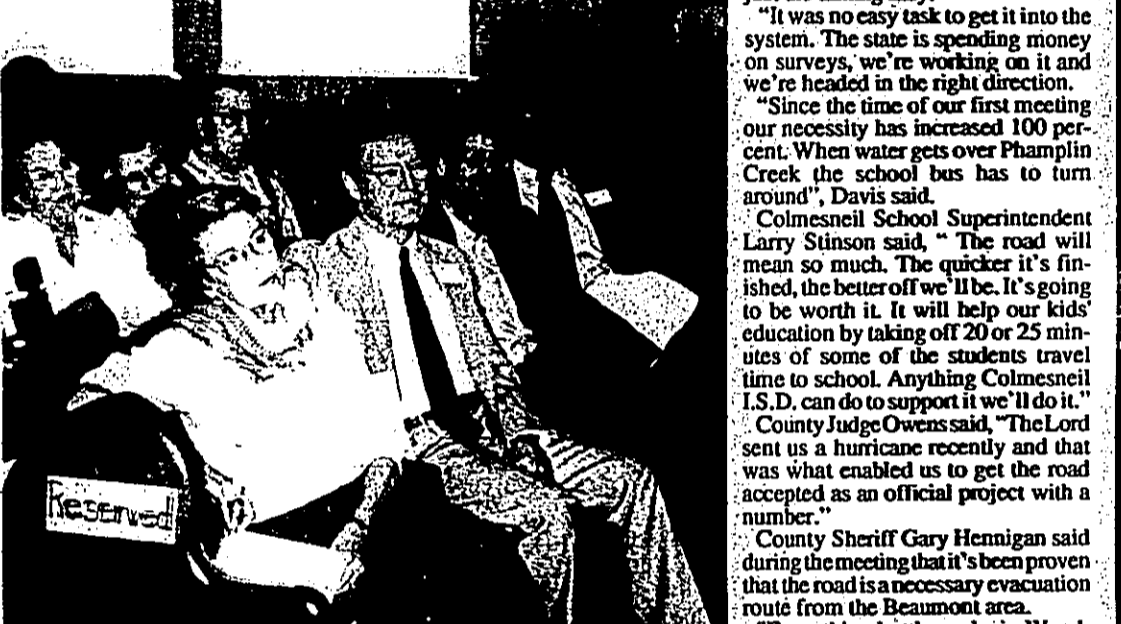

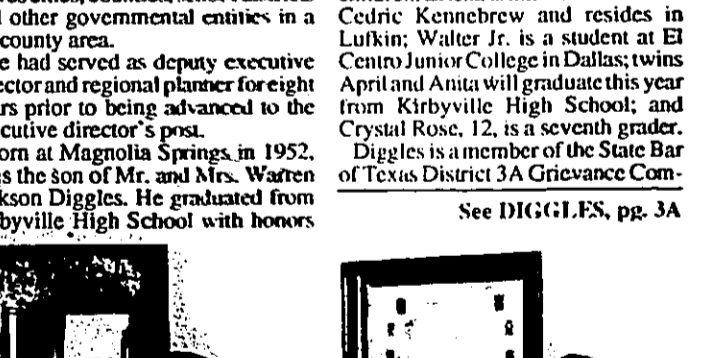

# Chester youth wins calf in dairy judging contest

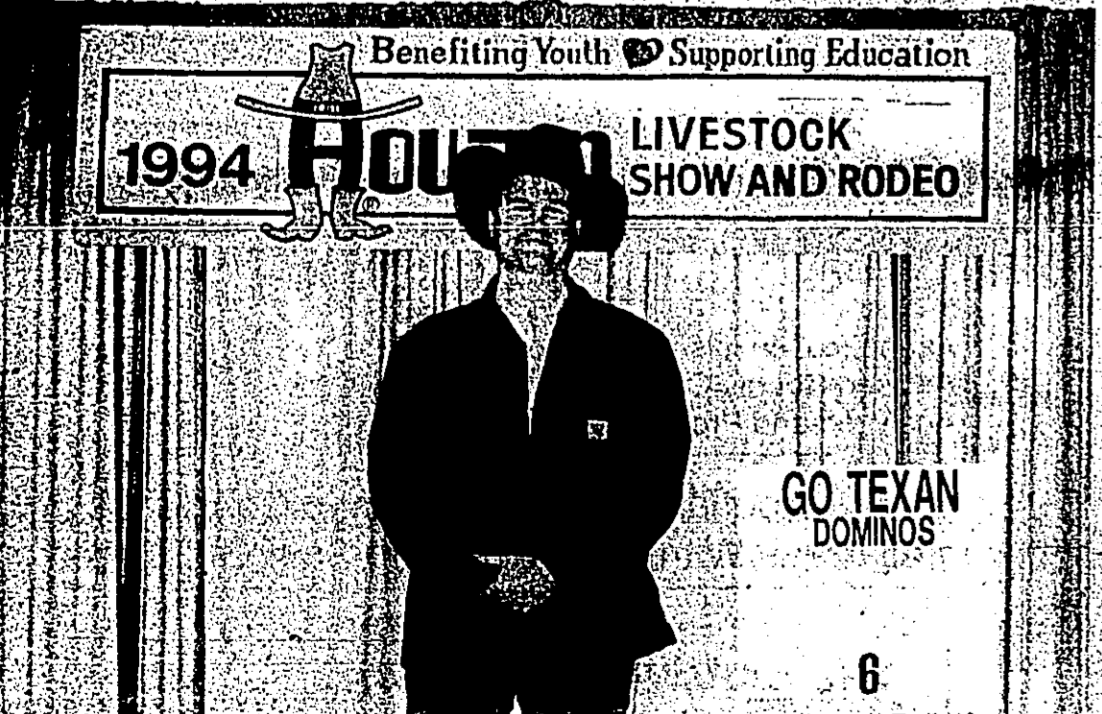

Houston — Demonstrating professional skills, talent and knowledge, 4-H judge Billy Jack Sturrock of Chester was one of 20 high point winners in the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo's dairy judging contest held Monday, Feb. 21. "Watching these students evaluate dairy cattle is one of the show's highlights," said Steve Woodley, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo manager. "Their abilities for evaluating livestock is some of the best in the nation," he added. "Each year, the winner get closer and closer to the scores of the professional judges, which indicates just how talented these kids are." Sturrock, a student in the Chester Independent School District, received a \$1,000 calf purchase certificate, donated by Asset Systems, to be used toward the purchase of a purebred dairy heifer. He will raise the animal, keeping detailed financial records and progress reports. These reports will be submitted to the certificate donor and to show officials monthly throughout the year. In addition, each winner is required to keep a pictorial account of the project and to submit a 500-word essay. "These young people work with the animals, and they also learn other valuable skills such as record keeping and report writing," Woodley added. All work with the heifer will be done under the supervision of Tyler County Extension Agent Matt Dochati. During the 1995 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, a special competition will be held and Sturrock will return to Houston to show his heifer in competition with all 1994 judging and calf scramble winners. The dairy judging contest requires that students match their skills in selecting the best quality livestock against the placing of a qualified judge. Each contestant is asked to place in numerical order, from highest to lowest, each of four animals in several classes. Scores are determined by comparing those of the students to the scores of qualified professional judges. Prizes are awarded on individual and cumulative team scores. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo runs through March 6 and features 18 rodeo performances, star entertainers, the world's largest livestock show, a superior horse show and many more activities. Each year the show benefits Texas youth through individual scholarships and endowments to Texas colleges and universities. Tickets for the rodeo performances are available through all TicketMaster outlets and at the Astrodome box office.

