## Hayride accident a 'close call'; second wreck 3/4 mile away

A church sponsored hay-ride almost turned tragic Saturday at 6 p.m. when the tall, hitch plate on a homemade trailer carrying seven youth on a church outing came loose sending the trailer careening off the road two miles south of Spurger. One 14-year-old boy was airlifted to St. Elizabeth Hospital, in Beaumont, while three others were sent to Silsbee Doctors Hospital and were subsequently treated and released.

Pastor of the Miracle Baptist Church, Webster Gilchrist, 54, was driving the 1984 Buick GMC truck when the trailer belonging to Robert Rogers, of

Warren, came loose. No charges were filed in the incident. Police reports indicate that the trailer came loose ejecting one child who fell under the rig and then had to be taken to Beaumont for treatment.

All the kids are now back in school except one youngster who still has a doctors appointment to keep.

While Department of Public Safety Officers were headed to the Hayride incident, officer Richard Brown drove up on a one-car roll-over accident located 3/4 of a mile from the first accident. This accident occurred at

6:15 p.m. Reports indicate that a 1983 Yellow Subaru driven by Robert E. Hillhouse, 27, ran off the road sliding sideways and then struck a culvert. Charges of "Driving While Intoxicated with serious bodily injury" were filed in connection with the accident.

Matthew Dillard, was also a passenger in the vehicle.

Rescue teams were summoned to both accidents and had trouble determining which one to go to first until authorities could figure out where the teams were needed first.

### Secretary of State says vote early

AUSTIN — Texas Secretary of State Ronald Kirk encourages all registered voters in Texas to take advantage of early voting through Friday, Nov. 4. Election day voting begins at 7 a.m. and ends at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 8.

Texas has 8,641,848 registered voters. Over 500,000 people in the State of Texas registered to vote between August 16 and October 9. "I am pleased that Texas recaptured over half of the voter registrations lost in August. It shows that Texans do take their government seriously and know the significance of taking the first step in the electoral process," Kirk said.

Although Texas experienced a slight decrease from its 1992 registration numbers, voter registration is higher than it has been in the last 20 years for a gubernatorial election. The following is a listing of voter registration in the last five gubernatorial elections: 1990 - 7,701,449; 1986 - 7,287,173; 1982 - 6,414,988; 1978 - 5,681,875 and 1974 - 5,348,393.

### DETCOG supports area grants

JASPER — The Deep East Texas Council of Governments recently gave its support to five East Texas agencies seeking a total of \$2.3 million in grants.

The unanimous support of DETCOG clears the way for these agencies to submit their grant proposals to the proper government agencies overseeing the funding.

The largest grant request is from Corrigan-Camden Independent School District for \$1.45 million. The application will be submitted to the U.S. Department of Education to fund Project C.A.R.E. (Corrigan Advancing Restructuring Education). The program will be implemented over four years and will provide access to high quality education and training to youth in the Corrigan-Camden ISD.

The Lufkin Independent School District is seeking a \$155,775 grant from the U.S. Department of Education for the continuation of the school district's Transitional Bilingual Education Program which focuses instruction on improving use of the English Language and better academic performance in math and science.

A third separate grant being submitted to the U.S. Department of Education is from Stephen F. Austin State

University. The university is seeking \$354,798 for a new interdisciplinary pre-service program to prepare undergraduate and graduate students to work as early intervention specialists.

Two cities, Lufkin and Pineland, are seeking separate grants from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs. The City of Lufkin's application is for \$350,000 to replace 11 miles of asbestos cement well field water lines of the city's water system.

The City of Pineland is seeking \$21,727 to address community development and housing needs such as sewer system, water system, park improvements and a capital improvements program.

## Flood after-effects

"It's a tragic situation, really, if they didn't get notice it would have been as bad as the '89 flood," said Town Bluff Neighborhood Watch Captain Billie Willis Monday of the Neches River flooding at Barlow Lake Estates and the Mt. Neches residential housing additions.

"As it was with notice and with neighbor-helping-neighbor, people were able to get many of their personal possessions out of the flood area," Willis said.

American Red Cross Disaster Service Volunteers Pat Bartley, Mike Baker and Antony Ferrera continued serving 80 to 100 emergency meals and distributing emergency water supplies on a twice-a-day schedule "at the mailboxes" which are located at the entrance area leading into Barlow Lake Estates off Highway 92.

Department of Health and Red Cross officials were instructing all people in the flood affected area including those with regular and artesian water wells to consider all but bottled water contaminated until water tests show otherwise. Water for drinking, cooking, or making ice should be boiled for three to five minutes before use, according to Stevens Water Company.

Texas Department of Health Nurse Beth Thomas, R.N. and Wanda

Standley, C.S.A. III were inoculating residents with tetanus vaccine. Red Cross workers Mr. and Mrs. A.L.

