## Funding for shelter studied by county

-Commissioners eye financial support for women's and children's shelter-

WOODVILLE — Although no formal action was taken Friday, Tyler County Commissioners gave tentative approval to providing some type of financial assistance to the Women and Children's Shelter of Southeast Texas. Leslie Peavler appeared before the commissioners court during a special meeting Friday to request a modest amount of aid from the county to help cover the Woodville Outreach Center's monthly utility and/or telephone bill.

"We're growing by leaps and bounds," Peavler told the commissioners. "We've seen 75 people in the last seven months and I'd say about 75 percent of that number are from the Fred-Warren-Spurger area of the county."

Peavler noted that the local outreach center is primarily designed to assist women and children who have been forced out of their homes due to physical and/or mental abuse. The center attempts to find housing as well as meet needs for food, clothing and counseling for those requiring help.

"We're asking if the court could see its way to help us in some way, maybe with the utilities or the telephone," she said, adding that the center's monthly utility bill runs around \$100 while the telephone costs between \$100 and \$150 per month on average.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Jerry Mahan, who was presiding Friday in the absence of County Judge Jerome Owens, praised Peavler and shelter's other volunteers for their work. He noted that while it might be possible for the county to provide some funding for the center, he added that it would take some time for officials to determine how much aid could be given and from which



When, in response to questioning from Mahan, Peavler told the commissioners that the local center was in immediate need of some funding to pay its bills, the commissioners and other officials and visitors in the audience could be given and from which

WOODVILLE — Tyler County's unemployment rate once again topped the 5 percent mark, rising to 8.5 percent during November.

According to figures released by the Texas Employment Commission, the November rate — the latest currently available — soared by 1.1 percent over October's 7.2 percent level.

While the November 8.5 percent jobless rate also is higher than August's 6.8 and September's 7.7 percent levels, it is still well below the record three-year high of 9.4 percent recorded in January 1992.

The latest figure also is 2.5 percent higher than the 6 percent unemployment rate recorded in November, 1991.

The new 8.5 percent figure translates to mean that out of an estimated labor force of 7,642, a total of 634 county residents were unemployed and looking for work during November.

Prior to November's rate increase, the local jobless picture had been improving each month since January's high with the exception of June and September. In June the unemployment rate jumped by .5 percent, rising from May's 7.8 percent mark to 8.3 percent while September's 7.2 percent rate represented a .9 percent increase over August.

In releasing the latest figures for Tyler County, TEC Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers noted that the state's unemployment situation also was having problems during November.

"The supply of jobs in Texas cannot keep up with demand, and that imbalance has pushed the state's unemployment rate even higher this time when we had hoped unemployment would go down," Nabers said.

November's 8.5 percent jobless rate was 7.7 percent, up .9 percent from October's 6.8 percent rate as well as from November 1991's rate of 6.8 percent.

Texas has 167,600 more people trying to find work this year compared to November, 1991, Nabers said.

"It appears that based on reports of an economic recovery, more Texans and others who have migrated to the state have entered the job market. That has driven the rate up again," Nabers said. "The problem is that as more

