in the 800 meter relay. Colmesneil's Sue Simon takes third place finish in the 400 meter dash.

Woodville coach Brent Belschner is named Coach of the Year while five of his team are selected to all-district. Derrick Heintgen, Jacob Wooten, Billy Gazzaway and Gary Weaver are named to the first team, while defensive standout John Greenwald is named to second team.

Throughout the year, something was
always happening which impacted the
lives of the people of Tyler County.
Her is a review of just some of those
stories.

JANUARY
In a story which appeared in the Jan.
1 edition, it was reported that two
people were slain and two more were
injured during a shooting inside a
crowded Wood Fair Open House on
the courthouse square in Woodville
on the night of Dec. 27.

Troy Bernatt, 15, and Floyd,
Samuel Brown, 22, both of Woodville
and both shot in the chest, died at

the scene while his wife, Melba
Gravener, 67, was admitted to the
hospital in "serious but stable" con-
dition on the night of the accident. She
was subsequently discharged on Mon-
day, Dec. 28, according to hospital
authorities.

Funeral services for Gravener will
be held at 2 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 27,
at the Turner Branch Cemetery, also in Spurger.

Jensen is a neighborhood friend of
the Gravener family and was a pas-
senger in the Gravener vehicle at the
time of the mishap.

The independently owned log haul-
ing truck was driven by Billy Ray
Miller of Colmesneil, and was deliv-
ering the Louisiana Pacific logs from

the First Baptist Church in Spurger.
Burial followed in the Turner Branch
Cemetery, also in Spurger.

According to Department of Public
Safety Trooper Stuart Summerlin, the
accident occurred at around 3:30 p.m.
on Highway 92 in front of the Spurger
Post office.

DPS reports indicated the Gravener
vehicle failed to yield right-of-way
into on-coming northbound traffic on
Highway 92.

Bystanders say the first noise that
was heard was the truck's horn blow-
ing, then the impact into the 1985
four-door Pontiac driven by
Gravener. The vehicles then slid
approximately 75 yards from the point
of impact at the south east corner of the
Spurger Mercantile store where they
came to rest. The bottom one-third of
the pole was severed leaving the driver
of the truck trapped in the up ended
cab for about an hour until he was
released by a Woodville Volunteer
Fire Department Jaws of Life Team.
The log truck slung its cargo ap-
proximately 75 yards from the point
of impact at the telephone pole. And,
bystanders said "it sounded like a bomb
when they hit."

Fire damages
TCAD offices

WOODVILLE — A relatively minor
Christmas Eve fire at the Tyler County
Appraisal District headquarters on
West Bluff Street in Woodville came
back to haunt that establishment early
Tuesday morning by re-igniting in the
attic area near where the original fire
occurred.

According to Chief Appraiser Linda
Lewis, the original fire, believed to
have been caused by electrical prob-
lems, occurred over her office and
involved mainly attic space and an
area over an adjacent lounge area.

The fire Tuesday was more involved
and spread quickly into a major por-
tion of the building. A newly added ex-
tension on the rear of the building was
spared, according to employees, due
to a fire wall in the attic.

Lewis said an electrician was called
to make what was considered by her
as "temporary repairs."

"We were supposed to get insurance
bids today so we could start perma-
nent repairs needed," she said Tues-
day morning.

Firemen worked quickly to preserve
the paper records and what equipment
including mapping and personal com-
puters. Tapes were placed over the file
cabinets to prevent water damage from
the fire. Lewis said the records were kept
on a tape backup and in the vault at the
bank.

Although Tyler County Judge
Jerome Owens worked to expedite the
deed closure of the recently acquired
Jasper Federal Savings and Loan
Building so the appraisal district em-
ployees would have a place to work
while their building is under repair,
the destruction of the property could
not be finalized in time to reopen the
appraisal district office by next week.

Lewis announced late Tuesday that
the TCAD office would be tempo-
rarily relocated to 307 West Bluff in
the building which previously housed
the Taco Bob's restaurant and the old
Peanut Factory.

"We will be open for business there
beginning Monday," Lewis said.

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MARCH

Heavy rains throughout the East Texas region prompted Tyler County Judge James Owens to issue a flood warning for residents along the Neches River in Tyler County.

The rainfall which struck during the opening days of March led the judge to issue the warning March 2. Sheriff's deputies drove into flood-prone areas and issued warnings to residents to evacuate.

On March 9, after the rising flood water inundated homes in the Neches, Barlow Lake Estates and Sheffield's Ferry subdivisions, the Tyler County Commissioners Court declared a state of disaster.

Corps of Engineers officials at Dumb B were forced to increase the discharge to 34,000 cubic feet per second. Anything over 20,000 cfs constitutes a flood.

In other news, five inmates who were involved in the riot at the GIB Lewis Prison Unit in August, 1991 were sentenced to life in prison after jury took only 40 minutes to find all five inmates guilty.

The jury deliberated less than two hours on the punishment for the trial and handed down two life sentences, two 99-year sentences and one 50-year sentence.

On March 7, Colmesneil school voters defeated a \$545,000 bond election. The bonds were sought to finance renovations and remodeling of the high school, expansion of the cafeteria and auditorium, construction of four new classrooms and a new superintendent's office.

Harrison won 76 percent of the vote to fill the post held by Barbara Tolbert.

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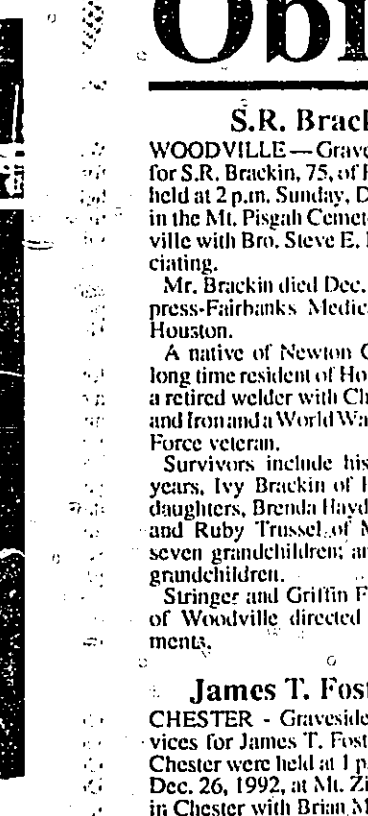
