Computer error prompts new appraisal notices

'Glitch' causes home values to be too high

WOODVILLE — Errors in the calculation of home values by the Tyler County Appraisal District's computer has prompted Chief Appraiser Linda Lewis to void appraisal notices sent out to home owners last week.

New notices were prepared over the weekend and were mailed Monday. "We worked all weekend on this and everyone who is a home owner should receive new appraisal notices," Lewis said after it was discovered that a computer glitch caused incorrect property values and well as homestead exemptions to be listed on all notices involving homes.

"The error only involved the calculation of home values and homestead exemptions. Notices involving property other than homes were correct and those taxpayers will not be receiving new notices," Lewis said.

Lewis said about 10,000 of the 30,000 appraisal notices mailed out by the district on Tuesday, May 17, were in error. The "glitch" in the computer software caused mistakes in home values ranging from 20 to 40 percent over the actual values.

"All I can say about this is that I am sorry that it occurred and that we are doing what we can to correct it," Lewis said Monday. "We mailed out 10,960 new notices this morning, but a few of those involve commercial properties rather than homes."

"We could not separate those properties from the homes when we reprinted the notices so a few commercial property owners may receive duplicates of the notices they received last week," Lewis explained.

The chief appraiser said the error was discovered last week after property owners began contacting her office with questions about the substantial increases in property values listed for their homes.

"Estimates were made for 300 people call or come up to the office," Lewis said Monday. "Very few of them were angry; most just had questions as to why the values had gone up," she said.

Of the 300 or so calls, only 12 formally requested to appear before the Appraisal Review Board to appeal the listed values.

"When we got to looking at the values these people were questioning, we discovered there was a problem," she said. "I tried to calculate the values for one gentleman and kept coming up with different answers."

Lewis said the problem apparently involved the computerized schedule of values which she said listed the price per square foot for various types of structures.

"What we had to do was remove this new schedule from the computer and go back to the one we used last year," she said.

The glitch also affected the way homestead exemptions were calculated.

"Each entity has its own exemption. For example the (Woodville) school

Atkinson selected as WISD principal

WOODVILLE — Dr. Joannie Atkinson of Warren has been named as the Woodville Intermediate School principal by the Woodville school board during a meeting last week.

Atkinson, who is completing her third year as the Fred Elementary School principal, was cited by Woodville Superintendent Carol Moffet for her experience at all levels of education. "I am very honored to be selected to fill the intermediate school principal's job," Atkinson said. "I am looking forward to working with Mrs. Moffet and the administrative team in Wood-

ville. I haven't had a chance to meet the teachers yet, but I hope to do so this week or next."

She officially takes over as the school principal in Woodville on Aug. 1 although she said she will "in and out" of the school throughout the summer. Prior to being hired as the Fred Elementary principal by the Warren Independent School District, Atkinson served as an assistant professor at Northwestern State University in Natchitoches, La., for a year and as a

Sullivan, Kenesson win Methodist church's Heritage Awards

WOODVILLE — The Woodville United Methodist Church formally recognized two longtime members Doug Kenesson and Quaidle Sullivan for their significant contributions to not only the life of the church but to the community that surrounds it as well.

The awards were given as part of the on that church's Heritage Sunday Program held on April 24.

Quaidle Sullivan

"and here I am."

The daughter of a Presbyterian family, her father was a school superintendent and her brother grew up to become a Presbyterian minister. She married F. B. Sam Sullivan in 1935 and they moved to Tyler County in January 1936. She and Sam joined the Methodist Church in about 1937 and attended the Woodville United Methodist Church Sunday until the two churches were joined. When they started out at the Southern Church, the late Sam Sullivan's father was the pastor for the church.

She taught school for 32 years, mostly in Warren, teaching Spanish, English and Latin. In the early 1950's she became a librarian for Warren when one of the school superintendents, just threw me in there. I had grown up in the Baylor University library and played in the library all the time and did things for them, he told me just take it over because he said I knew more than anybody else.

She retired from school teaching in 1972 and then served as librarian at Allan Shivers Library for 17 years and one month without pay.

Sam was a Methodist. "I had been going to Presbyterian summer camps every year from the age of six," she says. "We agreed before we got married that we'd be Presbyterians if there was a Presbyterian Church in the town and if there wasn't then I'd be a Methodist."

"Well, he moved me to a town without a Presbyterian church, and here I am."

She served as Sunday school superintendent for 20 years or more, and was over the children's department, which took children from birth through sixth grade.

"We had a very active children's department in those days. When the upstairs was built in the church, we had some 40 something children in that age limit. I practically pulled teeth getting wee wisdom started. Some of the older members of the church did not want the children to use the new building. But we just had to have wee wisdom. Teachers used to say that you could always pick a wee wisdom child all the way up through school because of the early start we gave them."