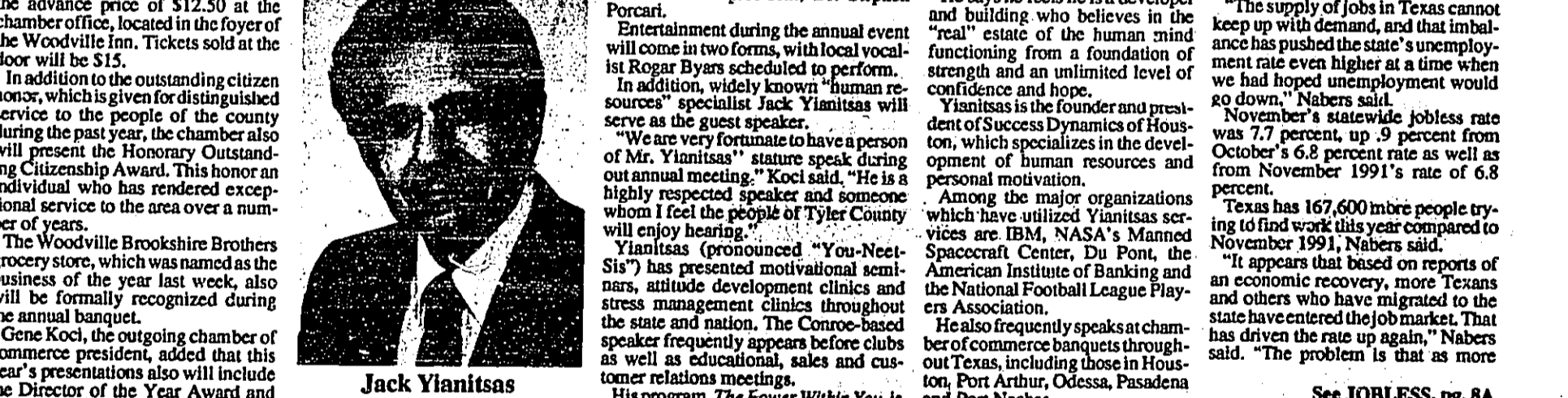

## Medicare's general enrollment period continued through March

LUFKIN — Most East Texas age 65 or over are enrolled in Medicare. Nationwide there are over 30 million covered under this Federal Health Insurance plan - a program which assists in the payment of hospital and medical expenses.

By far the majority of Medicare beneficiaries became entitled at age 65 - the age specified in the original law passed by Congress in 1965. In 1973 the law was modified to include disabled Social Security beneficiaries. Also covered were workers and their eligible dependents with chronic kidney disease.

The hospital part (Part A) of Medicare is paid for by the worker as a portion of Social Security taxes. Thus there are no premiums to pay when entitled to benefits. The medical part (Part B) is not financed from Social Security taxes, but rather from a combination of beneficiary premiums and general revenue contributions. The Government pays three-fourths of the total cost. The beneficiaries' basic premium for 1993 will be \$36.00 per month, up from \$31.80 in 1992.

Some people fail to sign up for Part B (medical) or drop it after becoming entitled. Each year from January through March there is a general enrollment period (GEP) for those who missed their first opportunity to enroll and for those who dropped out of enrollment. Those who wish to enroll in the 1993 general enrollment period must enroll by the end of March. Coverage for those who enroll during the GEP does not begin until the following July 1.

For most retired people past age 65 who did not enroll at age 65, or who dropped coverage, the GEP is the only means to become entitled. There are, however, special enrollment rules for workers over age 65 who are covered by an employer's health insurance plan, for those with chronic kidney disease and for disabled beneficiaries whose entitlement to benefits has been terminated and later reinstated.

Generally, a person who signs up during a General Enrollment Period (GEP) may expect to pay a higher premium. The premium is increased by ten percent for each full year a person could have had coverage but did not. Exceptions include those who have employer health insurance beyond age 65, but they must enroll within a specified period after employer coverage ends.

