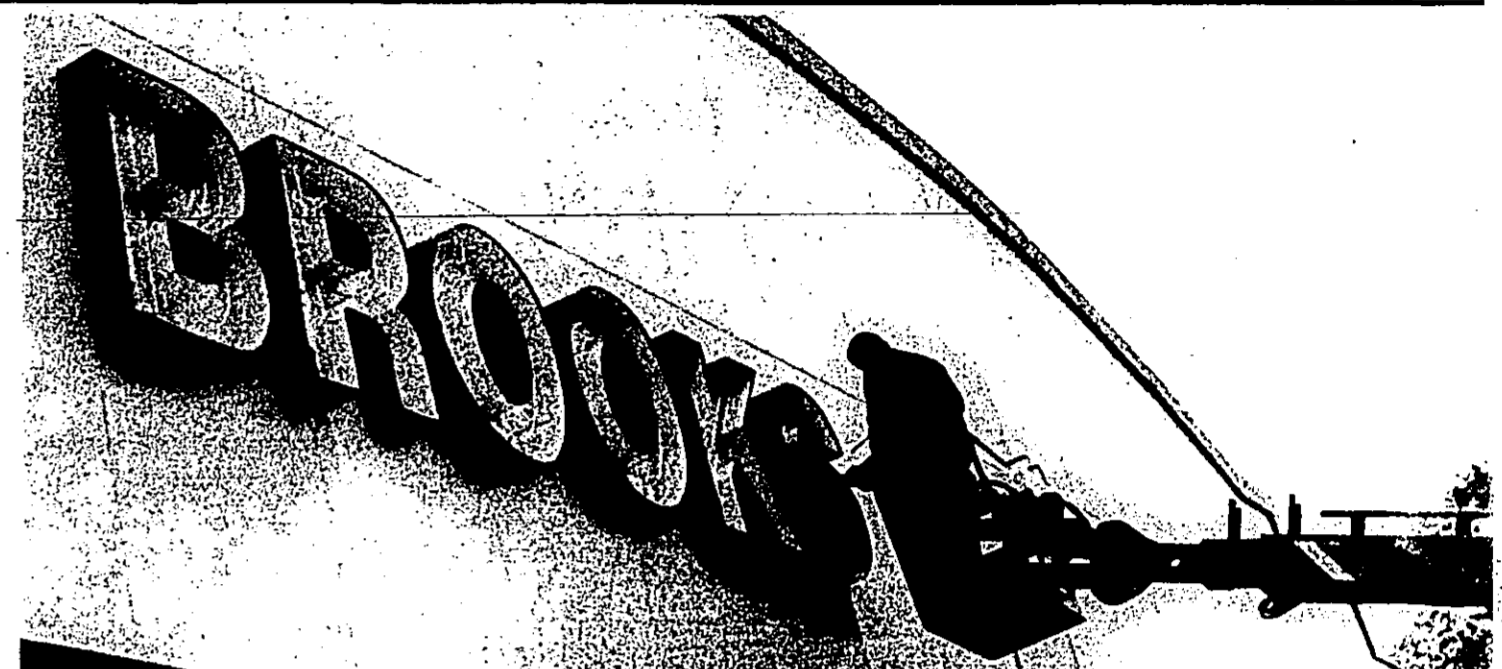

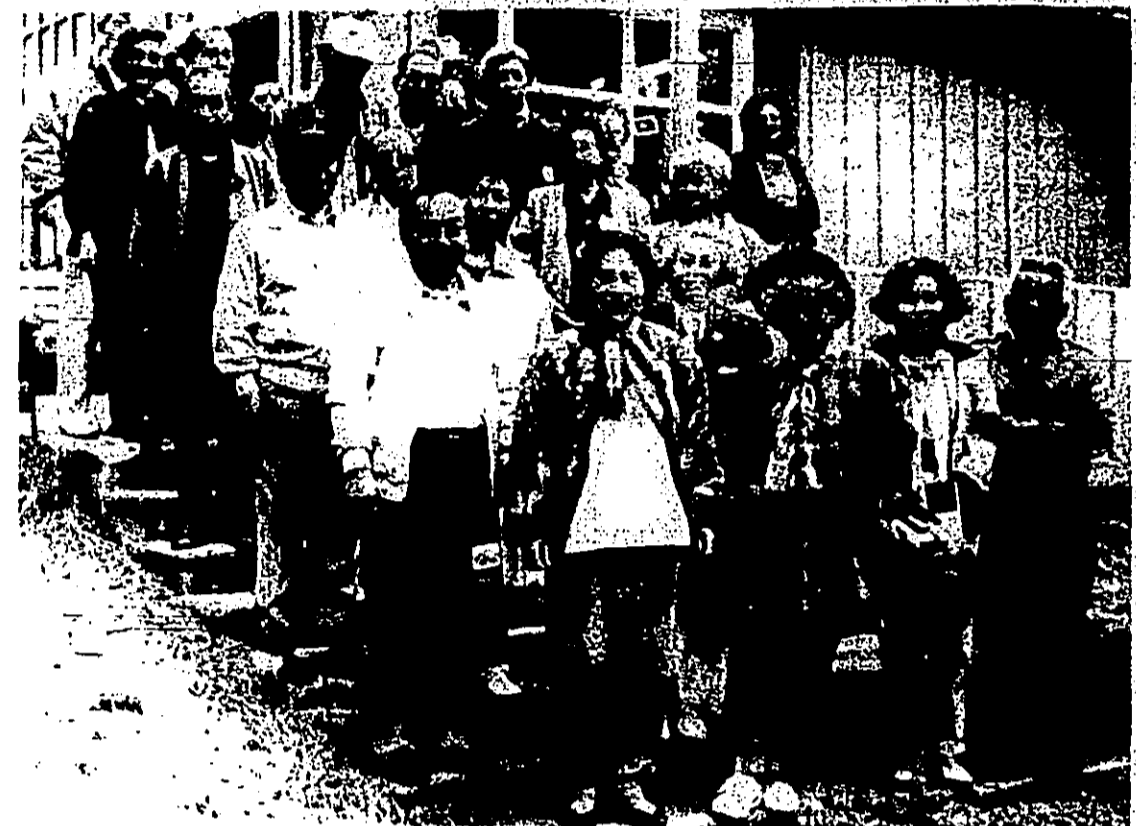

## Readers Write

### 'A yell, a scream, a shout'

Dear Editor: It has been most interesting to see the outcome of this year's elections. This was and is a yell, a scream, a shout from the majority of the people saying that they are dissatisfied with the status quo in Washington. We, the people, are fed up with the unbridled arrogance that has been so prevalent among elected officials. We will be watching what happens now very closely. Speaking of the arrogance and complete disregard for the people of this great nation, brings up the subject of the GATT/WTO. (If you are unfamiliar with this, GATT stands for General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade and WTO stands for World Trade Organization.) The GATT consists of some 22,000 pages of text and will not be administered virtually all of the rules for global trade. GATT will create a new global institution, the WTO, which would be the decision making, administrative body for the implementation of GATT. The membership of these organizations would consist of some 117 nations with each having only one vote. This means that in the event of a trade dispute in a developing nation, with possibly less than one million population, would have the same vote as the United States. Let's get real! Of the 117 nations, 83 percent are developing nations. If we look at the voting records of these nations in the UN, we can see that they voted against the United States on half or more of the votes in 1993. GATT/WTO members who voted against the United States are Kuwait, Egypt, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain, Brazil, Mexico, India, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore, Indonesia, Columbia, Venezuela, Chile, Peru - as well as China, a GATT/WTO applicant. There are some of the nations that GATT/WTO could ultimately cause the subjugation of the interests of the United States to theirs.

