

FmHA moves to speed up loan processing

TEMPLE — Texas farmers applying for assistance from Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will experience a breath of fresh air this year, George Ellis, FmHA Texas State Director, said today.

"I have today taken action to designate the full loan approval authority to the Texas State Director," Ellis said.

"The action means that FmHA's

services at the County level will be able to exercise loan approval authority up to the full County limit without any review or review of loan applications in order to approve an FmHA loan. This system was instituted several years ago in order to issue fewer mistakes and more uniformity from County to County.

"I still intend to hold FmHA Supervisors to the same high standards as in the past, however, I am also dedicated to streamlining the process so that our farm customers will have funds avail-

able to them at the time they are needed," said Ellis.

Farmers Home Administration, as an Equal Opportunity Lender, makes loans or grants to individuals or groups and guarantees to approved lenders without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin, marital status, and handicap. The mood of the first four TSHL's speaks for itself. Texas legislators recognize the value of the informed members of the TSHL and frequently call on them to attend hearings, committee meetings, and provide testimony on vital issues. Approximately 70 percent of the issues which the TSHL have presented have been addressed by the

Texas Legislature.

This TSHL will be the fifth group elected. Terms are for two years. Expenses for meetings in Austin are the responsibility of the TSHL members, with one exception: expense for the Orientation and Training Session, which will be held August 2-5, 1994 in Austin.

It is paid for by the Texas Silver Haired Legislature Foundation. The Legislative Session of the TSHL is scheduled for Sept. 12-16 in the Capitol Building.

Cocaine seized, four men arrested

WOODVILLE — Crack cocaine valued at about \$2,400 was seized and four men were arrested following three separate incidents investigated by the Tyler County Sheriff's Department last week.

Lonell Hooper of Doucette, his brother Gary Hooper, also of Doucette, and Daniel White of Warren, were each charged with possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver while Earl Barlow Jr. of Doucette was charged with possession of a controlled substance.

According to Chief Deputy Sam Bible, Lonell Hooper was arrested on Friday, Feb. 11, after deputies received information that a man was selling drugs out of a car in the parking lot of the O-Kay Food Store in Woodville.

Bible, together with Deputy Clint Smurock and Woodville Police Chief Scott Yosko, went to the store and spotted the car matching the description they had been given.

Woodville man held following shooting

WOODVILLE — A 54-year-old Woodville man was held in the Tyler County Justice Center early this week under a \$50,000 bond after being charged with attempted murder in connection with a shooting incident that left another man in critical condition.

Edward Lynn Lewis Sr. was charged in connection with the Thursday, Feb. 10, incident before Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace Wanda Brasher, who set the bond.

The victim in the shooting, Larry Cortell Smith of Woodville, was listed in critical condition at St. Elizabeth Hospital in Beaumont early this week. He had suffered .25 caliber and 12 gauge shotgun wounds to the hand, side and shoulder.

According to Woodville police and Tyler County Sheriff's Department reports, the incident involving Lewis occurred when he attempted to enter the home of Willie Horn at 801 Cardinal Drive in Woodville.

The woman told police that Lewis had entered her home, assaulted her and pointed a small caliber handgun at her. She left her home to call police and when she returned, the suspect had gone. She subsequently went to the police department and filed formal charges.

According to Police Chief Scott Yosko, a warrant was issued at that time charging Lewis with aggravated assault.

About 5:24 p.m. that day, deputy-sheriff's were called to the scene of another incident about two miles east of Woodville on Highway 190 involving the shooting of Smiddy.

Chief Deputy Sam Bible said that Smith was enroute home from work, traveling west on Highway 190 in a car owned by Horn, when a black car

Woodville eyes \$2 million sewage grant

WOODVILLE — The Woodville City Council voted Monday to continue the application process for a \$2 million Farmers Home Administration grant to help pay for a planned 140-acre lagoonal sewage treatment plant to be located in the southwest quadrant of the city.

The total estimated sewer plant project cost is \$4.4 million.

Actual construction cost will be \$3,500,000 with an additional \$750,000 needed for the construction of a sewage outfall interceptor. Other supplemental costs such as engineering reports, legal fees, bonding costs and administrative and contingency costs will come to \$120,000.

The city's current sewage treatment facilities are in violation of state regulations, according to City Engineer Robert C. Kyle, representing City Council members.

Kyle said that the city was permitted to handle 90,000 gallons of effluent per day but the readings in January showed actual usage at 103,000 gallons.

