

Know terms of division orders when negotiating a mineral lease

COLLEGE STATION—Mineral owners who negotiate an oil and gas lease for exploration of their property should pay particular attention to the treatment of division orders and royalty checks.

A division order may contain provisions that do not comply with the original lease terms but it can never permanently amend or supplant the lease.

Says Fambrough, "Division orders are revocable agreements signed by the mineral owner directing the distribution of proceeds from the sale of oil, gas, casinghead gas or their related hydrocarbons. If the terms of the division order differ from the lease, however, the division order cannot be revoked by the mineral owner."

The nine-page report explains the relationship between surface and mineral rights, negotiating terms of mineral exploration and division orders and royalty checks. (This publication is for information only and is not a substitute for legal counsel.)

Otherwise, a mineral owner could lose not only money but also beneficial lease terms acquired during the negotiation process, cautions Judon Fambrough, senior lecturer and attorney at law with the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University.

Lead poisoning widespread

AUSTIN—Are your children being poisoned in their own home? They may be suffering from lead poisoning without showing any symptoms. Lead poisoning is a widespread problem that affects people from all socioeconomic groups, geographic areas, and racial or ethnic populations. Children are especially susceptible to lead poisoning.

Several causes of lead poisoning exist. Lead-based paint is the most dangerous and widespread. Although lead has been banned in house paint since the 1970s, it remains a hazard in older homes or homes that are being renovated. Children are poisoned when the ingested paint chips containing lead. Lead paint also is used in painted steel structures, such as bridges and expressways. Lead-contaminated dust and soil is another source of lead in the environment.

Lead paint and dust are the major sources of lead poisoning, but others exist.

The level of lead in air has been significantly reduced with the elimination of leaded gasoline, but inhalation remains a cause of lead poisoning.

Other sources include water, food, and occupations or hobbies involving lead, such as construction work or working with stained glass. It also is found in some traditional or folk medicines and in some cosmetics.

Lead poisoning can be a serious medical problem. The ideal blood lead concentration is zero, but even small levels can be dangerous.

If you think your child may suffer from lead poisoning, see your physician. He or she may recommend a blood test and can tell you more about prevention and treatment.

Fair auction raises \$50,254

-4-H, FFA market animals draw record prices at Tyler County Fair-

WOODVILLE—The price records at the Tyler County Fair's annual livestock auction fell like rain Saturday, with almost every market animal bringing more money for the county's 4-H and FFA students than ever before. A total of \$50,254.83 was generated in the sales of the top five in each of the market animal categories—steers, barrows, lambs, broilers and rabbit pens.

Although this was the first time since 1990 that a member of Spurger's Rebbe family did not show the grand champion steer, the family continue to demonstrate their skill with livestock with Kachel Rebbe of the Spurger 4-H Club exhibiting the grand champion lamb.

It was absolutely wonderful how the people came together and worked to support the youth of Tyler County. It just goes to show that you work hard enough, anything is possible," he added. This year's livestock shows, which was the largest in recent memory, also paid off for the many youngsters whose animals did not make the cut for the main auction. In addition to the \$50,254.83 raised during the auction, other animals were sold "under the barn" generating another \$12,650 for the 4-H and FFA youngsters.

The overall quality of the livestock exhibited this year also won praise from a number of observers. Tyler County Commissioner Maxie Riley noted after viewing the animals that he was impressed by the high level of competition among the entries.

"You can go to a lot of fairs and see more animals, but you're never going to find many of higher quality than are here today," he said. "These children have done an outstanding job."

This year's grand champion steer, considered the premier winner in any livestock exhibition, was shown by Chess Adams of the Chester 4-H chapter. It was sold for a record price of \$5,500 to Buddy Lowery and E&L Lumber Co.

Woodville High targets discipline problems

WOODVILLE—Recent changes at Woodville High School find the faculty and students involved in a campaign to reclaim a disciplined well-organized approach to education. "This no-nonsense stance is unusual in a society which often questions acceptance of rules and regulations," commented Dr. Tom Harvey, principal. "We are determined to have safe halls, safe classrooms, and respectful students actively learning every day of the school year," added the principal of the 514 member high school.

