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New Caney man charged with assaulting a child

-Burglaries, thefts investigated by police-

WOODVILLE—A 32-year-old New Caney man was free this week under bonds totalling \$9,500 after being charged last week with aggravated sexual assault of a child and with stalking a child.

According to Woodville Police Chief Scott Yosko, Larry Joseph Duplechain was arrested Tuesday, July 23, on aggravated sexual assault charges stemming from a complaint filed by the mother of a 10-year-old Woodville girl.

The police chief indicated that the sexual assaults on the juvenile are alleged to have occurred over a one to two month period.

Duplechain was subsequently charged with stalking the same 10-year-old after he was released from the Tyler County Jail on Friday, July 29. After posting a \$7,500 bond on the aggravated sexual assault charge, Yosko said the New Caney man was warned by officers to "not to go near the residence" where the 10-year-old lives.

"Despite that warning, Duplechain went to that residence and began talk-

ing to the child again," Yosko said, adding that the man is believed to have been attempting to befriend the child.

"He was released on bond on the sexual assault charge about 1:30 p.m. and at 2:30 p.m. he was arrested for stalking and put back in jail," Yosko said.

Duplechain was later released after posting a \$2,000 bond on the second complaint.

Yosko noted that the bond on the sexual assault charge was relatively low because the suspect had been cooperating with investigators, even to the extent of driving from New Caney to Woodville on July 23 to surrender himself for arrest.

In other police activity this past week, charges were pending Tuesday against one adult and two juveniles in connection with the burglary and vandalism of a vacant residence at 707 Meadowlark in Woodville.

The home, owned by William Linginger, had been recently remodeled and was for sale.

On Monday, July 25, officers were called to the house after it was discov-

ered that someone had broken in through a sliding glass door.

"After they broke in, they proceeded to tear it to pieces," Yosko said. "This was probably the worst I've ever seen of a house torn apart. They knocked holes in the walls, tore down the ceiling fans and poured paint on the kitchen cabinets, appliances and carpeting."

"They also plugged all the sinks, turned on the faucets and flooded the house," he added.

Estimates indicated that more than \$8,000 in damage was inflicted on the property.

Also under investigation was a burglary reported at the J.B. Best and Co. department store in downtown Woodville.

Yosko said that on the night of Friday, July 29, someone broke out a plate glass window and stole \$393.82 in clothing as well as a mannequin valued at \$50.

Charges also were pending this week against a 17-year-old Woodville man and a juvenile in connection with the theft of a cash box from the GC Fabric/J.C. Penny store in downtown Woodville.

According to police reports, store owner Georgia Collins was in the process of closing the business at about 4:45 p.m. on Thursday, July 28, when two males walked in the store. While one of the suspects distracted Mrs.

Courthouse photographs needed for restoration

WOODVILLE—Photos of the Tyler County Courthouse taken prior to about 1930—especially those showing the old roof and clock tower—are now being sought as part of a proposed restoration project.

County Judge Jerome Owens issued the call for the old photos to give engineers details involving the appearance of the original roof and clock tower of the courthouse.

"We want to see if we can get some different photos that will allow us to restore the roof and tower back to their original appearance," Owens said.

The courthouse was built in 1891 using a Victorian style of architecture with the original exterior being composed of red brick. It was remodeled in the mid-1930s when the old jail portion of the structure was added on to the back or southside of the courthouse. During the remodeling, the red brick exterior was plastered over and the many flues and pointed gables of the original roof were torn down.

"The courthouse was given the 'shoebox' style of architecture that it now has with stucco walls and a flat roof," Owens said.

Under the current remodeling plan, Owens said the county would seek a grant from the Texas Department of Highways to restore the high, gabled roof and Victorian style clock tower.

"It would be way to expensive to try and restore the old red brick walls that are under the stucco," he said. "Basically, the brickwork is shot."

Cost studies are now underway and an application for grant funds will be

submitted to TxDOT sometime this month, Owens said.

"The engineers need as much detail as we can get as to how the courthouse used to look before the remodeling. We have one old photo (taken from the northeast corner) but we'd like to get as many as possible," he said.

Anyone with an old photograph which might be of help in the project is asked to drop it by Owens' office in the courthouse. Once it is copied, it will be returned to the owner.