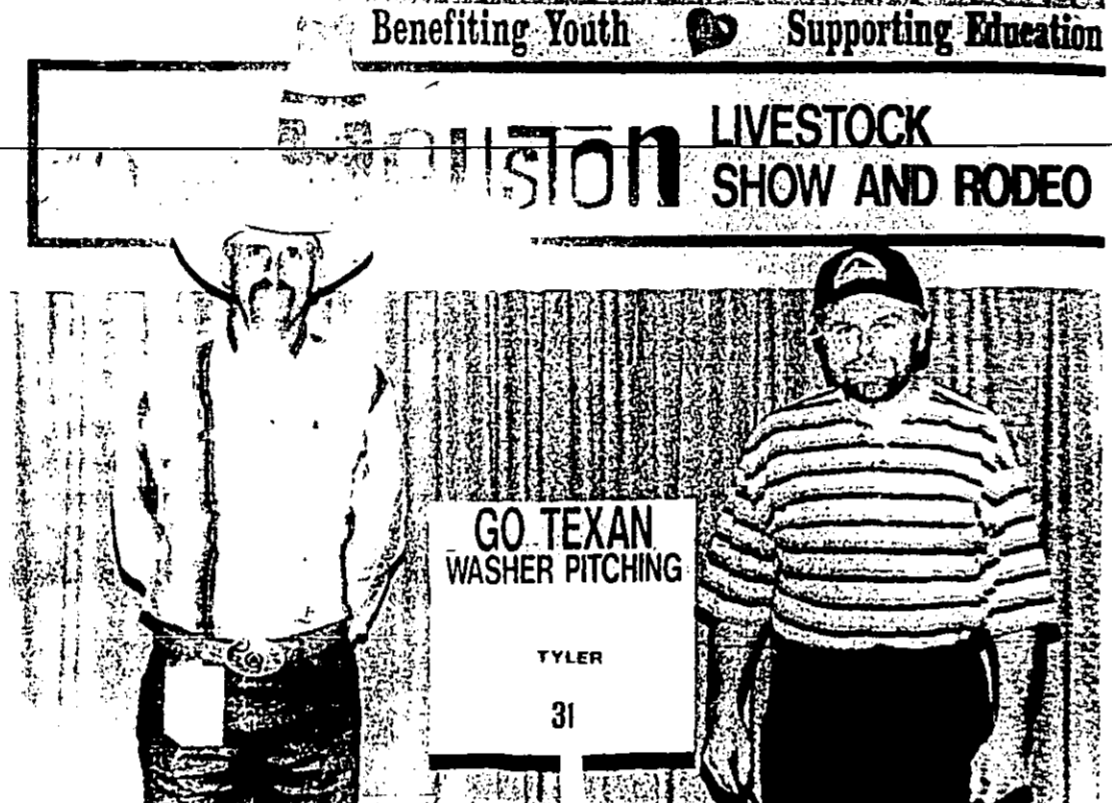

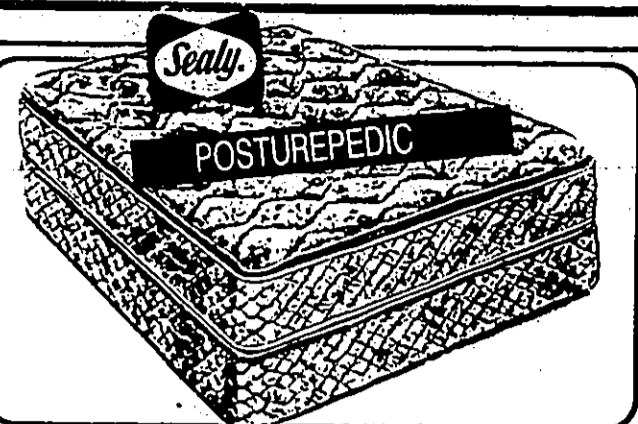

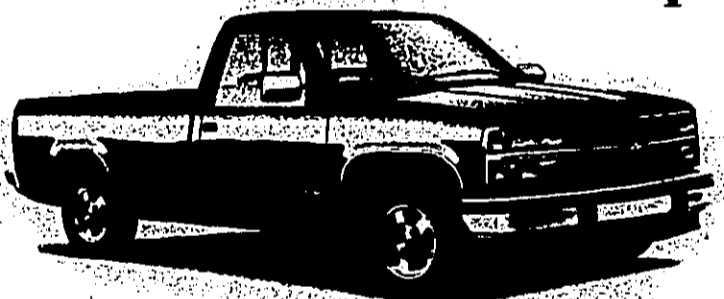

FM 92 hearing draws crowd

By John Morrison DAM B - Backed up by 83 pages of petitions, years of hard work and a sanctuary full of supporters, officials with the county and the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) held a public hearing last week to gather input on the proposed extension of FM 92 north from Dam. During the Feb. 22 meeting at the Mt. Carmel Baptist Church in northeast Tyler County, TxDOT Area Engineer Paul Cook and Jasper told the more than 100 people gathered for the event that the driving force behind the extension plan, Betty Jo Davis of Colmesneil "is the most persistent person I've ever known."

Davis and others have been pushing for the eight miles of pavement extension from Highway 190 at Dam B north to Recreation Road 255. "If you're not on Betty Jo's side...you're on the wrong side," added Tyler County Judge Jerome Owens, who said further, "This is the kind of road that will mean a lot to Tyler County. We do not want a road that is not going to do the job."

Cook said that summer workers would be utilized this year to stake the right-of-way along the road. "You'll see them in your yards, your fields and in the woods along the road. We'll have to chop many miles before we're through. We'll have to cut hills and fill valleys," he said. "Of course we'll need one year for development of construction plans and environmental planning." The project, once the land is acquired, is estimated to cost \$10 million. According to the chief promoter on

the project, Davis, some 88 percent of the necessary right-of-way has been donated with only 14 or 15 more donations or tracts required to complete the transfer. "These are landowners scattered at both ends of the road," she said. Davis said Louisiana Pacific, Kirby and Temple Eastern timber companies have donated to the project. Temple's Public Affairs Officer Tony Bennett told the group, "We're behind it 100 percent, and anything we can do to help spur it on any way we can, we'll do it."

Davis said the project was just a two community project. "It will serve all of East Texas. My project is getting the pavement done. I do my work on the telephone. I feel like we have the support and if we don't...we'll get it," she said. "I'm just the talking lady." "It was no easy task to get it into the system. The state is spending money on surveys, we're working on it and we're headed in the right direction." "Since the time of our first meeting our necessity has increased 100 percent. When water gets over Plumplin Creek the school bus has to turn around," Davis said. Colmesneil School Superintendent Larry Simson said, "The road will mean so much. The quicker it's finished, the better off we'll be. It's going to be worth it. It will help our kids' education by taking off 20 or 25 minutes of some of the students travel time to school. Anything Colmesneil I.S.D. can do to support we'll do it."