Mayor Billie Rose, however, indicated the city was in compliance with all the required letters to federal and state entities regarding the future development of the city's sewer construction plans needed to allow the sewer overages.

"We've got to build this sewer plant," said Rose.

Indians bid good-bye to tribal chief

INDIAN VILLAGE — "He has laid the path for us to follow in years to come, and we will try to follow the trail he has made for us to follow. Well done, rest in peace."

With those words, Mikko Oskola Clayton Sylestine finalized his eulogy of Chief Mikko Choba Kina - Robert Fulton Battise - in a funeral before an overflow crowd at the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation's gymnasium at 10 a.m. on Friday, Feb. 11.

Sylestine, second chief of the tribes, told the crowd, "The name of Chief Kina is echoed around the world... He was a devoted husband and father, a lifetime chief and a lifetime elder in the Presbyterian Church. He was a man of great faith."

Chief Battise, known as Chief Kina Kina in the Indian language, died Tuesday, Feb. 8, following surgery at St. Elizabeth Hospital in Beaumont. He was 84 and had served as second and later first chief of the tribes for 58 years.

Dr. Pam Morgan officiated at the service.

Neighborhood Watch to establish patrols

WOODVILLE — In an effort to "drive drug dealers out" of their neighborhood, Woodville Neighborhood Watch groups will be establishing volunteer foot patrols in the near future.

According to Woodville Police Chief Scott Yosko, plans are now being drafted to establish the patrols in cooperation with local police and the Woodville Housing Authority.

"The Woodville Police Department has been receiving information from the Neighborhood Watch groups for well over a year relating to drug trafficking and other criminal activity," Yosko said.

"This information has helped us to solve many criminal cases and rest drug traffickers on a fairly regular basis. Now, the groups will be helping us in an effort to enhance their effectiveness."

Last month, the watch groups gathered with police and local officials in a meeting hosted by the housing authority to discuss the possibility of a patrol program. A second meeting to finalize plans from the effort is set for 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 22, at the Woodville Police Department.

Yosko said the watch groups want to "drug dealers out" of their neighborhood. They have a "zero tolerance" drug trafficking in their neighborhood.

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Chief Robert Fulton Battise

INDIAN VILLAGE — Funeral services for Robert Fulton Battise, 84, first chief of the Alabama-Coushatta Indian tribes, were held at 2 p.m. Friday, Feb. 11, 1994, from the Indian Reservation Gymnasium at Indian Village with Dr. Pam Morgan officiating.

Burial followed in the Indian Village Cemetery.

Chief Battise died Feb. 8 at St. Elizabeth Hospital in Beaumont following surgery.

Born March 16, 1909 on the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation, he was the son of McCoo and Mabel Syles and attended school on the reservation. He was married to the former Eva Bullock on March 3, 1934.

He worked as a farmer as for the W.T. Center Lumber Co. of Camden, retiring when the company was acquired by Champion International. He also was a Sunday school teacher, a choir leader and sang bass in a quartet over the years.

He served the Alabama-Coushatta tribes for 38 years. At the age of 27 he was inaugurated as second chief along with his wife, Mrs. Eva Bullock, on Jan. 1, 1936, along with Bronson Cooper Syles as first chief. On Jan. 1, 1970 he was inaugurated as Chief Kina, or first chief of the tribes.

In addition to his lifetime position as chief, he was a lifetime ruling elder of the Indian Presbyterian Church, a respected leader of his people, he was known for his interest in the welfare and education of the tribes' children. There are an Chief Kina Scholarships awarded at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville as well as at the reservation. Both were named in Chief Battise's honor.

Chief Battise also was a champion chili cook and was known as a gracious host to all who visited with him. He was a friend of former President George Bush and knew every Texas governor personally since the 1930s. Dignitaries from all over the world visited him at the reservation.

He was the great-grandson of Chief Colaba, grand nephew of Chief Charlie Thompson, a nephew of Chief Cooper Syles and a double first cousin of Second Chief Emmet Battise.

He was preceded in death by his parents, his wife, Eva Bullock Battise, on June 28, 1987; a son, Claude Teer Battise, on Jan. 1, 1944; and a brother, Benjamin Battise.

Survivors include a daughter, Zetha

Nann Battise of Livingston; five sisters: Avery Battise, Fuller Battise, Ulla Battise, Dorcas Bullock and Louise Mae Battise, all of Livingston; and a number of other relatives.

The family has asked that donations be made to the Chief Kina Scholarship Fund, in care of Laurine Lowe Battise at the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation.

