TAAS scores reviewed by WISD board

WOODVILLE — TAAS test scores, the superintendent's contract, building fires and the weather were among the many topics discussed in WISD's regular meeting of their Board of Trustees Tuesday, Jan. 19.

In one of Superintendent Carol Moffett's two reports to the board, and with lengthy discussion, board members and educators delved into the subject of the TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) test score results. These scores, received by WISD within the past month, were the results of the third grade and seventh grade TAAS tests as well as the eleventh and twelfth grade TAAS Exit Level tests.

Beginning with the Exit Level test, out of this year's 98 seniors, according to Assistant Superintendent Mary Nell Rainey, 26 have now taken the TAAS test three times, but have yet to pass all three parts. Of those students, 24 are still failing the math portion of the test, eight the writing portion and nine the reading.

In a statewide preliminary report, figures reflect that of the Texas seniors who took the test this past October, 50 percent passing writing, 48 percent passing reading and 41 percent passed math.

"It's a disencouraging state," commented Dr. Tom Harvey, Woodville High School principal. "We're doing equally as poor (as the rest of Texas)."

He later added that the students who had failed the test are receiving special assistance and many of them, when re-taking the test in the spring, will improve their scores.

The eleventh graders' scores on the exit level test reflected scores in a range of three to eight percent above the statewide figures. Local scores show 91 percent passed the writing test, compared with 83 percent statewide; 79 percent in reading with 76 percent statewide; and 65 percent in math with 60 percent statewide.

The TAAS exit level test is given in the fall and spring during the 11th and 12th grades, and in the following summer for those who do not pass all sections by the end of their senior year. These students are allowed to graduate only after passing the test. Woodville third graders showed overall a four to 10 percent above the state average score on their test. They achieved a 78 percent passing mark in writing compared with 68 percent statewide. They also listed 83 percent passing in reading with 79 percent statewide; and 88 percent in math with 84 percent statewide.

Seventh graders scored at a level of 52 percent passing in writing with 68 percent statewide; 42 percent in reading with 51 percent statewide; and 42 percent in math with 51 percent statewide. These scores stand between nine and 16 percent below the statewide percentages.

Seven students have received recognition for their scores.

Governor picked as parade marshal

- Richards to participate in 1993 Dogwood Festival -

WOODVILLE — Texas Governor Ann W. Richards will be in Woodville March 20 to serve as the marshal of the 50th annual Tyler County Dogwood Festival Parade.

Dogwood Festival officials announced Monday that the governor has formally scheduled the Woodville visit to take part in the traditionally large and spectacular parade which gets underway at 2 p.m.

"We're very excited that the governor will be here. We feel that it will add a great deal to the parade and other festivities that will be held as part of the Dogwood Festival," Blanche Shaw, publicity director, said in announcing Richard's visit.

The annual Dogwood Festival Week-end has been moved up this year to the third weekend of March — which falls on March 19-20. In year's past, the Dogwood Weekend was held on the first weekend in April immediately following the Western Week-end.

This year, in hopes of holding the festivities while the East Texas dogwood trees are in bloom, the annual Dogwood Weekend was "temporarily" ahead of Western Week-end, which will remain in its traditional date slot of the last weekend in March — which falls this year on March 26-27.

While the festival is almost two months away, Shaw noted that the process of selecting a Dogwood Queen officials will get underway Thursday, Feb. 4, at the Woodville Inn. Beginning at 7 p.m., the first round of judging will be held to narrow the field of contestants down to five. One each representing the five Tyler County school districts. All Tyler County high school seniors are invited to enter the queen's contest and attend the Feb. 4 judging. The second round of judging will be held on Feb. 11 while the final round will be on Feb. 18. Both judging rounds begin at 7 p.m. at the Woodville Inn. The winner will be crowned during ceremonies March 20.

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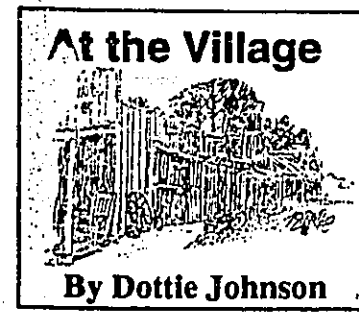

GSU-Entergy pact looks like good deal

At first glance the proposed merger of Gulf States Utilities Co. and Entergy Corporation of New Orleans might look a little too contrived for the uneducated eye but a closer look reveals potential benefits to our area that might not have been focused upon as yet.

There is no subtlety in the suggested benefits for residential users because of projected savings in corporate fuel costs purchases, company officials contend, customers can expect to save up to 8 and 9 percent on the retail portion of their bills. Because fuel makes up the larger portion of the monthly bills, residential users should pocket significant savings.

The regional geographic advantages of the merger of the two electricity companies provides, at a minimum, a network of communications, which if used judiciously, could lead to bringing needed industry to our economically strapped part of the world. Remember, the electric company is among the first called when someone wants to locate or start a business.

At present Entergy's regional network covers electric companies in Louisiana, Arkansas, and Mississippi. When the two are hooked together through the merger, the ability of the company to "shop around" for lower electrical rates during peak usage instead of having to accept higher rates is a definite "plus." Company officials accept a savings of over \$1 billion for the 10 years after the merger is complete.

GSU customers will be the ones to benefit directly because Entergy is committed to capping GSU rates for at least five years after the merger. How many other businesses can commit to that?

One of the more provocative benefits, lost about 10 years ago when GSU's financial sheet took a decline, was the charitable "direct" contributions which have been made in the past by GSU to worthwhile charities and community organizations in its current service area. If it wasn't for the "out front leadership roles of the current GSU employees" you might not have remembered that those charitable GSU contributions of the past have been long gone. Truth is that in 1992 Entergy spent \$5 million on such contribution and plans to support the GSU service area to the same tune.

Now that the stockholders of GSU and Entergy Company have approved the combination of the two systems, lets hope the utility company regulators and those who would intervene against such a merger would temper their actions in light of the above enhancements for our area. GSU has always been "out front" in leadership roles in East Texas. Let's not forget, however, in this approval process, to let the new Entergy Company folks, our sultors to the East, know that we want to keep it that way.

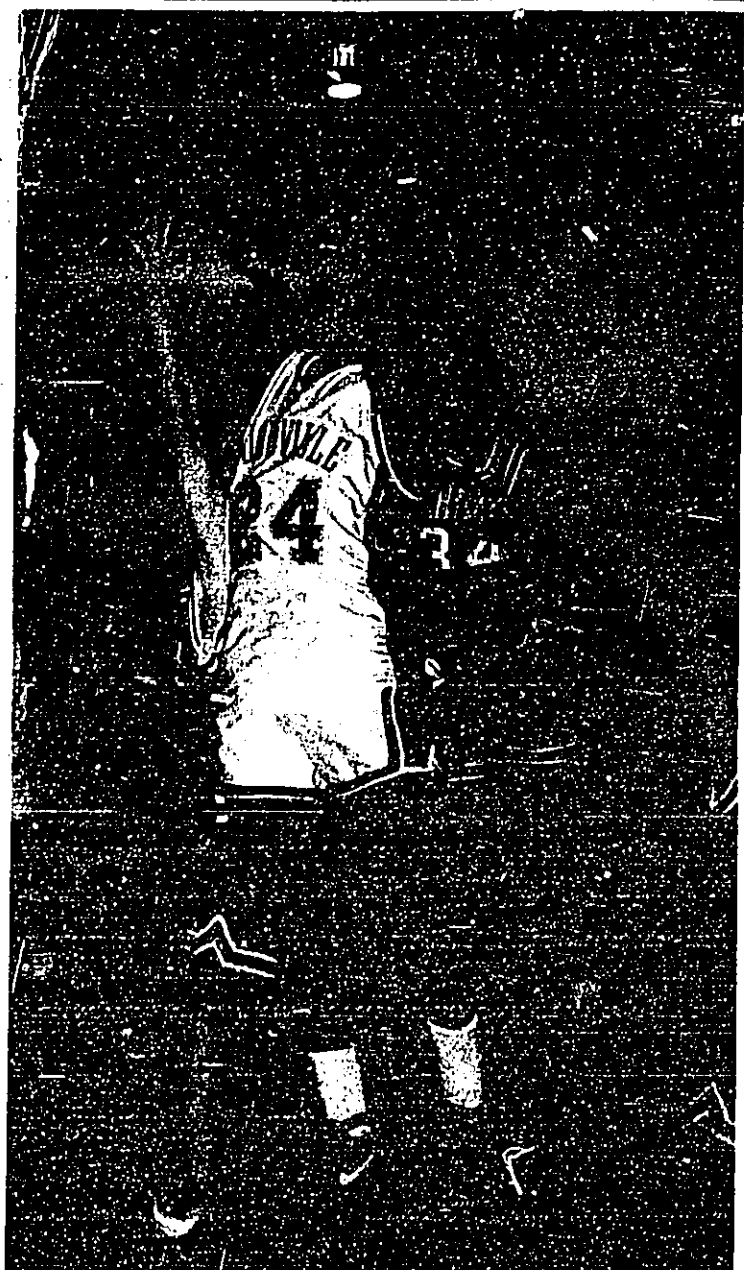

The Repository also contains information on the social and emotional needs of gifted students, the effects of various program options, training preservice teachers in curriculum differentiation for the gifted, and reliability and validity studies of non-traditional identification instruments.

