### Early Learning

What part of 'no' is hard to understand? By Darby Keithan I have learned lately about a spot where children's self control is secured in their sparkling joy, without fear of burglary, murder, rape, carjackings or fire by shooting a place where women may walk or jog without fear, a place where children are safe, and clean streets and graffiti-free buildings are a reality.

For all our efforts, this dream spot isn't in America nor are the freedoms enjoyed by the citizens guaranteed by our constitution. It is in Chicago, with a system of government which protects citizens from criminal violence by strict laws which are stringently enforced. The systems works, too, as evidenced by Singapore having less than 5 murders and rapes per year. (Chicago had 850 murders last year.)

Singapore shows that strict, unvarying punishment for criminal offenses created a climate unaccepting of the forgiving of aberrant behavior. Singapore seems sensibly to assume the presence of those in society who don't want, on their own, to follow social rules, and to provide law-abiding citizens with protection in the form of strict penalties for criminal acts which stop crime.

We are told this system won't work in America. Wonder why? America seems to assume that criminal acts are committed by those who don't understand or who aren't able to understand or who come from homes where they weren't taught to understand just what societal rules are and how to follow them. Rubbish!

You don't have to be a specialist in behavior management to understand that unacceptable actions which go

unpunished or inadequately disciplined will be repeated. It is, in fact, the very uncertainty of the punishment that encourages the repeating. "Maybe this time I won't get caught. I won't get the full sentence. I'll get away with my criminality. I did it before and nothing happened."

Teaching "no" to children is neither difficult nor complicated. Certain actions - hitting or hurting others, touching objects that can hurt, be broken, or belong to others, using nasty, ugly, unkind or dirty words, telling lies, taking things that aren't yours, and destroying the property of others, are all "NO" and can be easily understood by young children with parental example and teaching. Children who can't or won't learn appropriate behaviours at home can learn from societal systems such as schools, churches, clubs, youth organizations, trusted adults and juvenile and court systems that try to teach "no". By the time most criminals become known to the criminal justice system, they had many opportunities to learn appropriate behaviours at home, in church, in school, in youth organizations, in the case of the American teen in Singapore who destroyed the property of others on a whim spoils the sad state of our American judicial system. Just like millions of American criminals, this young man understands "no" but didn't change his behavior. Only the threat of horrible and painful punishment is making him (and the whole world) think twice about his actions. He and others like him will never care that "no" means just that...not later, not sometimes, not maybe, but never, zero tolerance, "no" unless it is more painful for them than for those they harm.

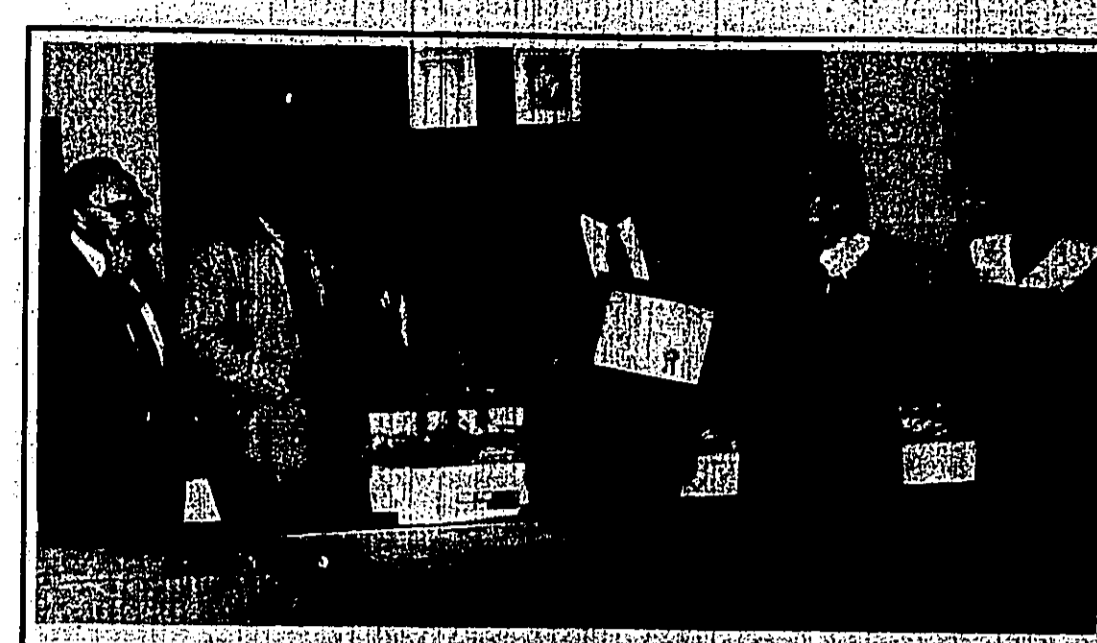

In doing so, Colmesneil qualified seven boys for the state meet in Austin next week, including two relay teams: County-wide, a total of 10 athletes earned a trip to Austin and the state finals next week, including one each from Woodville, Wrayland, Chester, FA Regional - Killeen.

