The card with its picture of Golden Gate Park was postmarked San Francisco, January 9, 1911. It was addressed to Percy Crandall of Milton, Wisconsin, and signed "Aunt Grace."

The card was written "on board the Mongolia," the ship that was to take this 35 year old lady physician on a lifetime of service as a medical missionary in China.

It was the beginning of a lifetime romance with the Chinese people that lasted until her death in 1947. During World War II, when Secretary of War Henry Stimson ordered U.S. citizens to go home, Dr. Grace's answer was simply, "I am home." And so she was, having adopted and educated two Chinese girls, *Weze* (Eduher Pan) and *Meling*. The elder, like her mother, became a doctor. The younger followed her mother's earlier footsteps to become a nurse. Together they cared for Dr. Grace during the cancer that ended her remarkable career.

Grace returned to the United States just four times during those years, the last time in 1939. On each of these trips she brought precious gifts of Chinese artistry and needlework to enrich the lives of her loved ones back home.

One of those gifts was the exquisite luncheon cloth and napkins of rice

Thanks to the patience and fortitude and nimble fingers of Heritage Society member Dorothy Lefkowitz, we have become members of the beauty of Japanese *Banaka* embroidery in the form of a number of beautiful framed items and a magnificent flamingo, all on view in the Village Exhibit Hall.

Those who attended the Second Annual Quilt Show at the Village last Saturday were fortunate to be able to see Dorothy at work on one of these embroidery paintings, an art form she learned from a friend, who had lived for a time in Japan.

South Sea artistry

And from the South Sea islands of Samoa, we see a ceremonial fine mat, brought to America and finally to Tyler County by Orlan Gazzway. Orlan explained the value of these mats which are presented to a chief on certain occasions, are used in dedications or the funeral rites of important persons. The fine mat on display was presented by Orlan to her mother, who she had met in the Pacific, performed by Orlan, honoring her great grandfather, who introduced Methodism to Samoa. A similar mat was presented to Orlan's father, *Ati Tolesoa* Filialilo Vaafusaga, upon his elevation to District Chief for his clan.

The other mat shown, a type once used as part of a *males*' dowry, is called a *Taga*. It is made from the bark of the *mbury* tree and decorated with pine mats from Kuluai nuts, a paint also used for ceremonial tattoos. Isn't it amazing how much we can

learn from those who have traveled from afar and settled down, right here in Tyler County.

Closer to home

Among the other beautiful examples of needlework on exhibit is a quilt point by Charles Hale's aunt, Miss Ester Hale of Cisco, Texas, ca. 1915, some of the late Ruth Gillespie's exquisite tating and lacework, which she gave to Irma Hickman, a turn of the century crocheted bedspread made in Camp Point, Kentucky, by Annie Cyrus, the aunt of Society member Ann Morgan of Baytown, and an array of fine needlework from Erlene McLanahan of Spurger, who never fails to amaze us with her varied talents.

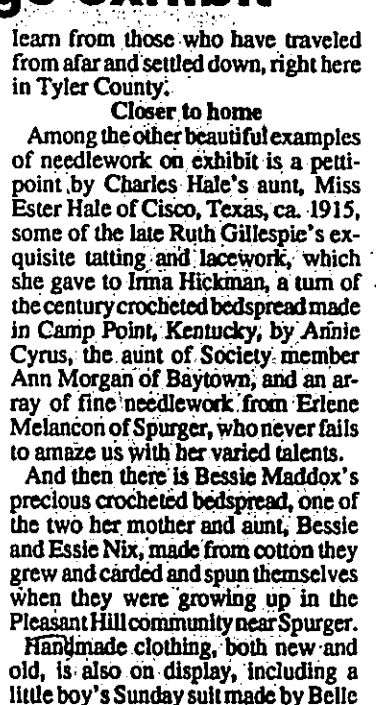

Another saga in the cutting board debate

Which is the best - plastic or wooden cutting boards? The debate is still on, but the USDA Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) has reaffirmed its recommendation of plastic cutting boards.