A major change in the discipline management plan finds that the school has created an "alternative school" that will meet in the evenings from 5-9 p.m. The school was created based on a student recommendation to have an alternative to expulsion.

According to Preston Broom, assistant principal, the alternative school option allows for a "disciplinary up" of acceptable standards of conduct. "Students who cannot function within the framework of a regular school setting will be required by compulsory attendance laws to attend school in a confined, restrictive and light-fisted atmosphere. Other districts in the county have joined in the support of the concept.

Pay telephones have also been removed from the halls. Students who need to make emergency phone calls during September, according to a reporter, who monitors the calls and keeps a log.

County sales tax income climbs

AUSTIN—Following two consecutive months of declines, Tyler County's sales tax income increased over 1993 levels by over 9.2 percent during September, according to a report issued by State Comptroller John Sharp.

The county's payment from its 1.5 percent sales tax during September totaled \$19,090.75, which was up by \$1,617.18 from the \$17,473.57 check received in September 1993.

During August, the county's sales tax rebate of \$27,470.03 was almost 15.6 percent more than \$25,000 below the previous year's \$32,545.42 payment while the county's July payment of \$19,248.15 was down by almost 3.2 percent (\$635.21) from the \$19,883.36 it received the previous year. June's payment, however, reflected a strong 21.5 percent increase with that \$20,592.09 check topping the June 1993 payment of \$16,950.23 by \$3,641.86.

Since the first of the year, the county's sales tax income has been swinging up and down when compared to 1993 levels. January's figures were up by 25.4 percent, February's were down by 1.5 percent, March's were down by 4.4 percent, April's numbers were up by 26.3 percent and May's payment was up by 3.2 percent.

So far this year, Tyler County has received \$198,207.58 from the tax, a figure which is about 2.8 percent or \$5,388.76 more than the \$192,818.82 received during the first nine months of 1993.

The year-to-date total represents 96.7 percent of the \$205,000 the county projected it would collect under its 1994 budget, which began on Jan. 1. With three months remaining in the budget year, the county is only \$6,792.42 short of reaching the \$205,000 target figure.

While Tyler County's sales tax revenue for the month came in over last year's levels, payments to the county's incorporated cities were mixed during September, according to Sharp. Sales tax totals generally reflect the level of business activity occurring within each county and city of the state.

Woodville, which collects a 1.5 percent sales tax during September, received \$481,453.65 in sales tax revenue, a figure which is about 1.4 percent (\$6,833.82) more than the \$474,619.83 collected during the same 12-month period.

While this was the ninth check received by Woodville this calendar year, it was the 12th and final one received under the 1993-94 budget, which was put into effect on Oct. 1, 1993.

During the fiscal year, Woodville has collected \$481,453.65 in sales tax revenue, a figure which is about 1.4 percent (\$6,833.82) more than the \$474,619.83 collected during the same 12-month period.

This means that during the fiscal year just ended, the city generated almost 107 percent of the \$450,000 it projected it would receive from the tax during the budget period.

Also receiving a boost during the month was Colmesneil, which received a payment of \$1,757.30. This reflects almost a 6 percent (\$108.56) increase over the \$1,648.74 received in September 1993.

The year-to-date total for Colmesneil is \$16,469.56 which is 1.5 percent (\$252.48) less than the \$16,722.04 collected during the first nine months of 1993 from its 1.5 percent sales tax.

Chester's, the only other Tyler County city to collect the sales tax, did not receive a September payment. The city has a year-to-date total of \$4,225.43 which is over 6.8 percent (\$310.11) less than the \$4,535.54 received during the same nine months of 1993.

Deputies were called to a Bethany Osborn Hill, whose early writings and dedication helped lead the discovery of Redmon's body lying on a bedroom floor with a .22 caliber semi-automatic pistol lying beside him. Drake ruled the death as self-inflicted after conducting an investigation at the scene.

Funeral services for Redmon will be held at 2 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 5, from the Stringer and Griffin Funeral Home Chapel in Woodville. A native of Warren, he was a lifelong resident of Tyler County and was a self-employed mechanic.

