Log truck accidents injure three people

TYLER COUNTY — Three Tyler County residents were injured last week in two accidents involving log trucks.

Darrell Grissom, 17, and Jacob Johnston, both of Woodville, were taken to the Tyler County Hospital on Wednesday, July 20, following an accident on the Holly Fork Road five miles north of Dana B. Bryan Ray Delacerta, 29, of Colmesneil, suffered minor injuries in a second mishap on FM 1745 on Friday, July 22.

After being stabilized at the local hospital, Grissom was transferred to St. Elizabeth Hospital in Beaumont where he remained Tuesday, July 26. Johnston suffered a collapsed lung and was admitted to the Woodville hospital for treatment. He was discharged on Monday, July 25.

According to an accident report filed by DPS Trooper Deaman B. Dunkin, Grissom and Johnston were injured about 12:44 p.m. July 20 when the 1990 GMC pickup driven by Grissom collided with a 1979 Freightliner truck tractor pulling a pole trailer.

Eugene Byerly, 54, of Burkeville, the driver of the log truck, was not reported as injured in the collision.

According to the report, the Grissom and Johnston were traveling north in the pickup at a speed above the posted

30 mile per hour limit when they saw the log truck coming toward them around a curve. Grissom reportedly locked the pickup's brakes and began a skid on the unpaved county road before colliding almost head-on with the truck.

Both Grissom and Johnston were transported from the scene by Eastex EMS ambulance.

The second accident occurred at 7:30 a.m. Friday on FM 1745 about 7.6 miles west of Colmesneil.

According to a DPS report filed by Trooper Bobby Risch, the mishap occurred when Delacerta, who was driving a 1989 Mazda four-door, fell asleep while traveling east on FM 1745. The Mazda drifted across the center line into the westbound lane.

A 1984 Ford truck tractor pulling a pole trailer was traveling west on the farm-to-market highway when it encountered the Mazda. Richard Calvin Welch, 35, of Bronson, the driver of the tractor-trailer rig, swerved to the right and began driving off the northside of the pavement when the Mazda struck it on the back left quarterpanel.

Following the collision, the Mazda spun free and left the northside of the roadway.

Assisted living center survey now underway

WOODVILLE — Efforts to construct an assisted living center in the Woodville area appeared to be gaining speed last week with the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce launching a survey of interested senior citizens.

"One developer of such centers has expressed interest in establishing a project in Woodville and is seeking more information about the local market."

"Specifically, we have been asked to find out how much interest there is in this area for this project. We need to develop a list of names of people who would be interested in moving into such a center," said Donece Gregory, chairman of the chamber's community development committee.

The center would be composed of apartments for senior citizens as well as "common areas" that would include a cafeteria, game areas and meeting rooms.

Some centers, such as one large facility opened about 18 months ago in Lufkin, have in-house ice cream parlors, beauty salons, barber shops and private dining rooms which can be used by residents for large family gatherings.

something that might be considered by couples who would like to give up problems involving the repair of their homes and yard maintenance. It would allow them to move into more of a retirement type lifestyle," she said.

"Centers of this type have nurses and nurses aides on staff to assist residents with their medication needs but do not provide the more controlled care found in nursing homes."

While the age limit set for residents of assisted living centers varies slightly depending on the company which operates them, the developer now looking at Woodville has a minimum age requirement of 62.

Therefore, the chamber is interested in hearing from anyone 62 years old and over who might be interested in moving into such an environment. A survey form appears on page 3A of this edition, or interested persons may call the chamber office at 283-2632.

Gregory noted that the local chamber has been working for about 2.5 years on attracting retirees to the Tyler County area.

Rule changes sought for 'superhighway'

-Information superhighway predicted to impact all facets of life-

NACOGDOCHES — Calling for changes in regulations governing telephone companies, an official with Southwestern Bell Telephone told a group of East Texas leaders that the current rules could be slowing down the state's access to the information superhighway.

