## Homemakers Hint Care need in handling spring foods

The colored Easter eggs, the smell of broiled mutton, the smoky flavor of ham remind me of spring. The special foods we savor. But what we also need to remember is that these special foods also need proper handling.

Spring foods are full of life and meat, poultry and eggs can be the source of bacteria that cause food-borne illness, such as salmonella. Follow these tips for safe handling.

There are a variety of hams on the market today, so it is important to read the label to know how to handle and cook whatever you buy. For example, some canned hams are shelf-stable, meaning they do not need to be refrigerated. But some canned hams do need to be refrigerated. Most lamb purchased for Easter is labeled "spring lamb" or "genuine spring lamb." The term "spring" does not necessarily refer to the season the lamb was born, but to its age (less than a year old) when purchased.

When purchased, a lamb is covered with a waxy whitish membrane called the "fleece" which should be removed before cooking. Lower temperatures may not kill bacteria present in the food.

Another important factor in keeping food safe is thorough cooking. All perishable foods must reach an internal temperature high enough to kill bacteria.

Cold foods can be arranged on platters ahead of time and served directly

## \* Polls open for early voting

Under this measure, school districts would not be required to implement items mandated by the state legislature unless the state fully funds the cost of the program or unless the measure is approved by at least two-thirds of the members of both houses of the legislature.

Proposition Number 3: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities and repaying the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."

This amendment would repeal a previous amendment authorizing the state to finance up to \$750 million in school district and education bonds using the permanent school fund as a guarantee of those bonds. Instead, a like amount of money would be issued in state revenue bonds to make loans to, or purchase bonds from school districts for the acquisition, construction or improvement of instructional facilities, including furnishing.

This measure also would allow the state to forgive payment of principal and interest on any part of loans made to school districts to construct new facilities.

City of Woodville  
Early voting and election day voting in the Woodville city election will take place at the Woodville City Hall, 113 N. Charlton. Early voting will run from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., weekdays through April 27 and election day voting will run from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on April 28.

Applications for mail ballots may be submitted to Donald W. Shaw, P.O. Box 317, Woodville, Texas 75797. The deadline for requesting a mail ballot is close of business on April 23.

Only three incumbent council members are seeking the three at-large positions. Those in the race, in the order they will appear on the ballot, include Larry Phillips, Ken Weaver and Tom Kinney.

All three posts carry two-year terms.

City of Colmesneil  
Colmesneil City Hall will be the site for early voting with polls open from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Election day voting will run from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and will be held at the Colmesneil Service Club.

City of Chester  
Early voting in the Chester city races will be held from 8 a.m. to noon at the city hall. On May 1, the polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., also at the city hall.

Chester residents are being asked to fill three city posts, including that of mayor and two at-large council seats and during the election, they will be asked to fill the city posts.

Mayor Bryan Davis is being challenged in his bid for a third two-year term while incumbent member Vonda Tolar and Kris Moore are running unopposed for two-year, at-large council seats.

Incumbent Councilman Louie Thompson did not seek another term.

## \* I-69 plan outlined

The benefits of international commerce. They see I-69 as a direct route to a greatly expanded economic future.

If the area wins final inclusion in the proposed corridor, it would anchor local business and industry to the benefits expected from the North American Trade Agreement, which proposes to eliminate barriers to international trade between the U.S., Canada and Mexico.

Supporters believe I-69, which already links Michigan to Canada, would provide a direct north-south route across the United States, creating a Canada-to-Mexico artery that would provide economic development opportunities all along the route. Economic gains would begin with construction of the interstate highway itself, creating jobs. Next would come the expansion of existing businesses and industries and the attraction of new ones to locate near the interstate.

The seven states involved in efforts to make I-69 a reality are Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas, Tennessee, Kentucky and Indiana.

Efforts are currently underway in Louisiana to switch the proposed route from East Texas, moving I-69 through Louisiana to connect with Interstate 10 for a westward run to Houston.

As it now stands, I-69 would be extended from Indianapolis to Memphis and on to Greenville, Miss. From there it would cut across northward to Nacogdoches, then generally follow U.S. 59 south through Lufkin,

## Bank of East Texas merger completed

CHESTER — Surety Capital Corporation (Surety) announced last week that it has completed the merger of the Bank of East Texas, located in Woodville, and the First State Bank into Texas Bank, National Association ("Texas Bank").

With the completion of these mergers, Texas Bank will have increased its asset size by approximately 60 percent. As of February 28, 1993, the Bank of East Texas had assets of \$8,355,902 and the First State Bank had assets of \$11,510,263. The newly merged bank will have four full service banking locations in Lufkin, Chester, Jacks, chairman of the Board of Surety, stated: "The mergers of the Bank of East Texas and the First State Bank into Texas Bank represent the first step in Surety's plan to increase its asset base. The completion of these mergers, along with the recently reported positive operating results for 1992, demonstrate Surety's growth and profitability potential."

