Traffic mishaps send 10 to area hospitals

WOODVILLE — A pair of traffic accidents during the past week sent 10 people to area hospitals for the treatment of injuries, according to accident reports filed by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Eight people, including three children, were taken to hospitals following a three-vehicle mishap reported Thursday, June 23, on Highway 190 about 10 miles east of Woodville. Two others were treated following a one-vehicle rollover Saturday afternoon, June 26, on FM 256 about 6.8 miles east of Colmesneil.

Taken to the Tyler County Hospital in Woodville following the Thursday mishap were Joe N. Berry, 31, of Killen; Brian Kelly Schrock, 23, of Livingston; and Stephen Andrew, 23, of Sumrall. Miss. E. Rother, all members of a Jasper family, were transported to the Jasper Memorial Hospital. They included Paul A. Collins, 28; Shaunda Collins, 21; Patrick Collins, 3; Paul Collins Jr., 5; and Latrice Collins, 2.

All of the injured with the exception of Berry were reported to have sustained only minor injuries. Berry sustained leg injuries and was pinned inside his vehicle for a time following the collision.

According to a report filed by Trooper Richard Brown, the accident occurred about 2:41 p.m. at the intersection of Highway 190 and Foster Hills Road. Schrock was driving a 1992 Ford F250 pickup pulling a 1991 Deere trailer east on Highway 190 when it collided with the rear of a 1975 Pontiac Catalina driven by Paul A. Collins.

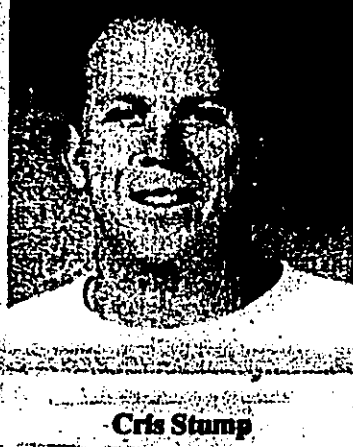
WISD hires Stump as baseball coach

Landowners protest sewer plant location

WOODVILLE — Some 13 concerned landowners who live near a planned 250-acre, \$2-million-a-year per day capacity rockered sewer filtration plant brought their objections Monday to a Woodville City Council special session in hopes the city would reconsider the location of the proposed plant.

Mayor Billy Rose allowed several of the people representing the landowners to address the council, even though the meeting was scheduled as a "special meeting" under the Texas Open Meetings Act to discuss legal matters and matters of real estate. In addition, the council had one item in open session when Mayor Billy Rose awarded Woodville High School graduating senior Erin Brochtrup a plaque honoring her for being selected as valedictorian in her senior class.

Rose indicated after reconvening from the executive session into regular session, "I do want to say that it is the city's intent not to purchase any more property past Sullivan's property."

Chief complaint from the landowners present was that they were not notified of the city's intent regarding the sewer plant. "I don't want to say that it is the city's intent not to purchase any more property past Sullivan's property," asked Virginia Baker, who lives near the Seneca Road Loop. "I'll have to sit there and look out my dining room window and see a sewer. You had two days to notify me and you didn't."

Blood drive planned

WOODVILLE — The Blood Center of Southeast Texas will be holding a summer blood drive on Tuesday, July 12, at the Woodville United Methodist Church. Drive hours are from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 2:30-5 p.m.

Woodville has a history of being very supportive of community blood drives, and Blood Center officials are coming on a good turnout for this summer's drive. The summer is the most critical time of year for blood supplies. With regular donors being out of pocket on vacations and doing other summer activities, many forget to include donating blood into their busy schedules.

Four area residents have achieved pation donor status since the January 1994 drive: two have achieved two gallons. There were 171 total donors at that drive which was held at Woodville High School.

There are 13 hospitals in Jefferson, Orange, Harvin, Newton, Jasper, Tyler and half of Chambers county served by the Blood Center of Southeast Texas. To supply the needs of patients in these facilities the Blood Center must draw 2250 pints of blood each week - all from volunteer donors who receive no compensation for their contribution.

Requirements include being at least 17 years of age through 75 and in good health. Many changes have occurred in deferral criteria, and some who were turned down because of medication they were taking or because of a medical condition may now donate.