Opening the doors on history

WOODVILLE—A piece of local history moved into place at the Heritage Village Museum last week as two handsome 10 foot wooden doors that once opened into Sullivan's Hardware found a new home in the entrance to the Village Vintette newspaper office.

According to Fred Sullivan, who donated the doors, they were one of three sets that were inset between display windows across the front of the original structure built by S.H. Reed between 1900 and 1905. In the 1930's, the bay windows gave way to progress and the widening of Bluff Street, but the doors remained in place, changing color with each repainting of the building that housed several different businesses over the years.

When Sam and Quaid Sullivan bought the building in February, 1952, moving their hardware business from North Magnolia, it housed a grocery store run by Roy Pate.

Over the next 20 some years, the doors were removed one set at a time, during three different remodelings, Sullivan said. But never did he see those doors unpainted and beautifully finished as they are today at the Village, the gleaming wood an elegant setting for the original brass hardware.

The Village Vintette building will be dedicated from this site at noon on Saturday, Oct. 15, during the Village's 7th Annual Harvest Festival.

Many Americans would love to cut the fat in their diets, but need a little help to do it. Researchers are now investigating ways to help people adjust to a lower fat diet.

Some believe that it might take as long as three months for an individual to adjust to a lower fat intake. It's a long time, and it may mean that people will need to be patient and persistent in their attempts to become accustomed to eating less fat.

There is evidence to support the fact that motivated adults can decrease the fat content of their diet on a long term basis. In the Women's Health Trial, a significant number of women reduced their fat intake to 20 percent or less of calories from fat. Some reported that during the study they found it difficult to give up their favorite foods. It was known that a reaction to fat is a result of their negative attitudes towards fat as a food component, or is actually the result of a physiological response to a high-fat intake after being on a low-fat diet for some time.

a signed record of phone calls. Harry commented that the use of the pay phones in past years allowed students to circumvent the authority of their parents by communicating with inappropriate or unwelcome friends as well as having access to possible illegal drug traffic.

The district has a no-tolerance stance on assaults and fights. Students are automatically suspended from school for fighting. Students involved in verbal or physical assault are turned over to legal authorities. Juvenile authorities of the county have been actively involved in assisting with the coordination of counseling programs for offenders as well as keeping records of students on probation.

Superintendent Carol Moffett said that "we recognize that something has to be done to improve the discipline of our youth. Woodville's school staff, administration, and board are committed to doing whatever is necessary to reach that goal." Moffett added that the involvement of parents has also assisted in the overall plan.