"For many years I did the church's Christmas program. I had lots of help. We'd practice the program on Saturday mornings right after the matinee at Woodville's Theater. The children were taught to and there was no wild stuff in town on Saturday afternoon because Preacher Mills would make them behave."

In addition to being a driving force behind the start of Wee Wisdom, she was also instrumental in planning and building the education building.

One member of the church has said of Quaidle, "We had a Sunday School when she was the superintendent. The teachers were there and the children were there and the chains hung on the wall under each child's name with the Bible verses they had memorized."

Described as "the best worker in the church," her strong personality and tireless energy made her irreplaceable on the many church committees of which she has been a member over the years.

"She is the mother of two: Fred Sullivan and Martha Sullivan, and the grandmother of three. She and her late husband, who was a Woodville Ag teacher, began Sullivan's Hardware in 1972 and then served as librarian at Allan Shivers Library for 17 years and one month without pay."

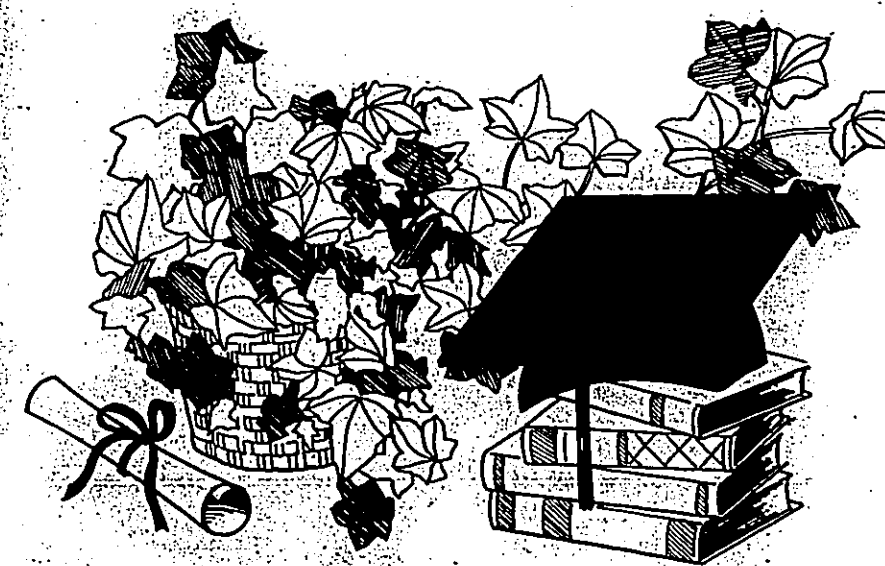

Born in Port Arthur, the honor graduate has attended Colmesneil High School for the past three years, coming there from Thomas Jefferson High School.

