"Sacred Harp" tradition at Stephen F. Oct. 8
 NACOGDOCHES — On Saturday, Oct. 8, the sounds of Sacred Harp singing, an old-time Southern religious tradition, will ring through a ballroom at Stephen F. Austin State University.

An All Day Singing and Dinner on the Grounds: A Sacred Harp Preservation Symposium will be held in the Twilight Ballroom of the Archie McDonald and Dr. Francis Student Center on the Stephen F.E. Abernethy.

Austin State University campus from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The Symposium is sponsored by the Outis Lock Endowment Foundation-East Texas and is invited to the session of the East Texas Historical Association and the Texas Folklore Society. Local arrangers are Dr. arcapella, spiritual singing tradition in which shape notes are used for musical notation.

This singing is sometimes referred to as "fasola music" (fa-sol-a) because it uses the centuries-old style of singing the names of the notes instead of words. The music is also characterized by frequent use of the minor key and unusual but compelling harmonies. Sacred Harp music is usually sung for the pleasure of the singers, not for an audience.

"Preachers of the Southern frontier in the early nineteenth century found themselves with large congregations who wanted to sing their religious experience but had not songs to sing," said Abernethy, executive secretary of the Texas Folklore Society.

"To fill their need, these preachers and song leaders took well known popular tunes and put religious words to them. They also made camp-meeting songs of simplified phrases and chants that could be easily learned and repeated. And they used songs from the northeastern singing schools," he said.

Many of these old songs of the Southern frontier were collected by B.F. White in an 1844 hymnal entitled The Sacred Harp. This book became the most used of the

More than 100,000 Texas high school and junior high students statewide will pray around their schools' flagpoles Wednesday, Sept. 21, during the fifth annual "See You At The Pole" event.

