

Federal law helps fight mail fraud

LUFKIN — A law to combat mail scams, called the Deceptive Mailings Prevention Act, gives the United States Postal Service (USPS) specific power to stop delivery of certain mail solicitations.

Under this authority, mailings promoting the purchase of goods or services, or asking for donations, will not be delivered by the USPS if the public might reasonably be misled into believing that the mailing comes from the Government or is somehow approved by the Government.

The law says that any envelope (or the face of any postcard) that includes a name, seal, insignia, term, or symbol that could reasonably be mistaken for a Government-issued mailing will not be delivered unless it also has a prominent "disclaimer." The disclaimer must appear on the envelope or face of the postcard and must clearly state that the mailing is not from or endorsed by the Government.

Many companies use "Social Security" or "Medicare" as a "come-on" to get people toward their advertisements. Even worse, some of these ads appear to try to deliberately mislead the public into thinking they have to respond to their mailing. Social Security or Medicare benefits.

Students plan cross-country solar drive

BEAUMONT — Some Lamar University-Beaumont engineering students are planning on driving approximately 1,100 miles cross-country with a car that gets 1,100 miles per zero gallons of gas.

Not as radical an idea as it sounds. The project is part of Sunrayce '95, an educational program sponsored by the Department of Energy and General Motors. The solar powered automobile will be designed, built and driven by Lamar students from the mechanical engineering department. Other Lamar students interested in solar power automobiles will also participate.

The biannual cross country race features student designed single passenger cars. The objectives are to promote efficient use of energy and to raise the confidence in renewable sources of energy.

The design competition is open to all colleges, universities, trade schools and other post-secondary educational institutions in North America.

Membership in the Lamar project is voluntary, but encouraged by the faculty. Dr. Darren Habitz, assistant professor of mechanical engineering, is working with the students.

The primary goals of the Lamar Sunrayce are to educate students in learning experience, to have fun and to win the race.

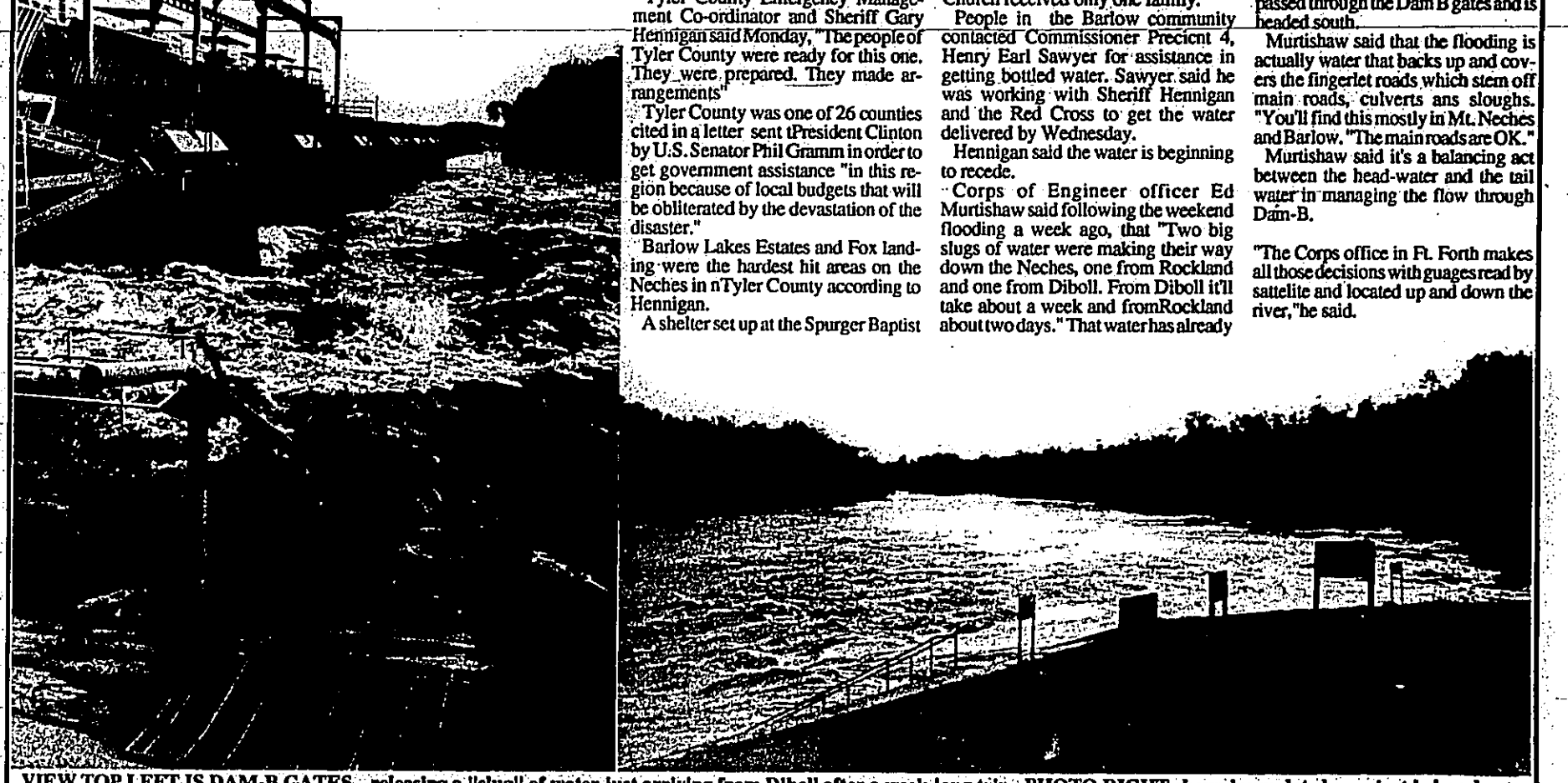

Flood water spares county, 'The people were prepared'

WOODVILLE — Tyler County Emergency Management Co-ordinator and Sheriff Gary Hentigan said Monday, "The people of Tyler County were ready for this one. They were prepared. They made arrangements."

