Holiday party ends in murder-suicide

WARREN — An all-night party ended violently Christmas morning when a 20-year-old Warren man used a shotgun to murder his girlfriend and a 17-year-old party guest before turning the weapon on himself.

According to Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace Tom Parker, Michael Joseph Tannery, 20, killed himself with a blast to the head from a 12 gauge shotgun shortly after he used the weapon to kill his girlfriend, Christina Marie Newsom, 20, and Joe Oscar Groze, 17, also of Warren.

"Mr. Groze was the first victim and was shot in the buttock and the right side of the head," Parker said. "Miss Newsom was shot two times, once in the fleshy part of her arm and into her side but I cannot point out where the second shot went. I assume it went into the same area."

What turned into a bloody Christmas morning shooting spree began as an all-night holiday party that began on Christmas Eve. Tannery and Newsom were the hosts and Newsom's two younger sisters, ages 15 and 13, were in the mobile home as were Newsom's two-year-old daughter and Newsom and Tannery's five-month-old daughter.

After the shooting began, the two teenagers grabbed the two younger children and fled to a neighbor's to call for help. None of the children were wounded during the gunfire.

Parker said that Tannery did leave a note before killing himself.

Sgt. Steve Sturrock of the Tyler County Sheriff's Department said officers were called to the scene of the shooting about 8:30 a.m. Christmas morning and discovered the three bodies lying in and around the mobile home.

Sturrock said investigators recovered one spent shotgun shell casing in a hallway and two in the kitchen where Groze's body was found. Two other

spent casings were laying at the foot of the bed in which Newsom's body was found.

Tannery was laying on the porch by the front door with the 12 gauge, pump action shotgun laying nearby. One empty hull was found in the shotgun," he said.

The apparent motive for the double murder and suicide was jealousy, Parker said. "Tannery was angry about an alleged affair between Groze and Newsom. They had apparently been arguing off and on as the party progressed."

"The seed was planted, fertilized all night with alcohol and harvested at about 8:30 that morning with murder," the judge said.

Parker said that Tannery and Newsom met over a year ago in Florida where Tannery was working on a construction job. About six months ago Tannery brought the woman to Warren where they lived together in a mobile home in a subdivision located off the county extension of FM 3290 near Warren.

Although the judge was unsure of what time the party ended, he said the two teenagers went to sleep at about 6:30 a.m. Christmas morning. When the first shot occurred at about 8:30 a.m., one other guest who was asleep on the living room couch ran from the trailer house, leaving his boots behind.

"Most of the party guests had already gone. The two people who were still awake at the time of the first shot were Groze and Tannery. I guess the party was still going on for them," Parker said.

The judge said that one of the teenage girls was sleeping with Newsom in a back bedroom when Groze was killed in the kitchen.

"When the first shot was fired, she

Students learn about early Christmases



WOODVILLE — Dressed in costumes from 19th century Texas, seventh graders from Woodville Middle School roamed through the Heritage Village Museum earlier this month to get a first hand look at how early settlers celebrated the Christmas holiday.

Prior to leaving for their annual holiday break, Woodville Middle School students visited the museum for a day-long look at pioneer life as it related to the Christmas holiday.

The trip culminated a teaching program entitled "The History of Christmas in Texas" which involved all teaching disciplines at the middle school.

"This program brings together a variety of classes and involves the students in a wide range of activities under one subject heading," said Mildred White, a middle school Texas history teacher. "For instance, in history the students studied about how Christmas was celebrated in the past and then they went out and interviewed an older person about their early memories of celebrating Christmas."

These interviews are then reviewed with the best being selected to be printed in a special booklet. Students in the middle school computer classes will then process the interviews and put them into the booklet form.

"Each class discipline has a part in the program. The science class gathers the pine cones and other materials to make the wreaths on each of the classroom doors, the math class made Christmas decorations using geometric forms and the reading class studied England's influence on Christmas traditions in Texas, especially the author Charles Dickens," White said.

Other activities included in the program involved the art class, which prepared old-fashioned cards and decorations; the physical education class, which studied games played by children in early Texas;

Drake runs for re-election as JP

SPURGER — Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace Roy C. Drake of Spurger has announced that he will seek re-election to a sixth term in the March 8 Democratic Party primary election.

Drake was first elected to the JP post in 1974 and took office on Jan. 1, 1975.