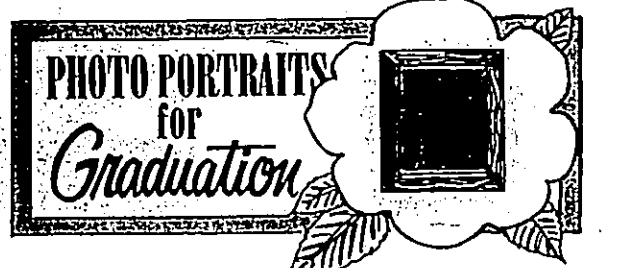

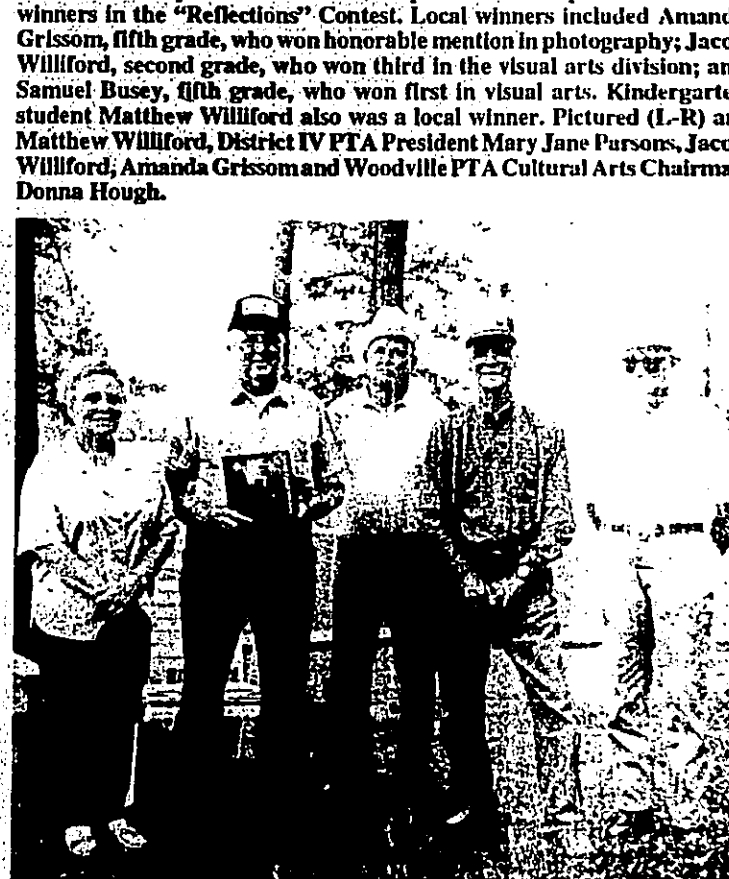

Woodville Middle School students learn about submarine life

WOODVILLE — Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class David White came to Woodville Middle School several weeks ago to tell the students about life beneath the ocean's surface. He educated and entertained the seventh and eighth graders with his responses to their many questions about submarine life, and encouraged them to work and study hard, and to strive for their goals.

White, 21, is the son of Woodville Middle School history teacher Mildred White, and is a 1990 graduate of Woodville High School. He has been in the U.S. Navy for three and a half years, is stationed at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, and for the last several years has been on the nuclear submarine U.S.S. Honolulu.

He is now aboard the U.S.S. Omaha, another nuclear submarine, which has just completed the first month of six-month assignment, currently on maneuvers in the Pacific Ocean. A machinist's mate, White's specialty is anything mechanical, from running the diesel engine to repairing equipment.

The following are some of Mrs. White's students' comments about what they learned.

"There's a lot about submarines I didn't know. There's still a lot of things I don't know, and there's a lot of things I know now, thanks to David. He didn't try to hog all the attention. He let others ask any kind of questions. No matter how dumb or stupid, he answered them all."

Daniel Reed

"I learned that there are normally about 120 people on a submarine ship at one time... they have six hour work shifts, and they have twelve hours to take a shower, sleep, watch movies, or do whatever they want to. The longest mission he has ever been out was for about 31 days... he would be going on another one for about 82 days or three months." Kassie Strickland

"The best time was when he told us they have some free time to do whatever they want, such as watch movies. I thought they wouldn't have any extra time. David also told us about the electronics. He told us about active and passive sonar and what it does." Lane Hart

"I learned a lot about the sub. The bunks were six feet long and two feet wide. The 15 captains (or higher ranking people) used one toilet and the rest of the crew, about 100 people, used three toilets, two sinks, and two showers. The sub makes about 10,000 gallons of water a day... the sub runs off of diesel instead of gasoline." Jacob Fluke

"He told us that there were two showers and three toilets (for 100 men) on the sub. I could imagine being in the shower and he answered that five or 10 minutes were just about as long as you stayed in because if you stayed too much longer you would get jerked out by the man waiting behind you." Rachael Harvey

"I found out many facts and neat things about a submarine. Such as the cost of each torpedo to be made, one and a half million dollars. I could imagine a lot of interesting things about life on a submarine." Rochellea Stylian

"One of the reasons I went to the school to talk to him was because he answered questions in words that everyone can understand. When he explained the inside of a submarine, I could imagine what it looked like." Tammy Blum

"I liked him coming to our school to talk to us. But when he talked about the inside of a submarine, I could imagine what it looked like." Tammy Blum

"I learned that he works on things that are not nuclear. He has travelled a lot of places. They play war games and use torpedo dummies. Warhead torpedoes cost almost one million dollars each. He also has to work for six weeks, then he can have a break for twelve hours and do whatever he wants to do. And that he met the head cheerleaders of all the NFL football teams (at a Chili's Restaurant)." name not available

"I wonder what it'd be like hitting a hole, or a mountain even? What about when you're under attack? It's probably loud. If I were David (which I'm not), I'd feel content with my job on my road." R. Carroll

"I learned that everyone has his own responsibilities and everyone relies on the other... have your full confidence on one or more things at once. If you don't, well then you're kind of holding others' lives in your hand." Isaac Unsworth

"He told us how he felt, and different things about the submarine. But one of the things I liked to be on a ship. He answered some of the questions in the back of my mind... I would really like to thank David personally." Nicole Curtis

"I learned how they turned salt water into fresh water and oxygen. I also learned about casualties, and the worst being fire. The width of a submarine is 33 feet and it's 366 feet long. They can stay underwater very long periods of time, in fact they can stay under as long as they have food. The submarines have no news or TV stations, only movies. When they're not on watch, they're eating, showering or sleeping." Isaac Unsworth

"He told us that he met the NFL football cheerleaders. He told us how they get oxygen from the ocean. He also told us what kind of medals he has and how he got them. He said when they work they get pay. I never knew that they get pay." Gene Williams

"I learned how the submarine worked. It ran off a reactor that was like a motor of a car... he explained the difference between two sonar radars... he told us about the missiles the submarines carried, such as Tomahawks. He explained the procedure when the reactor broke down." John Henry

"David said that they only have about 90 days worth of food. When that runs out they eat pancakes until

they get food from another port. They eat more pancakes because there is still flour left over." Thomas Wise

"On some subjects Mr. White was funny, and on others that weren't a laughing matter, he was serious."

when he started telling us about fires on the boat. He told us how scared he got and I thought to myself that I would be just as scared if not scarer."