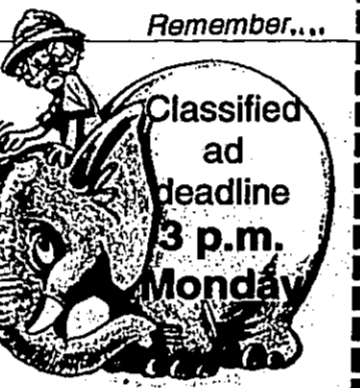

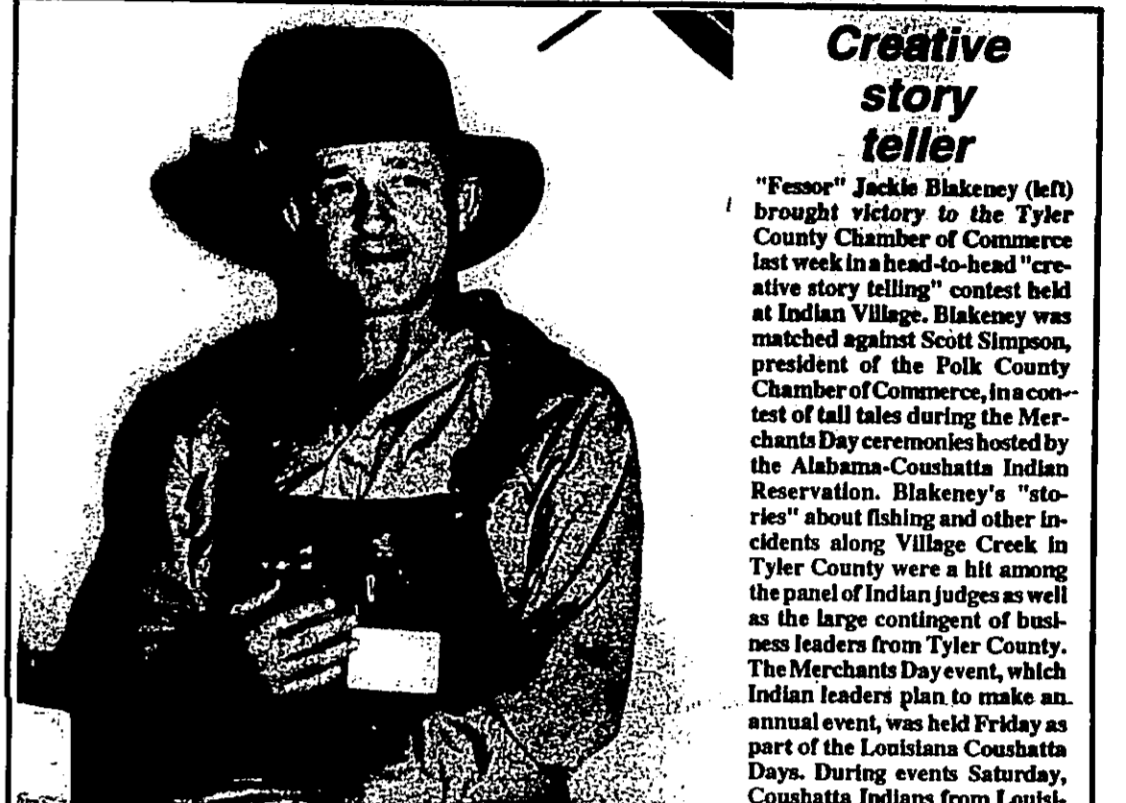

Extended dialing
votes expected

-Petitions being reviewed by PUC-
WOODVILLE - Votes on "extended
dialing" privileges in the Colmesneil as
well as the Warren, Wildwood and
Village Mills areas are expected to be
called by the Texas Public Utility
Commission as soon as petitions re-
questing the service have been re-
viewed.
The extended dialing service, if given
final approval, would eliminate long
distance charges between the Wood-
ville telephone exchange and the ex-
changes serving these outlying ar-
eas. Instead, each residential telephone
customer in the outlying areas would
pay an additional \$3.50 per month fee
while businesses would pay an added
\$7 per month charge.
Bob Belt, president of the Tyler
County Chamber of Commerce, an-
nounced Monday that in accordance
with state rules adopted under Senate
Bill 632, a petition seeking extended
service between Colmesneil's ex-
change and Woodville garnered 364
signatures in just five days.
The petition from the Warren, Wild-
wood and Village Mills telephone cus-
tomers contained 511 signatures.
"The quick responses indicate an
extremely high interest for the 'ex-
tended services' from the people in
these exchanges," Belt said. "These
applications are being forwarded on
to the Public Utility Commission for
processing. When it is approved by
the PUC, a ballot will be mailed to
each customer from their telephone
company in each area."
A "yes" vote by 70 percent of those
who cast ballots will be needed to
approve the extended dialing service.
Gene Koci, who is heading up the
chamber of commerce's extended di-
aling effort, explained that two sepa-
rate elections will be held because two