It is my firm conviction that the people of this great country need to know more about GATT/WTO. We do not currently know enough about the matter. However, the current members of the 103rd Congress are scheduled vote on GATT/WTO between Nov. 29 and Dec. 2, 1994. This lame-duck Congress is set to saddle our nation with something far worse than NAFTA. We should not let this happen. We must contact our representatives and senators immediately. We have to let them know that too much is at stake to leave their constituents in the dark and pull another fast one on us. Call your congressman FREE by dialing 1-800-768-2221 or 1-800-273-3273. Then ask for him or her. Please ask that any vote on GATT/WTO be delayed until the 104th Congress convenes. We deserve more information. Contact them today!

When I have to take steroid drugs to reverse potentially life-threatening symptoms, I gain weight. Most people associate weight gain with feeling good, but I do not feel good. I almost always have over-the-counter medicine, so I can't be as active as I would like. Most people associate inactivity with laziness, but I am not lazy. Lupus attacks many organ systems. Although the symptoms vary from patient to patient, they can include joint pain, muscle aches, skin rash, photosensitivity, hair loss, inflammation of the membranes around the heart or lungs, anemia and other blood abnormalities, kidney involvement, and others. Even physicians tend to associate celiac symptoms in many organ systems with hypochondria, but I am not a hypochondriac. I am thankful that lupus is not contagious, because the other features of this disease are hard enough to deal with. In lupus the immune system, which is supposed to protect the body against environmental and infectious agents, turns against itself and attacks and destroys healthy tissue. Without treatment even a mild case of lupus may become life-threatening. Although some of your readers may not have heard of lupus, it is a very common disease. It is more prevalent than muscular dystrophy, cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, leukemia, or cystic fibrosis. It is more widespread among black women than sickle cell anemia. Lupus affects all races, age groups, socioeconomic groups, and both sexes. However, 90 percent of lupus patients are women, with the usual age of onset being between 16 and 36.