County Judge Owens said, "The Lord sent us a hurricane recently and that was what enabled us to get the road accepted as an official project with a number." County Sheriff Gary Hennigan said during the meeting that it's been proven that the road is a necessary evacuation route from the Beaumont area. "Everything bottle-necks in Woodville," Hennigan said. "This project will also improve law enforcement in the county by enabling us to get here faster when there is a problem."

There are 160 acres of right-of-way needed over the eight mile FM 92 extension. Officials said 88 percent of the ROW had been donated by the three timber companies but that 12 percent of the land still needed to be acquired, hopefully by donation. See FM 92, pg. 3A

But doing more and working less isn't impossible...the catch phrase is "work smarter" and it applies to family lives as well as to the business world. Areas where working smarter gives you "freed" time include shopping for groceries, getting personal needs, cleaning supplies and meal preparation. Trips for often-used staples and groceries are easy to cut in half...but twice what you need. Storage costs less than

## Welcome To My World Don Stockton has impressive record in Warren

Rumors have come to my attention concerning a movement in the Warren I.S.D. Administration against one Don Stockton, head and sole member of the Music Departments of Warren High School and Warren Middle School. This upsets me, since Mr. Stockton is not only a good friend of mine, but an excellent educator and community leader as well. Don Stockton has taught band at Warren since 1982. That year, the Warren Band earned a rare 2nd Division award at the state level. During the school board of the time to dedicate a Band Day at Warren ISD. The following year, Warren made the first Sweetwater in the history of the school. From 1984 to 1987, the band hit a low spot; in 1988 to now Warren has earned fifteen Division 1's and two Sweetwater wins. In addition to his musical accomplishments, Mr. Stockton has an im-

pressive record as an educator. Students who graduate from Mr. Stockton's band usually dominate the honor rolls. These students learn discipline, goal orientation, the value of teamwork, and appreciation of the musical arts. Mr. Stockton also has played a significant role in the community. In addition to his services at Warren, he serves as a musical director at his Lutheran church in Nederland. He has also served as a leader in the Boy Scouts of America.