Last year, the controversial report of the Food Research Institute at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, which concluded that antimicrobial properties of wooden cutting boards make them safer than plastic ones, touched off a fury of newspaper and industry questions. In response, FSIS called on the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) of USDA to conduct more research on the question of the safety of cutting boards.

Scientists from the Eastern Regional Research Center of the ARS report that findings from their recent study support the use of plastic cutting boards for food preparation. These scientists found that bacteria consistently survived better on wooden boards than plastic. They also found that plastic cutting boards after 90-minute exposure to temperature-shock samples of *Escherichia coli* bacteria were 100 percent effective in killing the bacteria. The previous research, conducted by Dr. Dean Cliver of the University of Wisconsin, looked at the survival of organisms transmitted to boards via inoculated juices or liquids. Miller, the principal investigator of the new study, cautions that the debate is far from clear-cut. He makes the point that there are many variables to be considered in judging between the two materials.

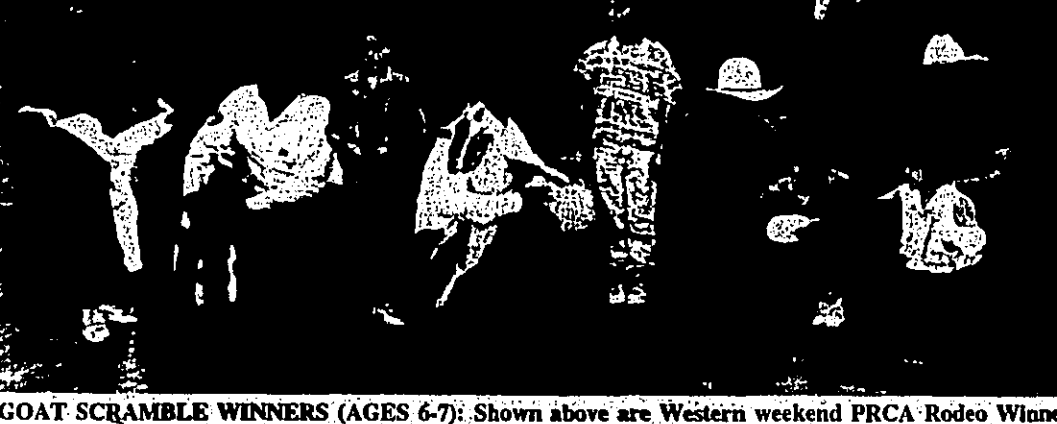

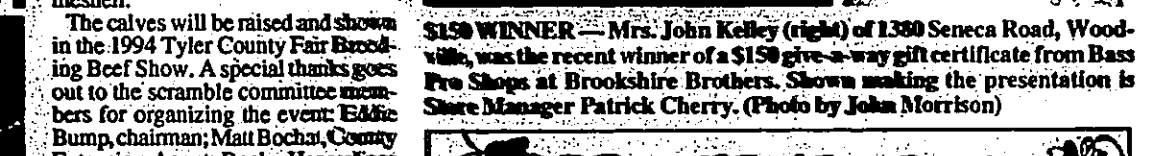

Deadlines near on filing tax renditions, exemption requests

WOODVILLE — Linda Lewis, chief appraiser of the Tyler County Appraisal District, has issued a reminder to all business owners, homeowners and landowners of approaching deadlines for filing property renditions, tax exemption applications and special use applications.

Business owners must file property rendition forms with the appraisal district by April 14. Business owners may receive an extension through April 30 if the owner requests it in writing and can demonstrate good cause.

A rendition is a report a property owner files each year, listing taxable property he owns or manages as of Jan. 1. The law requires certain property owners to file renditions every year.

Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on Jan. 1 must file a rendition statement with the appraisal district. Businesses, for instance, must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment, and other tangible business property on a rendition. It is to the owners' benefit to do so because chief appraisers use the rendition report to establish the property's fair taxable value. When business personal property tax is rendered, the chief appraiser is forced to estimate the value.