In 1994 I founded a nonprofit organization called the L.E. Spurger Club. We publish a fanzine newsletter with up-to-date, informative articles on subjects that are important to lupus patients. Anyone who would like more information should send a large, self-addressed envelope with two stamps.

### PROfessions

By David Rest You don't often hear a good word on the subject of war. Nearly all of what we run across in the news these couple of years has been solidly against. Now I'm not about to come out and tell you war is categorically good, or that we need more of it. War is a bad thing. But it is not all bad. I spent nearly all of 1944 in China, on the way. A pathetically small 14th Air Force under Major General Claire Lee Chennault was fighting with its back to the wall, holding off a Japanese force that was superior by every rational criterion. We were ridiculously outnumbered both on land and in the air. The Jap planes were faster, lighter turning, and longer ranging than ours. We were at the very end of the longest supply line on earth, over 15,000 miles, the long way around. If that wasn't enough to 'physic' a snowbird, the last 400 miles of that trip had to be by air, over the highest mountain range in the world. They called it the Hump. But folk we fighter pilots in China had the best war of any body. Flying the shark-faced B-40's made great fun of the Japs. The Flying Tigers, we were a lot more in a position to live up to. Most of us were young. We were less experienced than the original AVG, the necessary group who put the very first bone in the crew of the Japanese. But we were led by the same man who created the AVG, the necessary one of the greatest combat leaders in American history. And we got the job done. We heard of esprit de corps, the single-minded fighting spirit that sometimes rises up in combat units. We had it. You didn't hear it spoken of, but it was there. We

## Texas Baptists expand limits of cooperation

AMARILLO — Texas Baptists voted at their recent annual meeting to expand the definition of their Cooperative Program giving plan. And that should send the national Southern Baptist Convention a message that Texas Baptists favor "states' rights over federal control," according to newly re-elected convention president Jerold McBride.

McBride, pastor of First Baptist Church, San Angelo, was elected by acclamation to a traditional second annual term as president of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Other officers elected were first vice president Charles Davenport, pastor of First Baptist Church, Tulsa, and second vice president, Charles G. Dodson, pastor of Central Baptist Church, Carthage.

About 6,200 messengers to the 109th annual BGCT session approved with one vote a resolution to expand the program to include a \$63.5 million giving goal, including a \$41 million Texas Baptist budget for 1995. Gifts will be distributed 64.5 percent to Texas causes and 35.5 percent to worldwide missions.

BGCT messengers also approved a report of their strategy council calling for Texas Baptists to "share Jesus with every person in Texas by the year 2000."

In a key item of business, convention messengers approved recommendations of the Cooperative Missions Giving Study Committee. The 220-member committee was appointed by McBride to discover ways to "enhance cooperative missions giving among all Texas Baptists."

Texas Baptists broadened the definition of the Cooperative Program giving plan to include "Texas only" gifts of church-directed gifts to non-Southern Baptist convention worldwide causes such as the International Cooperative Baptist Fellowship or the international Baptist World Alliance.

Traditionally, the Cooperative Program unified giving plan has been a voluntary partnership strictly between churches, state conventions and the national Southern Baptist Convention. The convention rejected both a minority report from five members of the committee and a substitute amendment from the floor.

Cecil Ray of Georgetown, chairman of the study committee, urged adoption of the committee's recommendations as a way to live "breathing room essential to keeping Texas Baptists working together."

Approval of the expanded Cooperative Program does not mean the BGCT is pulling away from the SBC, McBride said.

"It's not a distinction, but we're saying, 'It's our decision how we will give our funds,'" McBride said he believed the firing of Russell Dilday after 15 years as president of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, brought the SBC controversy home to many Texas Baptists. And, he said, it was the "catalyst" that spurred messengers to action at this year's convention.

"When the earthquake hit Texas, we finally took it seriously," he said.

In other business, Texas Baptists rejected a move to instruct their public policy agency to draft a more restrictive statement on abortion.

Messengers voted to refer back to the Christian Life Commission (CLC) a motion that would have instructed the BGCT to "renewance the exceptions for abortion" in the commission's position paper, "Abortion and the Christian Life."

The motion would have instructed the CLC to "rewrite the paper with clear biblical support for the preservation and protection of the unborn child."

HOUSTON — Whether in an inner city or a rural health clinic, physician assistants are proving to be a cost-effective source of care for greater numbers of patients, said Carl Fasser, director of the Physician Assistant (PA) Program at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Adding a physician assistant to a practice, Fasser says, allows the physician to spend more time with problematic cases while shifting some of the patient care to the PA.

David Bartlett, a physician assistant at an occupational/family practice office in Corpus Christi, sees the diversity of his job as one of the best benefits.