With both his demonstrated success and his community service, Don Stockton has demonstrated his ability to serve as band director for Warren. Why, then, is this man, so well-suited to the job, apparently under attack from the administration? The answer is probably financial in nature. Since the oil bust hit Warren, the school budget has been tight, and the waste caused since in the name of renovation has increased the strain. At one point, the school board proposed to eliminate all extracurricular activities at Warren. This proposition was defeated due to massive community protest, but the problem remains.

The band director in any high school is paid substantially more than other teachers, due to the special nature of their subject. Furthermore, the expenses on travel to contests and even games on travel to contests and even games are taken up in school-owned band instruments, make the band budget a substantial portion of the yearly school budget. By changing Mr. Stockton with an inexperienced director, or eliminating the department altogether, much money could be saved. This although fiscally sound is a bad idea. The Warren band is experiencing a phenomenon not familiar to Warren fame. Music directors in schools across the state look forward

to Warren's performances. If Warren was as large as Fort Neches-Groves ISD, their performances would outstrip football for popularity. Maybe not, but the reality is that Warren's Warrior Band brings positive attention to Warren schools. Disposing of Mr. Stockton would be a grave mistake. In a school district which can't seem to hold on to a football coach, solidarity in the other departments is mandatory. In addition, if the Warren band program was eliminated, the district would risk losing some of their top students to Woodville, Kountze, or Silsbee schools.

In the end, there is only one good reason to fire Don Stockton, and hundreds of reasons why he should be kept. If personal politics come into play, however, all this could be ignored, and it is up to the citizens of Tyler County to prevent this from happening.

## Homemaker Hints Cuts in fat intake recommended by experts

Publicly during the past two decades has encouraged people to reduce their consumption of total fat and saturated fatty acids. The reason for this interest in reduction of these fats has been because diets high in total fat, saturated fatty acids, and cholesterol play a major role in the high

levels of blood cholesterol found in millions of Americans. Saturated fatty acid is the key dietary factor raising blood cholesterol levels. In contrast, dietary cholesterol has a smaller effect on blood cholesterol levels. Many health organizations, such as the American Heart Association, National Cholesterol Education Program, National Cancer Institute and others, are now recommending a reduction of

the total fat content of the American diet, from around 40 percent down to 30 percent of the total calories. Fat we eat contains fatty acids that are saturated or unsaturated; these are terms that refer to the chemical structure of the fatty acids in the fat molecules. Unsaturated fatty acids are divided into two kinds: monounsaturated fatty acids and polyunsaturated fatty acids. Saturated fatty acids are found primarily in the following: \*Animal products, particularly meats and poultry with large amounts of fat and many dairy products. \*Coconut oil, palm kernel oil, and palm oil are also very saturated.

Some of the saturated fatty acids in vegetable oils are also made oversaturated by a process called hydrogenation. \*Commercially-prepared and processed foods made with vegetable oils or with saturated fatty acids like butter and lard can also be high in saturated fatty acids. \*Polyunsaturated fatty acids are found primarily in plant products—including safflower, sunflower, corn, soybean, and cottonseed oil; nut, and

In order to help reduce fat in the diet and keep blood cholesterol at normal levels, you should: \*Eat less high-fat food (especially those high in saturated fatty acids). \*Replace part of the saturated fatty acids in your diet with unsaturated fatty acids. \*Eat less high-cholesterol food. \*Choose foods high in complex carbohydrates (starch and fiber) and produce you weight, if you are overweight.