WOODVILLE — City Health Inspector Frankle E. Rogers of Woodville has announced that he is a candidate for the Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace position in the March 8 Democratic Primary election.

Rogers is seeking the post now held by John Ed Hanks, who has not yet filed for re-election.

A native of Texas, Rogers served 20 years in the military, including service in Viet Nam. He retired in 1975.

Filing deadline nears for primaries

WOODVILLE — With less than a week remaining for people to file for positions on the primary election ballots, only one contender for the Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace post was added to the list of candidates for Tyler County offices.

The deadline for filing as a candidate in either the Democratic or Republican primaries is Monday, Jan. 3.

On Tuesday morning, Dec. 28, Walter R. Cowart of Dam B formally filed as a Precinct 3 JP candidate seeking the post currently held by John Ed Hanks. Although Hanks has not filed for re-election, the race for the Precinct 3 post has attracted a number of contenders, including Jimmy Wayne Davis, Clam Toland and Frankie Rogers.

Thus far, a total of 18 candidates have filed for the 11 local positions that will be featured on the 1994 election ballot.

As of noon Tuesday, the only countywide contested races were for the Tyler County criminal district

attorney's post, in which incumbent James A. "Jim" Clark was being challenged by former DA Pat Hardy, and the county treasurer's office, in which Assistant Treasurer Tina Bump and former banker Webb W. Ashworth were seeking the post being vacated by the retirement of Jean Phillips.

On the precinct level, contested races included that for the Precinct 2 county commission seat in which incumbent Commissioner A.M. "Pete" Barnes was being challenged by Chester Mayor Bryan Davis; the Precinct 3 JP post; and the Precinct 4 JP position in which incumbent JP Roy Drake was being challenged by Gordon McCabe.

Other county positions on the March primary ballot have thus far attracted only the incumbents. Those who are unopposed thus far include County Judge Jerome Owens, District Clerk Patricia (Pat) Brown, County Clerk Donece Langham Gregory, Precinct 4 County Commissioner Henry Earl Sawyer, Precinct 1 JP Wanda Brasher

and Precinct 2 JP Tom Parker.

All candidates who have filed thus far are running in the Democratic Party primary.

Those wishing to file in the Democratic Party Primary must submit applications by Jan. 3 to Wilson at Clemmons Insurance, 102 S. Charlton St. in Woodville. The office is open weekdays from 8:30-4:30 p.m. and Wilson may be reached by calling 283-5377.

Candidates seeking a place on the Republican Party Primary also have until Jan. 3 to file their applications with the County Republican Chairman Dr. Brian Babin at his dental office at 1002 W. Bluff in Woodville. Babin's office is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays and he may be contacted by calling 283-3721.

The primary elections will be held on March 8 with the winners advancing to the general election to be held in November 1994. Early voting in both primaries begins on Feb. 16.

Tax hikes, accidents among top 1993 stories

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of a two-part series concerning the top news stories which appeared on the front pages of the Tyler County Booster during 1993.)

WOODVILLE — Fatal accidents and increases in local taxes were among the leading stories which occurred in Tyler County during the first half of 1993.

In addition, 1993 saw a number of the state's political leaders paying visits to the area. Gov. Ann Richards served as the grand marshal of the 50th annual Tyler County Dogwood Festival Parade while Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry and State Comptroller John Sharp spoke to the Woodville Lions Club. The newly appointed chairman of the highway commission, David Bernsen, also came to town to speak to a gathering of East Texas county and city officials.

Following is a month-by-month breakdown of the top stories of the year.

JANUARY

As the new year got underway in January, county residents were still reacting to a fatal accident that occurred on Dec. 22, 1992 in Spurger.

The mishap involved a car and a log truck at the intersection of FM 92 and FM 1013 and claimed the life of the car's driver, Thomas Henry Gravenmiller, 82, of Spurger.

A 10-year-old passenger in the Gravenmiller vehicle, Rebecca Jensen, was in critical condition in a Beaumont hospital and a special fund to accept donations for her medical care was established shortly after Jan. 1 at a Woodville bank.

As a result of the fatal accident, county officials were able to convince the Texas Department of Transportation to initiate a study aimed at installing a flashing beacon at the intersection to help control traffic. Later in the year, TxDOT announced that it would install the beacon at the Spurger intersection as well as at the intersection of Highway 69 and FM 1943 in Warren.

Also in January, the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce named the Woodville Brookshire Brothers grocery store as its 1992 Business of the Year Award winner.