"It seems like they would not have any secrets but they do, and some kids when they asked him a question he said he couldn't tell us because it was top secret." Crystal McKee

"The bed he slept in, I could not ever do it if I was the same size as he was. He is one very good person. I couldn't ever eat the food that he ate; or ever go through the same routine with the restroom. He can take it but I

cannot take the pain. For I can say to Mrs. White she's blessed with a good and strong kid." Tommy Mafford

"Everyone gets along because they're underwater so long... the sub is 366 feet long and each watchy takes up two thirds of it. If someone were to die they would put them in a body bag and put them in a freezer. I myself would not choose this for a perfect job because I can't be enclosed for so long without daylight. I did learn always go to Chili's during the school bowl." Michael Johnson

"I learned that he is 22 years old and only has six feet of sleeping space. I think he is a brave man and also a squashed up man at that... David was, he is one very good person. I couldn't ever eat the food that he ate; or ever go through the same routine with the restroom. He can take it but I

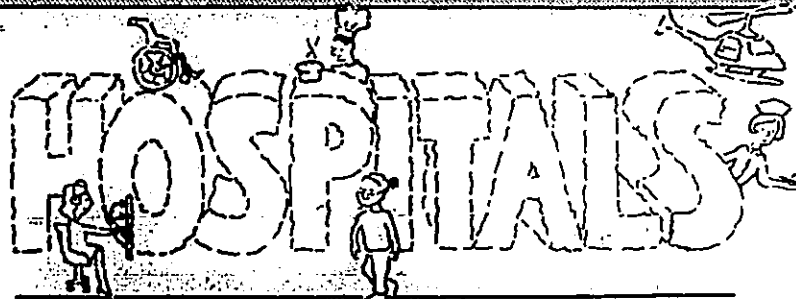

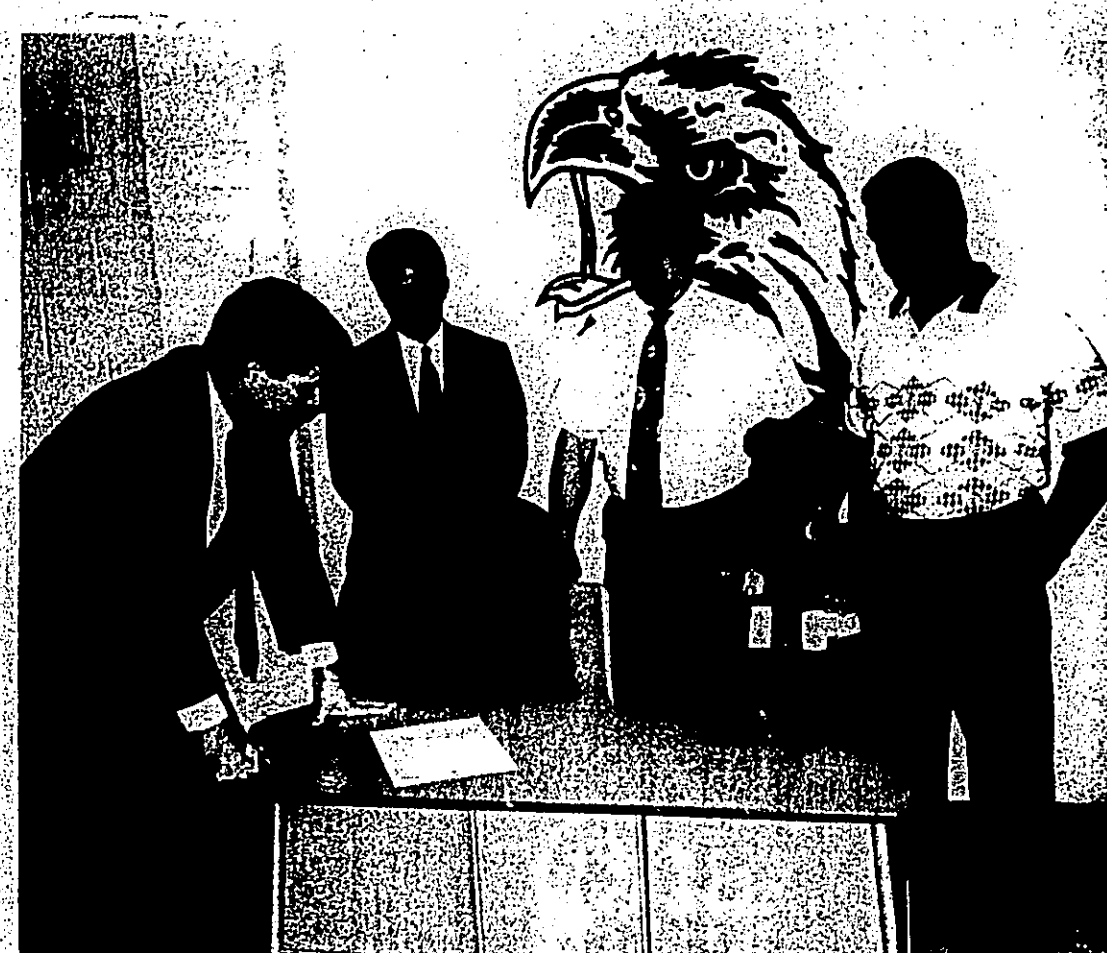

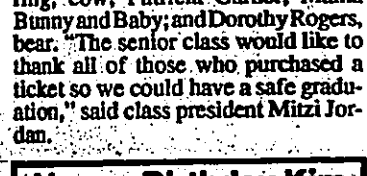

Computer error prompts new appraisal notices

"Glitch" causes home values to be too high

WOODVILLE — Errors in the calculation of home values by the Tyler County Appraisal District's computer has prompted Chief Appraiser Linda Lewis to void appraisal notices sent out to home owners last week. New notices were prepared over the weekend and were mailed Monday. "We worked all weekend on this and everyone who is a home owner should receive new appraisal notices," Lewis said after it was discovered that a computer glitch caused incorrect property values and well as homestead exemptions to be listed on all notices involving homes.

"The error only involved the calculation of home values and homestead exemptions. Notices involving property other than homes were correct and those taxpayers will not be receiving new appraisal notices," Lewis said.

Lewis said about 10,000 of the 30,000 appraisal notices mailed out by the district on Tuesday, May 17, were in error. The "glitch" in the computer software caused mistakes in home values ranging from 20 to 40 percent over the actual values.

"All I can say about this is that I am sorry that it occurred and that we are doing what we can to correct it," Lewis said Monday. "We mailed out 10,000 new notices this morning, but a few of those involve commercial properties rather than the homes where we reprinted the notices so a few commercial property owners may receive duplicates of the notices they received last week," Lewis explained.

The chief appraiser said the error was discovered last week after property owners began contacting her office with questions about the substantial increases in property values listed on their homes.

"Testimates were about 300 people calling or coming in to see me," Lewis said Monday. "Very few of them were angry; most just had questions as to why the values had gone up," she said.