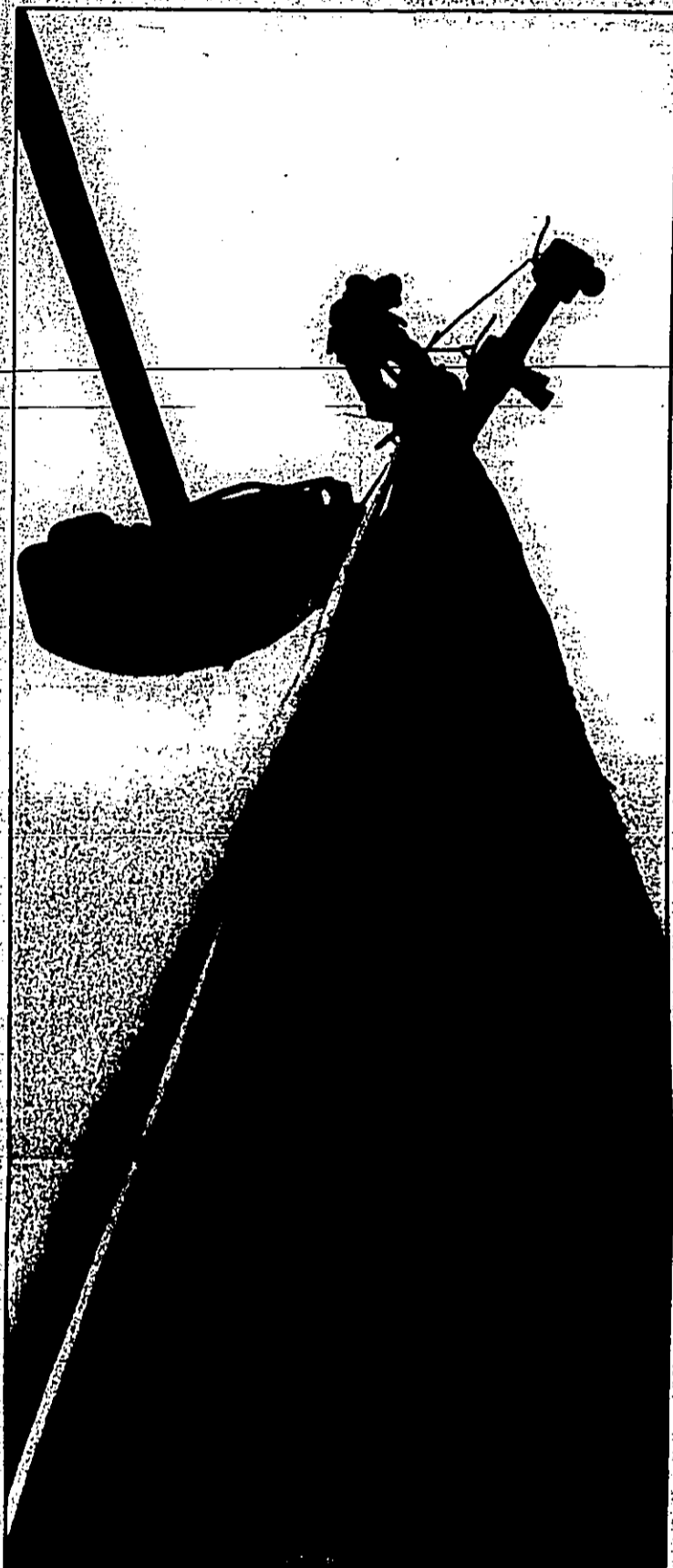
The courthouse, which will mark its 103rd anniversary during the Light Up The Square celebration in November, replaced the previous building which was constructed in 1858.

The Tyler County Commissioners Court issued the order calling for the construction of the new courthouse on Nov. 25, 1890. Two days later, it voted to issued \$30,000 in bonds to build the new structure.

Plans for the courthouse were accepted by the commissioners on Feb. 20, 1891 from the architecture firm of Glover and Hodges of Corpus Christi. The firm of Mahoney, Leall and Morris won the construction contract on March 30, 1891 for a bid of \$19,972 but later lost the job when they either failed or refused to make a bond for the project. Their contract was cancelled on April 15 and the firm of McKnight Brothers was hired under their bid of \$21,609. The completion date for the building was set for Dec. 1, 1891.

Before construction could begin, the

4-H Funfest kicks off Saturday

WOODVILLE—Livestock management clinics, a fish fry and a series of games for youngsters will be on the agenda Saturday, Aug. 6, during the first 4-H Funfest to be held at the Tyler County 4-H and FFA Rodeo Arena near Woodville.