Chamber officials noted that with an annual payroll topping \$600,000 and a long tradition of community involvement, the grocery store was more than qualified to win the top local business award.

That award, together with other top chamber honors, was formally presented during the annual membership banquet held on Jan. 21. Outgoing Chamber President Gene Koci was named as the 1992 Outstanding Citizen while the 1992 Honorary Outstanding Citizen award went to J.H. "Jiggs" Kennesson Jr.

Koci was cited for unselfishly giving his time to a wide range of community projects during 1992 and for his efforts to promote Tyler County and improve its economic life; Kennesson was recognized for his lifetime of achievement in making the county a better place to live.

In late January, the Tyler County Dogwood Festival Committee announced that Texas Governor Ann W. Richards would serve as the marshal of the festival's 50th annual parade on March 20.

FEBRUARY

On Feb. 6, Leslie Jane Boykin, 17-year-old daughter of Robert and Jane Boykin of Woodville, was crowned as the 1993 Miss Tyler County during the 28th annual scholarship pageant. Sponsored by the Wisteria Chapter of

WOODVILLE — Woodville City Council and the Houston Electric Co-op (SHECO) reached contract agreements after considerable negotiation regarding the installation of a water line extending out Highway 287 North this past week following a city council meeting on Wednesday, Dec. 15.

The water line is already installed. The agreement provides for the city to pay \$21,936 for the contractor installation of the line and then SHECO to reimburse the city for that cost, or any other cost. The contract was entered into according to City Attorney Harry Stafford, "as to cost or liability to the city."

SHECO agreed to those terms Friday, Dec. 17.
In other business the city passed an ordinance which will allow Gulf States Utilities customers within the city who use 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity to receive a one-time credit on their electric bill of \$33. According to Gene Koci, GSU Woodville manager, "The payment stems from a recent rate case settlement."

Council voted to reject a focus on persons who illegally dump trash within the city limits. When council looked at the city participation costs connected with the grant it decided not to buy into the program.
The city council passed Ordinance No. 93-3 providing for a 35 m.p.h. speed zone within the city limits at the entrance to Woodville High School. The 35 m.p.h. speed limit will be in effect until the school is demolished.

City Secretary Don Shaw said he was looking into an arrangement for the city to buy into the program. County Landfill. Shaw told the council that he believed the Polk County landfill would be closing soon because of stringent federal and state mandates and another landfill had to be found.
Shaw said the Angela County landfill had a 40-year lifespan.
In other business council handled motions for Stafford to initiate the FIA portion of the legal services for the new proposed sewer plant.

Caring is Sharing is located at 308 Beaver St. in Woodville. Their hours are from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday. They are closed Christmas Eve, New Year's Eve and the Friday before all holidays observed by the Aging Center.

"Are we our brothers' keepers? Of course we are! Those who have been helped today may, one day, help others. May each of us, contributor and recipient, experience a very blessed Christmas. In Jesus name I Pray."

Woodville Eagles ready for another state title run

WOODVILLE — Although Woodville coach John Lamberti would be the first to warn about counting chickens before they hatch, there is no doubt that this year's Woodville Eagles basketball team has all the makings of a state finalist.

"We have enough talent," admits the Woodville coach when asked of Woodville's chances of making it to Austin for the 32nd year in a row. "But he also warns, 'We've got to stay healthy, get some breaks, and keep everyone eligible.'"

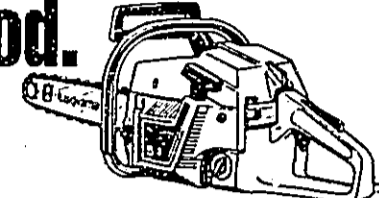

Holiday party ends in murder-suicide

WARREN — An all-night party ended violently Christmas morning when a 20-year-old Warren man used a shotgun to murder his girlfriend and a 17-year-old party guest before turning the weapon on himself.

According to Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace Tom Parker, Michael Joseph Tannery, 20, killed himself with a blast to the head from a 12 gauge shotgun shortly after he used the weapon to kill his girlfriend, Christina Marie Newsom, 20, and Joe Oscar Groze, 17, also of Warren.

"Mr. Groze was the first victim and was shot in the buttock and the right side of the head," Parker said. "Miss Newsom was shot two times, once in the fleshy part of her arm and into her side but I cannot point out where the second shot went. I assume it went into the same area."

