

# Running injuries can be avoided with proper care

HOUSTON — To prevent running injuries, pay attention to the four "S's": stretching, stride, shoes and surface.

"Many of the common running injuries can be prevented by simple adjustment in your running program or even a new pair of shoes," said Dr. Donald Baxter, a clinical professor of orthopedic surgery at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Baxter says stretching should be the first step.

"A full 10 or 15 minutes should be devoted to carefully stretching thigh and calf muscles," Baxter said.

A simple adjustment in stride may be necessary if aches and pains develop.

"A very long stride may cause the runner to land too far back on the heel, causing injuries to the ankle, Achilles tendon and arch," Baxter said. "Taking extremely short strides may strain calf and thigh muscles or stress the foot and ankle."

An exercise physiologist can analyze stride on stationary tracks using video tape to pick up flaws in motion. The third "S," shoes, is intimidating to many people because of the number of specialty running shoes on the market.

"Many of these shoes are expensive," said Baxter. "But, when fitted and cared for properly, the shoes can help prevent injuries. The key is finding the right kind of shoe."

Baxter suggests taking along an old pair of running shoes so a sales representative can see how you run.

Selecting the proper running surface is also important. Surfaces such as concrete roads and sidewalks can cause

shin splints, minute fractures in the bone below the knee.

"Even the most expensive shoes cannot eliminate all of the shock waves caused by constant running on that type of surface," Baxter said.

Baxter suggests a relatively smooth surfaced track or running trail. Even asphalt streets are softer than concrete.

Baxter also recommends cross-training.

Replacing one or two days of running with cycling or swimming gives certain muscle groups a rest while still providing a good aerobic workout.

## Procedures given for reporting late Social Security checks

LUFKIN — A person whose Social Security or SSI check does not arrive on the date it is expected should wait for three more mail deliveries before contacting Social Security. This will allow the postal service ample time for delivery and will take care of most of the delayed checks. If the check still has not arrived after three days, Social Security can begin necessary action for a replacement check.

The most common cause of failure to receive a check is failure to report a change of address. Many people fail to notify Social Security when they move, even though they rely on their Social Security or SSI checks as their primary source of income.

"Some people think it is enough to report their change of address to the post office. The post office, however, will forward mail to the person's new address only for a certain length of time. After that, checks will be returned to the U. S. Treasury."

If a person's check has been returned and the new address provided shortly thereafter, it can still take up to several weeks for a new check to be sent. If the check was not returned, a stop payment will be put on it and the matter

will be transferred to the U.S. Treasury, Washington, D.C., to determine if the check has been cashed. If it has not been cashed, a new check will be sent. This process can also take several weeks. If it has been cashed, a new check cannot be sent until the person who cashed the check is identified. This procedure is time consuming and for some, causes financial stress before another check is issued.

It is very important to promptly report a change of address to Social Security so that payments won't be interrupted. The report can be easily made by using Social Security's toll free number. A change of address should also be reported if direct deposit is being used. This ensures that any letters or notices sent to beneficiaries will be received.

## Two jailed following shotgun slayings

**-Separate incidents leave two dead-**

TOWN BLUFF — Two Spurger area residents were charged with murder early this week following separate shotgun slayings that left two men dead.

Laura Lee Eason, 34, of Spurger was freed Monday under a \$50,000 bond after being arrested early Sunday morning in connection with the death of her husband, Kelton Wayne Eason, 48, also of Spurger.

Seagramin Wiley Jordan, 65, of the Wayward Winds subdivision near Spurger remained in jail Tuesday under a \$100,000 bond in connection with the death Monday night of his daughter's fiancée, Larry W. Moore, 38, of Mesa, Ariz.

The first shotgun slaying was reported about 1:50 a.m. Sunday by the Bluff, Kelton Eason area near Town Bluff. Eason was pronounced dead by a Justice of the Peace Roy Drake, who subsequently also arraigned the victim's wife on a murder charge and set bond.

Drake also ordered an autopsy be performed on the victim's body.

According to Sheriff Gary Hennigan, officers were called to the James C. Baird farmhouse on River Road in Barlow Lake Estates Sunday morning and found Kelton Eason laying near a car with a single shotgun wound in his chest.

A 12 gauge shotgun loaded with buckshot was recovered at the scene. Hennigan said that according to witness statements, the couple together

with Baird had arrived at the residence early Sunday by car. When they got out of the vehicle, Mrs. Eason is believed to have brought the shotgun out with her.