Eagles earn playoff berth with Newton win

WOODVILLE — It's now official. The Woodville Eagles are in the playoffs.

After falling to the Hardin-Jefferson Hawks last week in a district showdown, the Eagles rolled back to knock off the Newton Eagles Friday night to at least secure a second place finish in district 24-3A.

The Newton victory gave the Eagles a 10-2 mark, one game behind Hardin-Jefferson, with two games remaining in district play.

Woodville hosted Orangefield Tuesday night and will close out district play Friday at Buna.

The Eagles are still hoping for a possible first place tie with Hardin-Jefferson. The Hawks played Buna at home Tuesday night and travel to Kountze Friday for the last district game.

Should H-J stumble and Woodville win its last two games, both teams would tie for the district title. A one game playoff would then take place to determine which team would represent the district as the first and second place team. That game would be played Tuesday at a neutral site.

If Hardin-Jefferson wins out, the Eagles will move into bi-district play against Tarkington, winners of district 23-3A. Woodville would play the Longhorns February 24 or 25 most likely at Livingston or Huntsville, with the winner moving on to the area playoffs against the likes of Rockdale or

LaGrange. Hardin-Jefferson, now ranked ninth in the state in this week's Texas Association of Basketball Coaches poll after its win over Woodville, will play either Hamshire-Fannett or Liberty in bi-district play. Both H-F and Liberty are tied for second place in the district 23-3A standings.

Last year Woodville swept through the bi-district and area playoffs by defeating Anahua 68-53 and Rockdale 72-64. Hardin-Jefferson's march to the playoffs by virtue of key district wins over Newton, Buna and Stephen F. Austin, along with an impressive win over Woodville last week.

Woodville led only briefly against Hardin-Jefferson in the 66-55 loss. That was with two minutes remaining in the first period.

Hardin-Jefferson responded by regaining the lead before the end of the period, taking a 14-11 lead at the break. Woodville was unable to get anything going inside, and by halftime Hardin-Jefferson held a comfortable 34-21 lead.

In the second half the Eagles played better, narrowing the gap to five points in the midway in the fourth period, but was unable to hit key shots or gather deci-

sive rebounds. After taking a 21-11 lead in the first quarter, Newton rallied back to narrow the gap to a 33-31 margin at halftime.

Newton took a four point lead midway in the final period before Woodville heard a wake-up call. A reverse slam by Beaty seemed to fire up the Eagles, and with two minutes to go Josh Lambert hit a three pointer to put Woodville up by five. From there Woodville dominated and won the game going away.

Beaty hit for 36, with Speights added 11, and Lambert tossed in 10. Speights grabbed 16 rebounds, with Beaty and Lambert each notching 12.

The victory pushed Woodville's record to 25-4 for the season. Lambert said that the Newton win "relieved a lot of tensions" for his Eagles. "It's been tough on the kids. Everybody's expectations have been so high."

FmHA moves to speed up loan processing

TEMPLE — Texas farmers applying for assistance from Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will experience a breath of fresh air this year, George Ellis, FmHA Texas State Director, said today.

"I have today taken action to delegate the full loan approval authority allowed under the Federal Regulations to FmHA County Offices in Texas," Ellis said.

"This action means that FmHA supervisors at the County level will be able to exercise loan approval authority up to the full County limit without prior review being required at other locations or even by FmHA officials at the same location."

"As this new year begins, I feel this will be a real help to our farm customers, and I intend to pursue this type of change, wherever, whenever I can," said Ellis.

FmHA County Supervisors were previously subject to a complicated system of reviews and reviews of loan applications in order to approve an FmHA loan. This system was instituted several years ago in order to insure fewer mistakes and more uniformity from County to County.

"I still intend to hold FmHA Supervisors to the same high standards as in the past, however, I am also dedicated to streamlining the process so that our farm customers will have funds available to them at the time they are needed," said Ellis.

Expenses for meetings in Austin are the responsibility of the TSHL member, with one exception: expense for the Orientation and Training Session, which will be held August 2-5, 1994 in Austin is paid for by the Texas Silver Haired Legislature Foundation. The Legislative Session of the TSHL is scheduled for Sept. 12-16 in the Capitol Building.

Cocaine seized, four men arrested

WOODVILLE — Crack cocaine valued at about \$2,400 were seized and four men were arrested following three separate incidents investigated by the Tyler County Sheriff's Department last week.