Transplant donations sought  
WOODVILLE — Donations to help cover the \$100,000 cost of a bone marrow transplant for Jeanne Hayes have been established by the Community Bank and Citicorp State Bank in Woodville.

David Sowell, a friend of Hayes and her family, established the funds Monday in an effort to help the Woodville woman prepare for the transplant procedure.

She is scheduled to undergo testing on Monday, April 12, at M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston. A surgical procedure is then scheduled April 15 during which her doctors plan to harvest bone marrow for later transplant.

Two days later, Hayes is scheduled to undergo extensive chemotherapy lasting about six days to treat cancer.

"She'll come home for 21 days and then return to M.D. Anderson for another round of chemo treatment lasting six days," Sowell said.

The medical plan of attack call for Hayes to undergo additional chemotherapy and total body radiation treatment prior to the transplant procedure, which is scheduled to begin sometime in late May. After the transplant, she will have to be kept in a protective environment for four to six weeks.

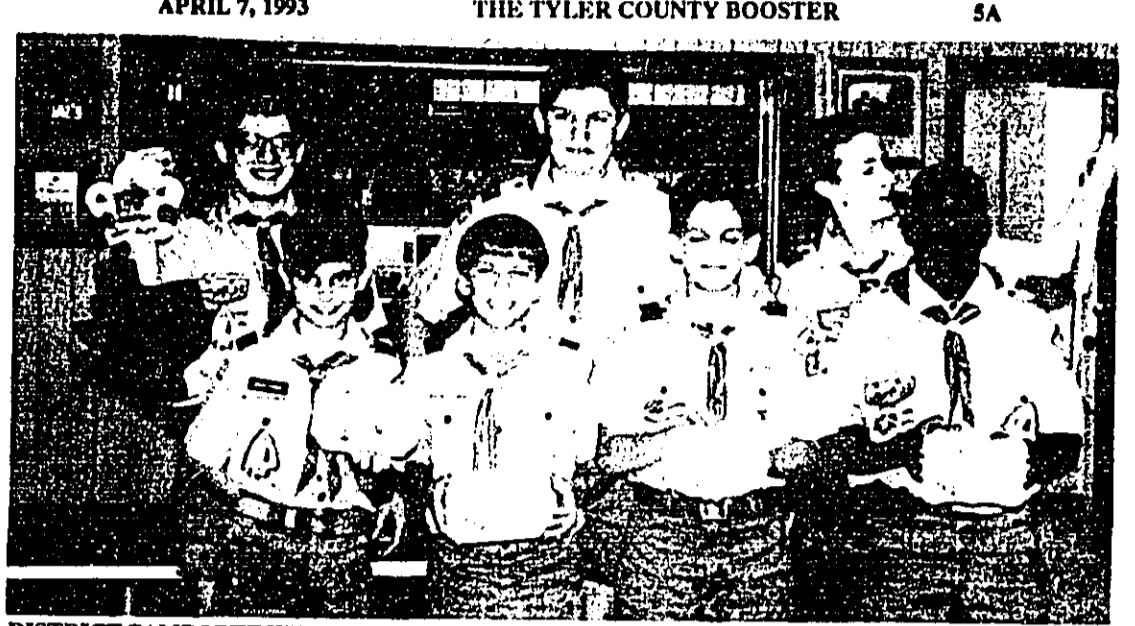

Areas (MSAs) saw a drop in February unemployment, except Houston and Wichita Falls. Unemployment rates in those two MSAs remained at the January level. Texas' lowest MSA unemployment rates were in Bryan-College Station at 4.2 percent, Austin at 5.0 percent and Amarillo at 5.9 percent.

The state's highest unemployment rates were in the South Texas MSAs. The McAllen-Edinburg-Missions MSA had a 18 percent jobless rate, followed by Brownsville-Harlingen at 13 percent and Beaumont-Port Arthur at 11.8 percent.

"I think I speak for everyone in the Texas labor market when I say this is a welcomed information. TEC Chairman Eddie Cavazos said in announcing the new rate, "This time last year, the rate was slightly lower, but we're thankful the joblessness number declined from last month's rate."

The number of Texans with jobs rose slightly during February, totaling 7,960,100. More than 28,000 jobs were created between January and February with the largest growth occurring in the government sector.

"Staffing in schools and colleges for the upcoming semester created many government jobs," Cavazos said. "Other moderate employment increases occurred in services, construction and transportation and public utilities."

