TYLER COUNTY — Tyler County's five school districts will begin the 1993-94 school year within the next two-week period with the Colmesneil Independent School District leading the pack on Thursday, Aug. 12. Woodville ISD will be next in line, beginning on lucky Friday, Aug. 13, while classes in the Chester ISD will start on Saturday, Aug. 14. Students in the Spurger ISD will return to classes on Tuesday, Aug. 17 and the Warren ISD will begin its new year on Wednesday, Aug. 18.

Bids accepted for collection center

WOODVILLE — Woodville builder Thomas C. Foreberry was awarded the contract Friday to construct Tyler County's Community Collection Center after a bid for the work was reviewed by the project's engineer. During a special meeting of the Tyler County Commissioners Court, engineer Wayne Stolz of the firm of Everett Griffin Jr. and Associates of Lufkin recommended Foreberry's bid for the construction of an 80,000-sq-ft collection center and a 20,000-sq-ft transfer station.

Warren school tax rate remains at \$1.33 level

WARREN — Despite a projected loss in state funding of about \$340,000 during the coming year, the Warren Independent School District's board of trustees has decided to keep the tax rate at \$1.33 per \$100 valuation. The overall \$1.33 tax rate in the Warren ISD has been in place for the past four years. Warren officials noted that during the years the Tyler County Education District (CED) was in place, it collected a county-wide total of \$8,253 million while the portion levied by the Warren ISD was \$504.7 million. When both rates were combined, taxpayers in the district paid taxes based on an overall \$1.33 rate.

New technology aids young writer - Handicapped novelist uses 'head-pointer' computer system-

JASPER COUNTY — Joe Burkett is an unusual young man. He graduated from Jasper High School while only 16 and now, at the tender age of 17, is completing his first novel. Burkett has a unique way of writing. He uses a computer system called "head-pointer" which allows him to write his stories by moving a cursor on the screen with his hand. Burkett is a young man who has overcome a physical handicap to become a successful writer.



HEAD-POINTER SYSTEM — Joe Burkett, 17, of Jasper County demonstrates the use of the FreeBoard Computer Access System he uses to write his novels. Diagnosed at age 11 months with infantile muscular atrophy, a form of Muscular Dystrophy, the young man has only limited use of his arms and uses his hand to "type" on his computer. A camera is mounted atop the computer screen projects a beam of light at Burkett's hand, using a ring reflector attached to the brim of his visor. The young writer beams the light back at the computer to control the movement of the cursor. The FreeBoard software projects a keyboard on the screen and Burkett can type by moving the cursor to the appropriate "key" pictured on the screen. (Photo by Greg Peak)



Woodville man jailed on burglary complaint

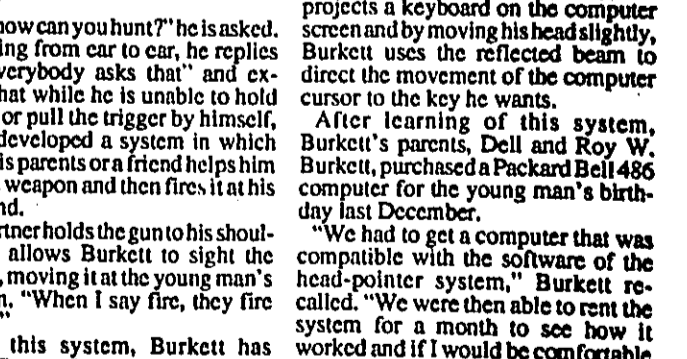

Summer Fun Water safety is vital

Teaching kids to swim is a great way to spend a summer. Overcoming fears, learning new skills, and improving abilities are important ways that we develop self-confidence and self-esteem.

Learning to swim also means learning about water safety as part of each lesson I teach is practicing ways of helping avoid water accidents. Even small children can be taught basic water safety and rescue techniques that all of us should know.

Staying safe around water means using common sense and remembering a few basic rules. Don't swim alone! Children must swim only when supervised by an adult, a person at least age 14 or over, and a life preserver must be used.

Swim where you know what the bottom is like. In ponds, streams, lakes, and pools, DO NOT DIVE UNTIL YOU HAVE CHECKED THE DEPTH AND FOR OBSTRUCTIONS!

