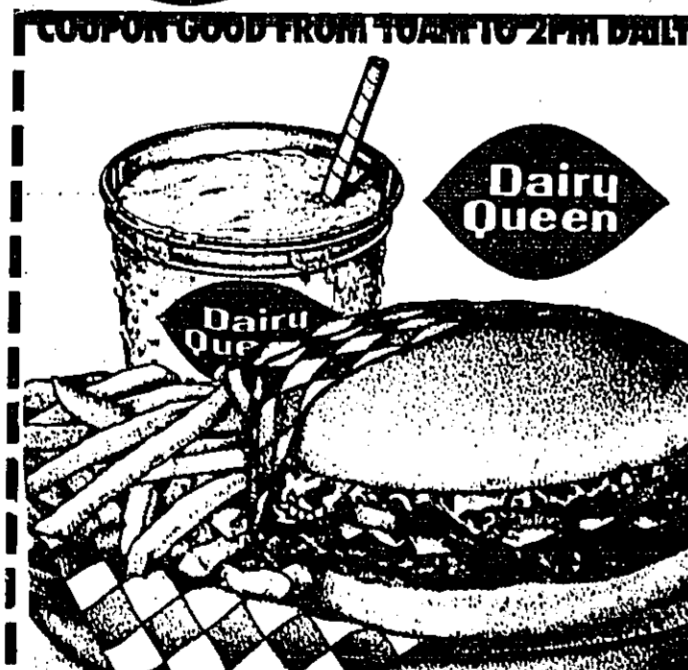

## Accident claims life of Town Bluff child

TOWN BLUFF — A 22-month-old child was pronounced dead at Tyler County Hospital in Woodville last week after a pickup truck accidentally ran over him at his residence near Town Bluff.

Kurt Nelson Lot Jr., son of Kurt and Amanda Lot of 114 Wayward Winds, Ponderosa Gardens subdivision, was pronounced dead at 7:09 p.m. Wednesday, May 12, following the mishap. According to a report filed by Tyler County Deputy Sheriff James Chapman, the accident occurred about 5:45 p.m. while the child was playing in the yard of his family's home. The pickup truck involved in the mishap was driven by Jason Woody Thompson, 21, of Clarks, La.

Thompson told investigators he was leaving Sims TV service, located beside the Lott residence, when he stopped the pickup on a slight incline of the driveway. He said the pickup rolled backward slightly after he stopped and that when he began to drive forward again, he felt something under the vehicle's tires and stopped to investigate. Upon exiting from the pickup, the driver discovered the injured child.

The child was rushed by Eastex Ambulance Service to Tyler County Hospital where he subsequently died as a result of head and other injuries. Following Chapman's investigation, Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace John Ed Hanks ruled the death accidental and no criminal charges are expected to be filed in connection with the incident.

Funeral services for the child were held at 10 a.m. Friday, May 14, at Lakeside Apostolic Church in Town Bluff.

## Hill climbing is way of life -Amputee rollerblades through Tyler County-



WOODVILLE — Like the rolling hills of East Texas, life for Casey Pieretti has been a series of major ups and downs. And while many in his position would retire from an active life, this 26-year-old amputee has rejected an idle lifestyle and instead is rollerblading across the United States.

The Santa Barbara, Calif., man and his "Blade Across America" team reached Woodville Monday evening, completing about 1,800 of the 3,100 miles, 13-state trek which began April 4 in San Diego. The goal is to reach Washington, D.C. by late June, raising both money for and public awareness of the need for a national limb bank for children.

Pieretti and his rollerblading partner, Joel Bott, hope to raise \$3 million during their cross-nation journey, mostly from corporate donations and through pledges of penny miles generated by school children throughout the United States.

Any assistance offered to the team on their journey also is being welcomed.

"Gifts of food, beverages and places to stay are a big help and, I have to say, have become more and more common as we make our way across Texas," Bott said. "Quite a few people in recent days have come forward to offer us refreshments and it is really appreciated."

While Pieretti and Bott are traveling the entire way on rollerblades — a cross between ice and roller skates with four wheels all in-line — they are accompanied by a motor home pulling an equipment trailer. Television producer-director Alrick Alrick and Frank Spencer make up the skating team's support crew.

