## Assault, stalking charges filed in separate incidents

WOODVILLE — Two Woodville men were arrested last week on assault and stalking charges following separate incidents in Woodville.  
Jack Falcon, 41, and John Lacey, 24, each were arrested by Woodville police following disturbances reported at local residences.  
Falcon was initially arrested on Tuesday, Nov. 9, at 11:30 p.m. following an incident at a mobile home on Cobb Hill Road. Officers were called to the home of Allee Rigby to find a man threatening and cursing her.  
When the police officer asked the man to leave, he refused and a struggle ensued. Falcon was then placed under arrest and placed in the rear of the officer's patrol car.  
According to Police Chief Scott Yosko, enroute to the Tyler County Justice Center, the suspect is alleged to have kicked the back door of the patrol car a number of times, causing about \$400 in damages.  
Falcon was then charged with criminal mischief in connection with the damaged car as well as with aggravated assault on a peace officer. Other charges in connection with the Nov. 9 incident.  
After being freed on bond, Falcon was arrested on Thursday, Nov. 11, again after a disturbance was reported at the Rigby residence on Cobb Hill Road. Yosko said officers were called to the residence about 3:25 a.m. and were told that Falcon had returned, shouted threats and tore loose electrical and plumbing lines running into the trailer.  
An arrest warrant was issued later that morning and Falcon was taken into custody at 9:15 a.m. on a misdemeanor charge of stalking.  
The state's new stalking law comes into play when someone, on more than one occasion, engages in conduct directed specifically at another person, that is likely to harass, annoy, alarm, abuse, torment or embarrass that person. Under the law, someone

Those wishing to file in the Democratic primary must submit applications by Jan. 3 to Joyce Wilson at Clemmons Insurance, 1025 Charlton St. in Woodville. The office is open weekdays from 8:30-4:30 p.m. and Wilson may be reached by calling 283-5377.  
Candidates seeking a place on the Republican Party Primary also have until Jan. 3 to file their applications with the County Republican Chairman Dr. Brian Babin at his dental office at 1002 W. Bluff in Woodville.  
Babin's office is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays and he may be contacted by calling 283-3721.  
The primary elections will be held on March 6, 1994 with the winners advancing to the general election to be held in November, 1994.  
Incumbent local officers whose terms will be expiring at the end of 1994 include Tyler County Judge Jerome Owens, County Treasurer Jean Phillips, District Clerk Pat Brown, County Clerk Donnie Gregory, Precinct 2 Commissioner Pete Barnes, Precinct 4 Commissioner Henry Earl Sawyer, Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace Wanda Breaux, Precinct 2 JP Tom Parker, Precinct 3 JP Tom Ed Hanks and Precinct 4 JP Roy Drake.  
Those wishing to file in a district or statewide race are required to file with party offices in Austin.  
Most local incumbent officer holders are expected to file for re-election. Phillips, however, has announced that she will be retiring from the treasurer's office when her current term expires.  
Filing fees for the countywide and county commissioner seats is \$600. The fee for entering one of the JP races is \$200. ### Emotional abuse: the scars that don't show

Home Economies Victims of physical abuse may have bruises, scars and broken bones to show for it. But emotional abuse leaves no visible mark. The scars and bruises from this form of family violence lie deep within the mind.

Researchers believe that the incidence of emotional abuse or neglect may exceed the number of 800,000 cases of physical abuse reported each year. One step toward dealing with emotional abuse is to recognize it in the family.

Emotional deprivation or psychological neglect is an especially devastating form of emotional abuse. It occurs when parents withdraw and will not emotionally support their children. Cold and rejecting, such parents ignore their children when they are sad or in pain and do not share their joys either. The child must look elsewhere for someone to depend on.

Selfishness or indifference and trying circumstances such as divorce, mental illness or forced separation can all lead to emotional abuse. A University of Minnesota study found that children who were psychologically neglected were often more seriously damaged than physically abused children.

Verbal assaults such as name calling, harsh tones and sarcastic put-downs are other forms of emotional abuse. The psychological "beatings" young people suffer from the most are those given by the people they trust and depend on.