Tyler County was one of 26 counties cited in a letter sent President Clinton by U.S. Senator Phil Gramm in order to get government assistance "in this region because of local budgets that will be obliterated by the devastation of the disaster."

Barlow Lakes Estates and Fox Landing were the hardest hit areas on the Neches in Tyler County according to Hentigan. A shelter set up at the Spurger Baptist Church received only one family.

People in the Barlow community contacted Commissioner Precinct 4, Henry Earl Sawyer for assistance in getting bottled water. Sawyer said he was working with Sheriff Hentigan and the Red Cross to get the water delivered by Wednesday.

Hentigan said the water is beginning to recede. "The Corps of Engineer Officer Ed Murishaw said following the weekend flooding a week ago, that "Two big slugs of water were making their way down the Neches, one from Rockland and one from Diboll. From Diboll it'll take about a week and from Rockland about two days." That water has already passed through the Dam B gates and is headed south.

One dead in Hwy 190 fatality

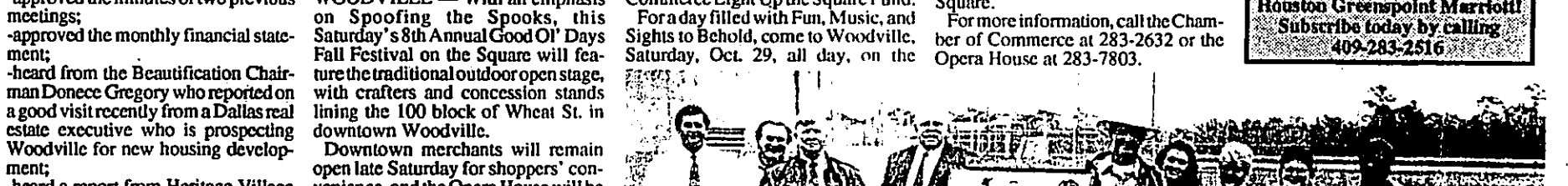
WOODVILLE — A one-car wreck claimed the life of a 43-year-old Kingwood man Saturday after he was involved in a car rollover crash Friday about 6 miles east on Hwy 190.

Nelson, T. Dennis, was pronounced dead at 8:22 p.m. at John Sealy Hospital in Galveston. Reports indicate his alcohol level was .40. The legal limit is .01.

According to Department of Public Safety officer reports, the victim was apparently swerving to miss a dog in the road. However, the DPS investigating officer pulled a 1.75 liter of bottled alcohol from the wreckage as the patient was being transported to Tyler County Hospital.

The accident occurred at about 1 p.m. with a rescue team equipped with Jaws of Life necessary to cut away the top of the red Ford Explorer station wagon.

Airplane crash victim

Dear Editor:

Five weeks ago, I was rescued from my crashed airplane high up in an oak tree near the Tyler County Airport. I now wish to publicly and sincerely thank all of the wonderful people and agencies that saved me. There were many people involved, some of which I don't know their names, but when I become mobile again, I intend to meet each one personally.

My sister, Mary Nichols, realized I was missing and called her pastor, Bill Swearingen, who then called Sheriff Gary Hemming. Sheriff Hemming organized a massive search and rescue effort, consisting of:

- 1) The Customs Department, which provided a helicopter and an airplane for the night search.
- 2) Attorney Walter Umphrey, who provided his personal helicopter for the morning search. The pilot was a deputy sheriff and Sheriff Hemming rode as spotter. It was he who first spotted me.
- 3) The deputies, Sam Bible and Otis Wigley, climbed the tree, rigged me in a rescue jacket, mounted a pulley in a higher branch and controlled my descent to good old terra firma.
- 4) The EMT's from Transair, Silsbee, J. Stanford and S. Wirth, who provided the rescue and medical attention.
- 5) The Woodville firemen, who brought in the extension ladder, rope and pulley.
- 6) The Texas DPS men and other sheriff's department men who carried me out of the woods.
- 7) The game warden who brought his 4x4 truck to the crash site and transported me to the St. Elizabeth's helicopter.

To all of you, thank you for saving my life. I know I can never repay all you wonderful people, so I'll just say, I will try to help others when they are in trouble.

Pig's death was unnecessary

I would just like to know what kind of PFA we are running at Woodville High School. I was one of the many who were asked to witness the heinous and watch the FFA student who murdered his pig Friday, Sept. 30, at the Tyler County Fair.

For anyone who was there, let me just tell you what I saw. It was during the twice weigh-in Friday night, and this student was the one of us weighing in. When they weighed his pig, it was a few pounds light, which meant he had to wait to show his pig unless in the next 20 minutes I gained a few pounds. So, this young boy and about four of his buddies take his pig over to the water trough and let the hog's throat until water starts coming out it's nose and pig's eyes roll back in its head.

These boys then rolled this pig back over to weigh in and that poor animal weighed 10 pounds more than it did before. Everybody was appalled that this boy was allowed to be crowned and that the FFA teacher stood by and let this happen.

I am sorry to witness this animal after they put it in its pen, eyes still back in its head; and by now its back legs still and obviously suffering. The boy was about to die, he had been so worried and started squeezing the pig, trying to get some of the water out, as he was told to do. He was laughing and cackling. I heard one of them say, "Aw it's just got a little gas."