"We're making the trip on a financial shoestring," Pieretti noted. "The motor home is being donated as is much of our supplies. The money that we raise goes for the national limb bank."

## Four sentenced to prison

WOODVILLE — Four people were handed prison terms while nine others were placed on probation during hearings Friday held before District Judge Monie Lewis in the Tyler County Courthouse in Woodville.

Kenneth Leach of Louisiana was sentenced to four concurrent 40-year prison terms in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice after he entered guilty pleas to four burglary of a habitation charges. In addition, four \$2,500 fines were levied as part of their investment.

## Rural job opportunities being sought for Texas -Ag commissioner urges local leaders to back November bond issue-

WOODVILLE — Labelling an expansion of the Texas Agricultural Financing Authority a boon to rural job opportunities, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Rick Perry was in Woodville last week seeking grass-roots support for an additional \$100 million in program funds.

Perry, who has served as the ag commissioner since January 1991, said the TAFE program is providing a major economic boost to rural communities throughout the state and is providing Texas taxpayers with major returns on their investment.

The program was first authorized by a 1989 constitutional amendment to use \$25 million in state general obligation bonds to provide loans to help develop "value-added processing projects" in rural areas of the state.

During a speech to the Woodville Lions Club on May 13, Perry noted that voters will be asked in November to approve an additional \$100 million for the program. He asked local leaders to help spread the word about the need for the money.

Perry noted the TAFE program loans are used to help private businesses build or expand plants which process the state's raw agricultural products. "Texas leads the nation in the production of cotton, wool, mohair, beef

and leather but we only process 8 percent of these products within the state," Perry noted. "Ninety-two percent of our raw products get shipped out of Texas and get processed somewhere else in the world."

Because of this, the state's agricultural economy is not as strong as it should be because each step in product goes through during processing both enhances the value of that product and provides needed jobs.

"We just didn't export our cotton over the last 40 years, we exported our children's jobs and with it our children," Perry said.

Pointing to the cotton shirt he was wearing during his speech, Perry said that a West Texas farmer was paid between 50 to 55 cents per pound for the raw cotton.

"And yet, by the time it got to the mill in Austin where my wife purchased it, the shirt was worth between \$28-29 per pound. That is what we're getting up by sending all of our raw products out-of-state — the difference between 55 cents and \$29."

A native of Haskell County in West Texas, Perry noted that in 1950, his home county had a population of over 13,000, most of whom lived and worked on family farms and ranches. "Every family had an average of 230 acres and raised an average of 3 to 4 children. Everyone in the county lived a sustainable lifestyle — in fact, a very good lifestyle."

"By 1990, the population of the county was only 6,000-plus — a 50 percent decrease in population over that 40-year period," Perry noted.

The ag commissioner added that many other rural counties experienced as much if not more of a decline as the "great migration" swept jobs and people from the rural areas of the state to the fast growing cities.

"In 1950, 80 percent of the people in the state lived in rural areas and only 20 percent lived in cities. Today, it is a mirror image of that with 20 percent living in the rural areas and 80 percent in cities," he said.

Perry noted one of the main reasons for the change was that the state's leaders did not have enough vision back in the 1950s to take steps to develop rural job opportunities.

The TAFE program is one of the ways that the state is working to change that today.

"The initial \$25 million (in TAFE bonds) is a relatively small amount when you look at the overall state budget, but it has been used to help fund 32 different projects across the state," he said.

Over the last 18 months, the money has been loaned out in various amounts ranging from \$76,000 up to a maximum of \$2 million. "The average amount is about \$750,000," he added.

Any business is eligible to apply for a loan as long as they will be processing food or fiber products. Loans made thus far have funded operations such as a cotton processing plant in West Texas and a realty operation in the Corpus Christi area. Perry added that one of the \$2 million

favorite with visitors of all ages. And being the good member that she is, Clara is encouraging her Spurgen friends to share the good times with her.

And so a tour and a brown lunch in the poll barn brought these ladies a bit closer to an understanding of what's really happening at the Village.

History please. Once in the Museum Store, they were glad to have the time to browse while we attended to other matters, like the needs of one Bruce Pedigo of Kansas.