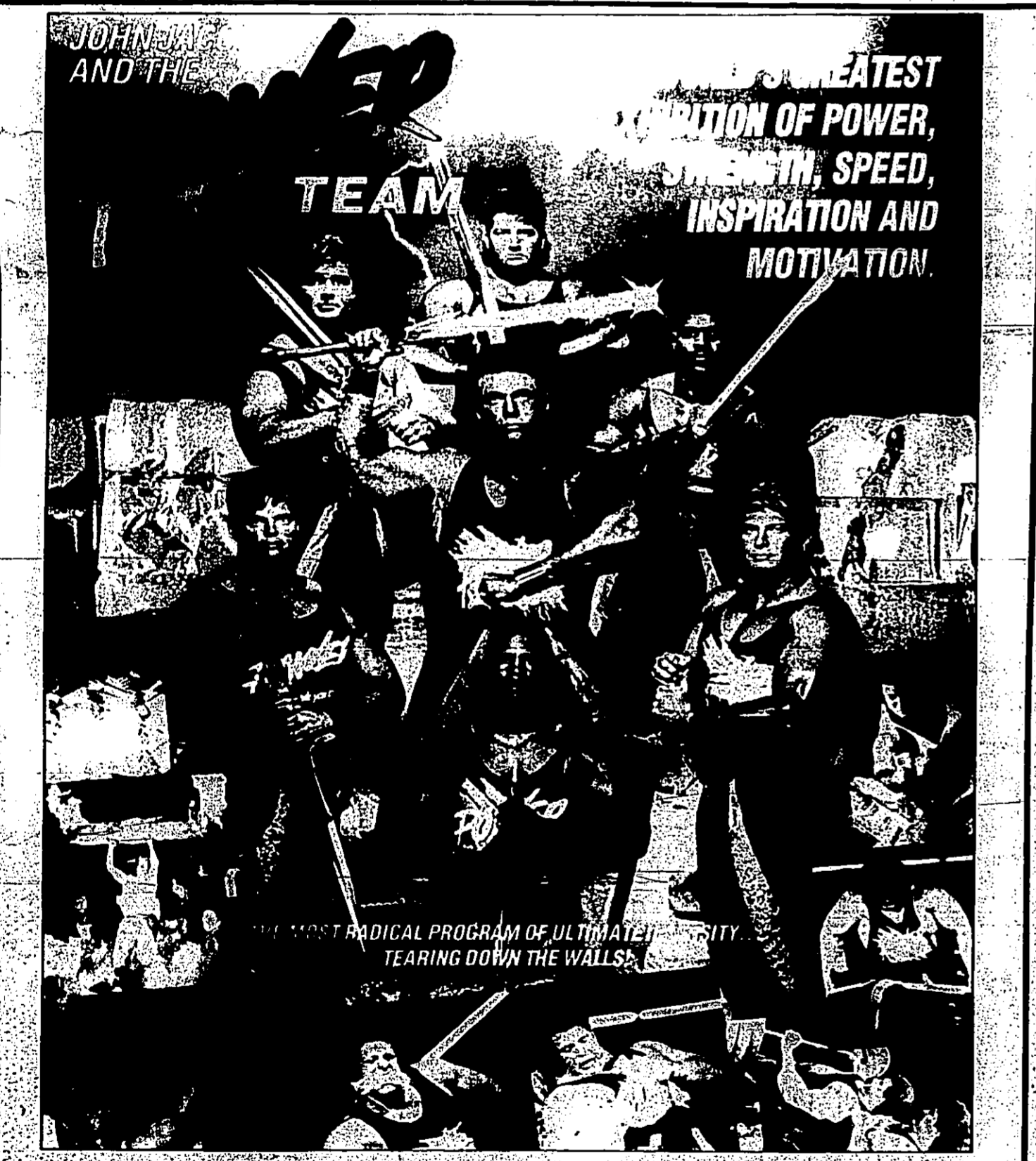

Haley finds sponsors for bill to assist fire departments

AUSTIN — Legislation proposed by State Senator Bill Haley (D-Center) aimed at curbing continually escalating vehicle liability insurance premiums for volunteer fire departments in Texas is alive and well, despite the fact that Senator Haley will not be a member of the Texas Senate when the State Legislature convenes in January, 1995.

Senator Haley today announced that he has secured both House and Senate sponsors for his bill, State Rep. Elton Bomer (D-Montalba) and State Senator Ken Armbrister (D-Victoria) have agreed to carry the bill in the 74th Texas Legislature.

"For months, we have met with volunteer fire fighters and representatives of volunteer fire departments to discuss their concerns about the rising costs of vehicle liability insurance," said Senator Haley. "Our regional meetings in Deep East Texas attracted more than 200 fire fighters representing more than 50 different rural fire departments. Since then, we have taken into account their needs, compiled claims statistics, and drafted a bill which is intended to curb those liability costs."

Senator Haley said that since making the announcement that he will be relinquishing his Senate seat at the end of his current term, there has been some concern among the volunteer fire departments about what would happen to the proposed legislation.

"The legislation is alive and well, thanks to Sen. Armbrister and Rep. Bomer," said Senator Haley. "Rep. Bomer had previously agreed to sponsor the legislation in the House before I announced my plans to leave the Legislature. And I appreciate Sen. Armbrister's support of the legislation and his offering to carry it in the Senate. These gentlemen are both very effective members of the Legislature and because of their leadership and considerable influence, I am confident the bill will have a very strong chance of passing."

Senator Haley noted that the proposed legislation will set up a risk retention group, operated by a state agency, which provides vehicle liability insurance to fire departments. "Essentially, what we're looking at is each department paying a set fee per truck per year with the state paying any claims. We are proposing a program that will at a minimum cut in half what volunteer fire departments are paying now for vehicle liability insurance."

"For years, rural fire departments in Texas have had to depend on fundraisers and donations to pay the costs of operating their departments," said Senator Haley. "And in recent years, volunteer departments were finding that vehicle liability insurance rates were taking a huge chunk out of their revenues. These men and women who serve as volunteer fire fighters put their lives on the line every day for their friends and neighbors and we felt it was time we got on their side and do what we can to make sure when life and property are threatened, those fire fighters have not been put out of business because they couldn't afford insurance on their trucks."