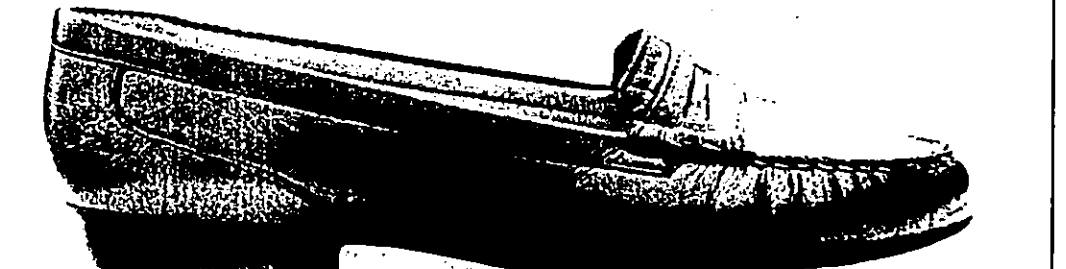

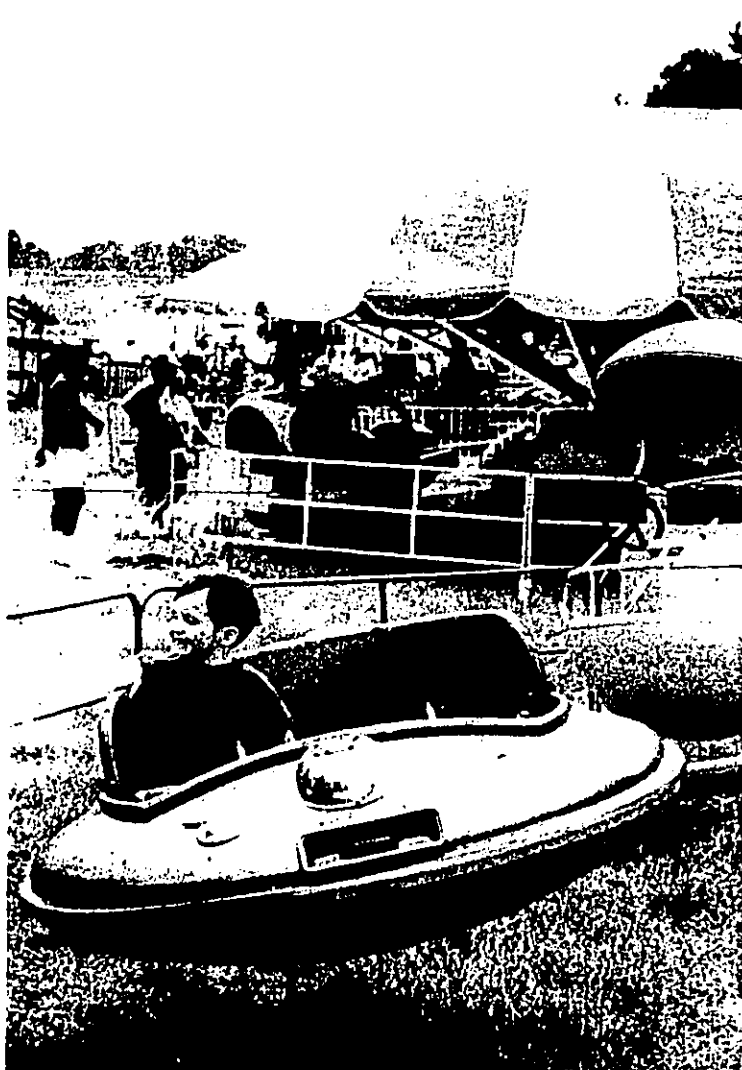

The play was to Ferguson who scampered forty yards to bring in the Warriors score. They succeeded in converting for two more, putting a total of eight points on the board for the Warren team.

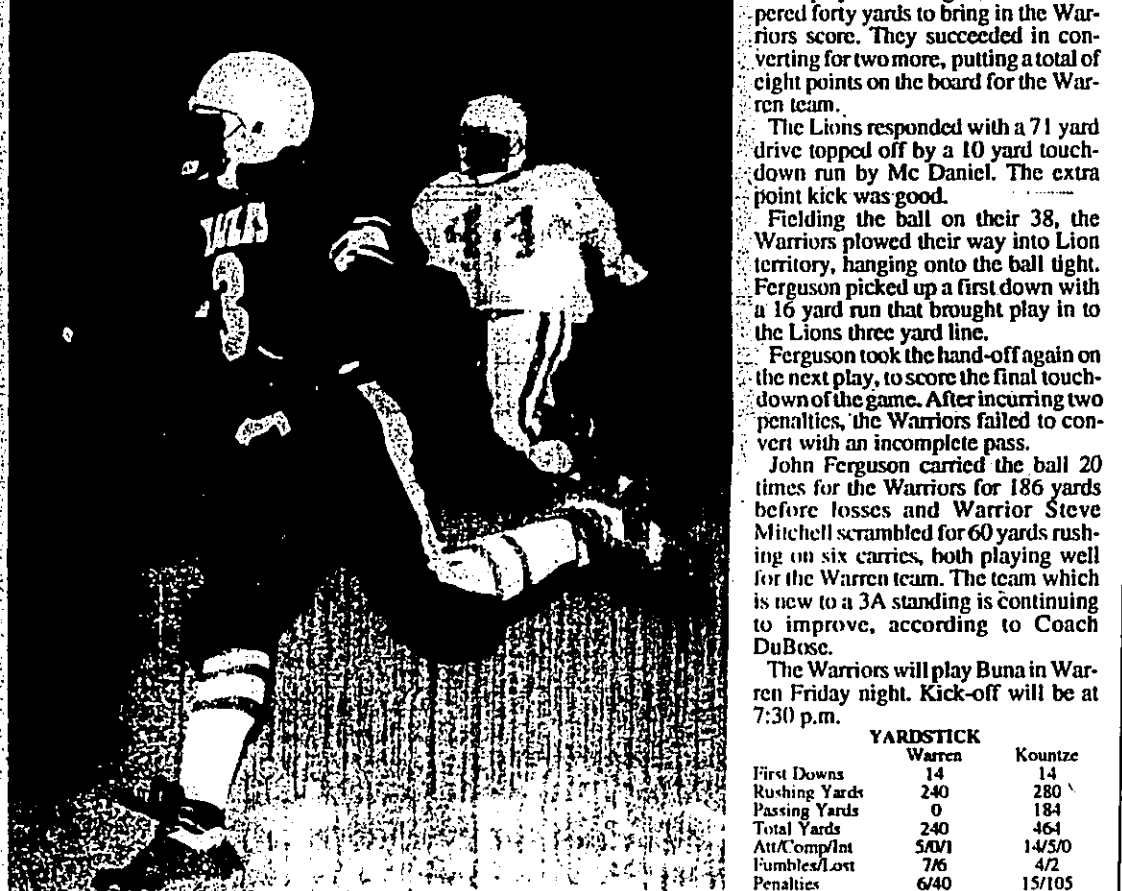
The Lions responded with a 71 yard drive topped off by a 10 yard touchdown run by Mc Daniel. The extra point kick was good.