While only business personal property must be rendered, anyone may voluntarily file a rendition with the appraisal district. Texas law does not require a property owner to render a home or other real property, but homeowners who do render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers, for several reasons.

First, by filing a rendition, property owners ensure that the correct address will be on their value notices, notices of hearings which may be scheduled if they protest the appraisal of their property, and on their tax bills. It is essential that property owners receive this information in a timely manner. For instance, if the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect address, the property owner is still responsible for paying the taxes plus penalties that result from late payment.

Second, a rendition is an opportunity for a property owner to record an opinion of the property's value, the opinion owner may use to protest the appraisal if they feel the proposed value is too high.

If a property is appraised by more than one appraiser, the property owner should file a rendition in each appraisal district office.

Property owners whose homes were damaged last year by a storm, flood or fire may also file a special type of rendition report with the chief appraiser, called a report of decreased value. The deadline for filing this report for 1994

During this week, in celebration of the battle's 130th anniversary, Civil War re-enactors from all over the nation (and overseas) are gathered to relive the entire week-long Red River Campaign of which the Pleasant Hill battle was only one clash, the last and largest. The Civil War Red River Campaign was the Union's attempt to capture Shreveport and invade Texas.

According to Truman Durr, technical director of the battle re-enactment, the campaign has special significance for Texas. "All the Cavalry for the Red River Campaign came from Texas," Durr states, "including Walker's Greys, who played a major role in the outcome. They became known as the 'Texas Rangers'."

The long week of fighting, walking and camping in the woods began on Easter Sunday in Natchitoches and is continuing with daily skirmishes

gains included construction and business services. Combined, the two sectors added 10,600 jobs to the state's labor market.

Wholesale and retail trade endured the heaviest job loss. Employment in general merchandise stores dropped by 4,400, followed by a 3,500-job decrease in apparel and accessory stores.

"Many retail outlets continued reducing holiday staff in February," Cavazos explained. "We expect jobs in retail trade to stabilize soon."

The Bryan-College Station Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) had the lowest February unemployment rate of all Texas MSAs at 3.5 percent. The Austin-San Marcos MSA had the second lowest at 4.2 percent, ahead of Amarillo MSA's 5.2 percent unemployment rate.

The MSA's with the highest February rates were McAllen-Edinburg-Mission at 18.1 percent, followed by Brownsville-Harlingen at 13.2 percent and El Paso at 12.0 percent.

County jobless rate hits new five-year high

WOODVILLE — Unemployment in Tyler County hit a new five-year high during February, jumping to 11.4 percent, according to figures released last week by the Texas Employment Commission.

For the second consecutive month, Tyler County's unemployment rate remained in double digits, climbing 6 percent above January's 10.8 percent mark. That rate as well as the latest 11.4 percent figure each top last year's high of 10.7 percent recorded in February.

The new rate is the highest recorded for Tyler County since February, 1989 when a 12.0 percent jobless mark was set.

Over the past 10 years, the highest unemployment number recorded for Tyler County was in June 1986. During that month, a record 18.4 percent of the county's workforce was unemployed, according to figures released last week by the Texas Employment Commission.

For the second consecutive month, Tyler County's unemployment rate remained in double digits, climbing 6 percent above January's 10.8 percent mark. That rate as well as the latest 11.4 percent figure each top last year's high of 10.7 percent recorded in February.

February, the statewide figures rose by the same amount. Unemployment in Texas grew from January's 6.8 percent mark up to 7.6 percent in February, according to figures released last week by the Texas Employment Commission.

TEC Chairman Eddie Cavazos noted that despite the rise, the state's job market is better than it was a year ago.

"Overall, Texas' unemployment picture has improved significantly since last year," Cavazos said. "The February 1994 unemployment rate decreased from the February 1993 rate of 8.1 percent and the February 1992 rate of 7.9 percent."