Mr. Pedigo, who was on his way to Louisiana, was looking for any information we had to add to his already sizeable file on the Pedigo family.

What he had, of course, dealt mainly with the family of A.B. and Julia Pedigo, who migrated to Texas from Virginia in 1873. After a stop over in Hardin County, they moved north and bought a large tract on top of the hill that still bears their name. In 1884

they built the old grandmansion, the Warner Holland House that sat on the shores of the Neches River and had it pulled by oxen up the steep hill, where it still stands today, the gathering place for Pedigo Family reunions.

liam Travis Hooker of Houston, whose family goes back to the John Henry Kirby days. He said his grandfather, also William Travis Hooker, was supposed to have been in partnership with Kirby in his first Lumber Company. Nowhere in our files could we find a mention of this or his grandfather, who married Mary Alice Burch. His brother Jim married another of the Burch girls. John Henry's sister Aurelia, born in 1834, married a Sam Houston Burnett. Was he a brother of these girls? Were they all offspring of the famous Valentine Burch, born in 1817? We don't seem to have much on either of these families, either in the Census or Cemetery records or "Sketches of Tyler County." There was a Samuel Burch listed in the 1870 census, but he wasn't born until 1861. It is a puzzle.

And then there's Paul Walker, who brought his cousin, Willie, to the Village to see what they could find about a saw mill town known as Leah.

They found it on an old county map on Sugar Creek, at a siding of the Southern Pacific Railroad between Compton and Rockland. According to Paul, there was a water tower at this spot, where the steam engines could take on water. The man who pumped that water

boarded with Paul's great grandfather, Dr. Pickering, who had a farm there. They also found the location of the Sand Hill Cemetery, where Dr. Pickering's daughter, Mittie, who was Paul's grandmother, was buried. Later in Lou Ella Moseley's book we found a post office at Leah from 1902 to 1904.

If anyone has information pertaining to these people and places, and our new friends would appreciate hearing from you, so we can update their and our historical records.

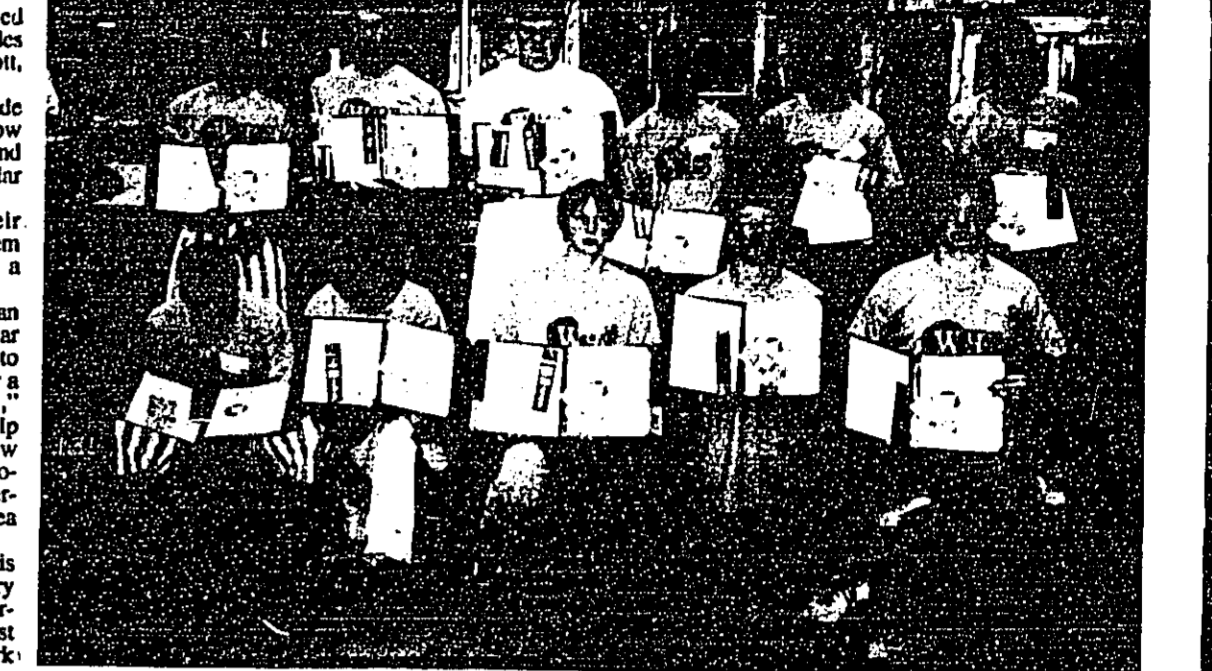

### Bulldogs take second in state 400 meter relay

AUSTIN—The Colmesnell 400 meter relay team ran home with a silver medal at the state 1A track meet Saturday on a day filled with plenty of surprises.

