Police seek assistance in search for burglars

Safe destroyed, \$1,100 taken from city hall

WOODVILLE — Police are asking area residents for information that will help them track down and arrest burglars who have been targeting the Woodville City Hall and David Davis's wrecker yard in recent weeks.

Police are asking anyone who might have information about these burglaries to give us a call. Police Chief Scott Yosko said Monday.

"They may have seen some suspicious hanging around the city hall or the wrecker yard or they may have had someone approach them about buying something that matches one of the things stolen during these crimes," he said.

The chief added that the department also is asking area residents to call with information about a series of break-ins reported at the Davis wrecker yard.

The yard has been burglarized three times over the last month — the last incident occurred on Saturday, Jan. 9. In all three cases, thieves broke into trucks and removed radios, amplifiers and speakers.

Yosko said that while the city hall break-ins are believed to have been committed by one or more adults, it appears that the series of wrecker yard burglaries are being committed by youngsters.

Police also are currently investigating a break-in reported at the Bamberg Plumbing during which a small air compressor was reported stolen.

Fire department eyes rescue equipment

WOODVILLE — Although the formal purchase was tabled Monday to give Woodville fire officials a chance to review the prices, the Woodville City Council opened bids Monday on new Jaws of Life rescue equipment for the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department.

Prices listed in the three bid packages ranged from \$113,000 up to over \$15,000.

Fire Chief Alva Cook told council members Monday night that the equipment, which will be paid for from funds raised by the local fire fighters, would be used to expand the department's rescue capability.

"Our existing equipment is now 14 years old," he said. "It still in good shape but we would like to purchase a new set and send in the old one to be reconditioned."

The Jaws of Life equipment is used primarily at traffic accident sites to pry apart metal to free people trapped in smashed and twisted automobiles and trucks. Cook noted that once the department's existing Jaws set is rebuilt, they plan to keep it in operation.

"The bottom line is we'll have two trucks equipped with rescue equipment rather than one," he said. "We are receiving more and more rescue calls so we feel that having two sets of rescue equipment on hand will be needed. We've already answered two rescue calls so far this year."

Cook noted that the money that will be used to purchase the second Jaws set was raised by fire fighters who "sold an awful lot of hamburgers."

He added that the fire department has not spent much money in recent years on new equipment, but he told the council that situation was changing.

"In addition to the Jaws equipment, Cook said the fire fighters have already approved plans to purchase a new one-ton truck to replace an existing 3/4-ton pickup.

"We've also initiated a team to look into the purchase of a tank truck," he said, adding that the department plans to submit an application to the T.L.L. Temple Foundation seeking a matching grant to help pay for the tanker, which carries an estimated price tag of \$70,000 to \$80,000.

Although agreeing to table action on the Jaws purchase, the council agreed to call a special meeting to vote on the matter sometime later this week or next.

Commissioners open bids during abbreviated meeting

WOODVILLE — Bids on sheriff's department cars, computer equipment and a dump truck were among the new items opened Monday during a brief meeting of the Tyler County Commissioners' Court.

With only three commissioners present for the 45 minute session, almost all of the bids opened were tabled until a special meeting scheduled for 8:30 a.m. Friday.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Jerry Mahan, who resided Monday in the absence of County Judge Jerome Owens, announced that the commissioners had meetings set up with the county state representative and senator in Austin Monday afternoon and were forced to cut short the Monday meeting.

Among the only bids items acted upon Monday was for the purchase of three patrol cars for the Tyler County Sheriff's Department. Accepting the recommendation from Sheriff Gary Hennings, the court accepted the bid from Knapp Ford of Woodville to purchase three new patrol cars at a price of \$11,983 each or a total of \$35,949.