Sponsored by the 4-H Leaders Association, proceeds from the event will be used to help pay for the expansion of the rodeo arena's livestock pens, specifically the cattle area. Local 4-H officials said that the number of cattle entries in the annual Tyler County fair is expected to reach about 50 this year—up from the average of 25 entered in recent years.

To take care of the increased number of cattle expected for the 1994 fair, 4-

H Leaders Association President Tima Bump said the organization plans to expand the cattle pens west from the existing hog pen area to the roadway and enclose up to another 300 square feet of space.

"How much additional pen space is created will depend on how much money and materials we can come up with for the project," Bump added.

Toward that end, Bump said the adult leaders will be hosting a 4-H Funfest on Aug. 6 to help raise funds for the fairground improvement project. In addition, the association also is asking area businesses and individuals for donations of money and materials to help with the project. Materials such as 2x12 lumber, landscaping timbers,

rafter materials and tin are needed and can be donated by calling the Tyler County Extension Office at 283-5284.

"Lindsay Whisenant has donated all of the 6-inch pipe we will need for the expansion project," Bump said. "A number of businesses have also come forward to donate money for weigh-in scales, which is something that we really have been needing at the arena."

Direct donations of cash can be made either to the Tyler County Extension Office or to the 4-H Leaders Association-Building Fund account set up at Citizens State Bank in Woodville, said Tyler County Extension Agent Matt

Unemployment rate on the rise

WOODVILLE—Following two months of declines, Tyler County's unemployment rate rose by more than a full percentage point in June, climbing to 10.4 percent, according to figures released last week by the Texas Employment Commission.

The latest jobless figures are still well below the five-year high mark of 11.5 percent recorded in March of this year but is substantially above the 9.3 percent figure listed for May.

June's 10.4 percent rate also is the fourth one this year that has topped the 10 percent level. January's rate was 10.8 followed by 11.4 in February and 11.5 in March. April's rate fell to 9.5 percent.

March's 11.5 percent rate was the highest recorded for the county since a 12.0 percent rate was listed in February 1989.

Over the past 10 years, the highest unemployment number recorded for Tyler County was in June 1986. During that month, a record 18.4 percent jobless figure is listed by TEC.

During the worst unemployment year in recent history—1986—the local rate never fell below an 11.2 percent rate set in January and remained mainly in the 14 to 15 percent range during almost the entire year.

The lowest local jobless rate during the past decade occurred during April 1990 when a 4.9 percent unemploy-

ment figure was recorded.

The June numbers—the latest currently available from TEC—show Tyler County with a 10.4 percent jobless rate. This translates to mean that out of an estimated civilian labor force of 7,223, a total of 748 county residents were looking for work during the month.

The 10.4 percent mark for June also was up slightly from the rate recorded one year earlier. During June 1993 the local jobless figure was listed as 10.3 percent.