million in monthly sales tax rebates made last week to 944 Texas cities and 111 counties. This reflects an 9.3 percent increase over the payments of one year ago.

Sharp said an all-time employment high of 7.7 million working Texans has produced greater consumer confidence and increased buying, which often translates into higher sales tax collections. More than 226,000 new jobs were created since July 1993 — 181,000 of which were in the services, trade, construction and manufacturing sectors.

According to Sharp, Texas cities received \$113.5 million for their September sales tax payments, up 9.2 percent from the \$103.7 million for September 1993. Counties were sent \$12.8 million, a 9.4 percent increase over last year's \$11.7 million.

This month's payments include taxes collected on July sales and reported to the comptroller in August, by businesses filing monthly tax returns. The city of Houston received \$15.5 million, the largest sales tax rebate for September and a 2.6 percent increase over the \$15.1 million rebate for the same period last year.

Houston gained 6,900 construction jobs since July 1993, marking that sector's largest employment gain since late 1990, Sharp said. The \$10.2 million September payment to Dallas was up 9.7 percent from the \$9.3 million for the same period last year.

The Dallas area again showed strong economic growth, adding 71,000 new jobs, more than any other major metro area in the state, Sharp added. San Antonio received the third largest rebate of \$6.7 million, a 9.1 percent increase over last September's rebate of \$6.2 million.

The Alamo City's steady employment gains continued and United Parcel Service announced plans to add 200 more jobs at its new processing and distribution center in October, Sharp said. Austin's payment of \$5.6 million for September reflected an impressive 20.6 percent increase above the September 1993 payment of \$4.6 million. The city of Fort Worth's rebate of \$3.4 million represented the largest

increase in Texas' six major metro areas, up a whopping 21.3 percent above last September's payment of \$2.8 million. Other East Texas cities which received September sales tax rebates included: • Lufkin, which received a \$439,972.78 payment. Since Jan. 1, this city has collected over \$4.9 million, which is up by 7.7 percent over the same period of 1993. • Zavalla, which received \$1,720.52 payment. Thus far this year, the city has received \$24,653.19 from the tax, an increase of almost 8.7 percent from 1993. • Kountze, which receive an

\$5,077.90 payment. Thus far this year, the city has collected \$86,121.80 from the tax, or 4.9 percent more than the same period of 1993. • Lumberton, which received a \$27,581.26 payment. Since Jan. 1, this city has collected over \$2.7 million, or 8.7 percent more than during the same period of 1993. • Silsbee, which received a \$81,783.35 payment. Thus far this year, the city has collected \$845,774.37 from the tax, or almost 62 percent more than during the same period last year. • Jasper, which received a \$124,838.33 payment. Since Jan. 1, the city has received \$1,186,037.81

from the tax, or over 262 percent more than the same period of 1993. • Kirbyville, which received a \$12,001.26 payment. Thus far this year, the city has collected \$122,563.89 from the tax, or almost 8.7 percent more than the same period of 1993. • Livingston, which received a \$126,701.91 payment. This far this year, the city has received \$1,213,348.85 from the tax, or over 7.9 percent more than the same period last year. • Corrigan, which received a \$8,746.17 payment. Thus far this year, the city has collected \$110,517.86 from the tax, or almost 11.8 percent more than during the same period of 1993.