Most small pools are only four feet deep. There is no safe place to dive! Do not run in the pool area and do not "horseplay" in the excitement of playing. It is easy to forget how shallow the water is or how near the edge of the pool is. Use diving boards appropriately. . . . Dive straight from the end, not toward the side of the pool and swim quickly away from the board following the dive.

Non-swimmers should not use floats or supports. Learn rescue skills and never attempt to rescue a distressed person by swimming. Even trained lifeguards use other methods and take flotation devices with them if a swimming rescue is necessary. A simple poem names the safety rules: "reach, throw, row."

Most water accidents involve persons falling in near the edge who could be reached easily. Reaching assists mean extending an arm, a leg, a towel, shirt, blank jeans, belt, fishing pole, plunk, goal, etc. to bring someone to safety. Human chains formed with non-swimmers on the shore and swimmers in the water can reach great distances. Throwing assists are made by tossing something that will float to the person in need. Empty plastic jugs, pool floats, benches, even spare tires will all provide support and, with a rope attached, allow you to pull them to safety. For victims who cannot be reached by throwing from shore, rowing to them is a good choice. Finally, swimming to a spot near them and then showing a support to them WHILE MAINTAINING A SAFE DISTANCE FOR YOURSELF IS THE BEST CHOICE.

Children can learn valuable skills at the same time. The next time you are thinking about the fun of swimming, take a few minutes to review and practice with your child some basic water safety rules and techniques.

State Capital Highlights School board ethics law opinion issued

committee chairman Dan Kubiak, D-Rockdale, last week had some concerns regarding a letter he sent to credit unions across the state, asking the institutions to donate \$100 each to a credit union in his home county, Kubiak's subcommittee oversees Texas credit unions.

But Kubiak said the letter was only an attempt to help his constituents, and furthermore, none of the credit unions that received letters sent donations to the Millam County Credit Union.

The 300-member minority-owned Millam County Credit Union which Kubiak helped organize needed to build its capital reserves account, from which loans of less than \$100 are made, he said.

Terry Young, spokesman for the Texas Credit League, said, "We've seen the letter, and we don't feel there is any undue pressure. I think he's just trying to utilize an avenue to help a credit union build capital."

Also responding to the letter, Texas Republican Party spokesman Karen Hughes said Kubiak "is clearly abusing the power of his office," and Common Cause of Texas executive director Gary Woodcock said, "I think this is probably something Dan would have been better advised not to do."

Tom Smith, director of the Texas office of the watchdog group, Public Citizen, called Kubiak's letter inappropriate.

Richard Urgo Appointees Gov. Ann Richards at a seminar last week reminded more than 100 people also appointed to state boards and commissions that with less than two years remaining on their terms, they have a job to do to shake (state government) up. . . . all it took is a good scrubbing."

She urged appointees to be independent and to make decisions for the good of all Texans, including giving women and minorities the opportunity to win state contracts. "We don't have an agenda here about who you do business with, but we do have an agenda that you open up the business of the State of Texas and make it available to everyone."

Richards also reminded the group that what they do in the office is a "direct reflection of what the governor's office is, and what stands for."

Parker Plans Not Settled Responding to rumors that he may not seek re-election, Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, last week said, "The practice of law is becoming increasingly burdensome and complicated, as is serving in the state Senate."

Parker, 59, was elected to the state Senate in 1976, after serving 13 years in the House of Representatives.

Parker said he would consult with family, friends and the citizens of the 4th Congressional District before making a final decision.

Homemaker Hints Children and vitamins

While you're not buying clothes, school supplies and lunch boxes to get your children started on the new school year, should you also be buying vitamins? Probably not.

Normal, healthy children who eat a varied and balanced diet will get the necessary nutrients their bodies need to grow. A multi-mineral supplement is unnecessary.

Consider the foods your children eat regularly. For example, if a child eats a bowl of fortified cereal every day, it may be similar to taking a vitamin, depending on the degree of fortification.

The labels on cereals and other fortified foods list the percentage of the recommended daily allowance (RDA) of vitamins and minerals contained in a serving of the product. A number of these products contain 100% of the daily requirements for adults.

If your child has a consistently poor appetite or eats only a limited variety of foods, a check-up by a physician is appropriate. The doctor may suggest a general nutritional supplement to improve overall health. Because excessive amounts of some nutrients, such as vitamins A and D, can be toxic, however, check with a doctor before giving a child supplement.