I never once saw the FFA teacher come to the aid of his student. I don't believe this was tolerated and I was stunned to see that this same boy was able to continue to compete in the activities of the fair. Something should be done to this boy, and most especially, something should be done to the FFA teacher who allowed it all to happen. I feel this is a prime example of why our children are like they are. If adults around them are so cruel and unconcerned about things, why should they be any different?

You may have seen me around town in a white "cowboy" hat. It's not all for show, though I confess it is a little bit of a show. I wear it. But I spend a lot of time out there. I've had a couple of skin cancers, and the docs threaten me with leprosy or worse if I don't bathe in sunscreen before I stick my head out the door. I settle for a hat.

It's funny, in a way. When I was really punching cattle, neither I nor any of my ranching family would have been seen dead in a ditch wearing "cowboy" dufs. We had a horror of ostentation in any form. Big hats and polynesian boots were the sign of a drugstore cowboy in our eyes. But now I don't much care what people think of my outfit.

Mild you, we could have used wide-brim hats, chaps, and high-top boots back then. We did a lot of hard riding in the years right after the war. Our herd of 500 white-faces had run almost wild while the young men were away. We had to round them up, earmark and brand them, and castrate the bulls we weren't going to keep for breeding. Besides the long days of riding, there was plenty of steer wrestling, bulldogging, and even some roping. Yippee - yi - ay!

I might have barked in the adulthood most folks felt toward cowboys if anybody like that had been watching. But was the greenhorn in that bunch. My grandfather and uncle Bill had been doing it most of their lives. The black ranch hands who worked for Papa were moderate glory, and all they could see was daylight between my britches and the saddle. But I learned a pretty good, and won an area tournament later on.

Learning to fly jet fighters was another hustle. I had gone back into the Air Force after graduating from Tulane in '49. Flew a tour of combat in Korea, but still in P-51's with systems and props. By then every thing was going to jets. I had to go back to Square One in some respects.

And the best goes on. Lots more learning curves along the way - but now I'm a farmer with four acres to take care of. So what am I hearing? A tractor tractor, that's what. I'm not complaining. It keeps me young - so far.

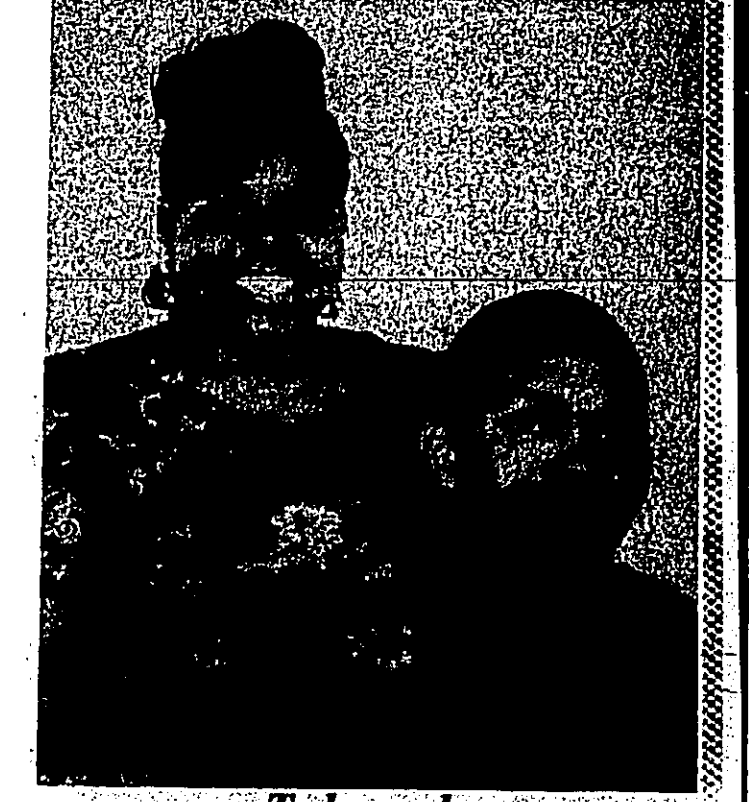

Warren Elementary wins 'Significant Gain' award

AUSTIN — Warren Elementary School has been named as one of only 391 schools campuses across Texas to win a 1993-94 Texas Successful Schools Award System (TSSAS) Significant Gains Award. According to Criss Clout, executive associated Commissioners for the Texas Education Agency, a total of 6,152 campuses were eligible for consideration for the award. 

The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 8; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecurring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecurring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$8.00), Call Transfer Disconnect feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing I feature (\$6.35 to \$8.00). All current PLEXAR I customers will have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, switching to the new restructured PLEXAR I service, or switching to PLEXAR II service with ten or more lines.

The proposed PLEXAR II restructuring will, among other things: (1) change the tariffed offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 56% of the present worth of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR II customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR II service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in certain situations.

An old-fashioned blacksmith's shop, a replica of the cab of a fire truck, and a high-wheeled logging cart once used by an East Texas lumber company are just a few of the exhibits found inside the facility on Alkisson Drive off Loop 287 West.

On the surrounding grounds of the museum, visitors can tour a railroad depot, a full-sized logging train, and see some old-fashioned logging equipment.

There is no charge for admission to the museum, although donations are accepted. For more information, call 409/632-5533.

Beside Loop 287 on Lufkin's southeast side, visitors will find home-grown vegetables and plants at the Angelina County Farmer's Market, considered to be one of the best of its kind in Texas. To get to the facility, take the US 69 exit off the loop. The market is located on the north side of the intersection. Booths are rented to area producers. The market is open from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday, year round. There is plenty of parking and a covered gazebo for outdoor events. For more information about the market, call 409/634-0555.