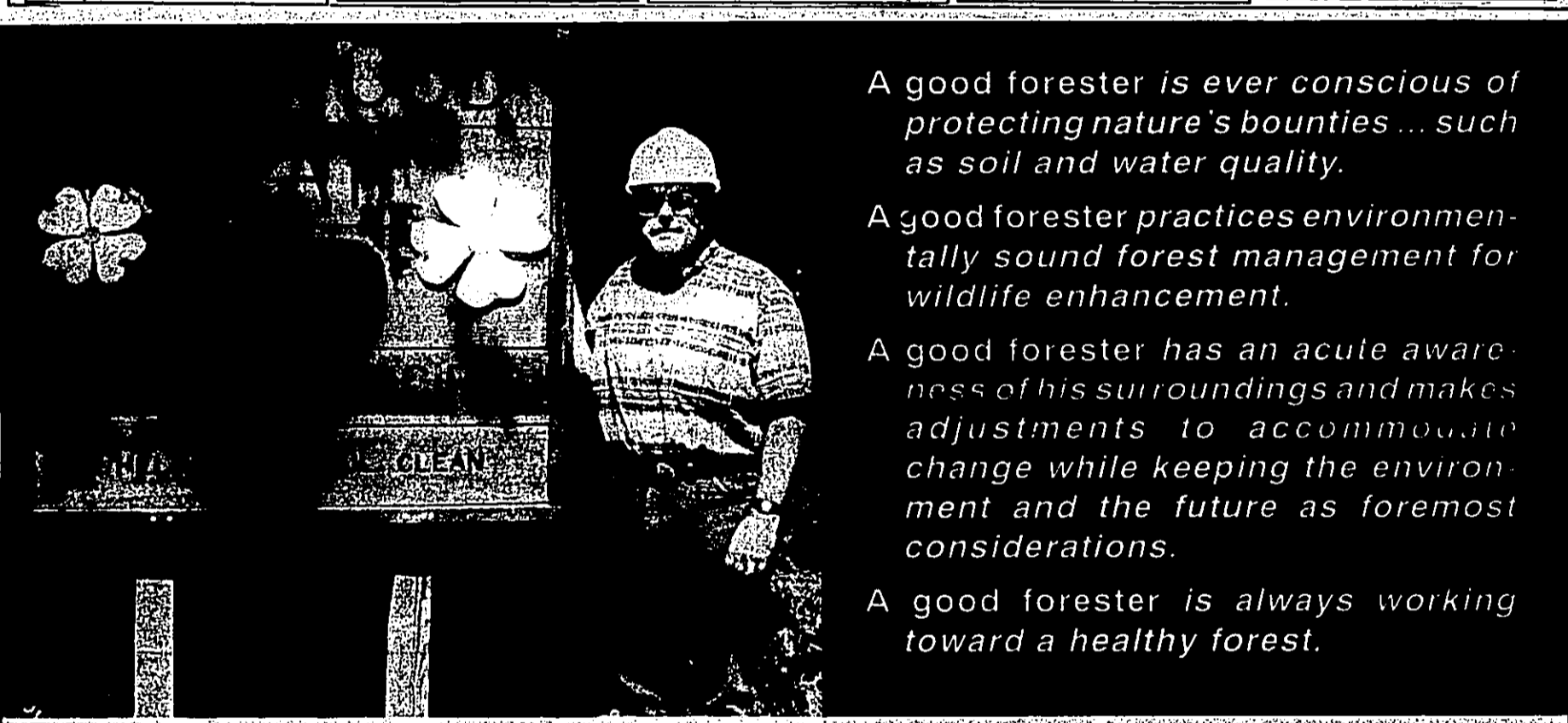

Are you Suffering from Trichotillomania?

HOUSTON—Ever feel like pulling your hair out? Those suffering from trichotillomania do, one hair at a time. Trichotillomania is the irresistible impulse to pull out one's own hair. The bizarre disorder affects millions of Americans and the majority appear to be women, says a psychiatrist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"It is difficult for us to know exactly how many people suffer from trichotillomania because victims are so secretive," said Dr. Suzan Streichenwein, an assistant professor of psychiatry at Baylor and chief of the Mental Hygiene Clinic at the Houston Veterans Affairs Medical Center (VAMC). "Most men will not discuss the disorder, whereas more women may open up and tell their doctors about the problem, which may be why we see a higher incidence among women."

Estrogen replacement therapy may help women more than previously thought

HOUSTON—While researchers know estrogen replacement therapy (ERT) strengthens bones, a study at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston will determine if estrogen also makes a menopausal woman's heart stronger.

"We suspect estrogen strengthens the heart and improves its ability to pump blood," said Dr. Michael C. Snabes, the study's lead investigator. "If this is true, it helps explain why menopausal women taking estrogen have less cardiovascular disease than those not taking the hormone. It may also explain why estrogen protects premenopausal women from the heart disease that afflicts their male peers," Snabes said.

Snabes, a senior reproductive endocrinology fellow in Baylor's department of obstetrics and gynecology, is teaming with investigators in The DeBakey Heart Center to learn how estrogen affects the structure and function of a menopausal woman's heart.

Menopausal women who are not taking estrogen begin the study with treadmill and ultrasound bicycle tests to determine how their hearts function before, during and after exercise.

The tests will be repeated after three months of ERT and after three months without estrogen, Snabes said.

"We know estrogen helps prevent osteoporosis and helps keep the ratio of 'good' to 'bad' cholesterol favorable. We think estrogen may also directly benefit the heart, but no one has studied that question until now," Snabes said.