"Is our job market recovering from the early nineties recession? Reports indicate it is; however, we'll know more after we get employment numbers over the next several months," he said.

Texas nonfarm wage and salary jobs increased by 47,000 throughout the month. The largest employment growth was seasonal and occurred in government. Local school districts, colleges and universities, adding more than 20,000 jobs to the labor market, completed spring semester staffing.

WOODVILLE — Early voting in both the Democratic and Republican party primary runoff elections is now underway with election day balloting set for Tuesday, April 12.

Early voting in the runoff continues through Friday, April 8, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at the Domino Hall located on the west side of the Tyler County Courthouse in Woodville.

As of Tuesday morning, a total of 27 voters has cast ballots in person in the Democratic Party race while no one had voted in the Republican Party runoff. Mail ballot applications for the run-off totaled 41 for the Democrats and one for the Republicans.

Those who voted in the March primary elections cannot switch parties for the runoff ballot. Those who voted in the Democratic Primary in March cannot vote in the Republican Primary runoff and those who voted Republican in March cannot cast ballots in the Democratic Party runoff.

Democratic runoff

There are three state-wide races on the Democratic Primary runoff ballot. In addition, voters in Tyler County's Precinct 3 will be asked to decide on the party's justice of the peace nominee.

Jimmy Wayne Davis of Colmansett and Walter Cowart of Dan B are seeking the Tyler County justice of the peace post for Precinct 3. The two men were the top two contenders during the five-candidate race in March.

Davis, a former JP, led the field with 387 votes (44.4% of the total cast) while Cowart, a building contractor, finished second with 161 votes (18.5 percent of the total). Because there are no Republican Party candidates for this office, the winner of this race will face the winner of the Democratic Primary runoff.

Patricia "Pat" Lykos and Don Wittig are competing for the Republican nomination for attorney general. The winner will face Democratic incumbent Dan Morales in November.

Where to vote

Voters wishing to cast ballots on Tuesday, April 12, may do so at 16 Democratic Party polling places located throughout the county. The Republican Party will operate only one polling place.

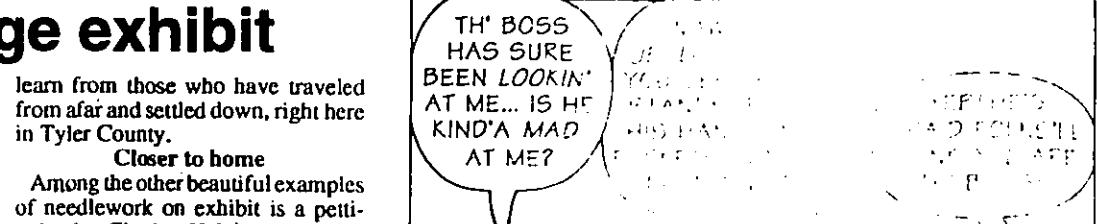

And now, with her 62 year old mother in tow, she took the next step toward her final career of medicine, which she practiced for several years in Wisconsin before answering the call to missionary work in China.

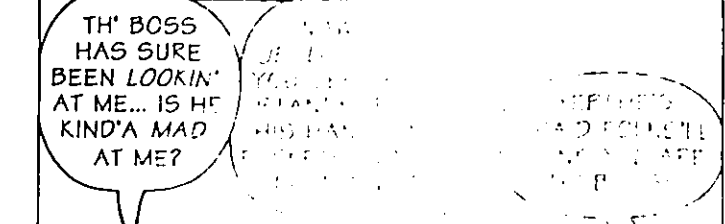

Scientists from the Eastern Regional Research Center of the ARS report that findings from their recent study support the use of plastic cutting boards for food preparation. These scientists found that bacteria consistently survived better on wooden boards than plastic. They also were unable to find evidence of antimicrobial activity in various types of wood, except for white oak which is popularly used for baseball bats, not for cutting boards.