Lewis said the error was caused by a software glitch in the computer program used to calculate property values. She said the error was discovered last week after property owners began contacting her office with questions about the substantial increases in property values listed on their homes.

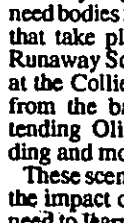

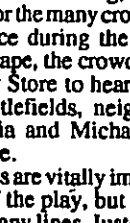

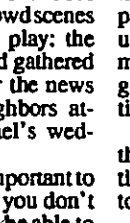

Sullivan, Kenesson win Methodist church's Heritage Awards

WOODVILLE — The Woodville United Methodist Church formally recognized two longtime members Doug Kenesson and Quaidie Sullivan for their significant contributions to not only the life of the church but to the community that surrounds it as well.

The awards were given as part of the on that church's Heritage Sunday Program held on April 24.

Quaidie Sullivan

"and here I am."

The daughter of a Presbyterian family, her father was a school superintendent and her brother grew up to become a Presbyterian minister. She married F.B. Sam Sullivan in 1935 and they moved to Tyler County in January 1936. She and Sam joined the Methodist Church in about 1937, and attended the Woodville United Methodist Church until the two churches were joined. When they started out at the Southern Church, the late Sen. John Tower's father was the pastor for the circuit.

She taught school for 32 years, mostly in Warren, teaching Spanish, English and Latin. In the early 1950's she became a librarian for Warren when one of the school superintendents, just moved in there. I had good friends in the Baylor University library and played in the library all the time and did things for them, he told me to just take it over because he said I knew more than anybody else."

She retired from school teaching in 1972 and then served as librarian at Allen Shivers Library for 17 years and one month without pay. Sam was a Methodist. "I had been going to Presbyterian summer camps every year from the age of six," she says. "We agreed before we got married that we'd be Presbyterian if there was a Presbyterian church in the town and if there wasn't then I'd be a Methodist."

"Well, he moved me to a town without a Presbyterian church, and here I am."

She served as Sunday school superintendent for 20 years or more, and was over the children's department, which took children from birth through sixth grade. "We had a very active children's department in those days. When the upstairs was built in the church, we had some 40 something children in that age limit. Practically pulled teeth getting Wee Wisdom started. Some of the older members of the church did not want the children to use the new building. But we just had to have Wee Wisdom. Teachers used to say that you could always pick a Wee Wisdom child all the way up through school because of the early start we gave them."

"For many years I did the church's Christmas program. I had lots of help. We'd practice the program on Saturday afternoons right after the matinee at Wood Fain's Theater. The children

were taught to and there was no wild stuff in town on Saturday afternoon because Preacher Mills would make them behave."

