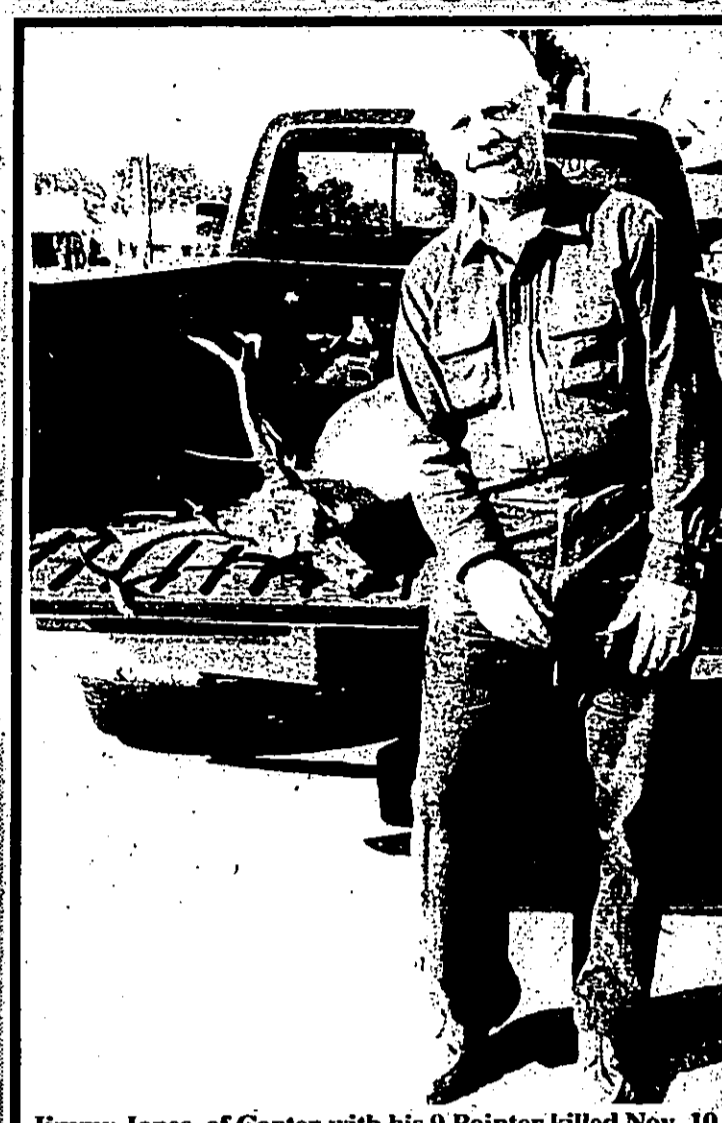

Expansion of Gib Lewis prison unit sought

-Prison board meets Friday in Austin to vote on statewide prison expansion program-

By John Morrison WOODVILLE — If the voting goes like State Representative Allen Hightower (D-Huntsville) is predicting, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) board will approve plans on Friday to expand the Gib Lewis Unit with a new dormitory for 300 more inmates and approximately 60 more staff members. The expansion of the prison staff will include about 50 corrections officers and ten or more support personnel. Hightower said Tuesday he sees the votes for the expansion, but remained cautiously optimistic, even though the majority of the State Criminal Justice Board members are appointees of Governor Ann Richards. "But, I wouldn't be surprised if it was 9 for 9 in favor," he said. A \$308.55 million project will be a welcome relief to Woodville city fathers who actually built the infrastructure for the Lewis unit to accommodate 2,000 inmates, rather than the 1,000 currently incarcerated there. "It will be a win-win situation for Woodville and Tyler County, not only because of more jobs and a \$2.5 million increase in annual payroll, but because the bonded indebtedness originally incurred to build the project will be paid off quicker. The new unit will consume more gas and water while the city had originally projected and which will help the city coffers," Hightower said. Hightower, who chairs the House Correction Committee which helps oversee prisons, was charged with the responsibility of bringing forward a plan that meets the state's statutory responsibilities regarding necessary increases in prison beds. "And do it in a way that was logistically and financially feasible," he said. "The numbers have grown to the extent that the state can no longer sit back and do nothing," Hightower said. Hightower said his committee went to Texas Department of Criminal Justice staff for ideas on how to use extensions on existing facilities as a way out of the problem. "After monitoring the problem and the backlog in county jails we had to do something," he added. According to David Nunlee of the Huntsville TDCJ public relations office, the plan will add 10,800 beds to the prison system, "co-located" at existing sites such as Gib Lewis in Woodville. In addition, 2,000 new boot camp beds will be added to the one boot camp now located in Sugarland. Added to that will be 250 beds to house parole violators and 6,000 two-month "state jail beds which are built and operated in partnership with the counties. The state still has to decide on an additional 1,500 beds after the leadership meets in March.