"At this practice, I see everything from pediatrics to geriatrics," said Bartlett, who graduated from Baylor's program in 1991. "My day may range from giving a safety lecture at a company to stitching a minor wound."

Other standard responsibilities include taking patient histories, giving physicals, identifying and managing health problems, and carrying out therapies discussed with the physician.

"Our PA graduates are well-prepared to work in hospitals, specialty clinics or general practices," Fasser said. "The current demand is definitely in ambulatory and primary care."

## 'Battle of the Bulldogs' set for Friday night

COLMESNEIL - The Colmesneil Bulldog's will scrap it out with the Dawson Bulldog's in Centerville Friday night for the Area Champion Title in the second round of post-season play.

The Dawson team is advancing to the Area playoffs after defeating the state-ranked Tenaha team 14-8 in an "errorless" B-District playoff game last Friday night.

Dawson Head Coach Kevin Childers credits his team's success this season largely to his defense, noting also the talents of senior Chris Matthews who was named First Team "All-State" player in his junior year for his push in the middle linebacker position.

"His defense was tough," said Colmesneil's Head Coach Mike Jacobs, referring to last Friday night's game where Dawson defeated Tenaha.

"Everyone was doing what they were supposed to be doing, and offensively, they played an errorless game. They're gonna be tough."

Dawson's defensive line is helped largely by their 6'3", 250 lb. sophomore Daniel Kelly who plays on both sides of the ball, and their defensive ends, Sandy Johnson and Charles Ford, who are "very effective" in putting the pressure on pass plays, according to Childers.

Last Friday night the Dawson defense sacked three of Tenaha's passers and was able to recover a number of fumbles that they had forced, turning possession over to their offensive unit that is also outstanding.

Dawson quarterback Craig Dunn threw for 625 yards so far this season, with 700 rushing yards tallied to his credit, while their running backs Jackson McConnell and Michael Wren each rushed for over 1,000 yards on the season.

"Offensively, we're in the ball well, we're able to keep teams off balance with the pass," said Childers, "but the Colmesneil team is very well coached, they don't make mistakes, it'll be a good game."

He added, "When you get this far into the play-offs, it's pretty much the second round of playoffs this week. The Colmesneil Bulldog's have worked their way to this game with an 8-2 season record, their best coming in the last two weeks of regular season play. They also lost to the team who took the District, Burkeville, with their only other loss coming when Ewaldale squeaked out a 29-28 victory, cashing in on some "big" plays.

The Colmesneil Bulldog's averaged 377 yards per game this season, and scored 44 touchdowns; tallying out with 295 points, for a four touchdown per game average.

Where the Dawson defense boasts it's strength in being able to put pressure on the pass plays, it shouldn't rule the Colmesneil team whose success has come primarily in being able to break through on the ground, with Greg Bennett scrambling for 2,031 yards this season, and all but two of the Bulldog's ten ball carriers averaging over five yards per carry.

Leading the Colmesneil offense will be as has been all season, Cody Wilder who was credited for 116 solo tackles, and 38 assists, for a total of 154. Marcus Allen who has also been a major key player for the Bulldog's, having pounded out 96 solos and 36 assists.

Throw in Ray Dobbins, Bo Bandy and Jack Jacobs, and the Bulldogs rank right up there with the best of the best, and should be able to do more than make this game interesting, but a defensive battle is sure to be waged.

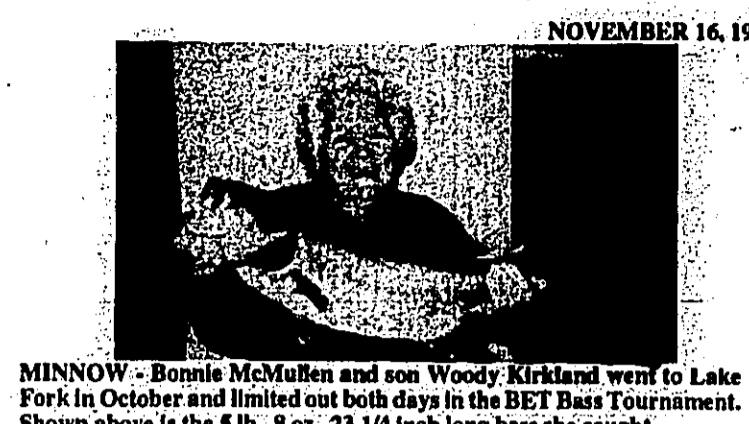

### Don't let bacteria gobble up your turkey

HOUSTON— Don't go for the "quick thaw" and let bacteria gobble up your turkey this Thanksgiving, says an infectious diseases expert at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"Turkey and other poultry defrosted outside the refrigerator too long are prone to contamination with salmonella bacteria," said Dr. A. Clinton White Jr., an assistant professor of medicine at Baylor. "Once the turkey has thawed, it's important to cook it thoroughly to kill bacteria and avoid serious illness."