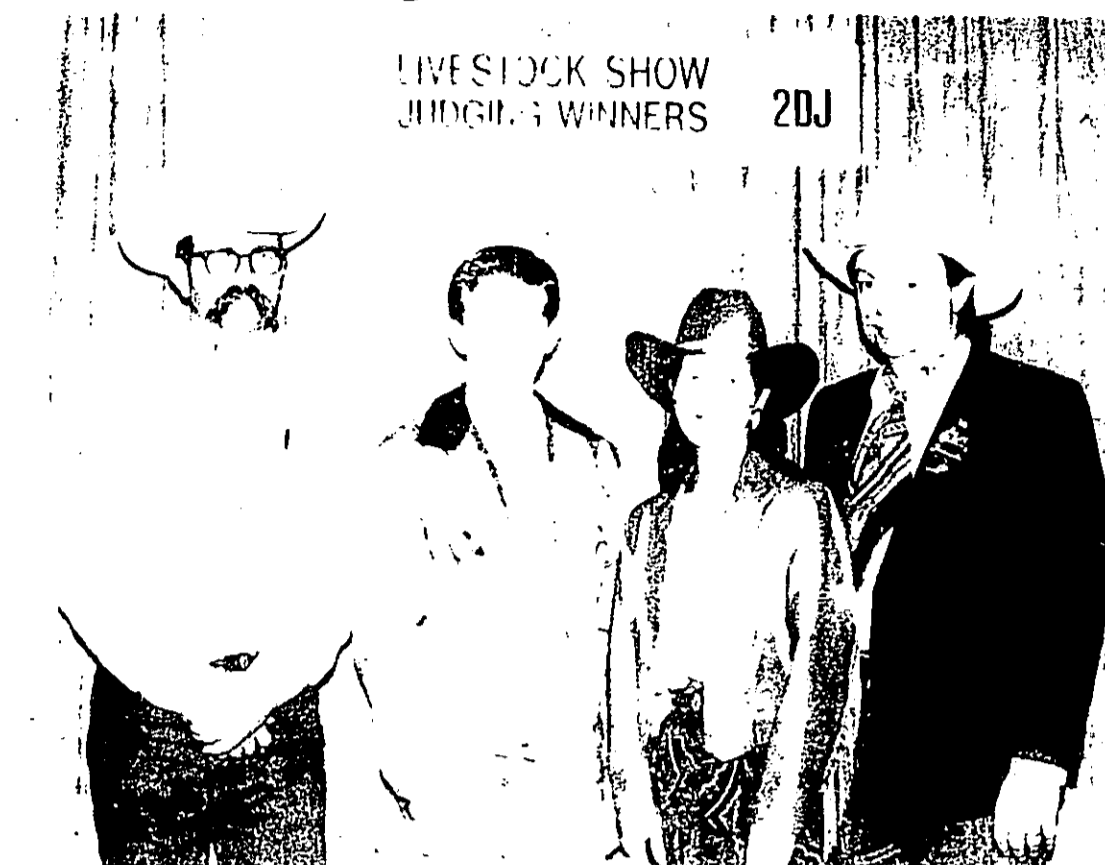

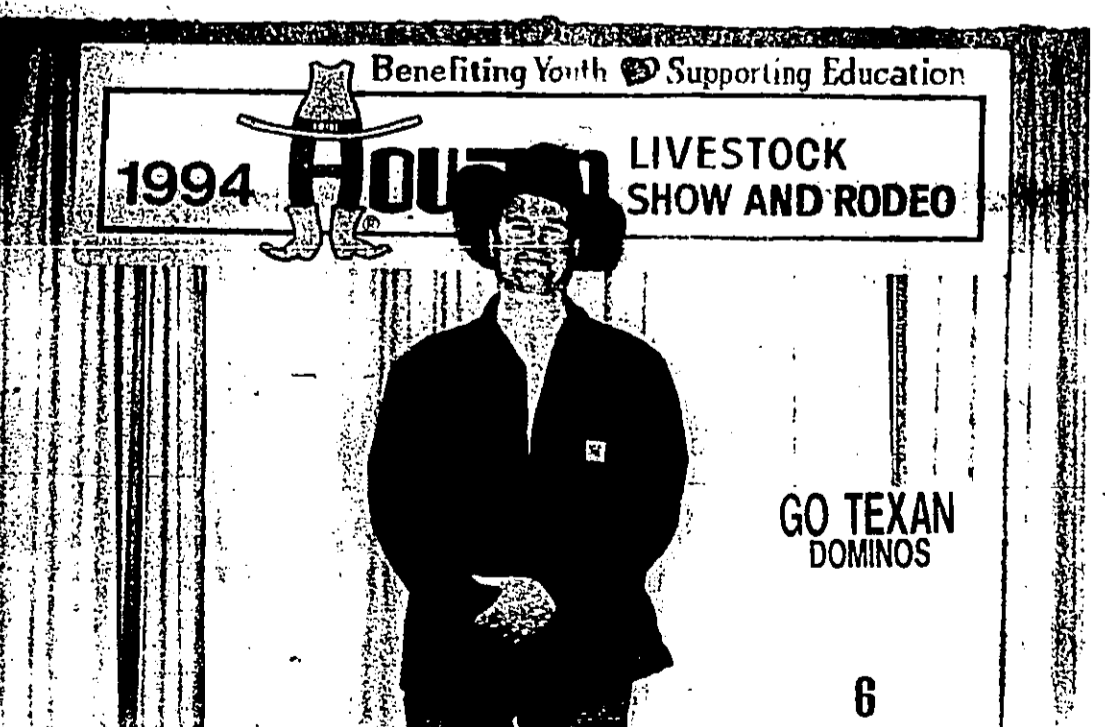


**LIVESTOCK SHOW JUDGING WINNERS** 2DJ

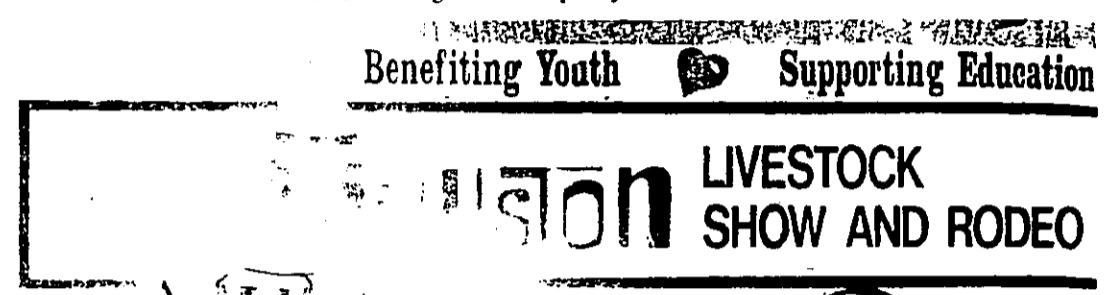

In addition, each winner is required to keep a pictorial account of the project and to submit a 500-word essay.