Lonnell Hooper of Doucette, the brother Gary Hooper, also of Doucette, and Daniel White of Warren, were each charged with possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver while Earl Barlow Jr. of Doucette was charged with possession of a controlled substance.

According to Chief Deputy Sam Bible, Lonnell Hooper was arrested on Friday, Feb. 11, after deputies received information that a man was selling drugs out of a car in the parking lot of the O-Kay Food Store in Woodville.

Bible, together with Deputy Clint Sturrock and Woodville Police Chief Scott Yasko, went to the store and spotted the car matching the description they had been given.

"When we got out of the cars and began to approach the suspect's vehicle, he broke and ran," Bible said, adding they chased the suspect from the store to behind the Tyler County Nutrition Center where he was captured.

"We had to wrestle him to the ground before we could stop his attempts to run," Bible added.

Officers subsequently found a clear plastic bottle containing about 40 rocks of crack cocaine. In addition, two larger rocks were discovered in a plastic bag in the suspect's front pocket.

Overall, Bible said officers recovered the equivalent to about 80 rocks of cocaine valued at about \$1,600.

The vehicle used by the suspect also was seized and Bible said officers will seek to confiscate the car.

Because Hooper was already free on bond on two previous felony drug charges, and because of the amount of drugs involved, Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace Wanda Brasher set his bond at \$100,000. He remained in the Tyler County Jail.

Woodville man held following shooting

WOODVILLE — A 54-year-old Woodville man was being held in the Tyler County Justice Center early this week under a \$50,000 bond after being charged with attempted murder in connection with a shooting incident that left another man in critical condition.

Edward Lynn Lewis Sr. was charged in connection with the Thursday, Feb. 10, incident before Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace Wanda Brasher, who set his bond.

The victim in the shooting, Larry Cordell Smith of Woodville, was listed in critical condition at St. Elizabeth Hospital in Beaumont early this week. He had suffered 25 caliber and 12 gauge shotgun wounds to the hand, side and shoulder.

According to Woodville police and Tyler County Sheriff's Department reports, the incident involving Lewis reportedly began about 4:42 p.m. on Feb. 10 when police were called to the home of Willie Horn at 801 Cardinal Drive in Woodville.

The woman told police that Lewis had entered her home, assaulted her and pointed a small caliber handgun at her. She left her home to call police and when she returned, the suspect had gone. She subsequently went to the police department and filed a formal charge.

According to Police Chief Scott Yasko, a warrant was issued at that time charging Lewis with aggravated assault.

About 5:34 p.m. that day, deputy sheriff's were called to the scene of another incident about two miles east of Woodville on Highway 190 involving the shooting of Smith.

According to Woodville Police Chief Scott Yasko, plans are now being drafted to establish the patrols in cooperation with local police and the Woodville Housing Authority.

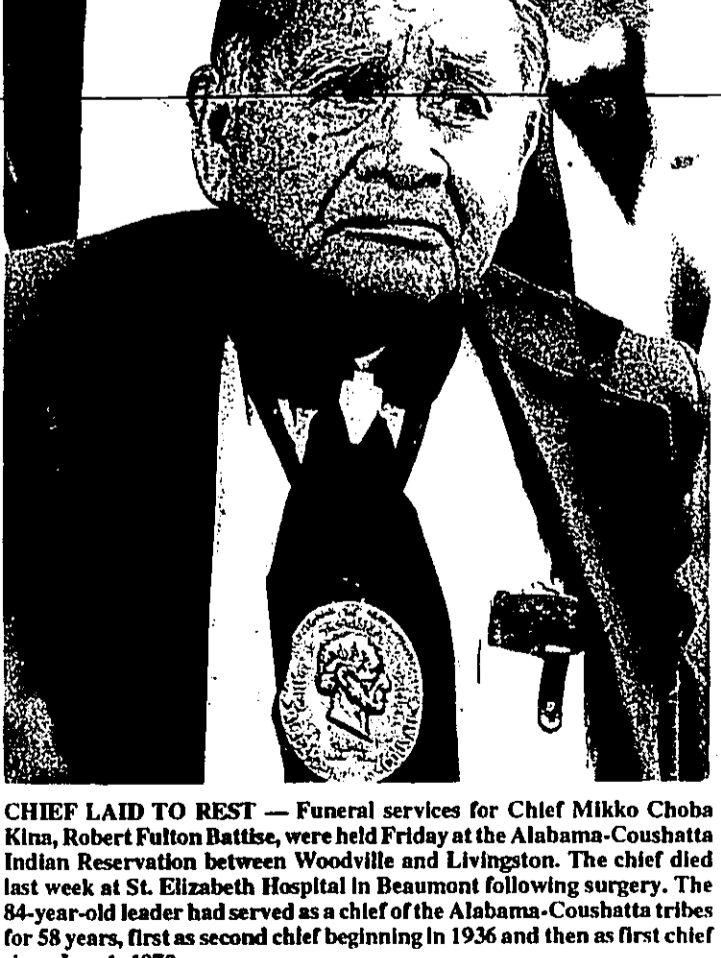
The Woodville Police Department has been receiving information from the Neighborhood Watch groups for well over a year relating to drug trafficking and other criminal activities.