"When he got out of the car, she told him to turn around," Hennigan said. "She asked him twice and after the second time, he turned around and she shot him."

Hennigan said the woman then laid the weapon down and told Baird to "call the law."

The sheriff said that the woman told investigators that she and her husband had been arguing throughout the day. The shooting was still under investigation Tuesday with deputies taking additional statements regarding the incident. Hennigan said the matter will be presented to a Tyler County grand jury.

The second incident was reported about 10:23 a.m. Monday at Jordan's residence in Village Mills, a place owned by Jordan's brother, W.O. Jordan. Hennigan said. "They started to get a little rowdy and left, driving back to Mr. Jordan's residence."

The sheriff said that Jordan told investigators that according to witness statements, the couple together

## Council okays curfew; accepts timber bids

WOODVILLE — The Woodville City Council voted unanimously Monday to enact by Sept. 1 a local curfew law that is a blend of wording from similar laws in other cities and being used by the cities of Beaumont and Dallas.

City Attorney Harry Stafford said the language of the "right time" portion curfew came primarily from a Dallas ordinance that "has already been tested in the courts." The Beaumont ordinance he said, applied during daytime hours when school is in session.

Stafford said that the ordinance could be in effect once published in the local newspaper. He indicated the ordinance will be published officially in the August 14 edition of The Tyler County Booster.

Woodville Police Chief Scott Yosko, who was asked about the enforceability of the ordinance, said, "We'll enforce that ordinance the same way we do all the other laws. We may give warnings at first."

In other city business the council accepted a high bid of \$187,423 from Kirby Lumber Co., Inc. for the timber to be harvested off the proposed new sewer plant location. Council also received bids from Morris Timber Co. of Lufkin, for \$93,826 and G.W. Logging of Woodville for \$65,608.94.

## Sales tax declines 15.6%

AUSTIN — Tyler County's sales tax income fell below 1993 levels for the second consecutive month during August, sinking by almost 15.6 percent, according to a report issued by State Comptroller Jim Sharp.

The county's payment from its .5 percent sales tax during August was \$5,075,390 from the \$32,845,424 check received in August 1993.

During July, the county's payment of \$19,246,151 was down by almost 3.2 percent (\$635,211) from the \$19,881,362 it received the previous year. June's payment, however, reflected a strong 21.5 percent increase with that \$20,592,020 check reporting the June 1993 payment of \$16,950,237 by \$3,641,86.

Since the first of the year, the county's sales tax income has been swinging up and down when compared to 1993 levels. January's figures were up by 25.4 percent, February's were down by 7.5 percent, March's total was down by 4.4 percent, April's numbers were up by 3 percent and May's payment was up by 3.2 percent.

So far this year, Tyler County has received \$178,116,835 from the tax, a figure which is about 2.2 percent more than the \$173,545,225 received during the first eight months of 1993.

The year-to-date total represents 87.4 percent of the \$205,000 the county projected it would collect under its 1994 budget, which began on Jan. 1. With four months remaining in the year, the county is on track to meet its goal.

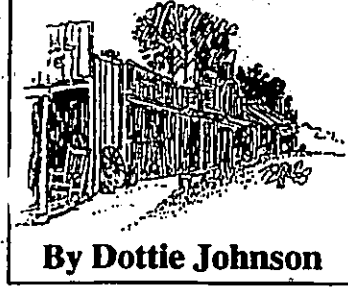

### Road ownership still disputed

Dear Editor: In reference to the Editor's Note in the Readers Write of the 8/10/94 issue of the Tyler County Booster, Commissioner Henry Sawyer commented that the 10 ft. wide, dead end, private easement (now claimed and extended to approx. 25 ft. wide) has been maintained since 1960. He stated that it has been used by the public for a number of years. Why would the public be interested in a dead-end private easement? The easement is for the use of the neighbors, their family and friends.

In January of 1993, the property owner received a letter from District Attorney James Clark, which she kept. The letter states (on record vol. 318 pg. 149) deed records (a 10 acre tract of no easement).

The owner, at that time, of the 10-acre tract gained access to the 10 acres through a 30 ft. county road up to the 10 acres. The 10 acre tract did not have an easement through the land in 1974. The easement did not come into existence until 9/9/83. Those facts are on county record and in the letter from James Clark. The county has no claim on the easement. The county has not purchased the easement, nor has the owner conveyed the easement to the county. Items, forged, torn pieces of forged titles.