Giving children vitamins can easily turn out to be a false sense of security that the child's nutritional needs are being met. But a supplement is not an adequate substitute for a good diet.

The best thing parents can do to get their children off to a healthy start on the school year is to stick to the best: encourage them to eat a good breakfast, snack on nutritious lunch and have plenty of healthy snack foods around for after school.

The Colmesneil Can Man: peddling his way to happiness

"I don't fish, swim, or hunt," says Shorty. "The only thing that I get enjoyment out of is busting cans. The way I look at it, the more cans they throw away the more cans go into my pocket. I figure that I'm making money when they're throwing money away."

Shorty, who just turned 47 this week, has been picking up cans across East Texas since the early '70s. The 5'1" collector says that he figures he has picked up some two to three million cans in the past 20 to 25 years.

"Summer is the best time to pick up cans," he says. "More people drink coke and beer."

An average week will net Shorty somewhere between \$10-\$15 for his efforts. He says that people around Colmesneil help him by saving their cans and dropping them off at his house on Miles Loop. He puts in anywhere from one to eight hours a day gathering cans along the roads.

"The Lord shows me where to go," Shorty admits. "Every morning I get up and He shows me which road to go. It's always full."

A native of Sibley, Harris made it to the eleventh grade before dropping out and taking a job washing cars for a Ford company in Hartin County. Later he worked at cleaning parks at Dam B, put in time at a service station, and spent nine years at Keller Industries in Woodville. He had to quit full time employment after he suffered a severe wrist injury at E&L Lumber. Since that time he has worked odd jobs around the area, including temporary work, painting, and yard work. He was married for 13 years, but has been divorced for the last six and has no children.

Shorty rides what he calls an old timey boys bike. He has cut the middle bar off and has lowered his bike for more maneuverability picking up cans. His current bike is his third in his career as a collector, and has also used a motorcycle at one time to help him in his work.

Three years ago was the last time he sold his cans. "I took them up to Redland and got \$700," says Shorty. "Harley Crews took me up there with his cattle trailer. I had 130 bags of Shorty admits. "Every morning I get up and He shows me which road to go. It's always full."

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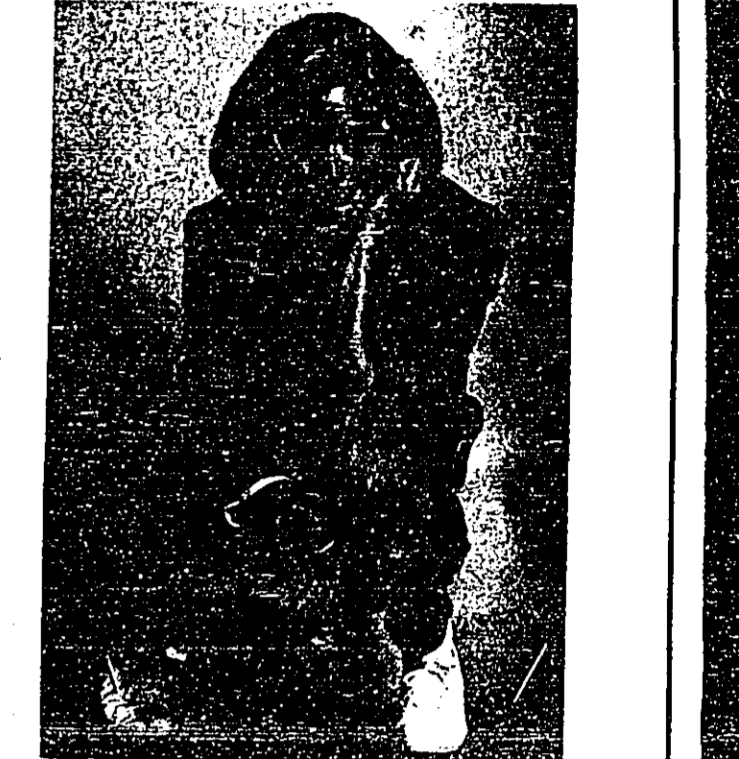
Sheriff's Report Activities during the week of July 26-Aug. 1