Salmonella poisoning is caused by bacteria that develop in raw or undercooked meats and other foods stored in a warm environment. When eaten, bacteria grow in the intestines, causing stomach pain, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and dehydration.

"Over-the-counter anti-diarrheal medications can help soothe your stomach pain, but drink plenty of fluids to treat dehydration," White said. "If the symptoms worsen, see your doctor."

Other foods like eggs and shellfish can also pose a health risk.

If your holiday recipes call for eggs, be sure to purchase clean, uncracked eggs, and keep them refrigerated. Avoid serving raw or undercooked egg yolks, which increase the risk of infection.

People who enjoy eating raw shellfish, like oysters, over the holidays should be cautious, says White.

"Eating raw oysters is not a good idea, especially for people with liver disease, because it harbors cholera-like organisms called vibrios which cause life-threatening infections," he said.

White advises washing your hands before preparing foods to reduce bacteria transmission.

"You can contaminate the turkey with common bacteria that you carry on your skin," White said.

Here are more safe holiday cooking tips:

- Don't use the same knife you cut raw poultry with on other foods. Wash cutting boards, counter tops and cooking utensils with hot, soapy water.
- Avoid sampling rare beef or poultry.

- Check the temperature of your turkey with a cooking thermometer to make sure that turkey has been cooked thoroughly.
- Thoroughly wash lettuce, peeled potatoes and other vegetables and fresh fruits.
- Throw away eggs kept for more than a month.
- Refrigerate leftovers immediately.

"The key is to be prudent when handling food," White said. "If you take precautions, you'll have a safe and enjoyable holiday."

### Open House on New National Forests and Grasslands

LUFKIN — The U.S. Forest Service will hold a series of Open Houses at Ranger Districts throughout East Texas during November. Each Open House will afford the public with an opportunity to meet U.S. Forest Service employees and hear about the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) and Revised Land Management Plan for the National Forests and Grasslands in Texas. The DEIS and Plan will guide management of 637,451 acres of National Forests in East Texas and 38,098 acres of National Grasslands in North Texas.

Each Open House will give visitors the unique advantage of hearing directly from the documents' authors on what the possible future of the National Forests and grasslands in Texas might look like. In addition, local members of each of Texas' National Forests will be available to discuss their views on how the new plan and DEIS will affect the various forests.

"We invite everyone to visit us and hear first hand what the future might hold for them in Texas," says National Forests and Grasslands in Texas Supervisor Alan G. Newman. He explained that the Open House gives people an opportunity to hear directly from the authors, how and why the new documents were written. "We look forward to seeing the owners of the National Forests and Grasslands in Texas at the Open House," he added. "According to Newman, the draft plan "strikes a balance" between the uses and values of the public's interest and the capability of the land to support them."

The new management strategies outlined in each alternative emphasize ecosystem management principles and the best ways to accomplish the Forest Service's mission.

"The preferred alternative sustains the uses and values best for future generations and does it in an economically sound manner," Newman concluded.

The public will have an opportunity to review and comment on these alternative management strategies, and the Forest Service's preferred alternative, until December 15, 1994.

## Shoulder problems can plague all athletes

HOUSTON — What do a young, multi-million dollar professional athlete and a 51-year-old secretary who plays tennis and swims have in common? It could be shoulder problems, according to an orthopedic surgeon at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Some professional athletes have surgery as soon as possible for a quick return to action. But, for most age-related injuries, a more conservative approach involving therapy is taken to minimize further injury.

"Simple resistance exercises such as those done with large rubber bands, as well as slow stretching in the upper body are usually part of the therapy," said Gabel. "They may also help build shoulder strength and help offset the effects of aging."

The rotator cuff is tendon that forms a circular joint where four large muscles support and move the humerus — the upper arm bone. If damaged or torn, the top of the humerus can press into the undersurface of the shoulder, resulting in sharp pain and stiffness.