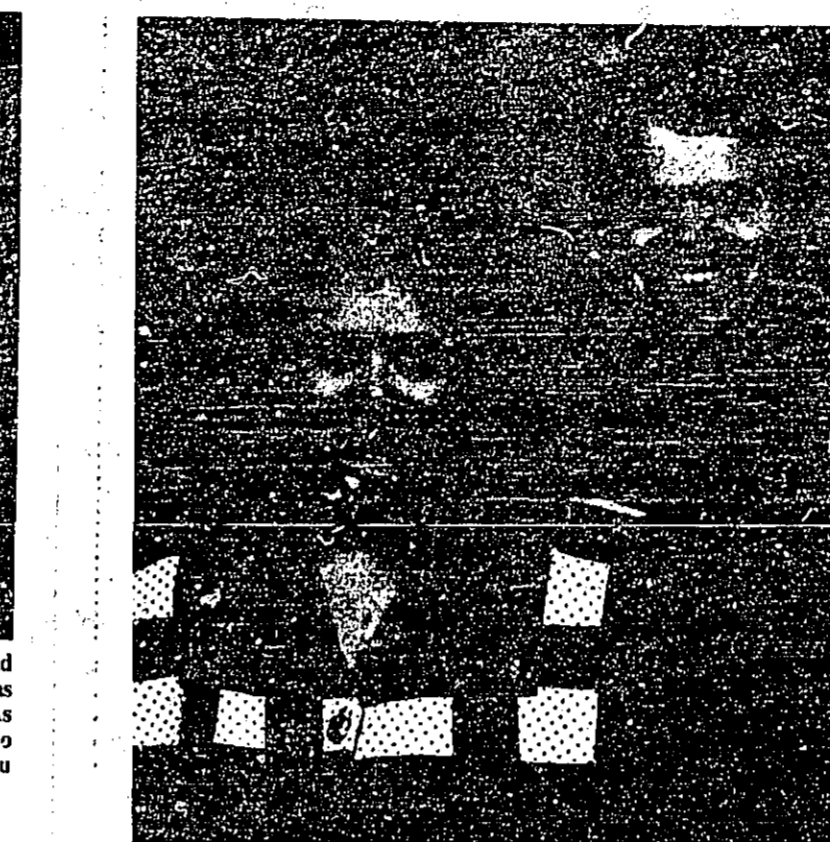

## Jews for Jesus coming to Woodville

WOODVILLE — The Jews for Jesus traveling evangelistic team, "The Liberated Walling Wall" will be coming to Woodville on Wednesday, Jan. 27. They will be presenting a program of music and testimony at First Baptist Church, 202 S. Canton, at 6:45 p.m.

Jews for Jesus have been singing their songs for almost two decades. Back in 1968, a group of Jewish Christians decided they wanted to sing the Gospel not with a more familiar sound to them than the standard brand of church music. They were lonely for their "own" sound. They wanted music with a harmony and rhythm that could blend their Jewish cultural experience with a message.

Their message proclaims Jesus as Messiah, which as Jews for Jesus leader Moishe Rosen puts it, "is all too often considered to be outside the realm of Jewish thought." The music has been combined with the message to create a cultural religious experience that is unique and written word to get the point across — and all with a distinctly Jewish accent.

Jews for Jesus are communicators. They see themselves as ambassadors as well, promoting understanding and reconciliation among Christians and Jews. The Liberated Walling Wall fills this role in a unique way. Woven into their music program are short personal testimonies of how various ones in the group have come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah. Their backgrounds are diverse.

Jonathan Sacks, who plays cello, has been a believer in Jesus since 1972. Prior to joining the team he worked as a certified public accountant and an attorney. Jonathan composes Jewish gospel music as well as performing it; one of his songs was recorded on the Liberated Walling Wall's most recent release, "He Will Return."

Susie Mendelsohn, also Jewish, has been a believer in Jesus since 1979. She has a bachelor of music and music education degree from the State University of New York at Potsdam. Prior to joining the Liberated Walling Wall, she lived in Texas, where she enjoyed participating in the Dallas Symphony chorus as well as singing professionally. She plays piano, guitar and violin.

Ruth Meadows is the daughter of a pastor who also happens to be a Jewish believer in Jesus — and Ruth has been a believer in Jesus since she was four years old. Her family often hosted traveling Jews for Jesus teams as well as growing up. Ruth studied music and psychology at Wheaton College. She sings alto, and plays cello and piano.

John Morgenstern is a twenty year old Jewish believer in Jesus from Fresno, California. Like Ruth, he has been acquainted with the Jews for Jesus ministry for many years, having grown up in a Jewish home and holding. John sings tenor, and plays saxophone, guitar and percussion; he has played in church orchestras and has sung in chamber choir.

enough to make it so. And the fact that the bulk of the Jewish community says that he isn't is not enough to make it not so. Our job is to get out and let our people know that the issue is too important to be ignored. Our hope is that people will care enough to look into the Scriptures for themselves and ask God to show them the truth about Jesus."

Different as each team member is, they share a common commitment to tell other Jewish people about Jesus. According to the Jews for Jesus, many Jewish people have misconceptions of what it means to be a Christian, and many Christians have misconceptions of what it means to be a Jew.

Team members feel that the message is the most important part of the Liberated Walling Wall's music. Their philosophy is: "Whether you're Jewish or a gentile, we hope that our message is going to help you understand. If you're Jewish, it'll give you insight into Christian thinking, and if you're not, you'll learn about Jewish things."