During the July meeting of the Deep East Texas Development Association in Nacogdoches, Southwest Bell's new

technologies manager, Jim Cowan, said that unless changes can be made in state law, Texas will fall behind other states in hooking into the computerized information superhighway now being developed.

"In a recent Lou Harris poll, one third of the general public had seen or heard something about the information superhighway, but very few really knew much about what it is," Cowan said.

"The changes coming because of the

information superhighway will literally transform the way each of us will live and work, but these changes will not be automatic," he said.

Cowan said that the information superhighway basically will be a nationwide computer network which will be used by government, business and individuals to transmit and make use of a wide variety of services.

"A trip to the local video rental store will be a thing of the past. You'll just call up any movie you want at any time you want to see it."

"If you like to watch pro-football, you'll be able to call up any game anywhere in the United States and even be able to select the camera angle you want," he said.

Cowan added that the superhighway also will increase a person's ability to

County schools open beginning on Aug. 11

TYLER COUNTY — The end of the long, summer vacation for Tyler County's public school students is coming to an end with the first of the county's five school districts set to begin classes in just over two weeks.

The Colmesneil Independent School District will be the first of the local school systems to get underway with classes scheduled to begin at 8:05 a.m. Thursday, Aug. 11. Teachers in that district will report for work beginning Tuesday, Aug. 9.

Classes in the Chester, Spurger and Woodville school districts all will begin on Monday, Aug. 15. Information on the Warren ISD's opening scheduled was not available this week.

Chester will begin classes at 7:55 a.m. Registration of students new to the district will take place on the morning of Aug. 15 or parents may register their children during the week of Aug. 8-12.

Students in the Spurger school district will begin their new school year at 8 a.m. on Aug. 15. Registration of students new to the district will be held during the week of Aug. 8-12.

In Woodville, classes on all campuses are set to begin at 8 a.m. New teachers will report on Aug. 9 and the rest of the teaching staff will begin work on Aug. 10.

An orientation program for kindergarten students will be held from 6:30-8 p.m. on Monday, Aug. 1, at Wheat Elementary School in Woodville. The orientation will begin with a general session in the school auditorium at 6:30 p.m. and parents and students will then be invited to visit the kindergarten classrooms to meet the teachers.

Class rosters will be posted in order for parents and students to find the appropriate rooms.

All students attending the Woodville ISD kindergarten program for the 1994-95 school year are encouraged to attend the orientation. Parent handbooks will be given out and student permission slips will be signed and turned in to the classroom teachers. Topics slated for discussion include: curriculum, methods of report-

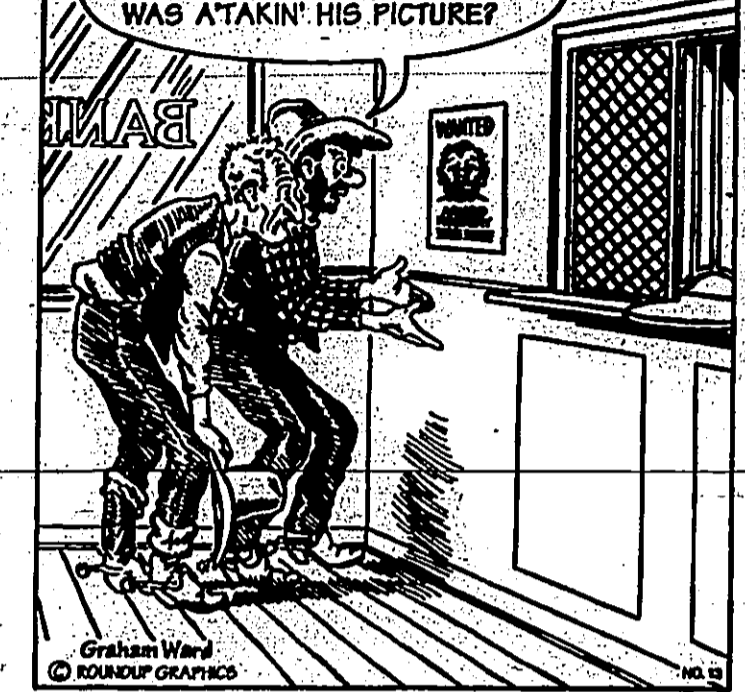
History profounds us as a slab to the future is poured