The Museum of East Texas, located near downtown Lufkin, is open six days a week and features different art exhibits throughout the year.

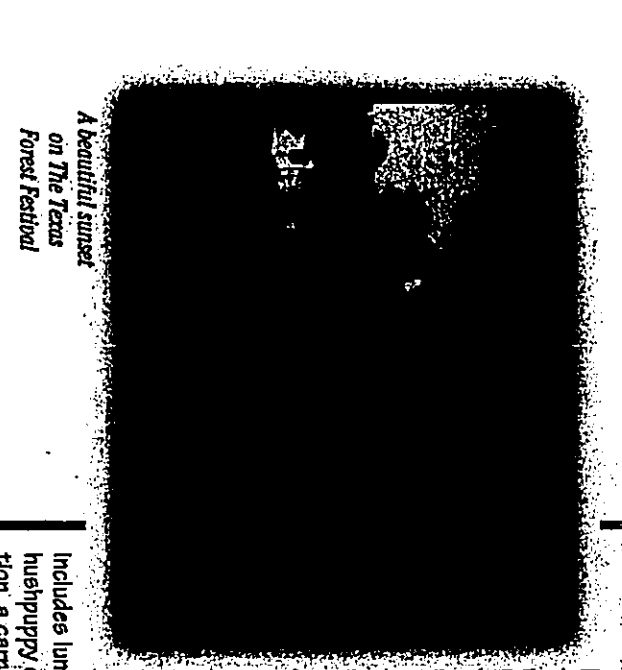
Another excellent art exhibit is found in the Lufkin City Hall. There, a collection of western art donated to the city by Dr.

Federal law helps fight mail fraud

LUFKIN — A law to combat mail scams, called the Deceptive Mail Prevention Act, gives the United States Postal System (USPS) specific power to stop delivery of certain mail solicitations.

Under this authority, mailings promoting the purchase of goods or services, or asking for donations, will not be delivered by the USPS if the public might reasonably be misled into believing that the mailing comes from the Government or is somehow approved by the Government.

The law says that any envelope (or the face of any postcard) that includes a name, seal, insignia, term, or symbol that could reasonably be mistaken for a Government-issued mailing will not be delivered unless it also has a prominent "disclaimer." The disclaimer must appear on the envelope (or face of the postcard) and must clearly state that the mailing is not from or endorsed by the Government.

Many companies use "Social Security" or "Medicare" as a "come-on" to get people to read their versions. Even worse, some of these ads appear to be deliberately mislead the public into thinking they have to respond or they might lose Social Security or Medicare benefits.

What should you do if you get mail that seems to be from the government, but actually isn't? You can either take it to your local post office, or you can call the Postal Inspector, United States Postal Service, 475 L'Enfant Plaza, S.W., Washington, DC 20269-2100.

If you want to lodge a complaint, it's important that you forward everything you received, including any envelope or wrapper. Also, be sure to include your name and address, the nature of your concern about the mailing, and the date you got it in the mail. All of the information will help the Postal Inspector take action.

Citizens desiring Social Security information are urged to contact their nearest Social Security office or call the toll-free number 1-800-772-1213. All Social Security information is free.

Students plan cross-country solar drive

Efficient use of energy and to raise the confidence in renewable sources of energy.

The design competition is open to all colleges, universities, trade schools and other post-secondary educational institutions in North America.

Membership in the Lamar project is voluntary, but encouraged by the faculty. Dr. Darren Haberz, assistant professor of mechanical engineering, is working with the students.

The primary goals of the Lamar Sunrayse Team are to participate in a learning experience, to have fun and to speakman for the team.

To do this, the race vehicle must be both cost effective and energy efficient. To keep the cost down, the group is doing all the design work and construction in-house.

The construction of a prototype is now underway, and scheduled to be completed in October. Final construction will be completed over the Christmas break.

The qualifying race days are June 16-18, 1995. Sixty-five teams have entered and will be narrowed to 40 entries for the final race. To qualify, each car must

complete a rigorous inspection process called "scrubbing," then complete 50 miles around a closed course at an average speed of 25 miles per hour.

One of the main concerns of the Lamar team is cost. An estimated \$75,000 is needed for materials, batteries, solar array, food and travel for the support team. The team will be doing fundraising from now until the project is complete. The project is not funded by the university.

The Sunrayse 95 event will begin on June 20, 1995 in Indianapolis, Indiana and terminate in Golden, Colorado. All vehicles will race in daylight hours, beginning at 10 a.m. and hope to average about 14 miles per day. The winner will be the solar car with the lowest cumulative elapsed time in completing the official course.

Some of the specifics included in the race rules are, sunlight or solar radiation is the only source of power allowed for propulsion. Only commercially available American-made solar cells and lead-acid batteries may be used. Battery weight is limited to 300 pounds. Solar cells, a horn, turn indicators, tail lights and a rear vision system must be functional for safety.

BEAUMONT — Some Lamar University-Beaumont engineering students are planning on driving approximately 1,100 miles cross-country with a car that gets 1,100 miles per gallon of gas.

Not as radical an idea as it sounds. The project is part of Sunrayse '95, an educational program sponsored by the Department of Energy and General Motors. The solar powered automobile will be designed, built and driven by Lamar students from the mechanical engineering department. Other Lamar students interested in solar power automobiles will also participate.