Susie Mendelsohn adds, "The music helps you to feel, the lyrics make you think. When you start thinking and feeling at the same time, what happens? You understand. Or at least, you begin to. We want people to understand how Jewishness and the gospel fit together."

shut down by a Woodville zone which stopped Hardin-Jefferson's inside play.

ence dipped into their wallets to come up with contributions.

"I'd be very surprised if we couldn't come up with \$200 to help you before you leave the courthouse today," Mahan said. In fact, donations raised in the commissioners courtroom reached \$197 while contributions received following the meeting in other county offices quickly brought the total to about \$250.

During the meeting, Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace Wanda Brasher told the commissioners that she refers a number of people who she sees to the local shelter for support.

"They do a great job," she said. "If

they just took care of the ones I send down to them, they'd stay extremely busy," Brasher added.

Mahan noted that many Tyler County residents have opened their hearts and pocketbooks to help those in need around the world, but added that it might be time to also consider helping those closer to home.

"I'm not advocating forgetting our responsibilities around the world," he said, "but we need to take care of the needs here in Tyler County as well."

Computer purchases

In other business during Friday's special meeting, the commissioners accepted a bid from K-S-M Data Systems of Groves on the purchase of

nine personal computers, three laser printers, six regular printers and modems. Cost of the items was \$21,754. Although the county also will need to purchase a high speed printer in the near future, computer consultant Jesse Sustaite indicated Friday's purchase all but completes the computer equipment upgrade being funded as part of a \$71,115 federal grant.

The grant, which originally included \$40,000 in local matching funds, was designed to expand the county computer system to include the offices at the Tyler County Justice Center.

Sustaite noted that the county had previously purchased an IBM AS/400 system together with sheriff's office, court management and justice of the peace software packages. Those purchases, approved in December, to-

talied \$103,675.

Because the federal grant, together with the county's initial \$40,000 match, amounted to only \$111,115, Sustaite told the commissioners that the county would have to come up with an additional \$143,114 to pay for the latest computer equipment purchase.

"That's not as bad as we thought it was going to be," Mahan said. "In December, it looked like we would exceed the grant by about \$30-40,000."

"Once we get the new system up and running, we'll have a piece of equipment here that, with some long range planning, will do a lot for the county," Sustaite said. "Over the next five years or so, we could just about pay for this in money saved."

In recommending that the county

accept the K-S-M bid, Sustaite noted that one bid item, a high speed printer, was deleted. The consultant noted that only one company submitted a bid on the printer, \$7,982, and that he believed that a lower price could be obtained at a later date.

In accepting the K-S-M bid, the commissioners noted that an adjustment would have to be made in the county's budget to come up with the extra funds.

Other business

During the meeting, the commissioners also:

- Approved a resolution requested by the district court judges named District Clerk Pat Brown as the county's designee to handle juror excuses.
- Tabled action on the appointment of hospital board members.
- Voted to extend existing landfill permit fees through the end of March.