Election 94: GOP candidate announces

WELCH enters Precinct 2 race CHESTER — Machinist Rudy Welch of Chester has announced that he will be a candidate for the Precinct 2 county commissioner's post during the March 8 Republican Party primary election. Welch, one of two Republicans seeking the nomination as the Precinct 2 commissioner, is running for the position currently held by Commissioner "A.M. 'Tito' Barnes. Barnes is seeking re-election in the Democratic Party Primary in March. The party winners in the two primary elections will face one another in the November general election. Welch, 58, attended four years of elementary school at Camp Ruby and four years at Cimarron before moving to Tyler County where he completed his final four years of high school at Chester. After graduating from Chester High School, he was employed by W.T. Carter and Bros. Lumber Co., working in the road maintenance and logging departments. In 1955, he went into the U.S. Army and completed his basic training at Fort Ord, Calif. He worked eight weeks in supply records at Fort Lee, Va., and then was shipped through Fort Lewis, Wash., to the Incheon Replacement Depot in Korea where he worked in the Post Exchange at the 8057 A.U. Replacement Depot through 1956. In 1957 he processed mail on emergency leave out of Korea and was honorably discharged in 1957. In 1962, Welch went to work at Alby Berry Motors in the service and claims departments and attended Houston Barber College at night. In 1965 he was employed at Western Gear and attended Houston Community College after work and at night. He has been employed by Western Gear, now known as West-Tech Gear Corp., for 28 years as a tool and cutter grinder. Welch also has served as president of United Auto Workers Local 864 in Houston for the past eight years. Faye Mayo went home last Friday... home to be with "Son," her husband of over half a century, who had been waiting for her for nearly 18 years...

...home to sit on the front porch of the old Mayo homestead in Spurger and reminisce about the hundreds, perhaps thousands of young people in whom she had instilled a love for music during the 70 plus years she taught and played and shared her talents with all of Tyler County.

But you wouldn't catch Miss Faye sitting very long. She was an "up and at 'em" lady, who played the piano for the Spurger Methodist Church most of those 70 years, including the Christmas Concert shortly after her 90th birthday.

Born at Hooks Switch near Beaumont on December 2, 1901, Faye came to Tyler County where she attended the Summer Normal School in Woodville. After receiving her Bachelor's certificate, she taught at Hicksburg and Warren before coming to Spurger in 1920 to marry B. E. Mayo, the youngest son of Richard C. and Mary Ann Sheffield. Mayo, who operated the first steam powered mill in the county, it was at the Mayo home, where many young ladies boarded while studying for their teaching certificates, but it was Miss Faye who won the heart of "Son."

From the very beginning of her life in Spurger, Miss Faye played for everything there was to play for, church school, meetings, weddings, funerals, socials, community programs, all the while continuing to study her craft while teaching others in private sessions both during and after school and on Saturdays at home.

During her long career, she also taught music in Warren, Colmesneer and Beaumont and raised four children, who presented her with ten grandchildren, 13 great grandchildren, and two great great grandchildren.