CHESTER — One of the finest retreat settings and encampments in East Texas sits in north Tyler County... just outside Chester. It's not a secret though, as some might say. History reveals the truth. In the early 19th century the Alabama Indians, then a large tribe, made their headquarters on this beautiful site and called their village "Ta-Ku-La," which means "peachtree". Then, white settlers occupied the location and along came lumber magnate John Henry Kirby, who had a good eye when he located his home site there. Following Kirby, the Temple Eastex folks had a good eye, too, when they bought the property from Kirby Lumber Company and then allowed a Baptist minister, Dr. Steve Hays, pastor of the Fellowship Baptist Church in Nederland, to follow through on a vision he had to build the camp. "I just wrote Arthur Temple a letter and told him of the plan to make it a youth camp... and the Temple Foundation responded wholeheartedly. We put together some 20,000 hours of volunteer labor." It all began seven years ago. The first two years were spent in construction and restoration, Hays said. Many churches responded with several denominations from South and Southeast Texas have used the facility, along with others like the Soil and Water Conservationists, a Baylor University group of students, Lamar University Baptist Student Union, the Luan School for Crippled Children, Chester Lions Club and the Tyler County Heritage Society. The camp also holds ladies, men and senior citizen's retreats. Recently the camp hosted Race No. 9 of the Texas State Mountain Bike Championship Series. The camp will host over 2,000 campers this summer alone. Over the years some 11,000 campers have enjoyed the facilities. Located at any one time with nice air conditioned dormitories for boys or girls. Recently the camp hosted Chapel Life Ministries, a Woodville-based prison ministry group, that serves the Gil Lewis Prison Unit. The group is in the process of building a new worship center inside the 1,000 man prison that says "Our God Is Alive!" Another centerpiece of the camp is the historic John Henry Kirby Homestead Museum and the Peachtree Village Hall. The Village Hall is an awe inspiring red brick chapel with beautiful arched glass windows. Services are held there during encampments as well as Easter Sunrise services and family gatherings.

The camp is a nonprofit organization which is affiliated with Christian Camping International and is state licensed. The camp has received commendation letters from both Presidents George Bush and Ronald Reagan. "The facility has a full commercial kitchen and is staffed by qualified personnel throughout the year." The camp is operated by a board of regents, with Dr. Hays as president. "The facility is already booked through 1995," Hays said recently. "M.R. Grimmer, who lives in Chester, and is the one who everyone loves and who takes care of the place," said of Dr. Hays, "He's the best leader I've ever worked under, the best leader all around."

"The rule says..."

I don't know about the rest of you, but sometimes I have a tough time with sports officials. It's an authority thing. As a professional sports writer and photographer, I feel that people in charge of sporting events understand that I am there to do a job. And most do. But there are exceptions.

One of those exceptions rolled out of the blue last week at the Big League Sectional Tournament held in Woodville. It was an interesting set of circumstances and the final outcome was that I was told to leave the field where I was taking pictures. It was an umpire's decision. He told me that I could not take pictures from the field because of insurance coverage. I was also informed that it was a Little League rule that photographers were not allowed inside the field of play.

The Quail Valley player, Dennis Moody, who was also the starting pitcher, was ejected after being called out on strikes in the bottom of the second inning. Plate umpire Bruce Williams gave Moody the heave-ho after the Houston pitcher questioned a call strike three to end the inning. Moody's father was also ejected when he came to his son's defense.

Several innings later Williams stopped the game to toss out another player's father, this time the Silsbee pitcher's dad, after an argument ensued near the first base dugout between several Silsbee fans and a Quail Valley coach.

Meanwhile out on the mound Beck's continued to dominate the contest at the same time took charge offensively

Now I've got to tell you that some umpires remind me of road buzzards. They've got a job to do. It may not be a real nice job, but it's a job that somebody has to do. For the most part we sort of ignore or overlook them. They're there to do a few of us who appreciate their ability to do what they do. But for the most part we just leave them alone and let them do their job... until they do something crazy like haul something off that we don't want to see.

Now whether the two umpires at the big league championship game at Hemphill Park were in the road buzzard category is a matter of opinion. But one thing is for sure, they picked on at least four folks that weren't ready to be picked on. Their evening didn't start right either. First of all one of their fellow members of the flock didn't show up because of illness. That meant that two of them had to officiate a championship game that would be the final game of the season for a doubleheader. Well, I mean, that in itself would put most folks in a bad mood. Just put yourself in their place. What if you were to officiate a church one Sunday and one of the other ushers failed to show up. Well by the time you're going to have to pitch up with the call at all, Heaven forbid.