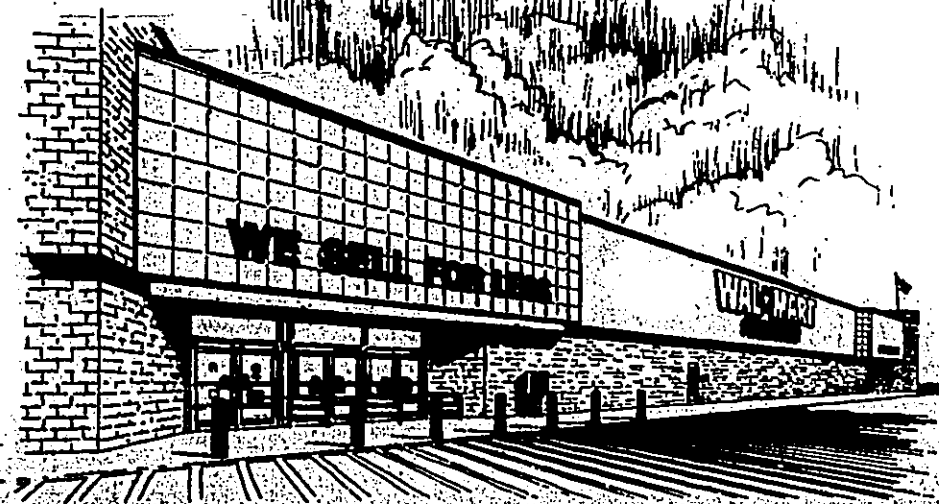

Know terms of division orders when negotiating a mineral lease

COLLEGE STATION—Mineral owners who negotiate an oil and gas lease for exploration of their property should pay particular attention to the treatment of division orders and royalty checks.

Otherwise, a mineral owner could lose not only money but also beneficial lease terms acquired during the negotiation process, cautions Judon Fambrough, senior lecturer and attorney at law with the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University.

A division order may contain provisions that do not comply with the original lease terms but that can never permanently amend or supplant the lease.

Says Fambrough, "Division orders are revocable agreements signed by the mineral owner directing the distribution of proceeds from the sale of oil, gas, casinghead gas or their related products."

"A division order is a sales contract and insures that the proper parties or owners are paid the correct amounts by the exploring company," says Fambrough. "However, because division orders are not issued until production begins, the mineral owner may be unfamiliar with the terms."

Lead poisoning widespread

AUSTIN—Are your children being poisoned in their own home? They may be suffering from lead poisoning without showing any symptoms. Lead poisoning is a widespread problem that affects people from all socioeconomic groups, geographic areas, and racial or ethnic populations. Children are especially susceptible to lead poisoning.

Several causes of lead poisoning exist. Lead-based paint is the most dangerous and widespread.

Although lead has been banned in house paint since the 1970s, it remains a hazard in older homes or homes that are being renovated. Children are poisoned when the ingested paint chips containing lead. Lead paint also is used in painted steel structures, such as bridges and expressways. Lead-contaminated dust and soil is another source of lead in the environment.

Lead paint and dust are the major sources of lead poisoning, but others exist.

The level of lead in air has been significantly reduced with the elimination of leaded gasoline, but inhalation remains a cause of lead poisoning.

Other sources include water, food, and occupations or hobbies involving lead, such as construction work or working with stained glass. It also is found in some traditional or folk medicines and in some cosmetics.

Lead poisoning can be a serious medical problem. The ideal blood lead concentration is zero, but even small levels can be dangerous.

If you think your child may suffer from lead poisoning, see your physician. He or she may recommend a blood test and can tell you more about prevention and treatment.