While local unemployment rate rose by 1.1 percentage points in June, the

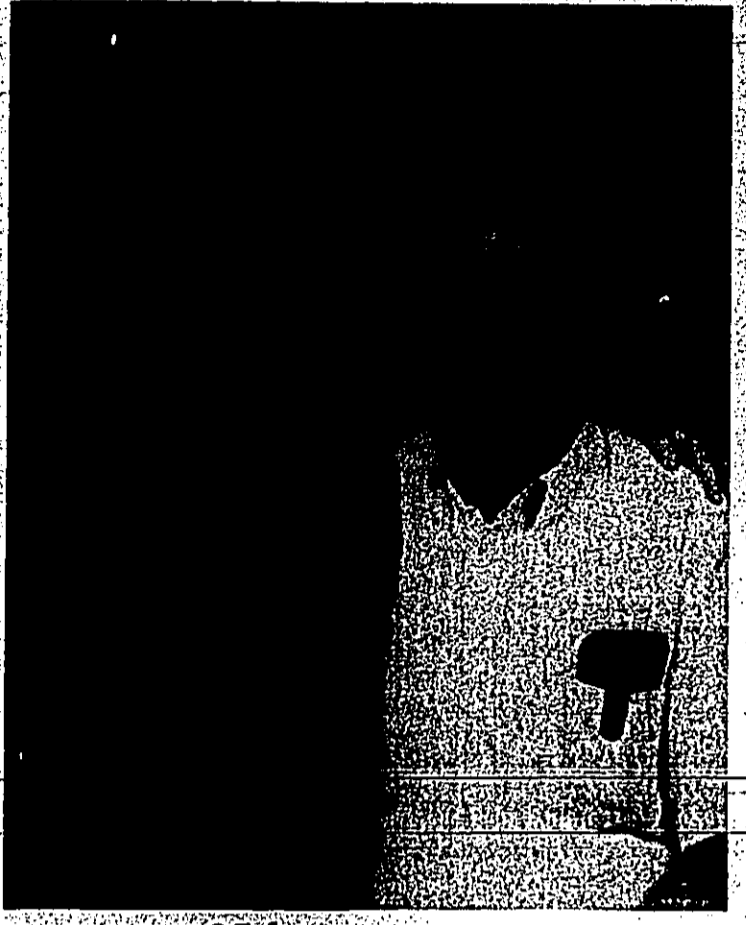

Angelina College fall classes scheduled for Woodville

WOODVILLE — Eleven college courses have been scheduled for Woodville this fall semester as part of the Angelina College teaching center program. Fall semester classes begin in Woodville on August 29. Each course meets one night a week from 6-9 p.m. for 16 consecutive weeks.

Other documents include a one year old or older voter registration card or letter on company letterhead certifying a year or more of employment in Texas. The high school transcript for students who graduated this past June will also serve as proof of residency if the student graduated from a Texas school.
Courses scheduled on Monday night include Introduction to Microcomputers and Speech, Communications, Tuesday offerings are Art Appreciation, British Literature, Principles of Economics and Federal and State Government. Wednesday courses are U.S. History from 1877 and General Psychology. Thursday's schedule includes English Composition, College Algebra and Introductory Sociology. Child's first school day can be smoothed

HOUSTON — A child's first day of school can be an "A+" if parents do the little homework of their own.
"A parent's attitude about school plays a big part in how the child accepts this new responsibility," said Dr. Lou Ann Mock, a child psychologist with the Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Put aside any anxieties you may have about your own school experience."
Mock encourages parents to build excitement about the first day by emphasizing that school is the beginning of a wonderful adventure.
"If your child has been in day care, make clear that this change is a real accomplishment and that now they are grown up enough to go to 'real' school," she said.
However, children may have concerns about this new experience.
Rather than make assumptions, Mock says, ask if the child has any questions about going to school. "The concerns may be as simple as wondering where the bathroom is or what will happen if they get sick at school," she said.
Parents often make the mistake of trying to fit too many activities in at the end of the summer. It is better to slow down a child's schedule as the start of school approaches.
Mock suggests the following techniques to prepare a child for the big day.
- Visit the school during the summer.
- Begin the appropriate bedtime and wake-up schedule a week or two in advance.
- Figure out the best morning routine.
- Let your child pick out first-day clothes and lay them out in advance.
- Get up earlier on the first day, so the morning will not be rushed.
"If possible, arrange to go to work a little later that day," Mock said. "This will put less pressure on you."

Alabama-Coushatta Russ-Indians return from Goodwill Games

INDIAN VILLAGE — The Russ-Indians are coming! The Russ-Indians are coming!
That was the wording on a sign outside the administration building as family and tribal members eagerly awaited the return of 14 Alabama-Coushatta Indian dancers from their trip to Russia Tuesday, July 26. Shortly before 5 p.m., two vans carrying the travelers pulled into the reservation, carrying tired but happy dancers who had just returned from what would be one of the most exciting trips of their lives.

To prove they had been where they said they had been, most got off the vans sporting their new Russian fur caps, despite the hot summer weather. The quiet, peaceful reservation was quite a contrast from Kirov Stadium in St. Petersburg, Russia, where on Saturday night, July 23, the Alabama-Coushatta Indians performed before an excited crowd of more than 70,000 persons at the start of the Goodwill Games.

While television cameras failed to focus in on the dancers from Deep East Texas, the Alabama-Coushattas nevertheless performed before their largest crowd ever. Again, quite a contrast from the crowds of fewer than 100 which they usually perform in front of during performances on the reservation.

old 1858 courthouse had to be moved. The 1858 courthouse was awarded to S.P. West and moved to the northeast corner of Black 14 in Woodville.

The county retained the use of the old building until the new courthouse was completed. The 1858 building was later acquired by John R.A. Stephens, father of Gov. Allan Stephens, and was sold to Mrs. B.F. Hughes in 1923.