Reynolds of Orange County, CA, were in the Barlow Lakes Addition doing damage assessment in order to qualify residents for temporary housing, food and clothing assistance from the Red Cross. An Eastex EMS ambulance stood on standby in Barlow Lakes having previously carried one family to a Red Cross shelter in Jasper earlier in the flood.

Portions of Barlow Lakes Estates were still flooded as of Monday noon. Federal Emergency Management Assistance Community Relations Officer Louis Soane indicated that at least four miles of private road serving Barlow Lake Estates were severely damaged and impassable and at least one large concrete culvert had been washed out from a road isolating part of Barlow Lakes Addition from access by car.

The flood water reached the tops of the mailboxes at the entrance to Barlow Lakes with access to the entrance area only after a 3/4 mile boat ride from where the road entered the Neches River floodplain. Residents reported as much as six feet of water in houses and trailers.

Soane urges people with flood damage that they must file a report in order to be eligible for government assistance. They may do that by either calling 1-800-462-9029 or by going to the Disaster Assistance

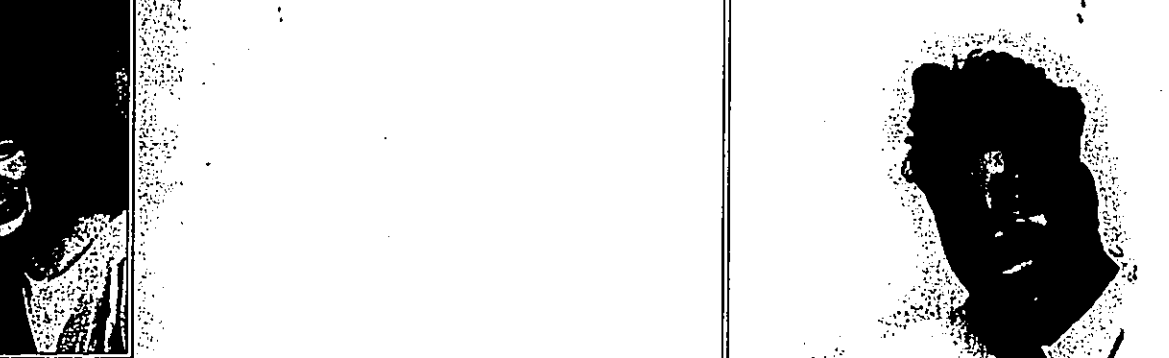

Harris named "Miss Sociology"