Their efforts enabled the Bulldogs to finish sixth overall in the state 1A standings with 22 points. Colton, who won first in the relay, took first place in the 1A division with 78 points.

The Woodville girls 800 meter relay took fifth in the 1A division.

Colmesnell had hoped to challenge for the top three spots in team standings, but a blazing sun halted two of their bids in the 400 and 1600 meter runs.

"All I was worried about was trying to catch Overton up there," said Byerly after the race. "They were so far ahead of us up there."

Simpson, who took third in the 400 last year in Austin, confessed that he knew that he was in trouble at the very start. "I didn't catch that guy in front of me. I'll be back," Edkins said.

There will be no charge for the fishing contest, but there is a \$4 fee per car to enter the park. For more information contact the park at 384-5231.

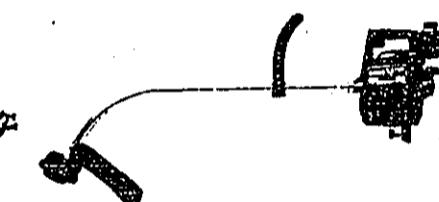
## Nut Hut team arrives for 'Sports Challenge'

## Accident claims life of Town Bluff child

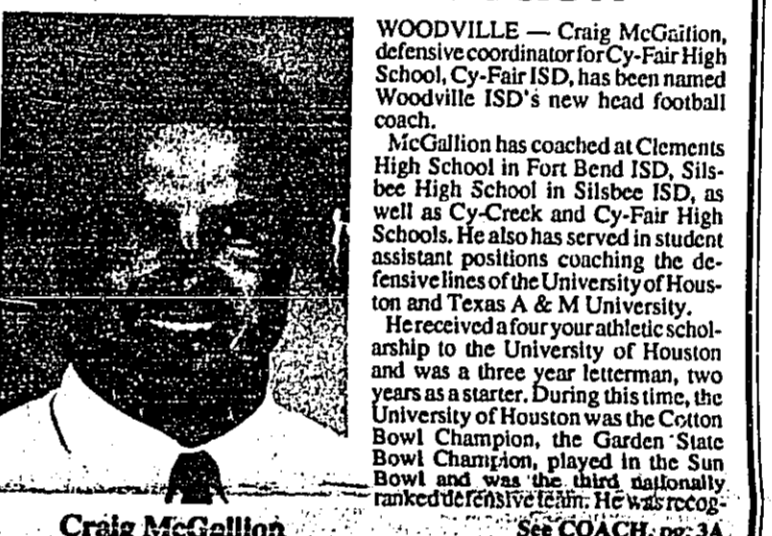
TOWN BLUFF — A 22-month-old child was pronounced dead at Tyler County Hospital in Woodville last week after a pickup truck accidentally ran over him at his residence near Town Bluff.  
Kurt Nelson Lott Jr., son of Kurt and Amanda Lott of 114 Wayward Winds, Ponderosa Gardens subdivision, was pronounced dead at 7:09 p.m. Wednesday, May 12, following the mishap.  
According to a report filed by Tyler County Deputy Sheriff James Chapman, the accident occurred about 5:45 p.m. while the child was playing in the yard of his family's home. The pickup truck involved in the mishap was driven by Jason Woody Thompson, 21, of Clarks, La.  
Thompson told investigators he was leaving Sims TV service, located beside the Lott residence, when he stopped the pickup on a slight incline of the driveway. He said the pickup rolled backward slightly after he stopped and that when he began to drive forward again, he felt something under the vehicle's tires and stopped to investigate. Upon exiting from the pickup, the driver discovered the injured child.  
The child was rushed by Eastex Ambulance Service to Tyler County Hospital where he subsequently died as a result of head and other injuries.  
Following Chapman's investigation, Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace John Ed Hanks ruled the death accidental and no criminal charges are expected to be filed in connection with the incident.  
Funeral services for the child were held at 10 a.m. Friday, May 14, at Lakeside Apostolic Church in Town Bluff.