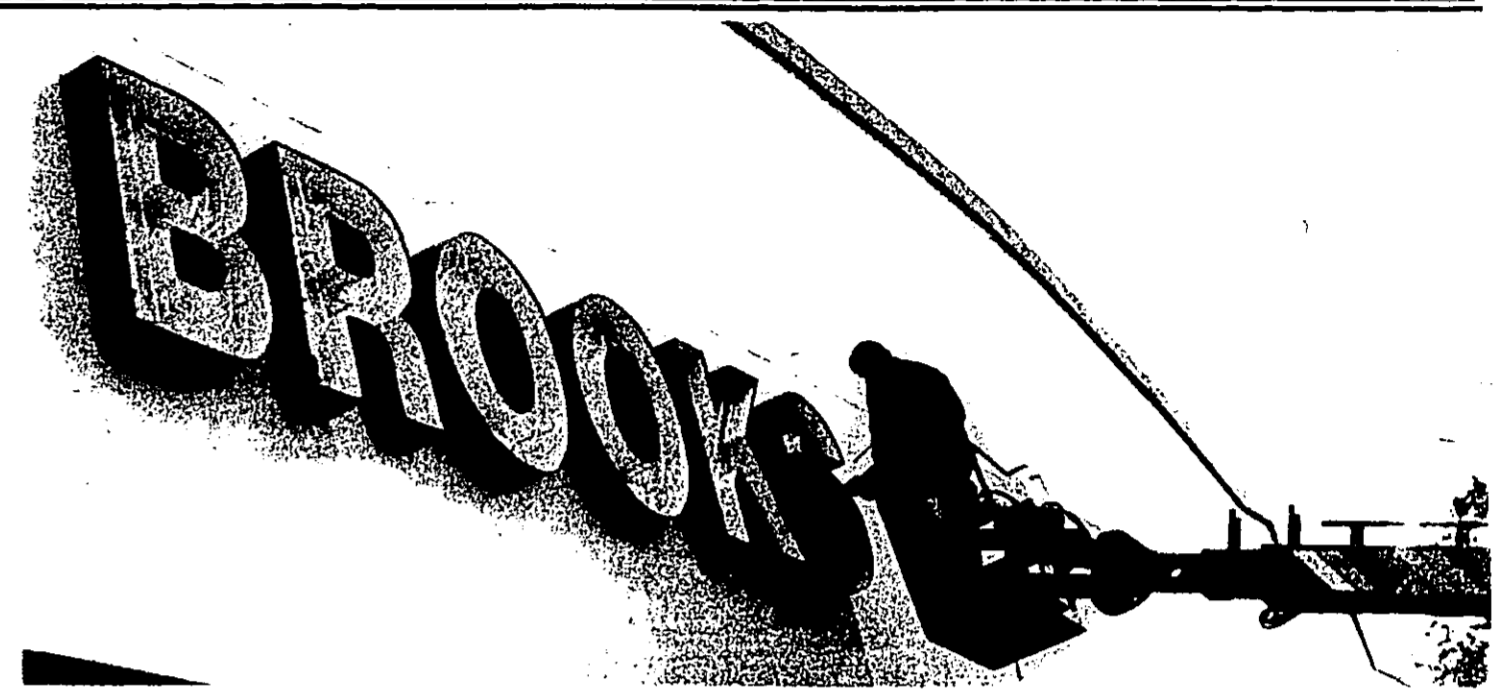

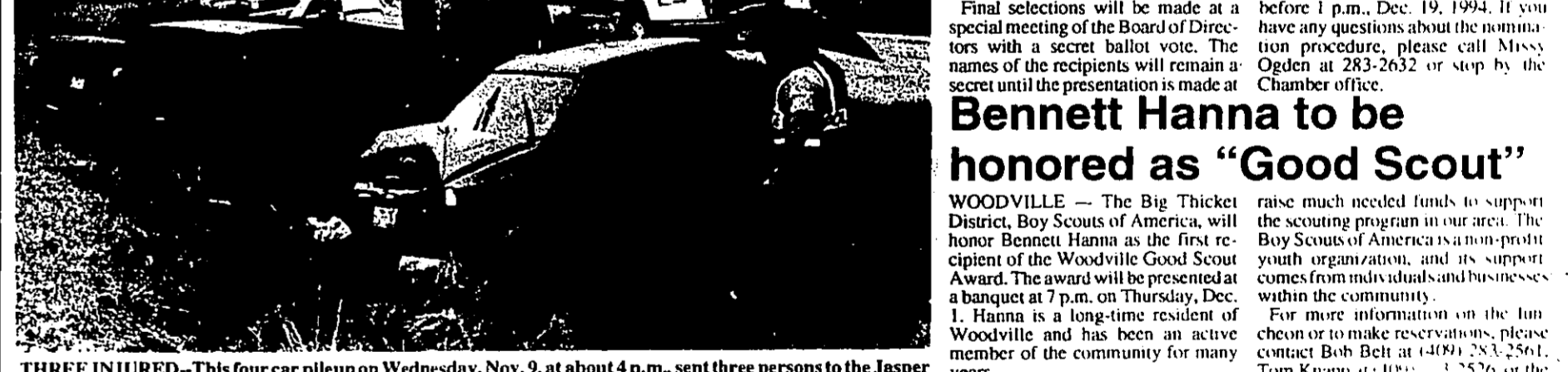

PROfessions

By David Rust You don't often find a good word on the subject of war. Nearly all of what I've run across in the past couple of years has been solidly against. Now I'm not about to come out and tell you war is categorically good, or that we need more of it. War is a bad thing. But it is not all bad.