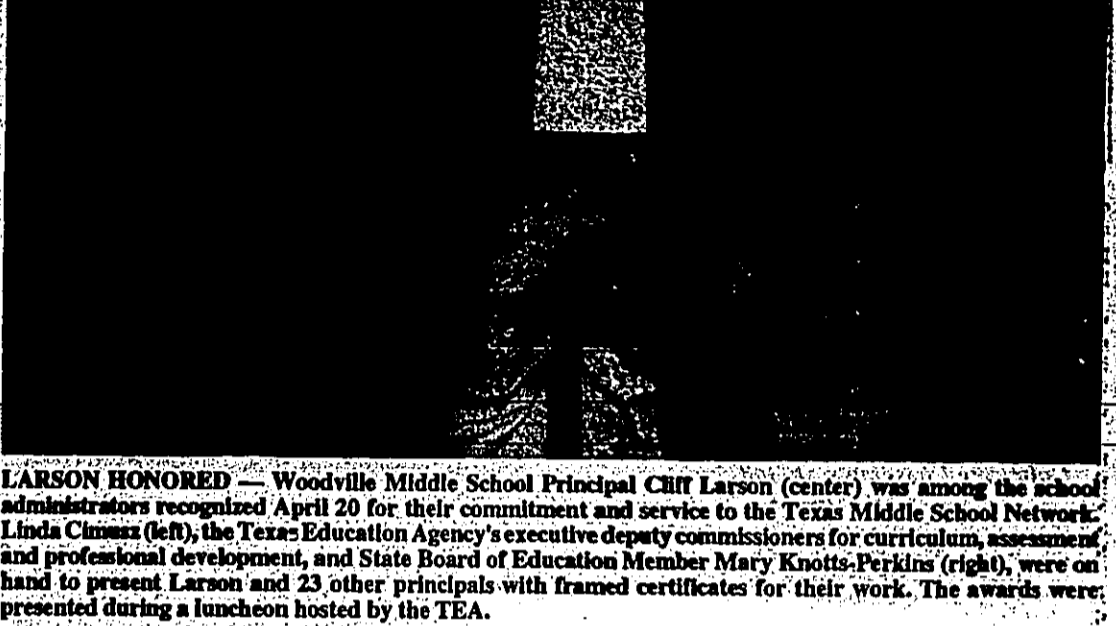

Tyler County grid teams picked for football playoffs

WACO — Three of the four Tyler County high school football teams are expected to have a chance to reach the post season playoffs, according to Dave Campbell's 1994 Texas Football magazine which hit the news stands last week.
• Woodville, Colmesneil and Chester all have strong chances of reaching the playoffs, according to Campbell. Warren, which moves up to 5A from 2A this year, is expected to have a respectable district record, but not strong enough for post season play. Woodville, under second year head coach Craig McCullion, joins Port Arthur Stephen F. Austin and Newton as the district favorites according to Warren.
• Warren is joined by Orangefield, Buna, Kirbyville and Kountze to round out the rest of the 21-3A district race. In the county's 1A schools, Colmesneil is a solid choice to finish second behind district 24-A favorite Burkville, while Chester is tabbed for third.

• For the upcoming programs, PIE has students from Spain, Germany, Poland, Russia, Finland, Argentina, Brazil, Colombia, Paraguay, Australia, New Zealand, Croatia and many other countries. PIE has also been invited to participate in a special government-funded program to bring scholarship students from the newly independent states of the former Soviet Union to the United States. PIE is a non-profit educational organization that has sponsored more than 18,000 students from 23 countries since its formation in 1975. The organization is designated by the United States Information Agency and is listed by the Council on Standards for International Educational Travel (CSIET), certifying that the organization complies with the standards set forth in the U.S. Standards for International Educational Travel Programs.