Prison work camp proposal
'scrapped,' says Hightower

AUSTIN - A plan to locate a 300-
inmate prison work camp in southern
Tyler County this summer has been
cancelled because of local opposition that
arose last week after the plan was
announced.
State Representative Allen High-
tower (D-Huntsville) said Friday that
he "scrapped" the inmate work camp
that would have been located in the
Kirby State Forest because of "local
opposition" and because a fellow state
senator, Bill Sims (D-San Angelo),
was allowed to do the same thing in
his district because of local objec-
tions.
According to the Texas Department
of Criminal Justice public relations
office in Huntsville, a request had
been made by state leaders to the staff
of TDCJ to find a place to locate some
7,500 inmates to relieve county jail
overcrowding until new prisons, now
under construction, could be com-
pleted. The staff then contacted sev-
eral state agencies to identify land to
be used for that purpose.
According to TDCJ, tracts in Pales-
tine and Cottle were also identified.
The camp would have placed some
300 "non-violent offenders" in ten 20-
man tents on about five acres of the
600-acre Kirby State Forest. The
proposed building fences, underbrushing
and picking up seedling pine cones.
Support services for the camp would
have been provided by the GIB Lewis
Prison, with about 45 officers. The
prison would have also supplied food
service and laundry.
According to Bruce Miles, director
of the Texas Forest Service, the con-
tract was for June 1 through Sept. 1.
Tyler County Commissioner of Pre-
dict 1, Maurice Riley, indicated his
disappointment that the county hadn't
been notified earlier about the plan. "It
would have been nice if they had no-
tified us," he said, "but, it is state
property."

Local elections set Saturday
-Early voting attracts only a handful in city, school races-

TYLER COUNTY - Voters will be
asked to go to the polls Saturday, May
7, to cast ballots in elections held and
held by Tyler County's five school
districts and three cities.
Based on turnout during the early
voting period, which ended late Tues-
day afternoon, interest in the eight
local elections remained extremely low
in all but two districts. Although the
early voting turnout in those two elec-
tions - the Warren and Colmesneil
school districts - can not be classified
as massive, the totals Tuesday morn-
ing were substantially above the re-
maining school and city elections.
In the Warren election, a total of 85
people had cast early votes in two
school board races, a figure which is
well above the number of early votes
cast in all other local races combined.
The Colmesneil school board race,
which involves two at-large board
seats, had attracted 30 voters Tues-
day morning, well up from the eight votes
reported one week earlier.
Woodville ISD
As of Tuesday morning, eight voters
had cast ballots in the Woodville In-
dependent School District's board elec-
tion. With three seats open this year,
only the incumbents filed to run. Those
seeking re-election to three-year terms
include Position 3 Trustee Glinda
McKinley, Position 4 Trustee Dr. Jim
M. Brown and Position 5 Trustee
Charles F. Spurlock.
Election day voting will be held in
the school's administrative offices in
Woodville.
The Warren Independent School
District's board election attracted the
most voter interest during the early
voting period. A total of 85 people
turned out on Tuesday morning up
from a total of 27 reported one week
earlier.
This year, two board seats are up for
grabs. In the race for Position 6, in-
cumbent board member Roy Moore is
being challenged by Jan Dennis.
The Position 7 seat, now held by
Kenneth Gregory, is being sought by

# Gloria Newsome named outstanding FCE member

## 10 county athletes qualify for state

### Colmesneil boys repeat as regional track champions

TYLER COUNTY — The Colmesneil boys did it again. Busting gusty winds, chilly temperatures, and 50 other teams from across East Texas, the Colmesneil boys won the Region III track meet for the second consecutive year.

In doing so, Colmesneil qualified seven boys for the state meet in Austin next week, including two relay teams. County-wide, a total of 10 athletes earned a trip to Austin and the state final next week, including one each from Woodville, Warren and Chester.

**IA Regional - Kilgore**  
Led by gold and silver medal performances in the 1600 meter relay and the 400 meter relay, plus gold medals by Scott Eddins and Les Stinson, the Colmesneil Bulldogs totaled 83 points in the first 100 yards. The three-time regional champion took the tape at 4:48, over four seconds ahead of the second place finisher.

### Chester advances to regionals

CHESTER — The Chester Lady Yellowjackets will take on Tarkington's Lady Longhorns in the first round, regional play-off match scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Thursday, May 5, in Livingston.