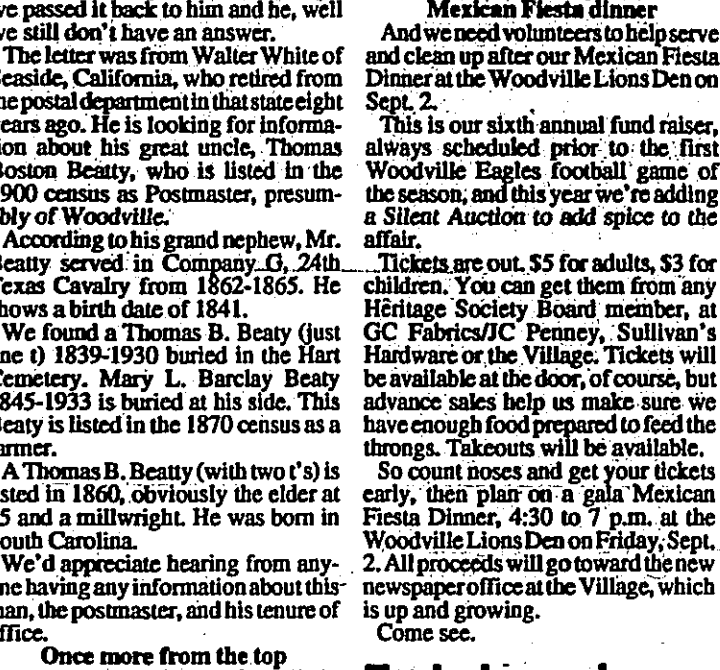

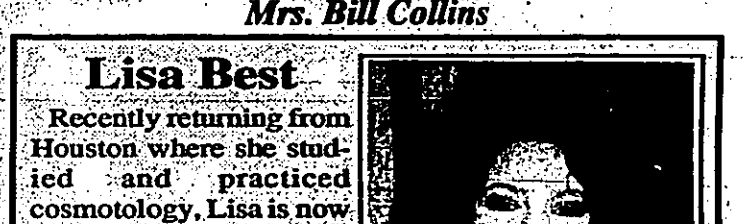

# Running injuries can be avoided with proper care

HOUSTON — To prevent running injuries, pay attention to the four "S's": stretching, stride, shoes and surface.

"Many of the common running injuries can be prevented by simple adjustments in your running program or even a new pair of shoes," said Dr. Donald Baxter, a clinical professor of orthopedic surgery at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Baxter says stretching should be the first step.

"A full 10 or 15 minutes should be devoted to carefully stretching thigh and calf muscles," Baxter said.

A simple adjustment in stride may be necessary if aches and pains develop.

"A very long stride may cause the runner to land too far back on the heel, causing injuries to the ankle, Achilles tendon and arch," Baxter said. "Taking in a very short stride may strain calf and thigh muscles or stress the foot and ankle."

An exercise physiologist can analyze stride on stationary tracks using video tape to pick up flaws in motion. The third "S," shoes, is intimidating

to many people because of the number of specialty running shoes on the market.

"Many of these shoes are expensive," said Baxter. "But, when fitted and cared for properly, the shoes can help prevent injuries. The key is finding the right kind of shoe."

Baxter suggests taking along an old pair of running shoes as a sales representative can see how you run.

Selecting the proper running surface is also important. Surfaces such as asphalt streets are softer than concrete.

Baxter also recommends cross-training. Replacing one or two days of running with cycling or swimming gives certain muscle groups a rest while still providing a good aerobic workout.

## Procedures given for reporting late Social Security checks

LUFKIN — A person whose Social Security or SSI check does not arrive on the date it is expected should wait for three more mail deliveries before contacting Social Security. This will allow the postal service ample time for delivery and will take care of most of the delayed checks. If the check still has not arrived after three days, Social Security can begin necessary action for a replacement check.

The most common cause of failure to receive a check is failure to report a change of address. Many people fail to notify Social Security when they move, even though they rely on their Social Security or SSI checks as their primary source of income.

Some people think it is enough to report their change of address to the post office. The post office, however, will forward mail to the person's new address only for a certain length of time. After that, checks will be returned to the U. S. Treasury.