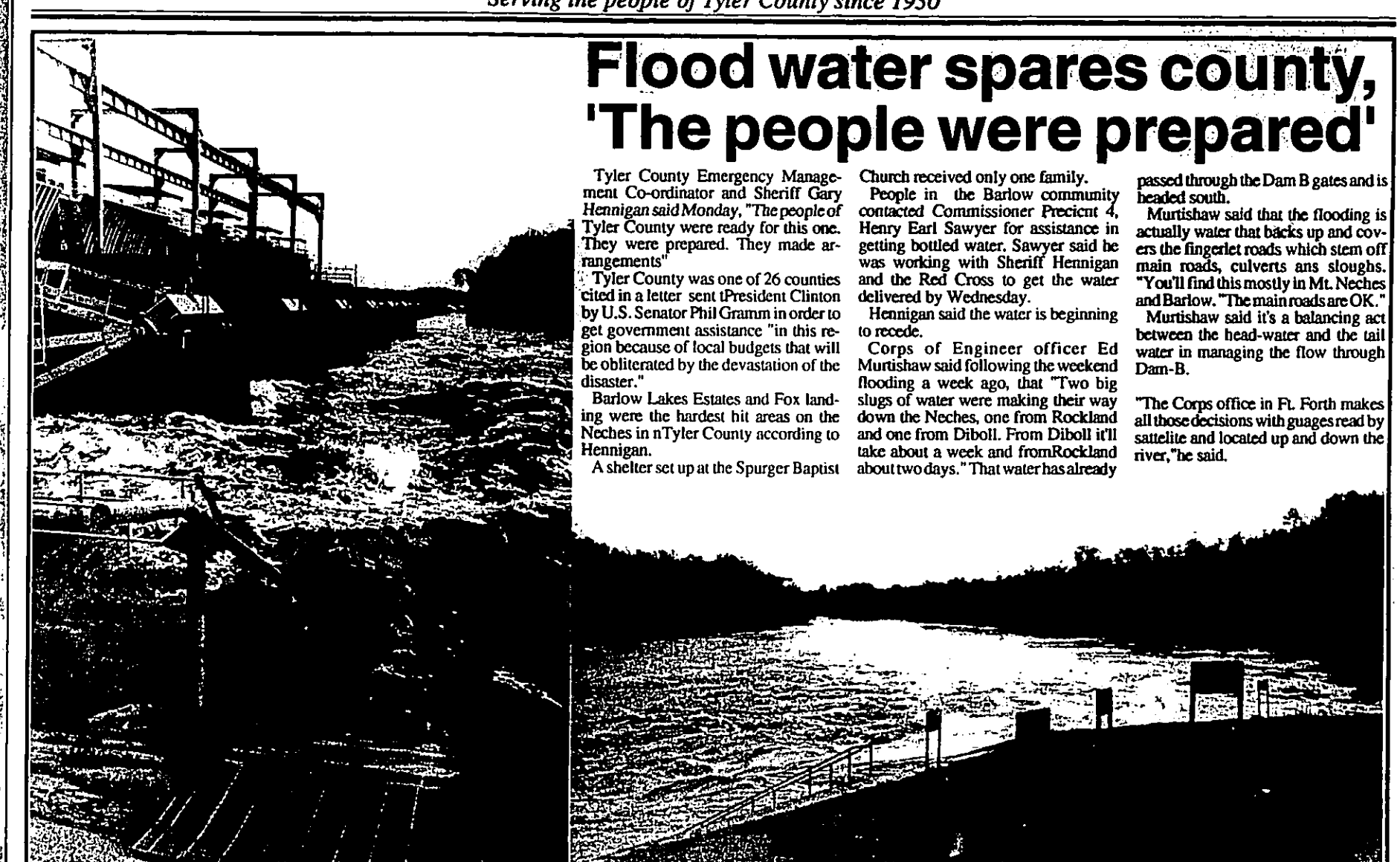

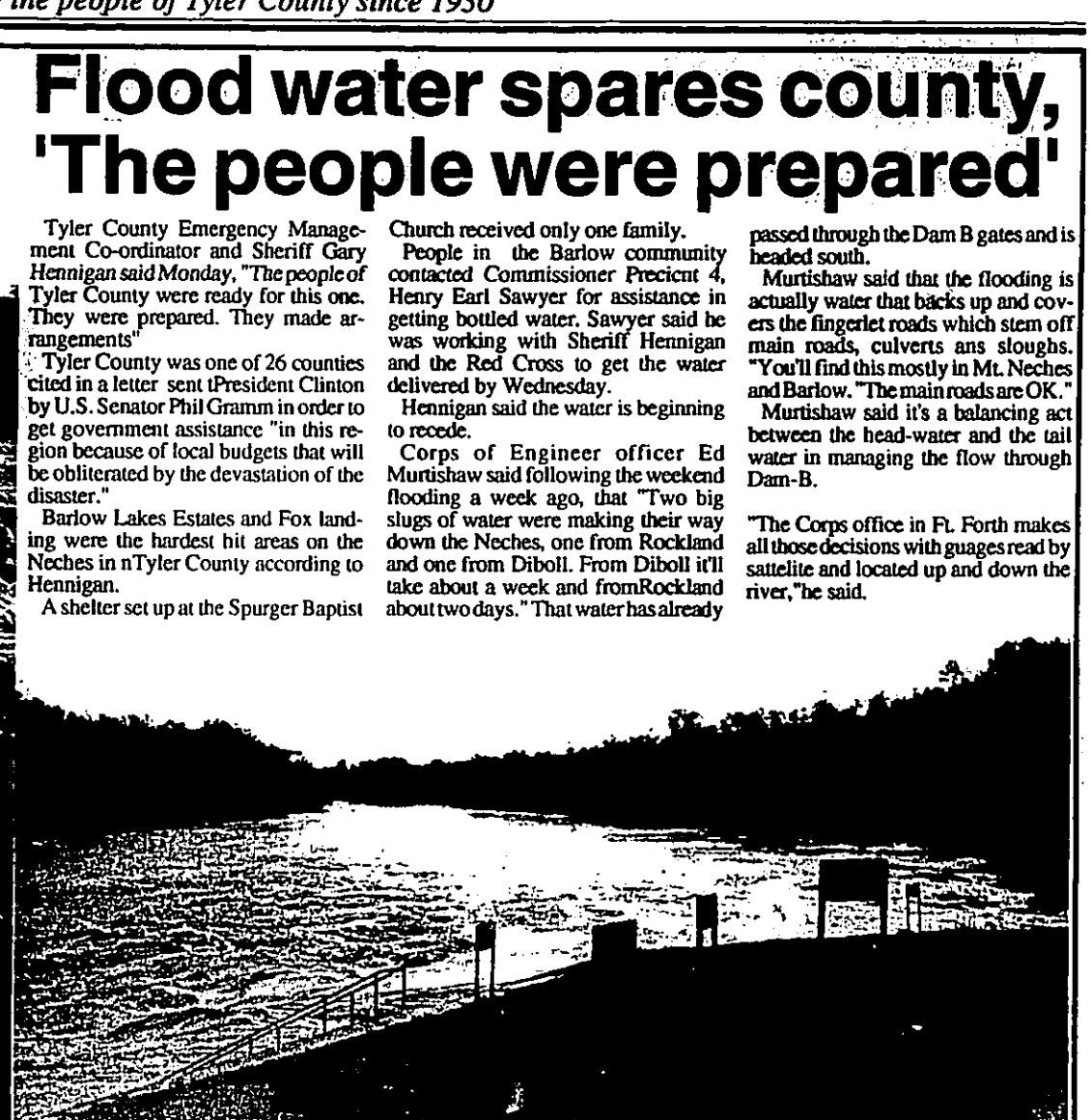


PHOTO RIGHT shows inundated area just below dam.

Entergy/GSU awards Chamber \$4,500 total of two grants

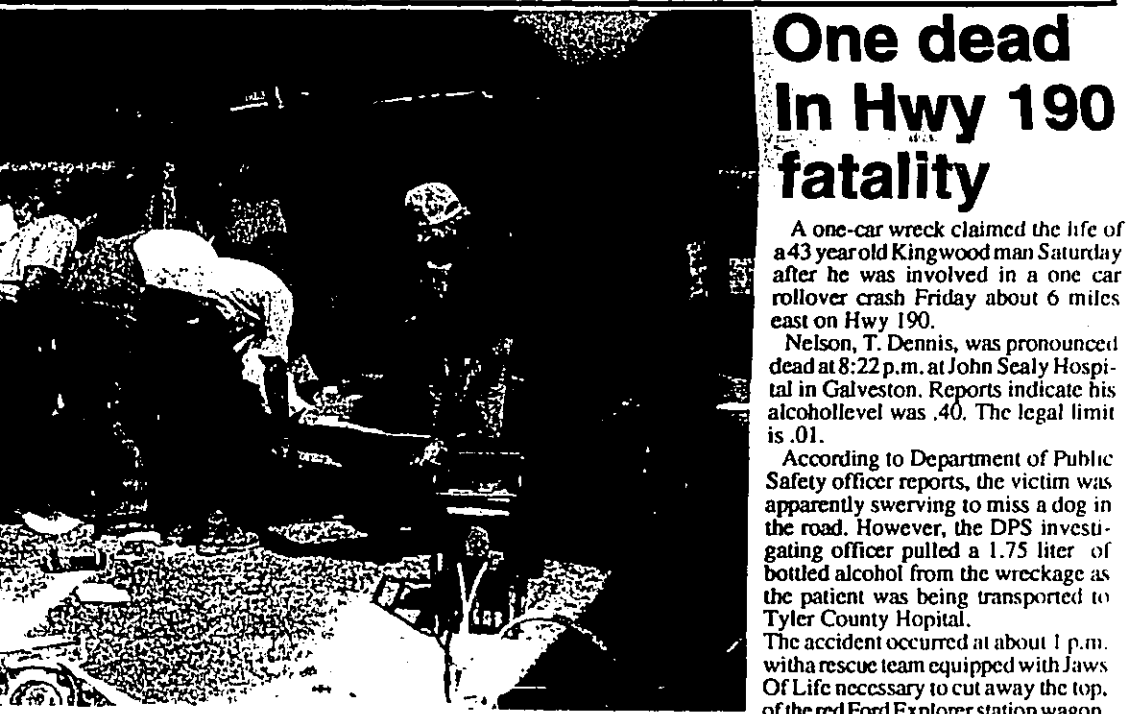

Tyler County Sports Woodville's playoff picture dims

WOODVILLE - Woodville's 21-19 heartbreak loss to SFA Austin last Friday night dims their hopes of making it to the District 24-3A playoffs next month.

It is now out of their hands, and their only hope of making it to the playoffs rests on Kirbyville and Newton defeating SFA. The Eagles would also have to be the victors in their two final matches, against Warren this Friday night, and over Orangefield next Friday.

This game against SFA was a tremendously emotional game, we were ready to play. It was a do or die game, and a very tough loss. We played well enough to win, but it just didn't fall for us," said Woodville's Head Coach Craig McGallion about last week's game.

Woodville's quarterback Larry Thomas pulled the Eagles within two points with a one yard touchdown run with 1:54 left on the clock, but SFA's defensive end player Johnny Colunga hit Thomas in the backfield on the conversion attempt, stopping the Eagles from tying up this crucial district game.

Thomas had a tremendous night of play, after the SFA Eagles had shut down the running game of the Woodville team, completing 15 of 33 passes for 242 yards, and credited for two touchdowns, one on a one - yard run, and one with a 24 yard pass to Kendrick Beatty in the end zone.