Psychologists find that people tend to live up to other people's expectations. So after being called "stupid," "lazy," or "rotten," long enough, a person may indeed begin to behave that way. Verbal abuse cuts across social and economic groups, but is more common in upper-income families.

Extreme pressure is a subtle form of emotional abuse that many child-development experts say is becoming a modern-day epidemic. Some parents seem to be more concerned about a child's intellectual prowess than his or her emotional well-being. The pressure to grow up fast and achieve easily in sports, academics and social interaction is stressed by middle class America.

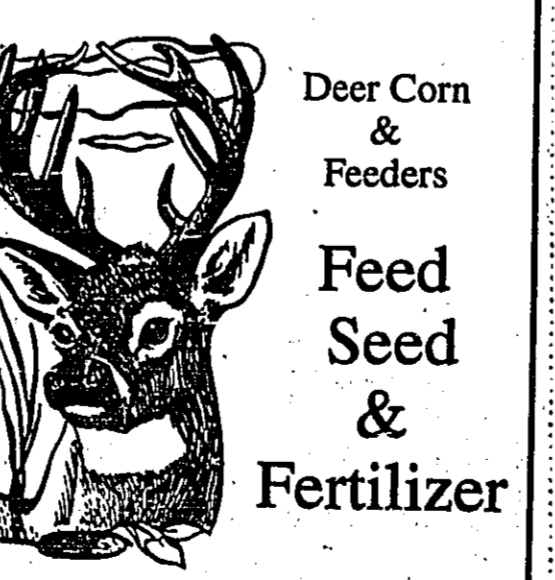

## Underdog Colmesneil faces state power Tenaha Friday

**COLMESNEIL** — The Colmesneil Bulldogs figure they have nothing to lose when they take on the state-ranked Tenaha Tigers Friday night in their area football showdown at Abe Martin Stadium in Lufkin.

The Tigers are state-ranked and were a preseason pick to win the state title. They have football tradition on their side as well, going to the playoffs for the third consecutive year.

The Tigers have a preseason all-star anchoring their defense, and a quarterback who has thrown an average of almost 200 yards and two touchdowns a game.

Meanwhile, the Bulldogs are reaching the playoffs for the first time in 11 years. They weren't even expected to finish in the top two in district this season. When they did, their coach cut his hair.

No one has mentioned a Colmesneil player as a possible all-state candidate, and even the big city papers have had their record wrong all season.

But if you listen real close you may hear something that is familiar as the

story of David and Goliath.

"I think you can surprise them if we lose a break or two," says Colmesneil coach Mike Jacobs.

"We are a lot better than people think," adds Bulldog quarterback Les Stinson.

"I don't turn the ball over and I don't turn them from making big plays, and we will definitely be in the ball game," believes Colmesneil defensive coach Rick Johnson.

And then there is Raymond Jackson, who for the past 14 years has coached the Tenaha Tigers.

"We won't match good with them," admits Jackson. "Our speed is what has been carrying us, and we feel that they have as much speed as we have. We are looking for a real tough game."

Actually the Bulldogs may even have more speed than the state-ranked Tigers with the likes of Stinson and Scott Eddins who have gone to state track championships for the past two years. Add Greg Bean, along with Jeff and Herman Allen, and the Bulldogs can run with the best of them.

"But running is one thing and passing is another... and that is where lies the strength of the Tigers."

Quarterback Joey Latham has put up the ball 180 times this season and connected on 101 of them. He has passed for 1,763 yards with 18 touchdowns. Put that on a per game average and you have 10 completions on 18 pass attempts for 176 yards and almost two touchdowns. Troy Alkman would love to have that average.

Actually the Tigers run out of the infamous "Run and Shoot," and there lies what Colmesneil feels is Tenaha's Achilles' heel.

"We had two of our best games against Chester and Huntington," says Stinson, "and they use the run and shoot."

"We'll mix up the coverage," confesses Johnson. "Sometimes we will be in a seven man coverage with four rushing, and another time we will have a deep zone and a man (defense) underneath. We will blitz off any formation."