If a person's check has been returned and the new address provided shortly thereafter, it can still take up to several weeks for a new check to be sent. If the check was not returned, a stop payment will be put on it and the matter

will be transferred to the U.S. Treasury, Washington, D.C., to determine if the check has been cashed. If it has not been cashed, a new check will be sent. This process can also take several weeks. If it has been cashed, a new check cannot be sent until the person who cashed the check is identified. This procedure is time consuming and for some, causes financial stress before another check is issued. It is very important to promptly report a change of address to Social Security so that payments won't be interrupted. The report can be easily made by using Social Security's toll free number. A change of address should also be reported if direct deposit is being used. This ensures that any letters or notices sent to beneficiaries will be received.

## Two jailed following shotgun slayings

-Separate incidents leave two dead-

TOWN BLUFF — Two Spuriger area residents were charged with murder early this week following separate shotgun slayings that left two men dead.

Laura Lee Eason, 34, of Spuriger was freed Monday on a \$50,000 bond after being arrested early Sunday morning in connection with the death of her husband, Kelton Wayne Eason, 48, also of Spuriger.

Benjamin Wiley Jordan, 65, of the Wayward Winds subdivision near Spuriger remained in jail Tuesday under a \$100,000 bond in connection with the death Monday night of his daughter's fiancé, Larry W. Moore, 38, of Mesa, Ariz.

The first shotgun slaying was reported about 1:50 a.m. Sunday in the Barlow Lake Estates near Town Bluff. Kelton Eason was pronounced dead by Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace Roy Drake, who subsequently also assigned the victim's wife on a murder charge and set bond.

Drake also ordered an autopsy be performed on the victim's body.

According to Sheriff Gary Hennigan, officers were called to the Jameson Farmhouse on River Road in Barlow Lake Estates Sunday morning and found Kelton Eason laying near a car with a single shotgun wound in his chest.

A 12 gauge shotgun loaded with buckshot was recovered at the scene. Hennigan said that according to witness statements, the couple together

with Baird had arrived at the farmhouse early Sunday by car. When they got out of the vehicle, Mrs. Eason is believed to have brought the shotgun out with her.

The sheriff said that the woman told him to turn around. "I believe she asked him twice and after the second time, he turned around and she shot him."

Hennigan said the woman then laid the weapon down and told Baird to "call the law."

The sheriff said that the woman told investigators that she and her husband had been arguing throughout the day. The shooting was still under investigation Tuesday with deputies taking additional statements regarding the incident. Hennigan said the matter will be presented to a Tyler County grand jury.

The second incident was reported about 10:23 p.m. Monday at Jordan's home in Village Mills, a place owned by his wife, Diane Jordan. Hennigan said that Jordan had been out Monday night partying with his daughter, Diane Marie Jordan, 20, and his daughter's fiancé, Moore, prior to the incident.

"They had been down at W.O.'s Friday Tavern in Village Mills, a place owned by Mrs. Jordan," Hennigan said. "They started to get a little rowdy and left, driving back to Mr. Jordan's residence."

The sheriff said that Jordan told in-



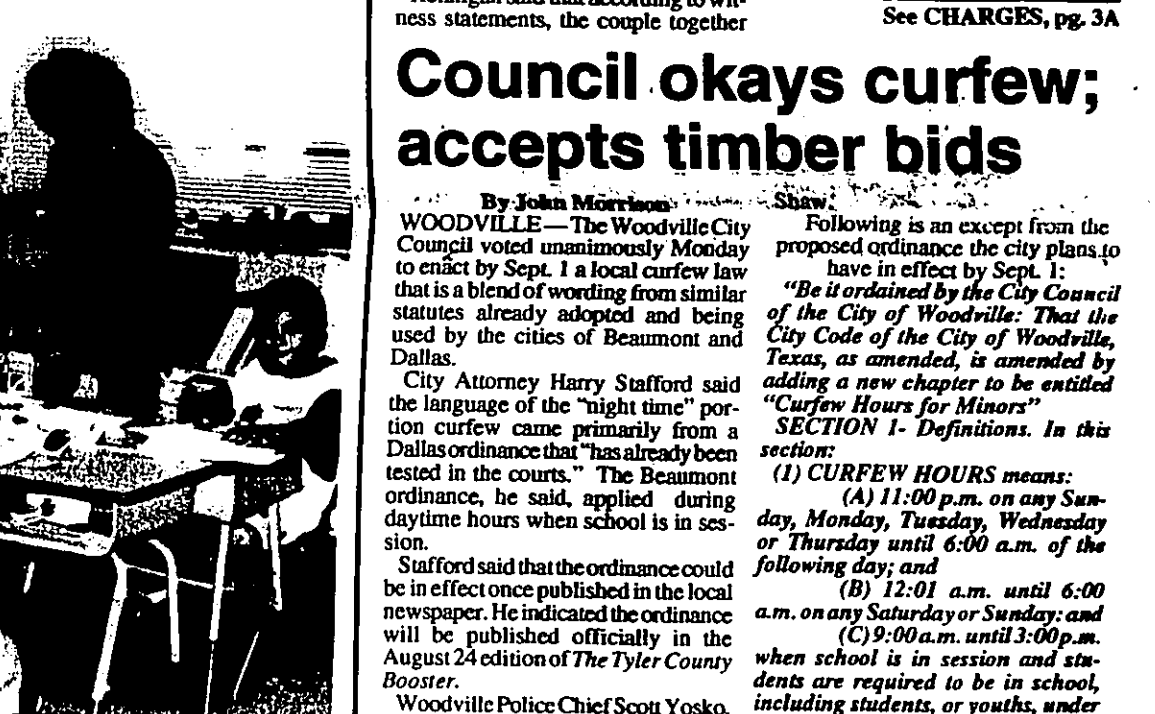
## Frontier Frolic brings old west alive