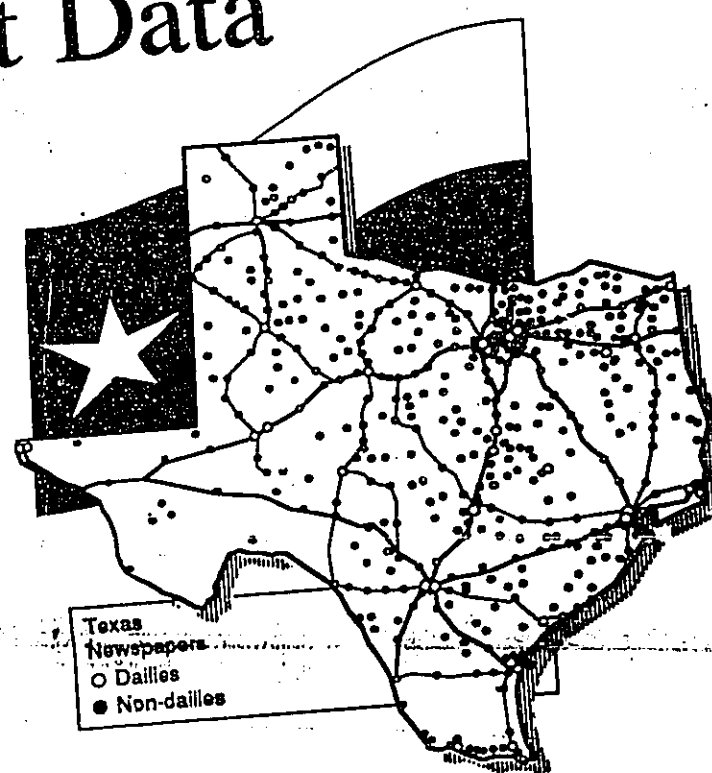

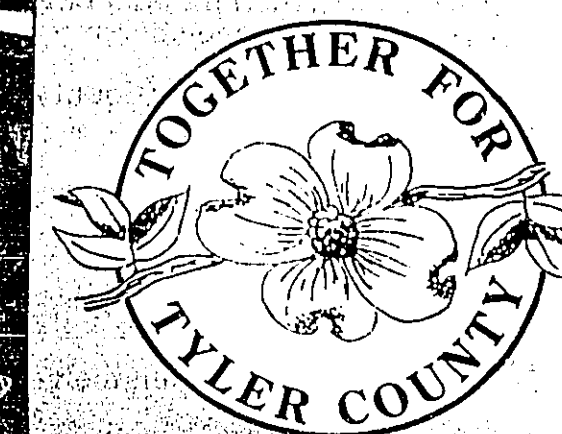

Koci wins top chamber honor**

WOODVILLE — Telling the audience that he now knows "what it feels like to win an academy award," outgoing President Gene Koci accepted the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce's highest honor Thursday, Jan. 21, during the association's annual banquet.

Koci, who was unable to speak for several moments after being named the 1992 Outstanding Citizen, accepted the award from last year's winner, Fred Sullivan.

Only minutes earlier, Koci had joked with the nearly 300 guests at the annual banquet that the name of the winner was one of the best kept secrets in the county.

"Even I don't know who the winner will be," Koci said. "And if the president of the chamber doesn't know, you can bet that they've gone to great lengths to make sure that no one knows who the winner is."

Sullivan, owner of Sullivan's Hardware in Woodville, praised Koci in his presentation speech as a person who has given unselfishly of his time to improve the quality of life in Tyler County.

"Our honoree for 1992 has been active in many diverse areas of our community life," Sullivan said. "He has been a business leader, active in civic organizations, or regional governing councils, and still finds time to be a service to his church and family. He is a person of great enthusiasm and he shares this enthusiasm for his community with all he encounters."

Sullivan added that Koci, who heads the local Gulf States Utilities office, has worked hard in the area of economic development.

"He recognized our area's need for an improved economy and began working through the chamber of commerce as chairman of the Industrial Development Committee. He pushed to get Woodville and other Tyler County cities to be a part of GST's Team Cities program in order to take advantage of the resources that regional affiliation could bring."

"He worked to promote Tyler County as a tourist destination as well as a potential retirement spot," Sullivan added.

While pushing for economic development, including serving as president of a regional development organization in 1992, Sullivan said that Koci also recognized that "quality of life was not only jobs."

Sullivan said that Koci also has worked to improve the local recreational opportunities and "to make Tyler County a more beautiful place to live or visit."

Chamber recognizes Kenesson**

WOODVILLE — Cited for his years of service to the chamber and county as a whole, J.H. "Jiggs" Kenesson Jr. was named as the 1992 Honorary Outstanding Citizen by the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce.

During the annual chamber banquet held Thursday, Jan. 21, Kenesson was presented with the honor by the 1991 award winner, Tyler County Sheriff Gary Hennigan.

The annual award is designed to recognize a local person for community service spanning several years.

"In my 26 years in Woodville and Tyler County, I can truthfully say this person is most deserving of this award," Hennigan said in his presentation speech. "He is an honest, hard-working man of high character."

In listing Kenesson's accomplishments which "have touched many lives in Tyler County," Hennigan noted that the honoree is a member of the Wood-

ville United Methodist Church and has served as Sunday school superintendent for several years.

He also has served as the church's administrative board chairman, on the church board of trustees and a building committee member for the present church building and for the Louise Anthony Youth Center. Kenesson also has been a recipient of the church's Heritage Award.

During his time in Tyler County, Kenesson also directed the construction of Lake Tejas as part of the Works Project Administration (WPA) recreation department. He served as a Scout master for 12 years and assistant scout master for several years, and helped build the "Welcome to Woodville" signs for the Woman's Study Club.

Kenesson also served as the 1956 recreation director, the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, as the Missio-

lodge worshipful master, as Dogwood Festival director, as chairman of the Woodville Rotary Club for a number of years, and as a board member for the Allan Shivers Library.

He also served on the Woodville Independent School District's board of trustees for a number of years, helped build the present flower boxes located on the downtown Woodville sidewalks, is a past president of the Woodville Rotary Club and has been designated as a Paul Harris Fellow by the local Rotary Club.

**Brookshire Brothers picked
as 1992 business of the year**

WOODVILLE — Although the award was previously announced, the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce formally recognizing the Woodville Brookshire Brothers grocery store as its 1992 Business of the Year.

The store became only the fourth recipient of the honor since the chamber initiated the award. Ketter Industries was the first local business to win the honor and was followed by Phillips, DVM, explained that the business of the year is selected based on both its financial impact on Tyler County as well as its commitment to the betterment of the quality of life of those living in the area.

"Brookshire Brothers is a significant employer in Tyler County, with currently about 70 employees and an annual payroll of about \$615,000," Phillips said. "But that is only a small part of the story."

Phillips said that there are very few churches, school groups or civic organizations in the county who have not benefited in some way by the generosity of the grocery store chain. He said that by either contributing cash, goods, services or just space at the local store for fund raising projects, Brookshires has helped the people of the county with a wide range of worthy projects.

"I personally know that the Rotary Club has benefited over the years and in sure the Lions Club can say the same thing," Phillips said. "County fire departments, the Caring is Sharing Program, the Dogwood Festival and the Tyler County Fair are just some of the groups which Brookshires has supported."

In addition to presenting the store with a plaque, the chamber also paid tribute to the local grocery store by placing large photographs taken at the store over the banquet head table. Local store manager Patrick Cherry

accepted the award on behalf of the grocery store chain. Brookshire Brothers President R.A. Brookshire of Lufkin also expressed his thanks to the chamber for the honor, joking with Phillips that "after hearing your remarks, I now know where all the profits are going."

"Seriously, it is the customers that make the company and we thank you for this honor," Brookshire said. "Someone earlier made reference to the 'movers and shakers' in Tyler County and all I can say is if we could move them all to Lufkin and Angeling County, there'd be some hope for us that live in that part of the country."

The local Brookshire Brothers grocery, which was established in 1968, currently employs 64 people plus six in the store pharmacy. Its annual payroll, not counting the pharmacy, is \$615,000.

In announcing Brookshires as the business of the year, chamber officials cited a list of contributions made by the store to various Tyler County organizations - a list which the chamber official was only "the tip of the iceberg."

Some of the contributions are made to:

- The local American Association of Retired Persons (AARP). Donations are made to for the group's monthly meetings and annual picnic.
- The Tyler County Caring is Sharing food bank. In addition to contributions of money and goods by the store, employees also annually contribute money to this program.
- Churches and non-profit organizations. These groups often use the store's entrance area for fund raising sales and rallies.
- Dogwood Festival. The store is contributing \$817 for flowers.
- Tyler County Fair. This past year, the store purchased the grand champion steer and donated it to the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department.

In addition to the store's involvement in community projects, Cherry is personally involved in various local activities. He is a 1993 member of commerce director, a 1992-93 director of the Woodville Lions Club, has coached Little Dribbler Basketball for four years, has coached Little League Baseball for three years, has coached girls softball for four years and has coached Lions Club softball for three years.

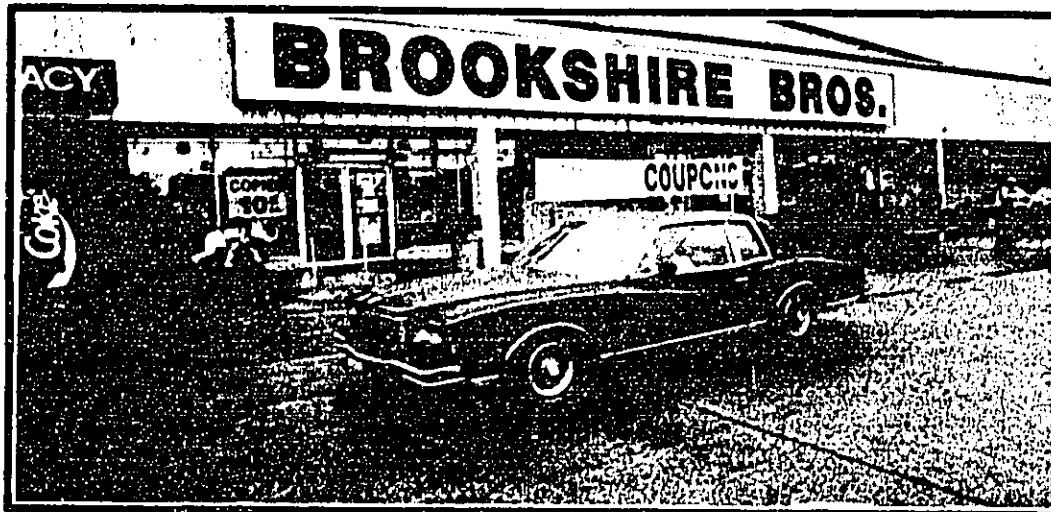

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A guide to the Tyler County Courthouse

Elected county officials are available to assist the public with questions about the day to day operation of local government in addition to helping residents obtain a marriage license, birth certificate, passport and vehicle registration. But the courthouse is often confusing and sometimes it is difficult to remember just which office handles what service. Perhaps this guide to the Tyler County Courthouse will provide some insight.