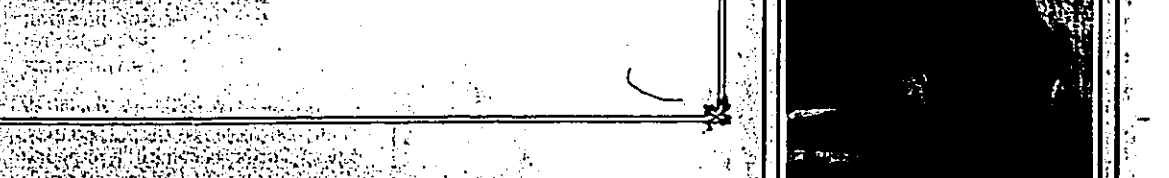

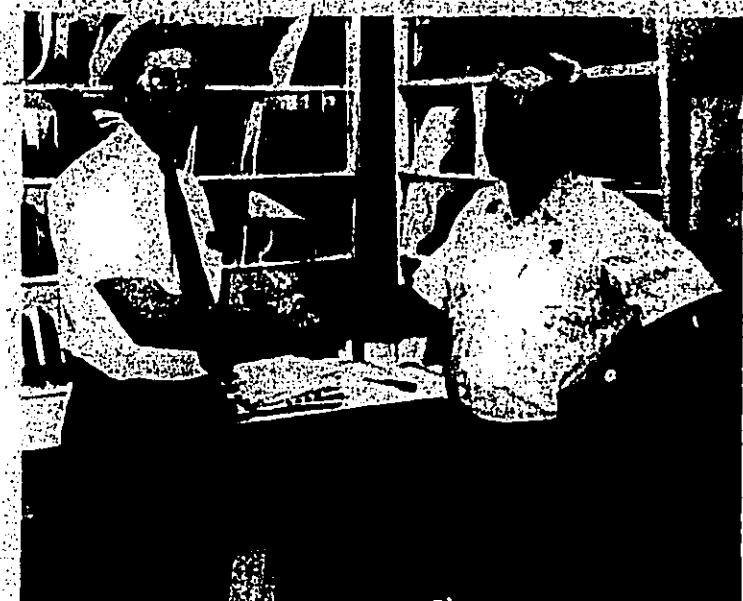

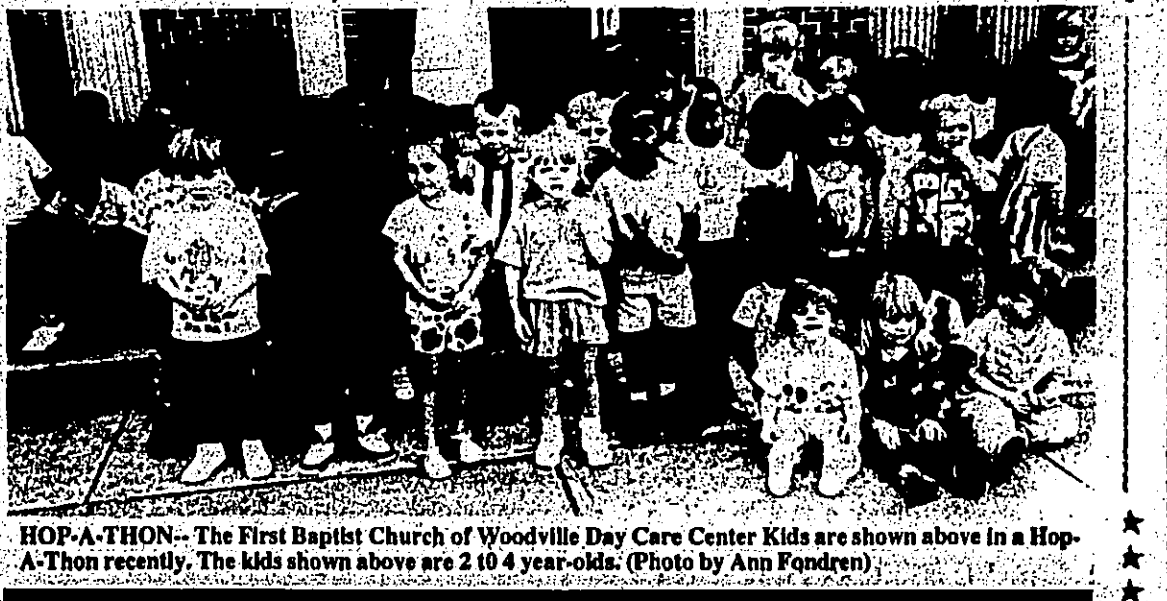

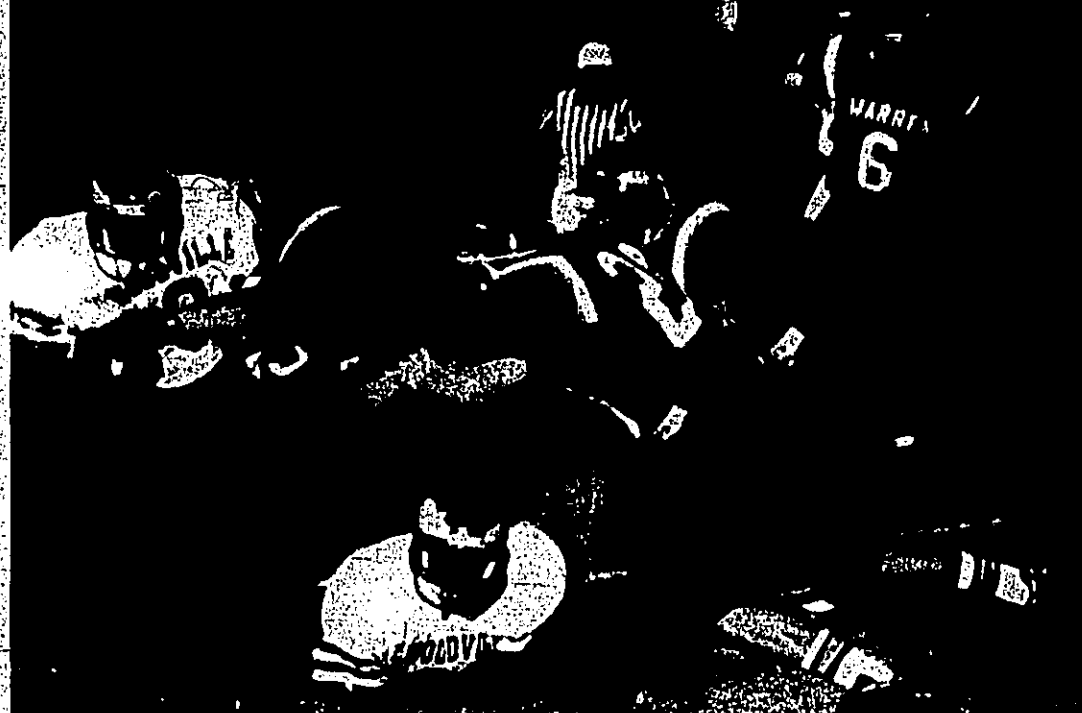

## Credits given for social security work

**LUFKIN** - Some people are confused about work requirements for Social Security benefits. Some associate work credits with the amount of the benefit they will receive.

This is not true. Work credit determines only eligibility for a benefit. Before any Social Security benefits can be paid, a worker must have enough credit for work covered by Social Security to be eligible - or insured, as it is called.