## Hill climbing is way of life -Amputee rollerblades through Tyler County-



WOODVILLE — Like the rolling hills of East Texas, life for Casey Pieretti has been a series of major ups and downs. And while many in his position would retire from an active life, this 26-year-old amputee has rejected an idle lifestyle and instead is rollerblading across the United States.  
The Santa Barbara, Calif., man and his "Blade Across America" team reached Woodville Monday evening, completing about 1,800 of the 3,100 mile, 15-state trek which began April 4 in San Diego. The goal is to reach Washington, D.C. by late June, raising both money for and public awareness of the need for a national limb bank for children.  
Pieretti and his rollerblading partner, Joel Bolt, hope to raise \$3 million during their cross-country journey, mostly from corporate donations and through pledges of a penny made by school children throughout the United States.  
Any assistance offered to the team on their journey also is being welcomed.  
"Gifts of food, beverages and places to stay are a big help and I have to say, have become more and more common as we make our way across Texas," Bolt said. "Quite a few people in recent days have come forward to offer us refreshments and it is really appreciated."  
While Pieretti and Bolt are traveling the entire way on rollerblades — a cross between ice and roller skates with four wheels all in-line — they are accompanied by a motor home pulling an equipment trailer. Television producer Almiré Akalafian and Frank Spencer make up the skating team's support crew.  
"We're making the trip on a financial shoestring," Pieretti noted. "The motor home is being donated as is much of our supplies. The money that we raise is going for the national limb bank."  
Along the route, Pieretti and Bolt stage rollerblading shows to help school children and discuss the team's support crew.

## Rural job opportunities being sought for Texas -Ag commissioner urges local leaders to back November bond issue-

WOODVILLE — Labelling an expansion of the Texas Agricultural Financing Authority a boon to rural job opportunities, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Rick Perry was in Woodville last week seeking grass-roots support for an additional \$100 million in program funds.  
Perry, who has served as the ag commissioner since January 1991, said the TAF program is providing a major economic boost to rural communities throughout the state and is providing Texas taxpayers with major returns on their investment.  
The program was first authorized by a 1989 constitutional amendment to use \$25 million in state general obligation bonds to provide loans to help develop "value-added processing projects" in rural areas of the state.  
During a speech to the Woodville Lions Club on May 13, Perry noted that voters will be asked in November to approve an additional \$100 million for the program. He asked local leaders to help spread the word about the need for the money.  
Perry noted the TAF program loans are used to help private businesses build or expand plants which process the state's raw agricultural products. "Texas leads the nation in the production of cotton, wool, mohair, beef and leather but we only process 8 percent of these products within the state," Perry noted. "Ninety-two percent of our raw products get shipped out of Texas and get processed somewhere else."  
Because of this, the state's agricultural economy is not as strong as it should be because each step a product goes through during processing both enhances the value of that product and provides needed jobs.  
"Every family had an average of 230 acres and raised an average of 3 to 4 children. Everyone in the county lived a sustainable lifestyle — in fact, a very good lifestyle."  
"By 1990, the population of the county was only 6,000-plus — a 50 percent decrease in population over that 40-year period," Perry noted.  
Perry said the state's agricultural commissioner added that many of our rural communities experienced as much if not more of a decline in the "great migration" swept jobs and people from the rural areas of the state to the fast growing cities.  
"In 1950, 80 percent of the people in the state lived in rural areas and only 20 percent lived in cities. Today, it is a mirror image of that with 20 percent living in the rural areas and 80 percent in cities," he said.  
Perry said one of the main reasons for the change was that the state's leaders did not have enough vision back in the 1950s to take steps to develop rural job opportunities.  
"The TAF program is one of the ways that the state is working to change that today."  
"The initial \$25 million (in TAF bonds) is a relatively small amount when you look at the overall state budget, but it has been used to help fund 32 different projects across the state," he said.  
Over the last 18 months, the money has been loaned out in various amounts ranging from \$76,000 up to a maximum of \$2 million. "The average amount is about \$750,000," he added.  
Any business is eligible to apply for a loan as long as they will be processing food or fiber products. Loans made thus far have funded operations such as a cotton processing plant in West Texas and a real estate operation in the Corpus Christi area. Sharp calls for prison school reform

AUSTIN — "If we can't do any better than this, maybe we should stop what we're doing and start all over again," State Comptroller John Sharp said.