WHERE WOULD YOU—

- obtain a marriage license? The county clerk's office, located on the first floor of the Tyler County Courthouse, issues marriage licenses. Phone 283-7362.
- obtain a birth certificate? The county clerk's office maintains birth records. 283-7362.
- obtain registration for cars, trucks, motorcycles, etc.? The county tax assessor/collector issues vehicle registrations, license plates, and renewal stickers. Located in the Courthouse Annex. Phone 283-2734.
- register and obtain a title for motorboats? The county tax assessor/collector can issue registration numbers and assist with obtaining certificates of title for commercial and private motorboats. —obtain a passport? The district clerk, located on the second floor of the Tyler County courthouse, acts as agent for the U.S. Passport Service to aid in planning for foreign travel. Phone 283-2162.
- obtain a voter registration card? The tax assessor/collector maintains all county voter registration rolls. Phone 283-2734.
- obtain a death certificate? These vital statistics are maintained by the county clerk. Phone 283-7362.
- examine the will of a deceased person? This would be among the probate papers filed in the county clerk's office.
- pay county property taxes? The tax assessor/collector maintains county tax rolls and is responsible for the collection of taxes. Phone 283-2734.
- record a deed or legal instrument related to real estate? The county clerk records documents of this nature. Phone 283-7362.
- pay a traffic ticket issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety? Contact the office of the justice of the peace listed on the citation.
- renew a driver's license? The DPS maintains a license renewal office in Tyler County Justice Center, 702 North Magnolia Street, (US 69) Woodville. Hours are 8 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 p.m. until 4:30 p.m. Wednesday through Friday. Phone 283-7757.
- visit an inmate in the county jail? The sheriff is the custodian of the jail. Inquiries as to visiting hours should be directed to the Sheriff's office, located in the Tyler County Justice Center, 702 North Magnolia Street, (US 69) Woodville. Phone 283-2172.
- obtain information on farming, gardening, or home economics? The county extension office maintains this information. Located in the

- basement of the courthouse. Phone 283-8284.
- file a complaint for criminal misconduct? The matter should be discussed with the district attorney. His office is located in the Tyler County Courthouse. Phone 283-8136.
- recover unpaid child support? The district clerk's office can assist in this area. Phone 283-2162.
- obtain institutional commitment of a mentally ill person? Contact the county judge to discuss this action. Phone 283-2141.
- file a small claim lawsuit? Such actions should be filed in the justice of the peace office in your precinct.
- seek to evict a tenant who fails to pay his rent? These matters are handled by the justice of the peace.
- report for jury duty? Report to the courtroom of court shown on the summons issued by the sheriff.
- register a cattle brand or determine who owns a certain livestock mark? The office of the county clerk will assist in this area. All livestock brands and marks must be registered in the county clerk's office and renewed every ten years.

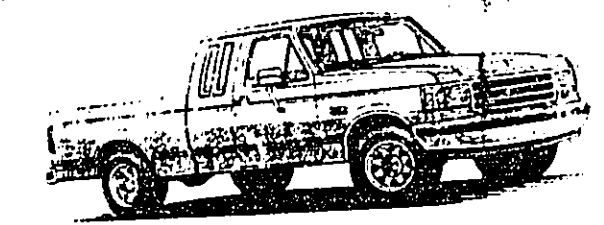

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
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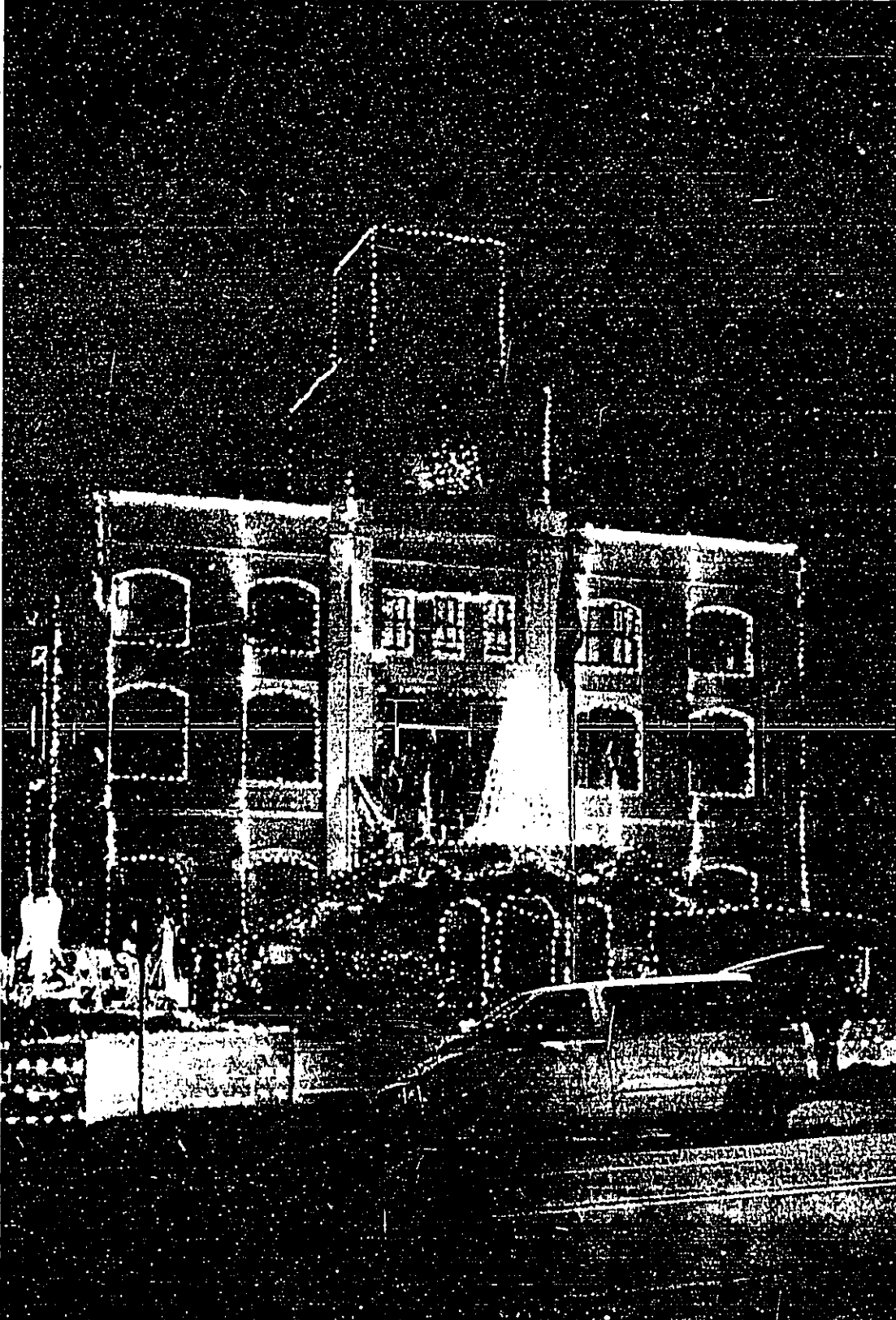
Year-round activities on Tyler County calendar

Chamber of Commerce Banquet
 The Tyler County Chamber of Commerce hosts their annual banquet in January of each year.
 At this annual event the recipients of the Citizen of the Year and Honorary Citizen of the Year awards are named and presented. Presentations also are made to the Business of the Year.

Miss Tyler County Pageant
 The Miss Tyler County Pageant, sponsored by the Wisteria Chapter of the American Business Women's Association, takes place annually in February at the Kirby Auditorium in Woodville.
 Local contestants vie in talent and

beauty competitions for the Miss Tyler County title. Younger girls compete for the titles of Junior Miss Tyler County and Future Miss Tyler County.

Dogwood Festival and Pageant
 On the third weekend of March, Tyler County celebrates the annual Dogwood Festival, an event which has been going on since the mid-30's. Visitors come from everywhere to see the beauties of spring in East Texas. Visiting duchesses and their escorts arrive on Friday for orientation and Friday night dances.
 Saturday brings the Arts and Crafts Fair, the Antique Automobile Show, and the huge Dogwood Parade through downtown Woodville, featuring floats from all over the state.
 Saturday night is the Dogwood Pageant where the Dogwood Queen is crowned and a local cast presents a pageant focusing on some portion of Tyler County history.

 Special programs of music are presented throughout the Festival, all in keeping with the time period presented at the Village.

 In October story tellers gather at Heritage Village and tell some of the scariest, funniest, true ghost stories and tales of the unusual and supernatural in the Big Thicket area.
 The stories are told in different locations throughout the village and guests are taken to those locations by lamp light.

Christmas Crafts Fair
 The Colmesneil Extension Homemakers sponsor a Christmas Crafts Fair every year in November at the Colmesneil Community Center.
 The two-day event features arts and crafts made by local artisans.
 Good Old Days Festival
 Early in November the Good Old Days Festival is held in downtown Woodville. Featuring demonstrations of old-time crafts, the event also features live entertainment, an auction, games and contests and arts and crafts.

Lighting of the Courthouse Square
 The historic Tyler County Courthouse, which celebrated its 100th birthday in 1991, welcomes the holiday season with over 64,000 miniature white lights, a project of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, in addition to the lights which draw visitors from throughout East Texas, entertainment on the Square is also scheduled throughout the holiday season.

ANGELINA COLLEGE

PUBLIC SCHOOLS
Tyler County has five public independent school districts within its boundaries with a combined enrollment of almost 4,000 students. The districts include Woodville, Chester, Colmesneil, Spurger and Warren.

WOODVILLE ISD
The Woodville Independent School District is Tyler County's largest, covering 275 square miles and has an enrollment of 1,702 students and a faculty of 134 teachers and administrators and 108 other support personnel. 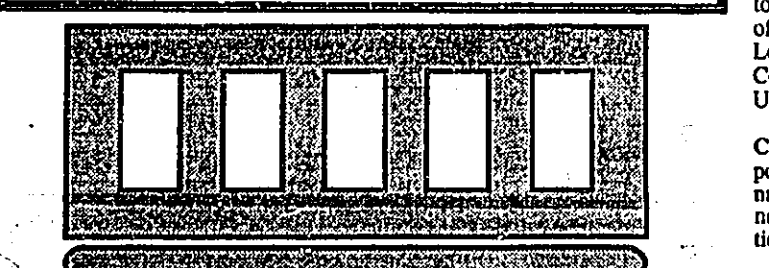

WARREN ISD
The Warren Independent School District is Tyler County's second largest, covering 252 square miles with an enrollment of 936 students and 72 faculty members. The district maintains four school campuses, including three located in Warren and one in the Fred Community. Fred Elementary School has an enrollment of 114. Warren Elementary has an enrollment of 300. Warren Junior High School has 300 student and Warren High School has 272 students. School Superintendent is Betty Ray Yates, 547-2242.

COLMESNEIL ISD
The Colmesneil Independent School District encompasses 220 square miles, with an enrollment of 412 students and 37 faculty members. School Superintendent is Larry Sunson, 837-2225.

SPURGER ISD
The Spurger Independent School District covers 107 square miles of southeast Tyler County and boasts a faculty of 30 teachers and administrators and a current enrollment of 385 students — including 210 in grades K-6 in the elementary school and 175 in grades 7-12 at the high school. School Superintendent is Johnny Lewis, 429-3464.

CHESTER ISD
The Chester Independent School District includes 176 square miles of northwest Tyler County and northeast Polk County, has 28 faculty members and an enrollment of 256 students — including 201 in elementary school and 136 in high school. School Superintendent is Gary Gazzaway, 969-2211.

WOODVILLE—Named after Senator George T. Wood in 1847, the post office was established the same year. Located in the rough center of Tyler County at the junction of highways US 190 and US 69.