The job itself determines if a worker is covered under the Social Security system. This is set by law and presently at least nine out of every ten jobs are covered. The tax rate itself is also set by congress. However, the base - the amount of earnings that tax is paid on is determined by the national increase in the average wage.

Before any Social Security benefits can be paid, a worker must have enough credit covered by Social Security to be insured. Social Security credits are measured in units called quarters of coverage (QCs). Both wage earners and self-employed people can earn these credits based on their calendar-year earnings.

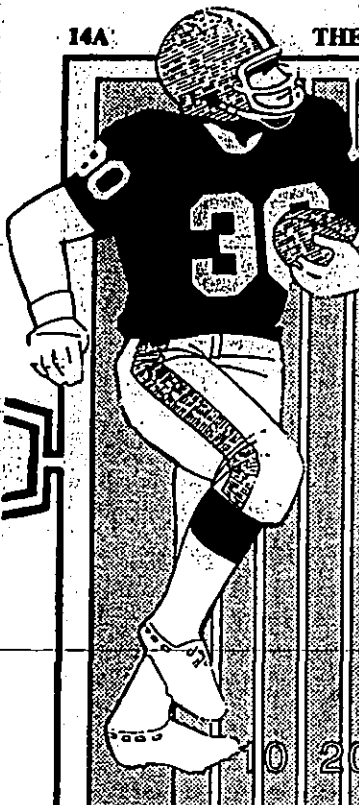

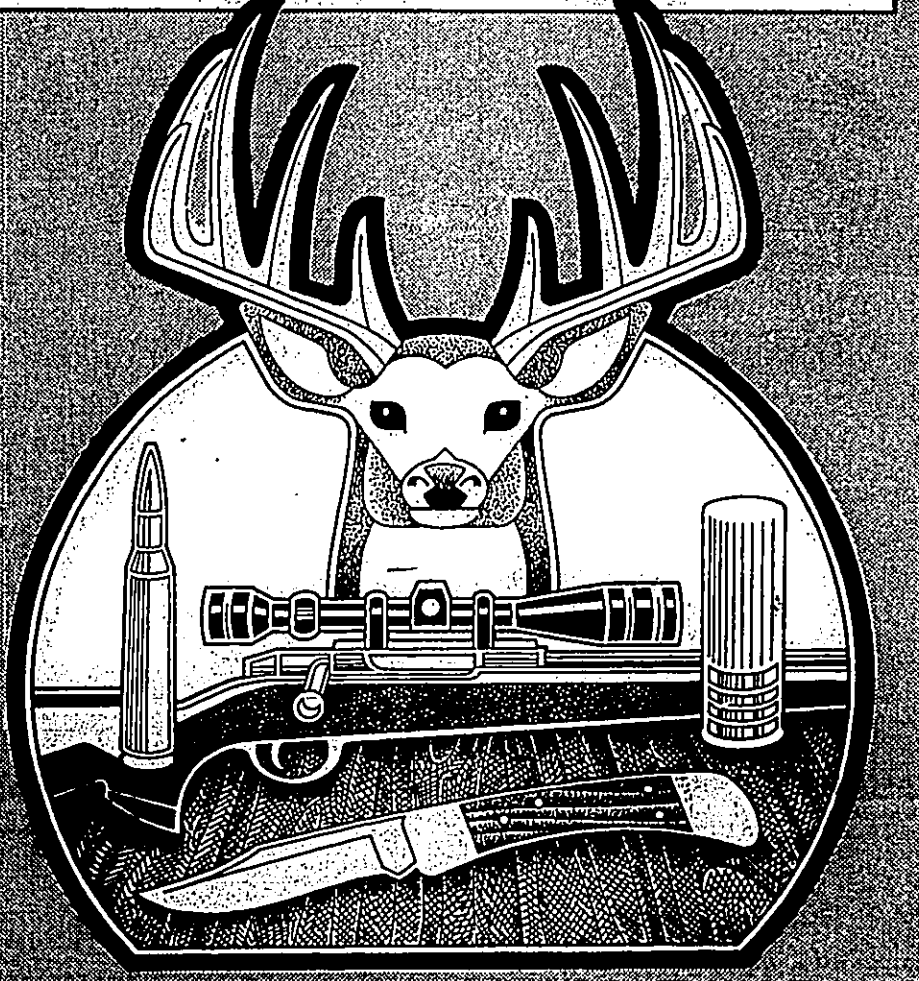

### Baylor selected as WHI clinical center

HOUSTON — Baylor College of Medicine in Houston has been selected as a clinical center for the Women's Health Initiative (WHI), the first comprehensive study of women's health undertaken in the United States.

The National Institutes of Health (NIH) today announced that Baylor and 23 other institutions across the country will join the 16 vanguard centers funded last year to conduct a long-term study of cardiovascular disease, breast cancer, colorectal cancer, and osteoporosis, all leading causes of death in postmenopausal women. The WHI will involve about 163,000 women nationwide.

