The annual festival continues Friday and Saturday with the Western Weekend celebration, including the tradi-

The rodeo, which for the second year is being sponsored by the Tyler County Sheriff's Posse under contract with the Dogwood Festival committee, will get underway at 7:30 p.m. Friday and again at 4:30 p.m. Saturday. Advance sale tickets are available at the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce for \$6 for adults and \$5 for children 12 and under. Tickets at the gate will be \$8 for adults and \$6 for children.

During the Friday night rodeo per-formance, a 4-H Club calf scramble will be held while Saturday's rodeo will feature the traditional goat scramble. While the goat scramble is open to all children up to seven years of age, the calf scramble on Friday is open only to 4-H Club members.

Included in Saturday's rodeo with the selection of the Western Weekend Sweetheart from among the candidates representing the various trail rides participating in this year's event. Judging of the sweethearts will take place Saturday morning with the winner being announced during the afternoon rodeo performance.

At 2 p.m. Saturday, the Western, Weekend Parade will get underway in Woodville with cowboys and cowgirls literally filling the streets with horses, wagons and buggies. While