Deadlines near on filing tax renditions, exemption requests

WOODVILLE — Linda Lewis, chief appraiser of the Tyler County Appraisal District, has issued a reminder to all business owners, homeowners and landowners of approaching deadlines for filing property renditions, tax exemption applications and special use applications.

Business owners must file property rendition forms with the appraisal district office by April 14. Business owners may receive an extension through April 30 if the owner requests it in writing and can demonstrate good cause.

A rendition is a report a property owner files each year, listing taxable property he owns or manages as of Jan. 1. The law requires certain property owners to file renditions every year.

Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on Jan. 1 must file a rendition statement with the appraisal district. Businesses, for instance, must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment, and other tangible business property in a rendition. It is to the owners' benefit to do so because chief appraisers use the rendition report to establish the property's fair taxable value. When business personal property is rendered, the chief appraiser is forced to estimate the value.

While only business personal property must be rendered, anyone may voluntarily file a rendition with the appraisal district. Texas law does not require a property owner to render a home or other real property, but homeowners who do render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers, for several reasons.

First, by filing a rendition, property owners ensure that the correct address is on their value notices, notices of hearings which may be scheduled if they protest the appraisal of their property, and on their tax bills. It is essential that property owners receive this information in a timely manner. For instance, if the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect address, the property owner is still responsible for paying the taxes plus penalties that result from late payment.

Second, a rendition is an opportunity for a property owner to record an opinion of the property's value, the appraiser's value and the appraiser's reasons for the appraisal. If a property is appraised by more than one appraiser, the property owner should file a rendition in each appraisal district office.

Property owners whose homes were damaged by a storm, flood or fire may also file a special type of rendition report with the chief appraiser, called a report of decreased value. The deadline for filing this report for 1994

Battle of Pleasant Hill re-enactment planned Saturday

PLEASANT HILL, La. — For the last 14 years, the 1864 Civil War Battle of Pleasant Hill has been re-enacted annually in the small Louisiana town, but this year's event, currently underway, is very different.

During this week, in celebration of the battle's 130th anniversary, Civil War re-enactors from all over the nation (and overseas) are gathered to relive the entire week-long Red River Campaign of which the Pleasant Hill battle was only one clash, the last and largest. The Civil War Red River Campaign was the Union's attempt to capture Shreveport and invade Texas.

According to Truman Durr, technical director of the battle re-enactment, the campaign has special significance for Texans. "All the Cavalry for the Red River Campaign came from Texas," Durr states, "including Walker's Greys, who played a major role in the outcome. They later became known as the Texas Rangers."

The long week of fighting, walking and camping in the woods began on Easter Sunday in Natchitoches and is continuing with daily skirmishes through this Saturday, with three large scale battles taking place during the last three days of the campaign.

The Battle of Wilson Farm (a battle between Union and Confederate Cavalry) will begin at approximately 9 a.m. Thursday, April 7, on Highway 175, two and a half miles north of Pleasant Hill on the Pleasant Hill Battlefield.

The Battle of Sabine Crossroads (Mansfield) will begin at approximately 1 p.m. Friday, April 8 at Sabine Crossroads, a mile south of Mansfield on Highway 175.

In Pleasant Hill, Saturday's activities begin with a parade at 10 a.m., continuing with events throughout the day, including plate lunches available at the Legion Hall and military maneuvers on the field after lunch.

The Battle of Pleasant Hill, which takes place on a 100-acre field, begins around 4 p.m. but the public is requested to be there as early as noon. This is the only battle for which there will be an admission fee: \$5 for persons age 12 and over, no charge for children under 12. A special group rate of \$3 per person is available to a minimum 25 persons and advance ticket purchase by calling 318-796-

2244. Parking will be available in town and shuttle buses will run between town and the battlefield.

Durr says that The National Guard is playing a major role in the activities, with many horses and wagons, as well as artillery. "There will be 300 horses, and two cannons so large that each will require six horses to pull it," he states at 2 p.m. Thursday, April 7.