SFA's special teams has a history of spreading out their opponents, and making big plays for this top rated team, but the Eagles only allowed them 16 yards in Woodville last week, due to the outstanding efforts of Craig Lewis, Trevor Odum, and Kevin Adams.

While the SFA team did jump the Eagles early on, McGallion is rightfully "proud of his defense," noting especially the performances of Charlie McCullough who had 14 tackles and an interception for a touchdown, James Ivy with 11 tackles, and Frank Systesine who jammed for nine.

Dale Tinsley, who was moved to the defensive line due to injuries incurred earlier on, has really come into his own, and also played a great game as linebacker last week according to Coach McGallion.

The Eagles will be traveling to Warren next week to play their neighbors, the Warriors in their "Homecoming" game. The Homecoming festivities for Warren were originally scheduled for last week during the game against Orangefield, but were re-scheduled due to the flooding that closed the Warren school district last week.

"This will be an important game for us, as I know it will be for the Warriors," said McGallion, "maybe the fact that we are going to be playing our neighbors will help the boys to get over this tough defeat to SFA, and give us the emotional factor that we need to bounce back."

After the SFA Eagles had developed their 14-0 lead in the first quarter, the Woodville Eagles shut them down, not allowing any more offensive points from this team who boasts a 43 point average this season.

SFA's only score in the second, third or fourth quarters came from their defense, after recovering a fumble Woodville's 14-0 lead in the first quarter.

The SFA team is said to have the best defense in the district, but the Eagles managed to adjust after SFA had shut down their running game, to score three touchdowns, and make this game a close contest.

Play action started out with SFA scoring on a 24-yard run by Ken Gordon, that capped off a 48-yard drive in the middle of the first quarter.

The Eagles fielded the kick-off following on the 23 yard TD pass that received, putting the Eagles back in the game with 8:20 left on the clock.

The Eagles kicked for the extra point and it was no good, but a flag was thrown on the play and the penalty fell against SFA for being caught offside.

This brought the Eagles in to the one and a half, and they decided to go for the two-point conversion. Thomas fired to Beatty, who was hit from behind as the pass hit and fell incomplete.

The Eagles shut down retaliation efforts, and regained possession on their own 43.

A 15 yard pass complete to Mitchell and a nine yard pass to Beatty brought play to the 33 where Thomas picked up another three on the run, and another Eagle first down.

Another pass to Mitchell followed, bringing play from the 30 all the way in to SFA's eight yard line. Jackson scrambled on a sweep to the left, and the Eagles were looking at third and goal from the three. Jackson picked up another two on a dive, and Thomas dove from the one on fourth down for the Eagles second touchdown, narrowing SFA's lead to 21-19.

Unfortunately for the Woodville Eagles, this is where Colunga sacked Thomas as earlier reported, shutting down the Eagles attempt to convert and tie up this ball game.

Kickoff next week will be at 7:30 in Warren, but come early to catch the Warren school's homecoming festivities.

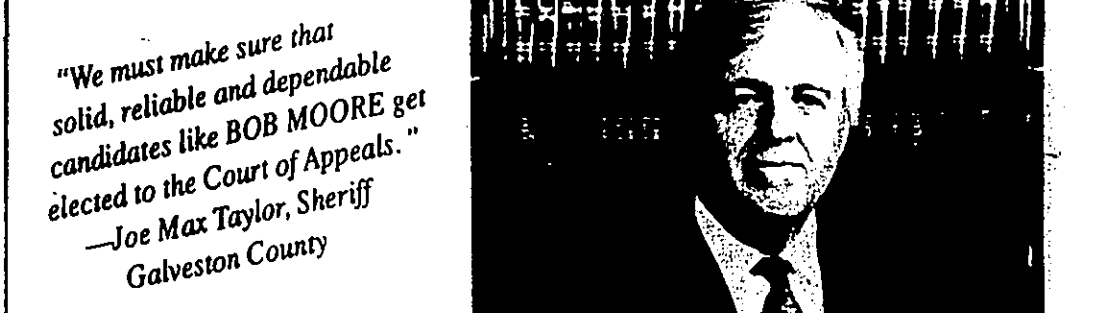

most of his waking hours visiting old sawmill sites, talking with those who lived and worked there and combing through thousands of documents to put together the most comprehensive anthology of sawmill towns and ghost towns ever assembled in East Texas," said John Anderson of Nacogdoches, chairman of the Foundation. "The foundation's commitment to publishing Mr. Block's research represents a significant step toward preserving the rich history of the forest products industry in East Texas," he said.

Anderson said the Foundation will provide copies of the hardbound, 400-page book free to libraries in East Texas and will make a limited number of books available to the public for \$35 per copy. Individuals may purchase copies by contacting Best of East Texas Publishers, P.O. Box 1647, Lufkin, TX 75901, 409/634-7444. Hundreds of sawmill towns prospered in East Texas during lumbering's golden era between the 1860s and 1920s. But when the timber played out, many of the sawmills stilling their saws and moved on, leaving behind vast forests, clusters of clapboard buildings, and remnants of concrete and steel.

Some of the sawmills and towns, however, overcame adversity by replanting their forests and diversifying their product lines. They continue to be viable in the pineywoods today, supported by modern sawmills and other wood-using plants, as well as new forms of economic activity. A World War II veteran and former U.S. Postal Service employee, Block has published two previous books, "A History of Jefferson County, Texas: from Wilderness to Reconstruction" and "Sapphire City of the Neches: A History of Port Neches, Texas." He retired from the U.S. Postal Service after 25 years, including 20 as assistant postmaster at Nederland and as officer-in-charge of the Orange post office. He was also postal director at Lamar University for 10 years, where he received his BA degree in history in 1970 and his MA degree in 1974. He also served as a teaching fellow at Lamar from 1970 to 1977.