Calling for sweeping reforms, Sharp released a comprehensive audit of the Windham School System, the educational branch of Texas prisons, conducted by his Texas School Performance Review staff.

The need for strong education programs in Texas prisons is underscored by the fact that 68 percent of all state inmates never made it out of high school.

"This report gives prison officials the tools they need to make immediate improvements. If they fail to take the steps now to make reduced recidivism a top priority, we will urge a total overhaul of the system — from top to bottom," Sharp said.

"The most telling measure of the success of any prison system and its educational programs should be its recidivism rate — how many inmates return to prison after their release," Sharp said.

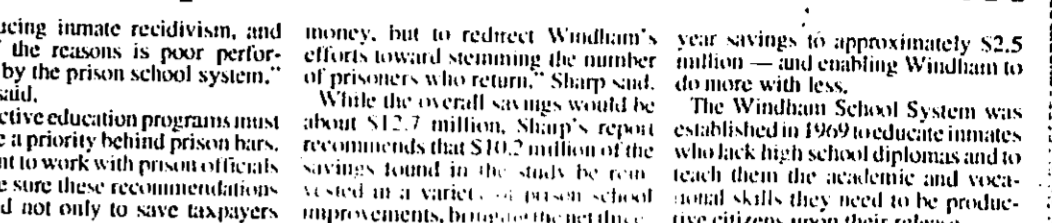
"Clearly, Texas is finishing the test of reducing inmate recidivism, and one of the reasons is poor performance by the prison school system," Sharp said.

Effective education programs must become a priority behind prison bars. We want to work with prison officials to make sure those recommendations are used not only to save taxpayers money, but to redirect Windham's efforts toward stemming the number of prisoners who return," Sharp said.

While the overall savings would be about \$12.7 million, Sharp's report recommends that \$10.2 million of the savings be used to fund school improvements, bring on-site activities year savings to approximately \$2.5 million — and enabling Windham to do more with less.

The Windham School System was established in 1989 and educates inmates who lack high school diplomas and to teach them the academic and vocational skills they need to be productive citizens upon their release.

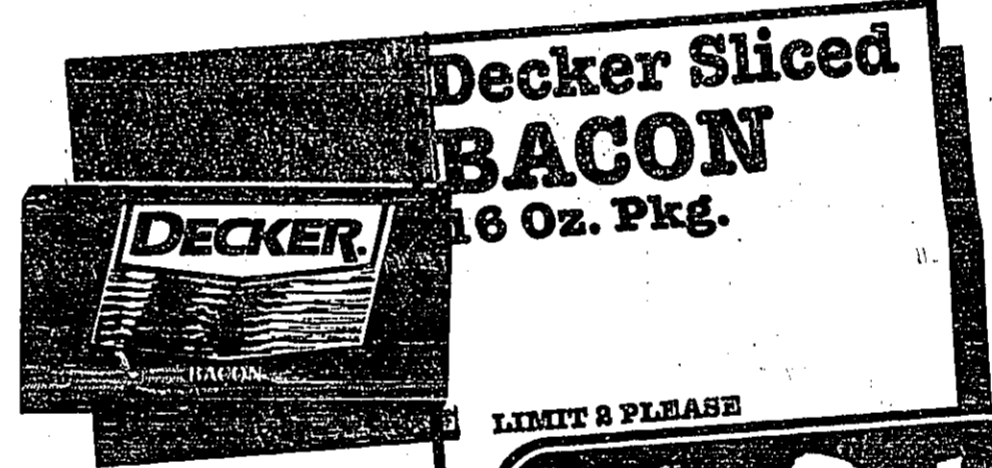