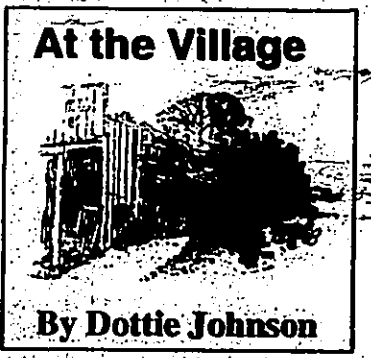

Homemakers Hints Food safety tips listed for summer

Consumers should be very aware of food safety precautions during the summer when outdoor activities such as picnics, campouts and cookouts are popular.

Often these activities involve food. Unfortunately, the incidence of foodborne illness also seems to rise during these months. Bacteria that cause foodborne illness grow best in warm weather temperatures, specifically at "danger zone" temperatures between 40 degrees Fahrenheit and 140 degrees Fahrenheit.

Foods that are most perishable are called "red flag" foods. They are most protein-containing foods such as poultry, meats, eggs, milk products, seafood, cream pies and casseroles. Red flag items also include such foods as fried chicken and hard-cooked or deviled eggs. Foods that are sometimes mislabeled as being non-perishable.

It's important to follow the "hot cold" rule for perishable foods. "Keep hot foods hot (over 140 degrees) and cold foods cold (below 40 degrees)." The combination of these foods plus temperatures in the danger zone spell trouble.

Prevention of foodborne illness starts with the planning of the menu. Do not include "red flag" foods unless you can keep them either "hot" or "cold." Refrigeration is needed, but not available, foods can be packed in an ice chest. It's important not to pack the ice chest too full and use adequate ice or ice packs to keep the foods at 40 degrees. Use shallow containers so food will chill throughout. Also, keep the ice chest in the shade.

Some foods do not require refrigeration until opened and may be better to take on a picnic. These include canned meats, peanut butter and jelly, breads, crackers, cereal and nut mixes. Dried and fresh fruits are another option.

Plan to eat as soon as possible after you arrive at the picnic site. Store any leftovers promptly and properly, or throw them away. It is best to carry only what you plan to eat. Do not leave foods out for more than two hours. In hot summer temperatures, one hour is a better rule to follow.

If you pick up deli or fast food items, either pick them up immediately before the event and eat as soon as you arrive, or buy them the night before, then refrigerate.

Cleanliness is very important to prevent the spread of bacteria. Avoid handling raw foods more than necessary. Never handle raw foods and cooked foods together. Do not reuse any utensils that touched raw food without washing them.

Spread a clean tablecloth on the table before serving. Use adequate handwashing or dishwashing facilities may not be available. Use these items only once, then throw them away.