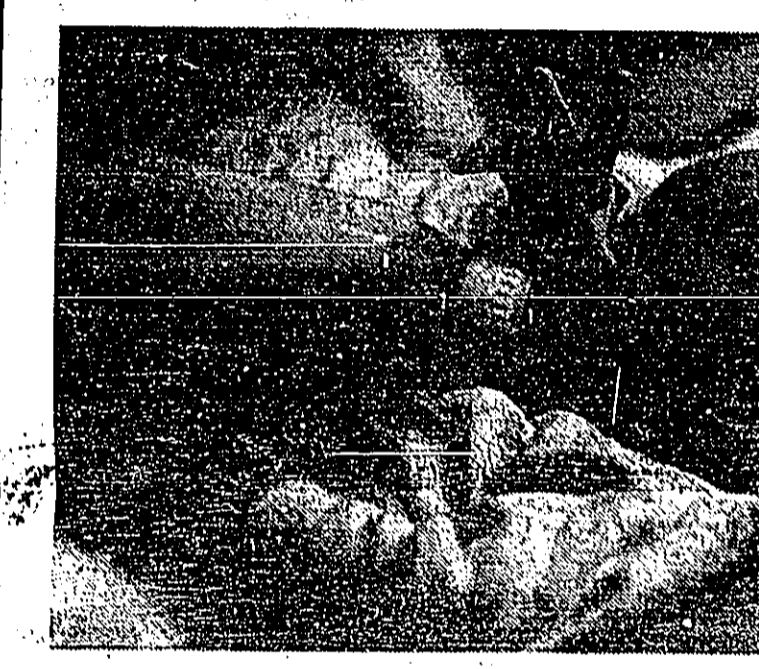

## Funding for shelter studied by county - Commissioners eye financial support for women's and children's shelter

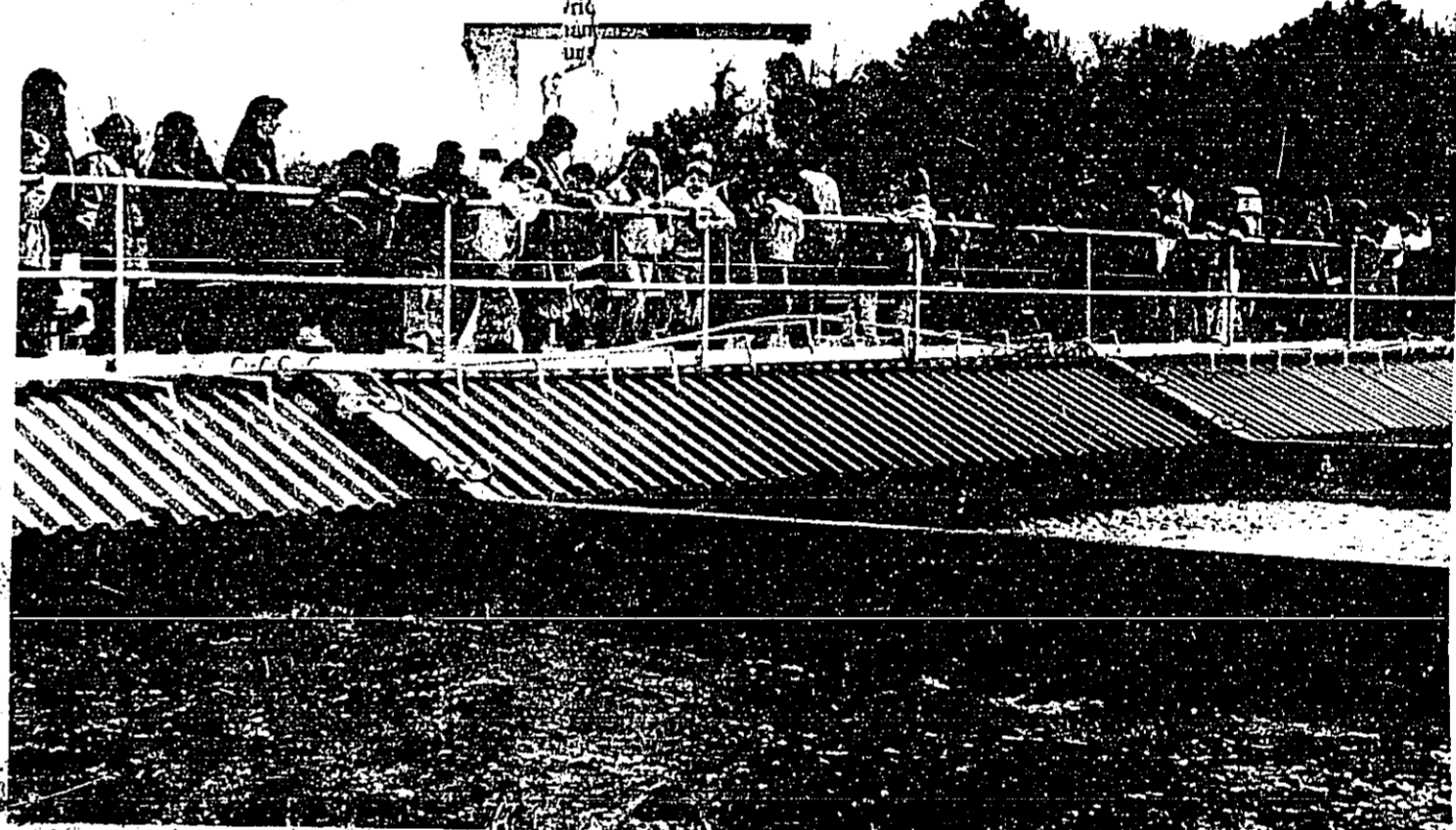
WOODVILLE — Although no formal action was taken Friday, Tyler County commissioners gave tentative approval to providing some type of financial assistance to the Women and Children's Shelter of Southeast Texas. Leslie Peavler appeared before the commissioners court during a special meeting Friday to request a modest amount of aid from the county to help cover the Woodville Outlets Center's monthly utility and/or telephone bill.