Co-investigators for the study, which should be completed by early 1993, include Dr. Ronald L. Young, associate professor of obstetrics and gynecology, Dr. J. Alan Head, professor of medicine, and Dr. William A. Zoghbi, assistant professor of medicine and assistant director of the echocardiography laboratory of the Methodist Hospital in Houston.

The DeBakey Heart Center is a joint program of Baylor College of Medicine and The Methodist Hospital in Houston supporting cardiovascular research, treatment and education.

Sleeping babies' bottle feeding can cause serious tooth decay

AUSTIN—The Texas Department of Health (TDH) Bureau of Dental Health Services warns parents that the practice of calming a baby for sleep by giving it a bottle of milk, formula or juice can cause serious harm to the infant's teeth.

Dr. Donald Crow, chief of the bureau, said that prolonged bottle feeding of babies with sugary liquids during sleep can lead to a condition called "baby bottle tooth decay." The condition is a leading cause of oral health problems among children younger than three, and often is the start of severe, life-long dental problems which can affect the patient's general health and nutrition.

While about 60 percent of Texas children have some tooth decay, about 16 percent is caused by baby bottle tooth decay, according to Dr. Crow.

Dr. Crow explained that when children feed from bottles while they are awake, saliva helps to wash away concentrations of sugar and acid that can damage teeth.

However, while sleeping, a baby's saliva flow is greatly reduced.

childhood and can continue throughout a lifetime. Young children will pull out their eyebrows or eyelashes while adults pull hair from the scalp and pubic areas.

"Kids don't have the resources adults do to hide the condition such as buying an eyebrow pencil or a wig and may withdraw socially,"

Streichenwein said. Patients carefully examine the hair's texture, color, and condition before deciding which one to pull.

The urge to pull, ranging from a short period of time to all day, can be brought on by stress, caffeine, sugar, chocolate or pre-menstrual syndrome. There is usually an increased sense of

tension before pulling and a sense of relief and gratification after pulling.

"Trichotillomania is thought to be a neuro-chemical imbalance and can be regulated with certain medications," said Streichenwein.

Streichenwein also suggests, in addition to medication, that a high protein diet and behavior modification

may control the disorder. "Becoming involved in activities to keep the hands occupied diminishes the urge to pull," said Streichenwein. "It is also important to relax."

Relaxation techniques include sitting in a favorite chair, listening to soothing music, taking a warm bath, or taking time to be alone.

Psychiatrists are not always familiar with the disorder, since patients generally seek the advice of pediatricians, dermatologists, gynecologists or clergy members.

"Once the secret of trichotillomania is revealed, more patients can be relieved of their terrible emotional pain and suffering," said Streichenwein.

Osteoporosis may begin in childhood

HOUSTON—A researcher at the Children's Nutrition Research Center (CNRC) in Houston suspects osteoporosis, a crippling bone disease, may begin in childhood.

"Most of an adult's skeleton is built and enlarged during adolescence. Being shortchanged on calcium at this stage of life could be especially damaging," said Dr. Steve Abrams, assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine.

Little is known about how growing children absorb calcium from foods and deposit it into healthy bones. Previous studies were performed more than 40 years ago and do not represent growth or dietary patterns of American children today.

Abrams is working on a study that will help fill this "calcium gap" by measuring calcium absorption and skeletal formation of young girls. Girls were chosen for the study because women are more susceptible to bone loss in later years.

The study will follow 50 white and 50 black volunteers between the ages of 5 and 15.

Abrams will look at the amount of calcium absorbed from the diet, how it

is distributed and how rapidly that calcium forms bones in relationship to age, the onset of puberty, diet and race.

Current Recommended Daily Allowances (RDAs) of calcium range from 800 milligrams for children ages 1-10 and 1,200 milligrams for children

Solid foods may be bad for infants

HOUSTON—Parents eager to start their infant on solids may want to postpone the porridge for the time being.

A researcher at the Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston suspects that introducing solids into the diets of infants to soon could rob them of important minerals.

"We know that infants can digest cereal relatively well as early as one month. However, the extra protein and calories contained in the cereal are lost in the stool," said Dr. Robert Shulman, associate professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine.

Shulman has also found that the stool of cereal-fed infants contains increased

levels of nitrogen, a building block of protein. "I want to know where this nitrogen is coming from," he said.

Shulman suspects that the nitrogen in the stool is caused by either diet or nitrogen-containing cells that line the intestine.

"Is the nitrogen coming from improperly digested formula and cereal or does the cereal cause the intestinal cells to slough off at a more rapid rate than normal?"