I spent nearly all of 1944 in China, on the way. A pathetically small 44th Air Force under Major General Claire Lee Chennault was fighting with its back to the wall, holding off a Japanese force that was superior by every rational criterion. We were ridiculously outnumbered both on land and in the air. The Japanese were faster, fighter turning, and longer ranging than ours. We were at the very end of the longest supply line on earth, over 15,000 miles, the long way around. If that wasn't enough to physics a snowbird, in the last 400 miles of that trip had to be by air, over the highest mountain range in the world. They called it the Hump. But folks, we fighter pilots in China had the best war of any.

Flying the shark-faced P-40's made former famous by the Flying Tigers, we had ferocious reputations to live up to. Most of us were young. We were less experienced than the original AVG, the mercenary group who had been sent to the Far East in the greatest combat loss in American history. And we got the job done. You've heard of esprit de corps, the single-minded fighting spirit that sometimes rises up in combat units. We had it. You didn't hear it spoken of, but it was there. We believed in what we were doing. We took immense pride in doing it. And we believed without a moment's doubt that it would do it better than anybody else, anywhere.

Add to this the salutation of being Chinese people. Before the AVG went into action, unescorted Japanese bombers had been using Chinese cities for bombing practice. But the Flying Tigers changed the rules of that game. From that time until the end of the war, such bombing as the Japs dared to try was almost entirely directed at our airfields, usually at night. The Chinese, for the first time in a decade, could rest easy. They knew very well that our presence there was what caused the change. And we could iterarily do no wrong in their eyes.

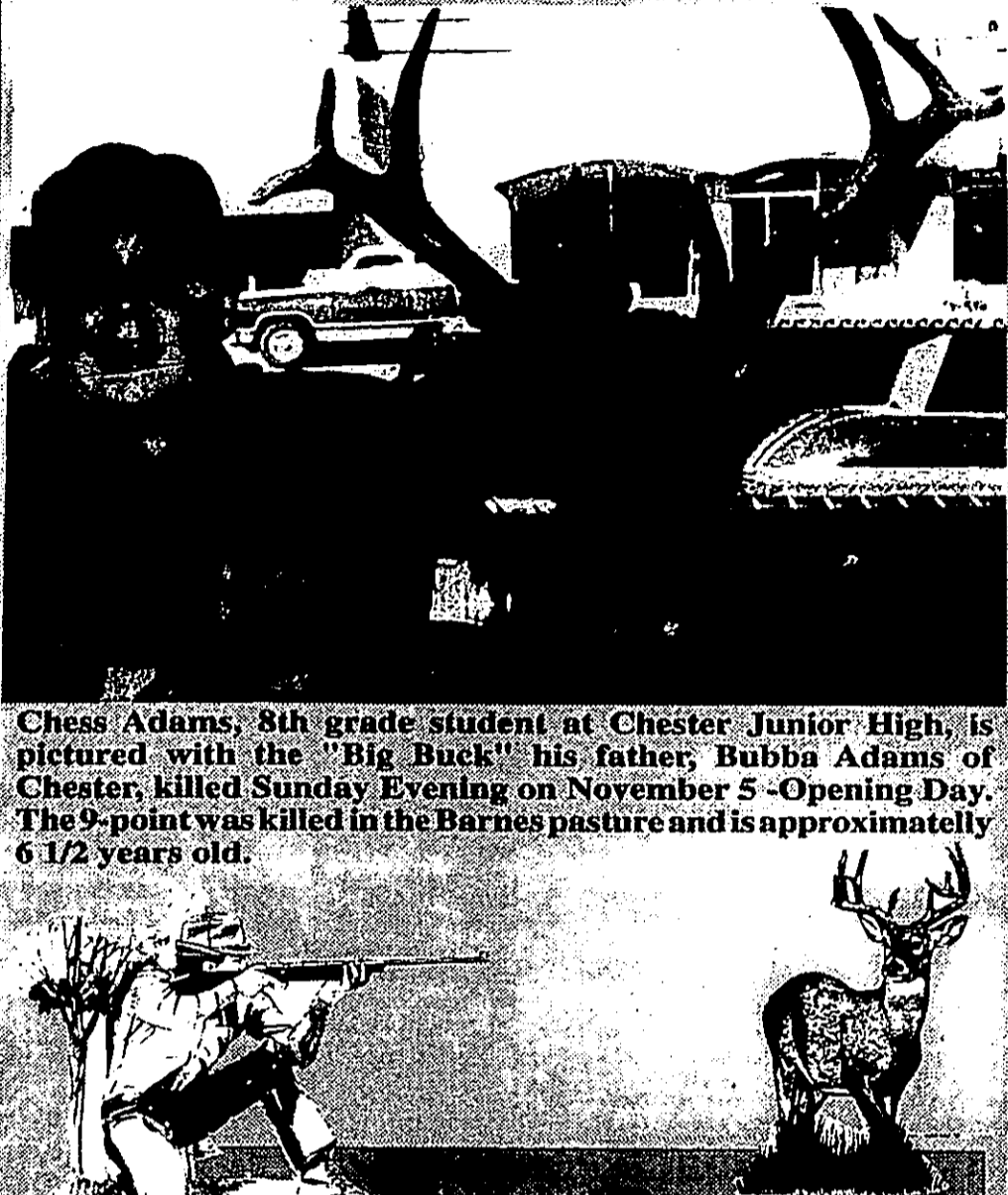

# Tyler County Sports 'Battle of the Bulldogs' set for Friday night

**COLMESNEIL** - The Colmesneil Bulldog's will scratch it out with the Dawson Bulldog's in Centerville Friday night for the Area Champion Title and the second round of post-season play.