Baylor will receive \$8.3 million over the next 11 years to support its center and the largest clinical trial in the college's history. More than 3,000 postmenopausal women ages 50 to 79 will be recruited from the Houston area for the study, and their health will be followed for an average of nine years in one of two groups: an observational study group and a clinical trial group.

The clinical trial is designed to provide definitive answers to seven questions about postmenopausal women:

- Does estrogen replacement therapy (ERT) and/or progestin plus estrogen replacement therapy (PERT) reduce incidence of cardiovascular disease?
- Does ERT and/or PERT reduce osteoporosis-related bone fractures? (Osteoporosis is a weakening of bones after menopause.)
- Does ERT increase the risk of endometrial and breast cancer, and does PERT increase the risk of breast cancer?
- Does low-fat diet reduce incidence of breast cancer and colorectal cancer?
- Does low-fat diet reduce incidence of coronary heart disease?
- Does a calcium and Vitamin D supplement reduce hip fractures?
- Does a calcium and Vitamin D supplement reduce incidence of colorectal cancer?

The observational study will provide information about risk factors for heart disease, cancer and osteoporosis in the general postmenopausal population. The information we get from this long-term, controlled study of women's health will confirm the preventive care and treatment methods doctors have been using for menopausal women, or show us better ways," said Dr. John Forey, principal investigator for Baylor's WHI Clinical Center.

The 2,270 participants in the observational study will provide health history and receive an initial physical exam. They will be re-examined every three years.

The 1,400 women in the clinical trial will participate in one of three treatment groups: hormone replacement therapy (ERT) with estrogen or estrogen and progestin, low-fat diet or HRT plus diet. Each group will have women who do not receive active treatment to serve as controls.

After one year of the study, a daily supplement of calcium and Vitamin D will be added to each treatment group. The study's impact will be enormous," said Dr. Jennifer H. Cousins, co-principal investigator and project director. "It is the largest clinical and observational study of postmenopausal women ever launched and is the first study of specific women-only health issues. It will have great significance in shaping the future of medical treatment for women."

Working with Forey and Cousins are Dr. J. Alan Hurd, co-principal investigator and clinic director, Dr. Raye Hurlwitz, investigator, both of the Baylor Department of Medicine, and Dr. Ron Young, investigator of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

One other WHI clinical center is located in Texas: The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio, Like Baylor, it is being funded for the first time this year.

### Children may benefit from SSI

The SSI program provides monthly benefits to more than a half million low-income children under age 18 who are blind or have disabilities. These children may qualify for disability benefits under SSI even if their parents do not. The children must meet Social Security's definition of disability or blindness in addition to meeting income, resources, and other eligibility requirements.

Children who have disabilities may now receive higher Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits as a result of a recent change in the way Social Security computes the effect of their parents' income on their monthly payment.

For a child who is under 18, unmarried, and living with parents, Social Security may count some of the parents' income and resources as the child's. This process is called deeming.

Under the new rule, Social Security will use a single formula to calculate how much of the parents' income is deemed to the child, whether the income is earned, unearned, or a combination of the two. The new rule applies only when one or both parents are working.

Two groups of children are encouraged to contact Social Security to see if the new rule affects their eligibility: (1) children whose applications for SSI benefits were filed before November 1992 and who were denied benefits based on their parents' income and (2) children for whom no application was filed because it was believed their parents' income would make them ineligible.