To find the answer, Shulman will follow the diets of male infants at the center's Metabolic Research Unit. He believes the answer will help scientists understand how the introduction of cereal affects digestion.

Caucasians appear to be at higher risk for developing osteoporosis than blacks.

Osteoporosis, a disease that causes bones to break easily, leads to hip fractures and crushed vertebrae as well as "dowager's hump," a telltale sign

of a collapsing spine. Osteoporosis affects an estimated 20 million Americans—most of them elderly women.

There is no cure, but Abrams believes that understanding calcium needs and bone growth during childhood can lead to its prevention.

"This information may help us determine the most nutritionally beneficial time to introduce cereals into an infant's diet, learn more about the components of nutrients and, in the future, allow pediatricians to design diets where nutrients complement rather than inhibit each other," he said.

In the meantime, he encourages parents to avoid the temptation to introduce cereal to their infant's diets because they think their infant needs to gain more weight, they prefer the convenience and availability of baby foods, or they mistakenly believe that added solids help an infant sleep through the night.

If parents have questions, they should consult their pediatrician, he said.

Bullock: Highway savings yield help for rural roads

AUSTIN — Lt. Governor Bob Bullock said Friday that efficiency measures inside the state highway department have produced \$57.6 million in savings which will be used for critically needed maintenance on the state's rural roadways.

"This money will help enhance the safety of millions of Texans, from children in school buses to farmers and ranchers, who rely on rural roads," Bullock said.

He pointed out that the \$57.6 million is a 45 percent increase over the \$125 million preventive maintenance budget already planned for the coming year.

Bullock said he has been advised by Texas Department of Transportation officials that the money will be distributed among the 19 state highway districts which primarily deal with Farm-to-Market roads and state highways in rural areas. The Beaumont district, which includes Tyler County, will receive \$1.2 million of the funds.

Bullock last week appointed an interim Senate committee to look into the rural road system and infrastructure needs. The committee consists of Sens. Bill Haley of Center, Ken

Armbrester of Victoria and Bill Sims of Pant Rock.

"This is a step in the right direction as the committee starts its assessment of the needs and the method of distributing state money," Bullock said. In appointing the committee, Bullock said that "safety, commerce and convenience are all at stake" in the rural transportation system.

Bullock praised the Transportation Department for finding the savings through what the agency calls its "Scrub the Budget" program.

Forestry museum honored

LUFKIN — The Texas Forestry Museum has been honored as the recipient of the prestigious Texas Historical Commission's Award of Excellence in Preserving History. Only one of three awards given in the state, the commendation cited the museum's East Texas Sawmill Data Base Project as the awarded project in preserving a historical legacy.

Through the efforts of Museum Director Carol Riggs and National Forests and Grasslands in Texas Archaeologist John Ippolito, the project began in earnest in the spring of 1993.

Funding from a U.S. Forest Service cost-share agreement allowed museum researchers to identify and collect basic information about sawmills and sawmill towns in East Texas for inclusion into a computer data base. The study began looking at those mills from 1880 to the present in the 38 counties known as the "Pineywoods" of East Texas.

At present, more than 2,250 mills have been entered into the data base, and more than 6,000 mills will be inventoried by the end of the project.

In discussing the project and the award, Riggs saluted Ippolito, saying, "John took an interest in the project from the start. His dedication and enthusiasm helped us pursue the project. We could not have started the project nor received the high honors we did if it weren't for John's efforts."

Riggs added, "It's unusual for a museum of our size to be doing high quality research of this magnitude. We're preserving Texas history through this project, and being honored for our effort makes it all that much more rewarding."

Ippolito praised the museum staff, saying, "The museum has made a strong commitment to showcasing our heritage. This is but one example of their good work. In addition to the museum, the sawmill project will provide valuable offshoots to other groups."

Requirements listed for SSI applications

LUFKIN — East Texans who apply for supplemental security income (SSI) payments can speed up their applications by knowing what to have available when contacting Social Security. SSI is a federally administered program for those age 65, disabled, or blind, and who have limited income and resources.

When applying for SSI, a person should have the following information available:

- His or her Social Security card or a record of the Social Security number.
- Proof of age, a birth certificate or the oldest other proof of age available.
- Information about any income and resources, such as payroll slips, copies of tax returns, bank books, insurance policies, car registration, and burial fund records. Parents or guardians applying for benefits for a child will also need to furnish information about their income and resources.
- Information about the place he or she lives, including the amount of the mortgage and property taxes on a home he or she owns, the lease and landlord's name if renting, and the cost of food and utilities.
- If disabled or blind, the names and addresses of doctors, hospitals, and clinics that have treated the applicant so that medical records may be obtained.