The Dawson team is advancing to the Area playoffs after defeating the state-ranked Tenaha team 14-8 in an "errorless" B-District playoff game last Friday night.

Dawson Head Coach Kevin Childers credits his team's success this season largely to his defense, noting also the talents of senior Chris Matthews who was named First Team "All-State" player in his junior year for his push in the middle linebacker position.

"Their defense was tough," said Colmesneil's Head Coach Mike Jacobs, referring to last Friday night's game where Dawson defeated Tenaha.

"Everyone was doing what they were supposed to be doing, and offensively, they played an errorless game. They're gonna be tough."

Dawson's defensive line is helped largely by their 6'3", 250 lb. sophomore Daniel Kelly who plays on both sides of the ball, and their defensive ends, Sandy Johnson and Charles Ford, who are "very effective" in putting the pressure on pass plays, according to Childers.

Last Friday night the Dawson defense snagged three of Tenaha's passes and were able to recover a number of fumbles that they had forced, turning possession over to their offensive unit that is also outstanding.

Dawson quarterback Craig Dunn threw for 625 yards so far this season, with 700 rushing yards added to his credit, while their running backs Jason McConnell and Michael Wren each rushed for over 1,000 yards on the season.

"Offensively, we've run the ball well, we're able to keep teams off balance with the pass," said Childers, "but the Colmesneil team is very well coached, they don't make mistakes, it'll be a good game."

He added, "When you get this far into the play-offs, it's pretty much the team with the least penalties and mistakes, who doesn't turn the ball over who's gonna come out on top."

The Dawson Bulldog's are coming into this second round playoff game with a record of 6-5, after defeating Tenaha last Friday. They were 1-4 out of district, and 4-1 in district play, their only district loss going to Bremond, who went on to take the district title, and are also entering the second round of playoffs this week.

The Colmesneil Bulldog's have worked their way to this game with an 8-2 season record, their losses coming in the last two weeks of regular season play. They also lost to the team who took the District, Burkeville, with their only other loss coming when Evadale squeaked out a 29-28 victory, cashing in on some "big plays."

The Colmesneil Bulldog's averaged 377 yards per game this season, and scored 44 touchdowns, tallying out with 295 points, for a four touchdown per game average.

Where the Dawson defense boasts its strength in being able to put pressure on the pass plays, it shouldn't rattle the Colmesneil team whose success has come primarily in being able to break through on the ground, with Greg Beaman having scrambled for 2,031 yards this season, and all but two of the Bulldog's ten ball carriers averaging over five yards per carry.

Leading the Colmesneil defense will be as has been all season, Cody Widner who was credited for 116 solo tackles, and 38 assists, for a total of 154, Marcus Allen who has also been a major key player for the Bulldog's, having powered out 96 solos and 36 assists. Throw in Ray Dobbins, Bo Bendy and Jack Jacobs, and the Bulldogs rank right up there with the best of the best, and should be able to do more than make this game interesting, but a defensive battle is sure to be waged.

The "cougar" began last week as the Pirates started the season off by defeating both Chester and Leggett in scrimmages.

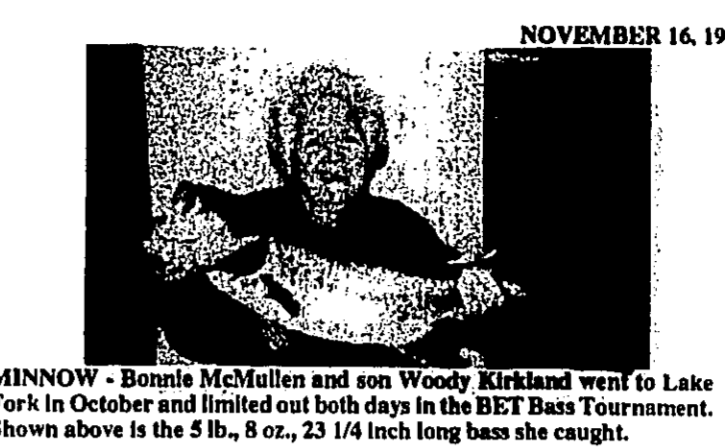