## Council okays curfew; accepts timber bids

WOODVILLE — The Woodville City Council voted unanimously Monday to enact a curfew law.

"Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Woodville: That the City Code, for the City of Woodville, Texas, as amended, is amended by adding a new chapter to be entitled 'Curfew Hours for Minors'."

City Attorney Harry Stafford said the language of the "night time" portion curfew came primarily from a Dallas ordinance that "has already been tested in the courts."

The ordinance, he said, applied during daytime hours when school is in session.

Stafford said that the ordinance could be in effect once published in the local newspaper. He indicated the ordinance will be published officially in the August 24 edition of The Tyler County Booster.

Woodville Police Chief Scott Yosko, when asked about the enforceability of the ordinance, said, "We'll enforce that ordinance the same way we do all the other laws. We may give warnings at first."

Yosko said he, along with city officials from Woodville, were invited by the Woodville School District to give a succession of six programs beginning on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 23-25, to about 60 students per day, then repeating the schedule the following week. The program will be aimed at high school students only, said City Secretary Don

Following is an excerpt from the proposed ordinance the city plans to have in effect by Sept. 1:

"Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Woodville: That the City Code, for the City of Woodville, Texas, as amended, is amended by adding a new chapter to be entitled 'Curfew Hours for Minors'."

SECTION 1. Definitions. In this section:

(1) CURFEW HOURS means: (A) 11:00 p.m. on any Saturday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday until 6:00 a.m. of the following day; and (B) 12:01 a.m. until 6:00 a.m. on any Saturday or Sunday, and (C) 9:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. when school is in session and students are required to be in school, including students, or youths, under expulsion or suspension who are required to remain under supervision during the time period.

In other city business the council: accepted a high bid of \$187,423 from Kirby Lumber Co. Inc. for timber to be harvested off the proposed new sewer plant location. Council also received bids from Morris Timber Co. of Lufkin, for \$93,232 and G.A.W. Logging of Woodville for \$65,688.94. awarded a low bid of \$32,000.10 on the recommendation of the city engineer.

## Sales tax declines 15.6%

AUSTIN — Tyler County's sales tax income fell below 1993 levels for the second consecutive month during August, sinking by almost 15.6 percent, according to a report issued by State Comptroller John Sharp.