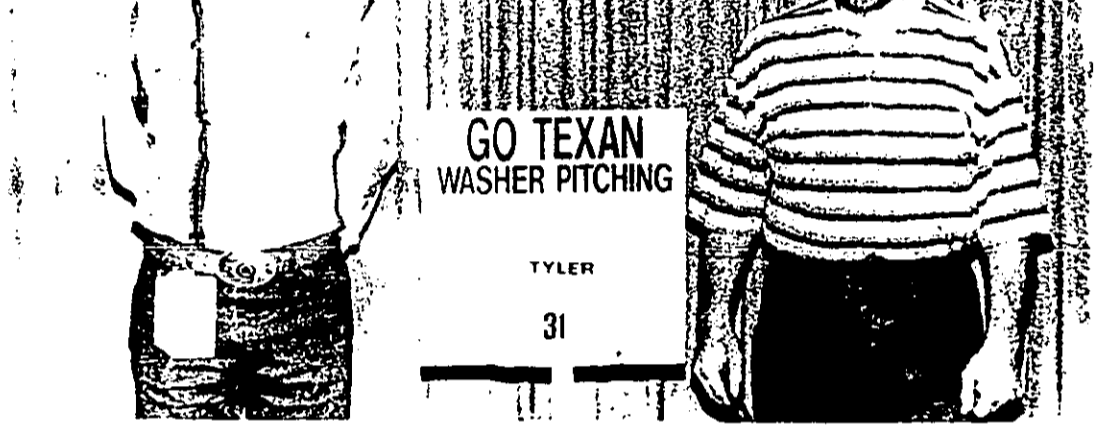
"These young people work with the animals, and they also learn other valuable skills such as record keeping and report writing," Woodley added. All work with the heifer will be done under the supervision of Tyler County Extension Agent Matt Bochatt.

During the 1995 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, a special competition will be held and Sturrock will return to Houston to show his heifer in competition with all 1994 judging and calf scramble winners.

The dairy judging contest requires that students match their skills in several areas, including the ability to identify the breed of the animal, the animal's age, sex and color, and the animal's overall health and condition.



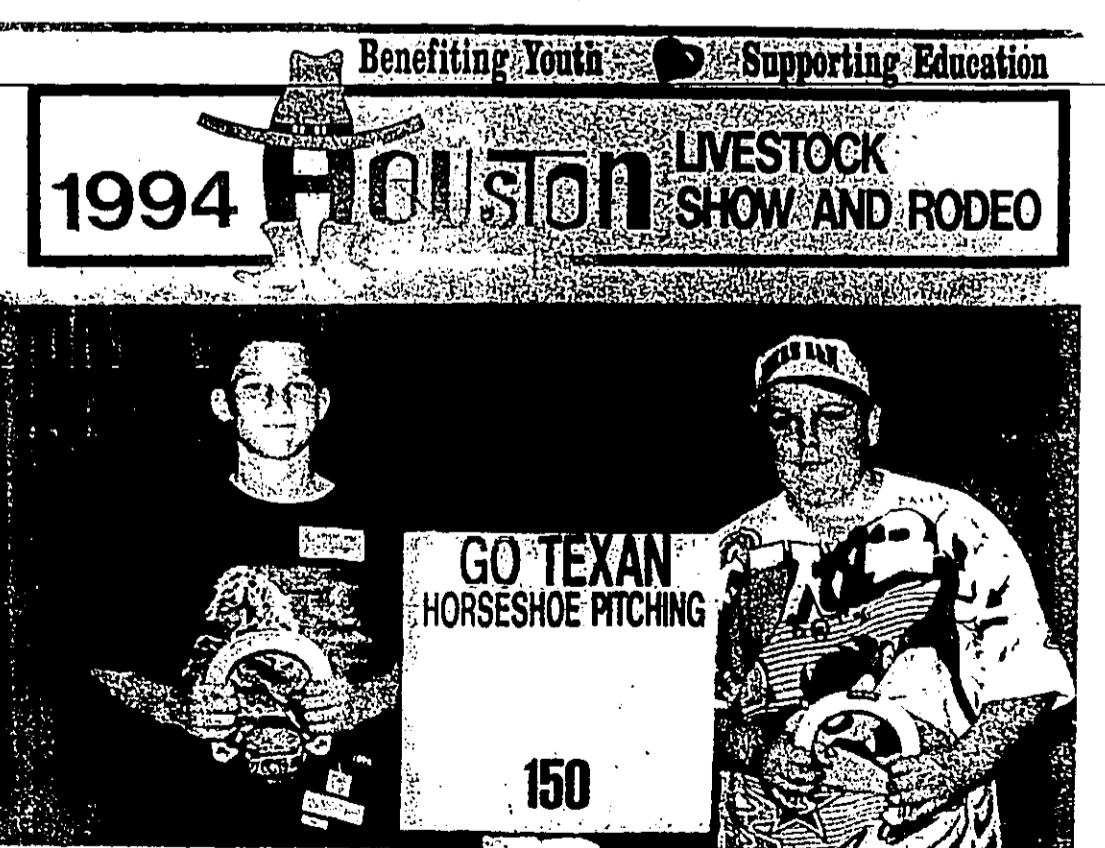

The Eagles used a solid defense and key shooting by Delondon Speights in the first period, Ryan Ferguson in the fourth, along with Ardis Beaty and freshman Gerod Betts in the middle portion of the game, to dominate the Longhorns 76-38.

Said Woodville coach John Lamberth after the contest, "We got back the form we had last year in the playoffs."