Most Social Security business, including filing for SSI, can be done by telephone. Applications and other necessary forms are completed by phone and mailed for signatures. Proof needed to determine eligibility may be submitted by mail, also.

Since SSI is such a complex program, citizens are urged to contact Social Security rather than try themselves to determine eligibility for benefits. For more information, take advantage of Social Security's toll free number: 1-800-772-1213.

Pilot lands airplane atop tree; rescue effort takes 24 hours

Experienced aviator James Harris says, "Everything fine."

"It looks like I'm going to live to walk another day," said 74-year-old rescued Pilot James Harris, who managed to land his single engine Dragonfly Mark II home-made airplane in some "soft" trees south of Woodville after attempting to land in a pasture instead.

The pilot remained in his cockpit atop a twelve inch oak for 24 hours before being recovered.

Harris said he had just taken off from Tyler County airport at 11 a.m. Saturday morning and after climbing to an altitude of about 2,000 feet for about 30 minutes realized the new fuel gauge he had just installed has "Either been misread or wasn't functioning right. I'm convinced it was me that screwed up. I couldn't get it to restart" he said, "but I won't know till they take the plane down."

Harris said, "I hate to say it but I wasn't quite flying high enough. I climbed after taking off from Woodville and I realized when I lost power that I couldn't make it back to the airport. So, I looked for the softest trees I could find, but that oak I landed in was 'n't soft at all."

The guys who came to get me were "magnificent" said Harris from his St. Elizabeth Hospital bed late Tuesday after undergoing surgery to both legs. At first it was thought that he had two broken ankles but the breaks were just above the ankles, doctors told him.

Tyler County Sheriff Gary Hennigan was notified about 10 p.m. Saturday of the missing pilot and initiated a search with the assistance of a helicopter and pilot loaned for the mission by Attorney Walter Humphrey, of Hillister.

According to Hennigan, "We called in U.S. Department of Customs jets with heat seeking apparatus to assist but to no avail. We had to call off the nighttime search but began early Saturday morning when after Hennigan made a pass south to Ivanhoe and on the return trip noticed the plane. The helicopter saw Harris waving his arms. "I knew they would get me down," Harris said, "but I sure was thirsty. He was discovered about one half mile north of the Earl Best residence just off the Fire Tower Road, near Boy Scout Camp Uland.

Tyler County Chief Sheriff's Deputy Sam Bible was the first to reach the victim and gaged with Harris till he and Deputy Otis Wigley managed to secure him in a special harness which was then lowered from the tree with the help of Department of Public Safety officer Bobby Rich. The rescue was dangerous because of the weight of the aircraft on the sixty-foot high tree.

Attachments from the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department, Trans Star EMS Services, the Department of Public Safety and the Tyler County Sheriff's office co-operated in the rescue. MedLink Helicopters from Beaumont lifted him to the metropolitan hospital by about 2 p.m. Monday.

Harris said, "All I did all night long was look up at the moon. I sure was lucky."



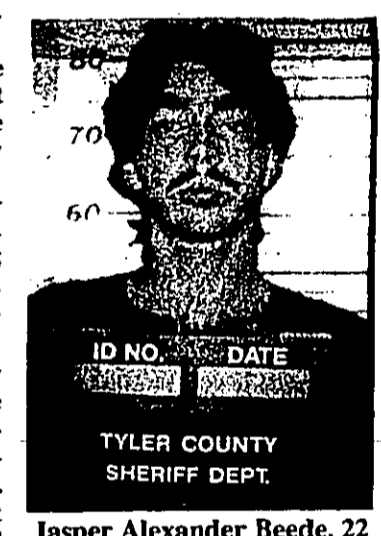
One captured 'one-to-go' in manhunt near Dam-B