When turned into a bloody Christmas morning shooting spree began as an all-night holiday party that began on Christmas Eve. Tannery and Newsom were the hosts and Newsom's two younger sisters, ages 15 and 13, were in the mobile home as were Newsom's two-year-old daughter and Newsom's five-month-old daughter.

After the shooting began, the two teenagers grabbed the two younger children and fled to a neighbor's to call for help. None of the children were wounded during the gunfire.

Parker said that Tannery did leave a note before killing himself.

Sgt. Steve Sturrock of the Tyler County Sheriff's Department said officers were called to the scene of the shooting about 8:30 a.m. Christmas morning and discovered the three bodies lying in and around the mobile home.

Sturrock said investigators recovered one spent shotgun shell casing in a hallway and two in the kitchen where Groze's body was found. Two other

spent casings were laying at the foot of the bed in which Newsom's body was found.

"Tannery was laying on the porch by the front door with the 12 gauge, pump action shotgun laying nearby. One empty hull was found in the shotgun," he said.

The apparent motive for the double murder and suicide was jealousy, Parker said. "Tannery was angry about an alleged affair between Groze and Newsom. They had apparently been arguing off and on as the party progressed."

"The seed was planted, fertilized all night with alcohol and harvested at about 8:30 that morning with murder," the judge said.

Parker said that Tannery and Newsom met over a year ago in Florida where Tannery was working on a construction job. About six months ago Tannery brought the woman to Warren where they lived together in a mobile home in a subdivision located off the county extension of FM 3290 near Warren.

Although the judge was unsure of what time the party ended, he said the two teenagers went to sleep at about 6:30 a.m. Christmas morning. When the first shot occurred at about 8:30 a.m., one other guest who was asleep on the living room couch ran from the trailer house, leaving his boots behind.

"Most of the party guests had already gone. The two people who were still awake at the time of the first shot were Groze and Tannery. I guess the party was still going on for them," Parker said.

The judge said that one of the teenage girls was sleeping with Newsom in a back bedroom when Groze was killed in the kitchen.

"When the first shot was fired, she

WOODVILLE — Dressed in costumes from 19th century Texas, seventh graders from Woodville Middle School roamed through the Heritage Village Museum earlier this month to get a first hand look at how early settlers celebrated the Christmas holiday.

Prior to leaving for their annual holiday break, Woodville Middle School students visited the museum for a day-long look at pioneer life as it related to the Christmas holiday.

The trip culminated a teaching program entitled "The History of Christmas in Texas" which involved all teaching disciplines at the middle school.

"This program brings together a variety of classes and involves the students in a wide range of activities under one subject heading," said Mildred White, a middle school Texas history teacher. "For instance, in history the students studied about how Christmas was celebrated in the past and then they went out and interviewed an older person about their early memories of celebrating Christmas."

These interviews are then reviewed with the best being selected to be printed in a special booklet. Students in the middle school computer classes will then process the interviews and put them into the booklet form.

"Each class discipline has a part in the program. The science class gathers the pine cones and other materials to make the wreaths on each of the classroom doors, the math class made Christmas decorations using geometric forms and the reading class studied England's influence on Christmas traditions in Texas, especially the author Charles Dickens," White said.

Other activities included in the program involved the art class, which prepared old-fashioned cards and decorations; the physical education class, which studied games played by children in early Texas;

Filing deadline nears for primaries

WOODVILLE — With less than a week remaining for people to file for positions on the primary election ballots, only one contender for the Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace post was added to the list of candidates for Tyler County offices.

The deadline for filing as a candidate in either the Democratic or Republican primaries is Monday, Jan. 3.

On Tuesday morning, Dec. 28, Walter R. Cowart of Dean B formally filed as a Precinct 3 JP candidate seeking the post currently held by John Ed Hanks. Although Hanks has not filed for re-election, the race for the Precinct 3 post has attracted a number of contenders, including Jimmy Wayne Davis, Clam Tolra and Frankie Rogers.

Thus far, a total of 18 candidates have filed for the 11 local positions that will be featured on the 1994 election ballot.

As of noon Tuesday, the only countywide contested races were for the Tyler County criminal district

attorney's post, in which incumbent James A. "Jim" Clark was being challenged by former DA Pat Hardy, and the county treasurer's office, in which Assistant Treasurer Tina Bump and former banker Webb W. Ashworth were seeking the post being vacated by the retirement of Jean Phillips.