CHESTER—Settled in 1976 after the post office was moved from its original site at Peachtree Village. Located northwest of Woodville at the junction of Highway 287 and FM 1745.

COLMESNEIL—Began with the coming of the railroad in 1852 and received its post office that same year. Named after railroad worker W.T. Colmesneil. Located nine miles north of Woodville at the junction of highway US 69 and FM 256.

ROCKLAND—So named by W.T. Colmesneil for the many rocks in the area. Located seventeen miles north of Woodville at highway US 69 and FM 1014.

SPURGER—Settlement here began around 1852 with a post office established in 1881. Located twenty-one miles southeast of Woodville at the junction of Highway 92 and FM 1013.

DOUCETTE—Settled in 1890, named for Fred Doucette who established first sawmill. Received post office in 1893. During the great lumber boom of the 1920's, Doucette was the largest community in Tyler County. Located five miles north of Woodville at the junction of highway US 69 and FM 1632.

WARREN—Received its name from Mr. Warren, connected with the establishment of the first sawmill there in 1880. Received post office three years later, in 1883. Located twelve miles south of Woodville at the junction of highway US 69 and FM 1943.

HILLISTER—A sawmill settlement that sprung up around 1880 and received its post office in 1882. Located eight miles south of Woodville at the junction of highway US 69 and FM 1013.

TOWN BLUFF—The oldest settlement in the county, settled in 1832 by Wyatt Hanks, who sold lots there. Also the first county seat. Located seventeen miles east of Woodville at the junction of Highway 92 and FM 1746.

FRED—Received its post office the same year as Spurger, in 1881. Located twenty-eight miles southeast of Woodville at the junction of Highway 92 and FM 1943.

DAM B—Located east of Woodville at US 190 and FM 92. Dam B is a small community located on the shores of B.A. Steinhagen Lake. The dam which forms Steinhagen Lake was built by the Corp of Engineers and was nicknamed "Dam B" since it was the second dam that was to be built. "Dam A" however, was never built, but the area became known as "Dam B."

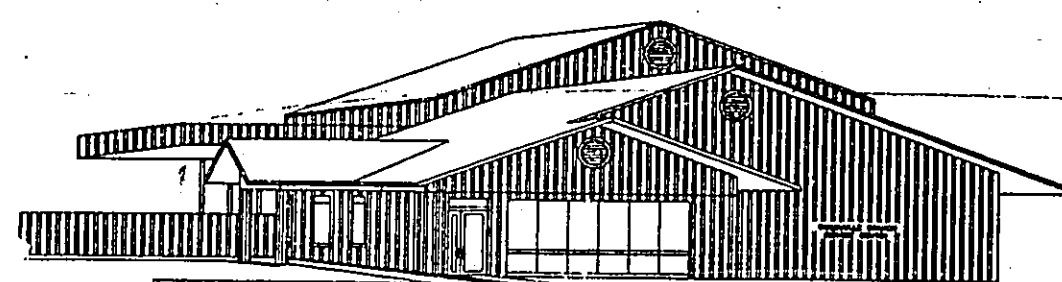

Recreational activities abound

There are limitless opportunities in Tyler County for recreation and leisure activities.

For book and history lovers there is the Allan Shivers Library, a memorial to an American statesman and former Governor of Texas and Heritage Village which features the largest collection of East Texas historical artifacts in the state.

Your round activities include hunting and fishing at nearby Steinhagen Lake, San Rayburn Lake in Jasper County or Toledo Bend Lake in Newton County.

In March and April Woodville hosts the annual Dogwood Festival and Western Weekend. This involves many of Tyler County's citizens in preparing and decorating for a colorful historical pageant presented in the Dogwood Amphitheater.

On the weekend following the Dogwood Festival, hundreds of trailriders converge on Woodville to participate in the Western Weekend Parade and wild west rodeo.

The Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation is 15 miles from Woodville on US 190 toward Livingston. The reservation has many organized activities including the Big Thicket Tour. Heritage Village, located just west of Woodville, offers tours of a Pioneer Village. Meals, served boarding house style, are available in the Pickett House.

Steinhagen Lake

The 16,830-acre Steinhagen Lake, operated by the lower Neches Valley Authority and the US Corp of Engineers, is a major source of water for recreational purposes.

Food, boat rental, tackle, bait, etc. are available at or near the lake. Martin Dies Jr. State Park, a 705-acre recreational area partially located in Tyler County off US 190 east, offers campsites, screened shelters, restrooms, showers, picnicking, fishing, swimming, water skiing, boat ramps, hiking trails and trailer dump stations.

Lake Tejas

A two-acre, roped-off swimming area is the main attraction of this summer favorite, ten-acre Lake Tejas.

Located one mile east of Colmesneil on FM 256, the lake is owned and operated by the Colmesneil Independent School District.

A concession stand with short orders is available as well as camping and picnic facilities. Open June through Labor Day.

Heritage Village

In the early 1950's, ceramic artist Clyde Gray began a living museum of pioneer life, Heritage Village.

Recently purchased by the Tyler County Heritage Society, the village now features the largest collection of East Texas artifacts on display in the state.

Over 30 buildings are open to the public and completely filled with authentic furnishings of the pioneer era. The Tolar Cabin, built in 1866, has been awarded an official historical medalion.

One of the most popular items is an original 1906 one-room school house now used as an old-time boarding house dining room. The Pickett House, Heritage Village, located two miles west of Woodville on US 190, plays host to approximately 100,000 visitors each year.

Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation

The Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation is located 15 miles west of Woodville on US 190.

Approximately 500 members of the combined tribes reside here. A museum, restaurant, arts and crafts shop, trial dance studio, Big Thicket tour and developed camping facilities are some of the amenities available.

Allan Shivers Museum and Library

In 1963, former Governor and Mrs. Allan Shivers purchased the Robert C. Shivers house, built in 1881.

Medical services available

PHYSICIANS

Tyler County is served by seven general and family practitioners. Additional services are provided by visiting physicians at Tyler County Hospital.

TYLER COUNTY HOSPITAL

The Tyler County Hospital provides major health care for local residents. It is equipped with modern equipment and is upgraded continuously. It is a 48-bed facility and features a heli-port for use by air ambulances.

Recent renovations at the hospital include the expansion of the emergency room facilities and laparoscopic surgery equipment.

NURSING HOMES

The county is served by three nursing homes in Woodville—Dogwood Trails Manor, Holiday Pines Manor and Woodville Convalescent Center.

REHABILITATION CENTER

The Rehabilitation Center, associated with Tyler County Hospital, offers physical, speech and occupational therapy. The center accepts Medicare, private insurance and, in some situations, Medicaid.

HOME HEALTH CARE

In Home medical specialist provide medical care by RN's and LVN's upon doctor's orders. They accept Medicaid, Medicare and private insurance.

AGING COMMITTEE

The Aging Committee of Tyler County is concerned with all factors involved in aging. These encompass financial needs, adequate housing, utilization of free time, community support, information and education, mental and physical health, and proper nutrition.

Each Spring the committee sponsors a Mayfest in conjunction with Senior Citizen month and honors an outstanding man and woman. The committee's major efforts are the Tyler County Human Services Center, 283-5517.

HUMAN SERVICES CENTER

The Tyler County Human Services Center is located at 201 Willow Street in Woodville. Here, citizens age 60 or over may receive a nutritious noon meal for a small contribution. The center also provides recreation in the form of dominoes, bingo, board games and occasional special programs. The Human Services Center also houses an information and referral service, the mini-bus program and the Thrift Shop, 283-7402.

MINI-BUS PROGRAM

The mini-bus program started in 1974 and provides an opportunity for the elderly and disabled to get to Woodville, the county seat, to conduct their business. The bus visits every section of the county on a weekly basis. Phone 283-5517.

SENIOR EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

This service provides the Human Services Center with numerous part-time employees who help with the mini-bus program, act as escorts and provide telephone outreach and clerical assistance in the office. The telephone outreach program contacts about 80 percent of the persons in the county twice a year to check on them and keep the files updated. Phone 283-5517.

County has long, varied history

Tyler County's history is long and varied. The trail, road would be a misleading term, from Nacoochee to Anahuac and the Spanish mission at Arrouisne led through Tyler County, crossing the Neches far into the Texas... would later be located.

In 1830 Fort Teran was built and named by Spanish soldiers. It remained a fort for a supposed of keeping out further Anglo settlement, until 1835 when all Spanish forces were encouraged to leave by the local volunteer forces.

In 1830, settlers were being granted and rights in what is now Tyler County. Wyatt Hank settled at Town Bluff about 1832 and began operating a ferry there. Gradually settlers spread up and down the Neches bottomland, farming cotton. Tyler County men served at San Jacinto and with Captain Chesner's band of Jasper Volunteers.

After the Texas Revolution, settlement increased steadily with Town Bluff as the major population center in the county.

In 1841, a larger area, of which Tyler County is now a part, was created as the Menard District by an act of the Texas Congress. Tyler County was originally created however for judicial purposes only and the courts of the Republic held that a county so created was unconstitutional. After a few months operation, with Town Bluff as the County Seat, the county organization was abandoned.

In 1846 the Texas Legislature created the county again, with a reduced area, giving it the name of Tyler in honor of then-President of the United States, John Tyler. This bill named six county commissioners to select two or more sites to be voted upon for the county seat. Dr. Josiah Wheat's survey at the present site of Woodville, in the forks of Turkey Creek was selected for the county seat.

The new townsite was surveyed and laid out accordingly in lots and blocks. The names of men and places of that era are preserved in the name of the town and its principal streets. George T. Wood was the senator and N.B. Charlton was the member of the house that passed the bill creating the county.

The town was named Woodville for the senator and the street immediately west of the courthouse was named Wheat Street in honor of the doctor whose survey was selected for the county seat. The main street, then as now, was the road to Town Bluff and named Bluff Street. Tyler County's first courthouse was completed Jan. 30, 1849. The second courthouse, a two-story frame building was erected in 1856. In 1891 that courthouse was removed and a three-story brick structure with a massive dome and clock was built. After serving the county for more than 40 years, the many flies and pointed gables were removed in 1936 and the building took on the appearance it bears today.