Gladys Pool died last Sunday morning at her home in the Cherokee community, where she lived her entire 74 years. We offer our deep condolences to her father Herman, who celebrated his 99th birthday last December, and her brother Jack.

But, thanks to Gladys and Herman, her memory and that of all those who ever called Cherokee home will live on in the form of the church she helped build to Heritage Village Museum.

During a visit with Gladys and her father several years ago, they recalled the "dry days of Cherokee, when it was a saw mill, a cotton gin, a general store and a post office, which was the reason for the community being renamed Cherokee-Dies. There already was a Cherokee Post Office design on the Texas, so the Dies name was chosen in honor of the late Martin Dies, Sr.

Gladys missed the days when the church served as a school house, attending her earliest grades in a two-room school that was built on the church grounds. From there, she went on to Woodville and Sam Houston State Teachers College, which brought her full circle to her first teaching assignment at Cherokee. Consolidation took her back to Woodville, where she taught for several years before going home to stay.

In 1945 she became clerk of the Cherokee Church, which her father

and other Baptist families in the community bought from the Methodists in 1936. She held that post from 1945 to 1954 and again from 1962 until 1986, when the Cherokee Church closed its doors, its congregation down to only a handful of members no longer able to support it.

Over the next several years, those faithful few made the soil searching decision that brought this historic church to the Village. Gladys and Herman Pool, Aaron Durham and J. C. Cruse, acting as agents and trustees of Cherokee Church, not only gave the church building to the Village, they gave the funds remaining in the church treasury and those received from the sale of the church property to help defray the cost of moving.

And so Cherokee Church and all its memories were taken apart board by board and replaced in the same place at Heritage Village Museum, where it serves as a church, a meeting place, an entertainment and educational center, much as it did during the 134 years it served as a religious, educational and community center for all denominations.

Thanks, too, to Gladys' service as clerk for those many years, she and her father were able to give to the Village all the records kept during the 50 years Cherokee served as a Baptist congregation.

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A new age in health care is coming to Texas

Amidst the talk of a bill given to the debate over national health care, health care is quietly about to become more affordable for an estimated 2.6 million uninsured Texans.

When it took effect on Jan. 1, the Texas Small Employer Health Insurance Availability Act (House Bill 2055) began helping to provide insurance for those uninsured Texans by

setting up affordable insurance plans for small businesses and their employees.

How does this cover the uninsured? Two of every three uninsured Texans are either employed or in the immediate family of someone who is employed. Many of these uninsured work for small businesses that have been priced out of the health care market by skyrocketing premiums.

The Texas Plan will provide health care without a cumbersome bureaucracy, tax increases or vague promises. It will do so by allowing these small businesses to join together in larger pools that can negotiate better insurance plans. Two or more businesses may form their own pool, sharing the discounts of being a part of a larger group. Small businesses may join a statewide non-profit buying cooperative, the Texas Insurance Purchasing Alliance, that will arrange coverage at group-firm rates. Small businesses can also turn to commercial insurance companies which will be required to offer these plans.

The Texas Plan will provide four group health insurance options for small employers, those with 3 to 50 employees. Two of the four options will be available for substantially less in premiums than coverage available in the market today. Small employers who are satisfied with their coverage may continue that coverage or may choose from three plans:

- Preventive and primary coverage includes diagnostic tests and screening, intended to find and treat problems early before more expensive care is required.
- In-hospital only coverage provides emergency care and hospitalization, some of the most expensive health care and the type that has bankrupted too many families.
- Standard coverage includes both preventive and primary coverage plus in-hospital and out-patient treatment.

Under the Texas Plan, employers will pay at least 75 percent of the monthly insurance premium for the

plan they select for their employees, estimated to be between \$60 per employee on the in-hospital only plan to \$165 for the standard plan.