In addition to being a driving force behind the start of Wee Wisdom, she was also instrumental in planning and building the education building. One member of the church has said of Quaidie, "We had a Sunday School when she was the superintendent. The teachers were there and the children were there and the chains hung on the wall under each child's name with the Bible verses they had memorized."

Described as "the best worker in the church," her strong personality and tireless energy made her irreplaceable on the many church committees of which she has been a member over the years.

She is the mother of two: Fred Sullivan and Martha Sullivan, and the grandmother of three. She and her late husband, who was a Woodville Ag teacher, began Sullivan's Hardware in town which continues in operation to this day.

A musician and an educator, Doug taught English at Warren for decades and on Sundays played the piano for Sunday School and for church. She was the first organist for the Woodville Methodist Church. When the church acquired its first Hammond organ, no one else knew how to play and she learned. In fact, one of the reasons the altar and choir are situated the way they are now is because she was self-conscious about playing the pedals on the organ without her shoes on.

In addition to playing every piano

in the church, Doug was the choir director all during the 1950's and 1960's, after she convinced Lois Fain to take over at the piano and organ.

Together with her husband Jiggs, Doug served as youth coordinator for the church and for many years the two of them organized youth activities for the community. At a time when there was even less for youth to do in Woodville than there is now, Doug and Jiggs helped make life interesting and socially active for a whole crowd of youngsters, and they did it with the church as the focal point.

Despite her busy professional schedule as a school teacher, her family responsibilities with the J.B. Best Department Store and her two children, Huntley and Jane Ellen, Doug found additional time to serve in the Women's Society of Christian Service. This organization and their famed "Silver Teas" raised money to help pay for the building of the new Methodist sanctuary.

"They worked like Trojans on those teas," commented one observer. The teas would be held at the parsonage, or sometimes at Doug's house, and the women of Tyler County would dress in their finest clothes and wear their highest heels to attend. Her son Huntley recalls seeing a silver plate in the hallway after one of those teas piled high with money donated by the ladies to the building fund. "I'm afraid my eyes got as big as saucers," he recalled.

"And this is not all. There has not been a bereaved family or a new baby in the church who has not received a casserole or a meal from Doug Kenesson," says one of her many admirers. "She never rested on what she has done, and never stopped doing for others," another admirer said.