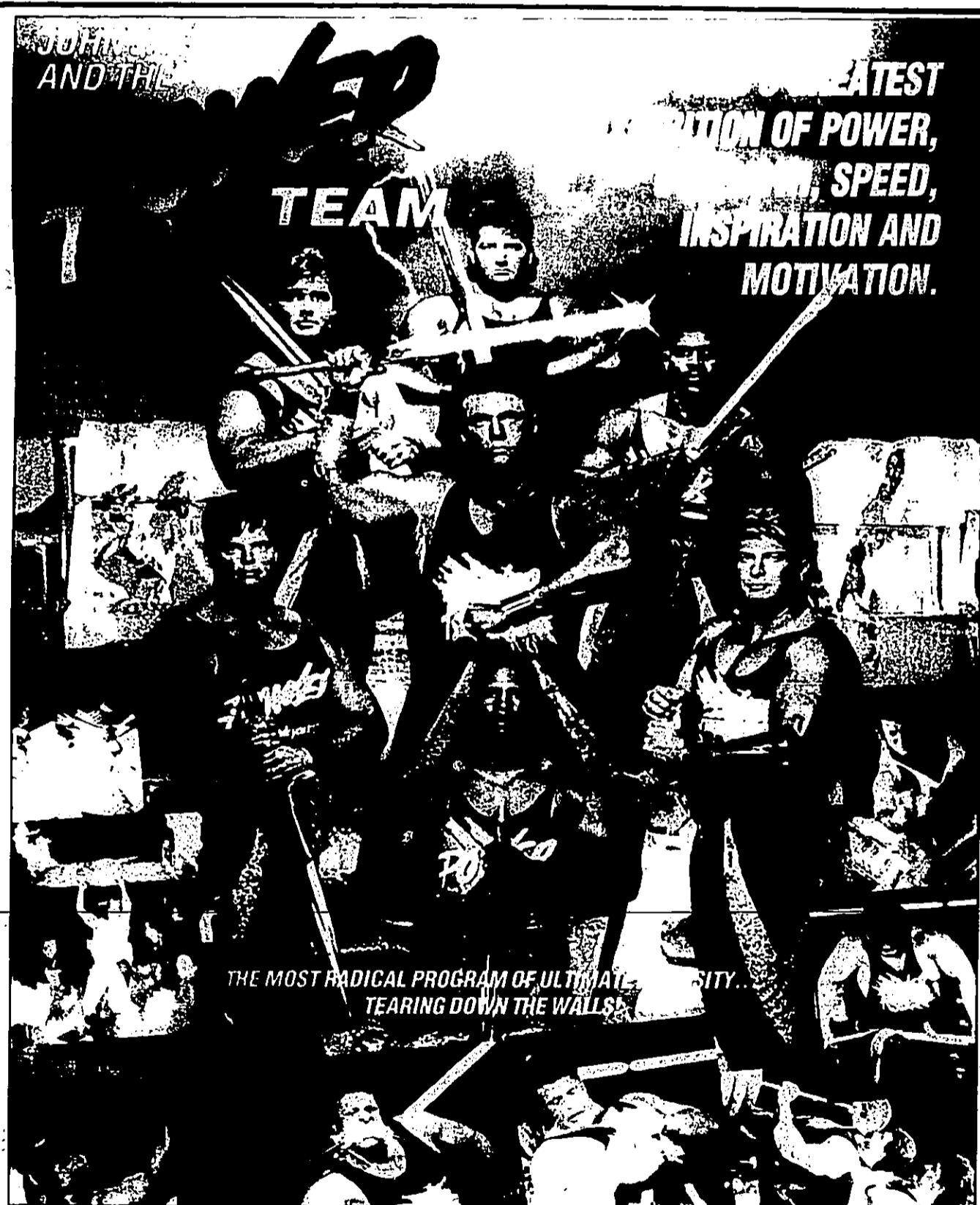

Haley finds sponsors for bill to assist fire departments

AUSTIN — Legislation proposed by State Senator Bill Haley (D-Center) aimed at curbing continually escalating vehicle liability insurance premiums for volunteer fire departments in Texas is alive and well, despite the fact that Senator Haley will not be a member of the Texas Senate when the State Legislature convenes in January, 1995.

Senator Haley today announced that he has secured both House and Senate sponsors for his bill, State Rep. Elton Bomer (D-Montalba) and State Senator Ken Ambrister (D-Victoria) have agreed to carry the bill in the 74th Texas Legislature.

"For months, we have met with volunteer fire fighters and representatives of volunteer fire departments to discuss their concerns about the rising cost of vehicle liability insurance," said Senator Haley. "Our regional meetings in Deep East Texas attracted more than 200 fire fighters representing more than 80 different rural fire departments. Since then, we have taken into account their needs, compiled claims statistics, and drafted a bill which is intended to curb these liability costs."

Senator Haley said that since making the announcement that he will be relinquishing his Senate seat at the end of his

current term, there has been some concern among the volunteer fire departments about what would happen to the proposed legislation.

"The legislation is alive and well, thanks to Sen. Ambrister and Rep. Bomer," said Senator Haley. "Rep. Bomer had previously agreed to sponsor the legislation in the House before I announced my plans to leave the Legislature. And I appreciate Sen. Ambrister's support of the legislation and his offering to carry it in the Senate. These gentlemen are both very effective members of the Legislature and because of their leadership and considerable influence, I am confident the bill will have a very strong chance of passing."