Woodville High targets discipline problems

WOODVILLE — Recent changes at Woodville High School find the faculty and students involved in a campaign to reclaim a disciplined well-organized approach to education.

"This no-nonsense stance is unusual in a society which often questions acceptance of rules and regulations," commented Dr. Tom Harvey, principal. "We are determined to have safe halls, safe classrooms, and respectful students actively learning every day of the school year," added the principal.

A major change in the discipline management plan finds that the school has created an "alternative school" that will meet in the evenings from 5-9 p.m. The school was created based on a student recommendation to have an alternative to expulsion.

According to Preston Broom, assistant principal, the alternative school option allows for a "tightening up of acceptable standards of conduct." Students who cannot function within the framework of a regular school setting will be required by compulsory attendance laws to attend school in a confined, restrictive and tight-fisted atmosphere. Other districts in the county have joined in the support of the concept.

Pay telephones have also been removed from the halls. Students who need to make emergency phone calls must use the phone of the vice principal, who monitors the calls and keeps a log.

Opening the doors on history

WOODVILLE — A piece of local history moved into place at Heritage Village Museum last week as two handsome 10 foot wooden doors that once opened into Sullivan's Hardware found a new home in the entrance to the Village Vidette newspaper office.

According to Fred Sullivan, who donated the doors, they were one of three sets that were inset between display windows across the front of the original structure built by S.H. Reed between 1900 and 1905. In the 1930's, the bay windows gave way to progress and the widening of Bluff Street, but the doors remained in place, changing color with each repainting of the building that housed several different businesses over the years.

When Sam and Quade Sullivan bought the building in February, 1992, moving their hardware business from North Magnolia, it housed a grocery store run by Roy Pace.

Over the next 20 some years, the doors were removed one set at a time, during three different remodelings, Sullivan said. But never did he see those doors unpainted and beautifully finished as they are today at the Village.

The gleaming wood is elegant setting for the original brass hardware.

The Village Vidette building will be dedicated from this site at noon on Saturday, Oct. 15, during the Village's 7th Annual Harvest Festival.

At this time U.S. Rep. Charles Wilson will pay tribute to the Big Thicket National Preserve, which celebrates its 20th Anniversary on Oct. 29 and to "Ma Thicket" Ethel Osborn Hill, whose early writings and dedication helped lead the preserve to its current status.