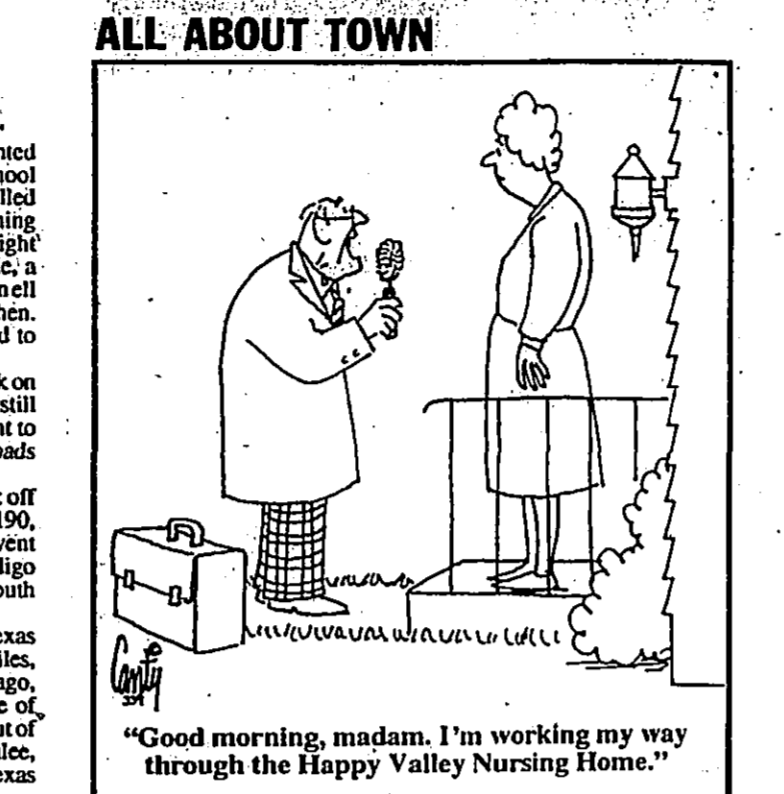

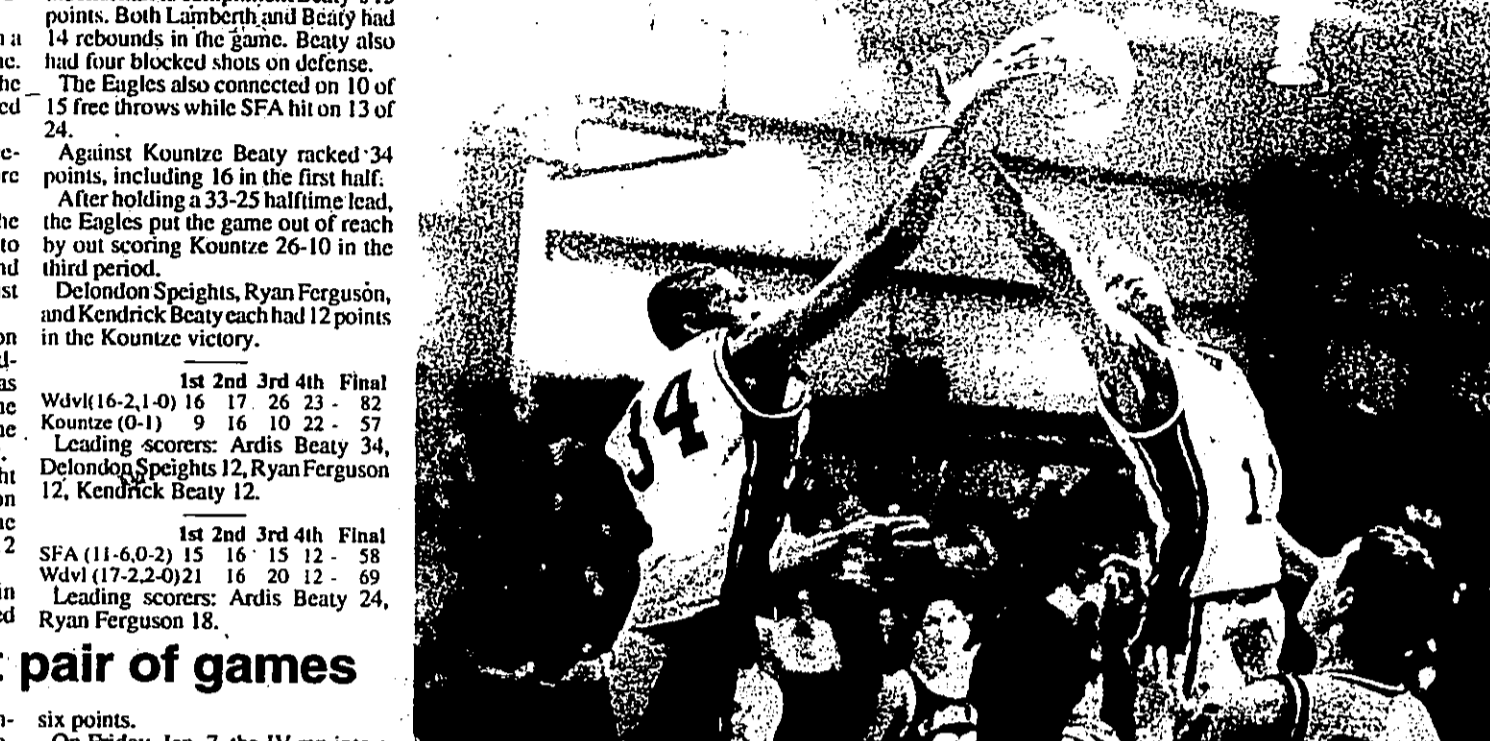
The Eagles upped their lead by 13 in the fourth period before SFA narrowed to six points.