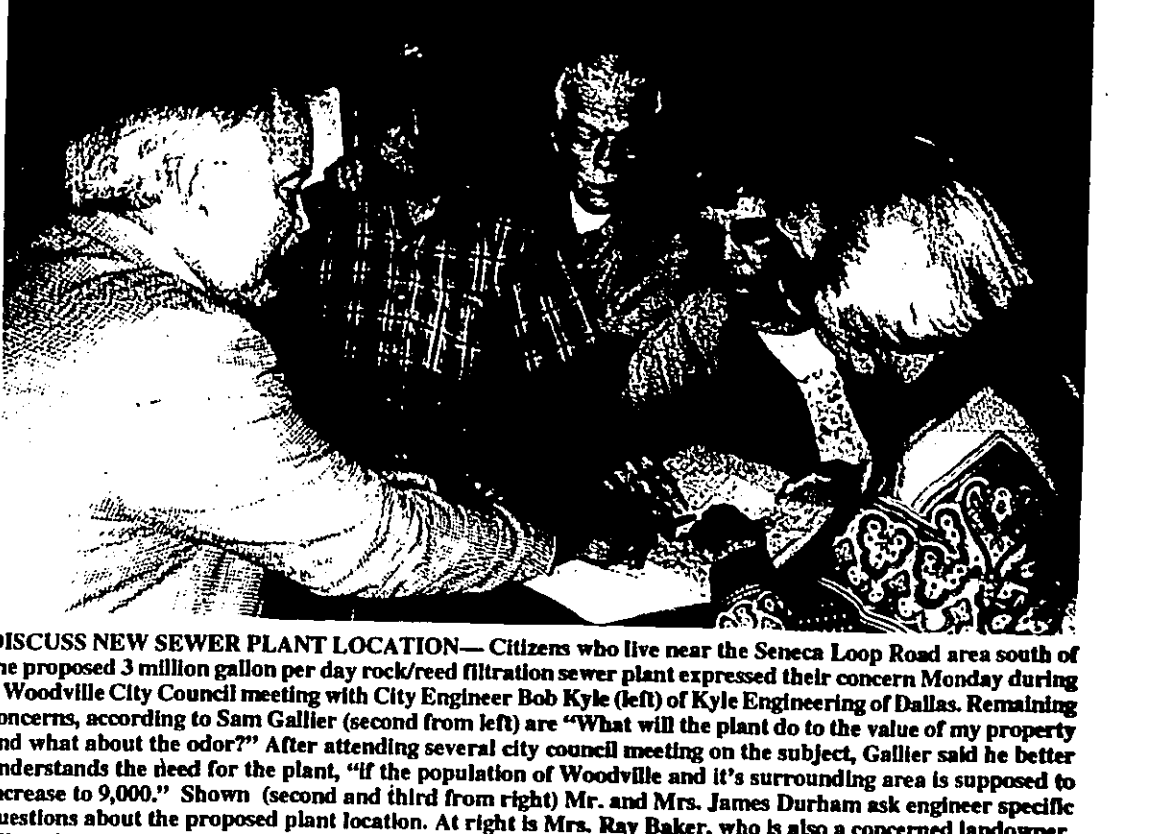
The county's payment from its .5 percent sales tax during August totaled \$27,470.03, which was down by \$5,075.39 from the \$32,545.42 check received in August 1993.

During July, the county's payment of \$19,248.15 was down by almost 3.2 percent (\$635.21) from the \$19,883.36 it received the previous year. June's payment, however, reflected a strong 21.5 percent increase that \$20,592.09 check topping the June 1993 payment of \$16,930.23 by \$3,661.86.

Since the first of the year, the county's sales tax income has been swinging up and down when compared to 1993 levels. January's figures were up by 25.4 percent, February's were down by 1.5 percent, March's total was down by 4.4 percent, April's numbers were up by 26.3 percent and May's payment was up by 3.2 percent.

So far this year, Tyler County has received \$179,116.83 from the tax, a figure which is about 2.2 percent or \$3,771.58 more than the \$175,345.25 received during the first eight months of 1993.

The year-to-date total represents 87.4 percent of the \$205,000 the county projected it would collect under its 1994 budget, which began on Jan. 1. With four months remaining in the year, the county's

## Homemaker Hints

Well meaning parents may not be aware of the adequate crash protection for their young children.

Many of the child safety seats that parents are using are old, used, or abused and do not provide adequate protection. A child's safety seat is seriously compromised when vital parts are not replaceable to explain how it is for use in motor vehicles and that it has not been in a crash, has instructions and all the parts.

Securely installed, child safety seats should face the back of the vehicle; babies over 20 pounds and one year face forward. Straps should be secured snugly over the child's shoulders. The harness clip used to keep straps on large's shoulders.

When a child is too large for the safety seat, use a booster seat with the lap/shoulder belt. Use a booster seat with older children until they are at least 4 feet 9 inches tall in a sitting position. Secure the child according to safety seat manufacturer's instructions.

Correctly secure safety seat to vehicle by following the vehicle instruction manual as well as safety seat instructions. Secure the convertible seat facing forward or to the rear depending on the size and age of the child. The seat should be held securely in position.

Even if you purchase a new child safety seat, be aware that occasionally parts of seats are found to be defective and the manufacturer issues a recall. If a recall occurs, the manufacturer will fix the defect at no cost to the owner.