Senator Haley noted that the proposed legislation will set up a risk retention group, operated by an agency, which provides vehicle liability insurance to fire departments. "Essentially, what we're looking at is each department paying a set fee per truck per year with the state paying any claims. We are proposing a program that will at a minimum cut in half what volunteer fire departments are paying now for vehicle liability insurance."

"For years, rural fire departments in Texas have had to depend on fundraisers and donations to pay the costs of operating their departments," said Senator Haley. "And in recent years, volunteer departments were finding that vehicle liability insurance rates were taking a huge chunk out of their revenues. These men and women who serve as volunteer fire fighters put their lives on the line every day for their friends and neighbors and we felt it was time we get on their side and do what we can to make sure when life and property are threatened, those fire fighters have not been put out of business because they couldn't afford insurance on their trucks."

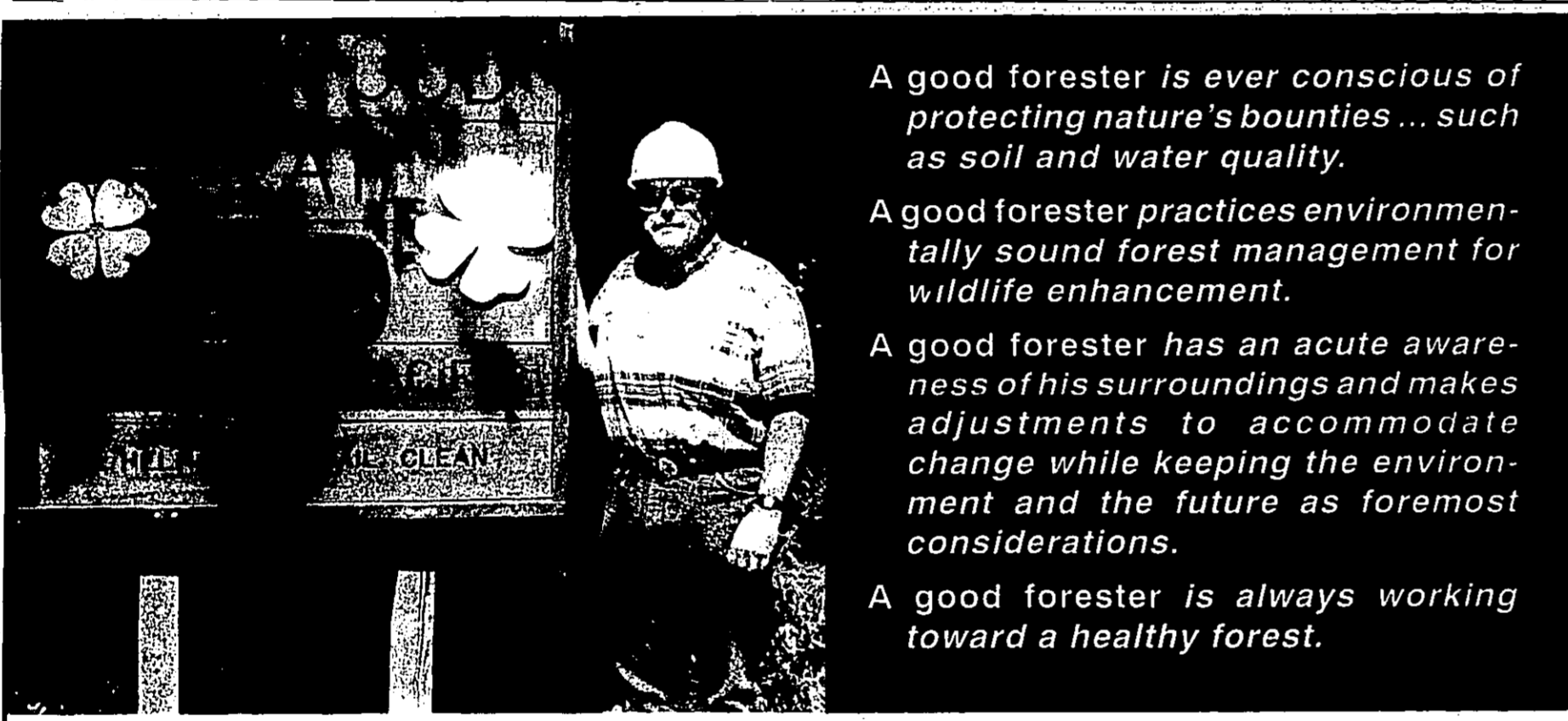