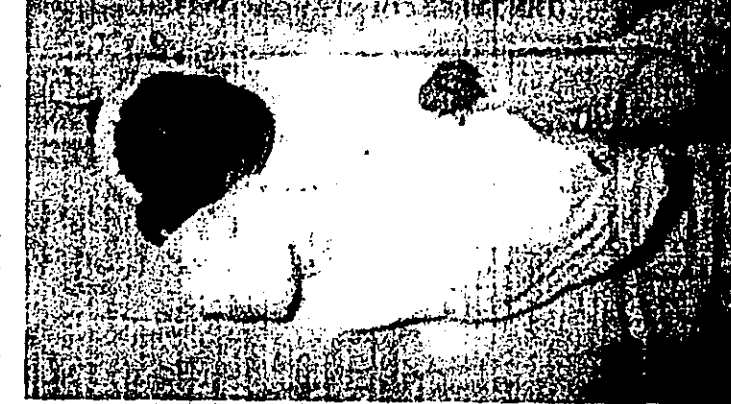

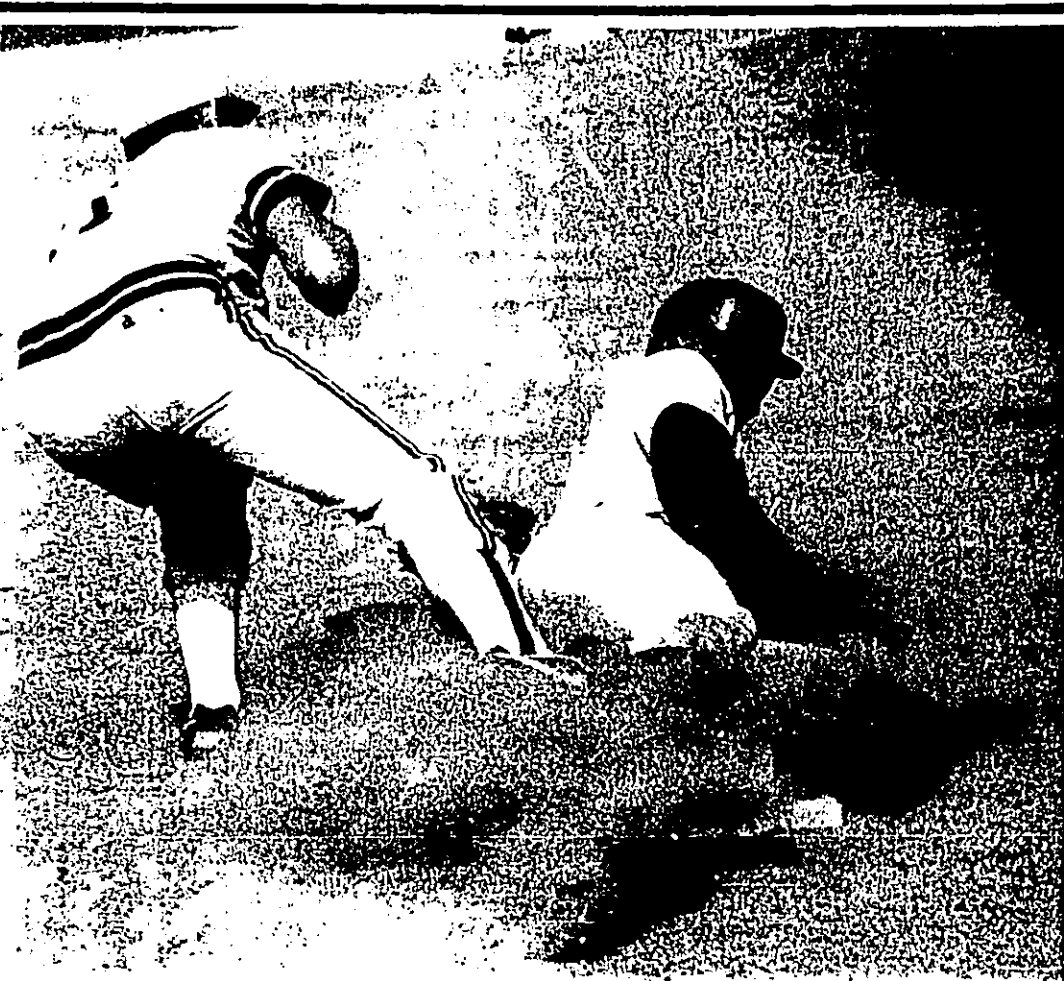

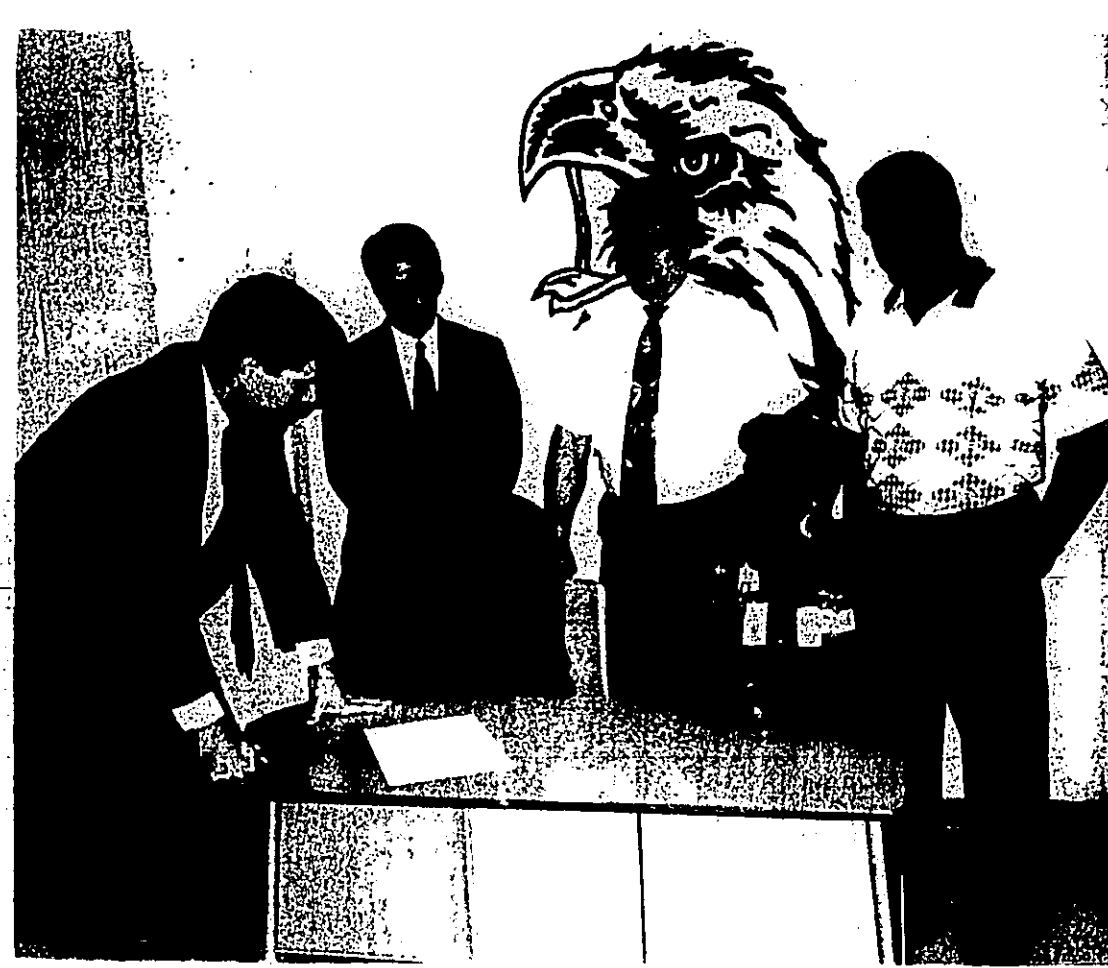

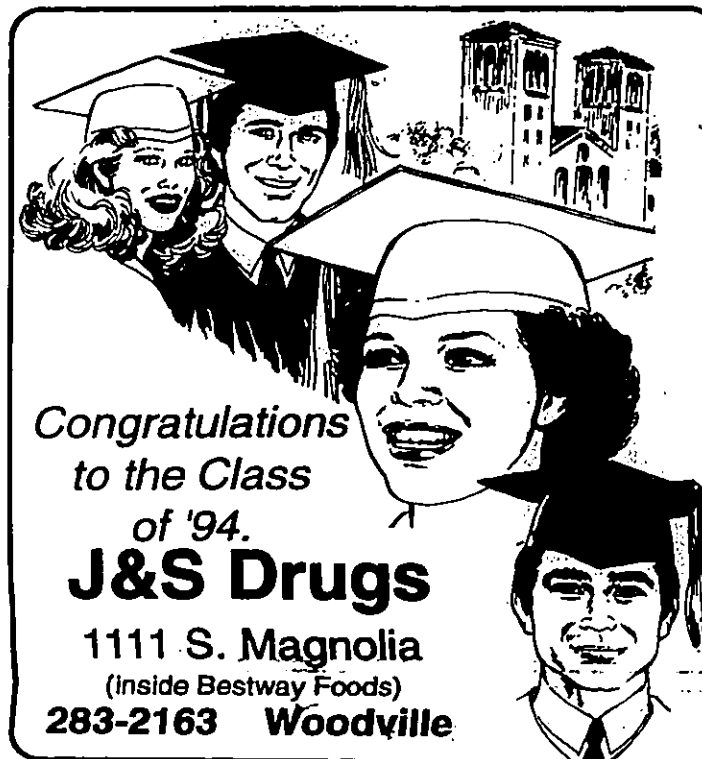
Greenwood was the only Woodville