Job losses occurred in the retail trade and mining sectors.

"Retail has been losing jobs, mainly due to 'after Christmas' reductions in staff," Cavazos added. "Job loss in that industry should begin to slow down."

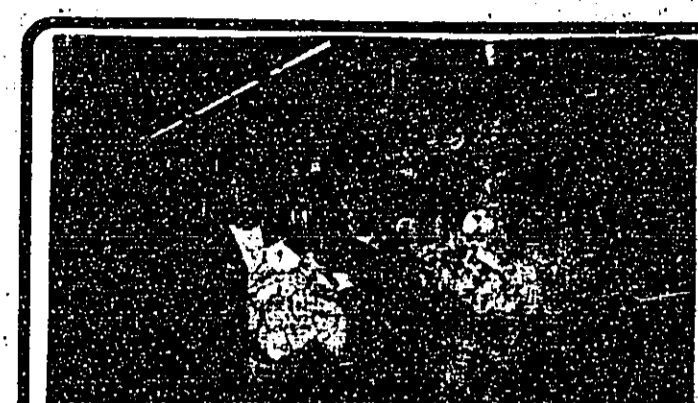

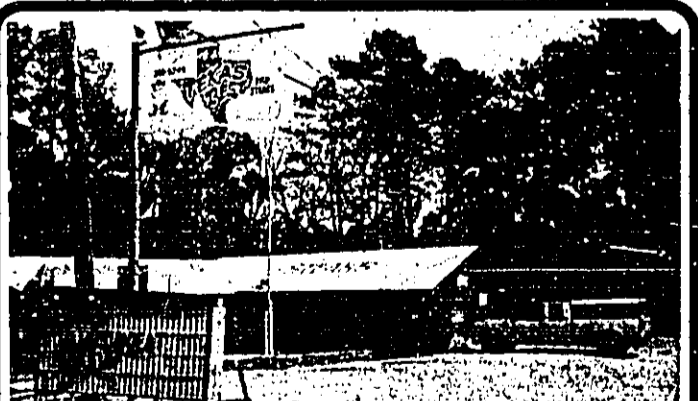

Riley Funeral Home in Nederland with burial in Oak Hill Memorial Park in Fort Neches.