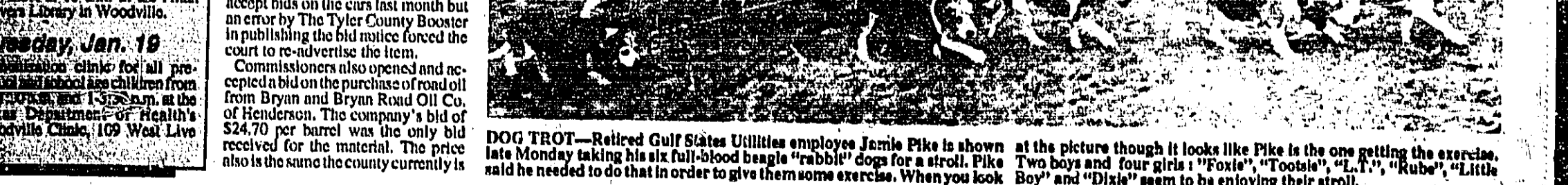
The court had been scheduled to accept bids on the cars last month but an error by the Tyler County Booster in publishing the bid number led the court to re-advertise the item.

Commissioners also opened and accepted a bid on the purchase of road oil from Bryan and Bryan Road Oil Co. of Henderson. The company's bid of \$24.70 per barrel was the only bid received for the material. The price also is the same the county currently is paying.

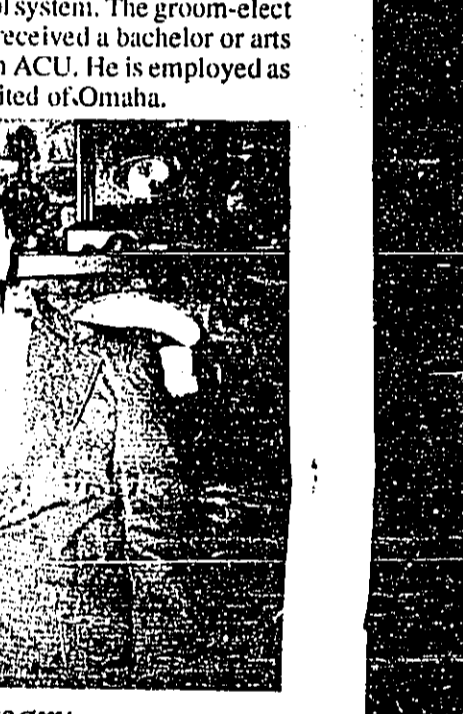

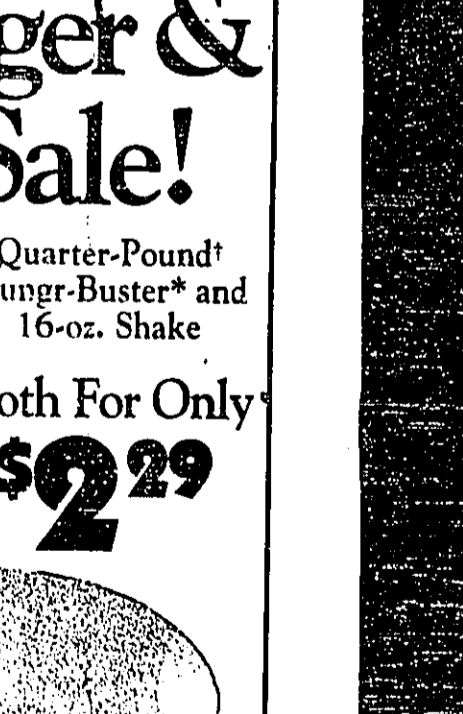

Becky Jinnette of the Dogwood Festival Committee came before the council to ask for help to cover the costs of the Porta Potty service.

"During the last three to four years, we provided the Porta Potties but our costs for the overall festival are going up while our income is not going up. This year we are asking if the city could use some of its hotel/motel tax money to defray half of the cost of the Porta Potties."

Jinnette explained that the total cost for the toilet would be \$500 for 10 units for both the Queen and the Western weekends of the festival. The cost includes servicing the units.

Although the council was not immediately sure if there was \$250 in unallocated hotel/motel tax money in the 1993 budget, they agreed that they could come up with the money somewhere in the spending plan.

"I also like to put a challenge to the county to meet the city in this," Mayor Billie Rose told Jinnette. "This may get the entire cost of this covered for you. After all, the Dogwood Festival brings in a lot of money into both the city and county so I believe that if the city of Woodville can find \$250, the county could find a like amount."