TAAS scores reviewed by WISD board

WOODVILLE — TAAS test scores, the superintendent's contract, building fires and the weather were among the many topics discussed in WISD's regular meeting of their Board of Trustees Tuesday, Jan. 19.
In one of Superintendent Carol Moffett's two reports to the board, and with lengthy discussion, board members and educators delved into the subject of the TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) test scores. These scores, received by WISD within the past month, were results of the third grade and seventh grade TAAS tests as well as the Exit Level and twelfth grade TAAS tests.
Beginning with the Exit Level test, out of this year's 98 seniors, according to Assistant Superintendent Mary Nell Rainey, 26 have now taken the TAAS test three times, but have yet to pass all three parts. Of these students, 24 are still failing the math portion of the test, eight the writing portion and nine the reading.
In a statewide preliminary report, figures reflect that of the Texas seniors who took the test this past October, 56 percent passing writing, 48 percent passing reading and 41 percent passed math.
"It's a disease across our state," commented Dr. Tom Harvey, Woodville High School principal. "We're doing equally as poor (as the rest of Texas)."
He later added that the students who had failed the test are receiving special assistance and many of them, when retaking the test in the spring, will improve their scores.
The eleventh graders' scores on the exit level test reflected scores in a range of three to eight percent above the statewide figures. Local scores show 91 percent passed the in writing test, compared with 83 percent statewide; 79 percent in reading with 84 percent statewide; and 65 percent in math with 60 percent statewide.
The TAAS exit level test is given in the fall and spring during the 11th and 12th grades, and in the following year for those who do not pass all sections by the end of their senior year. These students are allowed to graduate only after passing the test. Woodville third graders showed

narrow the field of contestants down to five — one each representing the five Tyler County school districts.
All Tyler County high school senior girls who have met the entry requirements are invited to enter the queen's contest and attend the Feb. 4 judging. The second round of judging will be held on Feb. 11 while the final round will be on Feb. 18. Both judging rounds begin at 7 p.m. at the Woodville Inn. The winner will be crowned during ceremonies March 20.

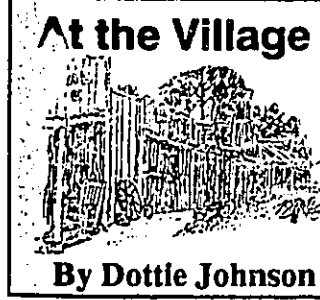

GSU-Entergy pact looks like good deal

At first glance the proposed merger of Gulf States Utilities Co. and Entergy Corporation of New Orleans might look a little too contrived for the uneducated eye but a closer look reveals potential benefits to our area that might not have been focused upon as yet.

There is no subtlety to the suggested benefits for residential users because of projected savings in corporate fuel costs purchases, company officials contend. Customers can expect to save up to 6 and 9 percent on the retail portion of their bills. Because fuel makes up the larger portion of the monthly bills, residential users should pocket significant savings.

The regional geographic advantages of the merger of the two electricity companies provides, at a minimum, a network of communications, which if used judiciously, could lead to bringing needed industry to our economically strapped part of the world. Remember, the electric company is among the first called when someone wants to locate or start a business.

At present Entergy's regional network covers electric companies in Louisiana, Arkansas, and Mississippi. When the two are hooked together through the merger, the ability of the company to "shop around" for lower electrical rates during peak usage instead of having to accept higher rates is a definite "plus." Company officials project a savings of over \$1 billion for the 10 years after the merger is complete.

GSU customers will be the ones to benefit directly because Entergy is committed to capping GSU rates for at least five years after the merger. How many other businesses can commit to that?

One of the more provocative benefits, lost about 10 years ago when GSU's financial sheet took a decline, was the charitable "direct" contributions which have been made in the past by GSU to worthwhile charities and community organizations in its current service area. If it wasn't for the "out front leadership roles of the current GSU employees" you might not have remembered that those charitable GSU contributions of the past have been long gone. Truth is that in 1992 Entergy spent \$5 million on such contribution and plans to support the GSU service area to the same tune.

Now that the stockholders of GSU and Entergy Company have approved the combination of the two systems, lets hope the utility company regulators and those who would intervene against such a merger would temper their actions in light of the above enhancements for our area. GSU has always "not out front" in leadership roles in East Texas. Let's not forget, however, in this approvals process, to let the new Entergy Company folks, our suitors to the East, know that we want to keep it that way.

State Capital Highlights Have partisan politics been sidelined?

AUSTIN - The Legislature's imposed deadline of June 1, state lawmakers apparently have cast aside partisan politics and are working with less animosity to reach a compromise on the state budget.

If true, it couldn't come at a better time. The Legislature's deadline for the state budget is fast approaching. The House and Senate are working with less animosity to reach a compromise on the state budget.

It means Democrats and Republicans will come together in a two-thirds majority necessary to pass a constitutional amendment on the May ballot for voter approval.

Republican-Democrat Plan Gov. Ann Richards' special session in November failed miserably because of political gridlock and some animosity on partisan squabbling, but that's not entirely true. There simply was no consensus to begin with, not even when Democrats and Republicans were working together.

Bullock, a respected Democrat, got the message; he picked Ratliff, a highly respected Republican, to chair the committee. Now it's a bi-partisan plan from the start, something that rank-and-file legislators might buy.

Put simply, Ratliff's bill calls for a "rainproof" budget. It would set a constitutional amendment to legalize county education districts. The CED's, some multi-county in size, will levy a tax and share it with all public schools in the CED.

If voters reject the amendment, then voters in each CED will also vote on whether to authorize the CED property tax.

If both proposals are mixed by voters in the regular county, that CED will spend no more than \$3,470 per student.

Only conference committee reports and Senate amendments may be considered on the fourth and fifth days before the end of a session.

"On the second and third days before the end of a session, the House will limit itself to conference committee reports."

"Revolving Door" Bill

State Sen. David Stibley, R-Waco, has introduced a bill to limit the revolving-door policy for employees at Texas' parole agency.

Stibley said his office is drafting a bill that would prohibit agency employees from representing convicts in private. The Texas Board of Criminal Justice unanimously endorsed passage of a revolving-door bill recently.

The decision came shortly after federal officials in Waco charged former parole board chairman James Gamberry with lying under oath about the extent of his parole consulting activities.

"We're concerned about someone using the good 'ol' boy network, and that's what this bill is designed to stop," Stibley said.

Other Highlights

With drastic budget cuts facing lawmakers and essential services at risk, State Comptroller John Sharp will begin his week disclosing 192 recommendations designed to reduce the state budget by more than \$3 billion. "What we are recommending is better than kicking a bunch of old folks out of nursing homes," he said.

Responding to educators who support a state income tax to ease budget problems, Lt. Gov. Bullock said: "An income tax is about as likely as the Red Sea opening up and engulfing Texas."

more work that everyone put forth to accomplish our objectives," Koci told the group. "I didn't realize, although I worked with a lot of committees, just how much was accomplished until I saw it written down."

Koci praised the work put forth by the Chamber's Development Committee and its chairman, Dr. Larry Phillips, during the past year. He noted that the group has been working on a special video presentation to attract commercial flower growers to the county.

"During the past year, 134 new jobs were created in Tyler County, and if the economists are correct, then for every 1989 and 1992 jobs created, the jobs come into being to service each job."

Koci also noted that according to information from the Texas Employment Commission, the Tyler County work force has increased by 1,051 since 1989 and 1992 while the number of jobless people looking for work has fallen by 62 during the same time period.

"In 1989 we had a work force of 6,591 while in 1992 that number rose to 7,642. Unemployment in 1989 stood at 6.9% or 10.6 percent while the jobless rate last year fell to 6.34 or 7.2 percent," he said.

With regard to the work of the chamber's Beautification Committee and its chairman, Emily Sumner, Koci had words of equal praise. He pointed out that the chamber presented nine beautification awards during 1992 and that the Color Tyler County project has done much to make Woodville a more attractive place to live and visit.

The Color Tyler County effort included the downtown Woodville flower boxes, which Koci said was an attempt to attract a commercial flower grower to the county.

"We wanted to see a grower come to Tyler County. We have good land and good water and we feel that with a business would be a benefit to the community."

After six weeks ago, the first grower committed to come to Tyler County. Since then, a second one has announced plans to come here and located on 100 acres of Tyler County land," Koci said.

The work of the Tourism Commission, headed by Annabeth Willis, also has borne fruit, Koci said. He pointed out that the Light Up the Square program begun in 1991 was carried forward this past year with 64,000 miniature white lights decorating the Tyler County Courthouse and courthouse grounds during the Christmas season. "Its growth and will continue to grow. Just give us a few more years and we'll be competing with Marshall," he said, referring to the city of Marshall's massive Christmas light display.

Koci added the tourism group also hosted a visit last year by a group of 28 tour bus operators who were looking over East Texas cities with an eye toward sites for their tours to visit.

The committee supported the chamber's Christmas light display.

Born near Waco in 1933, she is the only child of Ona and Cecil Williams. She attended Waco public school, then attended Baylor University on a debate scholarship before moving to Austin and becoming a teacher.

Richards first became involved in politics in graduate school at the University of Texas and, over the years, while juggling a household of four children — Cecil, Dan, Clark and Ellen — she stayed involved, volunteering to work on local and statewide campaigns and fighting for civil rights and economic justice.

In 1976 she was recruited to run for office and defeated a three-term incumbent for a seat on the Texas County Commissioners Court at a time when, she recalls, "Texas was not noticeably hospitable to the no-

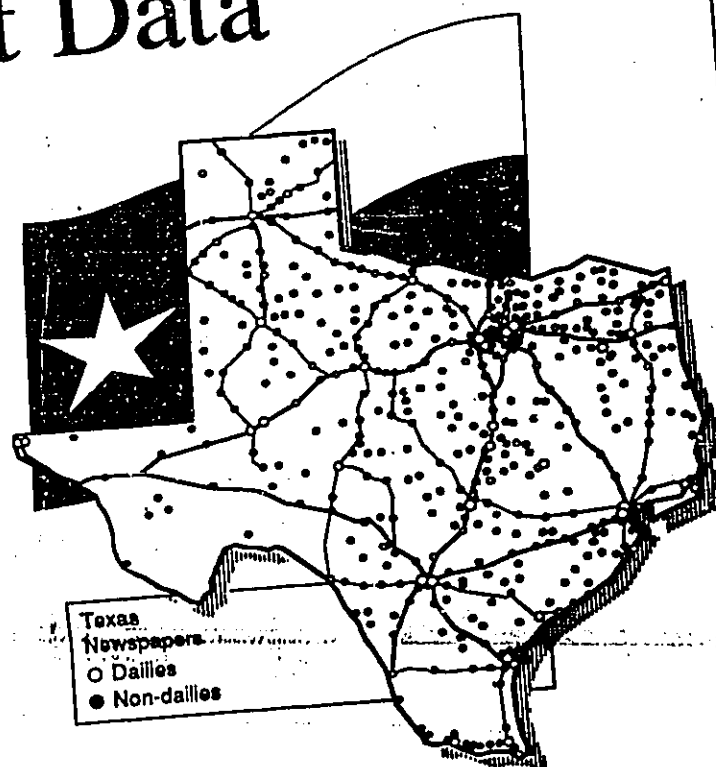

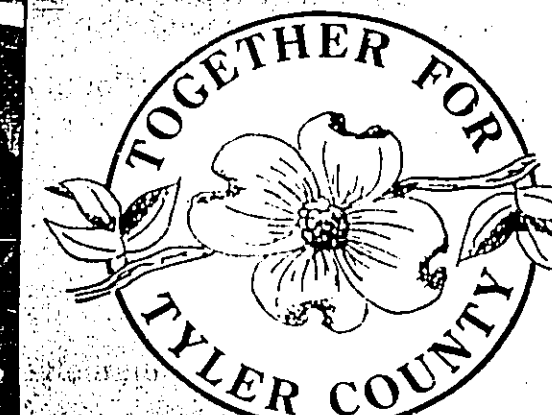

**Brookshire Brothers picked
as 1992 business of the year**

WOODVILLE — Although the award was previously announced, the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce formally recognized the Woodville Brookshire Brothers grocery store as its 1992 Business of the Year.