Expansion of Gib Lewis prison unit sought
 -Prison board meets Friday in Austin to vote on statewide prison expansion program-

 WOODVILLE — If the voting goes like State Representative Allen Hightower (D-Hugleyville) is predicting, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) board will approve plans on Friday to expand the Gib Lewis Unit with a new dormitory for 300 more inmates and approximately 60 more staff members.

The expansion of the prison staff will include about 50 corrections officers and ten or more support personnel.

Hightower said Tuesday he sees the votes for the expansion, but remained cautiously optimistic, even though the majority of the State Criminal Justice Board's members are appointees of Governor Ann Richards. "But, I wouldn't be surprised if it was 9 for 9 in favor," he said.

A "yes" vote on the overall \$308.55 million project will be a welcome relief to Woodville city fathers who actually built the infrastructure for the Lewis unit to accommodate 2,000 inmates, rather than the 1,000 currently incarcerated there.

"It will be a win-win situation for Woodville and Tyler County, not only because of more jobs and a \$1.5 million increase in annual payroll, but because the bonded indebtedness originally incurred to build the project will be paid off quicker. The new unit will consume more gas and water which the city had originally projected and which will help the city coffers," Hightower said.

Hightower, who chairs the House Correction Committee which helps oversee prisons, was charged with the responsibility of bringing forward a plan that meets the state's statutory responsibilities regarding necessary increases in prison beds. "And it is in a way that was logistically and financially feasible," he said.

"The numbers have grown to the extent that the state can no longer sit back and do nothing," Hightower said. Hightower said his committee went to Texas Department of Criminal Justice staff for ideas on how to use extensions on existing facilities as a way out of the problem. "After monitoring the problem and the backlog in county jails we had to do something," he added.

According to David Nuntle of the Huntsville TDCJ public relations office, the plan will add 10,800 beds to the prison system, "co-located" at existing sites such as Gib Lewis in Woodville. In addition, 2,000 new box camp beds will be added to the one boat camp now located in Sugarland. Added to that will be 250 beds to house parole violators and 6,000 two-mode "state jail beds which are built and operated in partnership with the counties. The state still has to decide on an additional 1,500 beds after the leadership meets in March.

Sales tax income falls by 34%

WOODVILLE — After two months of steady increases, Tyler County's year-end sales tax payment fell by almost 34 percent when compared to the amount received one year ago.

According to a report issued by Texas Comptroller John Sharp, the county's December sales tax check for \$147,768.98 was about 33.8 percent (\$7,534.44) less than the \$223,311.42 received in December 1992.

The sharp decline in the sales tax income follows a 13.8 percent increase reported in October.

The latest check is the last received under the county's 1993 budget and brings the year's total to \$251,784.78. The current total represents a 6.2 percent (\$14,805.89) increase from the \$236,978.89 received during 1992.

The 1993 total represents over 125 percent of the \$209,000 the county projected it would collect in the 1993 budget.

Although the county's sales tax income declined during the month, Sharp's report listed higher payments to the cities of Woodville and Colmesnell. Chester did not receive a December sales tax payment.

The City of Woodville's December payment of \$31,475.29 was about 4.9 percent (or \$1,547.81) more than the \$30,017.48 check received in December 1992.

Since Jan. 1, 1993, Woodville has collected \$482,906.08 from the tax, a figure which is over a percent (\$16,949.73) more than the \$465,956.35 received during 1993.

Although the latest check the city has received this calendar year, it is only the third it has received since its budget began on Oct. 1. Thus far this year, Woodville had collected \$17,883.67 from the tax, a figure which is 7.4 percent (or \$828.15) more than the \$112,387.42 collected during the first three months of the 93-94 fiscal year.

The total for the first three months of the current fiscal year represents 26.8 percent of the \$450,000 the city projected it would collect under its current budget.

Colmesnell, which has a 1 percent sales tax rate, received a December payment of \$1,406.32, a figure which is about 16.2 percent more than the \$948.88 received one year earlier. During 1993, Colmesnell collected \$22,996.94 in sales tax revenue, a 10.1 percent increase over the \$20,822.24 received during the same period of 1992.