The Pineywoods Foundation is a private charitable foundation serving the East Texas area. It has funded a number of projects dealing with the history of East Texas, including a grants program for the placement of Texas Forest markers dealing with the history of the forest products industry. "The message many teens receive both at school and at home is that exercise is 'not that important,'" said Dr. Albert C. Hergenroeder, chief of adolescent medicine and sports medicine at Baylor College of Medicine and Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

Hergenroeder, who regularly does pre-season examinations of high school athletes, has studied exercise and parents can do more to encourage physical activity among students of all ages. "Physical activity levels among teens in school are inadequate," said Hergenroeder, a member of Project PACE (Physician-based Assessment and Counseling for Exercise), a national program examining physical activity guidelines for teenagers. "There are not established national policies on minimum levels for student exercise."

PACE is expected to recommend minimum levels when its findings are completed. Hergenroeder feels personally that adolescents should participate in three or more moderate to vigorous exercise sessions per week. "Hergenroeder also believes that many adolescents find little encouragement at home.

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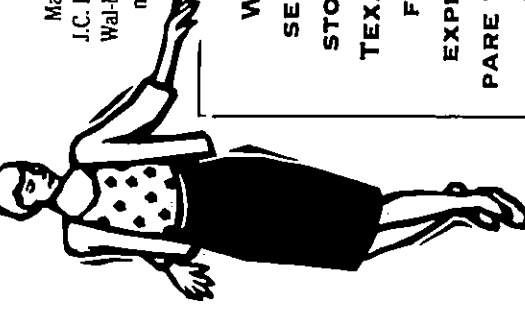

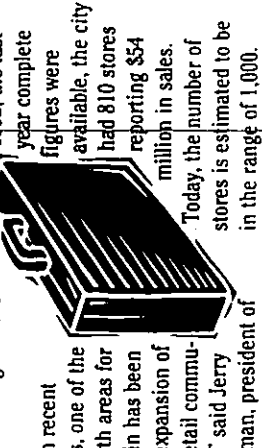

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HEALTHCARE COMMUNITY

Once upon a time in the 1960s, it wasn't uncommon for Deep East Texas residents to travel to Houston or Dallas for specialized medical diagnosis and treatment. Today, that trend is being reversed as more and more Deep East Texans choose Lufkin with increasing frequency, comforted by the proximity of close-to-home, high quality healthcare and significantly lower medical costs.

"The healthcare community here has evolved into one of the most progressive in East Texas," says Bob Bowman, chairman of the Angelina County Chamber of Commerce. "As a result, we're now in a much better position to provide treatments that were once available only in places like Houston. Lufkin's healthcare community has truly been regionalized to serve a wide area of Deep East Texas."

Medical specialties like oncology, endocrinology, nephrology, cardiology and cardiovascular surgery, psychiatry, dermatology, ophthalmology, general and orthopedic surgery and otolaryngology—only a gleam in someone's mind 40 years ago—are available in Lufkin as the city's medical community continues to blossom into one of the largest in East Texas.

Technologies that few people envisioned in 1960—including magnetic resonance imaging, open heart surgery, linear accelerator cancer treatment, and surgery with laser beams—are now commonplace in Lufkin.

Lufkin's two hospitals—Memorial Medical Center of East Texas and Woodland Heights Medical Center—are both full-service, acute-care medical centers with inpatient, outpatient and emergency services. In recent years, both have undertaken significant expansions and added a variety of new diagnostic and treatment facilities. Memorial has developed advanced cancer diagnosis and treatment techniques at its Arthur Temple Sr. Regional Cancer Center and Woodland Heights has instituted a regional heart care program with the capability of open heart surgeries.

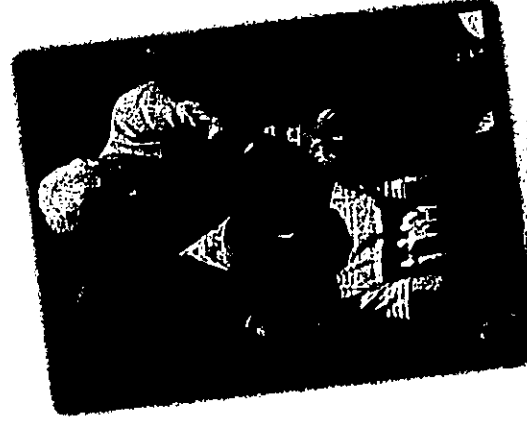
Concurrent with the growth of the two hospitals is the emergence of a number of new and expanded healthcare services throughout the community.

Practices dealing with glaucoma, diabetes and diabetes-related complications—was added to Lufkin's growing specialty practices.

Kidney dialysis services opened in Chestnut Village in addition to the Henderson Dialysis Unit at

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Outpatient rehabilitation facilities have been expanded at Woodland Heights. Memorial expanded its outpatient rehab facility, expanded its Occupational Rehabilitation Center and included an oral classroom for pre-school age deaf children.

Both Memorial and Woodland Heights have initiated significant work in regional industries. Lufkin now has two outpatient surgery centers: East Texas Eye Center and the Center for Sight, which opened in 1983.

Hospice in the Plains offers expanded services for the terminally ill. The Joe W. Elliott House, which provides low-cost overnight lodging for cancer patients and requires no medical insurance, is now available to East Texas residents.

A new Veterans Administration outpatient clinic is now seeing twice as many patients as the facility originally expected. Lufkin has received federal funds for expanded services.