In related action, the council voted to close Charlton and Wheat streets in downtown Woodville during the Dogwood Festival weekends. This year, the festival opens with Queen's Weekend on March 19-20 and will be followed by Western Weekend on March 26-27. The final weekend of the festival will fall on April 2-3.

Other action of the council also:

- Approved plan to extend a city water line into a new section of the Forest Lakes subdivision. Col. J.C. Nichols, the subdivision's developer, noted that while the development is outside the city, he was requesting that an additional 1,200-foot of three-inch water line be installed to serve a portable plant at a cost of about \$300.
- Agreed to advertise for bids on a chopper service to handle yard refuse such as tree limbs. Shaw noted that the city is currently investigating the purchase of a fire proof file cabinet at a cost of about \$1,400 and a smaller, used safe at a cost of about \$100.

Under the plan, Nichols would pay for the pipe and other materials and the city would install the line. Last year, the city changed its policy regarding work outside the city limits to allow that developers also pay for the cost of labor in installing water lines. However, the council agreed to waive those charges in recognition of Nichols' donation of right-of-way to the city for the sewage line which now serves the Gib Lewis Prison Unit just outside of Woodville.

"Right now we're answering rescue calls on a county-wide basis. No other fire department in the county has this equipment because not too many departments can afford it," the fire chief added.
When asked by Councilman Larry Phillips is the fire department ever receives any financial compensation from insurance companies or individuals for department's existing Jaws set is rebuilt, they plan to keep it in operation.

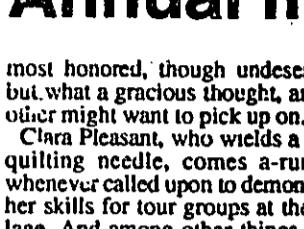

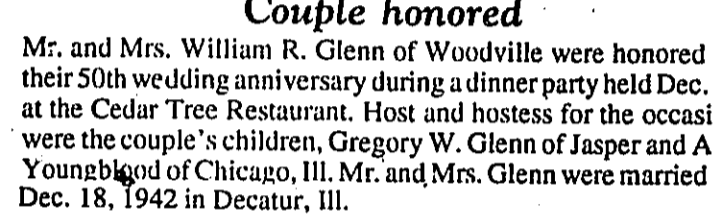

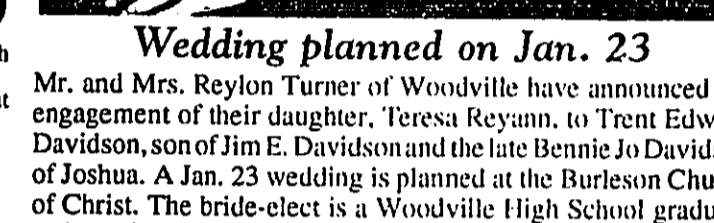

Dogwood 'Porta Potties' In other business Monday night, the council agreed to spend \$250 to cover half of the cost of renting 10 portable toilets to be located throughout downtown Woodville during the 1993 Dogwood Festival.

Becky Jimette of the Dogwood Festival Committee came before the council to ask for help to cover the costs of the Porta Potty service.

"During the last three to four years, we provided the Porta Potties but our costs for the overall festival are going up while our income is not going up. This year we are asking if the city could use some of its hotel/motel tax money to defray half of the cost of the Porta Potties."

Jimette explained that the total cost for the toilet would be \$500 for 10 units for both the Queen's and the Western weekends of the festival. The cost includes servicing the units.

Although the council was not immediately sure if there was \$250 in unallocated hotel/motel tax money in the 1993 budget, they agreed that they could come up with the money somewhere in the spending plan.

"I'd also like to put a challenge to the county to match the city in this," Mayor Billie Rose told Jimette. "This may get the entire cost of this covered for you. After all, the Dogwood Festival brings in a lot of money into both the city and county so I believe that if the City of Woodville can find \$250, the county could find a like amount."

In related action, the council voted to close Charleston and Wheat streets in downtown Woodville during the Dogwood Festival weekends. This year, the festival opens with Queen's Weekend on March 19-20 and will be followed by Western Weekend on March 26-27. The final weekend of the festival will fall on April 2-3.