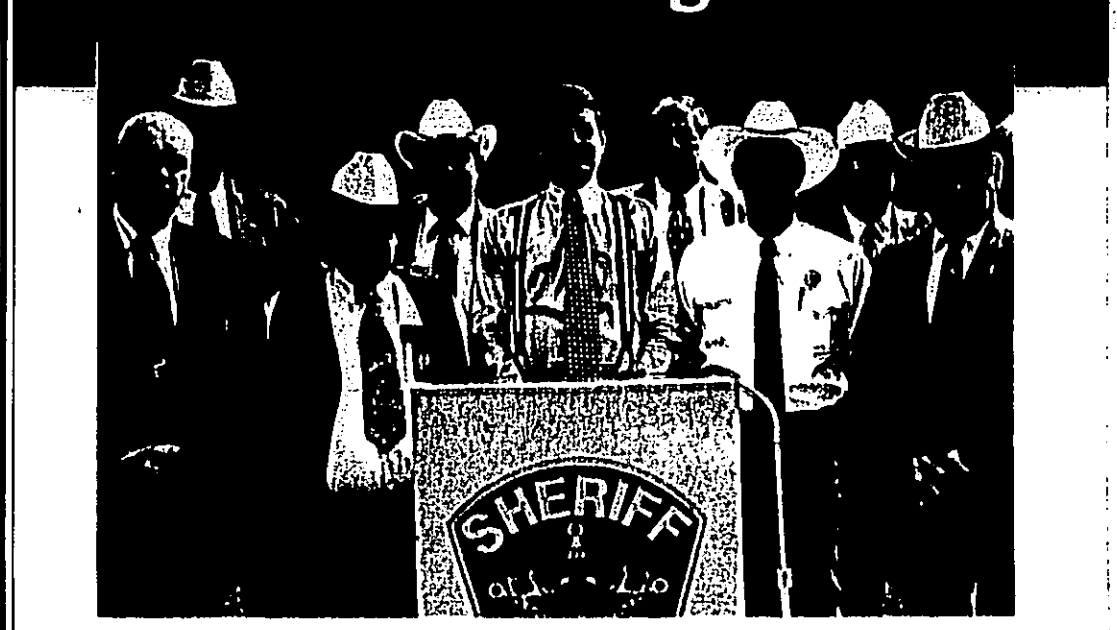

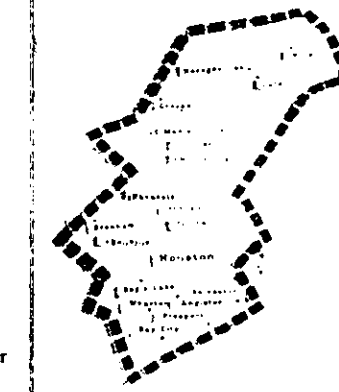

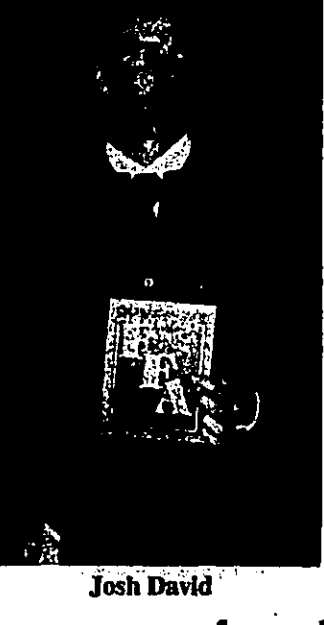

Next week the Eagles will play this season's final game against the Orangefield Bobcats who defeated the Kuntze Lions 28-6 last Friday night.

"The Orangefield team is just now recovering from this seasons early injuries, not unlike our team. It should be a good game," said McCallion.

The Warriors will be looking forward to playing their final game also this Friday, which will be played against Kirbyville.

The first scoring drive last Friday night began when the Eagles fielded a punt on the Warriors 44. A series of plays featuring Allen Adams as chief ball carrier with Edmond Lewis and Raymond Prevost clearing his path brought play in to the 11 yard line. 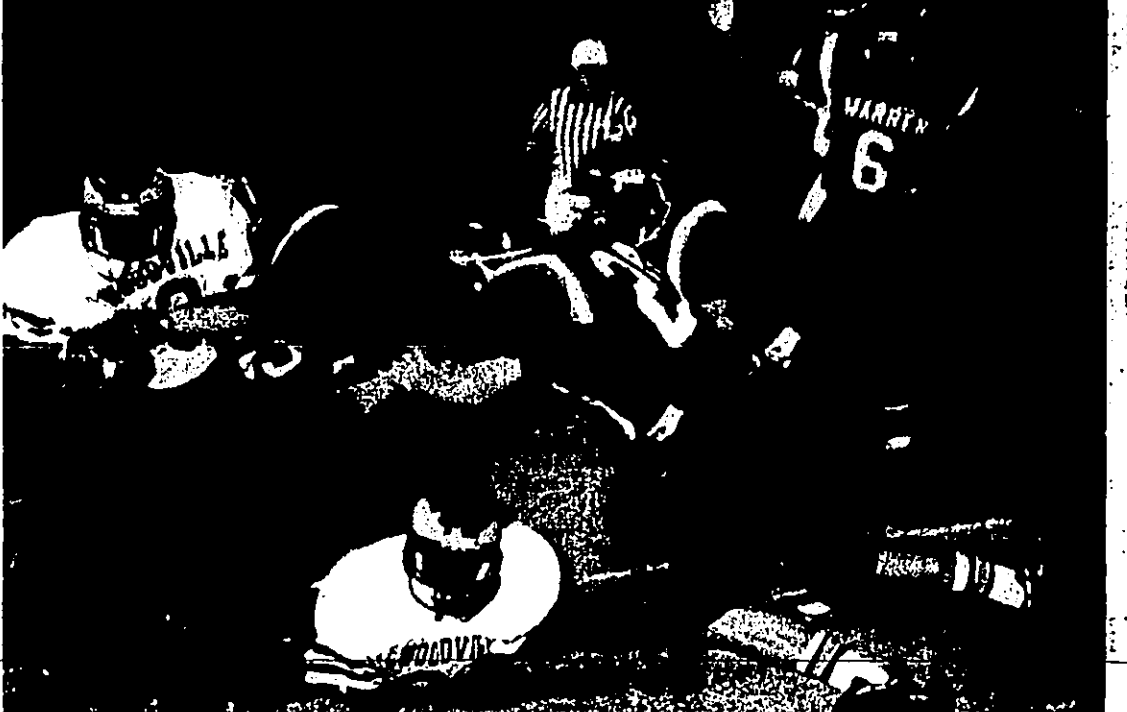

## Warren Junior High adopts block schedules

WARREN - This year for the first time, students at Warren Junior High are on block scheduling, a system which provides students with four 80-minute classes a day, rather than seven 45-minute classes.