The store became only the fourth recipient of the honor since the chamber initiated the award. Kater Industries was the first local business to win the honor and was followed by the Woodville Independent School District and the Tyler County Hospital.

In presenting the award, Larry Phillips, DVM, explained that the business of the year is selected based on both its financial impact on Tyler County as well as its commitment to the betterment of the quality of life of those living in the area.

"Brookshire Brothers is a significant employer in Tyler County, with currently about 70 employees and an annual payroll of about \$615,000," Phillips said. "But that is only a small part of the story."

Phillips said that there are very few churches, school groups or civic organizations in the county who have not benefited in some way by the generosity of the grocery store chain. He said that by either contributing cash, goods, service or just space at the local store for fund raising projects, Brookshires has helped the people of the county with a wide range of worthy projects.

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Chamber speaker tells local leaders Controlling 'distress' key to success



WOODVILLE — Using humor to help illustrate his point, "human resources specialist" Jack Ylanitsas told members of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce that stress is not necessarily a negative influence on those striving for success in life.

Ylanitsas, founder of Success Dynamics, works as a consultant to help businesses and industry achieve their goals through better customer and employee relations as well as by encouraging managers and workers to put forth their best efforts.

Speaking during the annual chamber banquet Jan. 21, Ylanitsas kept the audience of almost 300 people laughing at his stories and jokes. He noted that one of the things he has to watch for when working with various companies is "burnout" among the employees.

"One of the things I do is to teach how to avoid burnout," he said. "Basically, burnout occurs when you're too weary to worry, too tired to be concerned."

"Burnout means indifference and apathy and one of the ways I measure what it is, for better or worse, because of the people - you, me and all of our neighbors."

Ylanitsas added that the nation, like all of the businesses across the land, can only accomplish what its people will allow it to accomplish.

"It is the people who chose to be actively involved, people who care, who make things happen."

"Have you ever noticed that in any given endeavor, 20 percent of the work is done by 80 percent of the people and 80 percent of the people get the remaining 20 percent done?" he asked.

To change these figures, Ylanitsas said that the 80 percent doing only 20 percent of the work need to receive "permanent motivation," or an inner commitment to stay with a project for as long as it takes to get the job done.

"Most people are better than they think they are," he said. "They don't honestly believe they will make a difference so their motivation is low."

The success management specialist concluded his presentation by noting that success should always be viewed as a journey, never as a destination.

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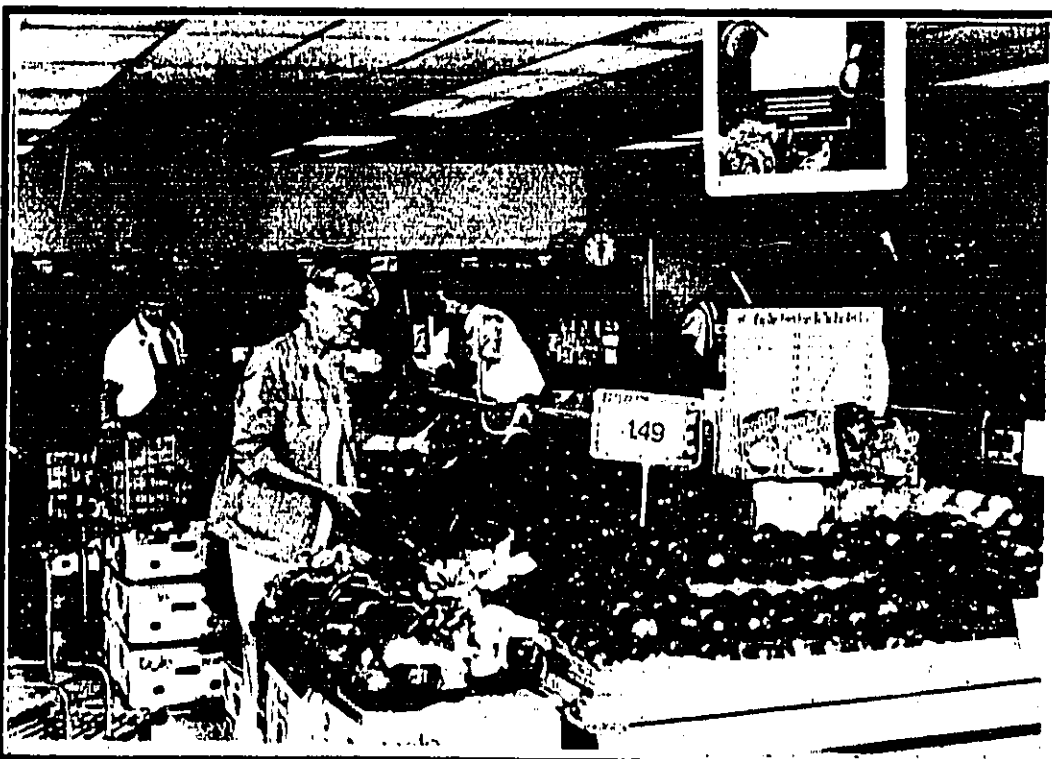
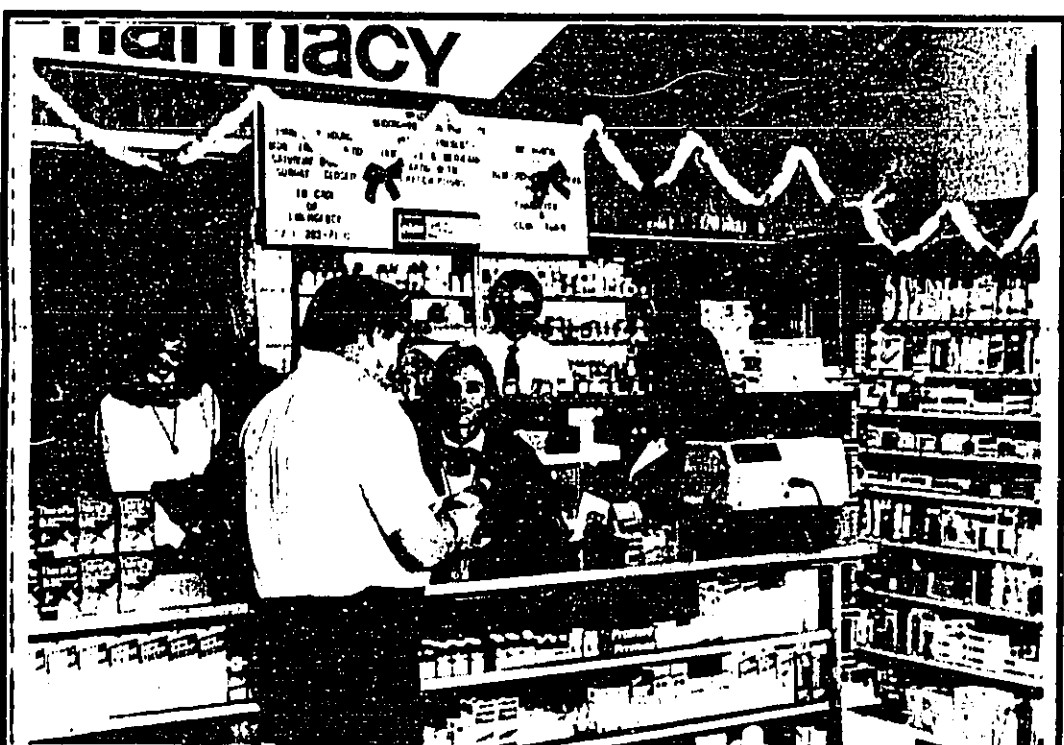
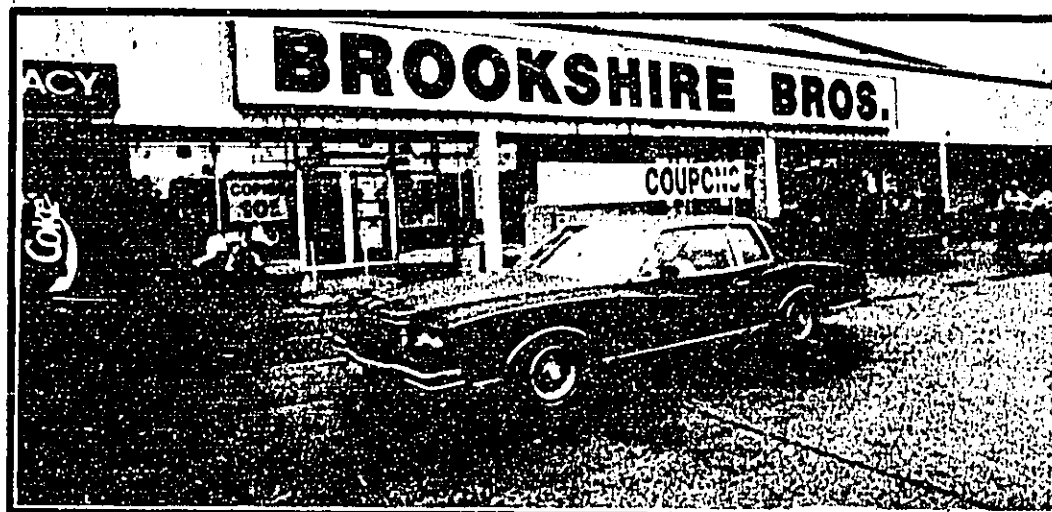

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A guide to the Tyler County Courthouse

Elected county officials are available to assist the public with questions about the day to day operation of local government in addition to helping residents obtain a marriage license, birth certificate, passport and vehicle registration. But the courthouse is often confusing and sometimes it is difficult to remember just which office handles what service. Perhaps this guide to the Tyler County Courthouse will provide some insight.