"We're growing by leaps and bounds," Peavler told the commissioners. "We've seen 75 people in the last seven months and I'd say about 75 percent of that number are from the Fred-Warren-Spurger area of the county."

Peavler noted that the local outreach center is primarily designed to assist women and children who have been forced out of their homes due to physical and mental abuse. The center attempts to find housing as well as meet needs for food, clothing and counseling for those requiring help.

"We are asking if the county could see its way to help in some way, maybe with the utilities or the telephone," she said, adding that the center's monthly utility bill runs around \$100 while the telephone costs between \$100 and \$150 per month on average.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Jerry Mahan, who was presiding Friday in the absence of County Judge Jerome Owens, praised Peavler and shelter's other volunteers for their work. He noted that while it might be possible for the county to provide some funding for the center, he added that it would take some time for officials to determine how much aid could be given and from which

area of the budget the money will be taken.

"Most people aren't all that familiar with the way county government operates, but the best time to ask for financial assistance is at budget time usually in July or August," Mahan said.

"We'd like to help because you all are doing a great job," Precinct 1 Commissioner Maxie Riley added. "However, I don't think we can do today. The county judge will have to get with the auditor to see if we have the money and to make arrangements to amend the budget."

When, in response to questioning from Mahan, Peavler told the commissioners that the local center was in immediate need of some funding to pay its bills, the commissioners and other officials and voters in the audience.

## Jobless rate jumps by 1%

WOODVILLE — Tyler County's unemployment rate once again topped the 5 percent mark, rising to 6.3 percent during November.

According to figures released by the Texas Employment Commission, the November rate — the latest currently available — soared by 1.1 percent over October's 7.2 percent level.

While the November 6.3 percent jobless rate also is higher than August's 6.8 and September's 7.7 percent levels, it is still well below the record three-year high of 9.4 percent recorded in January 1992.

The latest figure also is 2.5 percent higher than the 5.8 percent unemployment rate recorded in November 1991. The new 6.3 percent figure translates to mean that out of an estimated labor force of 7,694, a total of 634 county residents were unemployed and looking for work during November.

Prior to November's rate increase, the local jobless picture had been improving each month since January's high with the exception of June and September. In June the unemployment rate jumped by 5 percent, rising from May's 7.8 percent mark to 8.3 percent while September's 7.2 percent rate represented a .9 percent increase over August.

In releasing the latest figures for Tyler County, TEC Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers noted that the state's unemployment situation also was having problems during November.

"The supply of jobs in Texas cannot keep up with demand, and that imbalance has pushed the state's unemployment rate even higher at a time when we had hoped unemployment would go down," Nabers said.

November's 6.3 percent jobless rate was a 7.7 percent up 9 percent from October's 6.8 percent rate as well as from November 1991's rate of 6.8 percent.

Texas has 167,600 more people trying to find work this year compared to November 1991, Nabers said.

"It appears that based on reports of an economic recovery, more Texans and others who have migrated to the state have entered the job market. That has driven the rate up again," Nabers said. "The problem is that as more

## Medicare's general enrollment period continued through March

LUFKIN — Most East Texans age 65 or over are enrolled in Medicare. Nationwide there are over 30 million covered under this Federal Health Insurance plan - a program which assists in the payment of hospital and medical expenses.

By far the majority of Medicare beneficiaries became entitled at age 65 - the age specified in the original law passed by Congress in 1965. In 1973 the law was modified to include disabled Social Security beneficiaries. Also covered were workers and their eligible dependents with chronic kidney disease who were entitled to benefits has been terminated and later reinstated.