If you have recently purchased a new child safety seat, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration recommends that you either send in the manufacturer's registration card (if one is provided) or send your registration information to them and they will forward it to the manufacturer. (NHTSA is collecting names and addresses of individuals who want this information provided to child safety seat manufacturers, so they can be easily notified of any future recalls regarding their particular seat.)

The information provided must include: your name, telephone number, address, child seat manufacturer, model name and number, date of manufacture (found on labels on your child safety seat), and a written request that you are authorizing NHTSA to provide this information to child safety seat manufacturers. Send this information to: NHTSA, Office of Defects Investigation, NEF-12, 400 7th St., S.W., Washington, D.C. 20590.

budget year, the county is only \$25,883,177, short of reaching the \$205,000 target figure.

While Tyler County's sales tax revenue for the month fell short of last year's levels, payments to all these of the county's incorporated cities was up during August, according to Sharp. Sales tax totals generally reflect the level of business activity occurring within each county and city of the state.

Woodville, which collects a .5 percent rate, received \$58,223.64 in August, up by 8.4 percent (\$4,521.24) from the \$53,702.40 payment one year earlier. Thus far for the year, the city has collected \$325,368.01 from the tax, a figure which is .2 percent (\$493.47) less than the \$325,861.48 received during the first eight months of 1993.

While this was the eighth check received by Woodville this calendar year, it was the 11th received since the city's budget was put into effect on Oct. 1, 1993.

During the current fiscal year, Woodville has collected \$446,051.68 in sales tax revenue, a figure which is about 1.8 percent (\$7,792.78) more than the