Fewer classes of longer duration allow teachers to go more into depth in the different subjects, according to some education theorists.

Ms. Bettie Yates, Warren ISD school superintendent, says the plan was implemented after studying block scheduling at Kountze. She feels that it will benefit the students because the longer period will arouse the interests of many students.

Students currently attending Warren Junior High are quoted as saying, "It's really cool! We only have four classes a day!"

Most teachers support block scheduling because they have more teaching time and there is less movement in the halls, which means fewer class interruptions. However, there are a few who disapprove of the whole system. One possible drawback is that the students forget everything that they learn in the interval between classes, causing the teachers to review everything they did two days before.

Despite these arguments, block scheduling has been proven to be efficient in some Texas schools. Next year this system will be introduced into the Warren High School, according to Ms. Yates.

These reports originate as W-2 Forms or magnetic tapes for wage earners or Schedule SE's for the self-employed. A small percent of these reports, due to improper completion, cannot be initially posted to individual work records and recontact with the employer and worker is necessary. In situations where the employer is no longer in business and the worker cannot be located, the earnings cannot be posted. To protect their earnings records, each worker should ensure that their Social Security number and name are correct on their pay stubs and W-2 Forms. The Social Security number

## Credits given for social security work

**LUFKIN** — Some people are confused about work requirements for Social Security benefits. Some associate work credits with the amount of the benefit they will receive.

This is not true. Work credit determines only eligibility for a benefit. Before any Social Security benefits can be paid, a worker must have enough credit for work covered by Social Security to be eligible - or insured, as it is called.

The job itself determines if a worker is covered under the Social Security system. This is set by law and presently at least nine out of every ten jobs are covered. The tax rate itself is also set by congress. However, the base amount of earnings that tax is paid on is determined by the national increase in the average wage.

Before any Social Security benefits can be paid, a worker must have enough credit covered by Social Security to be insured. Social Security credits are measured in units called quarters of coverage (QCs). Both wage earners and self-employed people earn these credits based on their calendar-year earnings.

Church News Baylor selected as WHI clinical center

HOUSTON — Baylor College of Medicine in Houston has been selected as a clinical center for the Women's Health Initiative (WHI), the first comprehensive study of women's health undertaken in the United States. The National Institutes of Health (NIH) today announced that Baylor and 23 other institutions across the country will join the 16 vanguard centers funded last year to conduct a long-term study of cardiovascular disease, breast cancer, colorectal cancer and osteoporosis, all leading causes of death in postmenopausal women. The WHI will involve about 163,000 women nationwide. Baylor will receive \$8.3 million over the next 11 years to support its center and the largest clinical trial in the college's history. More than 3,600 postmenopausal women ages 50 to 79 will be recruited from the Houston area for the study, and their health will be followed for an average of nine years in one of two groups: an observational study group and a clinical trial group. The clinical trial is designed to provide definitive answers to seven questions about postmenopausal women: Does estrogen replacement therapy (ERT) and/or progestin plus estrogen replacement therapy (PERT) reduce incidence of cardiovascular disease? Does ERT and/or PERT reduce osteoporosis-related bone fractures? (Osteoporosis is a weakening of bones after menopause.) Does ERT increase the risk of endometrial and breast cancer, and does PERT increase the risk of breast cancer? Does a low-fat diet reduce incidence of breast cancer and colorectal cancer? Does a calcium and Vitamin D supplement reduce hip fractures? Does a calcium and Vitamin D supplement reduce incidence of colorectal cancer? The observational study will provide information about risk factors for heart disease, cancer and osteoporosis in the general postmenopausal population. "The information we get from this long-term, controlled study of women's health will confirm the preventive care and treatment methods doctors have been using for menopausal women, or show us better ways," said Dr. John Forey, principal investigator for Baylor's WHI Clinical Center. "The 2,200 participants in the observational study will provide a health history and receive an initial physical exam. They will be re-examined every three years. The 1,400 women in the clinical trial will participate in one of three treatment groups: hormone replacement therapy (HRT) with estrogen or estrogen and progestin, low-fat diet or HRT plus diet. Each group will have women who do not receive active treatment to serve as controls. After one year of the study, a daily supplement of calcium and Vitamin D will be added to each treatment group. "The study's impact will be enormous," said Dr. Jennifer H. Cousins, co-principal investigator and project director. "It is the largest clinical and observational study of postmenopausal women ever launched and it is the first study of specific women-only health issues. It will have great significance in shaping the future of medical treatment for women." Working with Forey and Cousins are Dr. J. Alan Hent, co-principal investigator and clinical director, Dr. Ray Hurwitz, investigator, both of the Baylor Department of Medicine, and Dr. Ron Young, investigator, of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology. One other WHI clinical center is located in Texas: The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio. Like Baylor, it is being funded for the first time this year. Children may benefit from SSI Under the new rule, Social Security will use a single formula to calculate how much of the parents' income is deemed to be available to the child, whether the income is earned, unearned, or a combination of the two. The new rule applies only when one or both parents are working. Two groups of children are encouraged to contact Social Security to see if the new rule affects their eligibility: (1) children whose applications for SSI benefits were filed before November 1992 and who were denied benefits based on their parents' income and (2) children for whom no application was filed because it was believed their parents' income would make them ineligible. The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 20; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecuring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecuring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$8.00), Call Transfer Disconnect Feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing Feature (\$6.35 to \$6.00). All current PLEXAR I customers will have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, switching to the new restructured PLEXAR I service, or switching to PLEXAR II service with ten or more lines.