This is more than just a stop-gap solution. Considering the difference this will make for a business with 10 employees that is paying \$140 per employee each month to provide comprehensive coverage for them. The average employer of this size who is paying 50 percent of the premium, will have two or three employees who are either covered or have the option to be covered toward their coverage and are thus uninsured.

Under the Act, the same employer can provide his employees with a hospital plan at a cost of about \$60 a month per person or \$2 a day. Of this the employer pays 75 percent or \$1.50 a day. Then, those employees who wish to do so may contribute an additional \$50 or \$60 per month to trade up to comprehensive coverage. Forty percent or more of the group want to trade up for more benefits, they do so regardless of their health status.

This plan will stop insurance companies from insuring only selected employees while excluding low-wage earners and known health risks. Many more Texans will have access to the care they need at a price that they and their employers can afford.

Is this the perfect plan? There is no one perfect plan. However, the Texas Small Employer Health Insurance Availability Act is a very big step toward helping many Texans help themselves.

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Early voting begins Wednesday, Feb. 16

WOODVILLE — Early voting for the March 8 primary elections begins today (Wednesday, Feb. 16) at the Tyler County Courthouse in Woodville.

Early voting, which continued through March 4, will be held from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in the Domino Hall located on the west side of the courthouse square.

A special Saturday voting day has been scheduled from 2-6 p.m. on Feb. 26, also in the Domino Hall.

Applications for mail-in ballots will be accepted by the Tyler County clerk's office through March 1.

Those eligible to vote by mail include those over 65 years of age or disabled and those who are registered to vote in Tyler County but need to have a ballot sent to an out-of-county address, including members of the military. Those applying for mail-in ballots must specify their party preference — whether they wish to vote in the Democratic or Republican primaries.

The March 8 primaries will determine who will be on the ballot in the November general elections.

Among the local candidates seeking office in the Democratic primary, there are only a handful of contested races.

Incumbent District Attorney Jim Clark is being challenged in his bid for a second term by former DA Pat Hardy.

The only other county-wide office tested race is for the County Treasurer's post, which is being vacated by the retirement of incumbent Treasurer Jean Phillips at the end of her present term. Deputy Treasurer Tina Bump and former banker Webb Ashworth are both seeking the office.

In the race for the Precinct 2 commissioner's post, incumbent Commissioner A.M. "Pete" Barnes is being challenged by Chester Mayor Bryson Davis.

Candidates seeking the Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace job being vacated by John Ed Hanks, candidates include building contractor Walter Ray Cowart, former Justice of the Peace Jimmy Wayne Davis, Woodville city health inspector Frankie Rogers, former constable Larry Crews and bookkeeper Clara Tolar.

The only other local race that developed in the Democratic Primary is that for the Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace position. Incumbent Roy Drake of Spurger is being challenged by Gordon McCabe of Odenville. Drake is seeking his sixth term as JP. McCabe, a native of Arizona, has resided in Tyler County since 1975 and has been employed by GSU (Energy) since 1978.

Other local office on this year's primary ballot drew only the incumbent candidates. They include Tyler County Judge Jerome Owens, District Clerk Patricia (Pat) Brown, Tyler County Clerk Donce Gregory, Precinct 4 Commissioner Henry East, Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace Wanda Brasher and Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace Tom Parker.

On the Republican side, only two candidates are seeking local office. Rudy L. Welch of Chester, a machinist, and Marion Houser of Woodville, a supervisor with Champion International, are both running for the Precinct 2 commissioner's post now held by Barnes.

Trash collection center opening nears

WOODVILLE — With an April 9 deadline looming closer on the horizon, members of the Tyler County Board of Commissioners are working to complete the final, major expenditure on the construction of a new community garbage collection center.

During Monday's meeting, the commissioners approved \$12,800 in additional road work to insure that county residents will have all-weather access to the newly completed collection center on Old Livingston Road near Woodville.

The commissioners earlier had approved \$31,418 to pave the access route to the trash compacting center from Highway 190 West. The additional funds will be used to improve the rock base of the road before it is paved. Mathews Construction Co. of Jasper is performing both the rock base improvement and paving work.

Under the road improvement plan, the county road which runs south from Highway 190 by the Henning Park baseball complex will be paved to its intersection with Old Livingston Road. The pavement will then cross under Old Livingston Road to the east entrance gate of the trash collection center.