With the win the Eagles moved on to the area title game, again in Huntsville, Tuesday night against the Comanche Cardinals. Another victory would put Woodville into the regional tournament Friday at Sam Houston.

Regional tournament teams include the Hardin Jefferson Manor winner, the Waco LaVega/Rusk survivor, and the area champion winner between Mexico and Conner.

Woodville would meet either Waco LaVega or Rusk in a contest Friday night with the winner of that game playing for the regional title Saturday.

Waco LaVega is the team Woodville defeated for the regional championship last year at Brenham. The Eagles have already played Rusk this season in the Palestine Westwood Classic and won by six points.

Rusk defeated state ranked Madisonville in Jacksonville Friday night in triple overtime, 111-110. Betts, who handed himself with the maturity of a senior, hit for 11 more points in the second half and finished with a total of 15.

"I just kept my mind on the game," said the freshman, "and played as hard as I could."

The hard play award in the fourth quarter had to go to Ferguson. The Eagle senior, who had been in a scoring drought for several games, caught fire with a 15 point production...all in the final stanza.

Everytime Tarkington thought about making a comeback, Ferguson stopped it with some type of scoring.

Woodville playmaker hit eight of 10 from the free throw line and popped a three on a key drive.

With Beaty drawing his fifth foul with three and a half minutes remaining in the game, Ferguson and the rest of the Eagles picked up the slack.

The Eagles were also helped when the Longhorns' 6-3 post, Brad Long drew his fifth foul.

Beaty felt that the Eagles played one of their best, if not their best, game of the season against the Longhorns.

Lamberth backed his statement by saying, "This was as good as any game we played this year."

To back his statements there are plenty of statistics to prove his point. For example, although not scoring but two points, Josh Lamberth joined Speights as the team leading rebounders. Lamberth had 12, while Speights had 13.

Ferguson led with assists with 10, and Beaty not only had a dunk, but had

four blocked shots as well. He also had six rebounds, while Speights led in steals with five.

The most positive thing going for the Longhorns was Chris Wilson. The Tarkington guard led Longhorn scoring with 20 points, nine coming from outside the 3-point circle.

Two more Longhorns hit for double figures, including Issac Vaughn for 14 and Chris Cain for 10.

Said Tarkington coach Jim Dixon, "I don't know what happened to us tonight. We didn't do a thing that we practiced all week. This wasn't a good time to have an off night."

The victory pushed Woodville's record to 28-4 for the season. Tarkington fell to 22-12.

The last time the Longhorns lost a game was to Woodville on New Years Eve.

**Colmesneil bombs Apple Springs**  
— Bulldogs claim bi-district championship, 66-50 —

DIBOLL — Apple Springs coach Grey Spivey worried all last week about Colmesneil's outside shooting going into Friday night's bi-district clash at Diboll High School Gym... He had every right to.

The Bulldogs bombed the taller Eagles from the outside with eight 3-pointers on their way to a 66-50 win and earned an area title match against Wells Tuesday night in Huntington.

The winner of the Colmesneil-Wells battle will go on to play in the class A regional tournament Friday night in Kilgore. Waiting for the winner will most likely be Laneville, ranked as one of the top two teams in the state.

Against Apple Springs the Bulldogs jumped to a 11-0 lead on three point baskets by Robbie Johnson and coasted to a 24-7 first quarter lead. Johnson connected on his first three shots... all three pointers.

Said Johnson, who finished the evening with 15 points, all from outside the three point line, "I like this gym. I've been playing here since I was a freshman when I was at Newton. It's a bright gym. I guess I'm good in bright gyms."

Johnson was the only offensive bright spot for the Bulldogs in the first period. Eric Daniels hit for a pair of three pointers and a total of 10 points in the first stanza. Daniels finished with 17 points, 13 coming in the first half.

And while Colmesneil took control in the first period, Apple Springs kept back into the game with stronger sec-

ond and third quarter. Late in the third period the Eagles moved within three, but another three pointer by Johnson gave the Bulldogs more breathing room.

Colmesneil led 43-36 to open the fourth period, but three point shooting by the Eagles' Desmond Lee narrowed it again to 47-41.

From there Colmesneil's Kevin McQueen took over, weaving his way through the taller Eagles to hit three baskets and adding six more points via the free throw line.

McQueen, who led Bulldogs scoring with 22 points, had five rebounds and two assists, said that the bi-district game was his best of the season.

"They were kind of tall and slow," said McQueen of the Eagles following the game. "We used our quickness against them... and it worked tonight."

The offense did its job, the Colmesneil defense played beyond expectation against the likes of the Eagles' 6-6, 6-5, 6-5, and 6-2 starters. Bulldog post Lee Stinson, standing at 6-2, blocked three inside shots by the taller Eagles and grabbed eight rebounds, while Lew Cruz at 5-11 did an excellent job of blocking out on the opposite side.

The Eagles, for whatever reason, pulled their big men over for much of the game and tried to match Colmesneil's outside shooting.

Said Stinson, "I think they tried to come inside, but we kept fronting them and they couldn't go up on us. They weren't too good of shooters inside."

The Eagles' point guard, Desmond Lee, hit five three pointers and led Apple Springs' scoring with 17 points. Jeffrey Mark at 6-6 had 12 points, while 6-5 Heath White had only two points and 6-5 Buster Choate had nine points.

But in the fourth quarter when the game was on the line it was McQueen and the Bulldog defense that rose to the occasion. McQueen hit for 12 of the Bulldogs' 23 points in the last stanza, while the Colmesneil defense held the Eagles to 14 points.