Generally, a person who signs up during a General Enrollment Period (GEP) may expect to pay a higher premium. The premium is increased by ten percent for each full year a person could have had coverage but did not. Exceptions include those who have employer health insurance beyond age 65 - but they must enroll within a specified period after employer coverage ends.

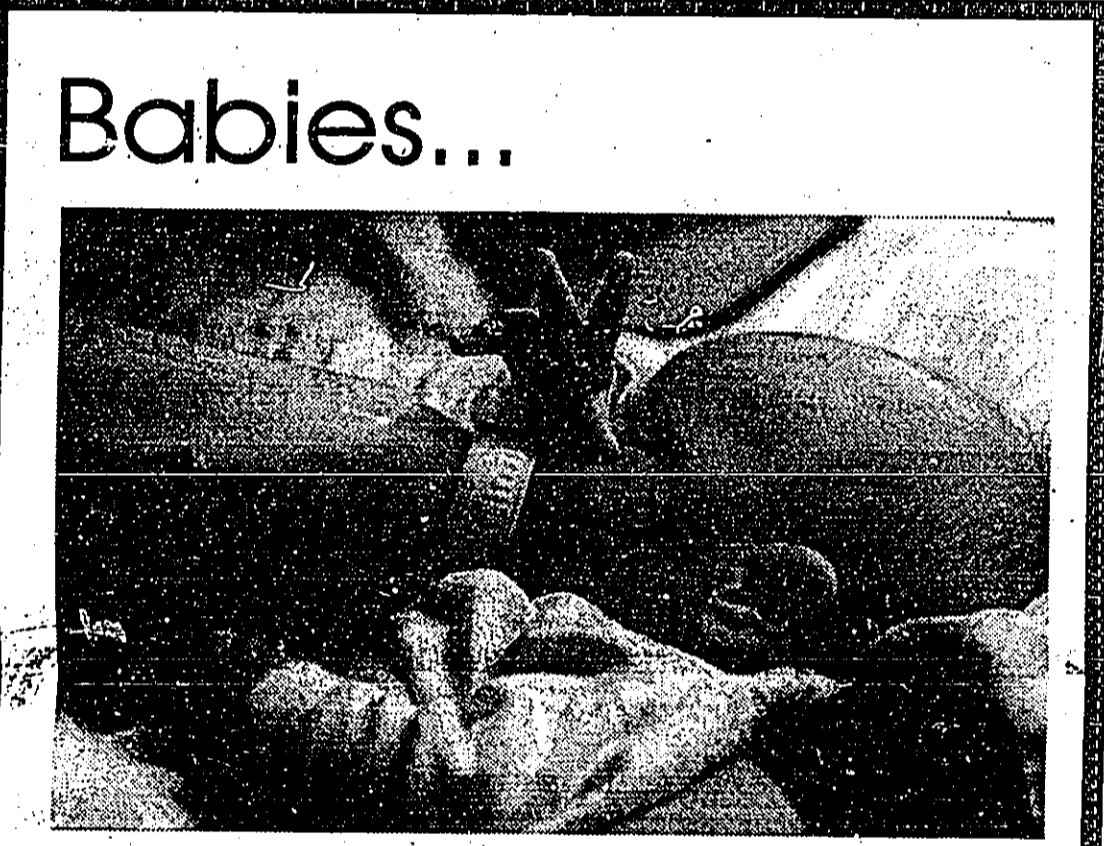

they just took care of the ones I send down to them, they'd stay extremely busy," Brasher added.

Mahan noted that many Tyler County residents have opened their hearts and pocketbooks to help those in need around the world, but added that it might be time to also consider helping those closer to home.

Computer purchases

In other business during Friday's special meeting, the commissioners accepted a bid from K-S-M Data Systems of Groves on the purchase of

nine personal computers, three laser printers, six regular printers and modems. Cost of the items was \$21,754.

Although the county also will need to purchase a high speed printer in the near future, computer consultant Jesse Sustaire indicated Friday's purchase all but completes the computer equipment upgrade being funded as part of a \$711,115 federal grant.

The grant, which originally included \$40,000 in local matching funds, was designed to expand the county computer system to include the offices at the Tyler County Justice Center.

Sustaire noted that the county had previously purchased an IBM AS/400 system together with sheriff's office, court management and justice of the peace software packages. Those purchases, approved in December, to-