The 1858 building was destroyed by fire in 1932. In November 1932, it was decided that a check should be placed in the new courthouse and a Town Clerk's office be located in Woodville.

Because entry was allowed to roam free in Woodville at the time, it was decided to erect a fence around the courthouse square. The 816-sq.-ft. wrought iron fence includes 72 cast iron posts, three sets of walk gates and one double gate cost the county \$1,200. The fence is now around the Mt. Zion Courthouse.

According to the commission court minutes, written by T.B. Hodges and later approved by Judge R.A. Stephens, on April 15, 1882 he announced that the courthouse was completed and that all plans and specifications had been met.

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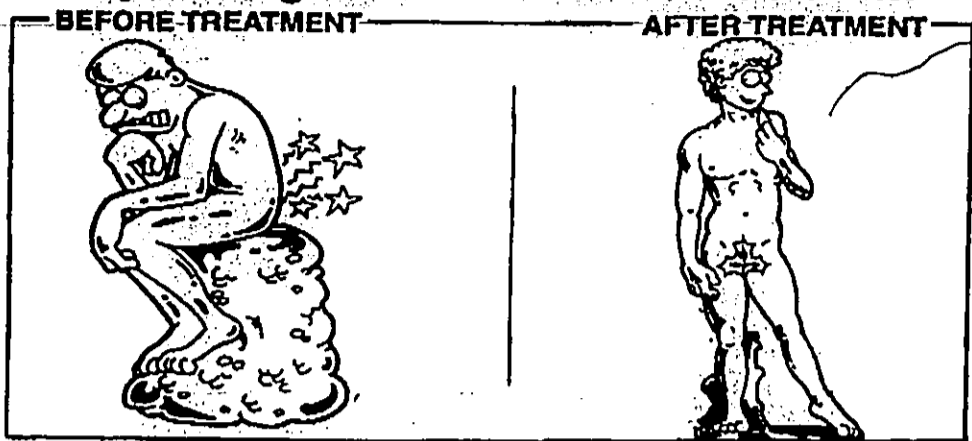
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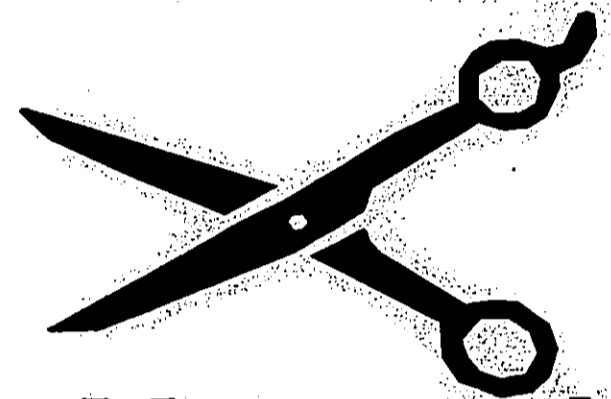

Radiation procedure treats inoperable brain tumors

NEW ORLEANS—A technique that destroys inoperable tumors or malformations in the brain is being used by physicians at the Ochsner Medical Institutions in New Orleans.

The technique—stereotactic radiosurgery—involves using small directed beams of radiation to treat areas that may be inaccessible by conventional surgery or for patients who may be unable to withstand surgery. The one-time application is also an outpatient, or same-day, procedure and may serve as a substitute for what can be in some cases up to 20-30 radiation therapy treatments, according to Dr. Roland Hawkins in the radiation oncology department at Ochsner.

Using those precisely directed beams of radiation, we are able to focus on and destroy the diseased tissue and spare nearly all of the surrounding healthy tissue," Hawkins said. "This procedure shows tremendous promise in treating certain types of brain tumors and other malformations within the cranial area."

There are only two such sites in the New Orleans area using the procedure and only about 50 sites in the U.S.

"This technique is so much more precise than conventional radiotherapy," he said.

that it is called radiosurgery. It's a still evolving and we expect to see other uses develop in the future."

The key to stereotactic radiosurgery is determining the exact location of the diseased tissue and programming it to be administered directly to the designated site.

The procedure usually takes a full day and is performed with a local anesthetic. A computed tomography (CT) scan is used to determine the exact coordinates of the diseased tissue within the brain. Working from that information, doctors then affix a metal ring to the head which helps the linear accelerator focus on the targeted area.