Planning for retirement important in getting benefits

LUFKIN—Deciding the best time to receive Social Security benefits is a decision that many people put off until the last minute. There are a number of considerations that could affect a person's Social Security benefits, thus the earlier one becomes aware of these factors, the better one can plan for retirement. The most important part of retirement planning, and the one that is very important, is deciding when to start receiving Social Security benefits. The very best time a person should consider starting Social Security, of itself, will not likely replace lost earnings. It is surprising how many people don't realize this until they receive their first Social Security check. Social Security has always been intended to partially replace lost earnings and to supplement other sources of income such as savings, investments or other pensions. The maximum Social Security monthly payment for a worker who retired at age 65 in 1993 is about \$1,148. For a worker who retires at age 62, the average benefit is about \$674. For an individual, the average benefit is about \$1,140. Social Security replacement of earnings averages about 40% on the lower-earning side with a slight increase as average earnings increase.

Statistics show that most workers retire as soon as possible. Age 65 is no longer the standard retirement age. However, age 65 is still the age at which full Social Security benefits are paid. Retirement benefits are reduced for those who retire before age 65. The reduction is 20 percent. The reduction for retiring prior to age 65 is 25 percent, and for retiring prior to age 62 is 35 percent. For those who retire after age 65, the reduction will gradually increase, beginning in the year 2000, and by age 67 becomes full retirement age.

For those who work beyond age 65, the Social Security benefit increases in the years between ages 65 and 70. This percentage, called Delayed Retirement Credit, will increase in the future. At age 70, benefits are paid regardless of earnings.

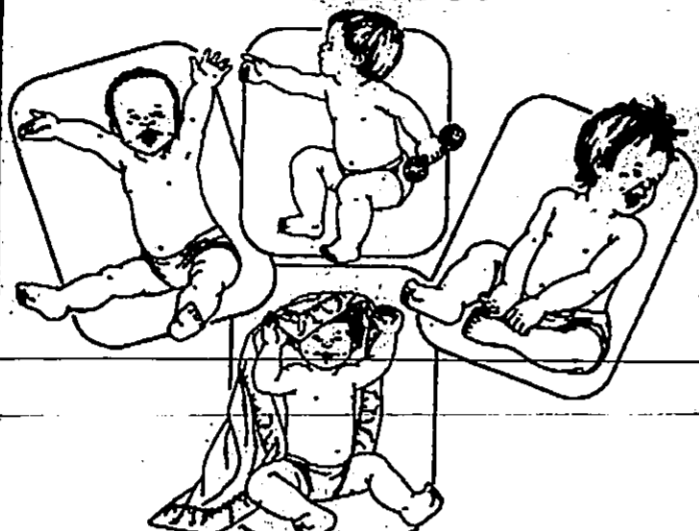
Retirement is not required to get Medicare. Anyone who plans to continue working past age 65 should sign up for Medicare 2 1/2 months before the month they are 65. Under recent legislation, coverage is available for those under an employer's insurance, depending on the employer's insurance plan. Workers should contact their health insurance and Medicare coverage before filing for Medicare.

Social Security benefits of people in higher income levels may be taxable. Only about ten percent of Social Security beneficiaries fall into these income levels. The receipt of a government pension may also affect Social Security benefits.