WHERE WOULD YOU—

- obtain a marriage license? The county clerk's office, located on the first floor of the Tyler County Courthouse, issues marriage licenses. Phone 283-7362.
- obtain a birth certificate? The county clerk's office maintains birth records, 283-7362.
- obtain registration for cars, trucks, motorcycles, etc.? The county tax assessor/collector issues vehicle registrations, license plates, and renewal stickers. Located in the Courthouse Annex. Phone 283-2734.
- register and obtain a title for motorboats? The county tax assessor/collector can issue registration numbers and assist with obtaining certificates of title for commercial and private motorboats.
- obtain a passport? The district clerk, located on the second floor of the Tyler County courthouse, acts as agent for the U.S. Passport Service to aid in planning for foreign travel. Phone 283-2162.
- obtain a voter registration card? The tax assessor/collector maintains all county voter registration rolls. Phone 283-2734.
- obtain a death certificate? These vital statistics are maintained by the county clerk. Phone 283-7362.
- examine the will of a deceased person? This would be among the probate papers filed in the county clerk's office.
- pay county property taxes? The tax assessor/collector maintains county tax rolls and is responsible for the collection of taxes. Phone 283-2734.
- record a deed or legal instrument related to real estate? The county clerk records documents of this nature. Phone 283-7362.
- pay a traffic ticket issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety? Contact the office of the justice of the peace listed on the citation.
- renew a driver's license? The DPS maintains a license renewal office in Tyler County Justice Center, 702 North Magnolia Street, (US 69) Woodville. Hours are 8 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 p.m. until 4:30 p.m. Wednesday through Friday. Phone 283-7757.
- visit an inmate in the county jail? The sheriff is the custodian of the jail. Inquiries as to visiting hours should be directed to the Sheriff's office, located in the Tyler County Justice Center, 702 North Magnolia Street, (US 69) Woodville. Phone 283-2172.
- obtain information on farming, gardening, or home economics? The county extension office maintains this information. Located in the

- basement of the courthouse. Phone 283-8284.
- file a complaint for criminal misconduct? The matter should be discussed with the district attorney. His office is located in the Tyler County Courthouse. Phone 283-8136.
- recover unpaid child support? The district clerk's office can assist in this area. Phone 283-2162.
- obtain institutional commitment of a mentally ill person? Contact the county judge to discuss this action. Phone 283-2141.
- file a small claim lawsuit? Such actions should be filed in the justice of the peace office in your precinct.
- seek to evict a tenant who fails to pay his rent? These matters are handled by the justice of the peace.
- report for jury duty? Report to the courtroom of court shown on the summons issued by the sheriff.
- register a cattle brand or determine who owns a certain livestock mark? The office of the county clerk will assist in this area. All livestock brands and marks must be registered in the county clerk's office and renewed every ten years.



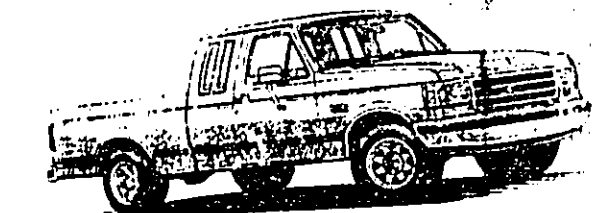

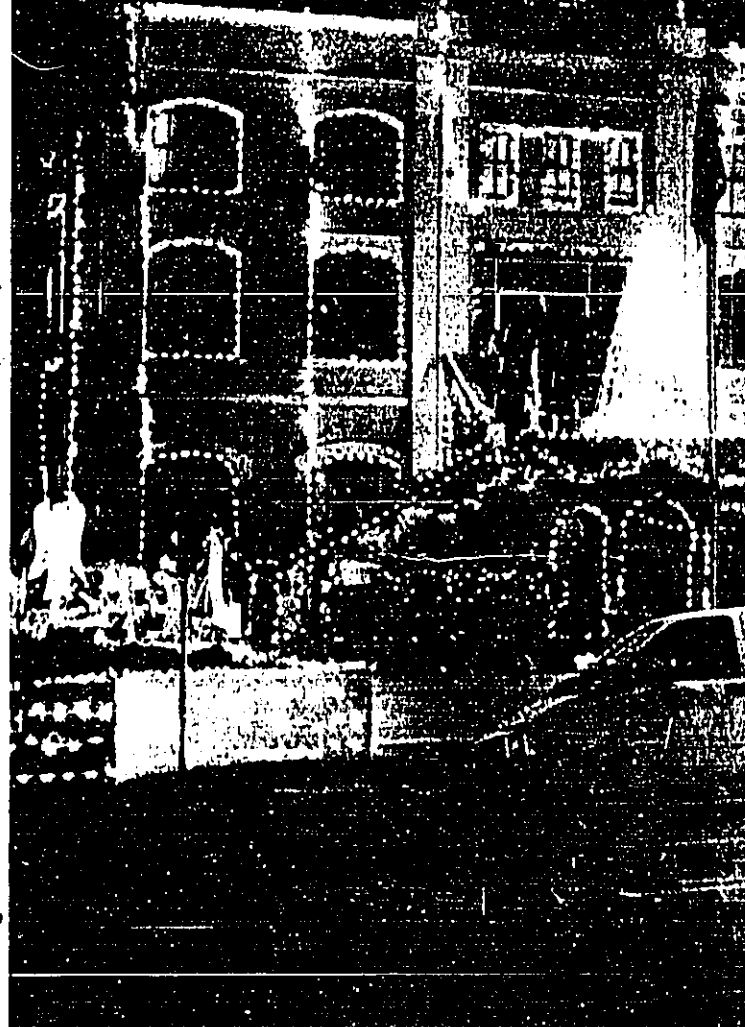
Year-round activities on Tyler County calendar

Chamber of Commerce Banquet
 The Tyler County Chamber of Commerce hosts their annual banquet in January of each year.
 At this annual event the recipients of the Citizen of the Year and Honorary Citizens of the Year awards are named. Presentations also is made to the Business of the Year.

Miss Tyler County Pageant
 The Miss Tyler County Pageant, sponsored by the Wisteria Chapter of the American Business Women Association, takes place annually in February at the Kirby Auditorium in Woodville.
 Local contestants vie in talent and beauty competitions for the Miss Tyler County title. Younger girls compete for the titles of Junior Miss Tyler County and Future Miss Tyler County.

Dogwood Festival and Pageant
 On the third weekend of March, Tyler County celebrates the annual Dogwood Festival, an event which has been going on since the mid-30's. Visitors come from everywhere to see the beauties of spring in East Texas.
 Visiting duchesses and their escorts arrive on Friday for orientation and Friday night dances.
 Saturday brings the Arts and Crafts Fair, the Antique Automobile Show, and the huge Dogwood Parade through downtown Woodville, featuring floats from all over the state.

Western Weekend
 Saturday night is the Dogwood Pageant where the Dogwood Queen is crowned and a local cast presents a pageant focusing on some portion of Tyler County history.
 The last weekend in March brings trailriders from all directions converging on Woodville as the annual Dogwood Festival continues.
 Friday night is marked by dances at the trail campsites, and Saturday brings the big parade through downtown Woodville.
 A wild west rodeo takes place at the Woodville 4-H, FFA Rodeo Arena, west of Woodville on US 190, and

 April brings the annual Woodville Garden Club Flower Show.
 Featuring different categories of arrangements and potted plants, this event is sponsored by the Woodville Garden Club.
 Tyler County Fair
 Each October Tyler Countians gather at the fairgrounds, west of Woodville near the airport, to inspect 4-H and Future Farmers of America livestock raised by local youth in addition to Future Homemakers of America events and adult events.

Village Harvest Festival
 An annual two day event on the third weekend of October, the Harvest Festival features over a hundred pioneer craft demonstrations, including spinning and weaving, candle and soap making, chuck wagon cooking, basket weaving and a Texas Army encampment.
 Special programs of music are presented throughout the Festival, all in keeping with the time-period presented at the Village.
 Boo Ye'll
 In October story tellers gather at Heritage Village and tell some of the scariest, funniest, true ghost stories and tales of the unusual and supernatural in the Big Thicket area.
 The stories are told in different locations throughout the village and guests are taken to those locations by lamp light.

Christmas Crafts Fair
 The Colmanell Extension Homemakers sponsor a Christmas Crafts Fair every year in November at the Colmanell Community Center.
 The two-day event features arts and crafts made by local artisans.
 Good Old Days Festival
 Early in November the Good Old Days Festival is held in downtown Woodville. Featuring demonstrations of old-time crafts, the event also features live entertainment, an auction, games and contests and arts and crafts.

Lighting of the Courthouse Square
 The historic Tyler County Courthouse, which celebrated its 100th birthday in 1991, welcomes the holiday season with over 64,000 miniature white lights. A project of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, in addition to the lights which draw visitors from throughout East Texas, entertainment on the Square is also scheduled throughout the holiday season.
 Christmas Tour of Homes
 Each year in December the Federated Women's Clubs of Tyler County—the Heritage Civic Club, the Women's Reading Club and the

Woman's Study Club—sponsor a home to be toured by the public during the holiday season. Funds raised from the tour goes towards local scholarships.
Festival of Lights
 At Christmas time of each year, the Tyler County Children's Services Board erects a large tree on the courthouse square and begins accepting donations for the needy children of the county.
 At the appointed hour, the tree springs to light, with each light symbolizing a donation to the fund.
Twilight Tour of Heritage Village
 Following the annual Tour of Homes in December, the Twilight Tour of Heritage Village Museum is the Tyler County Heritage Society's gift to the community.
 For this festive occasion, the Village is washed in candlelight and old-fashioned greenery, presenting an appropriate setting for a Living Nativity Scene, the reading of the Christmas Story and special programs of Christmas music.
 Hot wassail and Christmas goodies are served at the historic 1866 Tolar Cabin.
Other activities
 In addition to these annual events, the various clubs and organizations throughout Tyler County host events, like the Woodville Lions Club's annual fish fry and silent auction and their annual coed softball tournament; the Woodville Rotary Club's shrimp gumbo dinner and "all you can eat" pancake breakfast; and an assortment of chili cookoffs and potluck suppers.