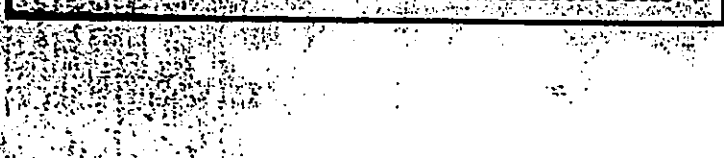

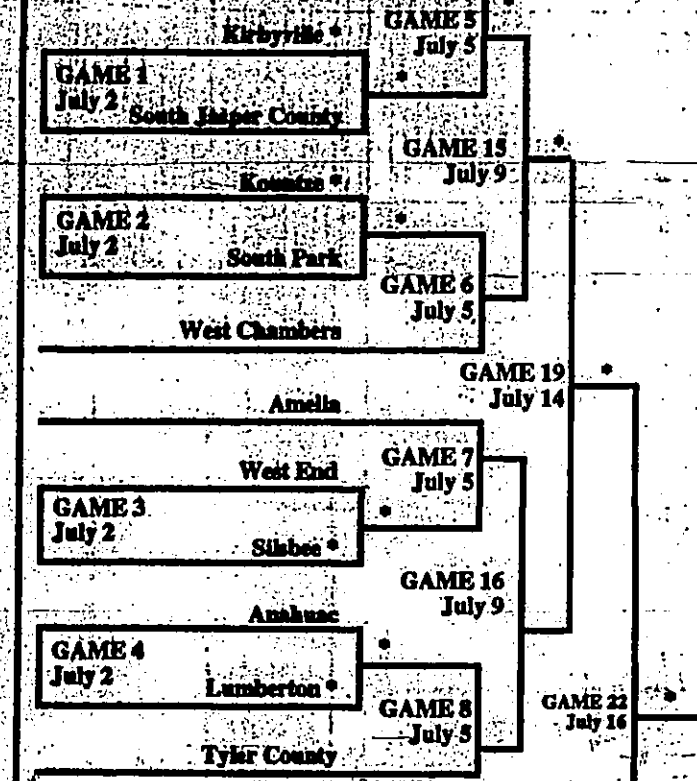

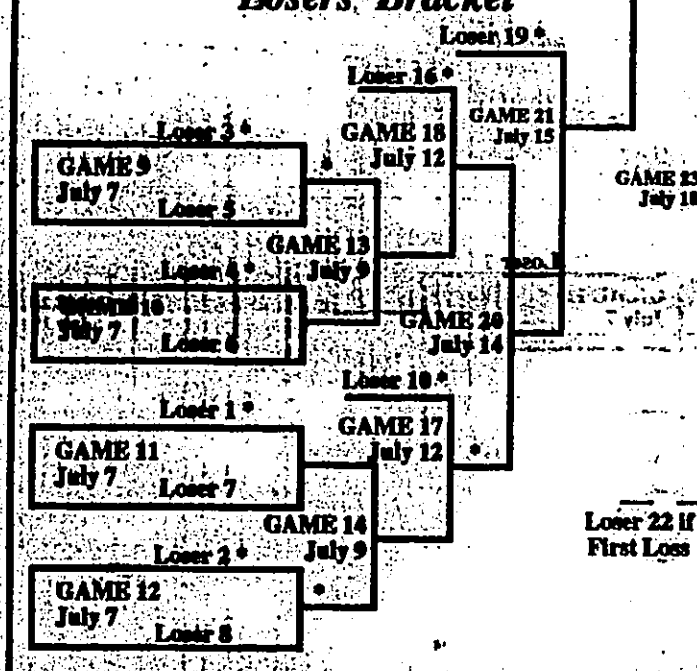

All of the injured with the exception of Berry were reported to have sustained only minor injuries. Berry sustained leg injuries and was pinned inside his vehicle for a time following the collision.

According to a report filed by Trooper Richard Brown, the accident occurred about 2:41 p.m. at the intersection of Highway 190 and Foster Hills Road. Schrock was driving a 1992 Ford F250 pickup pulling a John Deere trailer east on Highway 190 when it collided with the rear of a 1975 Pontiac Catalina driven by Paul A. Collins.

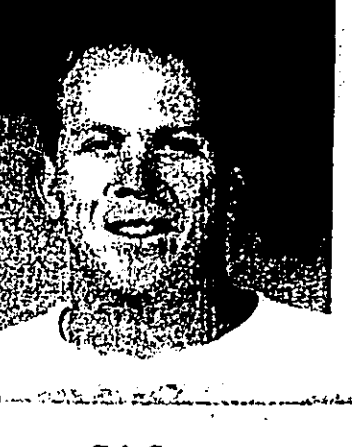
WISD hires Stump as baseball coach

"Why didn't you tell us?", asked Virginia Baker, who lives near the Seneca Road Loop. "I'll have to sit there and look out my dining room window and see a sewer. You had two days to notify me and you didn't."