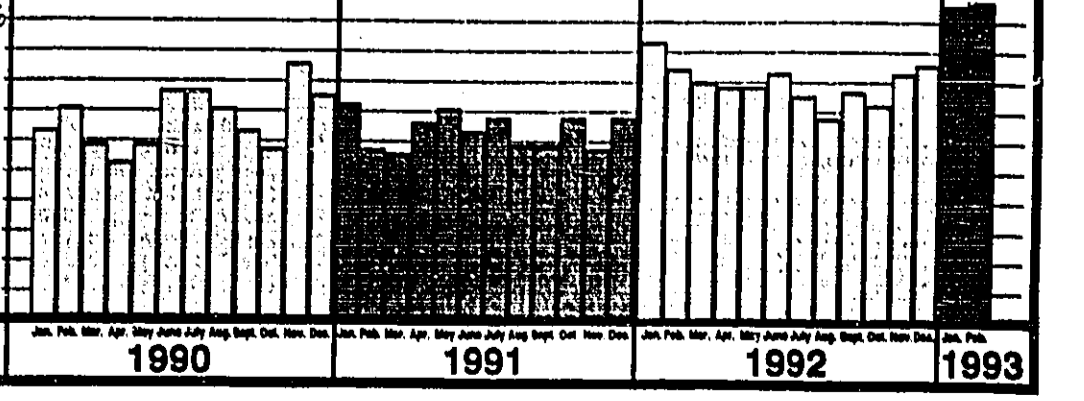
## Region targeted for bus service

**COLDSPRING** - Bus service for Tyler and surrounding counties in the Deep East Texas Council of Governments (DETCOG) could be a reality early next year, bring with it a \$2 million regional budget and 81 new jobs. Speaking during a luncheon meeting of DETCOG held recently in Coldspring, Brazos Transit System Administrator John McBeth said operable bus systems could be in operation in all 12 of DETCOG's counties by as early as January, 1994. Federal funds totaling \$10 million for the first phase of the transit system were released March 31 and counties included in the first round of funding are Angellina, Nacogdoches, Walker, Liberty and Titus. Tyler County is among the counties listed under the second \$10 million in federal funds to be released by June 30. Other DETCOG counties included in the second round are Polk, San Jacinto, Houston, Jasper, Newton, Trinity, Chamber, Cherokee, Sabine and San Augustine. A total of 110 buses will be distributed among the counties using the transit system, along with local spending program and new jobs, McBeth said. Tyler County is scheduled to get four buses and a \$200,000 budget. The local matching share of this will be \$20,000, which Tyler County Judge Jerome Owens noted would probably be allocated by the county commissioners and the Woodville City Council. Although the commissioners have given tentative approval to the bus plan, Owens noted that local funds have not yet been approved. "Basically, I believe we're waiting to see what the final plan will be. We're still waiting for them to determine the bus routes," he added. Owens noted that when placed in operation, the rural transit system will link the various Tyler County communities with a number of other East Texas cities such as Lufkin, Huntsville and Beaumont. "In addition, the system will eventually take local residents as far as Houston and Galveston, the judge said. "The Brazos Transit System has recognized nationwide for its ability to operate this type of system," Owens noted. "We feel fortunate that we're coming on board with a system that has proven to be of such benefit to the communities they serve." According to McBeth, county residents using the transit system will be picked up at their door, based on reservations and transported to business facilities or private homes anywhere within the DETCOG region. Transportation also will be provided to major medical facilities, such as those in Houston and Galveston. Cost to the users will be \$1.75 for a one-way trip within the region. To travel city-to-city in the same county, the cost will be \$1, or 50 cents to travel to the city itself. Senior citizens will be 25 cents, he said. Buses will operate between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and on weekends during the Christmas holidays. Public hearings will begin in the next two to three months to establish routes and schedules, McBeth said. The company, with offices in Huntsville and Bryan, already serves 92 communities in the Brazos Valley Region and four surrounding counties. Participating cities and counties in the DETCOG region will have choice of using business with regular bus styles or trolley cars. Each will operate on natural gas, McBeth said. DETCOG officers named in other business during the DETCOG meeting, Polk County Judge John Thompson was elected as county president for the 1993-94 year. Owens noted that when placed in operation, the rural transit system will link the various Tyler County communities with a number of other East Texas cities such as Lufkin, Huntsville and Beaumont. Public hearings will begin in the next two to three months to establish routes and schedules, McBeth said. The company, with offices in Huntsville and Bryan, already serves 92 communities in the Brazos Valley Region and four surrounding counties. Participating cities and counties in the DETCOG region will have choice of using business with regular bus styles or trolley cars. Each will operate on natural gas, McBeth said.

## Jobless rate continues to climb

**WOODVILLE** - Although increasing only slightly during February, Tyler County's unemployment rate remained well above the 10 percent mark for the second consecutive month. This marked only the second time in over 3.5 years that the local monthly jobless rate remained in double digits. Prior to January, the last time the local rate rose to 10 percent or more was in June 1989 when the county's unemployment figure was listed as exactly 10 percent. According to figures released by the Texas Employment Commission, the February rate - the latest currently available - rose to 10.7 percent, up from January's 10.6 percent. One month before that, the December, 1992 rate stood at 8.6 percent. The last time the local rate was higher than the current 10.7 percent mark was in April 1989 when it stood at 11.1 percent. The 2 percent jump in January was attributed to a variety of factors, including weather and the seasonal, after-Christmas layoff of holiday employees. TEC officials noted that unemployment figures for January and June are the months with the highest unemployment rates. June rates normally rise as high school and college students begin looking for summer work. While the employment news in Tyler County did not improve in February, statewide things were brighter with the rate falling from 8.4 percent in January to 8.1 percent in February. The latest jobless rate also is well above other recent months and is still well above the previous record three-year high of 7.4 percent recorded in January, 1992. The latest figure also is 2.1 percent higher than the 8.6 percent recorded in January, 1992. See JOBLESS, pg. 3A

### Homemakers Hints Care need in handling spring foods

Country Easter eggs, H.F.E. brislet roasting, the smoky flavor of ham remind us of spring and the special occasions that come with it. When purchased, lamb is covered with a papery white membrane called the fat, which should be removed before cooking. Use a sharp knife to cut away the fat to make the flavor of the meat strong.

All meat and poultry should be cooked in an oven set at no lower than 225 degrees F. Lower temperatures may not kill bacteria present in the food.

Another important factor in keeping meat safe is thorough cooking. Acceptable temperatures must reach an internal temperature high enough to kill bacteria. Cold foods can be served on platters ahead of time and arranged directly from the refrigerator.

## \* Polls open for early voting

Under this measure, school districts would not be required to implement plans mandated by the state legislature unless the state fully funds the cost of the program or unless the measure is approved by at least two-thirds of the members of both houses of the legislature.

**Proposition Number 3:** "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to school districts for partially financing facilities and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."