When Williams confronts Moody to tell him he should keep his comments to himself, the Houston pitcher then begins to use verbal skills that he learned in high school where guns and knives are as common as books. So long young Moody... enter older Moody. Not to be outdone by his offspring, the elder statesman of the family proceeds to barn Williams' ears with a vocabulary of blue words that matches the ump's uniform. Exit older Moody. All of this no doubt gets both ump's a little edgy and wakes up an already awoken crowd. Enter innocent newspaper photographer.

Because I've already let the cat out of the bag, you know by now that I was

After leaving the field I, like a good sports investigator and high school newspaper editor, decided to find out what happened. I began to ask questions. "Why can't I shoot pictures on the field where I have done so for years?" I asked. "I've worked for Dallas Cowboys games, college games, state championship games, even the Big League Championship games in Waco, and the biggie of all biggies... Tyler County's Big League sectional championship game at the Southern Regionals in Florida in 1977. And yet here we are, right here in our own front yard and I, the guy who has covered sports for almost 20 years in the county can't take a blasted picture on the field that I have spent countless hours crouching down like some deformed crawler while holding a camera waiting for the right shot so I can tell all my friends back in Dallas that I can tell the best of them. 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Federal law helps fight mail fraud

LUFK (N) — A law to combat mail scams, called the Deceptive Mailings Prevention Act, gives the United States Postal System (USPS) specific power to stop delivery of certain mail solicitations.

Under this authority, mailings promoting the purchase of goods or services, or asking for donations, will not be delivered by the USPS if the public might be misled into believing that the mailing comes from the Government or is somehow approved by the Government.

The law says that any envelope (or the face of any postcard) that includes a name, seal, insignia, term, or symbol that could reasonably be mistaken for a Government-issued mailing will not be delivered unless it also has a prominent "disclaimer" which must appear on the envelope (or face of the postcard) and clearly state the mailing is not from or endorsed by the Government.

Many companies use "Social Security" or "Medicare" as "concepts" to get people to read their advertisements. Even worse, some of these ads appear to be deliberately mislead the public into thinking they have to respond or they might lose Social Security or Medicare benefits.

What should you do if you get mail that seems to be from the government, but actually isn't? You can either take it to your local postmaster or postal inspector, or you can complain to Chief Postal Inspector, United States Postal Service, 475 L. Enfant Plaza, S.W., Washington, DC 20020-2100.

The overall \$1.33 tax rate in the Warren ISD has been in place for the past four years.