In discussing the plan, County Judge Jerome Owens noted that it was vital for the county to act on the matter as soon as possible in order to assure that the center is ready to operate before the April 9 deadline. On that date, new state and federal regulations will go into effect which will require the county to either close its landfill located east of Woodville or spend several hundred thousand dollars to meet more stringent solid waste disposal requirements.

The county had initially planned to close its landfill this past October when the new rules were to have gone into effect but were allowed to apply to the dump site open a few more months.

When the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and state regulators decided to postpone the implementation of the new rules until April 9, "We are trying to make sure, because of the increased traffic to the ball park and collection center, that we will have long-term, good transportation routes. It would be foolish to do anything but a first class job," Owens said following the meeting.

The judge noted that the Henning Park baseball complex, which also will benefit from the paving project, attracts visitors from all over East Texas and the paved road will enhance the appearance of the park.

"The other things is the collection center, which is a huge investment. We always said I wanted to provide a paved road to the center so that senior citizens and others who have difficulty getting out won't have to worry about being on bad or muddy roads," he said.

During Monday's meeting, contractor Ace Matthews indicated that he hoped to get started on the road early next week and that it would take about three weeks to complete the work.

"What's wrong with this week?" Owens said. "We know that we're going to have good weather the rest of this week and that's vital."

Mathews indicated the exact start date would depend on when he could get the crushed rock materials to begin working on the road base, but assured the judge that he would begin as soon as possible.

Owens indicated the collection center itself is nearing completion and when it is ready for use, officials with the Texas Department of Resources and Conservation (former the Texas Water Commission), would come to Woodville to help dedicate the facility.

"They have indicated that they want to be here because this is one of the finest collection centers to be built in this part of Texas," Owens said.

County sewer project moves forward

WOODVILLE — Tyler County Commissioners named a member of the committee Monday which will be charged with receiving and reviewing applications for the on-site sewer installation project to be completed by the county.

County Judge Jerome Owens explained that the project, funded under a \$250,000 grant, will allow the county to install approximately 10 miles of sewer treatment facilities in the communities of Doucette, Dam B and Warren.

Named as chairman of the committee was Guy Davis of Warren while members will include Donald Coleman of Woodville, Henry Deason of Colmesneer, Douglas Seamans of Chester and Willie Gill of Warren.

The committee will be charged with reviewing applications for participating in the project to insure that those seeking help meet income and other requirements. They will then present their recommendations to the commissioners court for final action.

While an exact date for the beginning of construction on the sewer project was not set Monday, project administrator Randy Blanks told the commissioners that work would begin as soon as possible.

"We need to begin moving fast on this," Precinct 1 Commissioner Macey Riley said. "By April the weather should be right and we need to get as much done this summer as possible. That's what we are shooting for," Blanks said.

Under the grant, residents of the targeted areas will be allowed to apply to participate in the project. While many of the on-site projects will consist of separate sewer lines, other types of sewage treatment systems also probably will be used to accommodate individual soil and land space conditions of the residential sites.

In other action during Monday's meeting, the commissioners:

Marie Howell reported that 10 volunteers assisted in calling prospective donors for the Southeast Texas Blood Center drive that was held in January at Woodville High School.

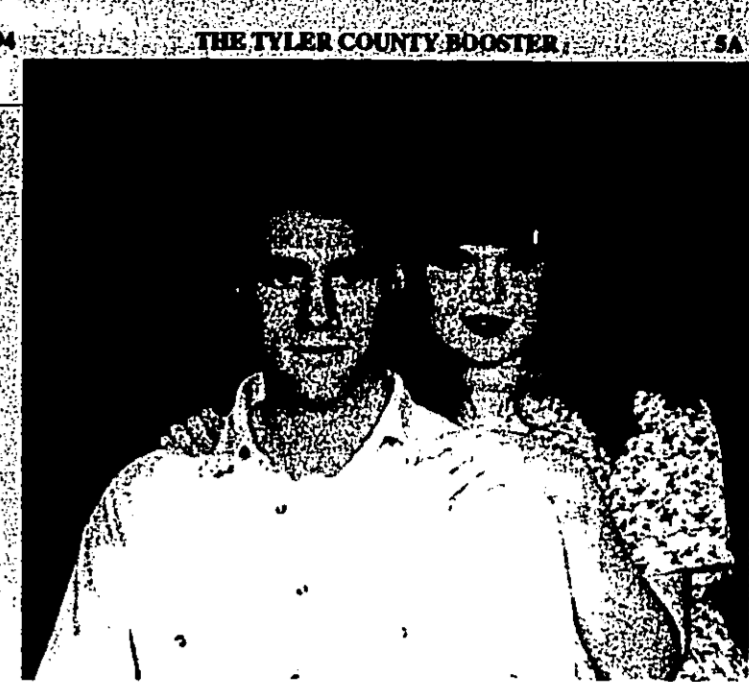
Pat Collier announced that volunteers had worked 3,522 hours during 1993 (Jan. 1 - Dec. 31).