This amendment would repeal a previous amendment, shortizing the state to finance up to \$750 million in school district and education bonds using the state's general obligation bonds. The measure also would allow the state to forgive payment of principal and interest on all or part of loans made to school districts to construct facilities.

## Transplant donations sought

WOODVILLE — Donations to help cover the \$100,000 cost of a bone marrow transplant for Jeanne Hayes have been established by Community Bank and Citizens State Bank in Woodville.

David Sowell, a friend of Hayes and her family, established the fund Monday in an effort to help the Woodville woman prepare for the transplant procedure.

She is scheduled to undergo testing on Monday, April 12, at M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston. A surgical procedure is scheduled for April 15 during which her doctors plan to harvest bone marrow for later transplant.

Two days later, Hayes is scheduled to undergo extensive chemotherapy lasting about six days to treat cancer.

She'll come home for 21 days and then return to M.D. Anderson for another round of chemotherapy lasting six days, Sowell said. The medical plan of attack called for Hayes to undergo additional chemotherapy and total body radiation prior to the transplant procedure, which is scheduled to begin sometime in late May. After the transplant, she will have to be kept in a protective environment for four to six weeks.

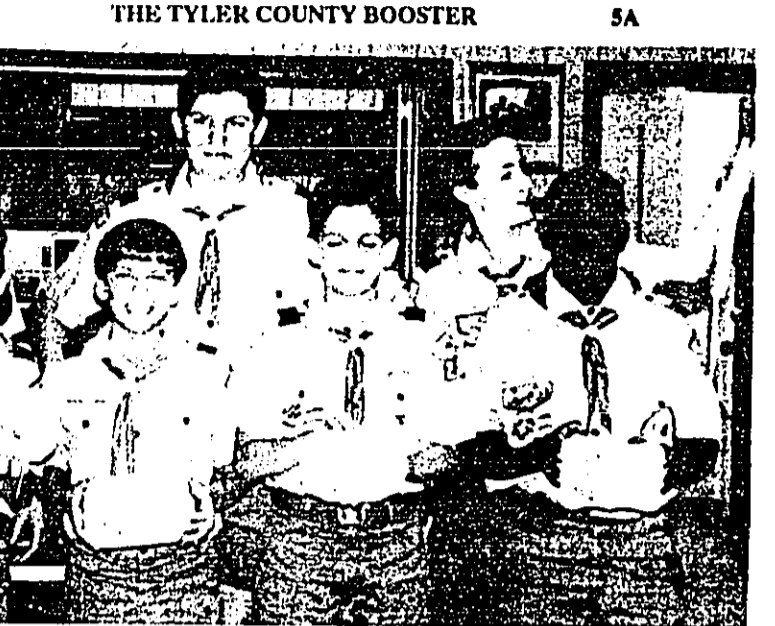

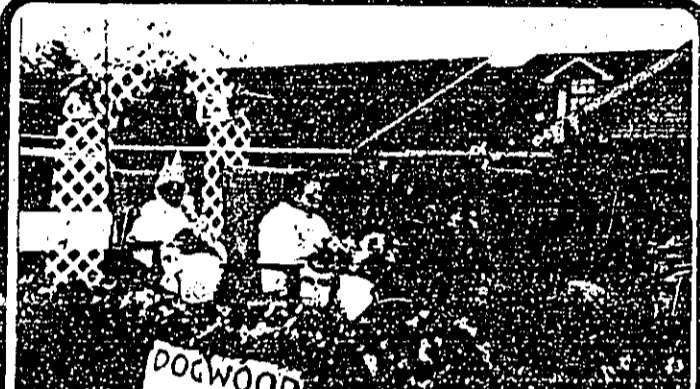

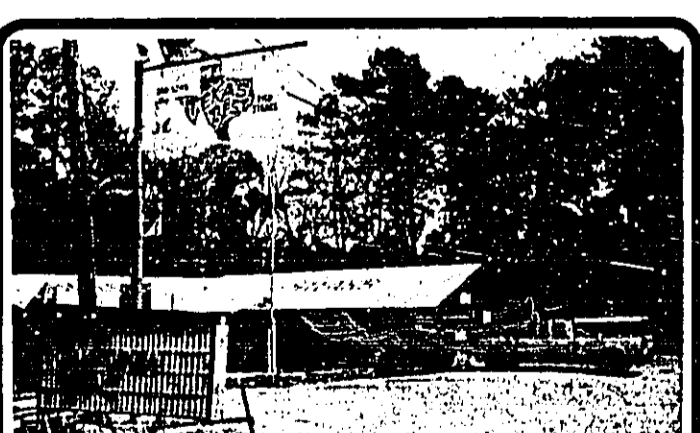