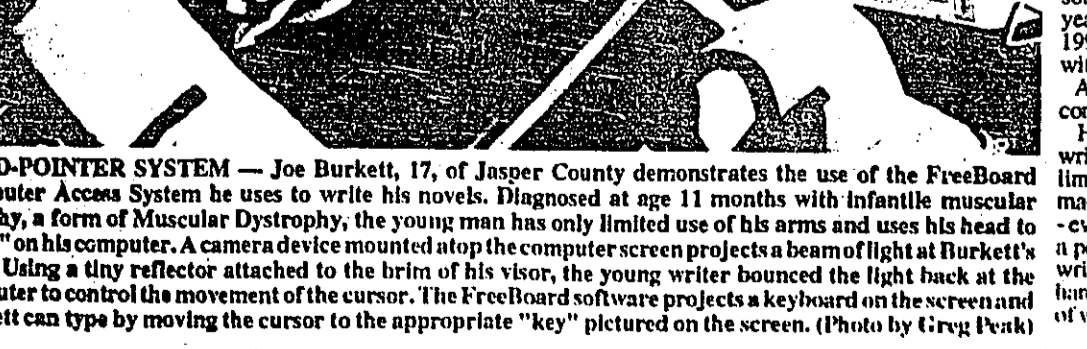

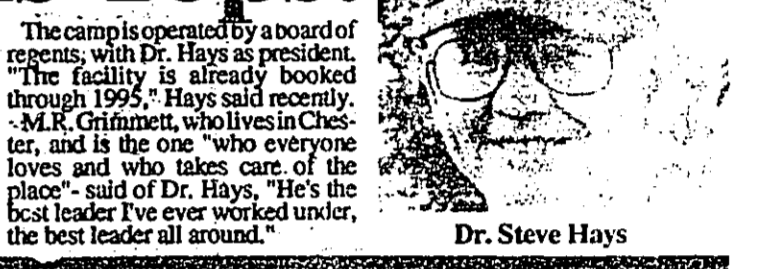

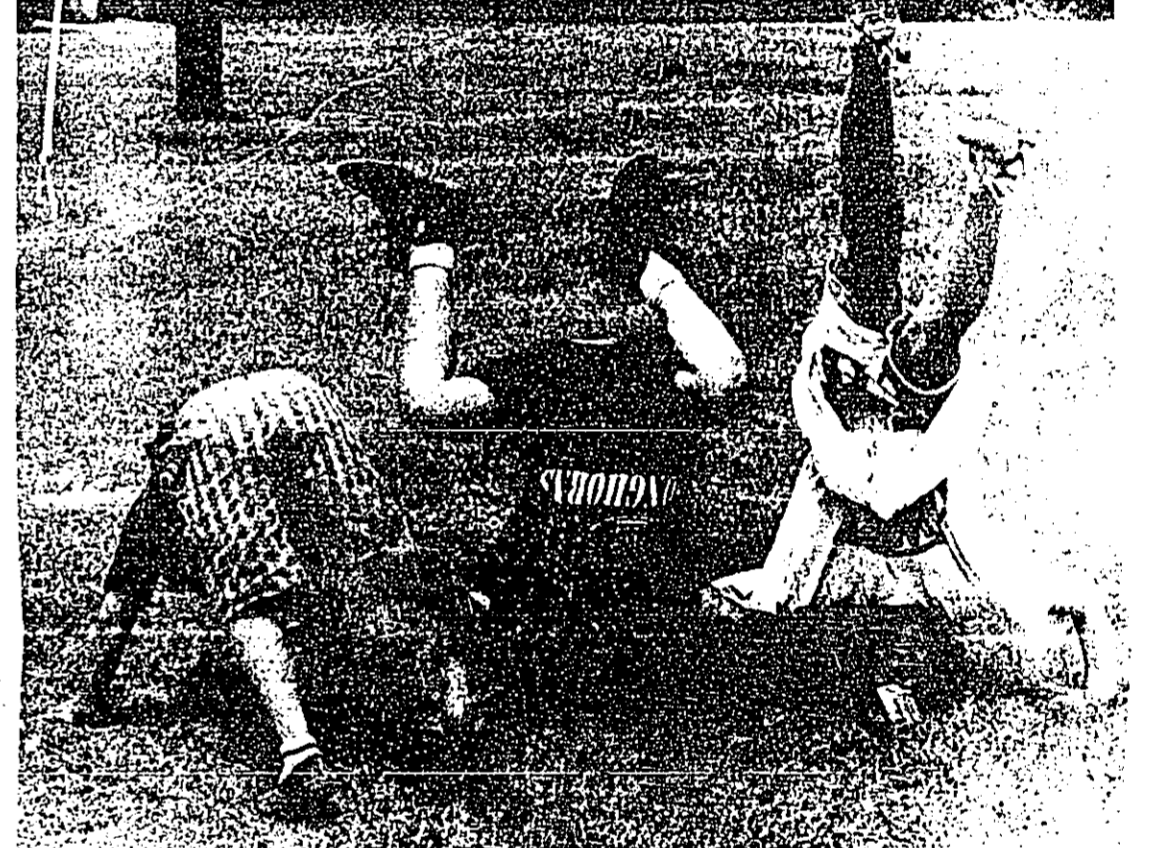

CHESTER — One of the finest retreat settings and encampments in East Texas sits in north Tyler County... just outside Chester. It's not a secret though, as some might say. History reveals the truth. In the early 19th century the Alabama Indians, then a large tribe, made their headquarters on this beautiful site and called their village "Ta-Ku-La," which means "peachtree". Then, white settlers occupied the location and along came lumber magnate John Henry Kirby, who had a good eye when he located his home site there. Following Kirby, the Temple Eastex folks had a good eye, too, when they bought the property from Kirby Lumber Company and then allowed a Baptist minister, Dr. Steve Hays, pastor of the Fellowship Baptist Church in Needland, to follow through on a vision he had to build the camp. "I just wrote Arthur Temple a letter and told him of the plan to make it a youth camp... and the Temple Foundation responded wholeheartedly. We put together some 20,000 hours of volunteer labor. It all began seven years ago. The first two years were spent in construction and restoration, Hays said. Many churches representing several denominations from South and Southeast Texas have used the facility, along with others like the Soil and Water Conservation Society, Baylor University group of students, Lamar University Baptist Student Union, the Huen School for Crippled Children, Chester Lions Club and the Tyler County Heritage Society. The camp also holds ladies, men