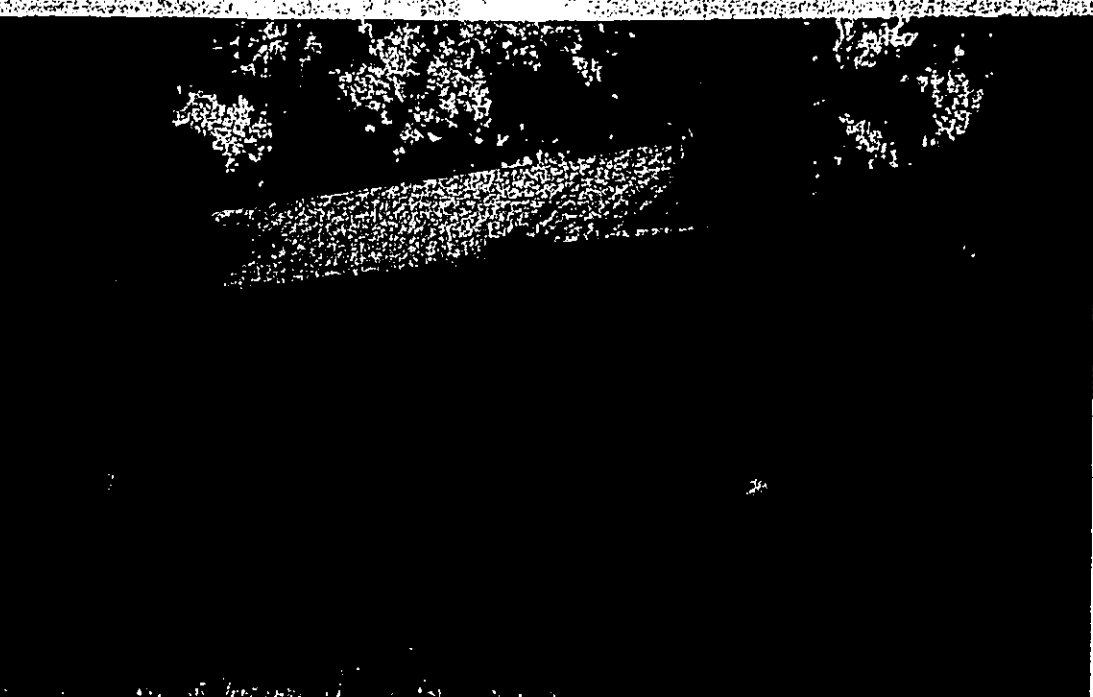
Wheeler Joyce Gartry brought the stage area a wheelbarrow that across the line and into the audience.

Homemaker Hints

Food safety tips listed for summer

By Sherry Jeanes County Extension Agent Home Economics Consumers should be very aware of food safety precautions during the summer when outdoor activities such as picnics, camps and cookouts are popular.

Often these activities involve food. Unfortunately, the incidence of foodborne illness also seems to rise during these months. Bacteria that cause foodborne illness grow best in warm weather temperatures, specifically at "danger zone temperatures" between 40 degrees Fahrenheit and 140 degrees Fahrenheit.

It's important to follow the "hot food" rule for perishable foods. "Keep hot foods hot (over 140 degrees) and cold foods cold (below 40 degrees)." The combination of these foods plus temperatures in the danger zone spell trouble.

Prevention of foodborne illness starts with planning the menu. Do not include "red flag" foods unless you can keep them either "hot" or "cold." If refrigeration is needed, but not available, foods can be packed in an ice chest. It's important not to pack the ice chest too full and use adequate ice or ice packs to keep the foods at 40 degrees. Use shallow containers so food will stay chilled throughout. Also, keep the ice chest in the shade.

Some foods do not require refrigeration until opened and may be better items to take on a picnic. These include canned meats, peanut butter and jelly, breads, crackers, cereal and nut mixes. Dried and fresh fruits are another option.

Plan to eat as soon as possible after you arrive at the picnic site. Store any leftovers promptly and properly, or throw them away. It is best to carry only what you plan to eat. Don't leave foods out for more than two hours. In hot summer temperatures, one hour is a better rule to follow.

If you pick up deli or fast food items, either pick them up immediately before the event and eat as soon as you arrive, or buy them the night before, then refrigerate.

Cleanliness is very important to prevent the spread of bacteria. Avoid handling foods with bare hands. Never handle raw foods and cooked foods together. Do not reuse any utensils that touched raw food without washing them.

Spread a clean tablecloth on the table before serving the food. Use disposable plates and adequate handwashing or disinfecting facilities may not be available. Use these items only once, then throw them away.

Our society suffers from the actions of children who have grown to adulthood without caring and supportive adults. Child rearing is a major job that parents alone can manage. In those long ago neighborhoods adults helped parent all responsibilities but also to let children know how vitally important they are? A friend of mine blames air-conditioning as a primary factor in creating the changes reflected in current social problems.

As an example, he cites evenings in the typical neighborhood of 25 or more years ago. Picture the houses, doors and windows open as children return from school and other activities. Dads relax after work and Moms are busy with dinner. One knew what was served as the aromas of food wafted through open windows. Also through open windows, parents, grandparents and neighbors supervised not only their own but also the children of friends as well. Porch sitting was a social opportunity, a chance to visit with friends, to cool off and rest after work, and served to keep an eye on kids who played outside until dark. Neighbors knew about family events such as new babies, job losses, promotions, and obituaries.