Keying the Colmesneil defense will be Cody Widner, who leads the team in tackles with 92. Also in the trenches will be Joey Harris and Marcus Allen. Latham has a talented corps of receivers, including Stacy Thompson who has caught 43 passes for 839 yards and 14 touchdowns.

Their leading rusher is Robert Bowden who has gained 694 yards and four touchdowns on 112 carries.

"They like to go for the long ball," says Johnson. "They don't drive the

ball. We are going to have to eliminate the big play."

Jackson says that his Tigers will be pressed by the Colmesneil offense, stating, "We know that we will have to score three or four times if we win."

And while the balance of the game seems to be a match between the Colmesneil offense and the Colmesneil defense, it could be the opposite that

makes the difference.

"I think we can run on them," says Jacobs.

Enter the likes of Bean with 1,604 yards in rushing this season and his counterpart, Leo Van Brewer averaging over 10 yards a carry and 635 yards.

Toss in Stinson at quarterback with 44 completions on 62 attempts and

710 yards, and the Bulldogs could play keep away long enough to make the area title game more than interesting.

"I think we can score on them," adds the Colmesneil quarterback. "We've just got to control the ball."

"They have a good team," adds the Tenaha coach, referring to Colmesneil. "They have good running back,

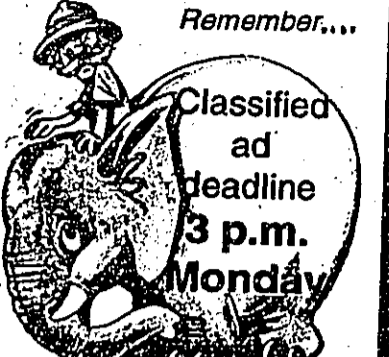

## Homemakers Hints

Emotional abuse: the scars that don't show. By Sherry Jeanes. Home Economics County Extension Agent.

Victims of physical abuse may have bruises, scars and broken bones to show for it. But emotional abuse leaves no visible mark. The scars and bruises from this form of family violence run deep within the mind.

Researchers believe that the incidence of emotional abuse is on the rise. It may exceed the more than 800,000 cases of physical abuse reported each year. One step toward dealing with emotional abuse is to recognize it in the family.

Emotional deprivation or psychological neglect is one especially devastating form of emotional abuse, occurring when parents withdraw and deny their children the support they need. Cold and rejecting, such parents ignore their children when they are sad or in pain and do not share their joys either.

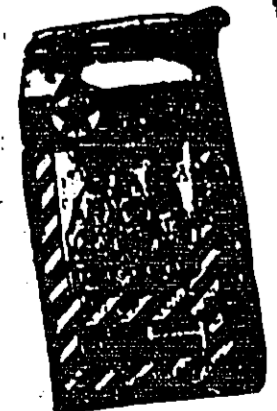

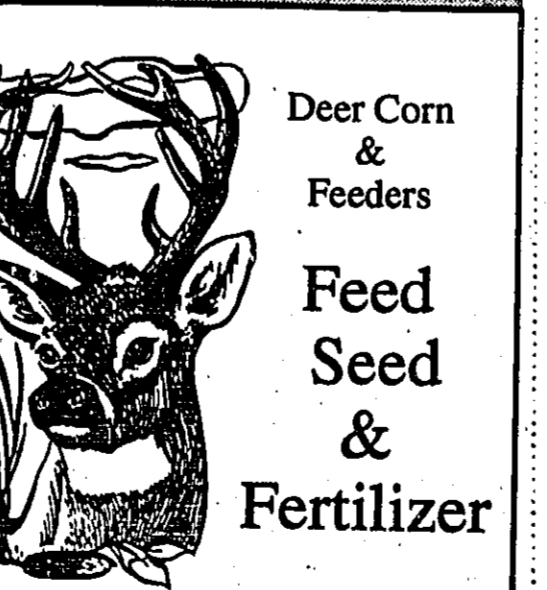

## Underdog Colmesneil faces state power Tenaha Friday

**COLMESNEIL** — The Colmesneil Bulldogs figure they have nothing to lose when they take on the state-ranked Tenaha Tigers Friday night in their area football showdown at the Memorial Stadium in Lufkin.