The camp is a nonprofit organization which is affiliated with Christian Camping International and is state licensed. The camp has received commendation letters from both Presidents George Bush and Ronald Reagan. The facility has a full commercial kitchen and is staffed by qualified personnel throughout the year. The camps operated by a board of regents, with Dr. Hays as president. "The facility is already booked through 1995," Hays said recently. "M.R. Grinnett, who lives in Chester, and is the one 'who everyone loves and who takes care of the place' - said of Dr. Hays. "He's the best leader I've ever worked under, the best leader all around."

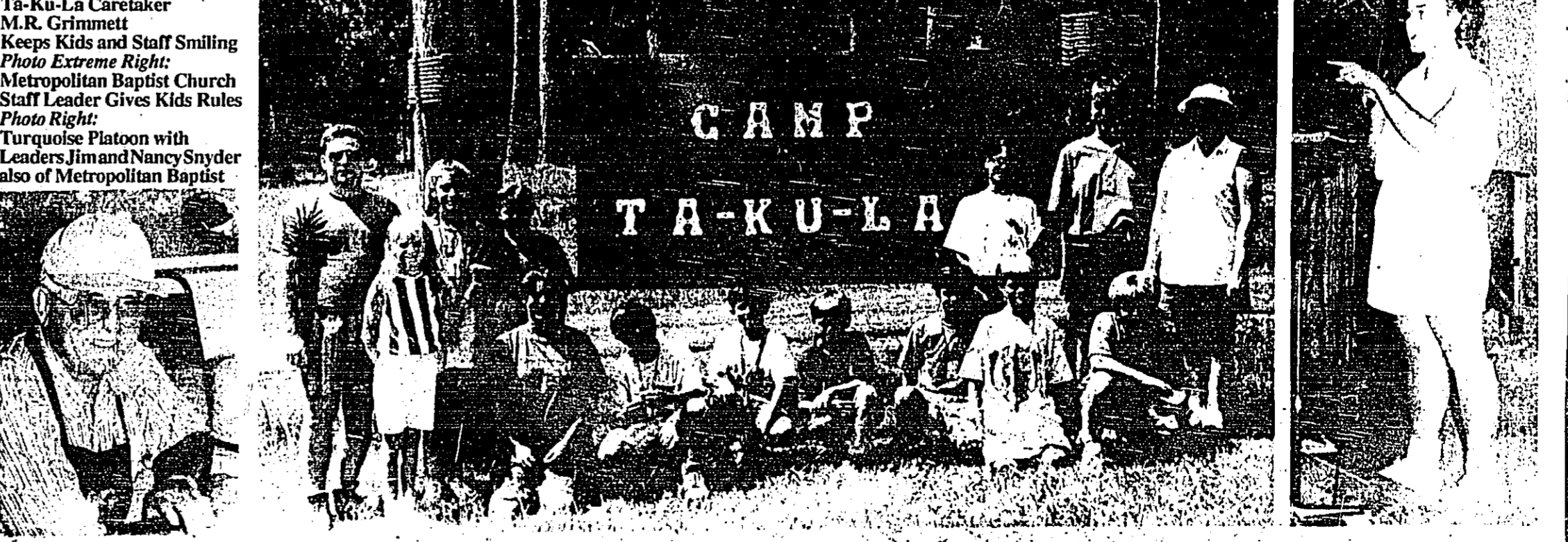

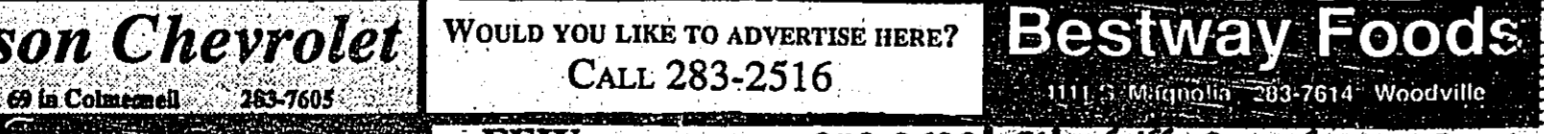
New minister at First Christian