"The target of the beams - the diseased tissue - is always in the path, no matter how the linear accelerator may turn," Hawkins said. "This delivers the highest possible dose of radiation to the targeted area while neighboring normal tissue is spared."

Stereotactic radiosurgery is currently being used for patients with various types of brain, head and neck tumors, and brain tumors that have not responded to radiotherapy. It can also be used in the treatment of arteriovenous malformations (AVMs), mal-formed blood vessels in the brain that can cause seizures and are generally inoperable. In the future radiosurgery may either be coupled with other forms of radiotherapy or surgery to fight intracranial tumors.

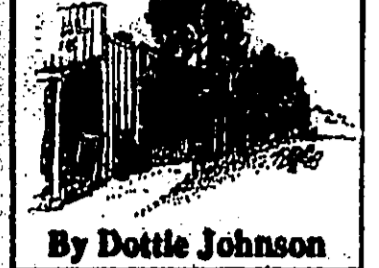

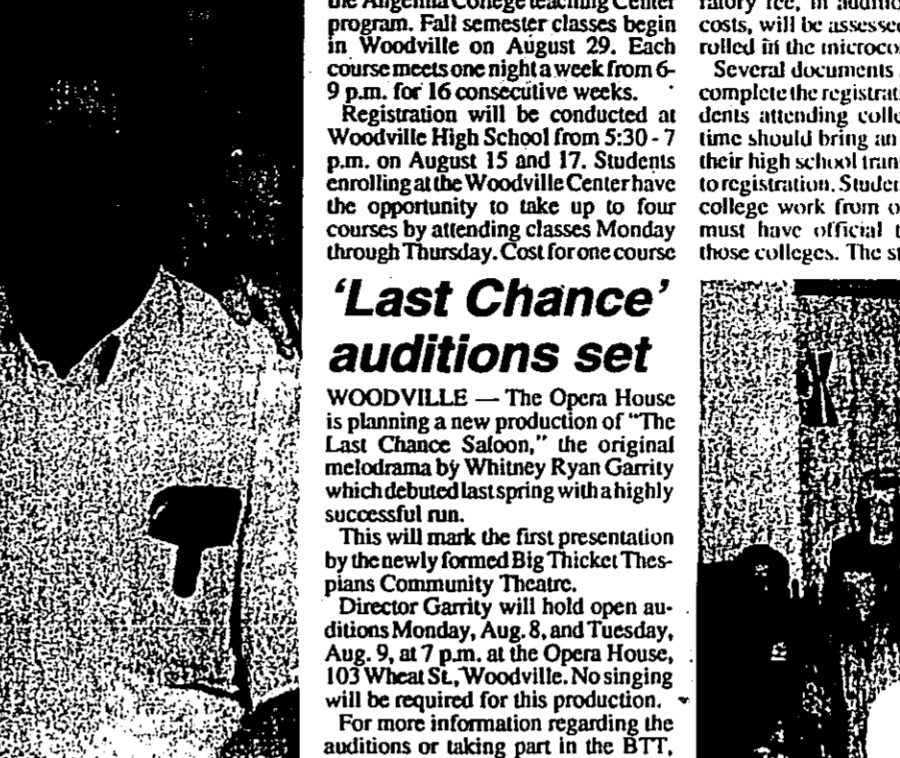

Angelina College fall classes scheduled for Woodville

WOODVILLE — Eleven college courses have been scheduled for Woodville this fall semester as part of the Angelina College teaching Center program. Fall semester classes begin in Woodville on August 29. Each course meets one night a week from 6-9 p.m. for 16 consecutive weeks.

Registration will be conducted at Woodville High School from 5:30-7 p.m. on August 15 and 17. Students enrolling at the Woodville Center have the opportunity to take up to four courses by attending classes Monday through Thursday. Cost for one course is \$97. Two courses are \$168, three courses are \$237 and tuition and fees for four courses are \$294. A \$15 laboratory fee, in addition to the tuition costs, will be assessed to students enrolled in the microcomputer course.

Several documents are necessary to complete the registration process. Students attending college from other institutions should bring an official copy of their high school transcript with them to registration. Students with previous college work from other institutions must have official transcripts from those colleges. The student must also be able to prove Texas residency to avoid paying out of state tuition fees which are considerably higher than in-state fees. A Texas driver's license, at least one year old, is the most commonly used document for proof of residency. Other documents include a one-year-old or older voter registration card or letter on company letterhead certifying a year or more of employment in Texas. The high school transcript for students who graduated this past June will also serve as proof of residency if the student graduated from a Texas school.