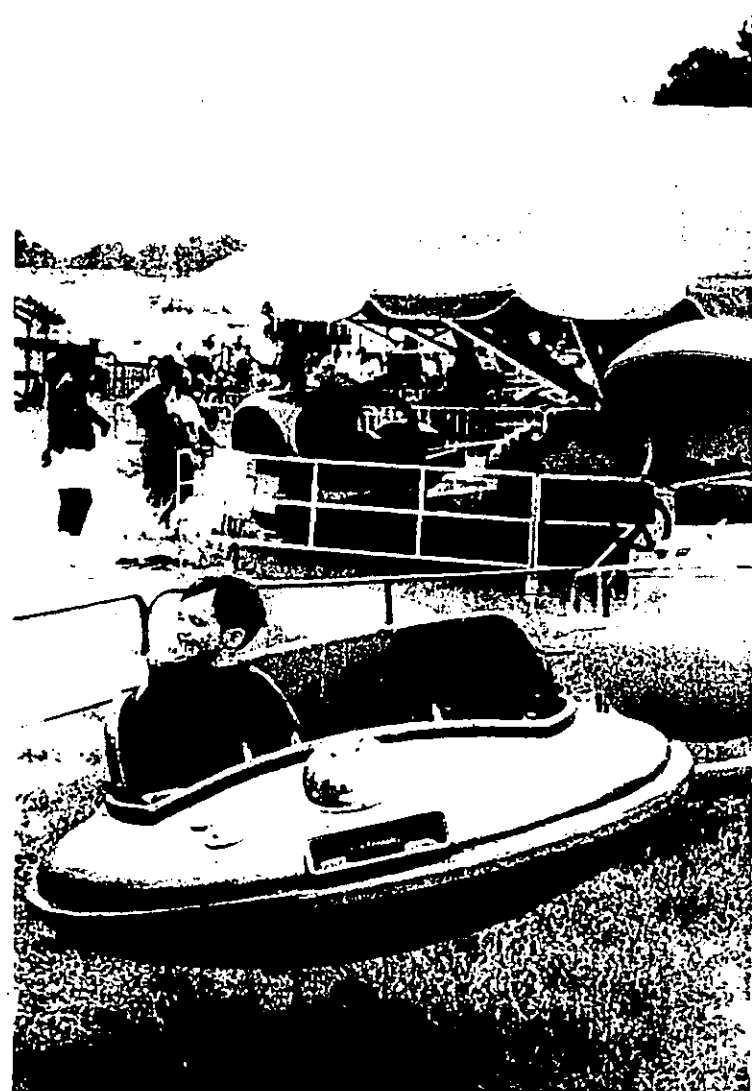

Hunter education class slated in Colmesneil

COLMESNEIL — A Texas Parks and Wildlife Department approved hunter education course will be conducted Oct. 8-9 at the Colmesneil High School agricultural building.

Classes will meet from 8 a.m. to noon and 1-4 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 8 and from 1-4 p.m. on Sunday, Oct. 9. Attendance both days is necessary to receive the minimum 10 hours of instruction required by the mandatory hunter education law.

All Texas hunters born on or after Sept. 2, 1971 must successfully complete the course to hunt. Minimum age for certification is 12 years. Hunters under 12 years of age can hunt only under direct supervision of a licensed hunter over 17 years of age.

Hunters between 12 and 17 years of age must either complete the course or hunt under direct supervision of a licensed hunter over 17 years of age.

A certification fee of \$5 is required to take the course which will be taught by certified hunter education instructors Don Barker and Craig Rogers. Additional information on the course may be obtained by calling Barker at 283-3210.

According to Sharp, Texas cities received \$115.5 million for their September sales tax payments, up 9.2 percent from the \$105.7 million for September 1993. Counties were sent \$12.8 million, a 9.4 percent increase over last year's \$11.7 million.

This month's payments include taxes collected on July sales and reported to the comptroller in August by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

The city of Houston received \$12.5 million, the largest sales tax rebate for September and a 2.6 percent increase over the \$11.1 million rebate for the same period last year.

Houston gained 6,900 construction jobs since July 1993, marking that sector's largest employment gains since late 1990, Sharp said.

The \$10.2 million September payment to Dallas was up 9.7 percent from the \$9.3 million for the same period last year.

The Dallas area again showed strong economic growth, adding 71,000 new jobs, more than any other major metro area in the state, Sharp added.

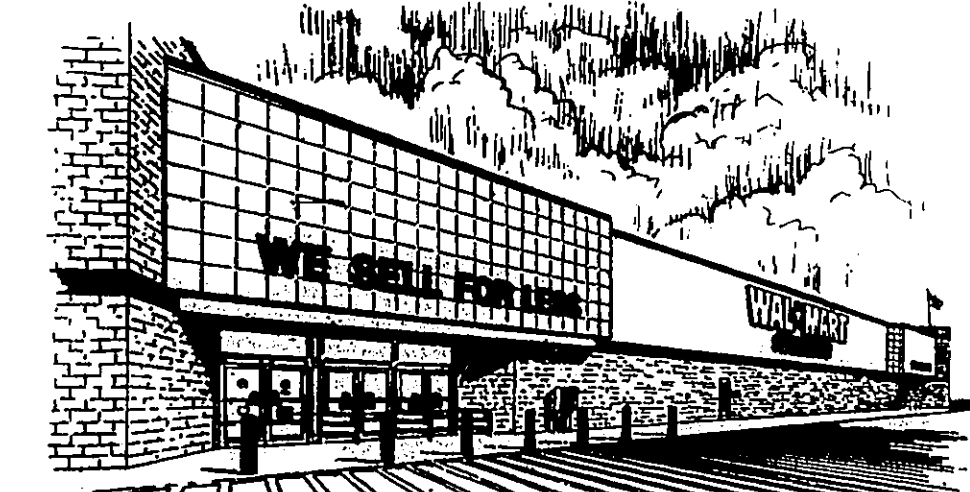