player named to the district's honorable mention team. The senior centerfielder batted .280 and was one of the top defensive outfielders in the league.

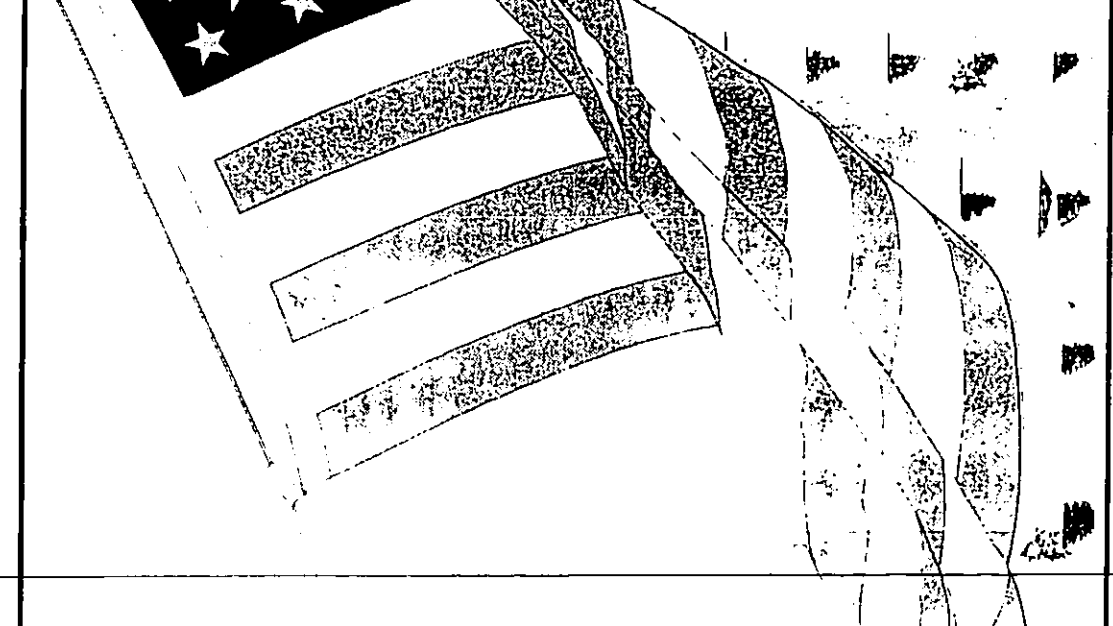