Chester, which also assesses a 1 percent sales tax, did not receive a December payment. However, since Jan. 1, 1993, the city has received \$61,187.79 from the tax, a figure which represents about a 1 percent (or \$47.71) decrease from the \$62,529.50 received during the same period last year.

The city and county sales tax payments, as collected by sales merchants during the same period last year, are as follows:

City of Woodville: \$17,883.67 (1993) vs. \$112,387.42 (1992)
 City of Colmesnell: \$1,406.32 (1993) vs. \$948.88 (1992)
 City of Chester: \$61,187.79 (1993) vs. \$62,529.50 (1992)

Sharp noted that the local payments were sent as part of \$111.8 million in December sales tax payments to 927 Texas cities and 111 counties, a 5.6 percent increase over payments made in December 1992.

Texas cities received \$101 million in payments, up 6.7 percent from the \$94.6 million they received one year earlier. Counties received \$10.7 million in rebates, a 3.9 percent decrease from the \$10.2 million they received in December 1992.

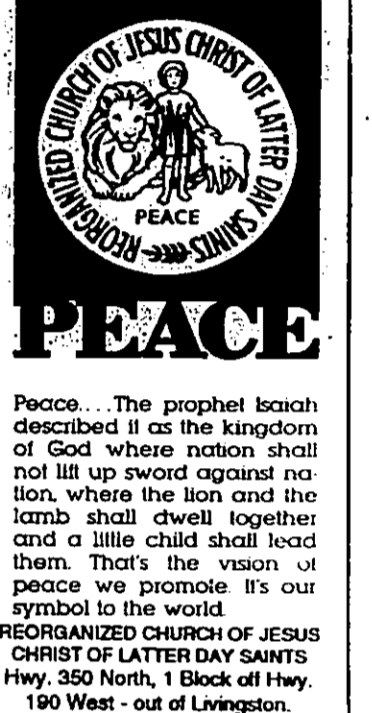

State ranked Woodville to meet Hardin-Jefferson in showdown Friday

WOODVILLE — The state ranked Woodville Eagles are going to be tested in the next two games of district play. After routing away Kountze and Stephen F. Austin last week to open district play, the Eagles now face district rivals Hardin-Jefferson at home Friday and then travel to Newton Tuesday in key district match ups.

The Eagles are ranked second in the state this week by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches with a 17-2 season record. Woodville is 2-0 in district play going into Tuesday night's contest at Kirbyville.

Hardin-Jefferson and Newton were also to have played Tuesday night at Newton. So having an upset by Kirbyville over Woodville, the Eagles can take a firm hold on the district race with wins over H-J and Newton.

Hardin-Jefferson is up and down, notes Woodville coach John Lambeth, but they are still dangerous.

The Hawks, which had a record of 17-0 going into Tuesday night's game, were beaten by Woodville 75-38 in the YMBL tournament.

They have four of their starting five back from last year and three returning from their second year.

"They still run, press, and shoot three's," notes the Woodville coach. Newton knocked off Buna Friday night and carried a 14-5 record into

Tuesday night's game against H-J. Woodville knocked off Newton, 70-60, for the championship of the Woodville Holiday Tournament.

The Eagles put SFA in a hole with a 69-58 district win Friday night at home. SFA had earlier lost to H-J in the season opener, while the Eagles blasted Kountze 82-57.

Against SFA the Eagles played see-saw throughout the first half before taking control in the third quarter. Woodville led 21-15 at the end of the first period, but watched SFA move to a five-point lead midway in the second period before regaining the lead just before the half.

Ardis Beaty again led the Eagles on the scoreboard with 24 points, including hitting two 3-pointers. But it was Ryan Ferguson's three pointers in the third period that gave the Eagles the cushion they needed for the victory.

Ferguson, who finished the night with 18 points, popped the nets on three consecutive 3-pointers in the third period to give the Eagles a 12-point lead.

The Eagles upped their lead by 13 in the fourth period before SFA narrowed the gap at the end of the game.

Josh Lambeth had eight points in the first half but finished with 15 points. Both Lambeth and Beaty had 14 rebounds in the game. Beaty also had four blocked shots on defense. The Eagles also connected on 10 of 13 free throws while SFA hit on 13 of 24.

Against Kountze Beaty racked 34 points, including 16 in the first half. After holding a 33-25 halftime lead, the Eagles put the game out of reach by out scoring Kountze 26-10 in the third period.

Delondan Speights, Ryan Ferguson, and Kendrick Beaty each had 12 points in the Kountze victory.