On the precinct level, contested races included that for the Precinct 2 county commissioner seat in which incumbent Commissioner A.M. "Pete" Barnes was being challenged by Chester Mayor Bryan Davis; the Precinct 3 JP post; and the Precinct 4 JP position in which incumbent JP Roy Drake was being challenged by Gordon McCabe.

Other county positions on the March primary ballot have thus far attracted only the incumbents. Those who are unopposed thus far include County Judge Jerome Owens, District Clerk Patricia (Pat) Brown, County Clerk Donece Langham Gregory, Precinct 4 County Commissioner Henry Earl Sawyer, Precinct 1 JP Wanda Brasher

and Precinct 2 JP Tom Parker.

All candidates who have filed thus far are running in the Democratic Party primary.

Those wishing to file in the Democratic Party Primary must submit applications by Jan. 3 to Wilson at Clemmons Insurance, 102 S. Charlton St. in Woodville. The office is open weekdays from 8:30-4:30 p.m. and Wilson may be reached by calling 283-5377.

Candidates seeking a place on the Republican Party Primary also have until Jan. 3 to file their applications with the County Republican Chairman Dr. Brian Babin at his dental office at 1002 W. Bluff in Woodville. Babin's office is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays and he may be contacted by calling 283-3721.

The primary elections will be held on March 8 with the winners advancing to the general election to be held in November 1994. Early voting in both primaries begins on Feb. 16.

Tax hikes, accidents among top 1993 stories

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of a two-part series concerning the top news stories which appeared on the front pages of the Tyler County Booster during 1993.)

WOODVILLE — Fatal accidents and increases in local taxes were among the leading stories which occurred in Tyler County during the first half of 1993.

In addition, 1993 saw a number of the state's political leaders paying visits to the area. Gov. Ann Richards served as the grand marshal of the 50th annual Tyler County Dogwood Festival Parade while Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry and State Comptroller John Sharp spoke to the Woodville Lions Club. The newly appointed chairman of the highway commission, David Bensen, also came to town to speak to a gathering of East Texas county and city officials.

Following is a month-by-month breakdown of the top stories of the year.

JANUARY

As the new year got underway in January, county residents were still reacting to a fatal accident that occurred on Dec. 22, 1992 in Spurger.

The mishap involved a car and a log truck at the intersection of FM 92 and FM 1013 and claimed the life of the car's driver, Thomas Henry Gravenmier, 82, of Spurger.

A 10-year-old passenger in the Gravenmier vehicle, Rebecca Jensen, was in critical condition in a Beaumont hospital and a special fund to accept donations for her medical care was established shortly after Jan. 1 at a Woodville bank.

As a result of the fatal accident, county officials were able to convince the Texas Department of Transportation to install a flashing beacon at the intersection to help control traffic. Later in the year, TxDOT announced that it would install the beacon at the Spurger intersection as well as at the intersection of Highway 69 and FM 1943 in Warren.

Also in January, the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce named the Woodville Brookshire Brothers grocery store as its 1992 Business of the Year Award winner.

Chamber officials noted that with an annual payroll topping \$600,000 and a long tradition of community involvement, the grocery store was more than qualified to win the top local business award.

That award, together with other top chamber honors, was formally presented during the annual membership banquet held on Jan. 21. Outgoing Chamber President Gene Koci was named as the 1992 Outstanding Citizen while the 1992 Honorary Outstanding Citizen award went to J.L. "Jiggs" Kenesson Jr.

Koci was cited for unselfishly giving his time to a wide range of community projects during 1992 and for his efforts to promote Tyler County and improve its economic life; Kenesson was recognized for his lifetime of achievement in making the county a better place to live.

In late January, the Tyler County Dogwood Festival Committee announced that Texas Governor Ann W. Richards would serve as the marshal of the festival's 50th annual parade on March 20.

FEBRUARY

On Feb. 6, Leslie Jane Boykin, 17-year-old daughter of Robert and Jane Boykin of Woodville, was crowned as the 1993 Miss Tyler County during the 28th annual scholarship pageant. Sponsored by the Wisteria Chapter of

We have an income guideline we work by that determines eligibility," she said.

The Monday before Thanksgiving 33 families were served with food. Through the generosity of Carole and Dick Colker, 100 individuals received turkey. "We got the turkeys in half," Marjorie said, "so that everybody got a little bit of turkey for Thanksgiving."