Courses scheduled on Monday night include Introduction to Microcomputers and Speech Communication. Tuesday offerings are Art Appreciation, British Literature, Principles of Economics and Federal and State Government I. Wednesday courses are U.S. History from 1877 and General Psychology. Thursday's schedule includes English Composition, College Algebra and Introductory Sociology. Alabama-Coushatta Russ-Indians return from Goodwill Games

INDIAN VILLAGE—The Russ-Indians are coming! The Russ-Indians are coming!
 That was the wording on a sign outside the administration building as family and friends members eagerly awaited the return of 14 Alabama-Coushatta Indian dancers from their trip to Russia Tuesday, July 26. Shortly before 5 p.m., two vans carrying the travelers pulled into the reservation, carrying tired but happy dancers who had just returned from what would be one of the most exciting trips of their lives.
 To prove they had been where they said they had been, most got off their vans sporting their new Russian fur caps, despite the hot summer weather.
 The quiet, peaceful reservation was quite a contrast from Kirov Stadium in St. Petersburg, Russia, where on Saturday night, July 23, the Alabama-Coushatta Indians performed before an excited crowd of more than 70,000 persons at the start of the Goodwill Games.
 While television cameras failed to focus in on the dancers from Deep East Texas, the Alabama-Coushattas nevertheless performed before their largest crowd ever. Again, quite a contrast from the crowds of fewer than 100 which they usually perform in front of during performances on the reservation.
 Besides the excitement of getting to perform in the huge stadium, the dancers also toured St. Petersburg and other parts of Russia. They saw the Summer Palace, the Peter and Paul Fortress and the Moscow Circus. They toured several of the beautiful Russian Orthodox churches.
 Actually, the Alabama-Coushattas performed three times while in Russia. On Thursday night, a big crowd was on hand to watch the dress rehearsal. Then on Friday night, they performed for a local crowd. But the big finale was on Saturday night, when they performed before the largest crowd of their lives.

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*** Courthouse**

1858 courthouse had to be moved. The 1858 courthouse was awarded to S.P. West and moved to the northeast corner of Block 14 in Woodville.
 The county retained the use of the old building until the new courthouse was completed. The 1858 building was later acquired by Judge R.A. Shivers, father of Gov. Allan Shivers, and was sold to Mrs. B.P. Hughes in 1923. It was destroyed by fire in 1922.
 In November 1929, it was decided that a new courthouse be located in the new courthouse and a Town Clock No. 16 was purchased from the Seth Thomas Clock Co. for \$791.11. J.D. Collier was then paid \$250 to install it in the new courthouse.
 Because cattle were allowed to roam free in Woodville at the time, it was decided to erect a fence around the courthouse square. The 816-foot of wrought iron fence, including 72 cast iron posts, three six by six posts and one double gate cost the county \$1,201. The fence is now around the M. Zion Cemetery near Chesser.
 According to the commissioners court minutes, architect T.S. Hodges came before the commissioners on April 15, 1922 to announce that the courthouse was completed and that all plans and specifications had been met.