"I preached to them all week that the game was going to be won in the fourth quarter," said Colmesneil coach Rick Johnson after the win. "I told them that early we may get ahead or get behind, but it's going to be won late... no matter what the score gets."

Johnson said that he felt that his Bulldogs could rest because they were in better shape than Apple Springs. "They (Apple Springs) did surprise me when they went man to man," said Johnson, "but they couldn't stop us from penetrating."

"I was pleased with about six things in the fourth quarter," added Johnson, "when we had to make some kind of stand, that we sucked it up and made that last run."

The Bulldogs finished the night hitting 14 of 28 two-point shots, eight of 18 three-point baskets, and 14 of 21 free throws.

Daniels and Stinson led the Bulldogs with nine and eight rebounds, while McQueen had four steals and two assists.

The quicker Bulldogs had 11 steals for the game.

Colmesneil's bi-district victory was the first post season boys basketball win since 1976 when the Bulldogs defeated Spurger in bi-district play.

Prior to the bi-district clash against Apple Springs the Bulldogs fell to the Goodrich Hornets in a warm-up game, 67-56. Goodrich was the district champion of 22 Apple Springs. Apple Springs was the district runner-up.

Against the Hornets the Bulldogs tallied 18 3-pointers, led and made 39-77 free throws. Goodrich scored 22 points in the final two quarters to capture the win.

Leading scorers included McQueen with 15 points, Greg Bean with 14, and Daniels with 10.

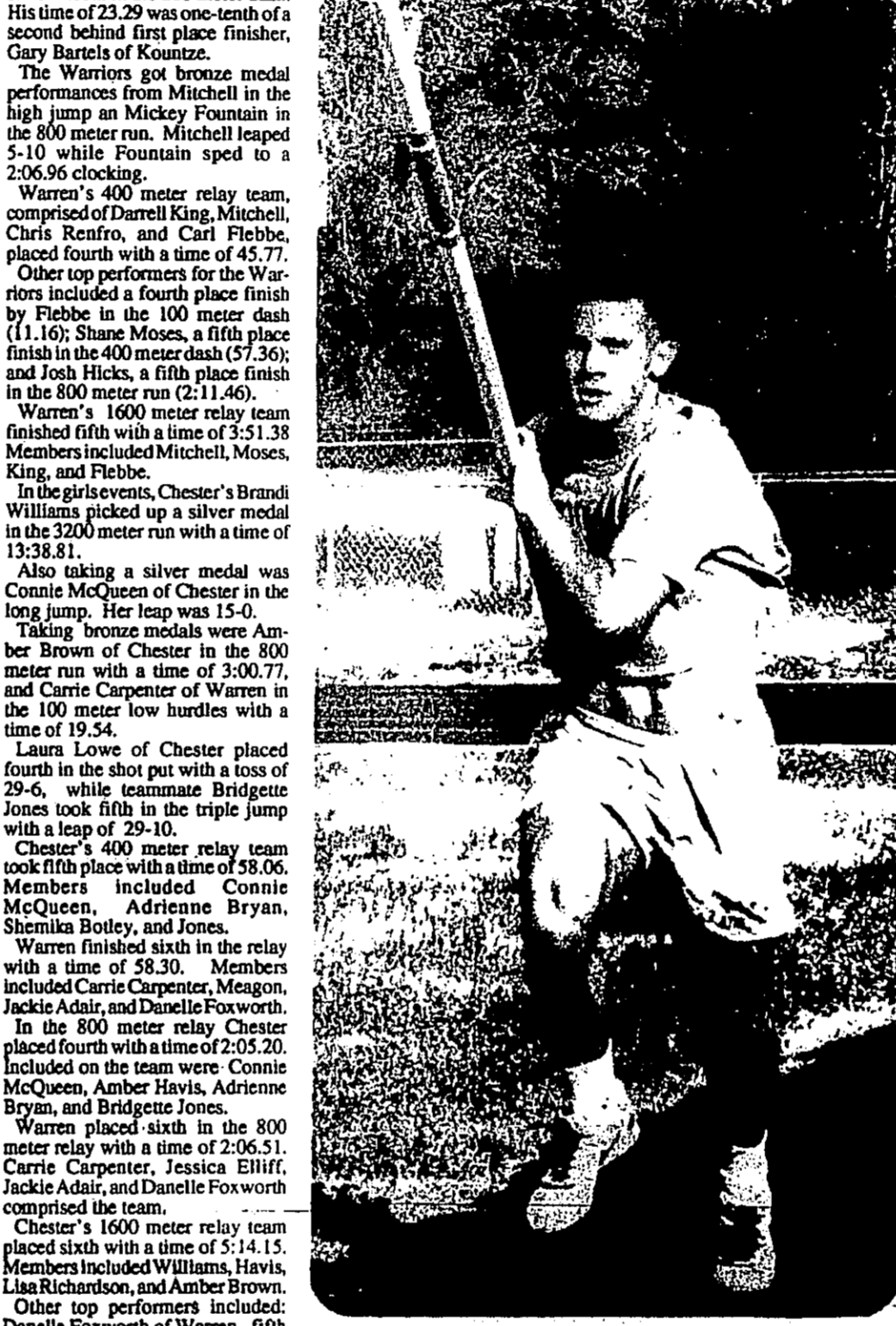
Warren finished sixth in the relay with a time of 58.30. Members included Carrie Carpenter, Meagan, Jackie Adair, and Danielle Foxworth.