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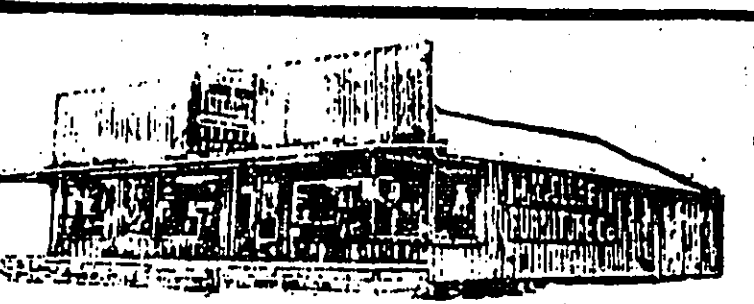

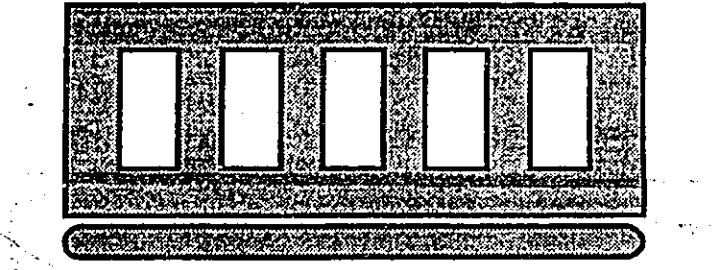

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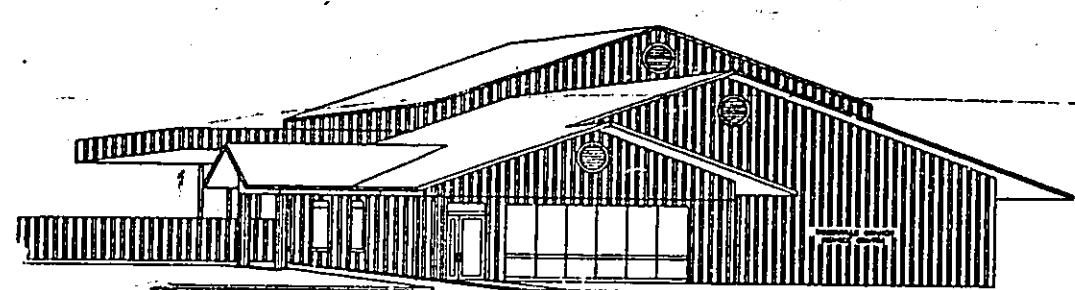

Recreational activities abound

There are limitless opportunities in Tyler County for recreation and leisure activities. For book and history lovers there is the Allan Shivers Library, an ancestral to an American statesman and former Governor of Texas and Heritage Village which features the largest collection of East Texas historical artifacts in the state.

Year-round activities include hunting and fishing at nearby Steinhagen Lake, San Rayburn Lake in Jasper County or Toledo Bend Lake in Newton County.

In March and April Woodville hosts the annual Dogwood Festival and Western Weekend. This involves many of Tyler County's citizens in preparing and decorating for a colorful historical pageant presented in the Dogwood Amphitheater.

On the weekend following the Dogwood Festival, hundreds of trailriders converge on Woodville to participate in the Western Weekend Parade and wild west rodeo.

The Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation is 15 miles from Woodville on US 190 toward Livingston. The reservation has many organized activities including the Big Thicket Tour, Heritage Village, located just west of Woodville, offers tours of a Pioneer Village. Meals, served boarding house style, are available in the Pickett House.

Steinhagen Lake
The 16,830-acre Steinhagen Lake, operated by the lower Neches Valley Authority and the US Corp of Engineers, is a major source of water for recreational purposes. Food, boat rental, tackle, bait, etc. are available at or near the lake.

Lake Tejas
A two-acre, roped-off swimming area is the main attraction of this summer favorite, ten-acre Lake Tejas. Located one mile east of Colmesneil on FM 256, the lake is owned and operated by the Colmesneil Independent School District.

A concession stand with short orders is available as well as camping and picnic facilities. Open June through Labor Day.

Allan Shivers Museum and Library
In 1963, former Governor and Mrs. Allan Shivers purchased the Robert Cruse house, built in 1881. It was moved to its present location in Woodville to serve as a museum for the collection and display mementos

Heritage Village
In the early 1950's, ceramic artist Clyde Gray began a living museum of pioneer life, Heritage Village. Recently purchased by the Tyler County Heritage Society, the village now features the largest collection of East Texas artifacts on display in the state.

The Big Thicket
An amazing array of flora and fauna, which once covered more than three million acres of East Texas is now under the control of the National Park Service which maintains an 84,000-acre Big Thicket National Preserve. The Preserve consists of a number of "units", each an ecological pocket of compatible birds, animals and rare plant life.

Woodville, "The Northern Gateway to the Big Thicket," has excellent accommodations and is the logical location to headquarter for excursions into the famed Thicket. Park Rangers at the Preserve conduct a large variety of programs throughout the year including activities for children and adults. A naturalist Activities Calendar is published listing the scheduled programs and may be obtained by contacting the Big Thicket National Preserve at 3785 Millam, Beaumont, Texas 77701 or phone (409) 839-2689.

In addition to several hiking trails, float trips, canoe trips, nature cruises, workshops on birds, wild flowers, photography, and trees and shrubs, wild food forays and map and compass classes are available. Many of the trails are wheelchair accessible and arrangements can be made to guide or provide activities for groups with special requirements.

Shiver's gubernatorial service. Adjoining the museum is a completely equipped library. The library circulates over 65,000 volumes annually including books and audiovisual material and handled 20,706 inquiries. These statistics are based on the 1987 report submitted to the Texas State Library.

PHYSICIANS
Tyler County is served by seven general and family practitioners. Additional services are provided by visiting physicians at Tyler County Hospital.

TYLER COUNTY HOSPITAL
The Tyler County Hospital provides major health care for local residents. It is equipped with modern equipment and is upgraded continuously. It is a 48 bed facility and features a heli-port for use by air ambulances.

RECENT RENOVATIONS
Recent renovations at the hospital include the expansion of the emergency room facilities and laparoscopic surgery equipment.

NURSING HOMES
The county is served by three nursing homes in Woodville—Dogwood Trails Manor, Holiday Pines Manor and Woodville Convalescent Center.

REHABILITATION CENTER
The Rehabilitation Center, associated with Tyler County Hospital, offers physical, speech and occupational therapy. The center accepts Medicare, private insurance and, in some situations, Medicaid.

HOME HEALTH CARE
In Home medical specialist provide medical care by RN's and LVN's upon doctor's orders. They accept Medicare, Medicaid and private insurance.

CONCEPTS OF CARE
Concepts of Care offers housekeeping and LVN care for the home-bound elderly.

OTHER MEDICAL SERVICES
The county is served by four dentists in Woodville and one dentist in Colmesneil. Services of an optometrist are also available along with the full time services of an optician. Woodville also has a chiropractic clinic and four pharmacies.

AGING COMMITTEE
The Aging Committee of Tyler County is concerned with all factors involved in aging. These encompass financial needs, adequate housing, utilization of free time, community support, information and education, mental and physical health, and proper nutrition.

MINI-BUS PROGRAM
The mini-bus program started in 1974 and provides an opportunity for the elderly and disabled to get to Woodville, the county seat, to conduct their business. The bus visits every section of the county on a weekly basis. Phone 283-5517.

SENIOR EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM
This service provides the Human Services Center with numerous part-time employees who help with the mini-bus program, act as escorts and provide telephone outreach and clerical assistance in the office. 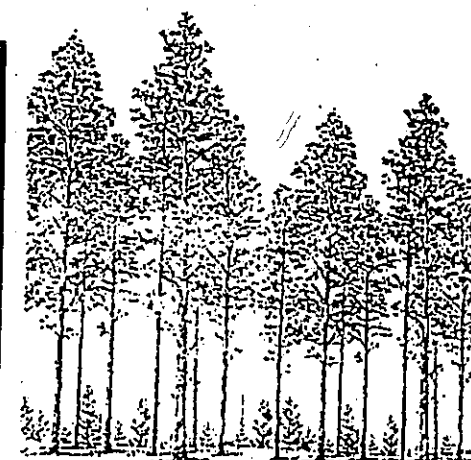

County has long, varied history

Tyler County's history is long and varied. The trail, road would be a misleading term, from Nacoochees to Anahuac and the Spanish mission at Oroquieta led through Tyler County, crossing the Neches at the site where Fort Teran would later be located.

Indians, Spanish troops and missionaries and invading filibusters from the United States, passed down this trail even before Stephen F. Austin began organizing his colony in 1820.

In 1830 Fort Teran was built and manned by Spanish soldiers. It remained in Texas, supported by keeping out further Anglo settlement, until 1835 when all Spanish forces were encouraged to leave by the local volunteer forces.

By 1830, settlers were granted land rights in what is now Tyler County. Wyatt Hankins of Tyler County, Bluff from 1832 and began operating a ferry there. Gradually settlers spread up and down the Neches bottomland, farming cotton. Tyler County men served at San Jacinto and with Captain Sherman's band of Lajper Volunteers.

After the Texas Revolution, settlement increased steadily with Town Bluff as the major population center in the county.

In 1841, a larger area, of which Tyler County is now a part, was created as the second District by an act of the Texas Congress. Tyler County was originally created however for judicial purposes only and the courts of the Republic held that a county so created was unconstitutional. After a few months operation, with Town Bluff as the county seat, the county organization was abandoned.

In 1846 the Texas Legislature created the county again, with a reduced area, giving it the name of Tyler in honor of then-President of the United States, John Tyler. This bill named six commissioners to select two or more sites to be voted upon for the county seat. Dr. Josiah Hood's survey at the present site of Woodville, in the forks of Turkey Creek was selected for the county seat.

The new townsite was surveyed and laid out according to lots and blocks. The names of men and places of that era are preserved in the name of the town and its principal streets. George T. Wood was the senator and N.B. Charlton was the member of the house that passed the bill creating the county. The town was named Woodville for the senator and the street immediately west of the courthouse was named Wheat Street in honor of the good doctor whose survey was selected for the county seat. The street

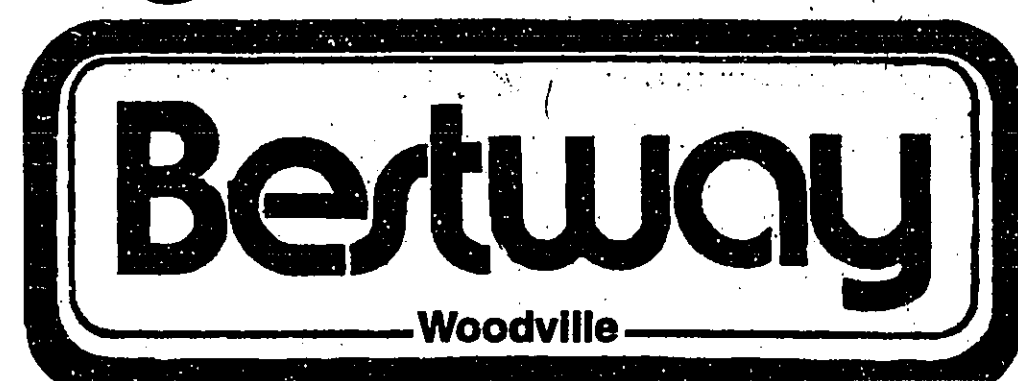