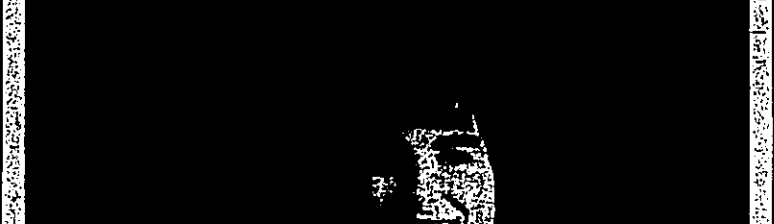

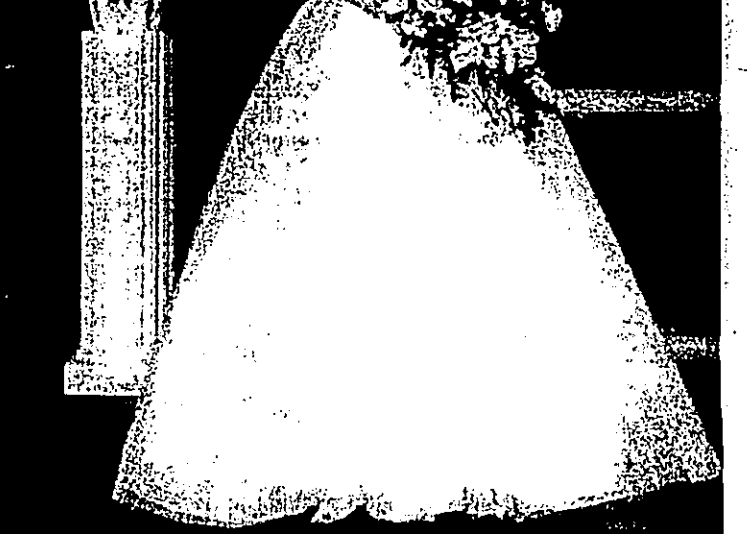

## Eagles hope to fly high again

(Second in a four part series) WOODVILLE — The Woodville Eagles caught a lot of folks by surprise last season, posting a 6-4-1 mark and reaching the playoffs under first year head coach Craig McGallion. This year McGallion and Eagles hope to return to inch a little further down the line in the playoffs with a team that will return 16 lettermen which includes six offensive and four defensive starters. But returning to the playoffs will most likely be more difficult than before. A lot of people overlooked us last year, notes the Woodville coach. "There will be a revenge factor this season. Last year was a rebuilding year for a lot of teams in the district. Standing in the way to his playoffs are seven teams in the new realigned 21-3A district, including preseason favorite Stephen F. Austin of Ft. Arthur and perennial power Newton. "SFA was rebuilding last year and went 10-1," emphasizes McGallion. "They've also got one of the best defensive linemen in the nation (Chris Reed). McGallion says that Bama is the most improved team in the district and that Orangeburg is to be looked at as the dark horse of the league. And what about Woodville? "We have a lot of doers," says the Woodville coach of this year's team. "There is not a lot of talk. They show it by example. They worked very hard in the spring and have worked very hard in the weight room. McGallion backs his compliment of his players with another remark. "Championships are won and lost in the spring," he stresses. "They (the players) are on the edge. They could step over and make a great football team. Every team is different," he adds. "Each has its own personality. They (Woodville) believe that they can play with anyone. They've got the desire." One of Woodville's desires this year is to get off to a better start than last season. The Eagles opened with an 0-2-1 mark in non-district play before putting it all together in league play with a 6-1 record. Their only loss in district came at the hands of SFA in a 31-7 contest. They also lost to Liberty guard, Frank Sylvester (5-10, 240) and Darin Baute (5-10, 215), and tackles Brandon Prevost (6-2, 225) and Edmond Lewis (6-1, 245). Ready for action also are center Charles Odom (5-10, 180), guard Brandon Allen (5-10, 220), and tackles Nick Marshall (6-0, 250) and Bobby Walker (5-10, 220). On defense, the Eagles' attack focuses on the linebackers where Jason Tolbert (6-2, 185) and Kenya Williams (5-9, 205) handle the outside duties, and James Ivy (5-10, 192) along with either Trevor Odom (5-9, 210) or Dale Threlley (5-9, 195) will work the inside. Brad King and Bert Thorford (5-9, 165) will come in to spell the starters. Also back on defense is junior tackle Robert Russell (5-10, 245). The other tackle position is still up for grabs according to McGallion. Working the nose guard is junior Shawn Midkiff (5-10, 210), backed with Brandon Allen. Steven Hadin (6-1, 180) and Justin Sturrock will take care of the corners on defense, while Craig Lewis (5-9, 165) and Sonny Hilliard are the safeties. The biggest question mark for the Eagles this season is their kicking game. McGallion admits that the coaching staff is spending at least 30 minutes a day looking for the right kicker and punter. The Eagles still have a couple of weeks to find what they need although they open scrimmage play at Hampshire-Fannett Friday. Most of the time there is no kicking in preseason scrimmages. Following Hampshire-Fannett the Eagles will journey to Livingston for their second and last scrimmage contest on August 26. Then it's Huntington on September 2nd home for the season opener. "I'm excited about this year," says the Woodville coach. "We've been working on this since the second week of November. It's going to be a fun year. There will be ups and downs, but these guys have enough character to have more ups than downs."

Hunters are reminded that a hunter orange cap and vest must be worn when hunting with firearms.

In the second game the Lady Bulldogs came back to even the match at 1-1 with a 15-11 victory.

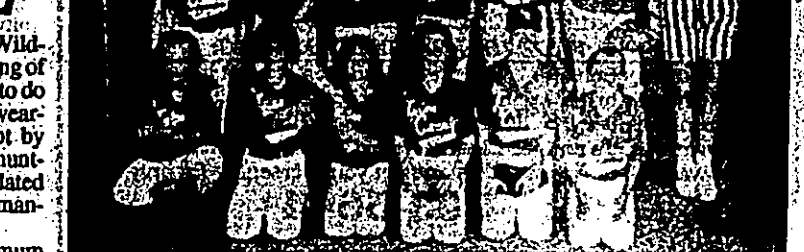
## Hunter orange required on US Forest Service managed land

LUFKIN — With hunting season approaching, the US Forest Service reminds hunters and those accompanying them during gun deer season to wear daylight fluorescent orange. Gun deer season runs from November 5, 1994 through January 1, 1995. According to Warren Starnes, forest wildlife biologist with the National Forests and Grasslands in Texas, the color safety clothing (also called "hunter orange") has been required in the agency's three wildlife management areas since 1985. In 1992, it was mandated on all US Forest Service managed land in Texas.

This year with the increased funding for wildlife management areas from the 1994-95 appropriations act, permits in 1995, Starnes expects a good deer population to be active in the forest and more hunters to be active as well.

According to Starnes, "Throughout the United States, accidental shootings have decreased dramatically when hunter orange has been worn. It's just good common sense."

Keep in mind, deer cannot detect orange, so while wearing it, the hunter's ability to bag his game. Deer are most sensitive to motion, sound and smell. All hunter orange will do is perhaps save the hunter's life," Starnes said. Steve Hall, conservation education