Eagles earn playoff berth with Newton win

WOODVILLE — It's now official. The Woodville Eagles are in the playoffs.

After falling to the Hardin-Jefferson Hawks last week in a district game, the Eagles rolled back to knock off the Newton Eagles Friday night to at least secure a second place finish in district 24-3A.

The Newton victory gave the Eagles a 10-2 mark, one game behind Hardin-Jefferson, with two games remaining in district play.

Woodville hosted Orangefield Tuesday night and will close out district play Friday at Buna.

The Eagles are still hoping for a possible first place tie with Hardin-Jefferson. The Hawks played Buna at home Tuesday night and travel to Kountze Friday for the last district game.

Should H.J. stumble and Woodville win its last two games, both teams would tie for the district title. A one game playoff would then take place to determine which team would represent the district as the first and second place team. That game would be played Tuesday at a neutral site.

If Hardin-Jefferson wins out, the Eagles will move into bi-district play against Tarkington, winners of district 23-3A. Woodville would play the Longhorns February 24 or 25 most likely at Livingston or Huntsville, with the winner moving on to the area playoffs against the likes of Rockdale or

LaGrange.

Hardin-Jefferson, now ranked ninth in the state in this week's Texas Association of Basketball Coaches poll after its win over Woodville, will play either Hamshire-Fannett or Liberty in bi-district play. Both H-F and Liberty are tied for second place in the district 23-3A standings.

Last year Woodville swept through the bi-district and area playoffs by defeating Atanabuc 68-53 and Rockdale 72-64.

Hardin-Jefferson's march to the playoffs will be their first in two years. Last season Woodville and Buna took first and second place in the district with the Hawks left at home.

This year the Hawks returned to the playoffs by virtue of key district wins over Newton, Buna and Stephen F. Austin, along with an impressive win over Woodville last week.

Woodville led only briefly against Hardin-Jefferson in the 66-55 loss. That was with two minutes remaining in the first period.

Hardin-Jefferson responded by gaining the lead before the end of the period, taking a 14-11 lead at the break.

Woodville was unable to get anything going inside, and by halftime Hardin-Jefferson held a comfortable 34-21 lead.

In the second half the Eagles played better, narrowing the gap to five points with the midway in the fourth period, but were unable to hit key shots or gather deci-

sive rebounds.

"It's just hard to beat a team three times in a season," noted Woodville coach John Lamberth following the loss. "We were fortunate to beat S.F.A. three times. We didn't beat Newton or Hardin-Jefferson (three times)."

Woodville had previously defeated H-J in tournament play, and had beaten the Hawks by two points at home in the first round district action.

The third time was the charm for the Hawks who hit 65% of their shots while Woodville managed only 48%.

"We were just cold," said Lamberth. "We had no outside shooting."

Although cold shooting, Lamberth complained about Hardin-Jefferson's hot gym before, during, and after the game.

"It was too hot inside," steamed Lamberth. "We asked them to turn off the heat, but they wouldn't do it. They had two men standing by the switches so no one could turn them off."

While Hardin-Jefferson seemed unaffected by the steamy gym, several Woodville players slipped off their feet while dribbling the ball down court, or while fighting for rebounds underneath the hoop.

Ardis Beaty topped Woodville scoring in the game with 23 points. Delondon Speights added 14.

Things didn't get much easier for the Eagles against Newton three nights later in a 74-61 win.

After taking a 21-11 lead in the first quarter, Newton rallied back to narrow the gap to a 33-31 margin at halftime.

Newton took a four point lead midway in the final period before Woodville heard a wake-up call. A reverse jump by Beaty seemed to fire up the Eagles, and with two minutes to go Josh Lamberth hit a three pointer to put Woodville up by five. From there Woodville dominated and won the game going away.

Beaty hit for 36, while Speights added 11, and Lamberth tossed in 10.

Beaty grabbed 16 rebounds, and Speights and Lamberth each notching 12.

The victory pushed Woodville's record to 25-4 for the season.

Lamberth said that the Newton win "relieved a lot of tensions" for his Eagles. "It's been tough on the kids. Everybody's expectations have been so high."