Other action During the meeting, the council also approved a plan to extend a city water line into a new section of the Forest Lakes subdivision. Col. J.C. Nichols, the subdivision's developer, noted that while the development is outside the city, he was requesting that an additional 1,200-feet of three-inch water line be installed to serve a new section of the development.

Under the plan, Nichols would pay for the pipe and other materials and city crews would install the line. Last year, the city changed its policy regarding work outside the city limits to ask that developers also pay for the cost of labor in installing water lines. However, the council agreed to waive those charges in recognition of Nichols' donation of right-of-way to the city for the sewer line which now serves the Gib Lewis Prison Unit just outside of Woodville.

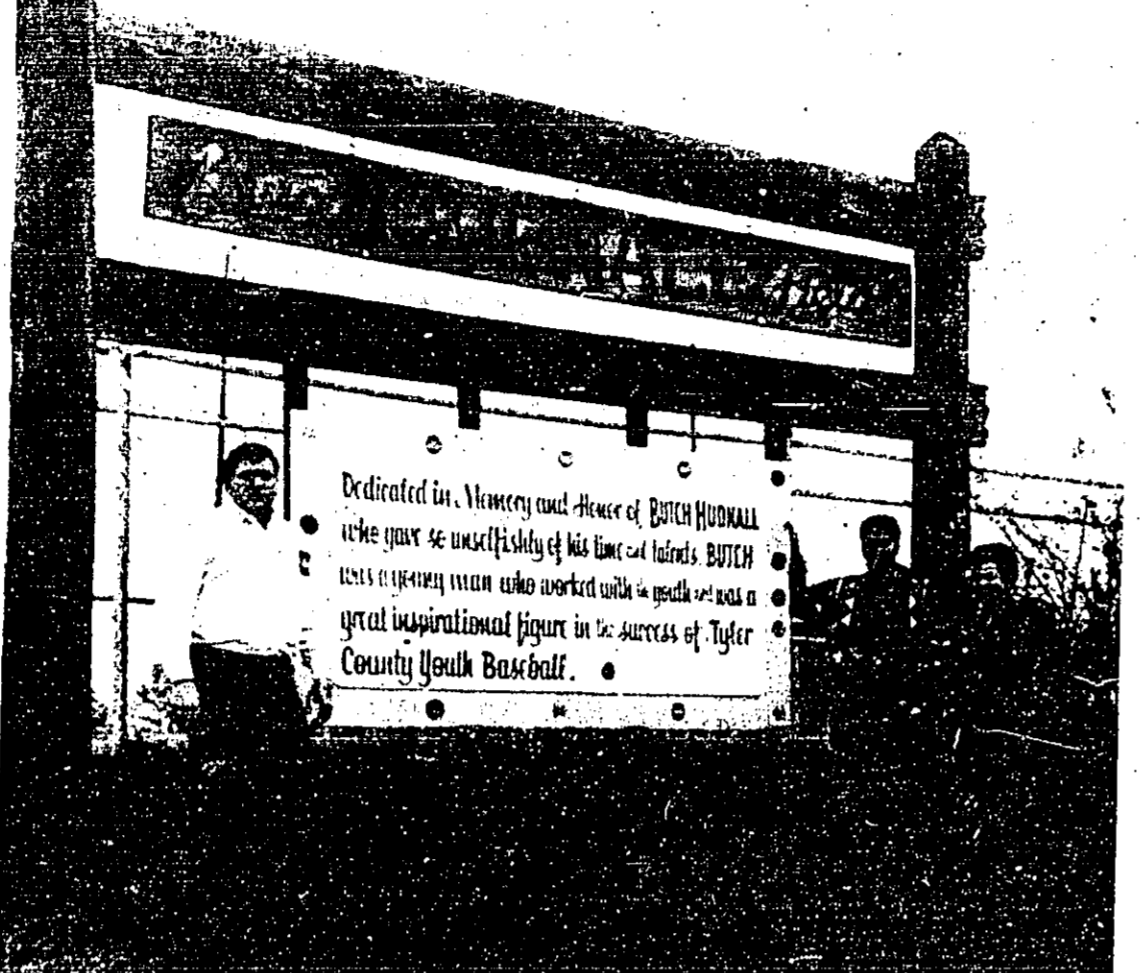
