MISSED IT — A 29-year-old Kirbyville truck driver sustained only minor injuries Tuesday morning when the tank trailer righer was driving rolled off the narrow, wooden Billiams Creek bridge on Hilly Road west of Colmesnell. Kenneth Gilchriest was taken to a Jasper hospital by a private vehicle as a precautionary measure following the mishap, which occurred at 5 a.m. Tuesday on the county road. According to Highway Patrol Trooper Denman B. Dunkin, the tank truck is owned by Taylor Interests, Inc., of Carthage and contained 130 barrels of 10-pound brine water, a mixture of saltwater and fresh water used in drilling. "He was traveling to a drilling rig off FM 1745 west of Colmesnell and got on the wrong road. He was searching for the right road when he came upon this bridge," Dunkin said. Although the rig weighed 80,000 pounds and the wooden bridge was rated for only 5,000 pounds per axle, Dunkin said it was not the weight of the truck that caused the problem. "It is my understanding he had already come across this bridge once and had turned around and was heading back the way be had come when the right-side tires missed the bridge." The truck rolled off the bridge, landing upside down in the creek. Almost all of its load of brine water was dumped into the creek and Dunkin said Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials will be conducting a damage assessment to determine how fish and other wildlife in the area were affected. Precinct 2 Commissioner Pete Barnes said the bridge will be closed to traffic probably for a minimum of three to five days.