The proposed PLEXAR II restructure will, among other things: (1) change the tariff offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 50% of the present worth of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR I customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in certain situations.

Dr. Ronald Roberts with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Lubbock said this summer's prolonged hot weather may have contributed to the crop.

The High Plains is well suited for pumpkin growth with a warm, sunny climate during the growing season and cool fall weather which is good for ripening.

## Sweepstakes scam does not deliver

BEAUMONT — Telemarketers are luring would-be victims with promises of sweepstakes winnings. The Better Business Bureau of Southeast Texas was notified by an Orange County Texas citizen that she was telephoned by an alleged representative of Publisher's Clearing House promising a \$215,000 grand prize.

The "catch" came when the telemarketer said the "winner" would be responsible for paying \$2,500 in taxes to a courier who would deliver her the award check within two hours. The woman, realizing the scam, said she was unable to pay that amount. Quick on his feet, the telemarketer counseled, saying Ed McMahon was standing nearby and agreed to reduce the tax amount to \$500. Tiring of the scheme, the woman hung up the telephone and never again heard from the caller and did not receive the alleged "award check."

## Shooting straight about gun safety

AUSTIN — Firearms are commonplace in most farm and ranch households, but familiarity does not stop accidents from occurring.

"Most firearm accidents happen while people are cleaning or hunting with guns," Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said. "Prevention is the best weapon against these firearm casualties."

Families should make sure that the home has a safe and secure storage place for guns that is beyond the reach of children and careless adults. Store firearms in an ammunition container, and keep both locked up.

Hunting is a natural sport for many rural families. Perry said that hunting accidents can be prevented by following these basic safety rules:

- Control the direction of your firearm muzzle. Carry your firearm safely. Keep it on one end and your finger off the trigger until you are ready to shoot.
- Identify your target and know what is beyond it.
- Be sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions and you have only the proper size ammunition for the firearm you are carrying.
- Unload firearms when not in use. Leave the action open. Firearms should be carried empty in cases and out of shooting areas.
- Never point a firearm at anything you do not want to shoot. Avoid all horseplay with firearms.
- Never climb a fence or tree, or jump a ditch or log with a loaded firearm. Never pull a firearm toward you by the muzzle.
- Never shoot a bullet at a flat or hard surface or water. During target practice, be sure to wear eye protection.
- Avoid alcoholic beverages or other mood-altering drugs before or while shooting.

"The best advice for gun safety is to treat every firearm with the same respect due a loaded firearm," Perry said.

## Birth records reflect continued popularity of some babies' names

AUSTIN — Among the details compiled in the annual report of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of Vital Statistics, perhaps the item most of interest to new parents is the list of most popular baby names.

Richard Bays, chief of the Bureau of Vital Statistics, said that since 1990, the list of most frequently given names of newborns has been a standard entry in the report. The list is compiled from birth certificates filed at the bureau.

Bays said that some names recurred yearly on the list. "Sometimes only the rankings among the top 10 change," he added.

"However," he said, "it's unusual to see celebrities' names appear. We suspect that ideas for some names are inspired by popular movie and TV stars, as well as by sports figures."

In the order of most often chosen, the 10 most popular names for boys born in Texas during 1993 were Michael, Christopher, Jose, Joshua, David, Matthew, Daniel, John, Jacob and Jonathan.

For girls born during the same period, the 10 most frequently given names were Ashley, Jessica, Sarah, Taylor, Samantha, Stephanie, Brittany, Amanda, Victoria and Emily.

Contrasting the 1993 list with the 1992 list, there were changes in ranking and additions and deletions on both the boys' list and the girls' list. On the 1993 list for boys, Jose and Jacob replaced Justin and James. On the list for girls, Taylor, Victoria and Emily replaced Elizabeth, Lauren and Jennifer.

Besides compiling separate name lists for all boys and girls born during 1993, the report also provides similar lists representing ethnic groups. Although those lists contain many of the same names as the overall roster, there are some exceptions.