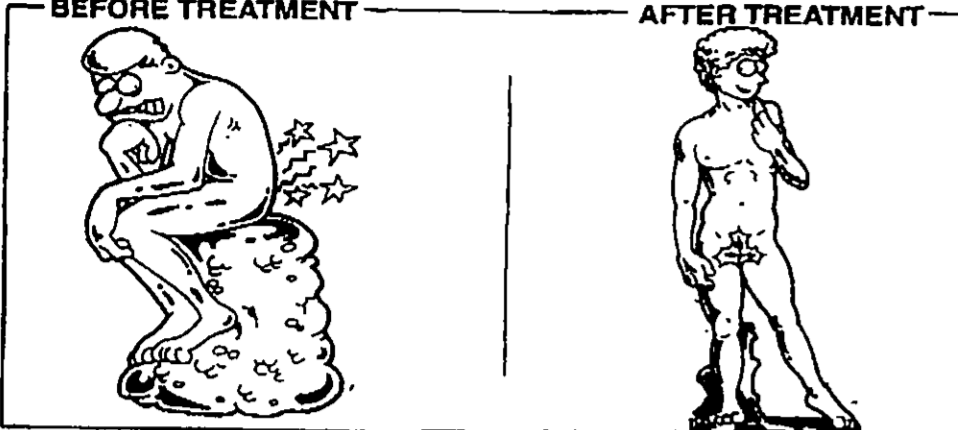

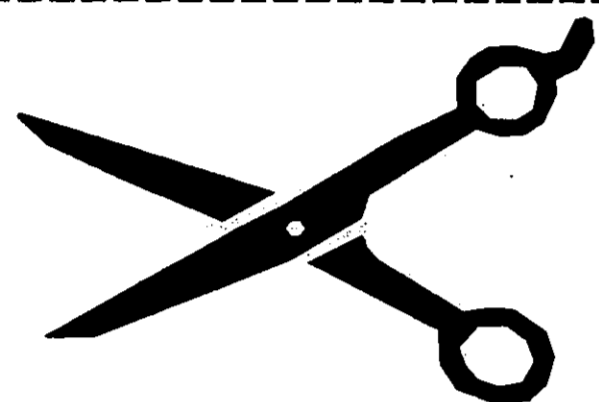

Radiation procedure treats inoperable brain tumors

NEW ORLEANS—A technique that destroys inoperable tumors or malformations in the brain is being used by physicians at the Ochsner Medical Institutions in New Orleans. The technique - stereotactic radiosurgery - involves using small directed beams of radiation to treat areas that may be inaccessible by conventional surgery or for patients who may be unable to withstand surgery. The one-time application is also an outpatient, or same-day, procedure and may serve as a substitute for what can be in some cases up to 20-30 radiation therapy treatments, according to Dr. Roland Hawkins in the radiation oncology department at Ochsner. "Using those precisely directed beams of radiation, we are able to focus on and destroy the diseased tissue and spare nearly all of the surrounding healthy tissue," Hawkins said. "This procedure shows tremendous promise in treating certain types of brain tumors and other malforma-

tions within the cranial area." There are only two such sites in the New Orleans area using the procedure and only about 50 sites in the U.S. "This technique is so much more precise than conventional radiotherapy that it is called radiosurgery. It's role is still evolving and we expect to see other uses develop in the future." The key to stereotactic radiosurgery is determining the exact location of the diseased tissue and programming those coordinates into a linear accelerator - the unit that emits the radiation beams. The accelerator is rotated around the targeted area in the patient's brain, allowing high doses of radiation to be administered directly to the diseased site. The procedure usually takes a full day and is performed with a local anesthetic. A computed tomography (CT) scan is used to determine the exact coordinates of the diseased tissue within the brain. Working from that information, doctors then affix a metal ring to the head which helps the linear accelerator focus on the targeted area. The target of the beams - the diseased tissue - is always in the path, no matter how the linear accelerator may turn," Hawkins said. "This delivers the highest possible dose of radiation to the targeted area while not harming normal tissue is spared." Stereotactic radiosurgery is currently being used for patients with various types of brain, head and neck tumors, and brain tumors that have not responded to radiotherapy. It can also be used in the treatment of arteriovenous malformations (AVMs), malformed blood vessels in the brain that can cause seizures and are generally inoperable. In the future radiosurgery may either be coupled with other forms of radiotherapy or surgery to fight intracranial tumors.

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Senior citizens cautioned about vacuum cleaner pitch

BEAUMONT — The Better Business Bureau of Southeast Texas and East Texas Legal Services have joined forces to help two local senior citizens exercise their rights under the three day cooling off rule. The senior citizens and several other local customers succumbed to high pressure sales by H.C.S. Enterprises, also known as Filter Queen, trading in old vacuums for a 36 month payment contract on a new Filter Queen vacuum at 21.9% interest. The "cooling off rule," a federal law, gives a buyer three days to cancel purchases of \$25 or more made in the home. The sales person must orally inform the buyer of his cancellation rights at the time of sale and provide two copies of a cancellation form and a copy of the contract. According to complaints, no oral information was offered by the Filter Queen sales rep about the cancellation law, though the statement was in the contract. Tom O'Neil, managing attorney for East Texas Legal Services, also found violations of Regulation Z of the Federal Truth in Lending Statute in the company's contracts. He will be working with the senior citizens under a grant that allows East Texas Legal Services to assist older people regardless of income level. Anyone who has had difficulty returning purchases under the three day cooling off rule, may contact the BBB at 831-5348 for assistance. However, the BBB warns that all contracts should be read carefully before signing and the customer should realize that the law requires that the cancellation document be mailed to the company.