Workers are encouraged to obtain an estimate of their Social Security benefit to use in retirement planning. Form SSA-7004 should be requested by contacting Social Security. The information

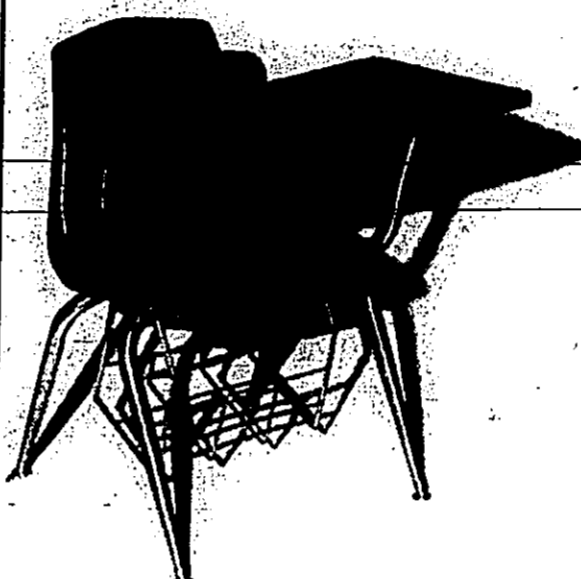
furnished by completing this form includes not only projected retirement benefits but also survivors and disability benefits. It also allows workers to see if their work has been properly credited to their work record. Due to statute of limitations, workers should request this information about every three years. Study targets alcohol's impact on cholesterol

BEAUMONT—When drunk on the road, a glass of wine with the meal may seem like a harmless tipple. However, a new study by researchers at the University of Texas at Dallas shows that moderate amounts of alcohol with a high-fat meal can increase the level of HDL (the high-density lipoprotein labeled "good") without increasing the level of LDL (the low-density lipoprotein labeled "bad").

"This is the answer of what usually happens when a high-fat meal is consumed with alcohol," said Dr. Henry J. Powell, professor of medicine and molecular physiology at Baylor.

"Alcohol seems to act as a catalyst that improves the body's efficiency in metabolizing the fat," Powell said.

"The main amount of enzyme increases more HDL in people than LDL."

"Alcohol also seems to have focused on the metabolism of fat and its components in the liver," said Powell.

Study volunteers are drinking an "alcoholic beverage," a blend of wine and beer.

"Researchers want to determine how the alcohol causes its positive effect on the metabolism," Powell said.

"Once we know how it works, we can begin looking for a substance that can do the same job as alcohol more efficiently, without the intoxicating effects," Powell said.

The research addresses an important public health question, according to Powell: "Should we go to 70 percent of what Americans consume when alcohol?"

"We know alcohol has a negative effect on triglycerides and total cholesterol, but not on LDL and HDL," Powell said. "However, if there is a positive effect on HDL, it may be a good thing to consider." Powell said.

Log truck accidents injure three people

TYLER COUNTY — Three Tyler County residents were injured last week in two accidents involving log trucks.

Darrell Grissom, 17, and Jacob Johnston, both of Woodville, were taken to the Tyler County Hospital on Wednesday, July 20, following an accident on the Holly-Fork Road five miles north of Dam B. Bryan Ray Delacerta, 29, of Colmesneil, suffered minor injuries in a second mishap on FM 1745 on Friday, July 22.

After being stabilized at the local hospital, Grissom was transferred to St. Elizabeth Hospital in Beaumont where he remained Tuesday, July 26. Johnston suffered a collapsed lung and was admitted to the Woodville hospital for treatment. He was discharged on Monday, July 25.

According to an accident report filed by DPS Trooper Denman B. Dunkin, Grissom and Johnston were injured about 12:44 p.m. July 20 when the 1990 GMC pickup driven by Grissom collided with a 1979 Freightliner truck tractor pulling a pole trailer.

Eugene Byerly, 54, of Burkeville, the driver of the log truck, was not reported as injured in the collision.

According to the report, the Grissom and Johnston were traveling north in the pickup at a speed above the posted

30 mile per hour limit when they saw the log truck coming toward them around a curve. Grissom reportedly locked the pickup's brakes and began a skid on the unpaved county road before colliding almost head-on with the truck.