Taking two years in its preparation, the size and length of the campaign re-enactment has drawn such interest that the enrollment had to be cut off two months ago, giving time for advance planning for things such as food for the armies, which had to be pre-packed ahead of time.

"This is the first time in history," said Durr, who is also mayor of Pleasant Hill, "that an undertaking of this magnitude has ever been attempted. This event will be educational to children as well as adults."

The re-enactment is presented by the 19th Century Living History Association, Inc.; The Village of Pleasant Hill, Louisiana; The Battle of Pleasant Hill, Louisiana; and the American Legion Post 300 and Auxiliary.

As an Eagle Scout Rabuck has also served as an assistant scoutmaster and has worked with the Tyler County youth group called Young Life, a non-denominational organization.

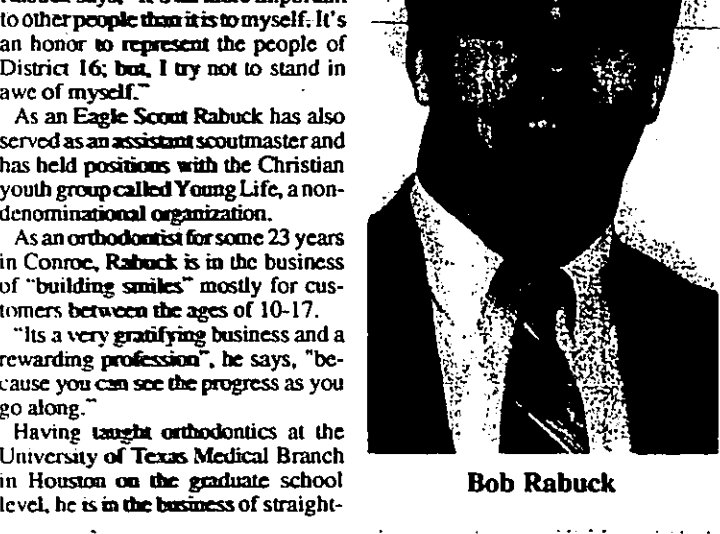
As an orthodontist for some 23 years in Conroe, Rabuck is in the business of "building smiles" mostly for customers between the ages of 10-17.

"Many retail outlets continued reducing holiday staff in February," Cavazos explained. "We expect jobs in retail trade to stabilize soon."

The Bryan-College Station Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) had the lowest February unemployment rate of all Texas MSAs at 3.5 percent. The Austin-San Marcos MSA had the second lowest at 4.2 percent, ahead of Amarillo MSA's 5.2 percent unemployment rate.

The MSAs with the highest February rates were McAllen-Edinburg-Mission at 18.1 percent, followed by Brownsville-Harlingen at 13.2 percent and El Paso at 12.0 percent.

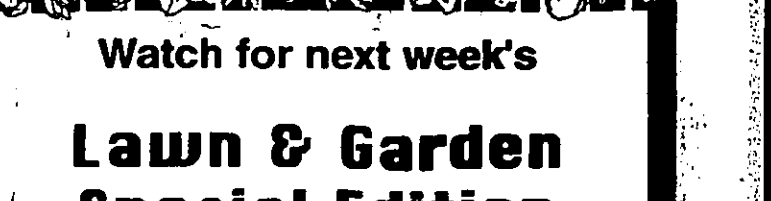

The eye complications of diabetes are the leading cause of new cases of legal blindness among Americans between the ages of 20 and 74. Blindness is also 25 times more common in a diabetic patient than in a non-diabetic patient.

Government studies show that profound visual loss can be reduced by 50% in the most severe form of the disease by laser therapy, and has a similar savings of moderate visual loss in milder cases.

The American Academy of Ophthalmology recommends a regular eye exam schedule for diabetic patients, depending on the patient's age, how long the patient has had diabetes, and the status of the eye.

Therefore, we urge everyone who is diabetic to have an ophthalmologist examine their eyes on a routine basis.