The Tigers are state ranked and were a preseason pick to win the state title. They have football tradition on their side as well, going to the playoffs for the third consecutive year.

The Tigers have a preseason all-star anchoring their defense, and a quarterback who has thrown an average of almost 200 yards and two touchdowns a game.

Meanwhile, the Bulldogs are reaching the playoffs for the first time in 11 years. They weren't even expected to finish in the top two in district this season. When they did, their coach cut his hair.

No one has mentioned a Colmesneil player as a possible all-state candidate, and even the big city papers have had their record wrong all season.

But if you listen real close you may hear something that is familiar as the story of David and Goliath.

"I think we can surprise them if we get a break or two," says Colmesneil coach Mike Jacobs.

"We are a lot better than people think," adds Bulldog quarterback Les Sison.

"If we don't turn the ball over and keep them from making big plays, we will definitely be in the ball game," believes Colmesneil defensive coach Rick Johnson.

Assistant coach Raymond Jackson, who for the past 14 years has coached the Tenaha Tigers.

"We won't match good with them," admits Jackson. "Our speed is what has been carrying us, and we feel that they have as much speed as we have. We are looking for a real tough game."

Actually the Bulldogs may even have more speed than the state ranked Tigers with the likes of Sison and Scott Eddins who have gone to state track championships for the past two years. Add Greg Bean, along with Jeff and Herman Allen, and the Bulldogs can run with the best of them.

But running is one thing and passing is another... and that is where lies the strength of the Tigers.

Quarterback Joe Latham has put up the ball 180 times this season and connected on 101 of them. He has passed for 1,763 yards with 18 touchdowns. Put that on a per game average and you have 10 completions on 18 pass attempts for 176 yards and almost two touchdowns.

Troy Aikman would love to have that average. Latham and the Tigers run out of the infamous "Run and Shoot," and there lies what Colmesneil feels is Tenaha's Achilles' heel.

"We had two of our best games against Chester and Huntington," says Sison, "and they use the run and shoot."

"We'll mix up the coverage," confesses Johnson. "Sometimes we will be in a seven man coverage with four rushing, and another time we will have a deep zone and a man (defense) underneath. We will blitz off any formation."

Keying the Colmesneil defense will be Cody Widner, who leads the team in tackles with 92. Also in the trenches will be Joey Harris and Marcus Allen. Latham has a copy of the playbook, including Stacy Thompson who has caught 45 passes for 839 yards and 14 touchdowns.

Their leading rusher is Robert Bowden who has gained 604 yards and four touchdowns on 112 carries.

They like to go for the long ball, says Johnson. "They don't drive the

ball. We are going to have to eliminate the big play."

Jackson says that his Tigers will be pressed by the Colmesneil offense, stating, "We know that we will have to score three or four times if we win."

And while the balance of the game seems to be a match between the Tenaha offense and the Colmesneil defense, it could be the opposite that

makes the difference.

"I think we can run on them," says Jacobs.

Enter the likes of Bean with 1,604 yards in rushing this season and his counterpart, Leo Van Brewer averaging over 100 yards a carry and 635 yards.

Toss in Sison at quarterback with 44 completions on 62 attempts and

710 yards, and the Bulldogs could play keep away long enough to make the area title game more than interesting.

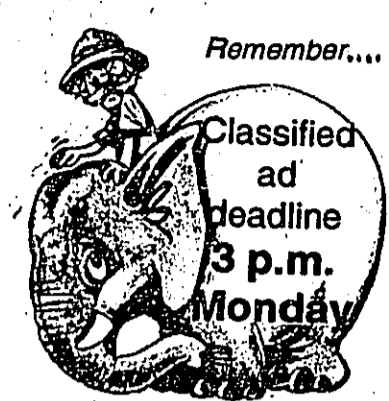