Both Grissom and Johnston were transported from the scene by Eastex EMS ambulance.

The second accident occurred at 7:30 a.m. Friday on FM 1745 about 7.6 miles west of Colmesneil.

According to a DPS report filed by Trooper Bobby Risch, the mishap occurred when Delacerta, who was driving a 1989 Mazda four-door, fell asleep while traveling east on FM 1745. The Mazda drifted across the center line into the westbound lane.

A 1984 Ford truck tractor pulling a pole trailer was traveling west on the farm-to-market highway when it encountered the Mazda. Richard Calvin Welch, 35, of Bronson, the driver of the tractor-trailer rig, swerved to the right and began driving off the northside of the pavement when the Mazda struck it on the back left quarterpanel.

Following the collision, the Mazda spun free and left the northside of the roadway.

Assisted living center survey now underway

WOODVILLE — Efforts to construct an assisted living center in the Woodville area appeared to be gaining speed last week with the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce launching a survey of interested senior citizens.

"One developer of such centers has expressed interest in establishing a project in Woodville and is seeking more information about the local market."

"Specifically, we have been asked to find out how much interest there is in this area for this project. We need to develop a list of names of people who would be interested in moving into such a center," said Donece Gregory, chairman of the chamber's community development committee.

The center would be composed of apartments for senior citizens as well as "common areas" that would include a cafeteria, game areas and meeting rooms.

Some centers, such as one large facility opened about 18 months ago in Lufkin, have in-house ice cream parlors, beauty salons, barber shops and private dining rooms which can be used by residents for large family gatherings.

"An assisted living center would be

something that might be considered by couples who would like to give up problems involving the repair of their homes and yard maintenance. It would allow them to move into more of a retirement type lifestyle," she said.

"Centers of this type have nurses and nurses aides on staff to assist residents with their medication needs but do not provide the more controlled care found in nursing homes."

While the age limit set for residents of assisted living centers varies slightly depending on the company which operates them, the developer now looking at Woodville has a minimum age requirement of 62.

Therefore, the chambers is interested in hearing from anyone 62 years old and over who might be interested in moving into such an environment. A survey form appears on page 3A of this edition, or interested persons may call the chamber office at 283-2632.

Gregory noted that the local chamber has been working for about 2.5 years on attracting retirees to the Tyler County area.

"A lot of people want to move out of the hustle of city life and we feel

Rule changes sought for 'superhighway'

NACOGDOCHES — Calling for changes in regulations governing telephone companies, an official with Southwestern Bell Telephone told a group of East Texas leaders that the current rules could be slowing down the state's access to the information superhighway.

During the July meeting of the Deep East Texas Development Association in Nacogdoches, Southwest Bell's new

technologies manager, Jim Cowan, said that unless changes can be made in state law, Texas will fall behind other states in hooking into the computerized information superhighway now being developed.

"In a recent Lou Harris poll, one third of the general public had seen or heard something about the information superhighway, but very few really knew much about what it is," Coward said.

"The changes coming because of the

information superhighway will literally transform the way each of us will live and work, but these changes will not be automatic," he said.

Cowan said that the information superhighway basically will be a nationwide computer network which will be used by government, business and individuals to transmit and make use of a wide variety of services.

"A trip to the local video rental store will be a thing of the past. You'll just call up any movie you want at any time you want to see it."

"If you like to watch pro-football, you'll be able to call up any game anywhere in the United States and even be able to select the camera angle you want," he said.

Cowan added that the superhighway also will increase a person's ability to

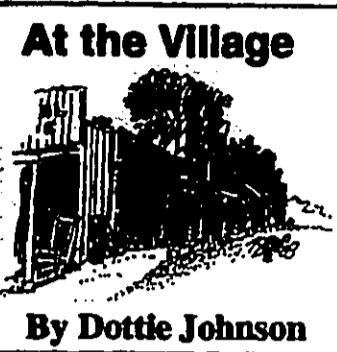
