





rule changes explained

LUFKIN—Recent regulations make substantial changes in the way the Social Security Administration evaluates disabilities in children applying for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments. One of the regulations significantly changes the process and standards used to evaluate children cases.

Two other regulations make specific revisions to the medical criteria used to evaluate disability in children with

to evaluate disability in children with Down syndrome, mental impairments and other serious hereditary, congenital, and acquired disorders.

In the Zehley decision, the Supreme Court found that Social Security used a narrower test for evaluating the disabilities of children under 18 than it used for evaluating the disabilities of course in the disabilities of course in the child's functions and behaviors will be examined and evaluated, including cognitive, communicative, motor, social, and personal skills. Since children's functioning varies enormously from age to age, the new regulation reflects this variability. It includes specific "age-appropriate guidelines" for children in various age groups: from birth to age 1, ages 1-3.






